Pony Auction Sets A Record

"A new record-setting auction" brought \$271,700 for 50 colts and fillies sold at the annual Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company's Pony Penning, according to spokesperson Denise Bowden.

The average price was \$4,700 with the high being \$17,000 and the low being \$2,000. It took half a dozen Saltwater Cowboys to control the first pony to be paraded out in front of a crowd of thousands. It sold for \$3,900.

Also early in the auction a "buyback" pony — one that is bought by a bidder and then given back to the fire company to stay with the herd and be raised on Assateague — was sold for \$16,000. The proceeds went to the local United Way. The winning bidder got naming rights and a certificate to take home.

The ponies swam the narrow Assateague Channel last Wednesday to Chincoteague. They were then herded down the streets to the Fireman's Carnival where they were auctioned the next day. Those that weren't auctioned, swam back to Assateague last Friday.

The tradition of Pony Penning started in 1925. The event was made famous by Illinois author Marguerite Henry when she wrote about Misty, the palomino pinto with markings resembling a map of the United States on her side. Henry paid \$150 for Misty at the auction in 1946.

A popular pony that was sold this year, Elvis, went for \$6,000. He was Bowden's favorite and will make his home in Ohio.

In 1982, 50 ponies were auctioned and brought a total of \$15,400. The top bid that year was \$600. Others were sold as low as \$175. The auctioneer insisted one filly was a Misty look-alike. In spite of his sales pitch, the pony sold for less than the \$308 average.

Now that Pony Penning 2019 is officially in the books, summer has begun its slow decent. With the fall drawing ever-so-near, we saved some really great kid-friendly activities for August. Over the next few weeks, we will be camping, exploring the refuge, and splashing at the waterpark. We explored Main Street at the beginning of the season, and this week, we decided to further explore Maddox.

First on our agenda, we ate, per usual. We mentioned last week about Pico and the Island Creamery, which are both on Maddox. There is also a neat place on Maddox on your left as you head towards the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge called Smokey's BBQ & Grill, which serves up—you guessed it—BBQ! They offer a variety of homemade sauces to choose from. It is a food truck-style establishment with a cool sandpit area in the back with different games, such as cornhole, and there is also a bounce house. Directly next door is Surfside Golf, which is where we finished our evening, as it was a little too hot for us in the afternoon, so we decided to do some other exploring first.

We always see the new wings mural on the building beside Sandy Pony Donuts when we drive that way (600 Maddox) that was recently painted by local artist Katie Lederer, but each

time, someone always was parked directly in front of it, making it completely impossible to capture a good photo op, although there were many other parking spots to choose from (as Bella pointed out—insert facepalm emoji here). Well, this day we went by at the perfect time; the lot was empty, so we took advantage of the opportunity. We love murals, and have taken photos with the "What Lifts You" wings in downtown Nashville, so we really wanted a picture with these to add to our collection, as well as our Chincoteague photo-op collection. No doughnuts for us though, much to our dismay, as they were closed.

After this pitstop, we went to the Brant, which is on the corner of Maddox and Chicken City. The Brant is a gift shop that has so, so many things; we did not expect to find the amount of product variety as we did, and Bella tried to walk out with, well, so, so many things! She opted for the Breyer horse gift pack that included Misty, Stormy, and the collector's book. She was so excited to finally get her hands on Misty and Stormy, as she is an avid Breyer collector. But seriously,

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we spent way too much time looking around in there. Make sure to take a pic with the big bear that guards the front entrance.

Another stop on Maddox that is a must see that we mentioned before is the Refuge ponies. We wrote about our experience back in the first issue of this year's Hitching Post, and since then, and between many visits, there are now four ponies and a new filly named Honeymoon.

The Museum of Chincoteague is also a stop you don't want to miss on 7125 Maddox Blvd., as it offers a wealth of information on the island's rich history. Visiting hours are Tuesday through Sunday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., and admission is \$4, with kids 12 and under free. Active duty military and their immediate family members are also free. Inside, you can find a preserved Misty, donated to the Museum by the Beebe family. They also have scheduled events throughout the summer, as well as one-hour Island History Tours. Check the website

Our final stop, Surfside Golf, was a great choice. They are open from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., so we were able to go after dark, when it was cooler, and although there were people out and about, it wasn't a super large crowd. There is another mini golf option across the street, Funland Amusements, but we went with Surfside because they have Dip-n-Dots that, as we've said before, Bella likes to eat.

Surfside offers two different 18-hole courses, one being more challenging than the other, and you can play one course for \$8 a person, or play both courses for \$14. Wristbands are also available for \$20 for unlimited play all day. Funland offers mini golf as well as an arcade, launch pad, rock wall, bumper boats, and go-carts, and is open daily from 9 a.m. to 10:45 p.m. See the website, www.gotofunland.com for pricing info. 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




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

Final Astronomy Night on Assateague

What can be better than spending a summer night on the beach gazing at the stars?

Spend a night on the beach with family and friends as the NASA's Wallops Flight Facility Visitor Center and partners host the final summer astronomy night from Friday, Aug. 9, 7:30 to 9:45 p.m., on Assateague Island.

Having just celebrated the journey to place humans on the moon in 1969 with Apollo 11, the evening provides the opportunity to bring family and friends to the beach to explore Earth's moon, Jupiter, Saturn, and the Perseid meteor shower.

Astronomy night begins with a presentation in the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge's Herbert H. Bateman Visitor Center auditorium at 7:30 p.m. and again at 8:00 p.m. Space is limited and the presentation will be held rain or shine.

From 8:30 to 9:45 p.m., join the Del-

marva Space Sciences Foundation at the north end of beach parking lot 1 for night sky observations through high-powered telescopes. The telescope observations are subject to cancellation due to inclement weather. Monitor the NASA Visitor Center's Facebook page for updates.

The event is free and open to the public, but park entrance fees still apply. For entrance fee information visit http://www.fws.gov/refuge/Chincote-ague/visit/fees.html

Optional items to bring include binoculars, a red light, and insect repellent.



Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



The vessel Miss Molly took Top Boat honors in the 2019 edition of the Eastern Shore Marlin Club's Annual Billfish Release Tournament with three marlin releases. Second Place went to the White Bite, which also had three billfish releases but lost out to the Miss Molly on a tiebreaker based on the third fish's time of catch. The Heat Wave finished in third place with two releases. Angler Brian Pruitt, aboard the No Limits, had the tournament's largest dolphin, which weighed 25.5 pounds. Captain Lindsay Paul aboard the Donzi took the largest tuna award. The 10-4 Joker with angler Gary Garvey released the first billfish in the tournament, a blue marlin. The tourney attracted a field of 16 vessels and a total of 17 billfish were caught and released.

Wachapreague – Stephen Sawyer, at Trident Tackle, reported that almost every boat fishing in the tournament over the weekend had catches of mahi and marlin encounters. The shop had registered citations for blue and white marlin releases, as well as a couple of sheepshead catches. Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported that lots of mahi, golden tilefish, and marlin releases were recorded over the weekend. The wrecks were producing spadefish, at least one cobia and even some mahi. Inside the inlet, limits of flounder were still being made by anglers willing

to put in some time.

Chincoteague - Pete Vasiliou, of Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reported that anglers are having the best late July/early August keeper flounder action inside the Chincoteague Bay in the last six to seven years. Schools of bluefish have also been making sporadic appearances inside the bay as well as along the surf at Assateague. The shop has weighed in a couple of nice sheepshead that were caught inside the bay. Vasiliou said there are plenty of big sharks around, both inside and outside the inlet. The inshore wrecks are still holding flounder, triggerfish, and spadefish, while a large class of mahi is being caught in the blue water

Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, reports flounder are being caught on both sides of the Queen Sound bridge, while the waters inside of Chincoteague Channel are holding large schools of pinhead croaker. Inside the canal, small gray trout have been taken, some barely meeting the minimum legal size. The whiting/ kingfish run continues between buoys 15 and 11. Sharks of all sizes and several species are spread from buoy 10 all the way out to Turner's Lump. On Blackfish Banks, Roeske said the rail cars are holding flounder, triggers, black sea bass, and spadefish, with cobia, dolphin and yellowfin tuna being caught farther offshore.

large sea bass, she added.

Lower Shore - Chris Snook, of Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported cobia fishing had rebounded "pretty good after slacking off" during the couple days of cooler weather last week. Lots of sharks are showing up in the cobia fishery and more red drum are showing up in the mix. A few puppy drum are starting to show up on the lower seaside. Spadefish continue to linger around the fourth island of the bridge-tunnel, while flounder are hanging along the bottom at the fourth island as well as beside the bases of the bridge pilings. Speckled trout are beginning to hit inside the lower bayside creeks. Croaker catches are still coming from out of Oyster and near Marker 262. Spot numbers are on the rise.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, reported that cobia fishing had slowed during last weekend, with a few keepers caught, but undersized fish and sharks were more abundant. Spanish mackerel were being caught down near the bridge-tunnel and up near buoy 36A. Brady said that the spadefish fishery remains productive both at the bridge-tunnel and around Plantation Light. Recent catches at the Cape Charles Pier

include keeper-sized flounder, speckled trout, and gray trout.

Upper Shore - A few speckled trout are starting to show up in the upper bayside shallows, where small rockfish are still the most dominant species. Gil "Sevie" Pruitt recently landed a 23-inch speck while fishing inside Pomco Creek. Bottom fishing over the deeper water rocks is producing a mixture of bluefish, whiting (sand mullet), spot and small croakers, with an occasional flounder. A few cobia are still being seen cruising the surface. Cownosed rays, locally called "bullfish," are a problem in both the shallow and deep water. In the barrier island surf, spot and small whiting are hitting bloodworm and Fish Bite baits, while bluefish and a variety of sharks and rays are being caught on fresh cut bait.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCAVA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.


