Assawoman Woman Accused: False Statements at NASA

An Assawoman resident was accused Monday, in U.S. District Court, in Norfolk, of knowingly making false statements or representations about the total concentration of organic nitrogen and ammonia that was being discharged from NASA Wallops Flight Facility (WFF) into local waters.

It was unclear from court documents if defendant Monica Kristine Borowicz, 50, actually worked for NASA or if she was employed by a subcontractor. The incident occurred between April 2014 and March 2018.

NASA made a statement Wednesday saying it "can confirm that Ms. Borowicz is a former contractor employee at Wallops who has not worked on the facility since April 2018. As this is a case pending before the court, additional questions should be directed to the U.S. Attorney's office." Later a NASA spokesperson said, "The daily operations of the NASA Wallops Flight Facility's wastewater treatment plant is supported by the facility's contractor LJT & Associates."

In January 2014, LJT, of Columbia, Md., was awarded a contract to perform institutional services at WFF at a maximum of \$257 million. "Services LJT & Associates will provide under the contract include facilities planning, engineering, and construction management; facilities operations and maintenance; construction and mission support; grounds maintenance; logistics; occupational medicine; environmental management support; records management; duplication; mail handling; custodial work; and solid

waste disposal" among other things, a press release stated. A \$200 million contract was awarded to the company for Feb. 1, 2019, through Jan. 31, 2024.

When a reporter called Joseph L. Kosky, the assistant U.S. attorney handling the case, she was referred to Joshua Stueve, director of communications. At press time, the reporter had not hear back from Stueve.

Her job was water programs/analytical lab head. When LJT's main of-

fice was called Wednesday, an operator said Borowicz worked at the Wallops' office. The Post was unable to contact Borowicz. Her attorney did not return a reporter's query.

The charge against Borowicz involves "monthly discharge monitoring reports submitted to the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)" that showed "false test results for Total Kjeldahl Nitrogen (TKN) levels," court records stated. The reports

are required in accordance with the Clean Water Act.

"According to an environmental resources document issued by NASA in August 2017, WFF was issued a Virginia Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit, which authorizes potential or actual discharge of pollutants from a point source to surface waters under prescribed conditions

Warner, Luria Address Hot Shore Topics

Health and child care, education, veterans, jobs, poultry, and broadband were among the topics discussed Wednesday at a town meeting at the Eastern Shore Community College hosted by U.S. Sen. Mark Warner, who was joined by Rep. Elaine Luria.

The two Democrats toured the NASA Wallops Flight Facility earlier in the day.

"I can predict with the great confidence ... the future of Wallops is going to be very good," said Warner, who is a former Virginia governor. Deborah Christie, former Rep. Scott Taylor's local representative, gave kudos "for constantly giving support" to Wallops. Luria, a Navy veteran and newcomer to politics, was on the Eastern Shore for a couple of days and had an open house at her local office Tuesday night. Both public meetings were well attended. Luria arrived late to Wednesday's session as she needed to change her clothes after just coming from visiting Dublin Farms, of Horntown, a

and limitations, by the DEQ on Aug. 17, 1989, with the most recent renewal date being Oct. 1, 2014, which expires Sept. 30, 2019 ... the permit applies to 11 industrial stormwater outfalls on the Main Base including the Federally Owned Treatment Works process outfall and three industrial stormwater outfalls on Wallops Island, including the deluge water storage pond at Launch Pad 0-A. Currently, there are no permitted stormwater outfalls on the mainland. Four non-industrial stormwater outfalls are located on the Wallops Main Base and five non-industrial stormwater outfalls are located on Wallops Island ... In accordance with its VPDES permit, WFF has prepared and routinely updates a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan ... Through the use of best management practices, quarterly and annual inspections, and personnel training, WFF remains proactive in stormwater pollution prevention."

Discharges are made to Little Mosquito Creek and Hog Creek, according to the document.

A DEQ operator referred a reporter to DEQ's Allan Brockenbrough. He would not comment about the case but said he would find someone at the agency to do so. A spokesperson later left a message stating, "We participated in that investigation but were not the lead." She referred questions to Stueve.

The charge was made through criminal information, not an indictment. Property derived from proceeds traceable to the violation could be seized through forfeiture if there's a conviction. The case was assigned to District Judge Raymond A. Jackson and referred to Magistrate Judge Douglas E. Miller.

"I'm very disappointed that this has happened," Accomack Supervisor Grayson Chesser said Wednesday. "I really don't know enough about it to say any more at this time but I'm sure it will be discussed in the groundwater committee meeting. The fact that this falls on the heels of the contamination of the Chincoteague wells makes it even more disturbing."

Chesser is a member of the groundwater committee. He was referring to Chincoteague wells on NASA's base

on Wallops Island that were found in April 2017 to be contaminated with high levels of PFAS (per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances) from fire retardants sprayed by NASA's fire department. Since then, Chincoteague officials bought property on the mainland where they are planning to dig new wells. They are waiting for NASA to give them financial assistance.

The Federally Owned Treatment Works at WFF "receives processed sanitary wastes," according to the WFF environmental report. "Little Mosquito Creek drains airfield runways, taxiways, aprons, and a hangar; satellite accumulation areas; above-ground fuel storage tanks; office buildings; roadways, parking areas, and grassy areas. This outfall discharges to Little Mosquito Creek. Potential sources of pollution include fuel spills from airfield activities or releases from fuel delivery vehicles or hazardous waste spills from a satellite accumulation area. A chance of stormwater contamination from hazardous wastes exists; however, all satellite accumulation areas are required to have secondary containment and are located inside covered structures. This outfall drains approximately 204.6 acres and its weighted runoff coefficient is low at 0.39.

"During a 24-hour, 2-year storm event, approximately 8.03 million gallons per day would discharge from this outfall. Little Mosquito Creek Drain orbital launch facilities, small launch facilities, office buildings, fuel storage tanks, RP-1 storage, roadways, parking areas, and grassy areas. Drainage involves retention basins with sluice gates and tidal flaps that drain to Hog Creek. Potential sources of pollution include orbital launch operations and fuel spills from delivery vehicles. To minimize the risk of stormwater pollution, all orbital launch vehicle fueling is performed by highly trained personnel during closely controlled conditions. Also, all launchpad wash waters are tested prior to discharge. All tank fueling operations are performed by trained personnel. Additionally, spill kits are readily available. These outfalls drain approximately 27.9 acres and 22.5 acres, respectively. Weighted runoff coefficients are low at 0.23 and 0.17."

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


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EGGS AND ISSUES AND CONGRESSWOMAN ELAINE LURIA

There was a new face and a new format at this spring's Eggs and Issues, a breakfast and political forum organized biannually by the Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce.

Congresswoman Elaine Luria spoke and answered inquiries from the audience in the Northampton High School gym April 23, before a panel of state and local politicians took their turn fielding questions.

"Everyone deserves access to quality, affordable health care," she said during an explanation of her position on what an inquirer termed "single payer" or "socialized medicine."

Single-payer health care means there is one public health care system that is funded by taxes, making the government the single payer.

"The Affordable Care Act (ACA) – it's a first step, but it was never perfect when we implemented it," she acknowledged.

"I believe in preserving the Affordable Care Act and continuing to make it better."

Rather than abandoning the ACA in favor of creating a single-payer health care system, Luria is interested in adding a "public option."

That means establishing a public health insurance agency that would create competition for private health insurance companies, with the purpose of driving down healthcare costs while preserving quality of care.

One example of a possible public option for health insurance is called Medicare-X, proposed by U.S. Senators Tim Kaine, of Virginia, and Michael Bennet, of Colorado.

The senators introduced the Medicare-X bill earlier this month. If it succeeds, starting in 2021, Medicare-X would be offered to localities that have a shortage of healthcare insurers. Medicare-X would be available in all ZIP codes by 2024.

Accomack and Northampton counties are among 62 Virginia localities with only one insurer participating in the ACA marketplace.

Luria seeks to reduce prescription drug costs through her participation on

the bipartisan caucus, Problem Solvers, which is focusing on the issue of drug patent extensions artificially inflating the cost of certain drugs, she explained.

Luria also mentioned the new rules for improving veteran access to medical care, established by the Veterans Affairs (VA) Mission Act recently signed into law.

She acknowledged the problem that Eastern Shore veterans have had traveling to the Hampton Roads VA Medical Center for care, a distance of "40 miles as the crow flies" that's not so convenient when actual driving distances are considered.

The new rules will give Shore veterans "access to care within the community."

Luria announced that she is leading a bipartisan effort to reauthorize funding for the Chesapeake Bay cleanup program of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), garnering applause from the audience.

The program has not formally been reauthorized since 2005. She and Congressman Rob Wittman are "pushing hard" for the bill that would fund the Chesapeake

Bay Program for the next five years.

She was asked her opinion of the Waters of the United States bill that would prohibit the EPA and U.S.

Army Corps of Engineers from enforcing certain regulations of the use of the country's waters and wetlands.

Luria said she has been asked to take sides "very aggressively" by both the environmental and agricultural communities. She has not made a final decision on her position, but she believes "we need to come to a medium that works for everyone."

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Cygnus Spacecraft Arrives at International Space Station

Northrop Grumman's Cygnus spacecraft, which was launched from the NASA Wallops Flight Facility last week, arrived and was bolted into place on the International Space Station (ISS) early Friday morning.

At the time of installation, Cygnus was flying 255 miles above the Indian Ocean just south of Singapore, NASA reported. The spacecraft will remain at ISS until July 23, when it will depart the station, deploy NanoRacks customer CubeSats, and then have a nine-month mission before it disposes of several tons of trash during a fiery reentry into the Earth's atmosphere.

Cygnus brought about 7,600 pounds of research materials, cargo, and supplies that will support some of the hundreds of investigations.

Astronauts exploring the moon's South Pole will need a way to help keep pesky lunar dust out of hard to reach places. One of the experiments

addresses this problem.

"This is the first flight of the Electrodynamic Dust Shield (EDS) and the first exposure to the space environment," said NASA scientist Carlos Calle. "It is a big deal, and we are very excited. We've been working on this for a long time."

Advanced Colloids Experiment-Temperature-10, or ACE-T-10, will test gels in a microgravity environment. "This research could aid in the development of increasingly complex materials that may serve as the building blocks for a range of applications on Earth including foods, drugs, and electronic devices," NASA stated. "The process also may provide an efficient method to build new materials and equipment in space."

Although ISS is equipped for health and life sciences research, the equipment available for cellular and molecular biology is still limited compared to capabilities found in Earth labs.

Bio-Analyzer, a new tool the size

of a video game console, allows astronauts to easily test body fluids such as blood, saliva, and urine, with just a few drops. It returns key analyses, such as blood cell counts, in two to three hours, eliminating the need to freeze and store samples.

The Vascular Aging investigation uses ultrasounds, blood samples, oral glucose tolerance tests, and wearable sensors to study aging-like changes that occur in many astronauts during their stay. It's one of three Canadian experiments exploring the effects of weightlessness on the blood vessels and heart, and the links between these effects and bone health, blood biomarkers, insulin resistance, and radiation exposure. Increased understanding of these mechanisms can be used to address vascular aging in both astronauts and the aging Earth population.

Spaceflight is known to have a dramatic influence on an astronaut's immune response. Rodents have an immune system that closely parallels

humans and will be used to learn more about the effects.

"This investigation aims to advance the development of measures to counter these effects and help maintain crew health during future long-duration space missions," according to NASA. "On Earth, it could advance research to improve the effectiveness of vaccines and therapies for treating diseases and cancers."

NASA will test Astrobees, three cube-shaped robots and a docking station for recharging — the first two are aboard Cygnus. The free-flying robots will use electric fans for propulsion and cameras and sensors to help them navigate. They have arms to grasp station handrails or to grab and hold items. Astrobees can operate in automated mode or under remote control from the ground to assist with routine chores on the station. They require no supervision from the crew, which would allow more time for the astronauts to do research.

fourth generation potato ranch and home of Phil Hickman, the chairman of Potatoes USA, the Marketing and Promotions Board for the U.S. potato industry.

"I want to be in tune with all the aspects of the Shore," she said. She also said she visited Chincoteague officials and the wildlife refuge to discuss the relocation of beach access.

Warner noted his association with Bob Bloxom, a Republican and longtime delegate, who served as his Secretary of Agriculture when Warner was governor. Bloxom's son, Rob Bloxom, is the current delegate.

A bit of a comedian, Warner said he wanted to "report of all the really good news things happening in Washington," and then stood there quiet for a moment or two. "Washington makes Richmond look logical even when the General Assembly is in session," he added.

Warner promised to continue fighting for broadband in rural communities. "I think we really have to think about this in new and creative ways," he said, adding that he hopes the 4G that everyone wants will soon turn into the 5G that everyone needs. "It's

like moving from radio to television, if the rural areas get left behind, we're really up the creek."

"I voted for ... 'Obamacare' years ago," he continued. "I knew when I voted for it, it wasn't perfect but it was the first time we did an expansion of health care." Warner said what he would like to see is "keep what's good and fix what is wrong." He also applauded Virginia for its Medicare expansion and wants to get a "match on states that went earlier than us." A real challenge would be "to treat rural hospitals the same as metropolitan on reimbursement rates."

Warner said he wants the cost of health care brought down as the U.S. spends "per capita twice as much as other countries. There is no reason we spend about \$1,500 per person" on prescriptions annually "when in France and England they spend \$600," he added.

"A constant issue is the Chesapeake Bay," Warner said. "The good news is Congress has put most of the money back in the bay and I think it will be repeated this year."

Regarding sea level rise, "Wish we could take it out of politics," Warner said. "I don't care what we call it ... low-lying

areas are going to be at risk." He said he will try to make sure "all the money doesn't end up in Hampton Roads, and Eastern Shore doesn't get its share."

Warner wants businesses to favor "humans" as it used to instead of concentrating on increasing earnings by small margins when 85 percent of the business is "people and (their) ideas. Shouldn't we treat people as well as the stuff?" he asked. "All those jobs don't need to be in Northern Virginia," Warner added.

In Luria's first 100 days in office, she was named the vice chair of the House Armed Services Subcommittee on Seapower and Projection Forces. Luria said she is working hard to get Vietnam veterans who were exposed to help for Agent Orange. She also is concerned about prescription drug costs and favored a bill on biologic drugs, which include recombinant proteins, tissues, genes, allergens, cells, blood components, blood, and vaccines.

Sue Mastyl, of Harborton, and a member of Citizens For a Better Eastern Shore (CBES), called Warner down about his support of the Fair Agricultural Reporting Method Act, known as the Farm Act, because it provides an exemption for hazardous substances from

animal waste at farms. "So now what is our remedy to get a handle on these emissions?" she asked, specifically naming ammonia from local poultry houses.

"I think you raise a valid point, let me take a look at that piece of legislation again," he said. "I'm surprised by your comment."

"I'm glad I surprised you," she answered. "I'd rather that you did it privately," he said, adding, "I owe you a better explanation."

The good news, Mastyl later said, is Warner's regional manager later took her contact information to follow up on it. "I think they are sincere," she said.

"On teacher training and compensation — underperforming too often we put our rookie teachers in our most challenged schools," said Warner. "If they get through the first five years then they get attracted and go to a wealthier area." He said the "wrong compensation model" is used. "Let's pay really successful teachers a bonus to go to schools."

Navy Chief Toni Walker of Wallops Island said the lack of child care is holding the community back. Charmin Horton, of the Eastern Shore branch of the food bank, told the officials that access to healthy affordable food is also an issue.

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
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How Far Must I Go to Get Legal CBD Oil?

Eastern Shore of Virginia residents will have to pay the hefty toll to cross the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel and then drive to Columbia Care dispensary, to be based in Portsmouth, Va., to legally purchase cannabidiol oil (CBD) or tetrahydrocannabinol oil (THC-A), which are derived from marijuana plants.

But, before using the dispensary, patients will also have to obtain registration from the state Board of Pharmacy. It is unclear when the dispensary will open as renovations will be made on a building first, according to reports.

According to the state bill, a doctor or practitioner may issue a written certification for the use of cannabidiol oil or THC-A oil for treatment or to “alleviate the symptoms of any diagnosed condition or disease determined by the practitioner to benefit from such use.”

The pharmacy board chose the companies that will run the five dispensaries in the state. They are in districts. Health Service Area V is

for residents in Hampton Roads and the Eastern Shore.

According to a list of state licenses, so far there are two Eastern Shore doctors who are registered to write certificates. They are Dr. Jefferson E. Moulds, a board-certified radiation oncologist at Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital, in Onancock, and Dr. Shirley Mason-Randall, an anesthesiologist, who founded Eastern Shore Pain Management Center, in Exmore.

“The written certification alone does not satisfy the conditions for asserting an affirmative defense for possessing CBD or THC-A oil. A patient, parent, or legal guardian must have a written certification issued to them by a physician prior to applying for registration with the Board of Pharmacy and possessing the oils.”

The state bill requires that each dispensed dose of the oils “not exceed 10 milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol.” It also requires “the Secretary of Health and Human Resources and the Secretary of Agriculture and For-

estry to convene a work group to review and recommend an appropriate structure for an oversight organization in Virginia and report its findings and recommendations to the Chairmen of the Senate Committees on Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources and Education and Health and the House Committees on Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources and Health, Welfare and Institutions by Nov. 1, 2019.”

According to the pharmacy board, “CBD and THC-A oils are derived from the Cannabis plant. They are minimally psychoactive and can be used to treat or lessen the symptoms

of many disease processes.”

The written certification is required because “marijuana remains illegal federally and in Virginia. Because of this, these oils cannot be prescribed; however, a physician may issue a written certification for the use of the oils.”

“A pharmaceutical processor is a facility that has obtained a permit from the Board of Pharmacy ... to cultivate Cannabis plants for the production of CBD oil and/or THC-A oil ... It is a vertical operation meaning that the plants are grown, oils produced, and oils dispensed all from the same facility. Each facility is responsible for the quality of oils produced.”

Subcontractor Suffers Electric Shock Performing Tower Repairs

A man was electrocuted Monday while making repairs to Accomack County's Communication Tower, which is near the county jail off Courthouse Avenue, in Accomac.

"The person who was shocked was a subcontractor for the company the county engaged to perform repairs," County Administrator Mike Mason said Tuesday. "The job this particular subcontractor was tasked with was to install new anchor points for the tower. It was approximately 5:33 p.m. when the accident occurred and County EMS was on the scene shortly thereafter."

Mason said the injured man was taken Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital, in Onancock, and later flown by helicopter to Peninsula Regional Medical Center, in Salisbury, Md.

Mason and the contractor, Allstate Power Inc., of Kentucky, would not identify the subcontracting company.

"There was an incident," said Chris Johnston, of Allstate. "The young man is in the hospital, alive, and our teams are on site and investigating ... we are waiting until we are able to get his side of the story," Johnston continued. He said he does not know the man's name or condi-

tion as it is not his employee.

"We are working as fast as possible to get as much information as we can to come to a conclusion," Johnston said. "I've talked to the subcontractor." Johnston noted that the subcontractor is not from the Eastern Shore. "Prayers and faith

have helped this young man this far. We will continue to say prayers and keep him in our thoughts."

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TUESDAY: DEQ BRIEFING ON GROUNDWATER PERMITS

The state Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) will host a public information briefing at 6 p.m., Tuesday, April 30, at Nandua High School, regarding 54 draft groundwater withdrawal permits for poultry facilities operating under consent orders in Accomack County.

Each of the State Water Control

Board orders allows the withdrawal of more than 300,000 gallons of groundwater a month.

DEQ will present an overview of recent permit activity and discuss how applications are evaluated, the results of the evaluations, what is included in a groundwater permit, and the next steps in the process.

After the presentation, attend-

ees will have an opportunity to ask questions. That session will not be part of the official public comment record, according to a notice. However, a public comment period for each draft permit will be initiated. More details concerning the public comment period, as well as upcoming public hearings on the draft permits, will be provided at the briefing.

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DEQ Groundwater Public Meeting Heats Up to a Boil

Environmentalist Ken Dufty, of Northampton County, was so exasperated by comments made at a recent Eastern Shore Groundwater Committee (ESGWC) meeting that he suggested Chairman John Coker move to Accomack to live beside a cluster of 24 poultry houses.

Coker is also vice chairman of the Northampton County Board of Supervisors and a likely candidate for the top spot because Chairman Spencer Murray is not seeking reelection in November.

"We're not going to be able to tell the poultry people or anybody how to run their business," Coker said during the groundwater meeting. He was referring to water usage and the expansion of poultry facilities in Accomack. "I'm certainly not going to tell somebody how to run their business. ... I don't know when enough is enough. I don't think the scientists can tell us. We're waiting for the scientists to tell us what really is going to happen to our water. We don't know yet. We all have

our gut feelings."

The groundwater committee wants poultry house operators to use the Columbia aquifer, which is replenished faster than the Yorktown aquifer.

"If the citizens in Northampton County did not demand and persuade the board of supervisors to tell the poultry industry that they would not be able to build their industrial sized broiler houses unless they adhered to a 1,000 foot setback in Northampton County, we indeed would be in the same poultry-saturated situation that residents find themselves saddled with in" Accomack, Dufty wrote to Coker.

"The inference that we should not regulate or advise businesses ... is a suggestion that may perhaps work for the industry or unchecked commerce, but it most certainly is not protective in most cases of public health, natural resources, or the environment," Dufty continued. "These three are assets that once lost are very difficult to recover or retrieve, and the suggestion that government should just take a hands-off

posture when dealing with prospective or existing industry or business is patently absurd and indeed insulting."

"You named Britt MacMillan as the scientist who we should rely on to tell us whether or not we should worry about the health or sustainability of our aquifer," said Dufty. "To my knowledge Britt MacMillan, although well regarded, is not a scientist, he is a groundwater consultant."

McMillian is a hydrologist and the committee's consultant. www.thebalancecareers.com and several other websites define "a hydrologist as a scientist who researches the distribution, circulation, and physical properties of the earth's underground and surface waters. They help environmental and other scientists preserve and clean up the environment, as well as search for groundwater."

"Many if not all of the major environmental and public health travesties of all time were created because these scientists or experts assured regulators that proposed actions by business or industry were harmless and benign," Dufty wrote.

He listed opioids among his arguments. "Scientists and experts assured the FDA (Food and Drug Administration) that opioids were harmless, non-addictive, and could be doled out like candy to patients needing pain relief ... Scientists and experts assured the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) and other regulators that deepwater drilling of oil in the Gulf of Mexico was safe, controlled, and no harm would ever result from this activity. The 2010 Deep Water Horizon oil spill turned

out to be the world's largest man-made environmental disaster thanks to the empty promises and assurances by the expert scientists. Their failure to protect and ensure that no harm would ensue from this deepwater exploratory well will reportedly have negative implications and effects that will last for generations."

He also blamed scientists and experts for assuring regulators in Michigan who failed to advise Flint residents about the water contaminants there and for the failure to adequately access the aquifer drawdown in Virginia Beach in the late 1970s causing "a halt in economic development for nearly 15 years until the pipe from Lake Gaston was constructed ... at a cost exceeding a half billion dollars."

Dufty said, "Nearly every major environmental accident, release of contaminants, spills or even the ill-placement of nuclear power plants were the result of miscalculations, omissions, oversights or blatant incompetence by the experts and scientists."

"It was clear to me by your questioning of Mr. McMillan and your transparent attempt to get him to say that there was perhaps an over-estimation of the amount of water that would be drawn from our aquifer by the 54 facilities currently under technical evaluation by the DEQ, (Department of Environmental Quality) an admission that Mr. McMillan refused to give, that you have become a fan of and for the poultry industry."

"This is most concerting for us here in Northampton County as many, many citizens spent a good deal of their time, resource, and energy protecting this county from the same industrial fate that is now plaguing residents living in" Accomack, he said. "We urge you to show more respect for your own constituency and our work in protecting Northampton county from environmental degradation and assault. ... My friends have a horse farm for sale in the Pungoteague area and will probably cut you a great deal. ... Perhaps you can encourage the owners of the adjacent 24 industrial broiler-house operation to silence their exhaust fans when you invite friends over for that backyard barbeque, something my friends have yet to perfect."


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

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Coffee and Conversation

Sen. Lynwood Lewis met constituents at the Cape Charles Coffee House last weekend to chat about the state legislature's challenges and triumphs that impact the Eastern Shore.

Much of the conversation focused on the health of the Eastern Shore's waters and lands and the people living on them.

"The reason we got Medicaid expansion is Donald Trump," Lewis said, referring to the "blue wave" that swept over Election Day 2018 when, in protest of the Republican president, citizens voted in Democratic lawmakers that helped pass Medicaid expansion in Virginia.

Bill Dyas is ready to see progress in the health care system for veterans, too.

A new bill will allow veterans to seek medical care closer to home, and Lewis and Eastern Shore Rural Health CEO Nancy Stern expect that local community health centers may be able to welcome veterans soon.

Currently, Eastern Shore veterans must travel to the Hampton Roads VA Medical Center for care, and the facility isn't accepting new patients.

Sue Mastyl asked what measures are being taken to protect Eastern Shore citizens from flooding and ero-

sion. Lewis believes living shorelines are a large part of the answer, which use natural elements to create buffers that protect land and prevent erosion.

He explained that a recent Virginia constitutional amendment will allow localities to reduce real estate taxes for property owners who make flooding resiliency improvements on their land, including living shorelines.

The conversation also touched on recycling and reducing the use of plastic bags. Renata Sheppard suggested that if stores charged for plastic bags, consumers would use fewer of them. To avoid creating a burden for low-income families, grocery shoppers who pay with food stamps would be exempt from paying for plastic bags. Lewis called Sheppard's ideas "excellent."

Sheppard and others also supported using after-school programs to teach kids more about environmental science. Mastyl emphasized the importance of kids not becoming "geographically illiterate," but learning about ecosystems like marshes and barrier islands and how to protect them.

Dyas has observed "resistance to teaching environmental policy" in local schools, but he noted after-school programs succeed wherever the principals are strong leaders.

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Phillips to Seek District 7 Seat

Howard “Jackie” Phillips announced Wednesday he will seek the District 7 seat on the Accomack County Board of Supervisors in the November General Election.

Phillips, of Cashville, a lifelong Accomack County resident and a 1979 graduate of Onancock High School, is ANEC’s coordinator of safety and transportation maintenance.

After high school, he became a certified diesel mechanic and said he worked closely with area farmers throughout the county. Phillips later joined the Army National Guard, where he was the distinguished graduate finishing first in his class of Advanced Individual Training. He served six years in the National Guard achieving the rank of staff sergeant.

Phillips then began his career at ANEC starting as a meter reader and custodian and working his way up the ranks after completing his four-year apprenticeship becoming an electrician lineman. He has served as a crew member, chief lineman, serviceman, superintendent, and director. He also served on the executive board of IBEW Local 1307 for two years.

“Public safety is a top priority for me,” Phillips said. “I’ve been involved in safety programs in the community for a number of years, from schools and churches to fire departments and local scout troops.”

Phillips became a Loss Control Professional through the University of Wisconsin School of Business and the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. He is an avid hunter and fisherman and is a past president of the Eastern Shore Anglers Club and was part of a group that helped establish what is known today as the Bay Challenge. Phillips is a member of Broadway Baptist Church, in Cashville, and has served as a deacon and trustee. He and his wife of 33 years have two adult daughters and twin grandsons.

Miriam Riggs, also of Cashville, is also vying for the post. Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy, who has held the job for many terms, is retiring.

Fire With Injury in Tasley

An unidentified property owner was burning down an old house on Church Road near Tasley on the evening of Saturday, April 20, when the fire got out of his control and 911 was called.

Deputy Chief Don Amadeo of Tasley Volunteer Fire Company said fire companies were called “as it was reportedly presenting a danger to a neighboring residence. We arrived and began hitting it with the deck gun, a big water cannon on the truck.”

“Chief Jeff Beall was attempting to pull a 3-inch supply line off the hose bed when he evidently lost his footing and fell off the rear of the engine,” said Amadeo. “He was transported to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital where he was treated

for apparent minor injuries and released.”

The fire was reported at about 6:35 p.m. Firefighters from Onancock, Melfa, Wachapreague, and Parksley also responded. Units were on the scene for about an hour. Firefighters were later called back “for a minor rekindle.”

In another incident, at about 3:15 a.m., April 18, firefighters from Onancock, Tasley, Parksley, Melfa, and Bloxom were dispatched to a fire in a one-car garage, with a vehicle inside, on Governor’s Drive, near Deep Creek. Firefighters arrived to find the garage was fully involved in fire with other structures nearby. They kept the fire from spreading, extinguished the blaze, and remained on scene about 90 minutes. No injuries were reported.

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Eggs and Issues: Broadband, Affordable Housing, and Litter

Eastern Shore citizens and civic leaders got the opportunity on April 23 to ask a panel of state and local politicians what government is doing about current issues, at the Eggs and Issues breakfast organized by the Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce.

The panel featured Sen. Lynwood Lewis, Del. Robert Bloxom, Chairman Donald Hart of the Accomack County Board of Supervisors, and Chairman Spencer Murray of the Northampton County Board of Supervisors.

Broadband Internet

Lewis said giving rural communities access to high-speed internet, aka broadband, is a “huge nut to crack” financially.

He played a role in establishing the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority (ESVBA) that continues to expand the Shore’s infrastructure for high-speed internet, running miles of fiber optic cable down secondary roads and driveways.

The authority provides broadband internet service directly to public schools and offices, businesses, and homes via fi-

ber optic cable, and it enables three local internet service providers to offer customers wireless broadband internet service.

“But we’re still falling short of the mark,” Lewis said. He believes federal funding for broadband infrastructure will be needed to “make a dent in the service areas.”

Lewis agreed with a statement made by Congresswoman Elaine Luria that the funding is likely to come in the form of an overarching infrastructure package that also includes money for roads, bridges, and waterways.

Bloxom added that because technology advances so quickly, it’s difficult to find investors willing to take a chance on “one technology that could conceivably be out-of-date by the time it’s built out.”

Affordable Housing and Wastewater Treatment

Murray acknowledged that finding affordable housing is a challenge on the Eastern Shore. In Northampton, for example, if 75 employees work for one employer, typically only 10 or 15 will be able to find affordable housing near their place of employment, he said.

Concerning affordable housing, “the key to it is infrastructure,” like sewer systems. The alternative of septic systems and mass drain fields isn’t always an option, he said.

Neither is every Eastern Shore town building and maintaining its own sewer system a workable goal, Murray added.

He supports the proposed Hampton Roads Sanitation District project that would take advantage of excess capacity at Onancock’s wastewater treatment plant and use it to serve the towns of Melfa, Nassawadox, and Exmore.

The project would require running a sewage pipe from Nassawadox to Onancock. A feasibility study has been completed, and the project needs federal funding to move forward, Murray said.

However, Bloxom is “a little more optimistic” about being able to pay for the project without federal funding and getting the job done more quickly.

He believes Eastern Shore towns should “get out of the business” of wastewater treatment. “The goal here is to actually lower the cost by bringing in someone who does nothing but treat water full time.”

Lewis said it’s an “all hands on deck” project, with support from Eastern Shore political representatives at all levels.

Hart added that Accomack is also working to address affordable housing needs, with 45 apartments expected to be built near the Virginia State Police barracks in Melfa.

“The reason it will work,” he said, is the apartment complex will connect to the sewage system at the nearby industrial park next to the Eastern Shore Community College.

Hart acknowledged that more workforce housing is also needed near Wal-

lops Island so employees can both work and live in Virginia instead of crossing the border into Maryland.

Stormwater Drainage

The panelists recognized that stormwater drainage is a problem that recently has been worsened by frequent heavy rains, but they had few answers for constituents on April 23.

“Whoever’s praying for rain, please stop,” Murray quipped. He noted that the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) performs less ditch maintenance now than it did in the past, and Northampton County lacks the capacity to dig out and clean out ditches.

Northampton is seeking clarity on conflicting regulations for stormwater drainage, and Accomack is also working with VDOT to find solutions.

Litter

One measure that Northampton County is able to take to improve drainage is cleaning trash out of culverts (wide, underground pipes that allow stormwater to flow under roads).

But litter is found throughout Accomack and Northampton counties.

“It is one of the biggest statements that we can make to people who come to the Shore,” Murray commented.

“I’ve always said, we’re poor, but we don’t have to look as poor as we are. And litter everywhere shows a disregard for our property and our land.”

In Accomack, the sheriff’s department allows nonviolent inmates to pick up litter along roads, under supervision. Accomack’s public works department assists the sheriff’s department in its efforts, Hart said.

“One thing that frustrates the board a lot is that we’ll see bags of trash within a half mile or a quarter mile of a convenience center.”

He wants to get Accomack schools onboard with a program starting in pre-K that teaches kids about littering and encourages them “to keep Mommy and Daddy and their brothers and sisters from throwing trash out of the car.”

“A lot of this is learned. You finish your McDonald’s, you throw it out the window,” he said.

Hart has seen clean roadsides become littered again within a couple days to a week. He hopes that educating children will help break the cycle.



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FOUR FINALISTS SELECTED IN QUEST FOR NEW ESCC PRESIDENT

Four finalists from among 92 applicants were named Wednesday by the State Board of Community Colleges in its quest to find a new president for the Eastern Shore Community College (ESCC).

The state board listed them alphabetically as David E. Bowles, of Hampton Roads, Va., Richard B. Pagan, of Daniels, W.Va., James Shaeffer, of Norfolk, Va., and Mellissia M. Zanjani, of Burlington Township, N.J.

“The Eastern Shore Community College presidency is attracting a diverse and dynamic collection of talented leaders from across the country,” said Glenn DuBois, chancellor of Virginia’s community colleges. “The college’s unique mixture of opportunities and challenges attracts innovative and creative leaders, excited about the chance to create the model 21st century rural community college, and that’s really promising for the entire Eastern Shore.”

Bowles earned his bachelor’s, master’s, and doctorate degrees from Virginia Tech. For the last five years, he has been the director of the NASA Langley Research Center, where he began in 1980 as a researcher. He has risen through the ranks there, serving as a project manager, deputy director, and associate director.

At NASA, an announcement stated, Bowles fostered the agency’s workforce, updating its physical facilities, creating innovative programs, and collaborated with external partners, including Virginia’s community colleges, for academic programs and economic development efforts. He was given the Presidential Rank Award for Meritorious Service in 2017 and the NASA Outstanding Leadership Medal in 2005 and 2015. Bowles is a member of the Virginia Governor’s Aerospace Advisory Council and the Virginia General Assembly Joint Commission on Technology and Science 2017 Committee charged with creating a “Blueprint for Growth of the Virginia Aviation and Aerospace Industry.”

Pagan, who retired from the U.S. Air Force, has more than 20 years of higher education leadership. In 1997, he began at Fairmont State University and its sister institution, Pierpont Community & Technical College, both in Fairmont, W.Va., as a professor and program coordinator. In 2011, he went to Guilford Technical

Community College, in Jamestown, N.C., to serve as Dean of the Transportation Technologies Division. Three years later, Pagan became the senior vice president and campus director of the National Aviation Academy in Bedford, Mass. In 2016, he was named vice president for Academic Affairs at New River Community and Technical College in Beaver, W.Va., where he currently works.

Pagan earned two associate degrees from the Community College of the Air Force, in Alabama, a bachelor’s degree from Liberty University, in Lynchburg, Va., a master’s degree from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, in Daytona Beach, Fla., and a doctorate from West Virginia University.

Shaeffer has been in education for four decades beginning in 1979 as a middle school teacher in the Kansas City School District. From 1984 to 1992, he worked at the University of Wyoming, Laramie. In 1992, he became an assistant professor and director of the School for Extended Studies and Public Studies at the University of Wyoming. From 1996 to 2005, Shaeffer worked at the University of

North Dakota, rising from an associate dean to an associate vice president. He moved to James Madison University, in Harrisonburg, Va., in 2005 where he was an associate vice provost and an associate professor. He became the founding dean of the College of Continuing Education and Professional Development at Old Dominion University in 2014, the position he currently holds. Shaeffer earned a bachelor’s degree from Iowa State University, a master’s degree from Kansas State University, and a doctorate from Northwestern University, in Illinois.

Zanjani has nearly 30 years of higher education, nonprofit, and fundraising experience. She is also a 2010 Fellow of the Thomas Lakin Institute for Mentored Leadership. In 1991, Zanjani began working at Towson University, in Md., as a student advisor and director of the African-American Cultural Center Program. She joined the American Lung Association of New Jersey in 1993 as the northern regional program director. In 1998, she became the director of development and alumni relations for Harford Community College in Bel Air, Md.

Zanjani moved to Tacoma Community College, in Washington, in 2003, to become vice president for Institutional Advancement and a foundation executive director. She held similar roles at Mercer County Community College in Trenton, N.J., in 2009; Georgian Court University in Lakewood, N.J., in 2013; and at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, Pa., in 2016. She became the vice president for Institutional Advancement at Lincoln University, in Pennsylvania, a year ago, the position she currently holds. Zanjani earned a bachelor’s degree from Chatham University, in Pittsburgh, Pa.; a master’s degree from Towson University; and a doctorate from Oregon State University.

The four seek to succeed Linda Thomas-Glover, the college’s fourth president, who retired in 2018, after serving for nine years. Billy Greer, who was president of Virginia Wesleyan, in Virginia Beach, Va., has served as ESCC’s interim president since January 2018.

The finalists will visit the college later this month and in early May to meet with faculty, staff, students, and the community.

Census Presents Problems and Opportunities in 2020

The 2020 census could be a problem in Accomack County. Along with misconceptions about reporting your existence to the Census Bureau, there's an old issue.

Twenty years ago it was somehow reported that 5,000 people lived on one small lot at Trails End.

"We proved to those people (the census bureau) that we did not have those people," Chairman Donald Hart of the Accomack board of supervisors said at a

board session Wednesday. "We took them to the lot, the actual lot. They wouldn't back down from it."

Since then, the county has been trying to live down the stigma of a dwindling population as the invisible people disappeared.

"That cost us so much grief," said Supervisor Grayson Chesser. "It was great in some ways, Sheriff (Robert) Crockett got some extra cars," Chesser said.

Crockett, who is now a county supervisor, smiled widely at the mention. He said he was able to hire some new deputies too. Had to change zoning," Chesser said.

"Years and years and years of grief. One of the worse things is the perception that the county is losing population. I don't believe we are. I don't believe we have in a long time. I can see people from other areas moving into District 3. ... We paid a big price for extra monies. ... I bet in the end it cost more. ...

"It's so very important that we get this right."

William P. O'Hare, president of O'Hare Data and Demographic Services LLC in Cape Charles, said discrepancies could

cost tens of thousands in federal funds for a decade, which is how often the census is done. "Complete Count Committees" are being established across the country to make sure every person is counted and to help get people to register who are reluctant, he said.

"We have a lot of population on the Eastern Shore that is at risk not to be counted," said O'Hare. He is working to distribute literature at the food bank and at the library's upcoming Diversity Day event. During the census for the first time, people will be able to register online after they receive a number in the mail.

Supervisor Reneta Major invited O'Hare to speak at the session. "The most vulnerable folk that don't get counted are children," she said. "I think it's frugal for Accomack County. I do thank you for coming and sharing and kudos."

O'Hare said that sometimes grandparents or grandchildren are not counted because people don't think to include them as part of the immediate family unit even though they live at the same residence.

"People who are non-citizens will probably be reluctant." There are people who

have privacy issues and don't want to answer a bunch of questions, he said. "People who have been incarcerated might think they don't have the right to be counted."

Then there is the issue of the 14 incorporated towns where people use post office boxes. When mail is sent to their physical address it is often returned to sender, said Supervisor Donald Hart.

"Personally, I kind of think my address is not correct and there are many, many, many in the county that are like that," said Supervisor Ron Wolff.

O'Hare said if the question of being a citizen winds up being on the form, it can be skipped and the person would still be counted. In some cases, a trusted community leader might be able to persuade people to register.

In other business, Director of Public Safety C. Ray Pruitt outlined an agreement that is of no cost to the county but will utilize NASA's fire department in times of need.

Board members also reported positive input regarding the merger of the chamber of commerce and tourism commission.

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

Fishing from the Shore

With the most recent bouts of wind and rain, not much has changed on the fishing scene over the last week, with the exception of increased numbers of red drum behind the breakers of the southernmost barrier islands. Flounder fishing is becoming a little more consistent as the air temperature swings become less severe. A few speckled trout have shown up in local nets and crab pots. Look for the bite to take off a few days before the next full moon and peeler run.

Upper Shore – Allan Ring, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, described the seaside flounder bite as “spotty, but picking up,” with catches coming in from the waters between Quinby and Chincoteague. Best baits have been large live bull minnows, silversides, Berkley Gulp, and strips of squid. The black drum bite continues off the beach. Sea clams have been the bait of choice for surf fishermen when targeting black drum. Ring noted there has also been some red drum showing up in the seaside catches. The Maryland rockfish season has gotten off to a slow start due to the wind and the dirty water created from the runoff. Anglers willing to put in their time have managed to put a few keepers in the boat. Some of the most consistent action has occurred in Tangier Sound by anglers trolling large 9-inch rubber shads on tandem and umbrella rigs.

On the freshwater scene, crappie fishing has been good on the Pocomoke River for anglers using one-sixteenth-ounce jigs, fished with curly tails and small minnows. Live bloodworms have been the bait of choice for black perch.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, reported that anglers were finding a few flounder, despite the recent wind and rains. He said that the fishing will be-

come steadier once the night time air temperatures consistently remain in the 60s. Most anglers are concentrating their efforts in Green Channel, Drawing Channel, and on the flats of Burton’s Bay. The shop will be hosting the 29th edition of the Captain Zed’s Annual Flounder Tournament beginning on April 26 and running through Sunday, May 5. First place will be worth \$2,500 in cash and the first 400 tournament registrants will get a free tournament T-shirt.

Chincoteague- Donna Rae, at Captain Bob’s Marina, said that weather had a huge impact on fishing during most of last week, with winds frequently gusting to 25 miles per hour. She reported that the few times that anglers were able to get out, dirty water and lots of drifting seaweed presented big challenges to fishing success. She commented that a few flounder were landed in Assateague Channel near the bridge. Rae was excited about the black drum run occurring in the surf. She said clam baits were the ticket to getting the big uglies to bite.

Jimmy Vasilou, at Captain Steve’s Bait & Tackle, reported that black drum were being taken off the beach, with increasing numbers of puffers (swelling toads, toadfish) also showing up. Inside, anglers were slowly picking away at the flounder. Captain John Chenault managed three keeper flounder on Sunday.

Lower Shore – Jeb Brady, at Bailey’s Bait & Tackle, said that the weather has made it tough to fish. He added that when anglers were able to get out, there were plenty of red drum in the surf of the lower shore barrier islands, with a few black drum mixed in. Brady added that some tautog are being caught under the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel as well as on the

Cabbage Patch.

Chris Snook, at Chris’ Bait & Tackle, reported that anglers were catching black and red drum in the barrier island surf as well as from boats anchored just beyond the breakers. Some tautog have been pulled from around the concrete ships and along the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Flounder fishing out of Oyster has been slowly improving.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) Virginia office today announced the results of the 2017 Census of Agriculture with new information about Virginia farms and ranches and those who operate them, including first-time data about on-farm decision making, down to the county level. The market value for livestock sold was \$2.60 billion, up 8.6 percent from \$2.39 billion in 2012 while the market value for crops at \$1.36 billion, up slightly from 2012.

“The 2017 Census of Agriculture provides a wide range of demographic, economic, land, crop and livestock production information,” said Herman Ellison, State Statistician. “Many of these data about Virginia and our counties are only collected and reported as part of the every-five-year census.”

“The Census shows new data that can be compared to previous censuses for insights into agricultural trends and changes down to the county level,” said NASS Administrator Hubert Hamer. “We are pleased to share first-time data on topics such as military status and on-farm decision making. To make it easier to delve into the data, we are pleased to make the results available in many online formats including a new data query interface, as well as traditional data tables.”

Some key Virginia highlights include:

- In 2017, the number of farms in Virginia totaled 43,225, down 6.1 percent from 46,030 farms in 2012.
- Land in farms, 7.80 million acres, down 6.1 percent from 8.30 acres in 2012.
- The average size of farm in Virginia was 180 acres, no change when compared to 2012.
- Market value of agriculture

products sold was \$3.96 billion, up 6 percent from \$3.75 billion in 2012.

- The average value of agriculture products sold per farm was \$91,625 compared to \$81,540 in 2012.

For the 2017 Census of Agriculture, NASS changed the demographic questions to better represent the roles of all persons involved in on-farm decision making. As a result, in 2017 the number of all producers totaled 70,594, up 2.4 percent from 2012.

Other demographic highlights include:

- The number of female producers totaled 25,509, up 18 percent from 2012.
- The number of male producers 45,085, down 4.8 percent when com-



pared to 2012.

- The average age of the all producers was 58.5 years, compared to 57.2 years in 2012.

- The young producers (age 35 years or less) totaled 5,996 or 8.5 percent of all producers.

- The number of producers who served in the military was 9,217 or 13 percent of all producers.

- The new and beginning producers (10 years or less on any farm) totaled 18,957 or 27 percent of all producers.

The Census tells the story of American agriculture and is an important part of our history. First conducted in 1840 in conjunction with the decennial census, the Census of Agriculture accounts for all U.S. farms and ranches and the people who operate them. After 1920, the census happened every four to five years. By 1982, it was regularly conducted once every five years. Today, NASS sends questionnaires to nearly 3 million potential U.S. farms and ranches. Nearly 25 percent of those who responded did so online. Conducted since 1997 by USDA NASS – the federal statistical agency responsible for producing official data about U.S. agriculture – it remains the only source of comprehensive agricultural data for every state and county in the nation and is invaluable for planning the future.

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
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
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Posted at Sea Level

Easter Hit-and-Flee

Dear Editor:

Easter Sunday at approximately 6 a.m. a white pickup truck pulling an older trailer with unsecured demo lumber on the trailer heading west on Chincoteague Road passed my son headed east somewhere between Ray’s Shanty and T’s corner. A piece of lumber was hanging off the trailer and struck my son’s truck in the driver’s fender, and came inside

the cab between the fender and door, striking my son on the left side of his chest, tearing a seven-inch gash under his arm and breaking his shoulder blade.

The truck did not stop. My son stopped and waited then stopped again at Ray’s Shanty. He then drove to his home. Atlantic Fire and Rescue came and had to cut the door open to get him out and he was taken to Salisbury hospital and then to Baltimore Shock Trauma.

As of Tuesday afternoon, he is still there. I’m writing this for three reasons. First, let this be a lesson to take a few minutes to secure your load with a strap, in order to eliminate such an event from happening. Second, life is precious; three more inches over and my son would have had a board driven into his heart on Easter morning. Third, this irresponsible individual needs to be held accountable for their careless actions.

There is absolutely no way the driver didn’t know a board on their trailer hit another vehicle hard enough to penetrate the cab.
