This site, adjacent to the Parksley train station, is the location for a veterans' war memorial (pictured, front and back). The town joined the family

of the late Cpl. Jerry Burkhead (pictured) to honor those who died in World Wars I and II, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam War, while promoting civic pride. The monument is planned for the center of the site, surrounded by six granite benches commemorating branches of the service and war dead. Anyone can be memorialized for \$100 on bricks that will surround the site. Burkhead, the youngest of 12 children, was born

in Justisville. After graduating from Parksley High School in 1966, he joined the Marine Corps and was deployed to Vietnam from Camp Pendleton in November 1967.

Burkhead was killed in action during the Tet Offensive on Feb. 8, 1968, in Quang Tri, South Vietnam, on Hill 64 near Khe Combat Base. "Remember, American veterans gave their all for us so that we can enjoy the freedoms we have today," said Parksley Mayor Jim Eichelberger. "Please help us honor those who gave so

## **Judge Finds Onley Man Not Guilty of Murder**

It took Circuit Court Judge W. Revell Lewis III 35 minutes of deliberation Tuesday before declaring Robert James (R.J.) Northan Jr., 30, of Daugherty Road in Onley not guilty of first-degree murder.

Lewis dismissed the charges of murder, use of a firearm in a felony and possession of a firearm by a felon. He had thrown out a robbery count earlier in the day.

"There's no question that Ronnie Washington was brutally murdered" in July 2015, the judge said. But, he explained, "Too many inconsistencies cause me to have a reasonable doubt" about Northan being the killer.

An unidentified bicyclist found the body of 47-year-old Washington of Nelsonia on the side of the street at the intersection of Bear Town and Metompkin roads.

Dr. Wendy Gunther, who autopsied Washington, said he had been shot multiple times and had 11 wounds, including one to the face that knocked out teeth, and others to the shoulder, chest and groin. Gunther said nearly

## Shore Records 8th and 9th Traffic Fatalities of the Year

Two traffic fatalities occurred on the Eastern Shore this week.

Christina G. Bowman-Weaver, 43, of the 2900 block of N. Radcliffe Lane in Chesapeake was thrown from the back of a motorcycle Sunday morning in Nassawadox, according to State Police Sgt. Michelle Anaya. The victim was rushed to nearby Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital, where she later died.

The two-vehicle crash occurred at about 11:40 a.m. in a southbound lane of Lankford Highway north of Route 609. A 2000 Ford Focus driven by Irene Boyd, 75, of Bayside Road in Machipongo "made an unsafe lane change,

causing a 2004 Harley-Davidson motorcycle to overturn as it tried to avoid being hit," Anaya said.

The driver of the motorcycle, Travis Levi Godfrey, age and address not available, had non-life-threatening injuries. He and Bowman-Weaver were wearing approved helmets, Anaya reported. Boyd was charged with making an unsafe lane change. She was not injured. Anaya said neither alcohol nor speed was a factor in the incident.

State Police Eastern Shore District Commander 1st Sgt. Ben E. (Jeff) Jeffrey Jones said Trooper Dane Lawson investigated the crash, which was the

half the shots would have killed him. Two bullets were recovered from the body. He also had a \$100 bill, another \$1.03, and a cell phone in his pocket.

The murder weapon, a 9mm Glock, was never recovered. There was no DNA, fingerprint or other physical evidence to link Northan to the crimes.

Eyewitness Derimon (Mac) Hargis said he, Washington and Northan were riding in the car when Hargis pulled over so the other two could get out and urinate. Washington had been sitting in the front passenger seat. Northan had been in the back. Both men got out and went behind the vehicle, Hargis said.

"I seen the first one," the witness said of the shots. "I was scared to death for my life ... I didn't know he (Northan) had the gun on him that night ... he always toted a pistol. Every time I seen him. But I didn't know he had it that night. ... It was some kind of Glock. I don't know what caliber it was." Hargis held his hands about 18 inches apart and said, "I saw fire about this long coming out of it."

"The front door was still open, the back door was closed," said Hargis.

There were "no lights on inside the car," he explained. "I seen him drop back and tried to come forward," Har-

gis said of Washington. "I just ducked and tried to take cover." The witness said he heard four or five more shots. "I'm not entirely sure." After the shots stopped, there was a 20- to 30-second delay before Northan got back in the car and directed Hargis to drive away.

But this wasn't the first story Hargis told police. He first denied knowing anything about the crimes. A police interrogation then yielded many versions before an officer told Hargis he was either the shooter or the witness.

Defense lawyer Tucker Watson contended that Hargis told the story that would pass the blame elsewhere without incriminating himself.

Hargis testified Northan instructed him not to tell anyone what happened that night. "I was scared," Hargis said. "I was terrified, man. I was really scared, man."

Another witness, Harvey (J.J.) Pettit, said he saw the three men drive away from the trailer park, where Hargis lived and he and they were partying that night. They were giving Washington, who had flashed a stack of money and bragged about having plenty to pay his bills and spend, a ride home. Pettit a crack user, said he saw Hargis and Northan come back a short time later.

But Hargis' girlfriend, Christina Huff-

man, an admitted crack addict, said she didn't remember Northan coming back with Hargis. Instead, she claimed she and Hargis picked up Northan at another location she could not identify, before the three of them went to buy crack and go to Ocean City, Md. It was unclear if the two men had money before they left to take Washington home.

Accomack Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney Matthew Brenner noted in closing arguments that Northan told Hargis that Washington was a snitch. While Hargis said he didn't think that was a reason to murder someone, Brenner said it could have been.

"Bad people do bad things to bad people," said Brenner. "So who are you going to have as witnesses? This is beyond a reasonable doubt."

Brenner was irritated when the judge allowed a woman who sat through parts of the trial to testify since other witnesses were separated. "I move for a mistrial," Brenner said. "She cannot testify, judge. This is highly unorthodox."

Lewis denied the motion. Keyontae Boggs of Hopeton testified that Northan showed up at her house at about 2 a.m. and left between 4:30 and 5 a.m. But none of the other witnesses seemed to be able to pinpoint exactly what time anything occurred that night.

eighth traffic fatality in the two-county area in 2016.

The ninth fatality occurred at about 5:45 p.m. Wednesday on Belinda Road south of Marsh Market Road near Sanford, killing a Hallwood man.

Christopher M. Hernandez, 23, of Hallwood was driving a 2006 Chevrolet Colorado west on the dirt portion of Belinda Road when he ran off the road, causing the vehicle to overturn and ejecting the passenger, Joseph Robert Kent, 25, of Sugarhill Lane.

Trooper Dan Wallace responded. Senior Trooper Johnny Godwin led the crash reconstruction at the scene. Speed is believed to be a factor in the crash, which is still being investigated.

Jones said both Hernandez and Kent were not wearing safety belts and were ejected from the vehicle. Hernandez suffered non-life threatening injuries. He was charged with reckless driving. Alcohol was not a factor in the crash.

The Shore recorded seven fatal vehicle accidents in 2015.

## Northampton Schools Issue 7th Highest Number of Suspensions in State

A report released last week by the JustChildren Program of the Legal Aid Justice Center shows that more than 126.000 out-of-school suspensions were given in Virginia to about 70,000 students in the 2014-15 school year. Race and disabilities seemed to be targeted in those figures.

The report states, "A fifth of all suspensions were issued to pre-kinder-

garten and elementary school students; the majority were for relatively minor, non-violent, subjective misbehavior like disruption, defiance, and disrespect; African American students and students with disabilities were suspended at hugely disparate rates; and statewide suspension rates flattened out after years of steady progress."

More than 20 percent of the sus-

pensions were issued to elementary school students, including 16,000 suspensions in pre-kindergarten through third grade. More than 10 percent of ninth graders were suspended at least once.

Figures for Accomack show 480 of 5,258 students, 9.13 percent, were given short-term suspension at least once. Nearly 15 percent of African American students, 6.8 percent of white students,

16.12 percent of students with disabilities and 8.06 percent of students without disabilities were suspended at least once.

In Northampton, about 15.38 percent (255) of 1,651 students were given short-term suspension. Slightly over 23.38 percent of African American students, 8.66 percent of white students, 23.98 percent of students with disabilities and 14.06 percent of students without disabilities were suspended at least once.

There were no figures available in the report regarding what grade the Accomack or Northampton students were in when they were suspended. Fewer than 10 students in each county were given a long-term suspension at least once.

Northampton was among seven divisions in the state where more than 15 percent of all students were suspended at least once. The others were Brunswick County with 22.5 percent, Petersburg City with 20.2 percent, Danville City with 18.3 percent, Mecklenburg County with 16.9 percent, Franklin County with 16.2 percent and Sussex with 15.4 percent.

"Virginia public schools need proven alternatives to harsh disciplinary measures like suspension and expulsion," the report states. "Students who are excluded from school are more likely to experience academic failure, dropping out, mental health problems and justice system involvement. Moreover, schools with high suspension rates generally have ... lower test scores and graduation rates. Worse yet, there is not evidence to suggest that suspension and expulsion deter misconduct or improve school safety."

JustChildren's report also provides information about proven behavioral interventions and alternatives to suspension and expulsion.

"What's so sad is that we know what works," said Jason Langberg, a Just-Children attorney and co-author of the report. "We just haven't had the political will to abandon the failed 'zero tolerance' mentality and to begin providing educators with the resources they need to ensure schools are safe and supportive."

## Accomack Will Ask Northampton To Help Pay for Library

Accomack supervisors agreed last week to ask Northampton County to share in the cost of the new \$5 million Eastern Shore Public Library being planned on Bennett Street in Parksley.

"Northampton's share ... plus a proportionate share of the property cost and architect's fees ... amounts to \$480,847 on a total projected budget of \$4,948,928 or slightly less than 10 percent," Accomack County Administrator Steve

Miner wrote in a letter to Katie Nunez. Northampton's County administrator.

"Though the facility serves local clientele, it also serves as the base of operations for the regional operations serving Northampton libraries and citizens," Miner's wrote, "It will continue to house the regional history room, a true ... asset benefiting the entire Shore, and the new community room."

Northampton's share was calculated on 25 percent of the square footage for material procurement and processing; shipping and receiving; archives and local history collection; storage; public research room; meeting space for education, community groups and programs; and the Internet routing system. That percentage of the library would be nearly 1,890 square feet of the 6,705 square-foot facility.

The cost of the library is estimated at \$264.65 a square foot.

A breakdown shows \$443,619 for new

construction and renovation; \$33,750 for a share of the former Fresh Pride grocery store that was \$135,000; and \$3,478 of the \$13,915 for the conceptual design.

The project will total 18,630 square feet including 12,630 that was the former store.

"We have pledged, but not yet funded, \$2 million towards the project," wrote Miner. "We plan to borrow the funds when they are needed. Overall, the project seems viable and I am personally very optimistic it will be accomplished. Certainly, Northampton's assistance will help ensure the success."

According to library plans, the store "will need to be completely gutted." A renovation list includes replacing flooring, ceilings, lights, the storefront and mechanical and electrical systems; insulating walls to meet energy codes; adding a sprinkler system; and construction of new restrooms.

"Since the facility was constructed before current environmental regulations were enacted, the site will need to be redesigned for proper circulation, added landscaping and adherence to current stormwater management regulations."

## Cape Charles Prepares for Beach Season

Cape Charles Town Council received a report regarding the upcoming harbor-dredging project that may put a damper on the spirits of some beachgoers.

The dredging project that had been scheduled for earlier in the spring may actually occur in June. Approximately 100,000 cubic yards of the dredged sand is to be used to replenish the northern end of the beach. Some council members expressed concern that the timing could have a negative impact on the town during the beginning of the tourist season.

Police Chief James Pruitt discussed the problem of late-night town visitors who create disturbances, particularly at the beachfront. He noted that in one recent incident, officers responded to break up an altercation at a restaurant near the Cape Charles traffic signal. He said some of the individuals then proceeded to the town beach, where officers again encouraged them to leave the area. Pruitt recommended that council consider a curfew for the beach area.

Council members discussed options for curfew times and noted that they do not wish to prevent individuals from using the beach as long as they do so in an appropriate way. Council agreed to revisit the issue at its work session June 2.

Town Treasurer Debbie Pocock presented the proposed FY2017 budget for review. The \$7,974,132 spending package includes \$3,105,600 for capital projects and \$3,723,535 for the General Fund, with a tax rate of 32.60 cents per \$100 of assessed value to equalize the overall tax revenue due to decreased property values based on the recent Northampton assessment. Council agreed to schedule a public hearing for June 9 to hear comments on the proposed budget.


Harbormaster Charlie Farlow reported that the operators of the tall ship Lynx might be interested in homeporting it in Cape Charles. The 120-foot vessel was launched in 2001. Noting that the town would incur no cost, Farlow asked council to express its support to the owners. He added that as the vessel usually spends a portion of its time visiting other ports, it should not pose a problem with regards to dock space for transient vessels that visit the town.

In a final action of the evening, council voted to support the development of a community kitchen at the former middle school in Machipongo.

Students in Grades 10 through 12 will participate in the year-long Ex-MASS Program, immersing them in lunar and asteroid science.

## Chamber Reviews Past, Looks Ahead

The Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce invited past presidents and chairs of major committees to a Leadership Luncheon at the chamber office last week. Jean Hungiville, executive director of the chamber, welcomed the group, noting how much local history has been shaped by the attendees.

Steve Mallette, current president of the chamber, reviewed the chamber's history, starting from 1953 when Charles Russell, George Walter Mapp, Lucius J. Kellam and others created it, with Russell serving as the first president.

That same year, the chamber board advocated construction of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. In 1957 the chamber sponsored 100 local residents for a trip to Richmond supporting the project. Kellam was eventually the leader, overseeing construction of the

the efforts to raise funds for the building today housing the chamber. The chamber also started and managed the Eastern Shore Tourism Commission in that decade.

The chamber also began holding annual Eggs and Issues breakfasts, where elected state and local representatives review the issues that were addressed in the recently concluded General Assembly and others of concern to local boards.

Mallette noted, "Throughout the first six decades, the chamber has been in the forefront of activities affecting planning and zoning, business advocacy, tourism, transportation, education, economic development and the quality of life." Mallette also pointed out that many of the chamber leaders have been second- and third-generation family members associated with the organization.

"A few years ago, after a lot of board discussions, a decision was made to begin transitioning from an events-driven organization and to return to our roots as an organization advocating for greater economic development on the Shore," said Mallette.

"One measure of our success will be an economy that creates opportunities for our children and grandchildren, to have a choice to either remain on the Shore after high school or continue with higher education and return to the Shore ... with career choices that provide greater sustainable wages and salaries."

Added Mallette, "I would suggest we are at a crossroads ... we either must expand our collective efforts as a community for greater economic opportunity or follow the path where we accept that our children and grandchildren would be better off to leave the Shore

where greater opportunities exist for employment."

#### **Foundation Supports Chamber**

In 2012, the Eastern Shore of Virginia Chamber of Commerce Foundation was established to assist business leaders by providing financial, scientific and educational resources to strengthen the area's business economy.

The foundation board includes George Bryan, John Custis, Jeffrey Holland, Brian Laird and Jean Hungiville, ex-officio.

Holland explained to the group that the Eastern Shore of Virginia Chamber of Commerce Foundation is the charitable arm of the chamber.

Under IRS rules, the foundation can support local businesses through education and scientific funding. Holland said in education, the foundation will be supporting special classes at the Eastern Shore Community College, educational symposiums and competitive internships.

In the scientific area, the foundation has studied the customer base, demographics and business trends of the Shore.

Since 2015, the most of the funds for the foundation have been derived from the sale of Eastern Shore license plates, conceived and designed by the chamber.

Holland said plans include business seminars on website development, marketing, integration of federal and large company procurement, Affordable Healthcare Act compliance for business, leadership seminars for businesses and how to leverage Google for local businesses.

The foundation also will seek funding through private donations, endowments and possible grants.

## **Hot-Fire Rocket Test Slated for Tuesday**


NASA's Wallops Flight Facility will provide launch range support for an Orbital ATK Antares 230 rocket first-stage test scheduled for May 31 at the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport's Pad-0A.

The window for the engine test, or hot fire, is 5 to 8:15 p.m. Backup test dates run through June 5. Completion of the test will be noted on the Wallops' Facebook and Twitter sites.

During the test, the upgraded An-

tares dual RD-181 rocket engines will fire for 30 seconds at 100 percent power (thrust) while the first stage of the test rocket will be held on the pad. The hot fire will demonstrate the readiness of the rocket's first stage and the launch pad fueling systems to support flights.

The test will be visible and audible in the Wallops Island area. Given the broad window and non-operational nature of the test, no live webcast or formal public viewing is planned.



The Broadwater boys' and girls' teams both won state track titles in Division 2 in the Virginia Independent Schools Athletic Association last Saturday in Richmond. It was the first time in the 50-year history of the VISAA State Track and Field Meet that one school won both the boys' and girls' championships in the same year.

## Broadwater Wins Boys', Girls' VISAA State Track Titles

Broadwater won both the boys' and girls' state track titles in Virginia Independent Schools Athletic Association Division 2 at Richmond last Saturday. It was the first time in the 50-year history of the VISAA State Track and Field Meet that one school won both the boys' and girls' championships in the same year.

The Viking squads were actually co-champions, with the boys amassing 102 points, the same as Peninsula Catholic High School, beating out 13 other squads. The girls tied Walsingham Academy with 112.33 points, besting 15 other Division 2 schools.

"We knew coming in that we would have to execute on a level we had not all season, and we did just that. Every single one of our athletes committed to filling their role and we overperformed in nearly every event," said Broadwater head coach Eric Hack. "Pre-meet projections put the boys in third position and girls in second, both teams nearly 20 points off the leaders. We were certainly underdogs coming in. The boys and girls have trained side-by-side all year, and we weren't going to settle. They knew what they needed to do at the meet, gave tremendous support to each other, and made history. This is a tremendously talented, committed, and smart group of young men and women. Every point every third of a point in the girls' case — was needed for these victories. I have

never attended a more exciting track meet. The score updates given after each event caused a hush in the crowd unlike anything any of the coaches have ever been a part of. The meet truly was not decided until the very last few meters of the very last event," added Hack.

Boys' team captain Taylor Major was named the meet's outstanding field event performer. He won both the long jump (20-3) and shot put (46-3), placed third in discus (128-0) and triple jump (39-50, and tied for seventh in high jump.

In addition to Major's accomplishments, state champion performances include those of Kate Gomer, Sophie Watson and Carly Wardius, who all tied for first in the pole vault (6-0). Major Morgan won the boys' high jump (5-10) for the second straight year. Sophie Watson was champion in the 800-meter run (2:36.4) and Ryan Bess in the boys' pole vault (10-0).

The girls' 4x800m relay team of Sydney Parks, Kate Gomer, Carly Wardius, and Sophie Watson (10:52.3) won Broadwater's first ever state championship in a relay event — accomplishing the goal stated by distance coach Eva Noonan on day one of practice. Noonan, an accomplished marathoner who has competed at Boston, has forged the Broadwater distance cohort into a formidable component of the Broadwater championship squads.

Watson, only a Grade 8 student,

earned All-State honors in three events and All-State honorable mention for her third place performance in the 3200-meter race (12:30.2). Broadwater also picked up essential points in the 3200-meter run from Sydney Parks and in the boys' 4x800m relay consisting of Robby Parker, Sawyer Coulbourne, Joey Creed, and Adam Buell (9:21.7).

"We witnessed tremendous leadership and performances from our topranked athletes," said Hack, "but we also had standout performances from our younger and less experienced athletes. They are the unsung heroes of the meet. Every point was absolutely essential."

In addition to his high-jump title, Morgan also placed third in the long jump (19-11.5) and fourth in the triple jump (38-9) and scored as part of the third-place 4x100 relay and 4x400 relay teams. Bowdie Arvidson was second in the pole vault (9-6). Dontae Weatherly placed third in the shot put (44-7). Tyler Major was fourth in the high jump (5-4).

For the Viking girls, Lauren Mc-Claskey was second in the 100-meter hurdles (19.16), third in the long jump (14-8.25) and fourth in the triple jump (29-0). Cardy Wardius was also third in the long jump (12-2.5). Anna Sexauer was third in the shot put (28-4.25).

In addition to Hack and Noonan, the Viking track teams are coached by Marisa Nairn, a fourth-grade teacher at Broadwater and former high-school track standout who works primarily with the sprinters and relay teams; and Robert "Gus" Gustafson, Broadwater parent and former captain of the Harvard University track and field team who works primarily with field events.

## VMRC Votes to Keep Cobia Fishing Open Through August

In addition to the improved weather, the good news for local anglers is the 5-4 vote by the Virginia Marine Resources Commission to keep the state's cobia season open until Aug. 30.

Federal fishery managers had requested that states adopt closures on cobia catches following a banner year in 2015 when anglers landed well over the Allowable Catch Limit.

Virginia's new regulations, which will go into effect June 1, were met with mixed emotions.

In Virginia waters inside of three miles from the coast, anglers will have a one-fish-per-person limit, up to a two-fish maximum per boat. Fish must be at least 40 inches long and only one can top 50 inches.

In an effort to lower fish mortality for catch-and-release action, gaffing no longer will be permitted. Some form of mandatory reporting will be put in place.

Dr. Julie Ball says the drum bite is good on the Eastern Shore side of the bay when they can get out. Boats are reporting good catches of big red drum from the breakers and sloughs off the Eastern Shore barrier islands, especially with the recent full moon.

Reds are also mixing in with some black drum among the shoals off Fisherman's Island, Nautilus Shoal and the 9-Foot Shoal areas in anywhere from 10 to 25 feet of water. Black drum is not red hot, and most fish are small, but a few blacks are pushing to over 50 inches recently. Blacks continue to come from the bayside of the Eastern Shore near buoys 10, 13 and 16, where sea clams and chowder clams are working best.

Flounder action is still picking up, but there is room for improvement in the lower bay. Folks are catching fish at the bridge-tunnel this week, but most of the action is still coming from the more protected areas.

On the Eastern Shore, the flounder action out of Oyster is still good, with strips of squid and Gulp baits working best in Sand Shoal Inlet lately.




