Murder Trial Suspended

Just before the start of the second day of the Ronnie Washington murder trial in Accomack Circuit Court Wednesday, prosecutor Matthew Brenner became ill and the case was continued until the two sides could come up with a date to proceed.

The delay came in the middle of testimony from Derimon (Mac) Hargis of Mappsville, who said he saw defendant Robert James (R.J.) Northan Jr., 30,

of Daugherty Road in Onley shoot Washington along Bear Town Road where the victim's body was found. He said the two men had gotten out of the car to urinate, leaving Hargis, who was driving, in the vehicle.

"I seen the first one," Hargis said of shots. "I was scared to death for my life. ... I didn't know he (Northan) had the gun on him that night ... he always toted a pistol. Every time I seen him.

But I didn't know he had it that night. ... It was some kind of Glock. I don't know what caliber it was." Hargis held his hands about 18 inches apart and said, "I saw fire about this long coming out of it."

"The front door (of the car) was still open (from where Washington had gotten out); the back door was closed," where Northan had been sitting. There were "no lights on inside the car," Hargis explained.

"I seen him drop back and tried to come forward," Hargis said of Washington. "I just ducked and tried to take cover." The witness said he heard four or five more shots. "I'm not entirely sure." After the shots stopped, there was a 20- to 30-second delay before

Northan got back in the car and directed Hargis to drive away," the witness testified.

Hargis said they went back to get Christina Huffman at the Mappsville trailer park, where the three men had been earlier. Hargis also lived at the park.

More Areas Want Paid Responders

Isolated areas in Accomack County can make rescue operations difficult. But in an age of fewer volunteers, one answer seems to prevail — more paid workers.

There's a proposal that will help alleviate the problem in lower Accomack County with a countywide 3-cent per \$100 valuation hike on the real-estate tax rate. That would pay for six new fire medics to run the Painter service and three more to fill in when others take sick time and vacations throughout the county.

Representatives from Saxis and Greenbackville volunteer companies told the supervisors Wednesday that help is needed in northern Accomack too. They suggested a 5-cent tax rate hike to take care of both areas. Supporting petitions signed by 250 people were presented.

Jimmy Dennis of Saxis complained that he lost a house and contents worth \$300,000 to a fire for lack of responders. "We have one of the nicest fire companies. The boys are good boys, but they work every day. If they had been on the job there, they could have gotten it out ... two people were on the scene, that was it."

Chuck Bradford of New Church mentioned the money volunteer companies make off ambulance billing even when the responders are from the county's Department of Public Safety (ADPS). He said a portion of that could be used to pay for more fire medics.

C. Ray Pruitt, ADPS director, had a plan to put an additional ambulance at Oak Hall Rescue, which serves Saxis and Greenbackville. He admitted that at times there hasn't been paid staff there. The Sprint program which brings a response person closer to the areas went unstaffed 16 percent of the time in 2015.

Pruitt presented a drive-time analysis for last year. He said 989 calls were answered within 8.5 minutes, 1,906 took between 8.6 and 11 minutes, 2,192 were between 11.1 and 16 minutes, 159 calls were answered between 16.1 and 21 minutes and 166 took more than 21 minutes to answer. The county's standard is 20 minutes.

Pruitt said of those over 21 minutes, 96 were to Greenbackville EMS District, 46 were to Chincoteague Bay Trails End and 24 were to Saxis District.

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Crockett Wants More Money for County Employees

Accomack Supervisor Robert Crockett said Wednesday he thinks the county should give more money to county employees in FY2016-17.

Crockett suggested the board consider giving the workers a 3 percent raise rather than the proposed 2 percent. He said an additional \$70,000 will come from the state. Those funds and the \$270,000 already set aside would allow the board to provide the same hike to county employees that state workers will get. Crockett said he would motion for the move at the appropriate time. A budget hearing was to take place the following day (after the Post's presstime).

In other business, Shirley Watkinson of Chincoteague Road reminded the supervisors how precious the 110-year-old Assawoman United Methodist Church is to local folks. The structure is in the NASA rocket Hazard Zone. She fears the stained glass windows could get break in a blast.

Watkinson quoted Chairman Ron Wolff as saying, "NASA doesn't ask anything from the county. It's asking a lot from the individual people who live in the area." She included property restrictions and property values, higher insurance rates and "certainly quality of life" in that equation. "Somebody is paying... so I urge you to put people who will speak up for the individuals ... not just the big entities."

The board later appointed Supervisor Grayson Chesser; Garnett Kellam, who lives close to the launch site; and Tommy Clark of Chincoteague to the new Accomack Wallops Working Group. NASA, the Navy, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (F&W) and the county Planning Commission also will appoint members to the nine-member panel.

The supervisors also:

•agreed to apply for a \$10 million Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) transportation grant for F&W to move the beach, parking and trails on Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge, and appointed Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr to represent the county in an environ-

mental assessment regarding those refuge changes;

•reported they are still awaiting answers from the county school division regarding \$6 million in funds earmarked for capital projects;

•accepted a bid for \$85,000 to renovate the former bank building in Parksley purchased for the Department of Public Safety.

•appointed Blake Johnson of the Island House Restaurant to the Eastern Shore Tourism Commission, Kenneth J. Savage of Chincoteague to the Eastern Shore Resource Conservation and Development Council, and Supervisor Paul Muhly as a liaison to the county treasurer's office to help with the collection of delinquent taxes;

•reappointed Tammy Pruitt of Onancock to the Eastern Shore Area on Aging Community Action Agency;

•agreed to adopt a resolution supporting a jetty project for Tangier;

•extended waiving of landfill tipping fees for brush until April 2 to allow cleanup from Winter Storm Jonas.

•received a report from County Attorney Cela Burge regarding a bill that is awaiting the governor's signature and would make the intentional release of hunting dogs without a landowner's consent a Class 3 misdemeanor.

• agreed to a consent order with the state Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) that includes a penalty of \$19,000 for causing erosion which allowed soil to enter a stream without a permit on property the Wallops Research Park leases from NASA. The county expects to recover the funds from a contractor who "cut trees and grubbed the roots in an area near an intermittent stream. ... The contractor has repaired the area according to a remediation plan approved by DEQ."

Joel Roberts Addison, 34, of Beckett Lane in Painter pleaded not guilty to the misdemeanor. He claimed that the person who sought the order on behalf of a child is now deceased.

"No sir," he said, informing retired Judge Stephen Helvin of Charlottes-ville, who presided over the case, that he did not think he was doing anything wrong. Addison thought he was under the protective order for one year, not two. He said he discussed the issue with OPD Chief John Sprivey.

Spivey confirmed Tuesday that "Joel Addison no longer works for the ... police department." Wednesday he said,

"Any open cases have been re-assigned to other officers."

Addison worked for the town for about a year when he was arrested. The PPO was in effect from Jan. 30, 2014, to Jan. 29, 2016, and was issued in Chesterfield. Va.

The officer was charged with the firearm offense on Jan. 26 when a check was made of his driver's license after he hit a deer on Lankford Highway near Melfa. Addison was in uniform, wearing a side arm and driving a squad car when the crash occurred. He had a shotgun in the trunk, which was said to be customary.

Addison was fined \$5. Costs were \$250. The judge apologized to him for having to convict. "I see both the facts and the law," Helvin said. The low fine

was to set an example.

"It's not that this defendant caused any problem with his firearm," said Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar, who praised Trooper D.P. Tudor for writing the warrant. "The police officer appropriately did her job. It's not a good idea for one officer to protect another police officer. In a way, it's a technical wrong ... we have met the burden."

Accomack Sheriff's Office

Two 16-year-olds were arrested late last week and charged with crimes that occurred on Quail Lane near Pungoteague, according to Accomack Sheriff Todd Godwin.

The names of the youths, one from Painter and the other from Norfolk, were not released because of their age. Godwin said a report of "suspicious individuals" was made by a neighborhood resident at nearly 3 p.m. March 11. When deputies arrived, they "saw someone fleeing from the rear of an unoccupied residence and into the woods.

"A check of the residence revealed that a burglary had occurred," the sheriff said. "Two juveniles were taken into custody a short distance from the scene and several items that were stolen from the residence were recovered."

The suspects were charged with burglary, grand larceny and possession of a firearm by a minor. They were taken to Norfolk Juvenile Detention Center pending a detention hearing.

"This incident was resolved in a timely manner due to an observant resident who contacted the sheriff's office," said Godwin.

FEDS SCRAP EAST COAST OFFSHORE DRILLING FOR OIL & GAS

Citing a price slump and environmental concerns from coastal areas, including Accomack and Northampton counties, the Obama Administration Tuesday reversed a proposal to open the Atlantic coast to oil and gas drilling.

The decision also cited conflicts with competing commercial and military ocean uses. The possible adverse effects of an oil spill was the local fear.

"Today's announcement is an opportunity to work with the Department of Defense (DOD) to address the concerns they have raised and to ensure that any offshore energy exploration is coupled with a revenue sharing agreement that benefits our commonwealth," Gov. Terry McAuliffe said.

Through his PAC, "Let's Grow, Virginia!" Republican Ed Gillespie, who plans to run for governor in 2017, said he was "incredibly disappointed that yet again this administration has blocked exploration for and development of our offshore energy resources in the Atlantic Ocean. The Interior Department has estimated that there could be 3.3 billion barrels of recoverable oil in the waters impacted, along with 31 trillion cubic feet of natural gas."

Gillespie said "development off our deep sea coast would have meant the creation of thousands of good paying jobs. ... This decision is a bad one for Virginia's economy and workers, and for U.S. national security."

"Today is a historic day for Virginia, for our country, and our planet," Shore-keeper Jay Ford of Belle Haven said Tuesday. "President Obama's decision protects our coasts and the future generations who inherit the consequences of our decisions. We want to thank the Virginia localities, trade associations and thousands upon thousands of citizens who made their concerns known to the administration. Accomack and Northampton counties led the way for the commonwealth."

Sen. Tim Kaine said, "I have long believed that the moratorium on offshore drilling, based on a cost-benefit calculation performed decades ago, should be re-examined. Today's announcement ... suggests that they have grappled with this question and concluded that the risks of such production outweigh potential gains. I am particularly struck by the material objections of the DOD. ... I have participated in this debate for over a decade as a governor and member of the Senate Armed Services Committee. The DOD has been relatively quiet during this public debate and has never shared their objections with me before."

"I take seriously the concerns the DOD and NASA have raised about the potential impacts of energy exploration and development along the Atlantic coast," Sen. Mark Warner said. "I look forward to getting a full briefing from the Navy and NASA Wallops about ... their concerns."

"Over the past several years, we have worked to educate Virginians about the reality of offshore drilling," said Caroline Wood, mid-Atlantic campaign organizer for Oceana, an international advocacy organization focused solely on ocean conservation. "Virginians from the Eastern Shore, in Hampton Roads and across the state elevated their voices and were tenacious in their defense of Virginia's spectacular coastal environment and the valuable industries it supports. ... The federal administration listened to the people of Virginia."

You have been sent a bill from the Town of Nassawadox for your town 2016 car/truck and trailer vehicle tag fees. The cost for all cars and trucks is \$33, and the cost for all utility and licensed boat trailers is \$18.

We are using the County's Personal Property list and records from the sales of decals at the Northampton Free Library as our operational database.

This is the first year we will be following all the other incorporated towns in Northampton County in billing on personal accounts as a residence or business which houses vehicles within Town limits, and will not be issuing decals for trailers and windshields.

The due date for payment is April 15, 2016; after that date you will be responsible for a 10% penalty and 2% monthly interest for each vehicle or trailer fee still outstanding.

The Town will also employ the use of the license registration renewal "HOLD" mechanism provided through the DMV, which will prevent you from renewing a license plate or driver's license until you have paid your account in full with the Town of Nassawadox, and paid the fee for "holding" your licenses through the DMV.

Any person who fails or refuses to pay appropriate fees after the due date shall be deemed guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined an amount not exceeding \$100.00.

quired about the arrangement, Wolff came down from room where the board was eating to show the check and explain. He said his price is about \$35 cheaper than when the county bought the sandwiches from a local Subway store. "We're saving the county money," he said. "I provide plates ... plus I deliver. If I didn't own a restaurant, I wouldn't be bringing them some sandwiches."

Wolff said the supervisors had requested that he bring the meals, though they never voted on it.

After the session, Supervisor Robert Crockett said Wolff was asked to bring the sandwiches for a special meeting by a consensus of the board. "We enjoyed" them and asked him to continue. "We're talking about sandwiches for nine board members and a few of the staff members and two bags of potato chips. I have no issue at all. It's such a small issue as far as the dollar amount, as far as the product amount. He presents a bill. It's above board ... he did that at our request."

He said he, Huffman and Northan then went somewhere in Maryland, where Northan purchased cocaine. Huffman then drove them to Ocean City, Md., where they walked on the boardwalk for about 90 minutes and Northan bought new clothes and changed in the bathroom there, Hargis said.

Defense lawyer Tucker Watson said he did not expect the rest of the case to be heard this week. Judge W. Revell Lewis III said he had just spoken on the phone to Brenner, who said he would be going to the hospital for care.

Brenner was still questioning Hargis when the first day of court ended Tuesday. The prosecutor had set up equipment so videos of the crime night from several locations could be viewed. Watson had not yet cross-examined Hargis.

Northan entered pleas of not guilty to premeditated murder of Washington, use of a firearm in the murder, robbery of Washington and use of a firearm by a felon in connection with the July 2015 incidents.

The defendant was already in jail when the indictment for those charges were handed down in August. He was being held on charges of shooting at an occupied vehicle and putting the life of the occupant in peril, possession of a firearm by a felon, brandishing a firearm and discharging a firearm in or near a public road, all occurring in February 2015.

He waived his right to a jury in the murder case.

Huffman also is expected to testify. It was unclear if Northan would take the stand. Watson complained that Brenner had not given all the information that he was due during discovery. He had asked the judge to stop the trial the previous day so more information could be gained, but Lewis refused.

Dr. Wendy Gunther, who performed Washington's autopsy, said the victim died from multiple gunshot wounds. He had 11 gunshot wounds, including some to the face that knocked out teeth, and shots to the shoulder, chest and groin. Gunther said nearly half of the shots would have killed him without the oth-

ers. Two bullets were recovered from the body. Washington also had a \$100 bill plus \$1.03 and a cell phone in his pocket.

A search warrant for that phone was filed with the court. It stated that a woman spoke to Washington at about 11 a.m. that day. "She advised that he was going to meet someone in the Mappsville area." The friend said, "she tried to call him again at noon and did not receive an answer on his cell phone."

Hargis said it was about 4 a.m. when the three men left the trailer park. They went to get gas and then stopped on the road, where the shooting took place.

Investigator Sam Castiglia testified that he told Hargis that he was a murder suspect when the witness was first questioned, although there is no plan to charge Hargis. Castiglia said Hargis and Huffman have been in hiding across the state to protect them.

The murder weapon hasn't been found. Watson said the DNA evidence would not connect his client to the shooting. He disputed the robbery, noting the money that was found in the victim's pocket.

he 2016
Virginia General Assembly included a two-year state budget that includes pecific items of importance to the Shore.

We have a half- million-dollar appropriation for a new library as well

as the state's share of the Tangier Seawall project, and a \$850,000 appropriation to support the development of unmanned vehicle technology.

We also have had significant political back-and-forth over the filling of a vacancy on the Virginia State Supreme Court. The issue appeared to have been finally resolved with the appointment of former Attorney General Ken Cuccinelli for a 12-year term on the Supreme Court bench, but his name was withdrawn. This vacancy has been highly politicized, which is unfortu-

nate for the court. However, the State Supreme Court has a strong bench and will survive.

The Certificate of Public Need issue, which had significant ramifications for our hospitals, has been put off until the 2017 Session. This issue is simply too complex to have been dealt with in a hurried fashion. I was one of two senators to vote against the bill in the Health and Education Committee, but by the time it reached the Senate floor, concerns among more senators resulted in its being carried over. Reforms of the Certificate of Public Need process are worthy of consideration, but in a much more deliberate fashion.

In the closing days of the Assembly, my office sent out 5,000 letters to Honor Roll students across the 6th Senate District. Congratulations to all the hardworking kids in the 6th Senate District.

We will return to Richmond on April 20 for the constitutionally-required reconvened or "veto" session. We will consider then the governor's vetoes of various pieces of legislation as well as amendments that he may make. In addition, the governor can make amendments to the state budget.

i, this is Rob Bloxom with this week's Capitol report from home on the Eastern Shore. The 2016 General Assembly session adjourned Friday at

8:45 p.m., completing its work ahead of schedule for the second year in a row. The early adjournment will save taxpayers over \$25,000.

This year, the House of Delegates worked tirelessly to strengthen Virginia's economy, improve our educational system so all children have the opportunity to succeed, and chart a responsible fiscal course for the future.

One of the most important tasks of

the General Assembly is crafting the two-year state budget. I am happy to report that the House of Delegates passed a conservative, responsible, and structurally-balanced budget that invests in the core functions of government while protecting precious taxpayer resources. Some of the highlights of the 2016-18 state budget are eliminating state liabilities, reducing borrowing and making one-time investments rather than committing to long-term spending. We are investing over \$900 million in new funding for K-12. Our funding also gives local school divisions added flexibility. We are providing over \$114 million in new funding for higher education to hold down tuition costs for Virginia families, while not raising taxes or fees.

Three of the four pieces of legislation I carried this year passed and have been signed into law by the governor. The first bill of importance to the 100th District

will expedite permits for beach restoration (HB 327), directing the Virginia Marine Resources Commission to develop an accelerated process for issuing permits for emergency sand restoration on publicly owned beaches when the erosion is caused by a discrete, identifiable weather event that was the subject of a local or state declaration of emergency.

In addition, along with Sen. Lewis, I included many budget amendments that will benefit the Eastern Shore. The Accomack Public Library will be granted \$500,000 as seed money for the new library construction in Parksley. We appropriated \$850,000 to establish the Unmanned Systems Commercial Center of Excellence to work in collaboration with the Mid-Atlantic Aviation Partnership and the Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority. This center will develop a strategic plan and a road map for the recruit-

ment and expansion of Unmanned Aerial Systems companies. And lastly, \$236,000 was designated for Virginia's share of an Army Corps of Engineers project to construct a seawall to preserve the harbor on Tangier Island.

I have joked in the past about not being safe until the General Assembly adjourns. My fellow senators and delegates and I can now return to our home district and live under the new laws that will go into effect July 1. I must thank my staff at Bloxom Auto and at Shore Tire and Auto. Without their dedication and hard work covering for me when I am in Richmond, I could not do this job.

Tread an item recently penned by Tom Verducci, a longtime Sports Illustrated writer, stating the most emotionally powerful words in the English language are monosyllabic.

"Love, hate, born, die, sex, kill, laugh cry, want, need, give and take" were the words cited by Verducci as examples.

With all due respect to Verducci, one of my favorite sports writers, I think he forgot one — golf.

Golf is often humiliating and humbling, but I can't wait to do it again.

It was back to the links for me last week after a five-month hiatus due to cold, rain and otherwise dreary weather over the winter. I played a midweek round at Bay Creek in Cape Charles and then on the weekend played the Birkdale Club, a Chesterfield course.

I was consistently inconsistent with the two rounds. My scores were 43-53 and 54-43. Thus, you if added my two best nines, I had a very respectable 86, but if you took my two worst, it would be a shabby 107.

The truth is I am not as good as the lower score nor as bad as the triple-digit number. I usually shoot in the low to mid-90s with an occasional foray in the 80s. My short game and putting hold me back from being a consistent 80s golfer. If I say so myself, I drive like a champ. But, sadly for me, I have to hit the ball again.

Golf is a game that can lure you into getting ahead of yourself. In that first round after five months of not playing golf, I was 2 over par after seven holes with three pars and a birdie and no double bogeys.

On the eighth tee, I started thinking about breaking 80, something I have only done once in my life. I had a double bogey on 8 and made a triple on 9 to shoot a disappointing 43 on the front nine. So much for breaking 80. I never made another

par the remainder of the day.

My new plan is not to think. Sometimes the head is the body part that gets in the way of playing well.

The best part of golf is the association with other golfers, who share your misery and joys on the links.

One of my favorites is George Savage, who will turn 88 next month and still plays with men 30 years younger. He not only plays with them, but he often shoots his age and usually takes their money at the end of the day. This day, our group included my longtime golfing buddy Charlie Cameron, college fraternity brother Steve Warren, and the always affable Glenwood Pruitt.

Last week, George was telling us about a Honda Classic golf tournament in Florida he was attending many years ago. He was standing near the tee watching Gary Nicklaus, the son of legendary golfer Jack Nicklaus, prepare to hit his drive.

As Nicklaus, who only had a brief PGA career, was going through his preshot routine, Savage turned to the guy next to him, wearing a baseball hat pulled down low and dark sunglasses, and commented, "He's as slow as his old man," referring to Jack Nicklaus, who was well-known for being deliberate on the course.

Even though we could guess what was coming next, with great laughter, George told us the man next to him turned out to be Jack Nicklaus himself.

George then told us a story about a golfer asking Ben Hogan how to "back up" a 7-iron, meaning making the ball spin backward when it hit the green.

"How far do you hit a 7-iron?" asked Hogan.

The man replied, "About 125 yards." Hogan replied, "Why would you want the ball to stop?"

This past weekend, I was part of a twosome with my stepson, Josh. We were paired with two other golfers upon arriving at the course. Golf clubs often make foursomes to keep the speed of play consistent when the course is crowded.

Introductions were made at the first tee with no last names needed. Your worst fear is that the other golfers are way better than you. Both Mike and Matt shot better scores than we did, but we were close enough that the day was enjoyable, particularly since the pair was attentive to our games and applauded our good shots. We did the same.

All golfers are equal on the course. Very little is discussed about what you do off the course.

I did learn Mike, who always seemed to be smiling and having fun, ran a Jaguar dealership for many years. When he learned I covered sports and wrote a weekly column, he said he had a friend who often said upon hitting a great shot, "I couldn't hit that more perfecter," adding that I should use that in my next column. I just did.

The other great thing about golf, compared to, let's say, tennis, is the great venues where the game can be enjoyed. A tennis court at Hilton Head is just like the tennis court anywhere on the Shore, but every golf course is unique and has its own special qualities.

I've been fortunate to play great courses at Pinehurst, including the famous #2, Homestead, the Golden Horseshoe in Williamsburg, Myrtle Beach and on the Robert Trent Jones Trail in Alabama.

They've all created great memories, and from each I can recall at least that one great shot everyone says keeps you coming back for more humble pie.

Broadwater's Riopel, Burrows Both in NCAA Division III Final Four

There are not likely many high schools — at least any the size of Broadwater — that can claim to have two former players in a Final Four in basketball, but that will occur this weekend when Amherst's Michael Riopel and Christopher Newport's Brendon Burrows will have a reunion at the Division III Final Four in Salem. Va.

Amherst defeated Tufts 86-73 Saturday to advance to Friday's semi-final versus Benedictine of Illinois, 30-0. Riopel, the sixth man for Amherst, scored 12 points in 25 minutes of action, hitting 3 of 7 shots from the floor and all but one of his six free-throw attempts.

Averaging over 20 minutes a game, the 6'5" sophomore connected on 48.7 percent of his shots this season, with a 40.9 percentage from beyond the 3-point line. He shoots 82.7 from the foul line.

Amherst advances to its third NCAA Final Four in the last four years and

seventh overall. The Purple and White won national titles in 2007 and 2013.

Christopher Newport is 30-1 with a 21-game winning streak. Burrows started all but one game. Although the 6'4" inch forward plays limited minutes and averages about 2 points a game, CNU coach John Krikorian likes the energy Burrows brings to the team and doesn't want to break up a winning combination.

Burrows also competes in track at CNU, winning the conference championship in the discus as a freshman with a 46.11-meter toss. He also placed seventh in the league in the weight throw and competed in the hammer.

CNU advanced to the Final Four in Salem with an 81-61 win over Wooster in Oswego, N.Y., last Saturday. The Captains will play St. Thomas of Minnesota Friday night in a national semi-final at the Salem Civic Center.

A win by both CNU and Amherst Friday night would set up a championship game on Saturday with Riopel and Burrows, once Broadwater teammates, on opposing teams.

BA's Bloxom Also Advances in Playoffs

Broadwater also had another alumnus go deep into the Division III basketball tournament.

Madison Bloxom, a senior at Christopher Newport University and a 2012 graduate of Broadwater, was a member of the women's CNU team that went to the Sweet 16 and ended the season with a 24-5 record.

Bloxom had planned to play basketball at CNU after scoring more than 1,000 points in her Broadwater

career while also playing volleyball and softball. But she switched sports to star in track and All-Confermade ence in the javelin throw.

Bloxom also has placed in the top 10 in the Capital Athletic Conference in the hammer throw, long jump and triple jump, while also competing in the 200 and weight throw.

After suffering a torn labrum and undergoing an operation following her junior season, Bloxom will likely redshirt for her senior track season with plans to compete as a graduate student next year. She decided to join the basketball team, and although she saw limited time while averaging 1.6 points a game, Bloxom says she has enjoved her time with the team.

Hearing on Northampton County Zoning was Despicable

Dear Editor:

I had the opportunity to attend and speak at the March 9 public hearing on the amendment to the 2009 zoning ordinance.

After a brief presentation by our \$3,000/week county administrator (whose salary and benefits are paid by a poor county with only 12,000 people) who, by the way, has mismanaged this county to the brink of fiscal collapse, Planning Commission Vice Chairman Dixon Leatherbury took on the Board of Supervisors, expressing his frustration that the 2015 zoning ordinance was being challenged. He forgot to mention that his wife, Bev Leatherbury, was a co-author of the new commercial real-estate manifesto, as she is part of the county's legal team who has been on the front lines of this ridiculous scheme.

He is joined by Mike Ward on the commission, another major player on the planning team running the ball toward the 2015 goal post and a major contributor to the pending rewrite of the Comprehensive Plan (and wait 'til you see that!). Mr. Ward never mentions that his wife is in real estate for Coldwell Banker while at the same time he pushes for the 2015 zoning ordinance that will break up Northampton County in a manner similar to commercial development in Virginia Beach and Ocean City (whose real-estate taxes because of that scheme are nearly twice that of Northampton County's).

Next up was a slew of "Yellow Shirts" (except for ousted Supervisor Rick Hubbard, who wore instead a bright yellow sweater) who, while complaining that the supporters of the 2009 zoning ordinance were using "scare tactics and misinformation," waved their arms and stamped their feet, basically arguing that they should be able to do anything and everything they want and to blazes with law and code. "This is America," they yelled! "Bring on the chicken houses, build those condos and high rises on our waterfronts ... don't get in our way! ... We need more tax revenue by commercializing this county!" Note that if they are successful, we will be the first county in America where our taxes go down after we pave over our farmland, stop our rainwater from replenishing our drinking water supplies, and put multiple developments like Royal Farms where our crops once grew.

But what was truly incredible was the number of yellow-dressed real-estate agents who belittled the new board members simply because they were doing what they promised to do (repeal the private-interest-driven 2015 code) when we overwhelmingly elected them last November.

One of the most bizarre attacks on the supervisors was delivered by Pat Coady, who ripped off his yellow shirt (that says Support the 2015 Zoning Ordinance) after attacking our new board member Robert Duer by saying this fine man only cares about Exmore (a wholly unsupported and false claim).

The entire night reminded me of a really bad Monty Python show and was, simply put, a disgusting show of thuggery by the yellow shirts, in complete disregard for the will of the majority of residents (reflected in our current Comprehensive Plan and supporting 2009 ordinance) and thumbing their nose at code and law.

During my speech to the supervisors and planning commissioners (I say the Planning Commission now represents nothing more than a poor joke given their dismal track record), I asked where the yellow shirts were over the last two years when thousands of citizens were working to right the impending wrongs of the expensive and ill-conceived zoning fiasco. And I took the liberty by answering it by saying they remained "sleeping" because they seemed to know that they had the old board in their hip pocket and were guaranteed that the board would ram the new zoning down our throats before they were ousted from their positions last December. Action To Repeal Zoning Changes Was Rash

Dear Editor:

Thank you for your thorough coverage of the debate over Northampton County's "zoning mess." Just when you think it could not get any more absurd, it does.

You wonder how three members of a newly constituted board of supervisors, without public discussion or notice to constituents, could at their first meeting, take it upon themselves to resolve to repeal an entire zoning ordinance enacted by the prior board, after years of study and debate. Their urgency was such (and their preparation so flawed) that they had to be reminded by counsel of the laws governing the timely notice of such actions.

What this panel of three also overlooked was that the reason they gave for their action (conflict of the 2015 ordinance with the Comprehensive Plan) directly contradicted the official position taken by the county just six days earlier. In a lawsuit then pending in the Circuit Court of Northampton County, the complaining party had, like the three supervisors, alleged that the 2015 ordinance violated the Comprehensive Plan. The County roundly denied this allegation, stating, "There is no requirement that a zoning ordinance be consistent with a locality's comprehensive plan, only that it be considered."

Actually, under the law, there are over 20 things "to be considered"; but under Virginia law, none of these are of such pre-eminence as to mandate the repeal of a zoning ordinance. So at the time the panel of three was justifying its unprecedented rush to judgment, they were acting in the teeth of the official position of the county itself.

I have no doubt that fault can be found in both versions of the ordinance, but I can say this: After 40 years of working with laws of every variety, federal, state and local, Northampton's 2009 zoning ordinance falls just short of the IRS Code in obfuscation.
