Poultry Dominates Discussions at Groundwater Meeting

An environmentalist who was speaking during the public participation portion of the Eastern Shore Groundwater Committee meeting Tuesday asked Tyson Foods to be satisfied with the number of poultry houses it now has in Accomack County.

"We need you on the Shore," Ken Dufty said of the industry. "We're not your enemies." But, "We believe you have enough here. Stop the build-out."

The Tyson representative, Doug Baxter, made no reply but appeared to be accepting Dufty's remarks that his group sees the poultry industry's value. Dufty is head of the activist group, Citizens For Open Government. He

said real estate values have declined because of the influx of poultry houses.

The previous day, the State Water Control Board voted to support stiffer penalties for Tyson Foods for repeated wastewater and stormwater violations at a poultry plant in Temperanceville. The board levied a final penalty of \$30,160 on April 15, compared to an initial proposed penalty of \$16,500.

A report early this month from Delmarva Poultry Industry Inc. stated that the three state chicken industry increased its economic output by 18.6 percent in the past five years by producing 4.3 billion pounds of chicken worth \$3.4 billion in 2018. The 20,425

Neighbors Say 'I Don't' to **Wedding Venue Proposal**

All Linda Cleaveland wanted to do was host weddings on her 65-acre property with its view of Nassawadox Creek.

Northampton's senior planner, Kelley Lewis Parks, assisted her with the zoning application, and Cleaveland believed she was prepared to face the planning commission at the April 2 public hearing on the proposed event venue.

But she was not prepared for what the chairman of Northampton's board of supervisors, Spencer Murray, said "sounded more like an inquisition than it did a hearing."

"I apologize for that on behalf of the board and the staff," he said at the

April 9 supervisors meeting.

Planning commission staff "did not ask you all the questions that you should possibly have been asked" beforehand, Murray said.

Planning commissioner Janet Sturgis had said the application was unacceptable because it was incomplete. For example, neither a professionally drawn plat nor an aerial photo of the property bearing Parks' handwritten notes and drawings included all the required information.

At a second public hearing held by supervisors April 9, several neighbors of Linda Cleaveland and her husband,

employees of the industry earned \$784 million in wages in 2018, and the region's 1,302 chicken growers earned \$268 million in contract income. In total, income earned by employees and farmers associated with Delmarva's chicken industry was \$1.05 billion.

"We're not going to be able to tell the poultry people or anybody how to run their business," said Chairman John Coker, who is also a Northampton supervisor. "I'm certainly not going to tell somebody how to run their business. ... I don't know when enough is enough. I don't think the scientists can tell us. We're waiting for the scientists to tell us what really is going to happen to our water. We don't know yet. We all have our gut feelings."

"That's why we've been working so hard to promote the Columbia" aguifer. said Britt McMillan, the groundwater committee's hydrogeologist. McMillian

was referring to the committee's request that high water consumers take from the aguifer that replenishes the fastest. But only a few have done so.

A Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) water withdrawal permit in Painter was discussed because the vegetable packing facility has promised to take 80 percent of its water needs from the Columbia.

An informational session about all the pending DEQ groundwater withdrawal permits will be held at 6 p.m., April 30, Nandua High School. Public hearings will follow on other dates.

Also discussed briefly was an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) report on local Toxic Release Inventory (TRI) that was included in the committee's agenda packet.

McMillan referred to them as "nebulous," or vague, because it "doesn't tell whether it is a problem or not." He noted that the list is a "good place to start."

The majority of the releases were for nitrate which is not considered as dangerous as metals.

A staff summary showed "five jurisdictions report more on-site releases than Accomack County. They are Montgomery, Covington, Chesterfield, Hopewell, and Isle of Wight. Perdue releases almost 13 times as much as Tyson and is responsible for 92.7% of TRI released in Accomack County."

Peracetic acid, a bleaching agent for food starch and a component of antimicrobial washes for poultry carcasses and fruit is among the newer releases being seen. Baxter said the federal government requires its use. The staff characterized it as "a strong oxidizing agent and severe irritant to the skin, eyes, and respiratory system."

The toxics releases as related to each facility are:

Perdue:

- 1.07 million pounds nitrate compounds, up from 699,640 in 2016, and more than double from 2015.
- 76 pounds peracetic acid to water. up from 29 pounds in 2016,
- 75,900 pounds hydrogen sulfide to air,

down from 83,880 pounds in 2016.

- 56.996 pounds nitrate compounds to water, up from 31,053 pounds in 2016, and 22,332 pounds in 2015
- 30,441 pounds ammonia to air, up from 2,736 pounds in 2016
- 580 pounds of peracetic acid to air, up from 0.

KMX Chemical:

- 3,680 pounds ethylene glycol, up (up from 750 pounds) to air
- 346 pounds methanol, up from 250 pounds) to air

NASA-Wallops Flight Facility:

- 526 pounds polycyclic aromatic compounds are managed on-site via recycling compared to none in previous years.
- In 2015, there were air releases of 27 pounds of chromium and 246.07 pounds of lead.
- In 2016, there was an air release of 88 pounds of lead.
- In 2017, 18 pounds of Naphthalene and 88 pounds of lead, both as air releases.

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Furness Will Not Seek Reappointment After Term Expires June 30

Accomack school board member Audrey Furness announced Tuesday night that she will not seek reappointment, and her term will expire June 30.

She had four words of advice for the school board: "Hard work pays off."

It's a message she has also used to inspire many of the youth she has encountered through the years. Her time on the Accomack school board has spanned more than 30 years and eight superintendents.

"You all must continue to work together as a team and really respect each other at all times in order to always ... do what's best for our children," she told the school board.

Furness said even though she will no longer be a member of the board after June 30, she will continue to help in any way possible.

"You all know that I love you and everyone and everything that is a part of Accomack County's education," she said.

"Accomack County's better off for having you serve as many years as you have," Chairman Paul Bull said, and Vice Chairman Ronnie Holden also offered words of thanks and appreciation to Furness.

Due to health concerns, Furness has not been attending school board meetings in person. An Accomack school division policy allows board members to participate in meetings remotely via audio connection.

The school board selection committee must appoint Furness' replacement. Accomack citizens voted "yes" in 2017 for an elected school board, but the first school board election will not occur until November.

Three parents of Accomack students requested exemptions from a policy that prevents children from taking advanced placement (AP) classes unless they are at least 16 years old and either a junior or senior.

Courtney Harned, of Melfa, said, "Age does not indicate academic maturity. GPA (grade point average) and academic performance are accurate indicators of preparedness for the rigors of college courses."

All sophomores should have the op-

portunity to take AP classes through the Virtual Virginia online program, Harned said. Her son has at least a 3.5 GPA and has achieved advanced scores on the SOLs (Standards of Learning tests).

Elbert Adamos, of Onancock, is the parent of a straight-A student who wants to take Virtual Virginia AP courses next year as a 14-year-old sophomore. The student, whose birthday is in December, is the youngest in his class.

T.J. Johnson, of Accomac, also has a child who would like to take AP courses as a sophomore. He called Virtual Virginia an "excellent program ... just for us. It's designed for rural Virginians, it's not designed for the big city and suburban schools. It's about equity."

The school board granted exceptions for all three students.

Director of Secondary Education Karen Taylor said according to the policy in question, a student must be at least 16 or a junior, not necessarily both, to take AP classes. The policy will be reviewed next week, she said.

Connie Burford, who belongs to the Nandua High School after-prom committee, asked if the school division has a policy regarding funds raised by parents and community members. Her recent request for \$108 to buy decorations, out of \$13,000 raised, was denied. Holden said the superintendent would contact her.

Chief of Operations Mike Tolbert updated the school board on another of Burford's ideas, livestreaming videos of graduations for students' family and friends who cannot attend in person.

Tolbert said the program will not begin this year, because even though the school division has all the required audio equipment, it lacks video equipment.

Tolbert added that the school division pays a company to livestream audio at 24 events per year, all school board meetings, and it has not yet quoted a price to livestream video at another three to five events.

John Cleaveland, spoke in objection to the proposal, mostly because of noise and traffic concerns.

Mark Shaffer said Wellington Neck is a "quiet, residential area." Many residents walk and bike for exercise and the road is not wide enough to accommodate the number of vehicles a wedding venue would bring.

"I was always under the understanding that this is a residential area. I never once dreamt that there could be a business put in down Wellington Neck Road that would allow this influx of traffic," Shaffer said.

The area is zoned agricultural-rural business and an event venue is allowed with a major special-use permit.

Evelyn Witick, the Cleavelands' nearest neighbor, called the amplified music played at weddings "deafening," and she is "totally opposed" to the proposal.

Alfred Burger said, "I came here to retire, I don't want to have noise" in "our quaint little neighborhood."

Planning Commissioner Glen An-

ders calculated that 100 decibels of noise on the Cleaveland property would fade out to about 39 decibels as it traveled 1,149 feet across Nassawadox Creek.

According to Northampton's ordinances, outside noise should not be heard inside a residence above 55 decibels after 10 p.m., and it should not be heard outside on private property above 75 decibels after 11 p.m.

Nancy Bisker speculated that the Cleavelands may be planning to build a marina, and they may allow guests to arrive by plane and land on the Cleavelands' private, grass airstrip. She further speculated that the couple is seeking to increase the value of the property in hopes of selling it.

But none of the neighbors were as vocal as Roberta Kellam, who said she revoked her support of the Cleaveland's proposal based on misrepresentations made by John Cleaveland.

"This would transform a current residential conservation property into a full-fledged commercial venue with noise, music, potentially fireworks, traffic, and the potential for intoxicated clientele," she said. The concept is not in compliance with the county's comprehensive plan, which encourages commercial development in towns and villages, not down residential necks. Kellam said.

She disagreed with Parks' assessment that the Cleavelands' land could be considered a "historic heritage" property.

Allowing the property an exception to the zoning code would result in "spot zoning" and set a dangerous precedent, Kellam asserted.

She referred to the Cleavelands as an "elderly couple with no known prior experience running an event venue."

"We balance very carefully the rights of a property owner and the rights of adjacent property owners, and sometimes it's a very delicate balance, and sometimes ... you need the wisdom of Solomon to find the answer," Murray said.

In an April 3 email to Parks, Linda Cleaveland, a former wedding planner from Richmond, stated she wants to hold 20 to 30 events per year, an estimation consistent with her statement at the April 2 planning commission meeting that she would like to host about one wedding per week from May through September.

The email also stated Cleaveland wants to host between 150 and 200 guests per event – not up to 500 guests as suggested by Parks' notes on the zoning application.


Parks used a maximum of 500 guests per event as a general guideline when determining how much space was available on the property for parking. Another wedding venue, the Elkington estate that occupies 500 acres in Eastville, was permitted for a maximum of 500 guests.

Elkington Events is owned and operated by Elizabeth Dodd Russell, whose family can be traced back 13 generations on the Eastern Shore, according to the business' website.

As Murray reviewed the details of Cleaveland's proposal, Supervisor Robert Duer interjected, "Did we ask Elkington do to all this?"

"I don't believe we did," Murray said.
"Why are we going to let one person
... not do anything and then run the other one through the ringer?" Duer asked.

Not all of the Cleavelands' close neighbors oppose the event venue. Patricia Boyer, an adjacent property owner, said, "I have no objection at all."





She pointed out that water or air traffic would not be a problem because large vessels cannot navigate Nassawadox Creek and the Cleavelands' airstrip is only permitted for private use. Boyer recalled fewer than a half-dozen landings on the air strip within the last 20 years or more.

Regarding traffic and noise concerns, horse shows have been held in Wellington Neck, and many horse trailers have been driven down the road to the events that featured sound and music played through loudspeakers, and "as far as I know, nobody complained," Boyer said.

Denise Apple said, "So many people do not know how beautiful the Eastern Shore of Virginia is." She enjoys the peace and quiet of the neighborhood but also would like the Cleavelands to be able to share the beauty of the land with others and help them make "special memories."

Dr. Federico Molera noted neighbors objected when John Cleaveland's private airstrip was approved, but Molera recalls only one plane ever landing there. The neighbors' objection to the event venue is "exactly the same," he said.

He doesn't believe Linda Cleaveland will get enough business to hold 20 weddings per year, "but I hope she does, because she will bring people to the Eastern Shore that will buy houses around the neck" to enjoy the land and lifestyle.

When Murray recalled Cleaveland to the lectern, she said a recent phone call with Kellam resulted in a "total misunderstanding" of the proposed business and that Kellam said the Cleavelands would win "over her dead body" and hung up on her.

"This is a woman who's running for your seat, Mr. Murray," Cleaveland said.

Kellam did not deny the accusations. "Mrs. Cleaveland is just as aggressive in her way of speaking to me as I was to her," she said.

"We're going to have the drunks vomiting at our driveway ... relieving themselves at our driveway." Kellam said she has even caught tourists having sexual intercourse in her driveway.

"I don't find it very funny," she added, accusing supervisors of laughing about the situation.

Supervisor John Coker, who serves on the Eastern Shore of Virginia Tour-

ism Commission, felt "conflicted" because "this is clearly something that enhances tourism in the county."

Murray advised Linda Cleaveland to ensure the planning commission received all the information that Cleaveland shared with supervisors April 9.

Supervisors will vote on the matter after receiving a recommendation from the planning commission.

OPIOID LAWSUIT MOVED TO US DISTRICT COURT

Accomack County's lawsuit that blamed 53 pharmaceutical companies for the local opioid epidemic and asks for \$58.6 million in damages was moved from the county circuit court to U.S. District Court in Norfolk last week upon the request of two of the companies

Specgx LLC and Mallinckrodt LLC entered the notice of removal April 10 in Norfolk, just five days after the lawsuit was initially filed in Accomack. The fee to move the case was \$400.

Defendants are permitted to move the case without argument.

The case was assigned to District Judge Rebecca Beach Smith and referred to Magistrate Judge Robert J. Krask. The county has demanded a jury be impaneled to hear the allegations.

"Accomack County has been hit hard by the opioid epidemic," according to documents filed by Accomack County Attorney Cela J. Burge and lawyers from firms in Norfolk, Va., Texas, and Tennessee.

New Fire Marshal Orders \$55,300 Northampton High Repairs

The first inspection of Northampton High School by a new fire marshal resulted in \$55,300 of required improvements, Northampton County Finance Director John Chandler revealed earlier this month.

"I got a stupid question. What are the consequences if we don't (make the improvements)?" Supervisor Robert Duer asked.

Northampton schools superintendent Eddie Lawrence said the school would be closed.

"That's what I wanted you to say," Duer said.

The \$55,300 did not include the cost of additional improvements that were ordered by the fire marshal and are being disputed.

Equipment that is being replaced or upgraded includes smoke detectors, sprinklers, fire panels, emergency lights, and ballasts that regulate current to the lights.

Northampton supervisors passed the proposed budget appropriation unanimously.

The structural investigation of Northampton High School officially began March 19 with a kickoff meeting attended by Waller, Todd, and Sadler, the architectural firm awarded the job.

Also present were the Lynch Mykins structural engineering firm and representatives of the Northampton school board, board of supervisors, and county administration.

As of April 1, assessments of the high school's roof, interior, and mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems were complete. The assessment of the building's exterior was about 50% complete.

The written report on the investigation is expected in early to mid-May, or approximately six to eight weeks after the investigation's start.

Principal Ron Yorko, of Nandua Middle School, and Principal Shirley Auguste, of Occohannock Elementary School, updated the school board on their respective school improvement plans.

Yorko's plan for improving students' reading skills revolves around the Level Literacy Intervention (LLI). The intervention groups students together who read at the same level and "puts real books in kids' hands," he has said.

Four times per week, 39 middle schoolers receive the intervention, and once a

week, their progress is monitored by having the students read aloud and answer questions about the material.

Of 39 students, 29, or 74%, have had a "good response," meaning they have shown growth. Of those 29 students, 16, or more than half, have advanced and are now being monitored for comprehension rather than reading fluency.

Nine students have had a "questionable response," meaning their reading performances fluctuate, although they appear to be on a gradual upward trend.

Only one student has had a "poor response," showing no signs of improvement and needing an alternate intervention.

There are also 35 middle schoolers receiving one of two math interventions, Number Worlds and IXL Math.

The school division is seeking a math progress monitoring tool. Math remediation success is currently tracked through whole group worksheets.

Auguste focused on another aspect of school improvement – encouraging positive behaviors – with an update on the Check In Check Out program.

Participating students keep a list of

goals, and periodically throughout the day, they check in with adults who monitor their progress and provide encouragement.

Students earn 0 to 2 points for their performance in each area, up to 30 points per day.

Of 25 participating students, 20 are meeting or exceeding behavior expectations by 80% or more.

Auguste shared data showing students are gradually moving into higher academic tiers, in which Tier 1 students need the least help and Tier 3 students need the most help.

For reading, in grades three to six, one or two students from each grade entered Tier 1, and one or more students in each grade left Tier 3.

Those numbers seem small, but they mean that groups of Tier 3 students decreased by as much as 25%.

Auguste also noted the positive impact of reducing student absences and showing appreciation for students when they're present.

Because of a new focus on relationships, Auguste said, students that used to drag their feet when they arrived at school now run up to her for a high five.

Accused Shooter Case Not Prosecuted

Quanta Mapp identified two of the three men who threatened and then shot him in his yard in March 2018 while his son sat in his nearby car. The gunmen were wearing masks but he recognized them and when he told them he knew who they were, they revealed themselves, Mapp said.

Even so, the jury trial that was scheduled for Thursday and Friday of this week was called off. Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan didn't think he could get a conviction for James Ernest Logan, 35, of Woodland Park Avenue, in Accomac. The case has not been dismissed so the charges could be brought back up.

"We're going to continue to look at the evidence," Morgan said. "One day we would like to say it is sufficient."

At a recent preliminary hearing, Mapp, who lived on Seaside Road in Painter, testified that his son had gotten in the car and popped the trunk so Mapp could place a fuel container inside before they went to the store. Mapp heard shouting over his shoulder and said he turned to find the three masked men pointing guns at him. The men began asking about money or drugs. Mapp said he is not connected to such activity and works at Tyson.

Edward Warner "Meatloaf" Byrd, 36, of Airport Drive in Melfa, then ordered another of the gunman to shoot, Mapp said. The victim ran away from the car so a stray bullet would not hit his son. The boy was not injured.

On April 1, Byrd was indicted in connection with the incident. A trial date has not yet been set. Both men are charged with robbery, malicious wounding, and use of a firearm.

Mapp first got shot in the arm, with the bullet going through to his stomach. Then he was shot in the head, he said. His son was not injured. Mapp said he knew the men by their voices and denied figuring out who they were based on rumors he later heard. Mapp testified he was able to get inside his house when the men ran out of ammunition. "He started shooting at my house and shot me in the head," he said of Byrd. "I thought I was dead. My son was still in the car."

Bloxom Man Charged With Rape of Juvenile, Other Sex Crimes

A 74-year-old Bloxom man is being held in Accomack Jail without bond after being charged with eight sex crimes including the rape and sodomy of a juvenile, according to a clerk at the county juvenile and domestic relations court.

Samuel Nock, of Hinman Street, is accused of the offenses alleged to have occurred between Sept. 30, 2018, and March 24. A reporter was permitted to ask questions about the case but was not allowed to see the file because it involves a minor.

Nock was charged with rape by force or threat, three counts of aggravated sexual battery by force/weapon, two counts of sodomy of a helpless victim, and two counts of object sexual penetration by force.

Nock was arrested April 11. He hired James Broccoletti, of Norfolk, to defend him. An August preliminary hearing was scheduled.

Maryland Woman Sentenced for Copper Wire Thefts

A Maryland woman was sentenced last week in Accomack Circuit Court to 24 years in prison for stealing green copper wire that belonged to the Accomack-Northampton Electric Cooperative (ANEC).

All but 12 months was suspended for Amanda Lea Grover Snyder, 35, of Costen Road in Westover. The thefts occurred between Aug. 1 and Oct. 4, 2018. Snyder was ordered to complete a 42-48 week corrective program within a year and to make restitution of \$23,710.25.

In another case, Jean Denis Adolphe, 46, of First Lane in Onley, pleaded guilty to malicious wounding of Jean Louis Augustine on April 17, 2018. The court record stated Augustine was hit with a prybar. Adolphe told police he hit the victim with a

rock. A criminal history and guidelines were ordered. Sentencing was scheduled for June 6.

In another case, Felix Junior Reid, 36, of Jackson Street in Parksley, was sentenced to five years in prison with all but six months suspended for failing to register as a violent sex offender on March 10, 2016.

Wade Matthew Summerville, 58, of Parsons Road in Greenbush, was sentenced to 10 years for a third or subsequent offense of distribution of cocaine. All but three years and two months was suspended. Summerville was put on indefinite probation and 10 years of good behavior. He could have been sentenced to life in prison and given a fine of up to \$500,000.

Shaniqua Kiara Holland, 27, of John Cane Road in Parksley, was sentenced to three years in prison with all but five days suspended for embezzling property from Food Lion, in Oak Hall, between June 4 and 30, 2016. She was ordered to be on unsupervised probation and good behavior for three years. Restitution of \$1,047.58 was ordered.

Macavis Rice, 31, of Saxis Road in Temperanceville, was convicted of burglary at the home of Benita Brown Aug. 11, 2018. A presentence report was ordered. Sentencing was set for May 23.

Five Charged With Felonies

Five Accomack men were arrested recently and charged with felonies, according to records filed in the county general district court.

Deandre Arness Abbott, 27, of Woodland Park Avenue in Parksley, was charged with eluding police in a high-speed chase that started as the driver left Royal Farms, in Onley, Tuesday.

Cpl. C. Hodgson, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO), wrote in the file that he clocked a vehicle going more than 90 mph. When he caught up with it, at the Whispering Pines intersection, it was going between 108 and 110 mph. The vehicle passed the Perdue Farms plant before slowing down and turning on Woodland Park Avenue. The driver then lost control of the vehicle, went into a field, regained control, stopped, and got out and ran.

Hodgson chased him for about 100 yards before Abbott fell to the ground, the deputy wrote.

Abbott is being held in Accomack Jail without bond. A June 10 preliminary hearing was scheduled.

In another case, Jonathan Gene Mears, 32, of Lankford Highway in Nelsonia, was charged with making a fraudulent promise to perform a construction job with advance payment from Danial Bell Jr. In September 2018, the file states, Mears received \$7,600 as partial payment for the work. Bell complained that Mears did minimal work and that what was done was unacceptable. Deputy Sean Lenhoff, of ACSO, investigated.

The charge was filed April 4. Secured bond was set at \$750. A June preliminary hearing was scheduled.

Leeshawn Lamar Davis, 30, of Matthews Street in Bloxom, was charged with possession of a Schedule I or II drug on April 9. He was arrested the same day. Deputy G. Lewis, of ACSO, investigated. Secured bail was set at \$1,500.

Donald Gene Failinger, 46, of Davis Road in New Church, was charged with obtaining a credit card without the owner's consent in connection with a Nov. 5, 2015, incident. He was arrested April 9. Secured bond was set at \$3,000. The Chincoteague Police Department investigated.

Willie Wayne Hall, 58, of Deerfoot Road in Melfa, was charged, on April 9, with possession of cocaine and possession of cocaine while in possession of a firearm. Hall was arrested the same day. Secured bond was set at \$5,000. Deputy Julian Sharp, of ACSO, investigated.

New York Man Pleads Guilty to Drug Charges

A New York man pleaded guilty Monday to felony drug charges in Northampton Circuit Court.

John Ross Taveras, 30, of University Avenue in the Bronx, pleaded guilty to possession of psilocybin, also known as mushrooms, and ecstasy, and possession with intent to distribute LSD. The incidents occurred Sept. 3, 2018. A presentence report was ordered. Sentencing was set for June 24.

Whispering Pines To Take Another \$74,000 to Demolish

There was a whirlwind of activity in the county coffers Wednesday as Accomack supervisors dished out another \$74,000 for the demolition of the old Whispering Pines motel, earmarked nearly \$107,000 to fund a 3% salary hike for county workers, voted to acquire better bonds to save \$500,000, and revised their real estate tax revenue estimate to show twice what they had previously anticipated.

In March, the supervisors awarded the demolition job to Allen Clark Jr. Inc., of Atlantic, which bid \$185,260 to haul away the remains of the once-booming landmark. The company was to tear down the derelict, deteriorating, and dangerous buildings that were twice set afire in an arson spree and left with rotting mattresses, mold, and trash.

"We could not come to terms" with the company, County Administrator Mike Mason reported to the supervisors about the Atlantic business. Mason asked the board to give the work to the next lowest bidder, Macsons Demolition & Environmental Services, of Norfolk, which bid \$248,316, a difference of \$73.966.

A \$50,000 grant was obtained to help fund the project. Nearly \$118,460 in derelict building funds, set aside for such projects, will also be used. The rest will come from the current county budget.

The supervisors agreed in a 7-1 vote with Supervisor Paul Muhly in opposition and Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy absent, due to illness.

"I don't see the county getting any benefit," said Muhly. He suggested the county acquire the property by "eminent domain," a process in which the government can buy property for public use. "That would be a great place for a housing project," said Muhly, who later explained the county should buy it before the buildings are torn down because the fair market value would be lower. Then, he said, all the funds to clean it could be obtained through grants.

"Is the reason you're doing this to make it more marketable?" asked Muhly. "Put a fence around it," he added.

"This is the last step upon us to get rid of this eyesore," said Supervisor Robert Crockett. "Nobody dislikes spending money more than I do. This is our only recourse ... a lien will be placed on the property ... the public has been commenting about it for years and years and years ... the net result is going to be the same. This way it will be done faster."

County Attorney Cela Burge reminded the board that the motel was determined as dangerous by a building official and is bringing criminal activity and vermin.

"I'm not trying to prioritize projects but if we did I would guarantee Whispering Pines would be at the top of the list," said Supervisor Reneta Major. "It just does nothing for Accomack County. We may not recoup all the money. At least we will be recouping some ... What industries want to come (to the Shore) when right here on Lankford Highway we see an eyesore? It's just plain ugly. I trust staff has done all they can do to explore other options."

The property is owned by Whispering Pines Inc., of Dillsburg, Pa. The motel was auctioned in 2012 for \$28,000 in an attempt to collect around \$35,000 in back real estate taxes. The sale fell through when it was realized that the company and its president, Dusan Bratic, had filed for bankruptcy. In December, a judge decided to allow the county to move forward despite the filing.

A lawsuit was filed in Accomack Circuit Court in February to collect the delinquent tax from Bratic's corporation.

The recently adopted fiscal 2019-20 budget gave all county employees a 2% increase based on what the state was expected to give for state-funded employees like those who work for constitutional officers and at the social services department, County Administrator Mike Mason explained. But in the end, the General Assembly gave a 3% hike and Mason wanted all employees to get the same percentage increase.

Bell's Neck Road is a Wash

The floorboards of their cars are rusted and the frames are shot from driving through salt water as they make their way home every day.

That's the plight of people who live at Bell's Neck in southern Accomack County. A discussion at Wednesday's board of supervisors' meeting disclosed the project to remedy the situation has been held up by a clerical error. The mistake was made six years ago.

Back then, Chairman Donald Hart, of District 8, made a motion to put the project on the top priority six-year plan. It was seconded by Supervisor Reneta Major, of District 9. The road is split with half being in District 9 and the other half in District 8.

But when the resolution was put on paper, it didn't include the name of the road. And no one caught the omission.

"The VDOT people were here that night," said Supervisor Ron Wolff. "They knew what the intent was."

"We have to accept the responsibility, as it is that the staff that did not incorporate it," said County Administrator Mike Mason, who was finance director when the error occurred.

Rod Hennessey said he goes through saltwater twice a day to make it home and out to work. Hennessey said he can't put more than a quarter of a tank of gas in his Chevy Silverado because the eroding tank is hanging. "There are school buses going through it twice a day" too, he added, remarking about the high cost to replace those vehicles.

There are 12 houses at Bell's Neck. "Everybody has a couple of cars," said Hennessey. "We're waiting. But we're running out of time ... You have to be able to work on the ditches" on the Eastern Shore — "the road to Saxis ... to Chincoteague."

State law allows for normal ditch maintenance, Hennessey said. Be-

cause of the wetlands there, permission would have to be given for construction of any new drainage ditch, he explained.

"It's not sea level rise," said Anthony Giorgilli, Hennessey's neighbor. "A simple ditch digging would" fix it.

Giorgilli said he's tired of being sent from agency to agency. He was told VDOT is seeking permits from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to do the work but when he called the USACE he was told they hadn't gotten an application.

"I call them untruths," Giorgilli said. VDOT tells him "Accomack County dropped the ball. ... Everyone is passing it around in a circle." He wondered what other resolutions may have been lost. "Maybe it's a mistake somewhere ... The road is getting worse ... That's my frustration thank you for listening to me."

"We're trying to find another way to get this done," said Hart. "This is very important to me. There are things on the list that were put on there 30 years ago. That's how much the (state) money has dried up."

"I feel the pain, I've rode the road," said Major. "Get a meeting (of VDOT and county officials and residents of Bell's Neck) set up and I will definitely be there as well,"


Major said. "I will do anything I can to help."

Mason said he recently met with local VDOT head, Chris Isdell. "I did ascertain that this is in the permitting process," Mason said, adding, there is a "three-prong" approach in the works "to reclaim the ditches subject to marsh intrusion," raise the road, and post warning signs about the high water.

"We went back and listened" to a recording of the session where the resolution was made, Mason said. "It's clear that this board wanted to make Bell's Neck a focus point."

More Than \$176,000 in CSB Work Given to Former Finance Director's Husband

Eastern Shore Community Services Board paid more than \$176,000 through its holding company, Mendisadd, to the husband of Lynier Linton, the agency's director of finance and administration at the time of the payments, for construction and repair work.

An audit conducted by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) by the department's Office of Budget Execution and Financial Reporting and the Office of Internal Audit uncovered the payments, finding \$34,763 in "related-party transactions" between Mendisadd and Mid Atlantic Residential Solutions LLC, a contracting agency registered to Mark Alan Linton who is married to Lynier Linton. The relationship had not been disclosed in financial statements.

CSB Executive Director Lisa "MiMi" Sedjat and current finance director Thomas Dix III revealed in an interview with the Eastern Shore Post the amount reflected in the audit was not the total amount contracted between

the CSB and Mid Atlantic, which totaled \$176,347 for 2017 through 2019.

The audit also found the agency paid for services without "evidence of review and approval by someone with competent knowledge that the goods and services were adequately performed and met applicable requirements."

Those were two of many findings of the operational review, which examined CSB policies and procedures and tested sample transactions from July 1, 2016, through Aug. 31, 2018, for compliance with adopted policies.

"It was our first audit in well over 10 years," said Sedjat.

The review identified a total of 16 areas of concern, some with multiple observations and conditions requiring corrective action. Many were related to outdated and inadequate policies and procedures, and to Mendisadd, which never had a set of policies and procedures formalized and put in place. The completed review was sent to the CSB board of directors Jan. 30 and the CSB responded in mid-February with its corrective plan.

Related-party transactions are governed by CSB policy, federal accounting principles, and state law regarding conflicts of interest.

Lynier Linton left the CSB last fall during the time the audit was being conducted. The timing was purely coincidental, said Sedjat. "She turned in her notice in July before we were notified of the audit," she said. According to Sedjat, the family moved to Maryland. The Post has requested a copy of the notice.

The audit further found where Mendisadd is concerned, transactions were not subject to CBS "nor any other prescribed policies and procedures," putting the organization at risk for not being able to detect errors or fraud.

Sedjat said there were guidelines they followed, but the auditors "took issue with the fact that they weren't documented policies and procedures."

Auditors recommended "strengthening internal controls over expenditures for ESCSB and Mendisadd." For example, in four of nine reviewed transactions, "there was no evidence of review or approval of work before payment of transactions involving construction, repair, or landscape work" to ensure work performed meets all state and federal requirements.

Sedjat said that does not mean the work was not overseen. "We enjoy a good relationship with code enforcement," she said. "We feel confident the work that has or will be done meets code."

The audit noted strong internal controls over payroll and human resources with fewer recommendations in those areas.

Accounting for fixed assets is another area where auditors made multiple recommendations. Capital assets comprised about one-half of total assets in the June 30, 2017 and 2018, audit statements, but "staff could not remember the last time an annual physical inventory was performed," the audit reports. The Government Finance Officers Association recommends a physical inventory no less than every five years to ensure the assets are still owned and have been properly depreciated.

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
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Other areas of concern included outdated financial and reimbursement, human resources, and IT-related policies and procedures, some of which were 20 years old. The ESCSB had not updated its procurement policies and procedures since 1999.

Deficits in financial controls perhaps played a role in the petty cash control weaknesses identified. They included not signing for petty cash in 20 of 46 instances; lack of guidance on use of petty cash; lack of unannounced audits of change and petty cash accounts; minor shortages in two petty cash funds; and an inaccurate master list of petty cash accounts.

Lack of credit card receipts was also identified for credit card purchases. The CSB's external audit firm, Robinson, Farmer Cox Associates found this in its Independent Auditor's Report for the fiscal year ending June 20, 2018, as a "material weakness."

In an interview with the Post, Board of Directors Chairman Bob Bloxom expressed concern that annual auditors weren't picking up on other items cited in the DBHDS review, with the exception of the credit card receipt issue. Robinson, Farmer Cox Associates' annual full-scope audit includes transactions testing, he said, similar to what was done in the state's audit.

"We intend to ask them specifically to leverage DBHCS work in their future audits," he added.

He views the audit as less of a wakeup call and more of a confirmation that the organization is mostly on the right path. Bloxom asked two questions at the end of the auditor's exit interview. "Is there any evidence of any financial malfeasance? The response was an emphatic 'no," Bloxom said. He also asked if there was anything in the audit "the board should be really concerned about? The answer again was 'All of it is housekeeping." Bloxom said the auditor told him the agency is ahead of other agencies in some areas, but needed to catch up in others.

DBHDS spokesperson Maria Reppas said the audit didn't find anything that would jeopardize state or federal funding, and "there is no significant risk to patient information based on information raised in DBHDS's audit."

Trooper Who Forged Tickets Being Sued

Johnny Godwin, the former senior state trooper who lost his job in 2016 after being convicted of forging tickets to boost his quota, is being sued by one of the people he falsely accused.

Larry Gordon Marsh II, of Koerney Drive on Chincoteague, is asking Accomack Circuit Court to award him \$2 million in compensatory damages and \$350,000 in punitive damages plus court costs.

The Virginia State Police were also named in the lawsuit. The department claims it is exempt from legal action due to sovereign immunity, a legal doctrine that says the state cannot commit a legal wrong. The department has asked for the case to be dismissed. A June hearing is scheduled for that argument.

"Trooper Godwin responded to a vehicle accident involving the plaintiff that occurred on Route 175 near the NASA Wallops Flight Facility Visitor Center," Nov. 26, 2016, the lawsuit states. Godwin responded to the scene and wrote a ticket against Marsh for following too close, which Marsh does

not deny occurred. Marsh stated that after Godwin left the scene, he filled out papers with two other charges, which Marsh said came to light when Godwin was arrested.

In the lawsuit, Marsh claims he was falsely accused of "possession of a controlled substance" and that the charge was "made with actual malice and knowledge that the accusations were false," Marsh said in the court documents. Marsh also claimed that Godwin charged him with of possession of marijuana.

Criminal court records from Godwin's case state that the other charges that Godwin forged were failure to wear a seatbelt and failure to have his driver's license in his possession. Godwin filed those charges with the police department but not with the general district court.

Assistant Attorney General Cal Brown will handle the case for the state police. The lawsuit was initially filed in Virginia Beach Circuit Court but was transferred to Accomack in February at Godwin's request.



n Saturday, April 27, 2019, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Northampton Sheriff's Office and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 17th opportunity in 9 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to Northampton Sheriff's Office at 5211 The Hornes, Eastville, Va. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

The last NTBI was held on October 27, 2018. On that date, the effort across the nation resulted in the collection of approximately 457 tons of pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medication for safe and proper disposal. In Virginia 137 agencies collected over 22,345 pounds at 197 collection sites. As a result, our communities are safer because of the disposal opportunities.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the



U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

Fishing from
the Shore

Fishing for black drum in the barrier island surf has been very productive along the entire length of Virginia's Eastern Shore's seaside, with double digit landings reported almost daily from the southern section of Assateague Island. A few red drum have also shown up in the mix, particularly from Quinby inlet south to Fisherman Island. I anticipate the start of the bayside black drum fishery happening any day now. Typical of early season flounder fishing, success is dependent on the weather conditions. Fishing in the shallows during the falling tide on a light, westerly, particularly southwesterly wind has been the magic formula to early season flounder catching success.

Lower Shore - Mark Snook, at Chris' Bait & Tackle, reports that there has been some "decent" red drum and black drum catches coming from the lower barrier islands as well as from boats fishing off Fisherman Island. A few black drum have been hooked on commercial trotlines on the lower bayside, but he is yet to confirm any recreation catches inside the bay. Tautog catches have been made along the submerged structure and along some of the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel as well as along the concrete ships off Kiptopeke. A few blowtoads and lots of crabs are being caught off the Kiptopeke State Park Pier. Flounder have been pulled from the back creeks on the seaside, out of Oyster. Chris' Bait & Tackle will be having its annual buy, swap, and sell flea market on April 20, from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Call the shop for more information.

A representative from Bailey's Bait & Tackle reported that there has been some "good black drum fishing on the seaside" but he had not heard of much else.

Chincoteague – Jimmy Vasilou, of Capt. Steve's Bait & Tackle, reports that the beach on Assateague and Wallops Islands are producing black drum, skates, and a few undersized striped bass. Blowtoads have just started showing up in the surf for those anglers using smaller hooks. Jimmy said that flounder fishing could not be described as "hot and heavy," but local Travis Thornton managed a 25.5-inch doormat while fishing with "Uncle Dave" Abell on a recent trip.

Donna Rae, of Capt. Bob's Marina, reported that anglers were catching flounder when "it's not blowing a gale." She mentioned the "junkyard" underneath the Assateague Bridge as one of the most productive early locations. Anglers familiar with navigating the shallows of Watts Bay and the lower end of Four Mouths have also enjoyed some early season flounder success. Live minnow and squid strip combinations have been the most productive early baits, followed closely by

minnow/Berkley Gulp combinations. A few keeper flounder just over the 16.5-inch minimum size limit have been pulled from off the end of the Birchwood Motel pier. Chincoteague area water temperatures have ranged from 59-63 degrees in the shallows on sunny days at low tide, but the water near the inlet remains at 50-53 degrees as of Monday.

Wachapreague – Capt. Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, commented that the flounder fishing "has not been hot and heavy." Paul said that the yo-yoing temperatures and windy conditions were mostly to blame. The top catch that he had heard of was one angler landing seven flounder, two of which exceeded the minimum size limit. Most anglers were returning to port with two or fewer fish. Paul expected improved fishing later in the week as the water temperature in the shallows had reached 66 degrees at the peak of low tide on Tuesday morning.

Upper Shore — Captain Matt Abell, of the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reports that flounder fishing remains steady from Quinby to Chincoteague, with the east side of Chincoteague Island currently out producing the Chincoteague Bay area. Black drum and a few red drum have been pulled out of the Virginia barrier island surf.

Doug Danielson caught a red drum in Quinby Inlet while fishing with clam baits for black drum. Small to medium-sized black drum have been caught in the vicinity of Watts Island. Look for red drum to show up in the shallows of Pungoteague Flats any day. The Pocomoke River has been producing black perch and good catches of crappie. C.L. Marshall reported that the best perch bite has been over a hard sandy bottom, with bloodworms being the top bait. Marshall said that post-spawned perch will now tend to congregate around structure. The Nassawadox Creek section of the river has been one of the crappie hot spots, with small live minnows being the most productive baits.

Possible Recreational Trophy Striped Bass Season Closures – The Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) will be voting on a somewhat controversial "emergency" proposal to eliminate the Chesapeake Bay spring trophysize striped bass recreational fishery, the elimination of the Coastal spring trophy-sized recre-

ational striped bass fishery, and the elimination of the Potomac River tributaries spring striped bass recreation fishery when it meets on April 23, 2019. The agency claims that the justification for these closures is due to the coastal striped bass stock being overfished, resulting in a low spawning stock, which is not "biologically stable." The proposal includes an effective closure date of April 29, 2019, for these fisheries. If the closures are adopted, a proposed public hearing on the matter will not be requested by the agency until May 28, 2019, almost a month after the closures takes effect.



Virginia Farmers/Landowners May Now Sign Up for Updated Conservation Stewardship Program

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is now offering Virginia farmers and forestry producers more options for taking their land management to the next level with the revised Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP).

Through CSP, agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining and expanding conservation activities like cover crops, enhanced nutrient management, buffer strips and pollinator habitat – all while maintaining active agriculture production on their land. While NRCS conducts continuous sign-ups for the program, interested producers must submit their applications by May 10, 2019 to be considered for FY19 funding.

CSP is for working lands (crop, pasture, nonindustrial forest and tribal ag land) and helps agricultural producers build their business while implementing conservation practices to enhance the sustainability of the entire operation. The 2018 Farm Bill made several changes to this critical conservation program that will benefit Virginia farmers. Highlights include:

- Enrollment of eligible, high ranking applications based on dollars (not acres) to cover part of the cost for implementing new conservation activities and maintaining current practices.
- Higher payment rates for certain conservation measures, including cover crops and resource conserving crop rotations.
- Specific support for organic operations and those transitioning to organic production.

"CSP is the largest conservation program in the United States with more than 70 million acres of productive agricultural and forest land enrolled nationwide," said Jack Bricker, state conservationist. "We are working to raise the visibility of CSP in Virginia with increased focus on its many benefits to include increased crop yields, decreased inputs, wildlife habitat improvements and increased resilience to weather."

CSP also encourages the adoption of cutting-edge technologies and new management techniques such as precision agriculture applications and new soil amendments to improve water quality. Producers interested in CSP should contact their local USDA service center or visit www.nrcs.usda.gov/GetStarted

Virginia Grain Stocks

Virginia corn stocks stored in offfarm facilities on March 1, 2019, totaled 11.4 million bushels, compared to 11.1 million bushels stored offfarm on March 1, 2018, according to USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Virginia all wheat stocks stored off the farm totaled 6.26 million bushels on March 1, 2019, compared to 5.82 million bushels stored off the farm a year earlier. Barley stocks stored in off-farm facilities on March 1, 2019, totaled 62,000 bushels, down 51,000 bushels from March 1, 2018. Off-farm oat stocks on March 1, 2019 totaled 23,000 bushels, up 1.000 bushels from March 1, 2018.

U.S. Grain Stocks

Corn stocks in all positions on March 1, 2019 totaled 8.60 billion bushels, down 3 percent from March 1, 2018. Of the total stocks, 5.13 billion bushels were stored on farms, up 3 percent from a year earlier. Off-farm stocks, at 3.47 billion bushels, are down 11 percent from a year ago. The December 2018 - February 2019, indicated disappearance is 3.33 billion bushels, compared with 3.67 billion bushels during the same period last year.

Soybeans stored in all positions on March 1, 2019, totaled 2.72 billion bushels, up 29 percent from March 1, 2018. Soybean stocks stored on farms are estimated at 1.27 billion bushels, up 49 percent from a year ago. Off-farm stocks, at 1.45 billion bushels, are up 15 percent from last March. Indicated disappearance for the December 2018 - February 2019 quarter totaled 1.03 billion bushels, down 2 percent from the same pe-



riod a year earlier.

All wheat stored in all positions on March 1, 2019, totaled 1.59 billion bushels, up 6 percent from a year ago. Onfarm stocks are estimated at 368 million bushels, up 42 percent from last March. Off-farm stocks, at 1.22 billion bushels, are down 1 percent from a year ago. The Dec. 2018 - Feb. 2019, indicated disappearance is 419 million bushels, 11 percent above the same period a year earlier.

Barley stocks in all positions on March 1, 2019, totaled 121 million bushels, down 7 percent from March 1, 2018. On-farm stocks are estimated at 46.2 million bushels, 5 percent below a year ago. Off-farm stocks, at 75.1 million bushels, are 8 percent below March 2018. The December 2018 - February 2019 indicated disappearance totaled 31.4 million bushels, 9 percent above the same period a year earlier.

Oats stored in all positions on March 1, 2019, totaled 50.2 million bushels, 9 percent below the stocks on March 1, 2018. Of the total stocks on hand, 18.1 million bushels were stored on farms, up 5 percent from a year ago. Off-farm stocks totaled 32.2 million bushels, down 15 percent from the previous year. Indicated disappearance during Dec.r 2018 - Feb. 2019, totaled 17.1 million bushels, 48 percent above the same period a year ago.

Help Stop Pests from Invading

The Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS) encourages the public to join the effort to stop the threat of invasive plants and pests in Virginia. Non-native, destructive insects, diseases and harmful weeds are a tremendous threat to the commonwealth's crops and forests, and can seriously harm the economy, environment and even human health. During the month of April, which is National Invasive Plant, Pest and Disease Awareness month, VDACS hopes to raise public awareness of the threat invasive species pose to the state's agricultural and natu-

ral resources.

Invasive species, such as the Asian longhorned beetle, emerald ash borer. gypsy moth, imported fire ant, boxwood blight and giant hogweed, wreak havoc on the environment, displace or destroy native plants and insects, severely damage crops and potentially cause the closure of foreign markets to those U.S. products that originated in infested areas. Once invasive pests become established, they can grow and spread rapidly, often due to no natural predators in their new environment. Invasive pests cost landowners, industry and the government millions of dollars to control. Taking steps to prevent their introduction is the most effective method of reducing both the risk of invasive species infestations and the cost to control and mitigate those infestations.

The public can help reduce the spread of invasive pests and plants by following these simple steps:

- Don't move firewood over long distances as it can be a carrier of invasive insects and diseases. Use firewood that originates from the area where it will be burned. Gypsy moth egg cases and emerald ash borer larvae can hitch a ride with the firewood and start infestations in new areas.
- Before leaving a work or recreational site, look for and remove any insects, seeds and other plant parts that might be attached to your equipment, boots, gear and vehicle.
- Consult with your local nursery or master gardener to select plants that are not invasive for landscaping and gardening projects. A wide variety of beautiful native plants that thrive in your local environment are available at local nurseries and garden centers.
- Don't plant seeds of invasive plants in wildlife food plots.
- Always declare any plant material brought into the United States when returning from a trip abroad.

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"Pippin" Pops into Chincoteague and Princess Anne for Four Shows

Coming of age may be a common storyline, but it's one that doesn't seem to lose its appeal. Perhaps because everyone has grappled with the existential questions of the meaning of life and finding a place in the world.

So it is with the coming-of-age musical comedy "Pippin," by Roger O. Hirson, and music and lyrics by Stephen Schwartz. The Lower Shore Performing Arts Company will stage the production April 27 and 28 in Chincoteague, and May 4 and 6 in Princess Anne.

The story characters are very loosely based on Pippin, first-born son of Charlemagne, emperor of Holy Roman Empire. The likeness pretty much ends at the names, as the musical veers far from any historical facts, imagining Pippin's coming-of-age story as he discovers what brings satisfaction and contentment.

"Pippin is looking for purpose," said Ryan Pidgeon, of Exmore, who plays the role of Pippin in his first production with the company. "I think that's something everyone can identify with." At some point, every person wrestles with the questions, "What am I supposed to do? Where do I fit in?"

Pocomoke High School Junior Alana Troxell has found she fits in at the theater company. After several shows with the group, she has stepped into the antagonist role of Leading Player. "My character leads him in the wrong direction," she said. "I get the bad guy roles a lot. It's kind of fun."

The appeal of playing a character so different than oneself is part of the appeal of theater, said Troxell. "It's an escape."

Besides the collection of eager-to-learn students, adults of all professions from across the lower Shore are drawn to the theater, said Takeisha Jackson, the company's public relations director. "People need this creative outlet because their jobs have absolutely nothing to do with the arts," she said.

Director Mark Taylor, an attorney by day, said "Pippin" is one of his favorite musicals, with a classic rock and jazz feel, akin to others of the same early 1970s like "Hair" and "Godspell." A collection of student and professional musicians will back the cast's vocal performances.

Despite the upbeat music, "Pippin" covers "serious issues like war, love, and politics. Although he doesn't quite find happiness, we ask, 'What will bring happiness to Pippin?" continued Taylor. "The answer is something young and old can relate to."

Taylor enjoys working with the predominantly young cast, but stresses that "Pippin" in not children's theater. "The mission of the theater company is to teach the art of performance to young and old alike," and there are both youth and adults in the production. That played a large part in the selection of "Pippin," because of its appeal to all ages in both the story and music.

The music, said Taylor, keeps the story moving along. "The audience will find themselves tapping their feet and moving in their seats."

Living With Parkinson's Disease: A Melfa Family's Experience

William Ferencik's diagnosis of Parkinson's disease couldn't have been more unexpected.

The 75-year-old former American Airlines pilot was visiting the Shore to determine if he wanted to move from New York. His wife, Joanne, had been here helping her father, and after his death in 2008, her mother, Ruth Kiks, of Melfa.

The strain of Joanne going back and forth to New York was hard on everyone. The couple had known each other for 25 years but only married three years ago.

William, or Billy, as he's called by those close to him, decided to come down, have a look around, and see if they wanted to call the Shore home. He didn't expect to land in the emergency room, or any of the things that followed.

"In the ER. That's where it all started," said Joanne. During Billy's moving exploration trip, his colostomy bag needed urgent attention, and he and Joanne found themselves in the emergency room at Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.

There they encountered neurologist Dr. Robert Paschall. He wasn't there to see

Billy, but he looked at Billy's chart, "You" — Joanne motioned that Paschall pointed to them — "in my office. I can help you."

In that follow-up appointment, Paschall diagnosed Billy with Parkinson's. The Ferenciks were floored. "In New York, he had been told he drank too much chardonnay as a pilot," she said, Billy nodding in agreement with her.

April is Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month. Symptoms of the neurodegenerative disease (a disease that affects the nervous system, especially neurons of the brain) include tremors, slowed movement, rigid muscles, impaired posture or balance, loss of automatic movements like blinking and smiling, and speech and writing changes.

According to the Parkinson's Foundation, about 60,000 Americans are diagnosed with Parkinson's disease each year and one million Americans are living with the disease.

"Commonly known for its movement or motor-related symptoms, people with PD are often more impacted by non-motor symptoms like apathy, depression, sleep behavior disorders, loss of sense of smell and cognitive impairment," according to the foundation website, www.parkinson.org

The ER visit was January 31, 2018, and before long, Billy had relocated to Melfa at the invitation of Ruth Kiks. From there, the three have built a support team of doctors, therapists, and other family and neighbors.

His condition is complicated by a difficult travel episode late last year that ended with pneumonia and left him further weakened. "He needs round-the-clock care," said Joanne, a 56-year-old with relative youth on her side.

Billy knows what's involved in providing that care. He once filled the same role for his mother, quitting his American Airlines job to care for her.

To ensure his mother got the best possi-

ble care, Billy took a job at the nursing home where his mother lived in Vestal, N.Y. That was about 15 years ago. Now he is the one who requires assistance, and Joanne provides the care he once gave for his mother.

Their pattern is not unusual. According to a 2015 study by the National Alliance

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of care, placing them at higher risk for health problems of their own.

Joanne's days begin at 5 a.m., when she empties Billy's colostomy bag, checks on her mother, gets them both water and prepares their morning medications.

A white board posted in the living room details the daily routine: Billy is up around 7:30 a.m. for his first pills. They wait an hour, then he takes another pill before having breakfast. Next is the nebulizer with oxygen "to keep the food from going in his lungs." It's one of four daily oxygen treatments.

Following the nebulizer, it's time for a wash up, then into the living room for a little TV viewing and a brief nap.

Once his nap is over, he is up for first exercise, one of five or six sessions each day. Several days a week he will see a speech, occupational, or physical therapist at the house.

Joanne also takes care of haircuts, nail trims, and other personal needs.

Billy stands to walk with the aid of an UpWalker, a specialized walker that keeps the patient standing tall instead of hunched over. At his full 6-foot height, one catches a glimpse of the former pilot who commanded jet airliners for 23 years.

"I'm proud of him and proud to take care of him and get him back on his feet," said Joanne.

For his part, Billy says he misses New York, misses the family property, but doesn't complain about his situation.







Grace Ames House

Built circa 1927, the Grace Ames House, left, sits on a point of land on the central branch of Onancock Creek. J. Grace Ames purchased the property in 1925 and negotiated access to what is now known as the Ames Street Bridge, which was privately owned at that time. The Grace Ames House is a classic example of a craftsman bungalow "kit house." Beginning in the early 1900s, kit houses were sold from the pages of catalogues and shipped by train across the country. The current owners renovated the home from the foundation up in 2016-17, creating an open, flowing design that incorporates multiple vantages of the creek.

The cleverly constructed back of the house features a second story deck with panoramic creek views. Outdoors, the garden is whimsical and unstructured with a focus on nature. Migratory birds enjoy native plants and waterfront perches. Open for the first time. Dr. Greg & Patsy Felthousen, owners.

Sans Souci

A two-story Victorian with gingerbread trim, Sans Souci, right, rests atop a small knoll overlooking Market Street in Onancock. The French phrase translates "without concern" and aptly describes this relaxing and tranquil property. The back section of the home was built in the 1850s and the front was added in the 1880s. Surrounded by established beech and hardwood trees, a boxwood-lined path leads to the front entrance. Furnished with 18th and early 19th century American pieces, Sans Souci showcases an impressive collection of tall case and mantel clocks inherited from the homeowner's father, a local builder and furniture maker.

When the home was remodeled in 1962, a bill of goods for building materials, circa 1858-60, was found in the rafters of the oldest section and is now displayed as a reminder of Sans Souci's significant historical footprint. On the grounds, visitors will enjoy the gingerbread trimmed gazebo and informal gardens including drift roses, daffodils, iris, hydrangea, jasmine, salvia, magnolia, and more. 

Scott Hall

The oldest house in Onancock, Scott Hall (right) was built in 1769. When land was purchased to build Scott Hall, Virginia was still a colony of Great Britain. Interior highlights include floor-to-ceiling bookcases and a recently renovated master bath. First built with thick walls, alcoves and trap doors, it's believed that Scott Hall was designed as a fortress. Many such features were corrected in a 2006 renovation.

Behind the house are the iron gates of the cemetery where 17 relatives of early Scott Hall owners are buried. Open for the first time. Ms. Elizabeth A. Lankford, owner.



Benjamin Fosque House

Located in the heart of Onancock, its Victorian façade in full view from Market Street, the Benjamin Fosque House (right) was built in 1883. Sawn brackets and extensive ornamental tracery adorn the gables and porches. The cathedral ceiling creates a bright, open space for modern family living while following the architectural vernacular of an historic Victorian home.

In the backyard, a variety of deciduous and evergreen shrubs and perennials provide year-long color and foliage, framing views of the central branch of Onancock Creek. Open for the first time. Dr. & Mrs. Fletcher D. Fosque, owners.

Although May is officially Lyme Disease Awareness Month, April has brought reports on the Eastern Shore that those nasty ticks, which can infect you, are already out there latching on and biting.

According to www.msn.com, the incidence of Lyme Disease is 11.6 per 100,000 residents. But the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) thinks the figures are much higher. It estimated about 30,000 cases a year.

"This number does not reflect every case of Lyme disease that is diagnosed in the U.S every year," the CDC website stated. "Standard national surveillance is only one way that public health officials can track where a disease is occurring and with what frequency. Recent estimates using other methods suggest that approximately 300,000 people may get Lyme disease each year in the U.S."

I contracted the disease many years ago and it went untreated and wrongly diagnosed for many years so I have made it my mission to alert others about it. I never saw the tick. Some deer ticks are so small they are not detectable.

Within three to 30 days after a tick bite, the symptoms include fever, chills, headache, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, and swollen lymph nodes.

Between 70- 80% of those infected will get a bull's-eye rash that can appear anywhere on the body. Later, severe headaches; neck stiffness; more rashes; severe joint pain and swelling; facial palsy; pain in tendons, muscles, joints, and bones; heart palpitations or an irregular heartbeat; episodes of dizziness or shortness of breath; inflammation of the brain and spinal cord; nerve pain; shooting pains, numbness or tingling in the hands or feet; and problems with short-term memory can occur.

With early detection, most cases of Lyme disease can be treated successfully by taking a few weeks worth of antibiotics.

Using repellent, removing ticks promptly, checking your clothing, and putting clothes in the dryer, not on a clothesline, will help prevent Lyme disease. Ticks can also ride into your home on your pets, so be sure to carefully check them too.

"Showering within two hours of coming indoors has been shown to reduce your risk of getting Lyme disease and may be effective in reducing the risk of other tickborne diseases," the CDC states. It "may help wash off unattached ticks and it is a good opportunity to do a tick check." The diagram at the right show placed most likely to harbor a tick.

What to do with a tick once it is removed is widely discussed. Some people flush them down the toilet. I don't think that kills them so I don't recommend it. The best thing I have come up with is to put the tick on a piece of



tape and save it until the 30 days go by. That way, if there is any doubt that you have Lyme disease or a doctor won't prescribe an antibiotic to cure you, you can ask to have the tick tested.

The state health department site states, the bacteria that causes Lyme disease is only transmitted through the bites of infected black-legged ticks, also known as deer ticks.

In response to other concerns, Congress already has the power to draft anyone if the draft is reinstated. The Violence Against Women Act expired and was not renewed by the current Congress.


