Teen Dies at the Scene of Atlantic Road Crash

A teenager died at the scene of a traffic crash on Atlantic Road last Friday, according to 1st Sgt. B. E. Jeff Jones of the state police.

Shyasia L. Davis, 18, of Horntown, a Chincoteague High School student, was a back-seat passenger in a 2011 Chevrolet Malibu that crashed head-on into a tree. Davis was wearing a seatbelt.

The vehicle was driven

by a 17-year-old Parksley resident. His name and that of another 17-year-old male, who was in the backseat, were withheld by police because they are under 18. Both were taken to a nearby hospital for treatment of serious injuries. Their condition was not included in a police report made late Monday. The passenger was wearing a seatbelt. The driver was not.

The front seat passenger was identified as Krista N. Everett, 18. She was taken to the hospital for treatment of

minor injuries. She was wearing a seatbelt.

The driver was going south, less than a mile south of Bowden Lane in Assawoman when the vehicle came through a curve, ran off the right side of the road, spun around and struck the tree.

Reports state Davis was a se-

nior at Chincoteague High. She was reported, in the initial police release, to live on Wallops Island.

The crash reconstruction team, led by Sr. Trooper Johnny Godwin, responded to the scene. Jones said, "Speed is believed to have been a factor." Once the investigation is completed, Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan of Accomack will determine whether charges will be made, Jones added.

A search warrant for the vehicle was filed Monday in Accomack Circuit

Court by Godwin. It identifies the car as belonging to Shamaka Lashawn Wharton of Leslie Trent Road in Parksley. After the crash, the vehicle was taken to Ward's Auto Repair Shop in Accomack. Police want to search the airbag control and powertrain control modules for data "about the crash to include, but not limited to, speed and braking."

This was "a motor vehicle crash in which the passenger was killed as a result of reckless driving," the court papers stated. "According to the vehicle manufacturer and the Bosch Corporation, there is an airbag control module and/or a powertrain control module in the vehicle that may contain information."

Accomack County Public Schools and its central office were closed this week so there was no information available about possible school plans for a memorial. Funeral arrangements were being made at press time by Cooper and Humbles in Accomac.

ELEMENTARY STUDENTS DEMONSTRATE ROBOTICS KNOW-HOW

A group of future Star Trek voyagers are in training at two schools in Northampton County.

Teachers Diane Crockett of Occohannock Elementary and Victoria Miller of Kiptopeke Elementary School are busy training students in Grades 1 to 6 in electronics and mechanics, both of which are being used to produce robots.

Last week, at a school board session, Crockett's students demonstrated the robots that they had built this fall. The machines were designed to move and lift objects, not unlike the robotic arms of the now retired space shuttles. Each student commanded the robots remotely which were able to lift, move, and stack objects individually and in conjunction with other students.

For several years, students at Northampton High have built and competed with their robots while the elementary students could only sit on the sidelines and watch. This year, they can learn the skills they will need to build high-tech

Artifacts Are Window into Life and Lifestyle of Francis Makemie

The Francis Makemie Society conducted a four-day archaeological dig in early December at the home place of Francis Makemie, the Eastern Shore's 17th century religious leader and founder of organized Presbyterianism in America.

Under the direction of Dr. Jason Boroughs, formerly a professor of archaeology at Salisbury University and currently research archeologist at George Washington's Mount Vernon, volunteers dug 10-foot and five-foot square units in various locations at Makemie Park on the Francis Makemie

home site. The Eastern Shore Chapter of the Archaeological Society of Virginia supported the dig with nine members.

Fitz Godwin, chairman of the Francis Makemie Society, said an abundance of artifacts continues to be found that tell the story of the renowned 17th century theologian. Godwin also introduced Dr. Beverly Straube to the Francis Makemie Society and to the dig. Straube is an expert on 17th century artifacts and a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries in London, England; founding member of Jamestown Rediscovery; and consultant to the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation.

Straube identified English black flint for black powder guns, ceramics, early wrought iron nails, window glass and an array of other artifacts previously dug from the Makemie site. The Francis Makemie Society washed the artifacts under the supervision of a former student of Borroughs, Violet Margarita-Goldkamp. Straube and the Francis Makemie Society members used the social hall of Emmanuel Episcopal Church near the dig site as a staging

area. The goal of the dig was to understand Francis Makemie and how he lived by the household items found and to "cross-mend" the broken shards and display side-by-side with an intact piece, a technique known as parallelism. Promoting knowledge of Francis Makemie is the ultimate goal.

KIPTOPEKE WANTS YOUR CHRISTMAS TREES

Kiptopeke State Park wants Christmas trees to help protect the coastlines and boardwalk. Starting Monday, Dec. 26 through Tuesday, Jan. 10, drop off natural Christmas trees from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The purpose of this project is for dune stabilization around one of the existing boardwalks and to help restore the sand that was washed away by coastal storms. This project also aims to reduce further erosion along the beach.

The trees will be strategically placed

to catch sand blown by the wind allowing dunes to grow around the trees. Over the years, the pine trees that are underneath the sand decompose and sand dunes remain. Dunes play a vital role in protecting coastlines, property and act as a protective barrier.

Trees should be dropped off at the beach next to the bathhouse. A sign will be placed in this area indicating where to place trees. Remove all tinsel prior to delivery. For more information, please call the park at 757-331-3402.



Eastern Shore Leads Ag Production

The Eastern Shore was listed as the leading producer of wheat in Virginia for 2016 in statistics released recently by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Accomack growers lead the state by harvesting 772,000 bushels from 14,100 acres. Northampton was next with 605,000 bushels. They were followed by 549 bushels in Essex County; 546,000 in Northumberland County; and 506,000 in Westmoreland County.

Loudoun County had the highest yields at more than 72 bushels per acre. Accomack and Northampton did not list in the top five for that category.

"The 2016 wheat crop is one farmers are glad to have behind them and one that they hope won't repeat itself soon," said Herman Ellison, the state's statistician. "A cold, wet spring limited yield potential and increased disease rates. Average yield statewide was the lowest since 2010."

"Virginia farmers harvested 9.28 million bushels of winter wheat in 2016, down 33 percent from the previous year,"

the report stated. "Yield averaged 53 bushels per acre, down 13 bushels from 2015. Farmers seeded 210,000 acres last fall, down 50,000 acres from 2015. Area harvested for grain totaled 175,000 acres. Acres for other uses totaled 35,000."

A 2007 report showed Northampton leading the wheat harvest with 1,324,268 bushels. At that time, Accomack was second with 980,123 bushels.

Northampton was the leading barley producer for 2016 with 79,300 bushels harvested from 1,110 acres. It was followed respectively by Westmoreland, Shenandoah, Hanover and Rockingham counties.

Northampton also led with the highest barley yield with 71.4 bushels per acre. Respectively, it was followed by Westmoreland with 68.5 bushels per acre, Rockingham with 64.3, Shenandoah with 61.3 and Hanover with 60. "Yields were reduced due to the spring freeze and quality was variable," Ellison said.

Estimates for corn and soybeans are anticipated in February. Hay estimates will be out in April.

4 large eggs

1/2 cup butter







Having watched several versions of Christmas Carol" this year, including my "The favorite, Muppet Christmas Carol," I am struck by a phrase. Not the one where Scrooge muses that he would like to "boil in his own pudding" "every id-

iot who goes about with 'Merry Christmas' on his lips," though that one is an attention grabber, to be sure. No, the one I'm thinking about is "keeping Christmas."

"You keep Christmas in your way, and let me keep it in mine," Scrooge admonishes his nephew, Fred. After Scrooge's transformation, in the closing paragraphs, it was said that Scrooge "knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man alive possessed the knowledge." (Maybe I should have issued a "spoil-

er alert," although I can't imagine any person not knowing the end to that story.)

What in the Dickens could Dickens have meant? Certainly not to keep all the presents, because the phrase appears appeared after Scrooge's redemption, so we can mark that one off.

The "Dictionary of Archaic and Provincial Words of the 14th Century, 10th Edition" published in 1881, provided a definition of "keep" that means "to follow the example of." Was he saying that Scrooge never reverted from his overnight metamorphosis, remaining a man of generosity, following the example of Christ? That's one explanation.

I conducted an informal office survey about the meaning of "keeping Christmas well." Answers ranged from "sharing the Christmas spirit," to "keeping it special," to "sharing your quesadilla." (You never know what you'll get when questions are pitched to the entire office. I'm sure teachers can relate.) If we eliminate the obvious outlier, we're left with "sharing Christmas spirit," and "sharing your quesadilla," so I'm going to say sharing is the common theme. That sounds right, and lines up with the lessons from "A Christmas Carol."

The website <u>www.historytoday.com</u> suggests that Dickens was largely responsible for Christmas as we know it, because the story was written during a time

when the observance of Christmas was falling from favor. Industrialism had people working long hours, like the character Bob Cratchit, and the church discouraged frivolities such as those nephew Fred enjoyed in his household. But the tale of Mr. Scrooge and his ultimate redemption proved so popular that it helped to reignite Victorian interest in Christmas and creating customs and traditions.

Every family has its own traditions. In our household, the holiday isn't complete until everyone has been called, since my immediate family resides in seven states. I'll cook a big dinner and complain about the dishes, then make a pitcher of custard eggnog and retire to my recliner with my feet facing the pellet stove and drink way too much of it from my hand-painted wine glass from Linda Cicoira. I'll fall asleep watching "A Christmas Story" or "How The Grinch Stole Christmas" under the lights of the Christmas tree (red lights only). We'll go to church on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, and wish a "Merry Christmas" to everyone, and really mean it. We'll pray for peace on earth, and really, really mean it. And we'll pledge to keep that spirit alive throughout the year and really, really, really mean it.

So you keep Christmas in your way, and keep it well. Honor it in your hearts. Share your quesadillas. Merry Christmas, everyone!
