Accomack and Northampton Schools Consider 'Free Lunch for All' Programs

Accomack County Public Schools might soon provide free breakfast and lunch for every student through a program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's food and nutrition service agency.

The program is Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), and it's such a "huge" development that the entire school division qualifies for it, Accomack schools Director of Finance Beth Onley said.

A school or school division will qualify for the program if at least 40% of its students receive social service benefits such as Medicaid, SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, aka food stamps), and TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families), giving students "direct certification" for the USDA program.

About 55% of Accomack public school students have direct certification, and a total of 64% qualified for the free and reduced lunch program this year.

Because the school division qualifies for the USDA program through direct certification, parents will no longer need to fill out applications for their children to get free breakfast and lunch.

With every student getting breakfast and lunch for free, Accomack schools would no longer have to worry about bad debt from unpaid lunch bills, which was about \$28,000 this year, Onley said.

With USDA's help, Accomack schools could provide free meals to students without losing money, but only if participation in breakfast and lunch increases.

About 36% of students eat school breakfast; that number must increase by at least 6 percentage points. About 56% of students eat school lunch; that number must increase by at least 8 percentage points.

Onley proposed two strategies for increasing participation in school breakfast.

At the elementary level, a program called Breakfast in the Classroom would be implemented. Kids are more likely to eat breakfast when they see their peers getting breakfast in class, Onley said.

When Newport News implemented the program, the number of children who ate school breakfast doubled.

Accomack's numbers are expected to more than double, Onley said.

The middle schools will offer Grab and Go breakfasts that students can pick up at kiosks in convenient locations – typically in the halls and cafeteria – and take to class to eat.

The school board unanimously approved the continued development of the free breakfast and lunch program at their July 16 meeting.

In Northampton County, even more students qualified for the school division's free and reduced meal program this year – 76%.

Northampton schools Director of Operations Chris Truckner said when he began working for the school division nine years ago, the number of students who qualified for free and reduced lunch was about 67%, and now that number stays between 75% and 78%.

"I'm a huge advocate for making sure the hungry (are) fed," he said at the June 13 Northampton school board meeting.

But he isn't yet confident that the school division can participate in USDA's Community Eligibility Provision program and not lose money.

One of Truckner's concerns is that Northampton schools' lunch periods are not long enough to accommodate the increased number of students who would eat school lunch if it was free to everyone.

Chief Financial Officer Brook Thomas, who has analyzed data from the cafeteria point-of-sale systems, said it takes about 11 seconds to serve each high school student and 15.5 seconds to serve each elementary school student.

At Northampton High School, by the time the last student is served lunch, there are about eight to 11 minutes left in the lunch period for that student to finish the meal, Truckner said.

Sometimes there were only four minutes left in the lunch period when the last student was served, Thomas added.

Extending the lunch period would mean cutting into instructional time, Truckner said.

It would also affect recess, Superintendent Eddie Lawrence added.

The program could also affect transportation, depending on how early students would need to arrive at school for breakfast, he said.

School board member Maxine Rasmussen suggested adding Grab and Go options at lunch to speed up service times. Northampton has already implemented Grab and Go breakfasts at the middle and high school.

Truckner called it a "great idea" but added that USDA has strict guidelines for school lunches, which must be followed.

Northampton schools will have to hire more staff to accommodate the additional students who will participate in school breakfast and lunch if the division participates in the Community Eligibility Provision program.

Truckner cautioned that it would be problematic if the school division implemented the program and later decided it was no longer sustainable and ended it. "You can always give somebody something, but when you take it back, well, it's a time."

Lawrence agreed the program and its implementation require more thorough investigation "before we jump off a cliff we can't climb back up on."

A committee will do the research as part of the update to Northampton schools' comprehensive improvement plan, and the school board will revisit the subject during the next school year.



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Cape Charles Town Council Upholds Decision to Deny Mural on Front of Hotel

The Cape Charles Historic District Review Board prevailed when the town council upheld the board's decision to deny permission to paint a mural on the front of the historic Hotel Cape Charles on Mason Avenue.

The application was for creating "public art," not "painting a building in the historic district," according to Hotel Cape Charles owner David Gammino.

But the argument he made before town council members July 18 was not enough to change their minds, and they voted unanimously to uphold the historic district review board's decision.

It was the first win for the historic district review board since the town council overturned four of the board's decisions at a special meeting July 8.

All four of the denials that were reversed related to the construction or renovation of homes or related structures in the residential area of Cape Charles' historic district.

But Gammino's case was different.

He proposed painting a mural on the front of a historic hotel on Mason Avenue, Cape Charles' main street and commercial center.

Gammino said he was inspired by the Richmond Mural Project and the nearly 100 murals that appear on buildings throughout the city's historic district. The murals can be viewed at <https://richmondmuralproject.squarespace.com/murals-1>

But one key difference is that most of the Richmond murals are painted on the sides of brick buildings, whereas the Hotel Cape Charles mural would have been front-facing.

Mayor Smitty Dize indicated that if the painting was for maintenance purposes, it would be acceptable, because the historic hotel was previously painted.

But the purpose of the project was not maintenance, but art.

Chairwoman Susan Eidam, of the historic district review board, said that public art is "completely incongruous" with the neighborhood.

If the town council had overruled the historic district review board on

the Hotel Cape Charles, it wouldn't have been the first time.

In 2013, the town council overruled the historic district review board's decision to reject the balcony redesign at the hotel, according to a news report.

The work was performed without permission, and the historic district review board refused to grant a Certificate of Appropriateness for the project, which was required before obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy and opening the hotel for business.

When the town council deemed the work consistent with the historic district guidelines and allowed the hotel to open, four of the five members of the historic district review board resigned or planned to resign, the report stated.

At the latest town council meeting July 18, council members agreed that Cape Charles needs public art, but it doesn't belong on the facade of a building that contributes to the town's historic district.

Councilman Steve Bennett said a mural on the front of the hotel would be an "eyesore."

Leash Law

Town Manager Larry DiRe recommended that Cape Charles enact a leash law, and he presented a draft of the proposed ordinance to the town council.

"If we don't do public safety, and if we don't do public health, we're not doing government," DiRe told the council.

The law would require dogs to be walked on a leash or other physical restraint.

The language in the existing town ordinance that suggests dogs may be kept under control using voice commands is "arbitrary and capricious," DiRe said.

Currently, dogs are permitted on Cape Charles' public beach from the day after Labor Day to April 1, after 9 p.m. and before 9 a.m.

The new law would expand the times dogs are allowed on the beach — where they may run and play off-leash — to the day after Labor Day through May 1, after 9 p.m. and before 10 a.m.

The council planned to vote on the proposal at a special meeting Aug. 1.

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Accomack County Salaries Are on the Rise Since 2017

Accomack County's 15 senior administrators and constitutional officers are being paid a total of \$1,568,035 annually, according to information provided on request to the Eastern Shore Post. The tally does not include benefits.

Eight of the county leaders make more than \$100,000, up from seven in 2017 and five in 2016. County school workers are not part of the calculation. The figures are as of July 12.

County Administrator Mike Mason is the best-paid employee. His annual salary is \$138,679, which now surpasses that of his predecessor, Steve Miner, who was getting \$137,862 a year when he retired in early 2017.

County administrators are appointed by the Accomack County Board of Supervisors. Before taking this job, Mason worked for years as Accomack's finance director. His salary is up by almost \$6,700 in two years. He makes more than the other top salary-getters: the county prosecutor, county attorney, sheriff, and clerk of the circuit court.

"All employee salaries were last adjusted in mass on July 1, 2019, for a

3% general salary increase approved by the board (of supervisors) when they adopted the fiscal year 2020 county budget," said Mason.

Commonwealth's Attorney J. Spencer Morgan III is paid \$130,637. That figure is up from 2017 when his annual wage was \$124,345. His former boss, Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar, was making \$127,643 when he retired in 2016. Morgan is running unopposed in November. His post comes up for election every four years.

County Attorney Cela Berge is paid \$128,433. That figure is up from \$122,247 in 2017, and \$117,500 in 2016. But it is still less than the amount the previous county attorney, Mark Taylor, was paid for 2014. Taylor was paid \$131,602. Both Berge and Taylor were appointed by the board of supervisors.

Clerk of the Circuit Court Samuel Cooper is paid \$126,206. He brought in \$120,128 in 2017 and \$115,463 in 2016. Cooper faces voters every eight years and has held the job for decades.

Sheriff Todd Godwin is paid \$123,246. He was elected twice by the voters and is planning on retiring at the end of the year. Godwin was a deputy for decades before he became sheriff. He oversees a staff of 82, which includes workers at Accomack County Jail. In 2017, Godwin had a staff of nearly 70 employees, and he was paid \$113,656 annually. His third in command, Todd Wessells, is running unopposed in November for the job.

Assistant County Administrator Stewart Hall is paid \$108,919. He was previously called the director of public works and has also held the title of deputy administrator of public works

and facilities. His position also oversees the airport and parks and recreation. Hall was paid \$103,674 in 2017.

Chief Information Officer Ben Fox is paid \$107,244. Fox's previous title was information technology director. Now he is also responsible for overseeing the county's translator television service and communications towers. Fox was paid \$97,288 in 2017.

Assistant County Administrator Rich Morrison has an annual salary of \$107,242. He was previously called deputy director of buildings, planning, and economic development. Before that, he held the title of director and planning and community development. Morrison was paid \$102,077 in 2017.

The salary for Chief Human Resources Officer Kathy Carmody is \$98,200. Her annual pay went from \$75,000 to \$93,470 in a reorganization in 2017. She is also in charge of records management.

Director of Public Safety C. Ray Pruitt is paid \$91,914. In 2017, he was paid \$87,487.

County Assessor Brent Hurdle makes \$90,616. He was getting \$86,252 in 2017.

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Director of Environmental Programs Chris Governator is paid \$89,111, which is up from \$84,819 in 2017. His job includes overseeing the county's storm drainage.

Treasurer Dana Bundick will retire at the end of 2019. Her annual pay is \$88,344. Bundick's post is an elected one. Her annual salary in 2017 was \$84,089.

Commissioner of the Revenue Deborah T. Midgett makes less than Bundick because she hasn't been doing the job as long. She is seeking another term in November and is paid \$81,099. Commissioner of the Revenue Leslie Savage, who died in office, was paid \$83,672 in 2017. Her salary usually matched Bundick's.

Registrar Patricia White was listed with a salary of \$58,145. In 2017, White's annual pay totaled \$55,345.

The annual salary for Airport Manager Barbara Haxter was also not included in the tally for directors. However, the "employee by department listing" had a single airport employee getting \$54,921 annually. Haxter was paid \$44,735 in 2016.

Average Salaries for Other County Workers

There are 225 county workers who are not considered administrators.

The average salary among them was \$41,776. A footnote stated, "the average salaries for the following departments are not comparable to those provided to the Eastern Shore Post in October 2017 due to re-allocation of staff after reorganization or vacancies."

That average salary figure included the airport worker. There was a circuit court worker making \$44,815.

The eight building and zoning department workers make an average of \$48,395.

The five workers at the circuit court clerk's office are paid an average of \$36,534.

The four workers from the commissioner of revenue's office are paid an average of \$30,450.

The five commonwealth attorney's office employees are paid an average of \$47,854.

The two county administration workers have an average salary of \$41,670.

The four environmental programs department employees make an average of \$35,892.

The four finance department workers are paid \$53,572 on average.

The two human resource workers have an average salary of \$36,816.

The three IT employees have an average salary of \$65,443.

The juvenile probation worker is paid \$37,550.

The legal services employee was listed as having a salary of \$46,006.

The three parks and recreation department employees average \$48,086 and must include manager Wayne Burton as his position was not listed elsewhere.

The two planning department workers are paid an average of \$48,086.

The 52 public safety workers are

paid an average of \$42,105.

The 44 public works department employees have an average salary of \$35,405.

The seven assessor's department workers have an average salary of \$46,930.

The two voter registrar employees are paid \$34,360 on average.

Sixty-eight sheriff's workers were listed with an average salary of \$43,795.

The six employees at the treasurer's office are paid an average of \$34,448.

Average Accomack Salary Lower Than National

The average income of an Accomack County resident is lower than the median nationwide figure. Also, on average men are making more money than women in Accomack.


The latest figures, from 2017, show the median household income in Accomack County was \$42,260 compared to the national average of \$60,336. Full-time male employees in Accomack made 1.34 times more than female employees. The statewide average salary for a man is \$74,183. The average for a woman is \$55,180.

According to www.virginia-demographics.com, nearly 20 percent of Accomack residents live in poverty. The website states the average age of the 32,412

people in Accomack is 46. Accomack County ranks 38 of 95 in population.

The website www.datausa.io states the median household income in Accomack increased from \$38,503 in 2016. The average commute time to work is 21 minutes. The average household has two vehicles.

There are 13,800 workers in the county. The largest industries are manufacturing with 2,394 employees, health care and social assistance with 1,777, and retail trade with 1,461. The highest paying industries are utilities with a salary of \$72,109, information with \$64,583, and professional, scientific, and technical services with \$58,214.





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Some Accomack Supervisors Are Frustrated With Grass and Trash

Accomack County Supervisor Paul Muhly, of District 4, wants Dollar General, in Mappsville, to be the great neighbor it promised to be. One step in that direction, Muhly said, would be for the business to cut its grass.

“If you drive up the highway, there are times that the grass is so high up there, you can hardly see the sign,” Muhly told the board of supervisors at a session last week. “They (Dollar General) were going to take care of everything but they don’t.”

The store was permitted to build in a residential area, Muhly said. “People take care of their yards. This corporation doesn’t do that. I wonder if we can have staff write them a regional letter.”

The board agreed that would be a good idea. County Administrator Mike Mason said Tuesday the letter was in a rough draft form and would be in the mail by the Eastern Shore Post’s deadline Thursday.

Muhly had not yet been elected to the board when three acres in the residential district were rezoned to business despite the protests of some local citizens and nearby business owners. Muhly spoke against it at a public hearing. “Mappsville is not mentioned in the comprehensive

plan as a business center since traffic safety is an issue and there is no nearby traffic light,” he said in 2015. “Shouldn’t the vote be based on existing policies? Why make a dangerous situation worse. Vote no.”

The issue came down to choosing between businesses as a long-established market nearby was opposed. After that hearing, the board voted 6-3 in favor of the zoning change.

In another matter, Supervisor Harris Phillips, of District 5, said he is concerned about rules at county convenience centers and wants the facilities to be “more convenient for people so trash doesn’t end up on the side of the roads.”

As a very accessible shop owner in Parksley, Phillips said people often come to him with their woes. “I’m getting a lot of complaints about convenience centers or lack thereof,” he said.

First, someone came to his business and said he was told he was not permitted to take trash to the center that wasn’t put in a bag. “That was taken care of,” said Phillips. Then, “someone had 20 bags and were told they brought too many,” said Phillips, adding, “Got rid of that.” Then he was told “People can’t use the convenience center more than once a day. Who

is making these policies up?” Phillips wanted to know.

Supervisor Ron Wolff, of District 2, is chairman of the solid waste committee. “I’ve heard a few things also. Hadn’t heard that last one.” Wolff said he dumps un-bagged trash from a container straight into the center’s receptacle. He plans to discuss the issues at the next committee meeting.


“One thing we heard at the last meeting was at the Horntown site there was a sign that said ‘only Virginia residents,’” said Wolff. “That is not true. From the committee and from Mr. (Stewart) Hall’s standpoint, we want to see all trash going into the convenience center.” Wolff explained that a lot of Maryland residents work on Wallops Island and take their trash to Horntown’s center. “At least they are not putting it on the side of the road and we welcome that.”

Wolff noted, “From May through June, 10,000 vehicles visited the convenience center on Parksley Road. It’s the busiest one in the county.”

At press time Thursday, County Administrator Mike Mason said the county had contacted Dollar General “and has been assured by a Dollar General representative that the grass at Mappsville will be addressed immediately. It is my expectation that it will be mowed if not today, before the end of the week.”





Ayres Sentenced for Attempted Murder of Deputy

Deandre Breshon Ayers, formerly of Painter, was sentenced to 34 years of active time in prison last week in Accomack Circuit Court for five felony charges including the 2016 attempted capital murder of Deputy Eric Nottingham.

Ayers, 31, of Hanson Avenue in Norfolk, Va., is also known as Deondre Brashaun Ayers, De'Andre Breshon Ayers, and De'Andre Breshon Ayres. He pleaded not guilty to the charges and plans to appeal the decisions.

The defendant was given another five years for violating probation bringing his total to 39 years. Ayers was sentenced to five years with three suspended each for shooting at an emergency vehicle, shooting from

a vehicle, use of a firearm and possession of a firearm by a felon. Judge W. Revell Lewis III also sentenced Ayers to 40 years for the attempted murder with 15 years suspended. Lewis ordered Ayres to be on good behavior forever.

On Sept. 26, 2016, Accomack officers were notified that Maryland police were looking for a silver Chevy Malibu in connection with a robbery at PNC Bank in Pocomoke, Md. Maryland authorities said three people threatened to blow up the bank but did not display weapons or explosive devices to tellers. Afterward, they were seen getting into the Malibu, which had Virginia tags.

Just after hearing the alert, Nottingham said he saw the vehicle near Temperanceville. He followed and when it ran a stop sign, he attempted to pull the car over.

"The vehicle was acting like it was stopping," Nottingham testified at the trial. It rolled to about five to 10 miles per hour "and then floored it and went up to 80 to 90 mph." The deputy said the car suddenly jammed on the

brakes. That's when he saw an arm come out of the driver's window with a gun pointed toward him.

"It started popping off," Nottingham said. "I heard metal clanking around. I just heard a whole bunch of shots." The deputy tried to chase the Malibu but his car had quit running as "three bullets struck my vehicle, one of them hit the transmission core," Nottingham testified.

Prosecutor Spencer Morgan said Ayers admitted to driving the car from the Maryland bank robbery. It was unclear if Ayers would be taken there for trial.

Murder-for-Hire Plotter Sentenced

Cynthia Harmon confessed to an Accomack Circuit Court jury last January that Evron Terrell Strand Sr. was her partner in love and crime. Their illegal acts included selling drugs and attempting to arrange the murder of a police informant who was injured in a 2017 shooting.

Harmon said she testified against Strand, 44, of Nelsonia, in hopes of a getting a reduced sentence for herself and because it was "the right thing to do." Last week, her better-late-than-never ethics were rewarded.

Judge W. Revell Lewis III accepted a plea bargain agreement between Harmon and Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. The document involved giving Harmon four years of active time in prison for conspiring to murder Nathaniel "Nate" Johnson and conspiring to obstruct justice. In exchange, she pleaded guilty to the two charges. Warrants initially said she committed 16 felonies.

The informant was shot three times just before he was scheduled to testify against Strand for cocaine distribution. His teenage girlfriend was shot in the foot. Both victims recovered.

Harmon was sentenced to 20 years for the murder conspiracy charge with 16 years suspended. She was given a 10-year suspended sentence for obstruction. Harmon has been in jail since November 2017 and has served nearly half her term. She was ordered to be on supervised probation for three years and on good behavior for the rest of her life.

Morgan said Harmon, 53, of Parksley, "acted primarily as a switchboard for Strand." She set up three-way phone conversations between Strand and prospective hitmen, including her son. Strand was in jail when the incidents occurred. After the shooting, Harmon, and her son, Debrandon Pierre "Beans" Harmon, 30, delivered payment to one of the suspects. The three went to the local Walmart to make the transaction. Cynthia Harmon does not have a prior criminal record, Morgan said.

Strand is scheduled to be sentenced on Aug. 1. He is being held in the Eastern Shore Regional Jail. A jury recommended he be sentenced to a total of 50 years in prison for seven charges. Debrandon Harmon is scheduled for trial Sept. 12.

Cynthia Harmon told Lewis she is enrolled in a GED program through the Accomack Jail. She quit school in the ninth grade, she said. Defense lawyer Tucker Watson offered no evidence at the trial. Harmon did not speak when Lewis offered her a final opportunity before sentencing.

Last week, Keenan Jibrel Berry, 26, of Parksley, who said he lived near Harmon, was given five years of active prison time for his part in the scheme. He was recorded telling Strand about Johnson's location. Berry denied any involvement and pleaded no contest, which means he contended his innocence but pleaded guilty to conspiring to murder because of overwhelming evidence.

Aaron Jamarcus Bowens, also known as "Easy" and "BOBO," 22, of Painter, was another of the men Strand asked to kill Johnson. Bowens pleaded guilty to the conspiracy. He was set to be sentenced last week. That final step was delayed until Sept. 5.

Roquan Lee'teq "Cake" Rogers, 21, of Exmore, the accused shooter, was



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convicted of three counts of conspiracy in connection with the murder plans. The jury was deadlocked on nine other counts, which included attempted capital murder. Both victims testified at Rogers' trial that he was the person who shot them. At Strand's trial, the young woman, who says she is no longer involved with Johnson, testified that she was going by what Johnson had said.

A new jury could read the transcripts to see if it can come to a conclusion about Rogers. His attorney has argued for all the charges to be dismissed. The first jury recommended a total of 17 years in prison for Rogers but when polled, one juror said he did not agree with the suggestion.

Bond Denied for 17-Year-Old Accused of Rape

Bond was denied Monday in Northampton Circuit for Kwelli Juwan Spady, the 17-year-old Northampton High School student who is accused of abducting and raping another pupil last Valentine's Day.

Spady, of Cape Charles, was indicted on the charges and will be tried as an adult. He has been held at the Norfolk Detention Center since his arrest Feb. 15, except when he was brought to Eastville for court appearances. A jury trial has been set for Oct. 15. The incidents occurred at the school.

Northampton Sheriff David Doughty said Spady was taken back to the detention center after the hearing. "Due to the nature of the charges and safety of the public, bond was denied," he said.

In another case, Tamekia Nakesha Davis, 29, of Savagetown Road in Painter, was convicted of misdemeanor embezzlement from Food Lion, in Exmore, July 15, 2018. She was initially charged with two counts of felony embezzlement. Davis was sentenced to 12 months in jail with 345 days suspended. Restitution of \$767 was ordered. The court file stated a video showed Davis sliding merchandise across the counter and then voiding it from the total transaction.

Norfolk Man Charged With Felony Eluding

A Norfolk, Va., man was charged in

papers filed in Northampton County General District Court recently with felony eluding.

Jericho Llaneta, 27, was arrested on July 16 for the offense that was alleged to have occurred the same day. An Aug. 15 preliminary hearing was set. Capt. David Eder, of the Eastville Police Department, investigated. At an arraignment July 18, Sharri Mapp was appointed to represent Llaneta.

Four Arrested on Felony Offenses in Accomack

Four people were accused of felony offenses recently in Accomack General District Court.

Jermaine Kenron Newkirk, 36, of Dennis Drive in Parksley, and Gloria Grillone, 32, of Mason Road in Bloxom, were both charged July 18 with possession of a Schedule I or II drug. They were arrested July 19.

Deputy K.A. Reese, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, investigated.

Preliminary hearings were set for Oct. 28. Newkirk and Grillone are being held without bond.

In another case, Christopher Joseph Fox, 20, of Sea Mist Drive on Chincoteague, was charged with two counts of possession of a Schedule I or II drug July 20. He was arrested the same day. A secured bond of \$1,000 was set. Reese investigated.

Jeremie Carpenter, 24, of Trailer Circle in Cape Charles, was accused of using a vehicle without permission July 7. He was arrested July 19 and is being held without bond. Deputy Nicholas Kugler, of ACSO, investigated.

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
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Northampton Supervisors Approve Emergency Funds to Shelter Homeless from Heat

Northampton supervisors unanimously approved the appropriation of \$25,000 for Northampton County Social Services and the Eastern Shore Area Agency on Aging Tuesday night, for emergency use to find shelter for individuals and families who have become homeless during the dangerously hot summer.

“I cannot imagine anybody sleeping in a car with their children during the last few nights of 90, 95-degree weather ... and we don’t want it to happen,” said Spencer Murray, chairman of the Northampton board of supervisors.

Mozella Francis, director of Northampton County Social Services, said homelessness is on the rise, and the department of social services has identified eight families that have become homeless since mid-May.

Some of the families have at least one person who is employed, but one unforeseen expense can lead to a financial disaster, she said.

“All it takes is one setback, and they’re choosing between fixing the car

and the rent.”

Many families in transition don’t have \$1,500 to \$2,000 to pay for the first and last month’s rent and security deposit at another home for rent, and local agencies like social services are prohibited from covering those expenses, Francis said.

Donna Sample-Smith, CEO of the Eastern Shore Area Agency on Aging, is facing the same issues as Francis. ESAAA serves both Accomack and Northampton counties and receives limited funding – about \$7,000 in federal funds annually.

Supervisor Dave Fauber asked, “I know that all the housing in the county has been bought up and nobody lives in it, so what do you do if you’re looking for a house?”

The Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission (A-NPDC) provides a list of available housing options, but there is often a waiting list for the units, Sample-Smith said.

Housing options are so limited that frequently the agencies have no other choice but to pay for their clients to

stay in a hotel for a few days or a week.

It costs \$325 plus tax for a client to stay at the Regal Inn for one week, Sample-Smith said.

Staying with extended family is not an option if those family members live in subsidized housing, where there is a 14-day limit on how long visitors can stay.

“Those options that most people would default to – mom, dad, uncle, cousin – those are not options,” Francis said.

The \$25,000 in emergency funds will come out of \$60,000 left over in the Northampton County Social Services fiscal year 2019 budget due to the department being understaffed.

Another budget appropriation presented by Director of Finance John Chandler was for \$10,000 from Northampton schools’ capital improvement fund, to make emergency repairs to a wall at Northampton High School.

Architectural firm Waller, Todd, and Sadler, of Virginia Beach, Va., found the damage in the 1978 addition to the school, in a wall near the art room,

during a recent study of building conditions at the high school.

The funding request stated that bricks have come loose from the concrete masonry unit (CMU) wall, and the brick wall is bulging. The damaged area of the brick wall will be replaced and reconnected to the CMU wall.

The project will begin after the school division receives three bids and selects the lowest bid.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence expects the demolition portion of the project will be completed before school starts.

In another matter, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) is preparing to add the new road in Cape Charles, Route 642 – which provides access to Bay Creek and the town harbor – to the secondary road system.

The road also needs a name. The Cape Charles town council chose Cassatt Parkway, after Alexander Cassatt, the engineer who laid out the railroad around which the town of Cape Charles was built in the late 1880s.

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Murray deemed the name appropriate and asked his fellow supervisors what they thought.

“I don’t think you want to know,” Supervisor Robert Duer said. “I think they ought to name it Cemetery Road, because that’s where the money came from to build it.”

Cemetery Road is the Northampton County section of Route 602, which is scheduled for repair by VDOT. The entire 1.75-mile stretch of Route 602 will be repaired, including the section belonging to Accomack County, named Lee Street.

Cemetery Road needs pavement repairs, and its cross-slope, which helps stormwater drain off the road, will be flattened.

The repairs are part of VDOT’s Secondary Road Six-Year Plan (SSYP) for Northampton County. The Cemetery Road project became the number-one priority only after the construction of Route 642 was completed.

“We suffer at the northern end of the county due to politics,” Duer said. “No representation ever built that road,” he said of Route 642, which was

dubbed “Bay Creek’s \$11 million dollar driveway” in a local blog.

VDOT estimates the Cemetery Road project will cost less than \$925,000, and it is expected to be finished in 2023.

CHERITON ENDS FISCAL YEAR WITH A SURPLUS

The town of Cheriton received good news at its July 24 town council meeting when the final numbers for fiscal year 2019 showed the town had a surplus.

“It was a tough year, but we still managed to stay in the black,” said Mayor Larry LeMond.

Within the last “tough” fiscal year, Cheriton fired its police chief – the sole employee of Cheriton’s police department – sold its police car and equipment, and decided that all town law enforcement would be provided by a Northampton County sheriff’s deputy a few days per week.

Some revenue sources fell short, but others exceeded expectations and spending was kept in check to give the town a total surplus for the year of almost \$50,000 and nearly \$300,000 in

various bank accounts.

Nearly \$24,000 was received from Northampton County sheriff’s department traffic enforcement, far short of the \$75,000 budgeted.

But the town received nearly \$39,000 of the \$40,000 it expected from Cheriton Police Department traffic enforcement, even though the police department was active only until the end of September.

The police car sold for \$25,000 and the police equipment and weapons brought in \$4,775.

Since the police department became inactive, the town saved money on the police chief’s salary and benefits. Only about \$20,500 was spent, compared to about \$57,000 in the previous year.

Councilwoman Jackie Davis asked why the town’s DMV office made around \$19,500, about \$5,000 less than

citizens have waited and continue to wait for the road to be fixed.

Following the discussion, supervisors unanimously approved the name Cassatt Parkway for Route 642.

last year. Town Clerk Stacey Sparrow confirmed that the office is making fewer sales because more people are doing their business with DMV online.

Cheriton’s department of building and code enforcement, headed by Warren “Ski” Wisneski, made about \$6,100, more than double the revenue the department brought in last year.

Meal tax revenue approached \$10,000 this year, nearly twice the \$5,000 budgeted. Cheriton made a little more than \$6,000 in meal tax revenue in FY 2018.

In FY 2020, Cheriton may apply for another \$1,000 Virginia Municipal League Risk Management grant, used to purchase items that improve safety, like traffic cones, anti-slip mats, and playground mulch. The mayor asks that any ideas be passed along to the town clerk.



The Final EA evaluates the environmental consequences of a range of reasonable alternatives that meet NASA's needs, as well as the needs of the other federal Cooperating Agencies, to restore the Wallops Island shoreline in order to reduce the potential for damage to, or loss of, NASA, U.S. Navy, and Virginia Commercial Spaceflight Authority's Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport assets on Wallops Island from wave impacts associated with storm events.

NASA's Preferred Alternative is the harvesting of approximately 1.3 million cubic yards of sand from the

north end of Wallops Island and placement of the harvested sand in areas that have been eroded during recent storm events. Additionally, NASA proposes to construct a series of parallel nearshore breakwater structures that would reduce the intensity of wave action and slow sediment transport. TANGIER JETTY REQUIRES TRANSFER OF ISLAND LAND OWNED BY ACCOMACK COUNTY

There's a snag in getting a jetty for Tangier that has been in the works for about 25 years.

Accomack County will need to hand over 1.71 acres it owns on the island, County Attorney Cela Berge announced at a board of supervisors' session last week.

The panel unanimously agreed to conduct a public hearing on the issue Aug. 21. The hearing is required before they can sign over the deed.

The parcel is needed for jetty construction, Berge said. The property was acquired by Accomack when the channel was constructed in 1965 but it was never used for that purpose, she added.

The jetty is "very important to them," Berge said of Tangier Islanders.

Last September, Gov. Ralph Northam announced an agreement had been made between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Virginia Marine Resources Commission. They were to design and construct the \$2,646,000 seawall.

With more than \$2 million in federal money and about \$529,200 in state funds, the jetty would be built to protect the western portion of the island, channel, harbor, and associated seafood industry. The straight stone seawall would start at the southwestern tip of the Uppards and extend south nearly 500 feet into the channel.

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FILM CHRONICLES HISTORY OF NORTHAMPTON COUNTY JAIL.

The video, "The Last Jail on the Northampton Court Green," begins when jails were just a holding place for court trials and immediate punishment. The documentary focuses on the 1914 penal institution in Eastville that was utilized until about a dozen years ago and was demolished in 2017. The film also promises to recognize earlier jails on the green that are now "lost to history," according to the Northampton Historic Preservation Society.

The premiere, Sunday, July 28, 2 p.m., at the Palace Theatre, in Cape Charles, will have free admission. Carl Lounsbury, an architectural historian, will provide an introduction and a question-and-answer session after the film.

The 1914 jail is the same place that former Northampton Sheriff Wayne Bradford remembers when he first became a deputy in 1976. Sheriff Tank

Belote was in charge then and there was money for only four dispatcher/jailers. They did both jobs.

"If the dispatcher got sick one of the road deputies had to take the position," Bradford said. At night, if the dispatcher marked out of service that meant he was busy checking the jail and inmates. "If they didn't come back in 10 minutes, we were supposed to go to the jail to see what happened," Bradford said. "I've even seen the secretary work as the dispatcher. Then the road deputy would have to come in and work the jail."

It held a maximum of 32 prisoners then. "At one time they had to put in more bunks," Bradford said. "There were three floors, the ceilings were not high ... a little over six-feet-tall. The sheriff's office on the other side was two stories. The walls were two-feet thick ... brick and mortar, steel bars and supports."

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Lounsbury will explain the progression of jail construction, types of prisoners, and their treatment.


Eastville Mayor James Sturgis will provide an overview of the economic growth that funded the construction of “a cutting edge, early 20th-century jail in a rural and isolated Eastern Shore,” an announcement stated.

“Transforming attitudes toward incarceration led to better prisoner treatment and healthier conditions. Smaller cells, areas to congregate, and modern utilities were included in the 1914 Jail. Twentieth-century manufacturing techniques improved security.”

When the historical society realized the jail was to be torn down, Lounsbury, an expert on historic Virginia court greens, was asked to make recommendations on how to retain its history if the jail could not be saved. He suggested creating the film.

The film follows county law enforcement officers and leadership as they provide a tour of the 1914 facility and discuss how it functioned. It was the last jail built on the historic Northampton County Court Green.

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


50 Years After the First Moonwalk, People Gather at NASA Wallops Visitor Center to Celebrate

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
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

Their final regional tournament record was 2-2.



Central Accomack Senior Boys Clinch Southeast Regional Title and Advance to World Series

The Central Accomack senior boys not only broke Central Accomack Little League history on Wednesday, but Eastern Shore history. The boys defeated South Carolina in the eighth inning, making them the first team from the Shore to make it to the World Series.

The team's journey to the championship game began on Saturday when the boys posted a 8-0 shutout against North Carolina. Jacob Meilhammer led the team offensively with a perfect appearance at the plate, hitting 3-for-3 and batting in one. Tyler Greene and Dylan Marshall each drove in two runs, and Luke Parks had one RBI.

Cade Williams earned the victory on the mound allowing zero runs on one hit, striking out five and walking one. Everett Savage and Brandon Adamos helped close out the game with Savage recording the last six outs to earn the save for Central.

With the team being placed into the winners bracket, they would face off against Florida on Sunday to see if they could gain another victory. It was a close game, but the boys came out on top, with a final score of 4-3.

Central's three hits were tallied by Armonte Dickerson, Parks, and Greene. Zykeese Davis and Marshall each drove in one run, and Savage batted in two.

Greene earned the win on the mound allowing zero runs on two hits and striking out two. Savage helped close out the game and recorded the last ten outs. Greene also robbed a home run in the last inning, sending the boys into their third game undefeated.

Central took a tough loss on Monday against South Carolina with the final score being 1-3.

Cade Williams shouldered the loss, pitching a complete game with five strikeouts and allowing three runs on seven hits.

With the boys being knocked to the losers bracket, they were challenged by West Virginia on Tuesday to see who would stay in the running.

The board was resting 6-6 in the bottom of the of the sixth inning when Parks homered, scoring two runs and



making the final score 8-6.

Dylan Ross was also an offensive leader, notching two hits on four chances. Greene, Davis, and Adamos each earned a hit and batted in a combined total of four.

Greene took the victory on the mound allowing seven hits, six runs, and one strikeout in one and two-thirds innings. Ross threw five and a third innings and recorded the last 16 outs to earn the save for Central. The senior boys were heading into the championship game.

It was a nail-biter in Florida on Wednesday afternoon, as Central and South Carolina faced one another for the second time of the tournament, knowing only one team would advance to the world series.

It did not look too promising as the boys were down 0-3 in the first inning.

Central answered during their next at-bat, with Savage reaching on an error which drove in two. Greene then hit a fly ball to center field, which drove in one more run, giving the team a 4-3 lead.

South Carolina fought back, gripping the lead in the fourth inning and Central was down again 4-6. However, the boys were not going down without a fight. Adamos, Meilhammer, and Dickerson each did their job at the plate, and the bases were loaded with only one out. Parks shined in the box, hitting a grand slam, putting Central up 8-6.

Carolina put two more runs on the board, evening up the score again in the fifth inning. Greene and Davis each singled, putting them both on base. Marshall dominated his at-bat, hitting a double and knocking in two runs, giving Central another lead of 10-8.

The opposing team answered once again, tying the game in the seventh inning. Central was unable to gain any runs during their next at-bat, causing the teams to go into extra innings.

South Carolina scored one in the top of the eighth, putting Central on bottom, but not for long. Dickerson walked, Parks reached on an error, Ross singled on a bunt, and the bases were loaded once again. Savage hit a fly ball causing Dickerson to score, and Greene hit the walk-off fly ball allowing Parks to score. The final score was 12-11 and the boys were named the Southeast Regional champions.

The boys will travel to Easley, S.C., to compete in the World Series, which is scheduled to begin July 27.



Fishing from the Shore

The eyes of the local offshore fishing world will be focused on the community of Wachapreague this weekend and the 2019 edition of the Eastern Shore Marlin Club's Annual Billfish Release Tournament. Vessels are allowed to fish two out of the three days beginning on Friday, July 26, and running through Sunday, July 28. Numerous awards will be on the line including top daily catches, most billfish releases, and largest dolphin, tuna, and wahoo. The offshore fishing action has been very good recently, with the exception of tuna, so expect some outstanding catches during this event.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, reported that anglers were still finding flounder inside the inlet as well as out on the wrecks. Spanish mackerel, cobia, and spadefish were also prowling over the inshore wrecks. Farther offshore, trollers in the blue water were finding “nice” gaffer dolphin (mahi) and both blue and white marlin. Tuna have been scarce over the last week. The shop had registered release citations for a shark and white marlin caught over the weekend. The Wachapreague Inn reported the offshore bite has been “really good.” They received reports of mahi caught as far inshore as the wrecks, as well as Spanish mackerel, houndfish, and cobia.

Lower Shore – Chris Snook, at Chris' Bait and Tackle, reported the flounder bite has improved around the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, especially near the high-rise section and around the third and fourth rock islands, where schools of spadefish are also cruising. The shop weighed in a 7-pound, 6-ounce doormat flounder for Maryland angler Wayne Waters. Red drum fishing has picked up outside the bridge-tunnel, where a few schools of late-season black drum have also been seen. Croaker fishing has been increasingly productive near buoy 262 and out of Oyster. The sea mullet (whiting) bite remains strong south of Kiptopeke and a few speckled trout are starting to hit inside some of the lower bayside creeks.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Tackle Shop, reports that cobia fishing remained good through last weekend. Due to the excessive heat, most bottom fishermen limited their angling activities to the early mornings and late afternoons, but still found plenty of success. The Plantation Light area has produced some larger Spanish mackerel catches and spadefish catches have come from up against the structure as well as around the fourth island. The Cape Charles pier has produced sea mullet (whiting) and a few gray trout.

Chincoteague – Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina reports the flounder throwback percentage went up with the last heat wave and she is hoping the drop in air temperatures will reverse that trend. The best flounder fishing has occurred in the Chincoteague Channel from buoy 17 north beyond the new bridge with live minnows and Berkley Gulp Swimming Mullet combinations produc-

ing the bulk of the fish. The kingfish (whiting) bite has been strong all summer, according to Roeske, and live or scented artificial blood worm baits have been very productive on the tasty panfish. The inshore coastal shark fishery is active and always a hit with the tourists. Flounder, black sea bass, triggers, and spadefish have been taken over the railcars. Offshore action has consisted of large mahi and a few tuna, with large black sea bass taken over the deep-water wrecks.

Jimmy Vasiliou, back at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle after his J Lo concert experience in Philadelphia, reports that the surf anglers are finding kingfish (whiting), spot, small bluefish, a few pompano, and some large sharks (just in time for Shark Week)! The inshore structures were producing triggerfish and spadefish, but the flounder fishing has been inconsistent. Offshore anglers were finding large mahi, king mackerel, and hammerhead and mako sharks at the Parking Lot. Inside the back bay, anglers were finding flounder, spot, and a few cobia.

Upper Shore – Captain Matt Abell, of the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reports that a number of his customers have been trying to beat the heat by high speed trolling for Spanish mackerel in the inshore ocean waters off Chincoteague. Anglers baitfishing inside the inlets are finding a mixture of kingfish (whiting) and flounder, while flounder fishing on the railcars has been inconsistent. Trig-






gerfishing, however, has been good on the Winter Quarters wreck and on Blackfish Banks for anglers soaking small pieces of clam for bait. Cobia fishing picked up over the week, with more keeper-sized fish being reported. Large schools of red drum are prowling the waters off Fisherman's Island. In the upper reaches of the Pocomoke Sound, bottom fishing has produced speckled trout, rockfish, perch, and spot.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCAVA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.
