Chincoteague Incurs Brunt of Storm Jonas on Virginia Shore

About \$800,000 would be needed to replace the four parking lots that got washed over with sand and water at Assateague Beach when Winter Storm Jonas swept through last weekend. A National Park Service (NPS) representative said Wednesday the agency is working on getting the funds to fix the lots with all work expected to be completed by Memorial Day weekend.

Another \$526,000 worth of property damage was assessed on Chincoteague Island from the high winds and downed trees.

Town officials, the refuge manager, maintenance workers and Superintendent Debbie Darden of the NPS toured Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge Monday. The parking lot cost estimate came at the conclusion of the meeting, Refuge Visitors' Services Manager Michael Dixon reported.

Currently, parking for ocean access is limited to along Beach Road at the refuge. A closer surf, narrower beach and totally flat land with no indication that parking ever existed are now evident. It is not the first time the lots have been destroyed.

Dixon said roadside parking will handle the off-peak season but would be "nowhere near handling our summer visitation." All trails were reopened this week with the exception of Woodland, where contractors are cutting down trees for a new southern coral for the famous herd of Chincoteague ponies.

He refers questions about replacement parking to the NPS.

"The Virginia parking lots will be rebuilt," said Liz Davis of the NPS.

"The estimate for this construction is \$750,000 to \$800,000. The funding will be provided by the National Park Service. The work will be done by the National Park Service. It is our goal to complete parking lot 1 (to the left of the circle) as soon as possible. We want to have parking lot 2 open by Easter. We want to have all parking lots open by Memorial Day weekend."

"In my opinion, the breach from Assateague caused most of the problems because there are no dunes," said Bryan Rush, Chincoteague's emergency management coordinator. "The lack of maintenance on the beach is certainly an issue we need to look at down the road. They call it a barrier island for a

reason. It's there to protect. It is putting Chincoteague at great risk."

Rush separated damage estimates into two categories — governmental and private. Both were sent to the Virginia Department of Emergency Management, which he said gives the governor the ability to ask the president to declare a disaster area. That designation would allow the local government to recoup damages and for private property owners to obtain low-interest loans.

There was \$30,250 worth of estimated damage to public facilities, including the public works building, community center and Chincoteague Elementary School, which had "roofing material ripped off all the way to the

plywood," said Rush.

That figure also includes overtime and special equipment that was needed. Rush reported that the well-visited four giant Adirondack chairs on the western side of the island that together spell the word LOVE were flipped over by the wind. Each is 10 feet tall and weighs more than 500 pounds.

The coordinator said that the approximately \$495,000 worth of damages to personal property on Chincoteague includes destruction from trees that fell on homes and cars. He expects more reports as seasonal owners check on their property.

The Chincoteague causeway was

Steps Continue To Rescind Northampton Zoning Ordinance

Northampton supervisors continued to disassemble the just-passed Zoning Ordinance at their work session Monday.

They had voted Jan. 12, on a 3-2 vote, to revoke the ordinance that had been put in place the previous month. On Monday, Chairman Spencer Murray urged the board to set up a calendar that will allow for a vote to be taken soon on the ordinance change.

According to the schedule, the board will send the application for the change to the Planning Commission, which will be given roughly six weeks to review it prior to conducting a joint public hearing on the change on March 9. Assuming that the schedule is maintained, a final vote on rescinding the ordinance could come in March.

The board discussed the definitions of Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs) vs. Animal Feeding Operations (AFOs). While both CAFOs and AFOs refer to animals confined for feeding, they differ in the number of animals or animal units in a given space. While CAFOs and AFOs can apply to many species, the largest related concern between the two on the Eastern Shore has had to do with poultry operations.

A CAFO is an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) term for a large concentrated AFO, but any size AFO that discharges manure or wastewater into a waterway is defined as a CAFO. regardless of size. CAFOs are regulated by EPA under the Clean Water Act.

A second area discussed concerned the minimum setbacks regarding



large-scale or utility wind turbines. The setback requirement from the closest property lines was increased to no less than 1.25 miles from a given wind turbine. While the board may grant an exemption only after an agreement, through the execution of a legally binding publicly recorded document.

A final discussion with regard to the Zoning Ordinance dealt with sign regulations. Off-site town business directory signs are designed to inform those traveling on Lankford Highway of businesses in a town and direct them to the downtown center. While the board debated the size of such signs, it was generally agreed to restrict their size to 40 square feet.

The board briefly discussed the concept of business licenses vs. a business tax. referred to as a Business Professional Occupational License (BPOL) tax. The county currently has a one-size-fits-all business license fee of \$30 annually. A BPOL tax would be a fee assessed on the gross receipts for a business. Supervisor Larry LeMond noted that under the current tax structure, a small business pays the same as a large grocery store, which appears to be unfair to smaller businesses. LeMond suggested that the board look into the option of a BPOL tax. Murrav asked County Administrator Katie Nunez to provide the board with a comparison of how the two plans would affect revenue for the county.

A final point addressed by the board involved a request from Grayson County to endorse a resolution objecting to Attorney General Mark Herring's directive concerning reciprocity for concealed-weapon permits with other states. Herring has said that concealed-weapon permits issued by states that are not as strict as Virginia will not be recognized in the commonwealth. The supervisors agreed that they need more time to review the request.

Correction

closed for about 5.5 hours Saturday morning.

The one reported injury from the storm occurred when a resident's hand was hurt as he was trying to leave a trailer on which a tree had fallen, Rush reported.

"A great portion of the island was without power for some time," Rush said. "Kudos to those guys" from ANEC. "That was pretty dangerous times in the dark with high winds. That was pretty dangerous work and nonstop."

"Chincoteague received the brunt of everything," said Accomack County Public Safety Director C. Ray Pruitt. He got no reports of significant damage anywhere else in the county. But during the storm, declarations of emergency were called for the county and the town.

There were significantly higher tides, a scattering of power outages, and trees down on the mainland, Pruitt

said. The Quinby causeway and bridge were closed for about 10 hours as the result of "high water and power poles that were leaning in a compromising position." He said the electric company got in there and corrected the situation.

In Wachapreague, Pruitt said, the tide rose nine feet above sea level. The fire department there moved equipment to a site outside of town for several hours as a precaution.

"Tangier was fine," he continued.
"Minor flooding there, but nothing like on the seaside."

Chincoteague announced that it will collect tree limbs and bagged pine needles, pine cones and small debris downed from the storm. These materials will not be picked up at the regular trash collection time. Call the town office at 336-6519 no later than 5 p.m. Friday, Feb. 12, to be added to the list. Accomack County Landfill has waived tipping fees for the debris through Feb. 13.



Final Beam — Signed by Many — Lowered onto Hospital

Shore community members were invited recently to sign the final beam in the infrastructure of the new Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital (RSMH) and Riverside Shore Cancer Center (RSCC) being constructed near Onley. A crowd of 200 gathered to sign the beam and watch while a crane lifted it into place.

After Rev. Elizabeth Freund gave the invocation, Riverside Health System President and Chief Executive Officer William Downey commended the local Board of Directors. "They had the vision to say, 'How do we continue to enhance, expand and improve' "health care services on the Eastern Shore?

John Peterman, administrator and vice president of RSMH, unveiled the slogan that team members will use over the coming year to refer to the transition planning process. The winning entry, "Sailing Into Excellence," was voted on by team members from a pool of suggestions submitted by their colleagues.

Beam signings and "topping out" ceremonies are part of a long construction industry tradition that celebrates the completion of the steel structure work as the building takes shape with the placement of the topmost beam. It's the first milestone in the process of bringing the building to life.

The steel used in the hospital and cancer center

was manufactured in the United States and fabricated in Maryland.

Construction of the hospital and cancer center, as well as a medical office building, will total more than \$80 million and local vendors have been used whenever feasible. They include Adco Signs, Allen Clark Trucking, Apostle Roofing, Beauchamp Construction, Branscome Eastern Shore, Chapman Electric, Crystal Steel, Eastern Shore Events and Rentals, Eastern Shore Landscape Management, Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority, Fulgent Contracting, Heavenly Creations Catering, Highcamera Aerial Photographic Service, Hill Sand and Gravel, Holiday Inn Express and Suites, Jack Tarr Electrical Contractor, Moore's Portable Solutions, Oak Hall Supplies, Onancock Building Supply, Patriot Steel, Rommel Electric, Sev's Cleaning Service, T&W Block Inc., and Walker Laberge.

The total square footage of all three buildings comes to more than 179,000 square feet. The hospital will offer 52 private inpatient rooms, including 10 rooms for critical care patients. It also will feature 13 private Emergency Department rooms, three operating rooms and state-of-the-art diagnostic imaging.

The campus is 60 acres bordered by woods and a creek, with access from Lankford Highway.

Accomack Circuit Court

An Accomack Circuit Court jury has already recommended that Khalil Mohammed Muslimani, a 68-year-old child sex offender, should spend the rest of his life in prison. But the Onancock man is waiting in the county jail to stand trial on another alleged sex offense.

The jury recommended recently that Muslimani serve two life terms plus 20 years for forcible sodomy and carnal knowledge of his niece, who was a teenager in 1998 and 2002 when the crimes occurred.

In the upcoming case, he is accused of raping his stepdaughter who was 12 when she gave birth to his child. She says she had four of his children by the time she was 16 and was taken to have an abortion of another child when she was 11. She stopped going to school when she was 10.

Last week Muslimani was back in court to ask for a new lawyer. He was not satisfied with the one who was appointed. "If Mr. Paul Watson ... does not resign voluntarily, then the defendant requests and asks that this court dismiss ... Watson."

Judge W. Revell Lewis III denied the motion, saying the Eastville attorney visited Muslimani often to discuss the case and is capable of representing him.

Muslimani also wants to go to his home on Robbins Lane, with an escort of officers, if necessary, "to retrieve crucial evidentiary documents to be presented at his trial." The items were not listed in his written request and no action was taken.

The trial is set for March. It was canceled last time as prospective jurors were waiting to be chosen and Muslimani took sick and was rushed to the hospital.

"I would like to point out that I never consented to any sexual relations with my stepfather," Spione, now 41, wrote in a letter to the commonwealth's attorney's office. She has consented to the use of her name in articles about the case.

Cornell Lee West In 22 of Flotche

Cornell Lee West Jr., 32, of Fletcher Road in Nelsonia was sentenced to six years on each of two counts of distribution of cocaine that occurred March 11 and 12, 2014. All but six months was suspended. West's driver's license was suspended.

Javelle Scarborough, 39, of Chandler Lane in Parksley pleaded guilty to eluding police on July 14, 2015. Sentencing was deferred pending completion of a presentence report.

Megan Jones, 29, of Dover, Del., pleaded guilty to grand larceny of property belonging to Patty Bloxom between July 27 and Aug. 5, 2012. A short-form presentence report was ordered. Sentencing was continued until June.

Patrick James Johnson, 39, of Turkey Run Road in Mears was given a three-year suspended sentence for possession of heroin and a six-month suspended sentence for possession of drug paraphernalia. The crimes occurred on Aug. 18, 2014. Johnson was ordered to complete 100 hours of community service and to be on supervised probation.

Richard Todd Taylor, 50, of Sand Street in Temperanceville was given a two-year suspended sentence for possessing a firearm after being convicted of a felon. He was stopped by an officer who noticed he had an expired inspection sticker. The officer saw Taylor had a .22 caliber rifle in his vehicle.

Northampton Circuit Court

An Accomack man was sentenced Monday in Northampton Circuit Court to four years in prison for eluding police last summer.

All but six months of that term was suspended for Calvin Lee Bailey, 27, of Pungoteague. He also was sentenced for reckless driving to 12 months, with all but six months suspended, to run consecutively with the first sentence. Bailey was fined \$100 for driving without a license and another \$100 for having defective equipment. The incidents occurred on July 19, 2015.

In another case, Bruce Lee Nutter, 39, of Cape Charles was sentenced for possession of a firearm by a non-violent felon to two years in prison, with all but a month suspended. The offense occurred Aug. 29, 2014.

James Randolph Richardson Jr., 56, of Nassawadox pleaded guilty to a count of possession of heroin that occurred Nov. 20, 2014. Richardson was also accused of possessing the drug Jan. 3, 2015. That charge was not prosecuted.

Accomack District Court

Without a death, there cannot be manslaughter.

That's how things went down at a preliminary hearing Monday in Accomack General District Court for a case involving a fatal car accident alleged to be caused by too much alcohol consumption.

Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan was unable to legally prove that Devante Deshawn Harris, 23, of Parksley died after being ejected from a vehicle that crashed near Accomac. Since Harris was taken to a Maryland hospital and an autopsy was likely done in Baltimore, Morgan couldn't find a way to enter the death certificate.

Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar explained that Virginia does not allow out-of-state witnesses to be subpoenaed to the district court for a hearing. That is only available in the circuit court.

So while Morgan had the information in his hands, he wasn't allowed to submit the evidence through the expert who signed or witnessed it.

Without proof of death, Judge Gordon Vincent would not find probable cause to certify the charge of involuntary manslaughter against driver Brandon Oneil West, 23, of Pungoteague. He dismissed the case as urged by defense lawyer Terry Bliss.

West admitted to Trooper Louis Milyko that he was driving the black 2002 Mitsubishi Lancer that crashed on Lankford Highway on Dec. 10, 2015, near Accomac.

Morgan said he would be seeking a direct indictment for manslaughter in the case. That will likely happen when the grand jury meets Monday, Feb. 1.

Vincent did find cause to certify another felony, maining a passenger in West's vehicle by DUI.

Milyko said that when he arrived at the accident scene, he saw Harris lying on the side of the road in "grave" condition. Emergency responders were working to save him.

In addition to West, who Milyko said was walking but unresponsive to conversation, two additional passengers, Ray and Javone Fitchett, were taken to the local hospital.

"Ray Fitchett was in extreme, extreme pain," said the trooper. "You could tell he was hurt bad ... he was flown to Norfolk General."

"I was drunk and I wrecked," Milyko said the defendant confessed to him.

All three said they had been drinking alcohol, he added.

After the hearing, West was taken back to Accomack Jail where he has been held without bond since he was treated and released from Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital in Nassawadox just after the accident occurred, closing north and southbound lanes of the highway for hours.

Charges of "felony dog attack" were lodged this week against the Onancock woman whose canines grabbed and bit two young neighborhood sisters while they waited for the bus to take them to school on Monday, Jan. 4, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Edna Lenae Parker, 38, of Circle Drive is accused of two counts of being "the owner of a canine or canine crossbreed or other animal (who) commit(s) a willful act of omission in the care, control or containment of such animal so gross, wanton and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life and was the proximate cause of such animal attacking and causing serious injury to a person."

Parker was arrested Jan. 23. She was released from Accomack Jail that day after posting \$2,000 secured bond. Fairy McPherson, an animal control officer with the Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO), investigated.

A preliminary hearing is set for late February. But first, Judge Gordon Vincent will have to determine if the dogs, described in court documents as a brindle female pit bull and a gray-and-white male pit bull, are vicious and need to be killed. Both are being held at the county's animal control facility near Melfa. Magistrate Brittany Russell Taylor determined they were vicious on Jan 14.

"I was notified by the victim's mother through dispatch that her two juvenile daughters had been attacked," McPherson wrote in the file. "One of the juveniles remained in the hospital for several days due to the extent of the injuries."

The girls' mother, Tonya Hernandez of Mink Farm Road, identified her daughters as Victoria Hernandez, a 17-year-old Nandua High School student, and Mariana Hernandez, a sixth grader who attends Nandua Middle School. Mariana was hurt the worse by the male dog who "locked his jaw" on the girl's calf.

Victoria was bitten in the leg by the female dog while trying to help her sister, their mother said. It was the first day back to school after the holidays.

"They have to walk down my driveway, Tonya Hernandez said. "You can see the house. Maybe a half mile. It was the next-lane-over neighbor's dog." She said both girls had to go to the hospital and both had to get a series of rabies shots. Mariana spent three days at Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters in Norfolk.

"What gets me is ... it's like an elderly neighborhood, said Tonya Hernandez. "They've made 14 calls (complaints about the dogs) and nothing was ever done. By the time they come to check, the owner gets them inside. Everybody knew whose dog it was."

She said Mariana "cannot walk on her leg. She can't extend it because it tore up the ligaments ... she can't point her toes." Tonya Hernandez said her younger daughter won't be going back to school for "a while. She's got to use a walker to walk. My daughter was asking what are they going to do with the dogs, are they going to hurt them? We've always been dog lovers."

Keshaun Lamar Coston, 24, of Bayside Road in Greenbush was arrested Sunday and charged with intentionally causing at least \$1,000 worth of damage to a 2002 Mercedes Benz belonging to Marvin Wynder on May 11, 2015. Coston is being held without bail in Accomack Jail. Accomack Deputy N.J. Bogan investigated.

Coston also was charged in Northampton District Court with grand larceny occurring Nov. 5, 2015. That case was handled by Exmore Police Chief Angelo DiMartino.

Marvin Kwame Snead, 25, of Mill Run Apartments in Exmore was arrested Jan. 19 and charged with burglary, and assault and battery in connection with June 17, 2015, incidents.

"Mr. Snead broke into Jessica Lilliston's home by pushing a window air conditioner in," Deputy H.F (Chip) Little of ACSO wrote in the file. "He then assaulted her and dragged her around the house by her neck causing a cut on her right foot." Secured bond was set at \$2,000.

Martin G. Miles, 24, of Mitchell Lane in Parksley was arrested Jan. 12 and charged with stealing property valued at \$200 or more belonging to Josh Parker on April 17, 2015. Investigator C.A. McPherson of ACSO. Bond was set at \$500.

Markeice O'Bryant Harmon, 30, of Metompkin Road in Parksley is accused of committing five counts of credit-card forgery and a count of credit card fraud on Dec. 15, 2015. Investigator Pat Coulter of ACSO handled the case. Harmon was arrested on Jan. 21 and is being held in Eastern Shore Regional Jail in Eastville.

An officer who had been working for Onley Police Department (OPD) for about a year was put on suspension after being charged Wednesday with carrying a firearm while a preliminary protective order was in effect.

According to records filed in Accomack General District Court, Joel Richards Addison, 34, of Beckett Lane in Painter was released from custody on \$5,000 unsecured bond. A checklist for bond determination listed him as unemployed from OPD.

OPD Chief John Spivey said Wednesday the charge was made "as a result of an investigation conducted by the Virginia State Police. The Town of Onley is also conducting an internal investigation into this matter. Mr. Addison is currently suspended pending the outcome of the criminal allegations and the internal investigation of the Town of Onley's Police Department." He would not say if Addison is being paid while the investigation is being conducted.

Trooper D.P. Tudor wrote in the court file that she was dispatched to a traffic crash at about 7 a.m. Thursday, Jan. 21. Addison had struck a deer on Lankford Highway in Melfa.

He "was in his issued police uniform, driving a marked OPD vehicle and wearing his issued firearm," Tudor wrote. "Upon running Officer Addison's license, it was discovered that there was an active protective ordered issued by Chesterfield Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court on Jan. 30, 2014 and expiring on Jan. 29, 2016, in which Addison was the respondent."

Tudor wrote, "Addison was served with this order the same day it was issued. One of the requirements of this order is that the respondent "not purchase or transport any firearm while this order is in effect."

Cape Charles Council Fouses on Trail, Breakwaters, Harbor

Cape Charles Town Council moved forward with additional improvements to the town last Thursday

First on the agenda was a discussion regarding Phase 2 of the Cape Charles Community Trail. The long-range plan for the trail is to have it ring the community so people can walk from the residential and harbor areas, and the beach, to the local businesses from the safety of boardwalks and sidewalks. The multiuse trail is being funded with a mix of grants and local monies. The Phase 2 cost estimate is \$2 million and a contract with Kevcor Contracting Corporation was awarded last fall, subject to Virginia Department of Transportation approval and allocation of Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) grant funding. Phase 2 should begin in February.

Expansion of the offshore breakwater project is well underway, with construction of the third breakwater as well as additions to the two existing ones. The plan calls for up to five breakwaters to be placed from just west of the harbor entrance, running parallel to the shoreline and the channel leading to the harbor, to an area west of Plantation Creek. The purpose of the project is to provide protection for vessels and floating docks and infrastructure in the inner harbor from wind-driven waves from the northwest, west and southwest. The project is estimated to cost \$860,000, 75 percent of which is funded by a Virginia Port Authority grant, with the remaining 25 percent coming from local funds. Barring any unforeseen problems, the project should be completed in time for the 2016 boating season.

In a related area, Councilman Steve Bennett raised the issue of why several owners had moved their vessels from the town harbor to the Oyster Farm Marina on Kings Creek. Assistant harbormaster Barbara Michaux responded that some owners relocated their vessels when harbormaster Smitty Dize accepted a position as manager/dockmaster at the Oyster Farm Marina. It was noted that a new harbormaster has been selected to fill the position left vacant by Dize. The town intends to announce the new harbormaster's name soon.

A third project being considered by council is the Pine Street Waste Management Area/Parking Lot to be located behind the town library at Mason Avenue and Pine Street. It was selected to help alleviate the shortage of parking spaces in the downtown area created when the parking lots adjacent to the former grocery store property on Mason Avenue was purchased for redevelopment. Councilman Frank Wendell expressed concern over the cost of the project. On a vote of 5-1 (Wendell voting against), council agreed to move forward with the project.

Council reviewed a conditional-use permit (CUP) to build residential units above the commercial property at 207 Mason Avenue. The property has received CUPs in the past and no construction has ever been completed. The most recent CUP dates from 2010. The owner has plans to move forward with the construction if council approves the CUP. Council voted unanimously to approve the applicant's request.



CAPITAL LETTERS

Rob Bloxom with this week's report from the Capitol. I hope everyone made it through last weekend's storm and returned to normal tides.

House hours will become long in the

coming days as we have full dockets in committees and on the floor. We lost one and a half days because of the storm, but we will make our days longer versus going beyond our allotted time in Richmond.

I receive a lot of emails from across the state and I try to read them all, but most are of the cut-and-paste variety so you only need to read the first one. The topics that fill my inbox the most concern animal and Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) bills. Animal bills are very emotional as no one wants to see any animal euthanized. This is a no-

ble idea but not realistic. Many shelters obtain a low euthanizing rate by limiting what animals they accept. The question to ask is, is it better for a shelter to have a 90 percent adoption rate but only accept 1,000 animals or accept 5,000 animals, have 2,500 of them adopted, but only receive a 50 percent adoption rate? The other problem is between private shelters and public ones. In some localities, the private shelter is the only shelter and it contracts with the locality. This is a complicated issue that has been argued for decades, as my father can attest.

The next topic is the VMRC. There are many bills in Richmond pertaining to oyster leasing and how the VMRC is handling the growing industry. The number of lease applications has the staff overloaded. The number of licenses required to grow aquacultural products is astounding. While the price of these licenses is not great, the number of them shows how fast this industry is evolving and how the VMRC is responding to each new situation.

The sheer number of bills pertaining to the VMRC reaffirms my commitment to keep the menhaden fishery under the legislature's control. I am not happy with their management of blue crabs or oysters; therefore, I am against giving them control over menhaden. The fishery is managed by the Atlantic Marine Fisheries that sets a catch quota for the fishery. Virginia can either accept our quota or let New Jersey have it. We don't win many battles in that arena, but we do have the lion's share of the quota in menhaden.

Science a few years ago cut the quota by 20 percent because of concerns of sustainability. This past year, the quota was raised by 10 percent. The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission Menhaden Technical Advisory Committee is staffed by 15 fish scientists who study migratory fish. It is my belief that if you use science to decrease a quota, then you must use science to increase a quota.

The other bills concerning menhaden are the classic battles between the commercial and the recreational fishermen. Both have been operating in Virginia since the Indians caught menhaden for fertilizer. I encourage you to keep in touch with me and my office over the coming months. I value the feedback you provide on a continual basis as it helps me do a better job of representing you. 

he son of a high-school football coach, Dr. Mark A. Mentzer played the game in high school, growing up in Lancaster, Pa. In college, he was a wrestler at Division I Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster.

His father was also an amateur boxer who probably took his share of hits to the head.

"I am sure my father must have had a concussion or two, but fortunately, he was lucid to the day he drew his last breath," said Mentzer earlier this week, sitting behind his desk at Broadwater Academy, where he teaches AP calculus and advanced physics and guides the school's robotics team.

Mentzer remains an avid fan of football, following his Philadelphia Eagles and attending Broadwater's home football games in the fall. A week from Sunday he will be one of approximately 115 million people who will watch the Denver Broncos battle the Carolina Panthers in Super Bowl 50.

Unlike some who say the game is too violent as we learn more about the impact of head injuries and predict the demise of football as we know it in this century, Mentzer thinks the game needs to go on but can be made safer.

In fact, Mentzer has consulted with the National Football League and equipment manufacturers on sensors and instrumentation related to brain injuries. This past July he received a patent for his invention of a sensor system for mild traumatic brain injury (mTBI), applicable for both military personnel and contact-sports athletes.

His sensors have been presented to the National Science Foundation, received the highest rating by the Army Research Laboratory and now are in calibration testing at several independent laboratories.

Mentzer writes, "I developed a sensor to accurately correlate biomechanical data to biomedical, and to identify thresholds for neuronal injuries. I developed the relationship of neuronal injuries to their insult thresholds, and calibrated my sensor outputs to these injury modalities."

In simpler language, Mentzer said a football helmet could have a sensor — or it might even be in the mouthpiece — that could measure the impact of a hit to the head. A light could register green, yellow or red, depending on the severity of the hit, which would enable medical personnel to determine if the player could return to play, needs more testing or should be held from action.

Hopefully, Dr. Mentzer did not notice I had the glazed look of a football player who just had his bell rung as he rattled off one scientific term after another in our interview this week.

I earned a degree in college, but it was in English. Dr. Mentzer, on the other hand, has multiple master's degrees from Johns Hopkins University in biotechnology and business administration, and a PhD and another master's in electrical engineering from the University of Delaware, in addition to his physics and music degrees from Franklin and Marshall College.

The patent he received this past summer was one of 17 he holds, including several in memory technology, optical communications and others in fuel systems.

He has authored two books on sensor technology and integrated optics.

A civilian employee of the U.S. Army, serving as a research scientist until he decided to pursue a new career as a high-school math and science teacher, Mentzer also has operated an aerospace defense company, managed an optical-assembly manufacturing company and led global-product development in Europe, Asia, and the

Americas in addition to teaching graduate engineering and physics for seven years at Penn State University.

So how did he wind up at Broadwater Academy?

After years of travel, including stays in Japan, Scotland and Mexico while also working extensively in Germany, France the United Kingdom, Belgium and Holland, Mentzer, now 50-something, wanted to semi-retire and was advised by a friend he might find gratification in teaching.

Last year, he was teaching at Crisfield High School in Maryland and took a group of students to a math competition. Prior to the competition, he noticed a group of students busy working the keypads of their calculators while other competitors were just waiting for the event to start. He walked over to a teacher, who turned out to be longtime Broadwater teacher Chris Gordon, and asked what his students were doing.

"They are warming up for the competition," said Gordon.

Mentzer replied, "I would like to teach students like that"

Mentzer struck up a friendship with Gordon and soon found himself applying for a position at the school and recently purchasing a house on Chesconnessex Creek, where he lives with a 16-year-old dog he inherited from his father. The 75-pound dog is a mix of chow, pomeranian, Afghan hound, bouvier and Boston terrier. Mentzer determined this with a mail-order genetics test kit he used.

He has found teaching at the high school to be extremely rewarding. "I am really enjoying interacting with the students here and helping them to pursue their interests," Menzter said, as several students entered his classroom to talk about preparing for SAT tests.

Mentzer also has established a relationship with the Virginia Institute of Marine Science and remains in contact with many of his colleagues from his previous careers.

Mentzer took time out to see the recently released movie, "Concussion," starring Will Smith as Dr. Bennet Omalu, whose findings shed light on the impact of repeated hits to the head for former athletes.

"Based on what I have studied, the facts of the movie are correct," said Mentzer, who added that considerable study is being done on the effects of concussions.

Mentzer has two grown children and said today he would be reluctant to let his son play football. "Both my son and daughter played soccer," he noted. "But there are issues, particularly for girls who are more prone to head injuries, with repeated headers by soccer players. It's not just football. Wrestlers can sustain head injuries too.

"We need to develop ways to immediately determine when an athlete has suffered a head injury and how severe that injury might be, allowing someone other than a coach to determine if and when that player can return to the field of play."

And Mentzer has a patent for a sensor that soon may be part of the solution leading to that capability.





Chicken Houses Pose Threat

Dear Editor:

The proposed expansion in the number and size of chicken houses in Accomack County presents a huge threat to the health of our waters and all the activities — fishing, shellfish harvesting, aquaculture and tourism — that depend on it. The most obvious and proven threat is the volume of manure that will be generated if all the chicken houses planned (the number comes close to doubling our present status) go into operation. Planning and Community Development Director Rich Morrison indicates the houses will be governed by "robust" regulations, but the fact is, those regulations address only building setbacks. They say nothing about the manure. That, sadly, is the responsibility of the individual contractor, not Tyson or Perdue.

Local farms are oversaturated with manure, and individual contractors don't have the resources to ship it to more remote fields that could use the fertilizer, fields which (unlike our peninsula) are not surrounded by water and penetrated by tidal rivers and creeks.

The problem of manure pollution exists in both Virginia and Maryland's portions of the Delmarva Peninsula. Maryland paid dearly for it in 1997, when the Pocomoke River suffered a massive fish kill. Fish caught in and near the river were covered with sores, and Pocomoke watermen suffered illnesses, including rashes, headaches, respiratory problems, eye irritation and long-term vision deficiencies. The toxic algae *pfiesteria piscicida* has been linked to these symptoms and to a fish kill

counted in the millions which occurred in North Carolina's Neuse, New, and Pamlico rivers. Blooms of *P. piscicida* and other algaes are promoted by over-fertilization.

Legislation has been introduced in Maryland to place the cost of appropriate manure disposal on the poultry processors. They can afford it; they profitably export chicken to such countries as Russia, China and Mexico. These countries get cheap chicken; Perdue and Tyson get the profit; and we're left to deal with the manure and environmental damage.

Until legislation similar to Maryland's is passed in Virginia, we should be very careful about approving more chicken houses in Accomack County.
