Dr. King's Legacy Remembered

Cold weather and the remnants of snow and ice along the roadways Monday failed to dampen the spirits of dozens of participants who arrived at Northampton High School to commemorate the life of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

While Mother Nature failed to cancel the celebration, it did cancel the traditional walk to the courthouse. Event organizers agreed that the severe temperatures and winds would be detrimental to the heath of many of the event attendees. Not to be deterred, the guest speakers for both portions of the event shared the spotlight at the high school.

One change this year was the absence of the high-school Junior ROTC Color Guard. The ROTC program was among the causalities of the FY 2016 budget. Cape Charles Coast Guard Station, which prior to the Junior ROTC had provided a color guard, once again stepped in to carry on the tradition.

Rev. M. Palmer Bunting, pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church in Exmore, addressed the gathering and stressed the need for everyone to follow the doctrine of Martin Luther King Jr. by measuring the value of individuals not by their color but by their character. Rev. Bunting urged everyone to look for ways to help others, and to look for ways to make their lives better. On a more local level, he noted the need help keep Shore businesses solvent as a way to keep jobs in the area. Rev. Bunting also stressed the need to support school safety and to urge children to steer away from violence that too often results in the loss of innocent lives.

Former county resident Tasha Church Hoffler, a 1997 graduate of Northampton High School, currently is a school connections facilitator for Worcester Counter Public Schools in Maryland. She addressed those present about fulfilling their dreams by working towards them every day. Hoffler stressed the need to develop a plan to make a dream a reality and then following through with those plans. Finally, having achieved one's dream, Hoffler urged everyone to help others achieve theirs. "Never give up on your dreams," she urged.

Accomack Supervisors Blasted with Range of Issues

Change seems inevitable in Accomack. It's a place where rockets explode, poultry houses multiply, planes fly low late at night and the beautiful Atlantic coastline is looking to offshore oil drilling.

County supervisors were told Wednesday that all of these could affect the economy, public health and property values.

The rocket that malfunctioned at Wallops Island in October 2014 showed a grim picture of what could happen to nearby landowners. NASA's blast zone is worrying those who reside inside, people whose families have lived on the farms for generations. Some are scared of property damage while others are wondering just how the designation will shape their future.

"It ought to be a big concern to anyone who lives in these circles," said
Fred Darby of Assawoman, adding
that those who live farther south haven't
escaped because if his property values go down, those who live or own in
Belle Haven or Parksley or elsewhere
will have to "take up the slack." Darby
warned, "There has to be a balance."
And he noted the effect on the local
"quality of life."

Garnett Kellam, who lives just across Assawoman Creek from the launchpad, wonders about his family's property. "We don't see ourselves putting up a housing development ... but whatever we decide we want to do, you all are starting to put restrictions on our land."

Supervisor Grayson Chesser pointed out that Kegotank Elementary School, which his granddaughter attends, is right at the border of the rocket zone. "That doesn't make me feel good," he said.

County Assessor Brent Hurdle reported that new assessments for real estate are going out in the mail. "Overall, the changes ... resulted in a decrease of approximately 2 percent in the fair market value real estate tax base," he said. Between 10 percent and 25 percent of the 40,000 parcels went up in value.

Asked if he'd seen anything negative in the blast zone, Hurdle answered, "I really haven't as yet."

Residents wanted to know about the obvious increase in air traffic. They were told the Navy is continuing training missions with two routes — one along the bay and another along the sea.

The supervisors asked the Planning Commission to continue to study land use which includes both Navy and NASA activities. Officials agreed they have no power over either.

A consensus of the panel was that all are against the quest for oil. It was unanimous except for Supervisor Reneta Major, who was absent due to a death in the family. The message will be sent to the governor via County Administrator Steve Miner.

Matt Cormons of Parksley reminded them that no jobs will come with the drilling. "We face a lot of risk ... if there is a mishap.... aquaculture, tourism could be destroyed."

And there were those who didn't want to wait for the public hearing early next month on poultry house ordinance changes. They included warnings from Dr. Jillian Fry, a faculty member of the Environmental Health Sciences Department at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She urged the supervisors to consider the possible "infections, respiratory illnesses, cancers, pathogens, drug residues, ammonias and heavy metals" involved with the chicken production. She was cut off after the usual four minutes allotted for those speaking during the public participation segment.

Supervisor Robert Crockett discounted her comments. He read the disclaimer on a study about poultry houses that came from her department.

"We are disappointed the supervisor attempted to discredit the letter, particularly given that the five authors possess clearly unassailable credentials," Eastern Shorekeeper Jay Ford said later. "A disclaimer is

If the sitting Board Chairman won, he would have bragging rights that the "majority" of the citizens wanted Northampton County to look and feel like Ocean City. If he lost, it would be a mandate indicating the majority of residents want to promote and grow this county in a more sustainable manner. The results of that election are history.

Newly elected Supervisor Spencer Murray and Robert Duer, shortly after election, held a town hall meeting in Nassawadox and faced a packed room full of their constituents, announcing that they heard them loud and clear, and would act accordingly on the first meeting of the Board in January.

True to their word, on January 12, 2016, Supervisor Robert Duer courageously read a resolution repealing the 2015 Zoning Ordinance and presenting an amended 2009 zoning ordinance that would make it easier for investors to put their faith and dollars into this county, while not "throwing the baby out with the bathwater", as now-Chairman Murray remarked. That Resolution passed on a 3-2 vote with our homegrown hero, Supervisor Granville Hogg, joining his new Supervisors in the affirmative vote to protect the interests of their constituents.

The outstanding actions of the majority of the new Board marks a long overdue and extremely welcomed lifting of an administrative dark cloud over this great county, and we pledge to work together with these brave and committed public officials to restore this county to the magnificent stature that it has enjoyed for centuries. And finally, we cannot stress how proud we are of the elected officials who did exactly what they said they would do when they campaigned, restoring our faith in what is arguably the greatest system of governance in the world.

Shore Residents Flock to Poultry Discussion

More than 100 Shore residents attended a panel discussion on poultry houses Wednesday at Broadwater Academy.

The panel, sponsored by Citizens for a Better Eastern Shore (CBES), was moderated by Marc Steiner and was taped for rebroadcast on the Marc Steiner Show and Delmarva Public Radio. The panel included representatives of the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), John Hopkins University, the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS), and an egg grower, as well as a consultant for the Socially Responsible Agricultural Project. Noticeably absent from the panel were any representatives of the poultry industry.

DEQ spokesman Neil Zahradka outlined procedures for permitting of poultry houses, including regulations regarding the disposition of poultry manure. According to the information provided, poultry house operations that have at least 20,000 chickens require a permit. Permits regarding manure include its onsite storage and handling by poultry growers as well as its transport and disbursement on agricultural land.

Roger Everton, also of the DEQ, addressed water quality and the testing of water sources for a number of items such as salinity, pH, and possible pollutants be they from the poultry industry, traditional agricultural farm practices, or other land uses.

Mark Brush of VIMS said efforts are underway to determine the effects of the poultry industry on local waters. One of the main items of concern centers around the introduction of nitrogen into the water. This would include agricultural production as well as residential septic systems.

Maria Payan from Pennsylvania, a consultant for the Socially Responsible Agricultural Project, referenced health issues that could arise from living near an industrial poultry operator. Payan said a member of her family had developed health problems as a direct result of living near poultry houses. While she noted that all poultry operations do not necessarily create problems all of the time, when something does go wrong, it often goes wrong in a big way. She noted that there is a fine line between poultry production and the other interests of a community.

Jillian Fry of Johns Hopkins University spoke on studies regarding industrial food animal production and its effect on nearby land and population. Fry addressed the issue of runoff from agricultural land that can result in the introduction of chemicals and heavy metals into the water. She stressed the need to prevent the air and chemicals from blowing out onto nearby homes as they may pose health risks to the residents. Compounding these concerns, according to Fry, is that currently there is no mandatory monitor-

ing of private wells or air in Virginia.

Carole Morrison, who operated poultry houses for over 20 years prior to switching to egg production, stated that approximately 70 percent of those who operate poultry houses live at or below the poverty level. She attributed this to the requirements that they invest more and more money without any assurance of what they might earn from their labor.

According to Morrison, a prospective poultry grower must foot the cost of the land and construction of the houses (estimated in excess of \$300,000 each), as well as utility costs. In exchange, the poultry industry owners provide the local growers with the birds, feed, and medications for the birds. Fry concluded that she makes more from egg production from her 500 hens than she did when she operated poultry houses.

One poultry house operator disagreed with Fry's assessment, saying his income, as well as that of his 12 full-time employees, is well above the poverty level.

During the question-and-answer period, the majority of those who addressed the panel expressed concerns over the potential for water pollution and manure disposition. One speaker suggested that farmers on the Shore should look at ways to move back to growing vegetables, as was done up until the latter part of the 20th century, although no plan was given for how this might be accomplished.

Proposed Accomack School Budget Would Hike Salaries

Accomack School Board's proposed FY2017 budget is more than \$2.2 million above the current spending package and will go to public hearing Feb. 2 the panel decided Tuesday.

Superintendent Chris Holland's funding request includes increases in teacher salaries of a step (1.34 percent) and a 2 percent increase, totaling \$664,000.

Member Dr. Ronnie Holden wanted more for the instructors and motioned that teachers get a 4 percent increase instead. It was unclear how much money would be needed, but the board agreed to put it in the package.

Chairwoman Margaret Miles participated in both open and closed sessions via a conference call. Member Camesha Handy was absent.

At the start, the increase was \$2,156,508. That also included a 3.34 percent raise in classified employees' pay, for a total of \$209,000, and an administrative raise of \$79,182 for eight people. New spending also would cov-

er \$150,000 more for health insurance, \$47,000 more for dual enrollment and advanced placement classes, five additional teaching positions for \$263,605 (\$209,000 from new state funds), \$25,000 more in coaching activity supplements; an engineering teacher and supplies for \$70,841; \$76,000 for teacher allotments; and an upgrade to 12-month positions for 10-month secretaries, costing \$17,000.

The proposal was \$261,746 short before the increase from 2 percent to 4 percent for teacher's salaries, Finance Director Beth Onley explained. She was waiting to get more information from the county regarding discretionary funds.

Onley said five more regular school buses at \$436,430 and a special needs bus for \$98,136 are also needed.

Prior to the budget discussion, three teachers, all with at least 25 years of experience at Accomack Schools, told the board of the importance of retaining teachers to avoid a negative impact on students.

"Many who I have personally mentored ... continue to be successful in other school divisions because they feel valued, have competitive salaries and affordable healthcare," said Debbie Riley of Quinby, a teacher at Pungoteague Elementary.

"Once these are in place in our school division, we are confident that our teacher turnover rate will be comparable to areas similar to ours, if not better," Riley continued.

Students Kimberly Wert and Caroline Turner urged the board to allow a pilot swim team at Nandua High School. They contend there are between 30 and 40 students who are already interested, the YMCA is on board and the activity could help fight the high obesity rate and give students an individual way to participate. It is anticipated the cost would be comparable to wrestling.

It was also reported that Tangier Combined School was among 50 of 6,000 schools nationwide that qualified for an Imagine Literacy Program award.

On the board's personnel list, Acting Principal Karen Taylor was hired as principal of Chincoteague Elementary School, with a salary of \$75,353.75. That figure is the same as was listed for her when she took the acting position.

Police in Northampton are hoping a cell phone will lead them to a killer.

Lt. Michelle Hallett of Northampton County Sheriff's Office obtained a search warrant earlier this month that allows access to records connected to a phone found near murder victim Delvn Martin's body.

The 51-year-old resident of Smith Beach Road near Eastville was found dead at his home at about 3:30 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 3.

According to the search warrant, an iPhone was "in the immediate proximity of the victim's body. A physical and logical forensic examination of the phone will assist in determining persons who are associated with the crime, corroboration of statements from witnesses as to the last phone contact, as well as a possible motive to his murder."

Hallett obtained the warrant on Jan. 8.

Accomack Circuit Court

A conscientious Accomack Circuit Court jury got stuck on the meaning of a word last week when it deliberated a first-degree murder case, according to the court file.

The 12-member panel was deciding the verdict in the trial of Michael Anthony Press, who it convicted for the brutal 2014 slaying of Leon Harmon Jr., a popular Accomack County Public School bus driver.

After being out for nearly 2.5 hours, the jury sent a question to Judge W. Revell Lewis. "Our concern is with the word 'intent' as in 'a specific intent to kill," the jury foreman wrote on a small yellow-lined notebook paper.

"Can we be provided with any more specificity on this word?" the message stated. "Does it mean that the actions taken require that the defendant wanted the victim's life to be taken, not just to beat him unmercifully?"

Lewis answered, "It is not appropriate for the court to answer your specific questions. You have been instructed as to the law in this case. which instruction you are required to follow."

In the end the jury decided Press wanted to kill Harmon, 61, since after another half hour, it came back with the guilty verdict. Press beat Harmon to death. It took an additional 35 minutes to recommend that the 47-year-old Horntown man be sentenced to 35 years in prison and fined \$30,000 for the crime.

A Hallwood man was sentenced last week in Accomack Circuit Court to six years in prison for two counts of sell-

All but a year was suspended for James Robert Weakland, 32, of Corbin Street. The crimes occurred on March 12 and 20, 2014.

Curtis Lee Ames Jr., 26, of Holly Ridge Drive in Melfa pleaded guilty to two counts of child endangerment in a plea bargain with Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. The crimes occurred Feb. 28, 2015. along Wachapreague Road and in Piggen. A count of eluding police was not prosecuted. Ames is free on bond pending completion of a presentence report.

Cpl. E.J. Nottingham of Accomack County Sheriff's Office pulled Ames over and arrested him for the crimes. "I could hear children crying," the officer wrote in the court file. "I observed a four-year-old male in the front passenger seat, not in a child seat or seat belt and a 1-vear-old female in the rear seat behind driver, also no child seat or seat belt."

Ames had "a gun under the seat," the report states. Nottingham wrote there was a strong odor of alcohol. "He told me he had a few beers earlier ... he had bloodshot eyes and slurred speech."

Christopher William Floyd, 55, of Bobtown Road in Pungoteague entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of unlawfully wounding Louis Earl Lilliston on April 20, 2015. A jury trial was scheduled for July 13, 2016.

Mindy Marie Sanyang, 41, of Serenity Lane on Chincoteague pleaded not guilty to two counts of writing bad checks. She was acquitted of committing the crime on Dec. 1, which involved a check for \$1,133.34, but convicted of the Dec. 16 offense, which involved \$354. A presentence report was ordered. Sanvang is free on bond.

Sied Dontay Hopkins, 22, of Lankford Highway in Painter was convicted of grand larceny that occurred on April 17, 2015. He is being held in Accomack Jail pending completion of a presentence report.

As happens every year, most of the afternoon was spent adopting the rules and procedures for this General Assembly. It was, I am pleased to report, a relatively smooth process. I hope this is an indication of a harmonious and productive session.

Opening day is also an important day for legislators as their leadership announces committee assignments. I am pleased to report that mine remain the same. I will be serving again on the Senate Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources Committee; the Health and Education Committee; and the Local Government Committee. These committees all deal with subjects very important to the district and the commonwealth. I look forward to continuing to serve on them.

Bills continue to be filed, with the final filing deadline today, Jan. 22. I will report later in detail on some of the initiatives I am introducing, along with some budget amendments that I am involved with. The governor's proposed \$109 billion budget will undergo significant revisions in the House Appropriations Committee and in the Senate Finance Committee. Legislators also proposed amendments which will be considered by those committees. These amendments offer different priorities for the state's two-year spending plan.

Evaluation and possible reformation of the state's Certificate of Public Need process appears to be one of the centerpieces for debate during this 60-day legislation session. Such reform could have significant ramifications for Virginia's system of health care, particularly for rural areas served by smaller hospitals. It is something about which we need to be very concerned and aware. I will, of course, closely monitor the progress of the various pieces of legislation that have been offered to reform and change this process which has been in existence since 1973. It is the process by which we make sure our health care facilities are efficiently allocated within the commonwealth. There is some thought that by introducing more market principles to the health care provider industry, reform would result in lower costs. Again, this may pose significant and negative impacts for smaller rural hospitals.


We will again, as we have several times over my time here in the Virginia General Assembly, begin debating the menhaden fishery — in particular, whether the Virginia Marine Resources Commission as opposed to the General Assembly should now be tasked with overseeing this fishery. There are other bills regarding menhaden and their harvest. There also are some bills

that have been introduced that would have a significant impact on the aquaculture industry, stemming from some landowner/aquaculture conflicts that have developed across the bay.

Being in Richmond for the General Assembly always offers opportunities to have meetings at higher levels with various state agencies on issues of local concern. Along with Del. Bloxom, we will be having meetings regarding health care for veterans and Department of Motor Vehicle service on the Eastern Shore, among other topics. We already have had a conference call with staff for our federal representatives on the Tom's Cove/National Park Service issue, which is of great concern for our watermen.

We will be in session until Saturday, March 13. As always, I encourage everyone to visit their State Capital and also to monitor the activities of the legislature on the General Assembly website VirginiaGeneralAssembly.gov As always, I can be emailed at District06@senate.virginia.gov and while in Richmond, by telephone at (804) 698-7506. es as well as the Chesapeake and Agriculture subcommittees. Additionally, I have been appointed to the Finance Committee where I serve on the subcommittee that considers bills pertaining to income tax, business licenses, estate tax and more. The deadline for bills to be filed is Friday, but most bills are finding their way to committees where critical issues that affect us are becoming clearer. Bills such as SB 298 that would raise oyster land rent to \$5,000 an acre and changes in the Virginia Ma-

The divide between rural and urban delegates is wide and requires time to educate my city friends on how issues would negatively affect us. In the end, the system works well and solutions that will benefit the commonwealth as a whole are created. This is a budget year and funding requests are under great scrutiny. The economic and budgetary outlook is positive, but most of the extra income is already pre-spent on automatic escalators. We will, as we have to by the constitution, have a balanced budget.

Northampton Looks To Add Teachers for Next School Year

The Northampton School Board heard Superintendent Eddie Lawrence's recommendations for the FY2017 budget last Thursday.

Noting that a number of items would need to be added to the spending package, he specified additional classroom teachers in language arts, math, science, and special education, in addition to more funds for transportation, maintenance, and school supplies and services.

The board then divided into small groups to look at priorities for the coming year. Over the next few weeks, a budget will be prepared for presentation to the Board of Supervisors for inclusion in the county FY2017 budget.

The board spend much of the evening trying to iron out changes to the current grade scale and policies ranging from assignments to cheating issues.

The board set up guidelines governing assignments that are turned in late or not at all. A sticking point for some board members was how to deal with students who cheat on assignments and or tests. According to the document, students found guilty of cheating will be provided with an opportunity to make up the work, but the grade that they receive on the makeup assignment will have limitations. Additionally, the students will face disciplinary consequences as outlined in the Student Code of Conduct for cheating.

Other changes to the policy include options for upper classmen to be exempt from final exams if they meet certain requirements regarding their academic performance for the year. While some members disagreed on the policies for the penalties regarding student cheating, the board voted to implement the policy beginning with the second semester of the current school year.

In other business, the board re-elected Skip Oakley and Randy Parks to serve as chairman and vice chairman, respectively, for 2016.





So Who's Ahead in the Shore Presidential Race?

he largest component — 27 percent — of Accomack and Northampton voters who participated in a recent email survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post said they do not know for whom they would cast their ballots in this year's presidential election were it held tomorrow.

Republican billionaire business mogul Donald Trump got 18 percent of the hypothetical vote. Next was Ben Carson, a retired neurosurgeon and author, who is also a Republican. About 12 percent of the survey participants favor him.

Twelve percent of participants said simply that they would be voting Republican. Six percent said they would be voting Democrat.

Six percent of survey-takers each chose Hillary Clinton, who is a former Secretary of State and first lady, and Bernard "Bernie" Sanders, a senator from Vermont. Both are seeking the Democratic Party's nomination.

Others who got a mention were Mario Rubio, a senator from Florida; Rafael Edward "Ted" Cruz, a senator from Texas; Ross Perot, a business tycoon who ran as an independent for president in 1992 and for the Reform party in 1996; Tulsi Gabbard, a congresswoman from Hawaii; and Moxie, a dog who lives in Northampton.

All of those who took part in the survey said they are registered voters who participated in the November 2015 general election.

"They are all a bunch of immoral liars, and I'm having a hard time deciding, but at this point, I would vote Republican," wrote Terry Ewell of Young's Creek.

"Undecided," said Patsy Goard of Hallwood. "I'm waiting for someone to run who's not a complete idiot ... proud to say I have never missed an election (local, state or national) since I registered in the 1970s."

"Not sure yet," wrote Vic Peppler of Captain's Cove. "But it would be someone that believes in the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the separation of powers."

"Right now I have no idea who is going to be running (or) exactly what is going to happen," said Donna Custis of Pungoteague. "If it comes down to Trump and Hillary Clinton, I won't vote. I couldn't find myself voting for either one of them. Nether one of them has any business running for president of this country," she continued. "I always go by the person. Not the party. I don't like either one of those people the way they are acting."

Greg Duncan of Parksley said, "I can answer it best by who I would not vote for. If you have never really been without and if you have a stupid amount of money, then building an underground camp to protect self and family and the rest of us can kiss this world goodbye."

David Adams of Atlantic picked Trump. "He's independently wealthy so 'hopefully' he won't coddle to the political interest groups. Also, he's not a politician, so he simply knows what needs to be done and will direct his staff to do it."

Paul L. Ewell of Justisville also picked Trump. "We need less political correctness, more work ethic, less social welfare, less commercial regulation and more entrepreneurship to help, as 'The Donald' says, make America great again."

Robert Duer of Exmore said he won't be choosing the Democratic Party's candidate. "Too many reasons: economy, gun control, Bengazi, taxes, etc."

Margaret Van Clief of Cape Charles said Clinton is "the gal for the job."

Orest Pelech of Onancock agreed. "Clinton, because of her expertise, experience and her positions on the middle class."

"I'm very libertarian-minded," said Patrick Belote of Onancock. "Ideally, I like Rand Paul (former senator from Kentucky) on domestic issues, but (for) foreign policy, his stance is a bit naive."

"I will vote Republican unless (Jeb) Bush (former governor of Florida and brother and son of two former presidents) or (Chris) Christie (governor of New Jersey) comes up with the nomination, in which case I'll 'throw my vote away' in protest to Gary Johnson (former governor of New Mexico). If Jim Webb (former senator from Virginia) runs, he'll be my throwaway vote," Belote added.

Anthony LoFaso of Onancock picked Carson. "He has smart common sense ideas. He wants to uphold and defend the Constitution. He is not a Washington insider, owes nobody anything, is not affected by the PC crowd, genuinely wants Americans to maintain their freedom (and) is calm and rational."

Lisa C. Johnson of Horntown wrote, "Actually, I have no idea. Neither candidate seems very fitting and I am saddened by that."

Karen Simpson of Quinby would cast her ballot for Rubio. He "has solutions to Obama's disastrous outcomes, not afraid to speak up and wants to make America strong again!"

She said, "Of course," she votes. "I am ashamed of how many people do not vote."

"I feel this country needs a fresh face," wrote Nancy Stephan of Onancock. "Someone who has not been a part of this old boys' network, someone who is not indebted to return favors, someone who wants to restore this country to its former democratic and capitalist nature that rewarded folks for their honest and hard work. Someone who recognizes we need to stop 'enabling.' Someone who acknowledges we are not all born with the same amount of beauty and intelligence so it's okay to

not demand equal success/results ... there are only two who are such 'outsiders' and they are Ben Carson and Donald Trump. I will vote for whichever is the candidate."

Bruce MacMaster Jr. of Onley said he would vote for Cruz or Trump, "because Trump is the only one crazy enough to put some people in jail where they belong."

Haydon Rochester of Onancock picked Sanders "because he's not taking money from rich people, because he cares about those who work for a living and wants to halt the decline in people's living standards ... he believes global warming is real and wants to do something about it and because he, unlike most of his opponents in either party, does not believe the USA should be wasting our young people and money on ill-conceived military adventures."

Marilyn Ailes of Mappsville said she would cast her ballot for Accomack Supervisor Ron Wolff. Maybe Supervisor Paul Muhly. "They're the only candidates who are honest, not beholden to Wall Street or anyone else, willing to listen and can give good reasons for his vote. Oh, right. They're not running for president. I don't see anyone I'd vote for, but I sure see a bunch I'll vote against!"

Edward Kehrig of Jamesville wants Trump for president. "He speaks the way I feel. For decades now we've had politicians BS the public with lies."

Alex Coleman of Chincoteague also picked Trump. "No excuses, need to get this country back on track, no political correctness, list goes on!" Coleman wrote, "Electing Hillary Clinton president would be like granting Satan absolution and giving him the keys to heaven!"

Denise Bowden of Chincoteague said, "I have voted both Republican and Democrat in my lifetime but if the election were today, I would be voting for Donald Trump all the way. The era for career politicians needs to be over. I like that he says what others don't have the guts to say and he is beholden to no one. Special interest groups can't buy him. I believe our forefathers who founded this country would roll over in their graves to see how too much government has ruined this country."

Bowden wants "term limits to be set for Congress. There is a reason why the Constitution only allows the president to serve two terms, so we don't end up with a dictatorship. Too bad they didn't have the foresight to realize that our Congress has turned into a dictatorship of sorts."

Al Wazlak of Belle Haven said he would write in Perot. He was "less baggage than Hillary and could buy 'The Donald.'"

Barbara Stevenson of Silver Beach said she would vote for "my dog Moxie. But actually anyone who is not Hillary."

standard procedure whenever any ... program within a university system makes policy recommendations in order to shield the parent university from legal liability. If we are to follow the supervisor's line of thought. ... We would be discounting VIMS reports as they often carry disclaimers that they do not speak for The College of William and Mary. We appreciate that the supervisors are working hard ... however, we are becoming increasingly concerned that any voices that run contrary to the recommendations made by the poultry lobbyists are being discredited rather than responded to."

Lee Ann Fick of Pungoteague, who owns an oyster aquaculture business, wants to "make sure the county grows in a positive way. ... If you want to bring better jobs to the county, you have to maintain better living conditions. Make sure the setbacks don't impair the living conditions for the future as well as the current residents."

Benny Hall of Temperanceville, a

grower, reminded the officials about the number of people employed by the poultry industry. "We all would have to be home tonight guarding what we have. We would be hungry" without the business. "I have never observed runoff from the chicken house. Ditches have clear water. We have to abide by nutrient management ... soil samples are taken every year ... the industry is looking for other uses for chicken manure."

The supervisors also heard from the Department of Motor Vehicles regarding the closure of the satellite office in Oak Hall. Agency representatives promised to open another office in early February. In the meantime, the Onancock office will be open until noon on Saturdays.

The supervisors also agreed to continue to oppose a state proposal that private companies be involved in septic permits and designs instead of the health department doing the job.

A recent dog attack on two students who were waiting to catch a school bus caused Supervisor Paul Muhly to suggest that "dangerous dogs and animal control" issues be revisited.

Ronnie Thomas of Atlantic said with all the work the supervisors do, they should get more money. Instead of \$7,000 in annual pay, he suggested each be paid \$10,000. The issue comes with state regulations and wasn't discussed by any of the members.



The death of Glen Frey this week turned my mind to the role of music in sports.

Not that the Eagles had many hits that have played prominent roles in sports — at least not like Queen, whose rock anthems "We Are The Champions," "We Will Rock You," and "Another One Bites the Dust" are often blared at venues for various sports.

Frey did play the role of a pro football general manager in the movie "Jerry Maguire."

But think of any sporting event you've been to and reflect on how big a part music plays in the festivities.

And I'm not talking about just the great fight songs the bands play, such as the familiar tunes of Michigan and Notre Dame.

At baseball games, pitchers of the opposing teams are serenaded by chords of "Hit the Road, Jack" as sung by Ray Charles.

I've been at college football game where the losing team had to listen to "Na Na Hey Hey Kiss Him Goodbye."

Baseball fans love to gyrate their bodies to spell out the letters of "YMCA" by The Village People during the seventh inning stretch.

John Denver's "I'm A Country Boy" is another fan favorite at baseball games, at least at games at Camden Yards in Baltimore.

At Fenway Park, Neil Diamond's "Sweet Caroline" is played during the eighth inning of Boston Red Sox games.

If there is an explanation for that song, this Yankee fan is not aware of it. Of course, "New York, New York" by the immortal Frank Sinatra makes perfect sense at the conclusion of games at Yankee Stadium.

Or, how could we forget the baseball classic, "Take Me Out to the Ballgame."

Frey's Death Prompts Role of Music in Sports

"Charge" is a rally cry for many sports teams.

"Center Field" by John Fogerty has become a baseball classic. Who can resist the refrain, "Put me in, Coach."

"Wild Thing" got its start with the hilarious movie, "Major League Baseball."

"One Shining Moment" by Luther Vantross has been a seminal moment for NCAA basketball, heard every year during March Madness.

Athletes even have their own personal trademark songs, with one of the best known, "Enter Sandman" by Metallica, played when Yankee reliever Mariano Rivera entered the game. He almost always quieted the opposition's bats, putting their bats to sleep.

Back in the 1970s when I attended University of Richmond basketball games, a recording of a recently released song became so popular that the band director was miffed when the students preferred it over the pep band tunes. The song was "Duelin' Banjos" from the movie "Deliverance," and I didn't know at the time nor do I know now what it had to do with basketball. But it sure fired us up.

Who can hear "Sweet Georgia Brown" without thinking of the Harlem Globetrotters and Meadowlark Lemon, the great basketball entertainer who recently left us?

Think of sports movies and the music that stays with us long after the credits come to a close.

The inspirational sounds of Rocky's "Gonna Fly Now" by Bill Conti and "Eye of the Tiger" by Survivor are known by many decades after the movie's debut — at least the first one, which is the only one I count.

A personal favorite of mine that I find is not so well liked by many others is "Chariots of Fire" and the song by the same name. I can watch that movie many times over while I've had friends

who say it is great for putting them to sleep.

There isn't one particular song I identify with "Remember the Titans," but I know it is a great movie score that adds to a really good story.

There are songs created just for sports, like the ESPN theme song or "Are You Ready for Some Football?" by Hank Williams.

Of course, every sporting event from high school on up starts with the playing of the National Anthem, and few would disagree that no one has ever done it better than Whitney Houston at the start of the Super Bowl in 2011.

You may be asking why Glen Frey got me thinking about music and the role it has in sports, since I haven't mentioned any songs by him or his iconic group, the Eagles.

I often work with "The Dan Patrick Show" on in the background. I enjoy Patrick's wit and his knowledge of all sports. We come from the same generation and enjoy the same music, which Patrick often comments on and mingles in with his show.

Frey has been a guest on the show and revealed he is a serious sports fan.

In addition, Frey had one of the great lines in all of music in the Eagles' signature hit, "Hotel California."

When I feel trapped in a situation — usually an IT problem I can't solve — I often think to myself. "You can check out any time you like, but you can never leave."

Fall Boating Safety Classes Announced

If you boat in Virginia waters, you must carry a safe boating course card on July 1, regardless of your age.

This winter, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 12-02 of Painter will offer two winter Boating Safety classes. The first class, Basic Boating Skills and Safety, will begin tonight, Jan. 22, at 6:30 at Craddockville United Methodist Church and end Feb. 5 with the required exam. Students then will receive the required Virginia Safe Boating card.

This course will be followed immediately by Advanced Boating Skills and Seamanship from Feb. 10 to Feb. 24. Those taking this course can receive the nationally recognized Boating Skills and Seamanship certificate from the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Basic Boating Skills and Safety covers all of the material a boater needs to enjoy being on the water. The topics include safe boat handling and even how to purchase a boat. This course is designed for those owning a boat for the first time to those who have spent a lifetime on the water and need a safe boating card or a refresher. The course qualifies for a Virginia Safe Boating card and will be held on Wednesday and Friday evenings from 6:30 to 8:30, as well as Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Advanced Boating Skills and Seamanship will be offered in the same time and location. This course, designed for those who have either been on the water already or who are in possession of a Safe Boating card and want to improve their skill., covers more advanced topics such as detailed navigation, line handling and knots, power systems, weather and radio protocols. The course is open to anyone having a boating safety card. Participants will receive the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Boating Skills and Safety Card and diploma.

The donation for the courses are \$20 for each course separately with loan of the textbook and \$35 for both courses if taking them consecutively. Students taking the courses consecutively also keep the textbook.


