Chincoteague's Pony Express

Thousands of fans congregated in the blazing heat Wednesday to watch the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company uphold a 91-year-old tradition called the Pony Swim.

A herd of 200 ponies was rounded up by the Saltwater Cowboys and driven into Assateague Channel, where the horses swam to Chincoteague Island, arriving at about 10:30 a.m. An audience of about 30,000 people watched as the ponies were herded down Main Street to be corralled on the carnival grounds until some of them were to be auctioned Thursday, and the rest would swim back to Assateague on Friday.

Following tradition, the first pony ashore, a chest-

Local Gathering Addresses Police-Race Relations

News accounts of violence across the nation sparked concern about race relations between Eastern Shore residents and local police agencies.

A panel of officers from Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) and State Police answered questions from about 30 local folks at a church in Belle Haven last Friday to dispel anxiety and promote the cops as being protectors rather than the bad guys.

Both sides said they fear what could occur at a traffic stop. The driver is afraid he or she may get a ticket, that the person in the unmarked car with the blue light is not really an officer and that the treatment might not be fair. Meanwhile, the officer fears what he or she may face approaching the vehicle. That dread rises when there are numerous passengers.

The officers also reported that the Bloods street gang, and heroin abuse are the worst problems on the Shore and the real threat. "The days of getting in a fist fight are over," Sheriff Todd Godwin said.

When signaled to pull over, a driver's hands should go to the top of the steering wheel so the officer can see them, State Police 1st Sgt. Jeff Jones said. If the stop happens at night, the driver also should turn on the overhead light inside the vehicle.

Norman Wells of Onley said he is originally from Philadelphia, where there is a reason to worry about law enforcement. "Here is different ... it is peaceful ... yes, it has changed ... and I know how to handle this," he said of the traffic stop. "But sometimes when I go out, I'm afraid."

"About being afraid," said Jones. "So am I; it's not a good place to be at all."

Capt. Todd Wessells of ACSO reported, "Eighty-five percent (of deputies) are involved in our communities ... through high-school sports, booster clubs, parks and rec. ... The deputies know these young kids growing up. They respect us because we wear a uniform, because we treat them right. Being from the Eastern Shore, we are unique ... it is God's country."

The forum was set up by Laskishia Banister and Rev. David Sabatino of the Foundation of Faith Worship Center, where the event took place. "We all know improvements can be made ... throughout America. It is our duty to take action now. We are destroying

ourselves," Banister said. "This is not a time to say this is none of our business because it is not happening here."

People are worried about what they are seeing on television and reading in the papers and on social media, participants in the crowd repeated over and over. Some, including the officers, blamed the problems on the media. All agreed the meeting was like "preaching to the choir" since all who were present are upstanding. They also agreed all races need to be reached and taught respect at a young age.

On the Shore, "people get to know you and trust you," Sgt. Anthony Bright, an investigator with ACSO said. "There is a code of the neighborhood that you don't speak to law enforcement or you'll get la-

beled a snitch," so not everyone he knows will greet him in public. "I'm a black male who grew up here all my life ... had a little red Nissan. I got one ticket and it came from this man right here," he said pointing to his boss, Sheriff Godwin.

Godwin seemed surprised. "I don't even remember. Man, I'm sorry," he added, putting his head in his hands.

On a more serious note, Bright continued, "It's not easy being in law enforcement. I've been assaulted one time and I go into all those bad neighborhoods. One thing that concerns me, there are blacks killing blacks on the Eastern Shore. ... People are afraid ... what we have to do is try to take back our communities, educate these younger black men. ... We need to try to gain control."

Tangier Designated 8th Oyster Region in Commonwealth

"This addition will allow travelers to experience the region in a new way by exploring its rich waterman heritage and history, tasting delicious oysters, and experiencing a part of Virginia that is truly unlike any other."

The Tangier/Middle Bay Region joins seven other oyster regions to form the Virginia Oyster Trail, a public-private

together to brand the Virginia oyster travel experience. These regions produce the largest quantity of fresh wildcaught and farm-raised oysters in the United States and each region produces oysters with distinct flavors, ranging in salinity, creaminess and sweetness.

"This new designation of the Tangier/Middle Bay region is a critical step to further bolster and support Virginia's robust oyster industry," said Haymore. "Today's oyster industry is booming and performing better than it has in nearly a generation, with a dockside value of nearly \$34 million last year, which is a 52 percent increase from 2013. This is in no small part due to the tireless hard work, dedication, and passion exhibited by our watermen and oyster farmers. Thanks to our industry in the Tangier/Middle Bay Region — and all of our oyster regions we can say definitively that Virginia is for oyster lovers."

Accomack Circuit Court

A Bloxom man pleaded guilty last week in Accomack Circuit Court to maliciously maiming a Greenbush resident, according to court documents.

Larry Thomas Bailey, 56, of Nelsonia Road used a machete or a lawn mower blade on Sherwood Bailey of Adams Road in Greenbush on Aug. 23, 2015. It was unclear from records if the two are related.

Larry Bailey was released on existing bond until a presentence report could be completed.

Autopsies Confirm Murder/Suicide

Autopsy results for an Accomack couple confirmed police suspicions Monday that their deaths were caused by a murder/suicide.

Elizabeth Madison Ann Jensen, 20, of Sanford died of gunshot wounds to the head and torso, according to a spokesperson for the Norfolk Medical Examiner's office. The manner of her death was homicide. Jonan Faricio Gonzales-Funes died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

The two bodies were found in a vehicle parked at the old ferry dock near Mappsville on July 16. The couple's 6-month-old child was also in the vehicle and is in good health.

The child was turned over to family members.

Tunnel Vision: Construction Starts in '17

The Chesapeake Bay Bridge and Tunnel Commission has awarded the Dragados Team a contract to construct a new parallel tunnel at the Thimble Shoal Channel.

This award marks the end of a 3.5-year project development and procurement process that leveraged a lowest price, technically acceptable acquisition strategy. The Dragados Team, a ioint venture composed of Dragados USA, Inc. and Schiavone Construction Company, LLC, submitted the lowest price proposal at \$755,987,318.

The Dragados Team's proposal includes a bored tunnel; construction will begin on Island 1 in the fall of 2017. Total construction of the tunnel is expected to take approximately five years.

According to commission Chairman Frederick Stant, "This has been a well-managed project with a thoroughly competitive procurement. We look forward to working with the Dragados Team for the successful construction of this critical infrastructure."

Dragados USA, Inc. is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Dragados, one of the construction arms of the ACS Group. Operating in 68 countries, ACS was ranked #1 on the 2015 Engineering News Record Top International Contractors List.

Dragados has built over 900 miles of tunnels, 5,300 miles of highways, and 1,500 bridges. Dragados USA works on major tunnel, infrastructure, and dam construction projects, including the East Side Access Caverns and Tunnels in New York City: the I-595 Corridor Roadway Improvements Project in Broward County, Fla; the Portsmouth Bypass in Ohio; the SR99 Bored Tunnel Project in Seattle, Wash.; and the Calaveras Dam in San Francisco, Calif.

Schiavone Construction, also a Dragados company, has major contracts in construction, repair, replacement, and reconstruction of tunnels for rail and mass transit systems, including the East Side Access. Second Avenue Subway, and No.7 Subway Extension projects in New York, as well as bridges and highways, deep foundations, treatment plants and marine work.

Final Procurement Phase

On May 27, the commission invited each of the three teams that had submitted fully-compliant proposals by the original due date of April 29 to submit revised proposals for a re-scoped project. All of the original price proposals exceeded the cost estimate.

The re-scoping was focused solely on reducing or eliminating non-critical elements of the project without compromising the safety factors or maintenance life cycle priorities that are specified in the technical requirements of the Request for Proposal documents.

The conceptual design initially included the widening of the manmade islands 250 feet to the west to provide physical space for either an immersed tunnel or bored tunnel to transition to the existing trestle alignment.

According to Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel Executive Director Jeff Holland, "The project was originally envisioned with a substantial expansion of the portal islands. As such, the expanded southern island would have created space for the future public amenities at little additional cost. When all of the teams ... focused on reducing cost, it became apparent that island expansion could be very limited or non-existent. As a result, the ... space sizing for the ... restaurant, retail shop and 200 additional parking spots ... became cost prohibitive and not necessary. This scope change, combined with others, allowed the commission to substantially reduce the cost of the project by nearly \$260 million."

The fishing pier at Island 1 will be renovated during construction and will re-open to the public in 2022, upon completion of the project.

Tunnel Construction

The project will begin on Island 1 with construction of a large pit. The Tunnel Boring Machine (TBM) will be delivered in several large pieces and assembled in the bottom of the pit.

The TBM will excavate and build the tunnel as the machine progresses from Island 1 to Island 2. Removed soil will be conveyed back to Island 1 for disposal. At the same time, new precast concrete tunnel segments will be delivered to the TBM, which will precisely place them as it progresses. After the TBM reaches Island 2, the machine will be disassembled and removed from the site.

After the tunnel liner is installed, construction crews will install the final roadway, lighting, and mechanical systems.

2 Candidates Vie for School Board Seat

Two men asked to be appointed to the vacant District 7 seat on the Accomack School Board earlier this month. Just after press time Thursday, Selection Commission members were meeting to decide if they would pick retired 30-year educator George Waldenmaier or former Planning Commissioner Dave Vaughn.

"I feel like I'm not finished yet," said Waldenmaier, who taught science and was a middle-school administrator. He wants to mend the rift between the county Board of Supervisors and the School Board and re-establish the credibility of the school system.

"I think scientifically," he said. "I have strict rules of ethics. I can't just say something because it sounds good ... not just a sales pitch. You can expect this from me." Waldenmaier said, adding, that he would ask questions and require evidence.

"It's a great responsibility in my view," he continued. "You're dealing with other people's children and other people's money." He said he would treat both with "caution and respect."

Among those speaking on his behalf were his former principal, John Killmon of Nandua Middle School, who attributed the increase in test scores at his facility to Waldenmaier following a five-year benchmark gap.

Harold Holmes, most recently assistant principal at Chincoteague High School, said he worked with Waldenmaier for all but a year of his tenure. He described the candidate as dedicated, with sound judgment, a level head and "extreme knowledge of school issues at a national and local level."

Vaughn named numerous job experiences, including nursing, social work and lawn care. "Of all the

jobs I've done, I wanted to make sure the service got done," he said, describing himself as a hard worker, independent thinker and very loyal team player who knows how to negotiate and compromise.

Vaughn taught young children at his church for 25 years and has "always believed strongly in education."

No one spoke on Vaughn's behalf and he seemed to shift support to Waldenmaier after a Bloxom woman told of her dismay with Waldenmaier. "No one in this room is perfect," said Vaughn. "I've known George for 25 years or so. I've had good dealings with him. I think highly of him."

He was referring to Connie Burford's comments. She opposed the appointment of Waldenmaier, saying that while he may have been a good teacher, "I have problems with him as an administrator ... he cannot function on the School Board."

She complained that Waldenmaier berated and accused a middle-school child of stealing when she went back for a carton of milk that she had forgotten. She said that another time, Waldenmaier was going to make two children who owed for lunches pay off their bill by working in front of other students. "We do not deny children food," Burford said.

In another incident, she said a student was sent to detention for losing his pencil. Waldenmaier had meant to send the student there for the rest of the class, but forgot about it and left him there for the whole day.

"We're in the education business," said Burford.
"Why would you not give him a pencil? What is so difficult about a pencil?" Burford explained that the boy had lost it when another student accidentally knocked items out of his hand in the hallway just be-

fore the class started.

After the commission meeting, District 9 representative Milton Bunting cleared up any misunderstanding about where he lives. He explained that his farm business is in Savageville (District 8), but his Pungoteague home street address, which is in District 9, has been added to the school division website.

In June, the commission voted not to return Janet Turner of Accomac to the School Board. The panel gave no reason for its decision. Turner was not opposed.

Onley Fire & Rescue Company Offers Plan for Its Survival

Working at a reduced capacity, being more aggressive in collecting bills for services, and selling some equipment will allow Onley Volunteer Fire & Rescue (OVFR) to continue to save lives and structures, Fire Chief and President Chris Davis said Monday.

With those adjustments, the company won't close its doors on Aug. 1, a possibility that Davis suggested to Onley's mayor and town council at a meeting last month.

But the chief is still hoping the town will make repairs to the firehouse and use the 1,000-square-foot east-side apparatus bays for a town meeting hall. Those repairs and alterations were estimated to

cost between \$300,000 and \$400,000 and include a new \$70,000 roof.

Town officials have said they want to erect a new facility, but nothing has materialized. At a recent meeting, Councilman Matt Hart complained that holding sessions in the VFW hall, where smoking is allowed during bingo games, is a health hazard.

"I met with the mayor and he told me" the town will not be able to help the company with its manpower issues as requested, Davis said. He asked for the town to hire two full-time fire/medics or four to six part-time ones to cover daytime hours on weekdays. "We believe that we can reliably staff the nights and the weekend timeframes" from 5 p.m. to 9 a.m. weekdays and 24 hours on weekends and holidays, he wrote in a plan he submitted to town officials.

Since the town will not be helping, Davis said the plan is for volunteer fire/medics to work nights, weekends and holidays and allow other nearby companies and the Department of Public Safety to take the day hours during the week. That move, he said, would likely increase response time.

In addition, OVFR hired a billing company that will collect to the point of taking debtors to court. "I'd love to give everybody a free service," he said, adding that it's not feasible. "Last year there were \$250,000 that people didn't pay. ... It's still going to be a battle because the daytime

billing keeps us alive. We're doing what we have to do and making the effort."

OVFD also is going to sell an ambulance for \$112,000 to Oak Hall. A firetruck will go to Pennsylvania and serve as a training vehicle. That will reduce the company's debt to \$80,000, which Davis expects to be paid off in three years. "Other than that, we will be debt free, which would be nice," he said.

"It's just a matter of getting through a very rough season," Davis said. "Our goal is obviously to build our staff ... but people work during the day." In recent times, three certified people who have just moved to the area or will soon more here have joined the department. Several others are being trained.

Cape Charles Considers Ways To Improve Its Harbor

Cape Charles Town Council reviewed options last week for improving the safety of the inner harbor.

Over the past several years, the town has constructed three offshore breakwaters to slow waves that enter the harbor from the west. The long-term goal was to have five offshore breakwaters providing protection from all directions. The town now faces the options of building a fourth breakwater as well as making improvements to the existing jetty, just making improvements to the jetty, or building the fourth breakwater without improvements to the jetty.

Council agreed to improve the jetty to help prevent beach sand from washing through the rocks and into the harbor. The 600-foot-long jetty will be raised by two feet. The estimate for the work is \$300,000. Funding for the project will come from an Aid to Local

Ports grant and local funds.

A second harbor improvement may come as a result of a request by Cape Charles Yacht Center to change the zoning for a property on the south side of the harbor from Harbor District to Industrial District. The Yacht Center plans to make improvements to the property to add a rigging facility, more yacht storage areas and a bulk storage area.

Council agreed to set a public hearing for the zoning application as well as other changes requested by the Yacht Center. If the changes are approved and improvements made, the Yacht Center's property will extend to Bayshore Concrete.

Mayor George Proto noted that the proposed improvements will offer additional jobs as well as more opportunities to improve the facilities within the harbor.

A request by Kathleen Glaser to add a pool to her property at 530 Randolph Ave. was granted. Glaser plans to use the property as a bed and breakfast.

Council voted to re-elect Chris Bannon as vice mayor for the next two vears.

Randy Custis Memorial Fund Executive Director Roger Eitelman told council that the park wants to add lights to the girls' softball field as well as other amenities. Estimates to add the lighting run as high as \$100,000. He asked council to donate \$5,000 a year for the next two years. Similar requests have been made to other towns.

Proto read a summary of recommended changes to the anchorage for coal colliers in the lower Chesapeake Bay. The Coast Guard is proposing a new anchorage in the bay west of Cape Charles, extending north from York Spit Channel Buoy 30 to Buoy 38, south to an area just west of Plantation Light, and west from that point to Buoy 30, making an elongated triangle.

The Coast Guard wants to hold a public informational session in or near Cape Charles to discuss the issue. No date has been set for the proposed session.





Waiting For Their Ships To Come In

Representatives from Coast Guard Sector Hampton Roads recently conducted an informational session with respect to designating a commercial ship anchorage just west of Cape Charles Harbor.

The session, conducted at Eastern Shore Community College, was sparsely attended. Nevertheless, Deputy Sector Commander Capt. Kevin Carroll, and Lt. Cmdr. Barbara Wilk provided a detailed review of where the anchorage would be located as well as why it is being considered for the ships, most of which would likely be colliers (coal ships).

While ships have been anchoring off Cape Charles for a number of years, an officially designated anchorage would be more closely regulated and could offer economic opportunities for the town.

The site would extend from York Spit Channel Buoy 30, northeast to Buoy 38, then southeast to Cherrystone Channel Light 2C (just north of Kiptopeke), and then west back to Buoy 30. An alternative anchorage could extend farther north. The site could hold as many as two dozen ships, more if the anchorage site is enlarged to the north.

Carroll said the Coast Guard hopes to receive more comments on the proposal. He noted that one of the main reasons the anchorage is being considered is that the Navy has security concerns over having large numbers of foreign vessels anchored for extended periods in an area where they do training (near Ft. Story and Lynnhaven Inlet) and where high-value assets transit. A second reason is that the Lynnhaven anchorage is in close proximity to the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, which poses problems should one or more ships drag anchor and strike the bridge.

While it is unlikely that any of the crewmembers would be allowed to disembark from an anchored vessel and visit the town, there would be an opportunity for Cape Charles businesses to sell and deliver products to the ships.

Carroll said the Coast Guard would like to conduct a similar session in or near Cape Charles so more individuals could take part in the discussion.

NOTICE OF MEETING AND PUBLIC HEARING

Pursuant to Va. Code Section 15.2-2204, notice is hereby given that the Town of Painter Town Council, during its regular monthly meeting, and the Town of Painter Planning Commission, during a special meeting of such Commission, will hold a joint public hearing on the matters specified below on Monday, August 8, 2016, at 7:30 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the agenda permits at the Painter Fire Hall, adjacent to the Town Office at 17118 Wayside Drive, Painter VA 23420.

The matters to be considered at the public hearing are generally described as proposed amendments to the town subdivision ordinance and to the town zoning ordinance to comply with recommendations of federal and state authorities related to Chesapeake Bay preservation.

The proposed amendments to the subdivision ordinance are as follows:

- (1) In Section 3-3.B, changing the reference to "Section 62.1-13.2" to "Section 62.1-44.15:72," and adding a sentence at the end of the paragraph requiring that any building or clearing within the Resource Protection Area (RPA) is limited to water dependent facilities or redevelopment.
- (2) In Section 4-3.G, adding a sentence at the end of the paragraph requiring any disturbance or clearing in the RPA must receive additional review and approval by the Town.
- (3) In Section 4-3.J, adding a sentence requiring that any plat for land in the RPA or the Resource Management Area (RMA) contain a notation advising that on-site septic systems must be pumped every 5 years.
- (4) In Section 6-1, adding definitions at the end of the section for "RPA" and "RMA."

The proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance are as follows:

- (1) In Sections II-15, II-56, II-57, III-6.3, and III-6.6.A, updating references to the Code of Virginia and/or the Virginia Administrative Code to conform the zoning ordinance to corresponding renumbering or recodifications of the respective state code sections.
- (2) Updated zoning map, Chesapeake Bay Preservation Area, and lot requirement figure representations, to reflect all changes to date, including a most recent federal determination of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Boundary.
- (3) Renumbering Section III-6.12.C.4 to "Section III-6.12.C.3" (correction of a prior scrivener's error).
- (4) Correcting another scrivener's error by renumbering the paragraphs of Section III-6.15 from "A," "B," "C," "C," and "D" to "A," "B," "C," "D," and "E," respectively.
- (5) Adding a sentence at the end of the newly renumbered paragraph E of Section III-6.15 that reads, "Exceptions to §III-6.12.B may be made provided that the findings noted in §III-6.15.C are made."
- (6) In Section XII-3.A, adding a provision requiring that any plat for development of land in the RPA or in the RMA contain notations advising that on-site septic systems must be pumped every 5 years, and that any land or water disturbance in the RPA must receive additional review and approval by the Town.

Following the public hearing, the Planning Commission may provide its recommendations to the Town Council, and the Town Council may act upon the proposals and recommendations without further notice. A copy of the proposed amendments may be inspected at the Town Office, address aforesaid, prior to the public hearing.



nut colt, was named "King Neptune" and will be claimed by the raffle winner drawn later at the Chincoteague carnival grounds.

About 60 to 70 foals were expected to be auctioned off Thursday. Last year, a record \$169,000 was raised by the fire company, according the Chincoteague Chamber of Commerce. This year is expected to net even more. The profits from one of the buy-back foals will be donated to the Special Olympics of Virginia's Eastern Shore.

Pony penning dates back to 1925, when Chincoteague suffered a series of devastating fires. Since then, "hoss penning," as the locals fondly call it, has become the iconic event that it is today.

It is a tradition not only for the town of Chincoteague, but for families as well. Skyler Moore, of Gaston, N.C., says, "It is a tradition for my family to come every year and be a part of Pony Penning. My favorite part is the auction. I love being able to help out and seeing all of the foals." Moore explains that her father rides, and she has been coming to Pony Penning as long as she can remember.

Following Thursday's auction, the remaining herd will swim back to Assateague Island at slack tide Friday to rest up for the 92nd Annual Chincoteague Pony Penning, to be held during the last week of July 2017.



Fours years ago when I joined the Eastern Shore Post after a long career at the Eastern Shore News, I returned to being a sports writer, the position that launched my journalistic career.

As a newspaper reader who has turned to the sports pages first his entire life and as a TV viewer who can recall his wonder of the advent of ESPN, covering sports seemed like taking money for something I enjoyed doing. The Post did not have a sports section before I arrived, so it was easy to raise the bar on sports coverage in this paper. Whether or not you are a hardcore sports fan, I hoped you found something within these pages the past fours years you enjoyed.

I know I enjoyed trying to find the stories that would lure you into these pages week after week.

Although I won't have a pad in my hand or a camera hanging from my neck, you will probably see me at a game or two as I check in on our local athletes.

I won't have the best seat in the house anymore, but then I won't have to write the story after the game.

And, yet, I will miss that too. Farewell, my friends.

Onancock Museum Tells Story of Eastern Shore Watermen

"There is nothing in the world I enjoy more than operating a crab scraper. And I mean nothing," Paul Ewell adds for emphasis, pointing to an old crab scraper on display in the Eastern Shore Watermen's Museum and Research Center at the Historic Onancock School.

Ewell is the executive director of the Watermen's Heritage Foundation of Virginia's Eastern Shore, the 501-c organization that runs the museum. Ewell drives from Virginia Beach with his wife, Sandra, the treasurer of the foundation, each Saturday to open the museum and welcome visitors from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The museum also is open 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Thursdays and by appointment.

Located a short walk from the Onancock Wharf and Marina and helping to attract boaters on weekends, the museum seeks to preserve the maritime history of Virginia's Eastern Shore and encourage the future for local watermen.

Ewell is a unique dichotomy, a native Eastern Shoreman who loves working on the water and also enjoys the academic world, teaching management and logistics at Virginia Wesleyan College in Virginia Beach.

"I grew up working with my father on the water on Hunting Creek outside Parksley and loved it," Ewell recalls. "I was a good student, but I had no plans to go to college until a teacher convinced me by saying, 'Paul, wouldn't you rather work on the water when you want to and the way you want to? Going to college will help you do that."

Ewell, 50, eventually earned a doctorate and has been on the Virginia Wesleyan College faculty for nine years, now serving as chairman of the MBA program for Management, Business and Economics. Sandra is an adjunct member of the VWC faculty and the interim assistant to the vice president for advancement.

But until two years ago, Paul worked summers on his older brother's crab boat, rising early in the morning and shaking crabs from as many as 350 crab pots under a hot sun. His brother passed away from cancer in 2014. However, Ewell keeps all his commercial licenses up to date.

As much as he loves working on the water, Ewell is just as happy archiving and researching the maritime history of Virginia's Eastern Shore. "We have 45,000 digitized photos that we use in a continuous slide show that changes often," says Ewell.

Many of the photographs also are displayed throughout the museum, along with tools of the watermen, boat models and other relics from the past.

Admission is free. "We don't charge for anything," says Ewell. "There is no membership fee. We just want to show the heritage of the working watermen and promote the industry. It's a labor of love for us. Maryland and the western side of the Chesapeake Bay have done a great job of documenting their watermen's history. The Eastern Shore of Vir-

ginia hasn't done all that much. Most of the early skipjacks worked on the Eastern Shore of Virginia, but when Virginia started to allow engines to be used in vessels to dredge oysters, there was no longer a need for skipjacks in Virginia, so they were sold to folks in Maryland. In fact, my great uncle actually moved to Smith Island with his skipjack and married a woman there."

Now over 90 years old and abandoned as a schoolhouse more than 30 years ago, the Historic Onancock School has been converted to a community and cultural center. In addition to the maritime museum, the school houses workshops of several artisans and craftspeople, including decoy carvers, jewelry makers and potters. The school also serves as a meeting place for a chess club, robotics group, master gardeners, table tennis players, the county band and other groups.

Ewell and his wife still maintain a home in Justisville outside of Parksley and spend weekends there after commuting from Virginia Beach. Ewell's family dates back to 1639 on Virginia's Eastern Shore, when an ancestor settled and named a town Guilford after his birthplace in England.

Ewell says many academicians frown on Facebook, but he finds it a useful tool for collecting data for the



museum. "I get a lot of great information from Facebook," he notes. "I will put a photo out there and get all kinds of responses that help me. If anyone has a shoebox of photos in the attic that relate to the working waterman either bayside or seaside, I can scan them and return them the same day."

In addition to his work at the museum, Ewell has recently co-founded with his wife WAVE, Inc., Waterman of Virginia Engaged, a lobby group working to support, market and organize the commercial fishing industry in Virginia. "It's a mission to unite watermen from all of Virginia into one cohesive group that will provide a solid voice for the waterman," says Ewell, who, despite his advanced degrees, has never strayed far from his roots as the son of a waterman.

Flounder Finally Showing at Folly, Wachapreague

Ron Greaser of Don's Tackle Shop in Wachpapreague says anglers are finding a decent flounder bite on the last two hours of the incoming tide just inside the inlets of Folly Creek and Wachapreague.

Tarpon are plentiful from Quinby to Oyster in the backwaters. Most fish are hooked with live bait under floats. One 75-inch fish was released last week.

Ocean fishing on the hills has slowed, says Greaser. The tuna that were being taken on the inshore hills have gone north. One Ocean City boat did get seven yellowfins on Lumpy Bottom this week. The 20-fathom line area has its share of dolphin. Wreck and reef fishing is holding up for flounder and spadefish around the buoys.

Bayside fishing is slow, says Geaser, waiting for the arrival of bull red drum off Bayford and the reefs. Spanish mackerel have shown up outside the Range Tower out of Occohannock Creek. Look for tide lines for these speedsters and troll small spoons with

4- to 6-ounce weights and #1 or #2 planers. Greaser says to run at about 7 mph, if you are catching bluefish speed up just a little for the Spanish.

Sight cast for cobia is still good around Latimer Shoal and the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. These pilings also are producing good numbers of spadefish and sheepshead. Flounder also have started showing up around the pilings and over the tubes of the CBBT.

Chris of Chris' Bait and Tackle at Capeville says flounder are being caught at the high rise and fourth island. Spadefish can be found there as well as at Plantation Light.

Croaker are at the Chimney out of Oyster and at the concrete ships. Sea mullet can be found at Latimer Shoals

Chris says cobia are at the 16, 13 and 36 buoys. She adds that red drum can be found at Latimer Shoals

Dr. Julie Ball says the flounder action in the bay is still productive, with some respectable flatfish to show. Good

action is still coming from near shore and inshore wrecks, where anglers are cleaning up with limits of nice fish averaging from 22 to 24 inches. Some keeper seabass also will take offerings on these same wrecks. For the bay flounder hotspots, jigging and live bait are most effective right now, with both techniques working around all four islands of the CBBT, with the average flattie averaging around 20 to 22 inches.

Ball says the word on the tarpon scene on the Eastern Shore is that it is good. Plenty of silver kings are being sighted, with some hook-ups, jump-offs, and released fish reported recently.

Offshore, billfish encounters are still on the rise. White marlin, with scattered blue marlin, are honoring boats with several flags flying this week. Yellowfin tuna are still around, with some fish pushing to around 60 pounds hitting the docks lately, along with some huge bigeye tuna. Big gaffer mahi are coming on strong, with some massive fish weighing in at over 40 pounds boated this week.



Guess it's to be expected, because today marks my last issue of the Eastern Shore Post as its editor.

It's been 16½ years now since Candy Farlow and I began the Post, and I know I can speak for her when I say that it has surpassed our most ambitious dreams.

I well remember that first edition of June 2, 1999. Producing it was just about as laborious as birthing our babies, and we probably were equally as naïve about what to expect. We had planned to start small — a simple 16-page paper to introduce the Post. But when our sales staff sold that ma-

So we put our personal Power-Macs (a misnomer, to be sure) to work. chugging out that first edition. And then there was the trip to the printers in Dover, Del., only to find that we had not known to bring every original graphic in the paper; thus, a return trip was required and an all-nighter resulted. The speeding ticket duly earned on the way back only cemented the madcap marvels of that initial edition, whose ultimate arrival at our Taslev office was welcomed as jubilantly as the Beatles hitting America — only with a reduced screaming throng of about seven.

Candy and I circulated through the Parksley Festival that first weekend, hesitantly asking revelers if they would mind taking one of the newspapers we were lugging around. These days, the demand for the Post is so fierce that we are forced to ration them in many locations — and for that we

are abundantly grateful.

Though the Post always has prided itself on being a bit "different" and counter-establishment, we actually developed a mission statement all those years ago, just like the big guys do. Of course, ours took about three minutes, where theirs normally require committees and seminars and not a few PowerPoint presentations. The Post's mission statement is three-fold: to produce a good product, to provide a few decent jobs, and to have a h___ of a good time doing it. And I like to think we've achieved all three.

But it's time for me to retire. The fact is that the Post is so robust, thriving so much, that it needs more energy than I can provide. I still can come up with the ideas, with the vision, but just not with the vigor to see them through. In addition, I have learned firsthand

how important it is to take time to live while you and your loved ones can.

And so rest assured, the Post is not going away with me. It will grow even more vibrant under new owners, who will treat it as tenderly as any newborn deserves.

I'll be around for up to three months more to help my baby adjust to its new life, but I won't be running the show. Hopefully, you won't notice when I finally slip out of the room, just as I hope you really haven't noticed my presence all that much behind the pages of the Post for these many years.

I'm sure readers have taken note that most of the column headings in our paper have the word "Post" in them: "MilePosts," "Posting Up," "Post Office," "They're At the Post," "Post-Op Ed Page," etc. It was another whimsical attempt to demystify what can be a lot of gray text. Well, there were a few "post" words that Candy just would not allow me to use, contending that they were too disrespectful. And so, after all these years, I will use here what I had facetiously suggested for the obituary heading, as I close out my post-mortem.
