Hospital Ready For Showtime (and ESPN) as Move Draws Closer

It's nearly showtime for Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital. The medical center will move its operations from the 1971-era facility into what Administrator John Peterman called the "most modern" hospital in Virginia, and "probably the most modern in Virginia and Maryland" in the Onley-Onancock area on Feb. 25.

The cost of the entire campus, which features the new hospital, a cancer treatment center, and a medical professional office building, is \$90 million.

Peterman led a media tour of the hospital Monday. The general public is invited to stop by on Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 4 and 5 (see page 6).

Once it's operational, the entrance area will receive visitors and patients, where they will be given visitor's badges or escorted to departments. "Everything beyond this point is secure," he said.

The emergency room, which is open around the clock, will have a separate entrance.

All patient rooms are private — and twice the size of rooms in the Nasawa-

dox hospital — with private bathrooms and showers, and room for family members to stay overnight. They also feature large-screen televisions that offer ESPN. "Our board chairman said we have to have ESPN in every room," Peterman quipped.

Local landscapes and familiar Eastern Shore scenes warm the hall-ways. Peterman said 99 percent of the artwork is by local artists or of local sites. "We did focus on making sure the hospital represents the Shore," said hospital spokesperson Sally Schreiber.

The hospital's three operating rooms are equipped with green light technology that allows the surgeon to see without glare. "We have the best surgical lights known to mankind," said construction Project Manager Glenn Gangitano.

A pneumatic tube system will allow lab draws to be sent and medications to be received without ever leaving the floor.

Peterman said the facility is designed to adapt as needs change. "It is designed to get us well into the future."

Trial Underway For Man Who Wanted To Kill Deputies

Sharif R. Akbar says he was having hallucinations and delusions in 2015. He thought that if he killed police officers, God would grant him superpowers. So armed with a butcher knife, he started out on foot from his grandmother's house near Cheriton to find the Northampton County Sheriff's Office.

Unsuccessful, the 27-year-old Centerville, Va., man decided to steal a van in an attempt to lure deputies to him.

The enticement brought three deputies to Nassawadox where he was surrounded. He stopped and was ordered out of the vehicle, but he didn't know how to put it in park and the van drifted into a squad car as Akbar got out and started punching.

"I'll kill them all," he said as the deputies took him to the ground. He urged others to kill the officers as he was handcuffed and arrested. Akbar is being held in Eastern Shore Regional Jail

without bond.

He was scheduled to continue his testimony in Northampton Circuit Court at press time Thursday. He entered not guilty pleas last week to attempted murder of Deputies Carlos Moyano and Rob Stubbs, assault and battery of the officers and stealing a vehicle belonging to Verizon.

Defense lawyer Tucker Watson of Eastville said his client did not plan

Attempted Murder Charges Certified For Suspects Who Shot at Deputy

Probable cause was found Monday in Accomack General District Court to certify charges to a county grand jury against two Norfolk men for attempted murder of a sheriff's deputy last September.

Judge Gordon Vincent also certified charges of shooting from a vehicle, use of a firearm in the attempted murder and unlawfully shooting at an occupied law enforcement vehicle.

Deandre Breshon Ayers, also known as De'Andre Breshon Avres and Deondre Brashaun Ayers, 28, of Hanson Avenue in Norfolk, previously from Painter, was certified for those counts.

Charges against Lamond Perry, 23, of Marshall Avenue, were also certified. Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan asked for charges against Demetrius Perry, 21, of the same address, (Lamond Perry's brother), to not be prosecuted at this time since all the lab analyses had yet to be completed.

Morgan said the plan was to allow Maryland to extradite Demetrius Perry so he could face charges there. The Virginia cases would be picked back up when the lab reports are final. Extradition papers were filed for him for robbery, making a threat of mass violence, theft of \$1,000 to \$10,000 and threat of arson.

A charge of possession of a firearm by a non-violent felon was also certified for Avres.

Maryland police were notified at nearly 2 p.m., Sept. 26, of an alarm going off at PNC Bank at 600 Linden Ave.. in Pocomoke. Officers went to the scene and were told "the bank was robbed by three subjects who threatened to blow it up with an explosive device. No weapon or explosive was displayed to the bank tellers. The three ... left the bank, ran towards the 6th Street Car Wash and exited the area in a silver Chevy Malibu with a Virginia tag believed to be JYU-4323," court papers stated.

Accomack authorities were notified to be on the lookout for the car. Accomack Deputy Eric Nottingham got the alert and then saw the vehicle on Route 13 near Temperanceville. He followed the car, which turned right on Nelsonia Road and headed towards Bloxom. When the vehicle ran a stop sign he attempted to pull it over.

"The vehicle was acting like it was stopping," said Nottingham. It rolled to about five to 10 miles per hour "and then floored it and went up to 80 to 90 mph." The deputy said the car then just jammed on the breaks. That's when he saw an arm come out of the driver's window with a gun pointed towards him.


"It started popping off," he said. "I heard metal clanking around. I just heard a whole bunch of shots." Nottingham put the squad car in reverse. "I thought those chargers were fast but this one wasn't fast enough for me."

The Malibu took off again. The deputy tried to chase it but he could smell something burning and then his car stopped. He said the gun fired twice as the vehicle was driving off. "Three bullets struck my vehicle, one of them hit the transmission cord," he continued.

Defense lawyer Paul Watson, who represented Ayres, said his client did not go into the bank and was not happy with what the others had decided to do. "He was terrified" about the gun which he said was fired out the window from the back seat, Watson said. "Somebody else fired the shot. I understand acting in concert. ... He was put in a very bad position" as there was "someone in the car with a gun."



NORTHAMPTON SETS HEARING FOR HIGHER 2018 SCHOOL BUDGET

Northampton's School Board got a first look at the draft fiscal 2018 school budget last week, which is about \$578,000 higher than the current year.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence presented the members with a list of priorities needed to keep the schools afloat. He emphasized mandatory items including an increase in the Virginia Retirement System, testing price increases and additional elementary staff to handle an increase in student enrollment. Lawrence reported enrollment is at 1,674 students.

Lawrence said additional secondary staff, a 1.5 percent step pay increase and transportation and operational increases would add another \$552,662 to the draft. After taking into consideration repurposed funds, the bottom line was just over \$578,000 above the current year's budget.

A public hearing on the proposal will be held at 7 p.m., Feb. 9, at Northampton High School. The board will conduct a work session at 5:30 p.m. The board will later present a budget to the board of supervisors for consideration.

A new astronomy program offered by the University of Virginia will serve up to 20 elementary students this summer. The program will run from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. for one week in June at Occohannock Elementary School.

Operations Director Chris Truckner praised his staff and school custodial staffs for their outstanding efforts to remove snow, including 4-foot to 5-foot drifts that blocked school entryways.

The board reviewed procedures regarding payments to new and terminated employees and updated its travel expenses policy. Also reviewed was a policy covering grievance procedures for employees. The board will consider voting on the procedures at its next regular session.

Lawrence said four full days have been missed due to inclement weather, and delayed openings have occurred that equal three days. The state focuses on actual classroom hours rather than just counting days. For several years, schools have added additional minutes to the instructional day, which help defray the time lost.

In order to avoid affecting Spring

Break or adding additional days at the end of the school year, two teacher workdays have been repurposed as instructional days. If the schools face additional down days due to weather, the school board will have to address the issue.

Lawrence noted while the loss of work days might be an inconvenience to teachers, it mean students will benefit from having two more days where they will be kept warm, fed, and safe.


A possible scam in Accomack County is leaving people feeling uneasy.

Dog owners are ignoring Cheriton's leash law, Councilman Wesley Travis told other town leaders last week.

He said the town needs to take a closer look at one situation in which the owner of pit bulls has allowed the animals to roam outside and chase other dogs and people in the neighborhood.

Other council members and Mayor Joe Habel agreed and urged anyone who sees dogs running freely and acting agNorthampton's animal control officers, who have the authority to respond within the town limits.

Habel noted the town has the authority to issue written warnings as well as citations for failure to comply with ordinances.

Drainage issues near South Bayside Road were also discussed. Council agreed to seek an estimate for repairing or replacing a drainpipe that appears to be

Habel said projects associated with the town park, including fencing around the playground, and the adjacent commercial district need to be completed. He noted, benches and trashcans were added in an effort to make the area more appealing. Councilwoman Mary Mears urged the panel to add a security system to the area.

Cheriton Fire Department needs assistance to purchase an air compressor sponse faster to calls, Habel said. Council agreed unanimously to allocate up to \$2,000 towards the system.

Cheriton's Annual Cleanup Day is set for March 11. Mears reported the event encourages residents to maintain their property and to "spruce up" the town. The event will be from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Those who participate will be treated to a cookout at the town park. Park Day is tentatively set for June 17.

to contest the latter three charges because there was enough evidence to convict him of those counts. "We do not stipulate that there is sufficient evidence" for the attempted murder charges, said Watson. "We intend to present an insanity defense on all five."

Commonwealth's Attorney Bruce Jones said the evidence would be the same either way.

Two Norfolk psychologists testified that Akbar was psychotic when the incidents occurred on Nov. 2, 2015.

"He essentially seemed fearful and

not in anyway faking or malingering," said Dr. David Keenan. "It's very difficult to fake a mental illness to an experienced evaluator."

Dr. Alana Hollings spoke this week through a teleconference. Court was delayed last week because she had family obligations. Hollings interrupted her testimony several times to talk to others Wednesday who could not be seen on the television screen. She admitted there were details about the incidents that she hadn't known but upon learning about them would not budge from her conclusion.

Akbar told officers that he needed to get his "manhood back" in order to revert back to Islam and that somehow he thought he could do that by killing those who are "toughest on the block" and could protect themselves. He came to the Eastern Shore with his mother the previous day and planned to steal his grandmother's guns while the two women were at doctors' appointments.

His mother testified Akbar had been acting bizarre and she was concerned about him. Abkar had an irrational

fear that something was going to happen to his sister and nephew and was not communicating with his mother in his usual straightforward way, she said. His mother hoped the visit would help but also urged him to get seek counsel as others in the family had mental health issues.

Akbar admitted to breaking into his grandmother's closet where she kept guns. He didn't know how to load the shotguns so he abandoned them. A handgun was not recovered. The knife, held in a transparent cylinder, was placed on the judge's bench.


Historical Society Presents Program of Stories of Shore's Older African Americans



Malicious Bodily Harm Charge Certified

Probable cause was found last week to certify charges of malicious bodily harm and unauthorized use of a vehicle to a grand jury against Brian Marquis Northan, the man whose tooth was once evidence in a murder case.

Northan, 29, of Leslie Trent Road in Parksley, is being held without bond in Accomack Jail in connection with the Oct. 23, 2016, incidents.

The victim, John Foster of Wattsville, said he was giving Lamont Johnson a ride home from playing cards. They stopped at Northan's house, who he met for the first time that night.

The three rode to several locations. They ended up at Johnson's house, where Johnson suddenly started hitting him.

"I was trying to block it," Foster said.
"I didn't expect him to start punching."

Then both men "rushed me," Foster said. "Brian had a wrench," it was a 1 1/2-inch tool that Foster had in his vehicle. "He broke my arm with it. After I was getting beat and couldn't defend myself, I ran to hide in the woods. I just laid there until I could hear no one moving ... once I got up ... I was just hobbling along beating on peoples' doors."

Foster said a woman finally called 9-1-1 and he was eventually taken to the hospital.

Foster's girlfriend, Caroline Abbott, testified that Foster and Johnson left her house to take her aunt home from playing cards. When they were gone longer than it would take to go from Wattsville to Parksley, she began to worry and called Foster. But Johnson kept answering Foster's cell phone, saying Johnson couldn't talk. Foster's car was later found at another location.

Northan is not a stranger to local law enforcement. He was first accused of capital murder in the 2010 death of Anthony Wayne Wilson 46, of Felton, Del. Wilson was found dead at the scene of a traffic accident near Greenbush. But he didn't die from the crash. A medical examiner ruled Wilson's life

ended from a gunshot wound to the head and neck.

Found in the vehicle was Northan's tooth, according to DNA evidence. After spending three years in jail awaiting trial, Northan pleaded no contest to voluntary manslaughter in a plea bargain and was sentenced to 10 years with all but two years suspended. He got another two years for possession of a firearm by a felon to run consecutively with the first term. In addition, he was given two years for shooting at an occupied dwelling in connection with an incident that occurred a month after Wilson died. The latter sentence was set to run concurrently for a total of four years to serve.

In the murder case, a witness changed his mind about what he saw three times. The doctor, who would have spoke about the tooth, moved to Canada and the murder weapon, which was found in the Pocomoke River, was bought and sold several times among felons, allowing Northan to say it wasn't his, according to testimony.

Foster said his arm is still broken on one side and that he wore casts for months.

In another case, when a witness was not available, charges of strangulation, abduction and assault were not prosecuted against Billy Raymond Austin Sr., 62, of Elihu Wallops Land in Horntown. The incidents allegedly occurred between Oct. 31 and Nov. 1.

Guilty Plea in Supervisor Carjacking

A 15-year-old pleaded guilty last week in Accomack Circuit Court to carjacking Supervisor Reneta Major's car and stealing a Broadwater Academy bus last summer.

Dabreon Lamont Tankard, of Woodland Avenue in Melfa, was tried as an adult. In addition to those charges, he pleaded guilty to stealing Major's car, felony destruction of property, use of a firearm in a felony, grand larceny and maliciously shooting at a vehicle. The crimes occurred in early August.

Tankard was remanded to Accomack Jail until a presentence report could be completed.

In another case, Joshua Jamar Cooper, 31, of Nathaniel Street in Mappsville, was sentenced to three years with all but four months suspended for forgery on Nov. 25, and to three years with all but three months suspended for unauthorized use of a vehicle on Nov. 27; to five years with all but four months suspended for abduction on Sept. 28, 2015; to 12 months for assault and battery, also on Sept. 28; to three years for use of a firearm, also on Sept. 28; to three years with all suspended for credit card fraud and restitution of \$1,274.85 between Feb. 20 and March 20, 2014.

The terms were all set to run consecutively. Good behavior was ordered for 10 years and supervised probation was ordered for five. Cooper's driver's license was suspended for six months.

Marcus Dupree Giddings, 33, of Cedarlake Drive in Williamstown, N.J., was sentenced to five years with four suspended for felony eluding on Aug. 20, 2008. A count of receiving stolen property was not prosecuted. He got 12 months with eight months suspended for contributing to the delinquency of a minor. The terms were set to run consecutively. Good behavior was ordered for five years and supervised probation was ordered for three.

Cheriton Woman Sentenced for Oxycodone Distribution

A Cheriton woman was sentenced to a total of 10 years in prison Monday in Northampton Circuit Court for illegal drug distribution. All but six months of the terms were suspended.

Glenneva Owens Weeks, 53, of Banks Road, was sentenced to five years for possession with the intent to distribute cocaine and five years for possession with the intent to distrib-

Stephen Christopher McCanna, 42, of Madison Heights, Va., pleaded guilty to distribution of an imitation drug and attempting to distribute a controlled substance. He was sentenced to two years and six months on each offense with all but 30 days each suspended, to run consecutively for a total of 60 days. Supervised probation and good behavior were ordered for three years and five years, respectively.

Caleb Salvatore Catalano, 20, of Center Sandwich, N.H., pleaded guilty to possession of hydromorphone, an opioid pain medication, also known as Dilaudid. The case was continued pending completion of a presentence report.

Steve Giddens, 19, of Birdsnest, pleaded guilty to possession with intent to distribute cocaine and possession with intent to distribute cocaine. The latter was a second offense. A presentence report was ordered.

Chincoteague Police Arrest Two in Connection With Island Burglaries

Two island residents were arrested last weekend and charged with burglarizing several downtown businesses and related crimes, according to Chief Randy Mills of the Chincoteague Police Department (CPD).

The accused are Dylan Tyler Lambertson, 21, and Amanda Lynn Bare, 19. The crimes occurred Saturday, Jan. 28, and involved Seaside Seashells, Eclectic Beachcomber, Chincoteague Island Barber Shop and Saigon Village. Sgt. Thomas B. Hick-

man of CPD investigated.

Lambertson was also charged in connection with vehicles that were broken into on Main Street and Ocean Boulevard later that day. Cpl. Thomas J. Adams of CPD investigated those incidents.

Both suspects were charged with four counts of burglary, two counts of grand larceny, and one count of possession of burglary tools, destroying/defacing property and petty larceny. Lambertson was also charged with another count of grand larceny and four more counts of petty larceny.

Records filed in Accomack General District Court stated Bare "admitted she and Lambertson broke into three businesses." Lambertson had an iPad in his possession when arrested that was identified by one of the victims, the file stated. He is being held without bail.

Baseball Fans Get Stoked at 2017 Hot Stove Banquet

Hard-core baseball fans were out in full force Jan. 26 at the Wicomico Youth and Civic Center for the 2017 Hot Stove Banquet to hear baseball tidbits about the Delmarva Shorebirds and their parent team, the Baltimore Orioles.

The term "hot stove league" dates from 19th century small town America when, during the winter, people gathered at the general store or post office, sat around an iron pot-bellied stove, and discussed baseball along with politics and the weather.

Guest speakers for the this year's banquet included Gary Rajsich, director of scouting for the Baltimore Orioles, and Kent Qualls, Orioles' director of minor league operations.

Also speaking was Chris Bitters, General Manager of Delmarva Shorebirds, who talked about upgrades to Arthur W. Perdue Stadium, including 674 new padded seats and a new video board three times larger than the previous board. Bitters also revealed a new Shorebirds logo, noting the season opener was April 13.

Qualls thanked the area fans for

supporting young players starting their professional baseball careers with the Single A Delmarva team. He reminded the large crowd that the Oriole infielders Manny Machado and Jonathan Schoop played in Salisbury as well as All-Star reliever Zach Britton. Trey Mancini, who played for Delmarva in 2014, is expected to make an impact with the major league team in the coming years after an impressive debut last season, according to Qualls. Yermin Mercedes, another former Delmarva Shorebird, also has potential to help at the big league level.

Rajsich detailed the extensive scouting process that the Orioles go through to sign, draft and acquire players. Rajsich is credited with drafting and signing Jon Lester, now a star pitcher for the Chicago Cubs. Before becoming a scout, Rajsich was an outfielder and first baseman for the New York Mets, St. Louis Cardinals, San Francisco Giants, and the Chunichi Dragons of the Japan Central League. Assessing the strengths of the Orioles, Rajsich said the team had good power, great defense and

the best reliever in the game of baseball.

Asked about the team's starting pitching, Rajsich said several of the younger Oriole hurlers needed to step up this year. He noted Chris Tillman, who led the team in wins with 16 last season, was the Birds' unquestioned ace, backed up capably by Kevin Gausman and Dylan Bundy, another Oriole who saw action as a Shorebird. He added Tyler Wilson and Mike Wright would likely round out the Oriole rotation after showing flashes of promise last year. Wade Miley and Ubaldo Jimenez are also candidates for the starting rotation.

Questions from the crowd indicated fans were elated the Orioles had unexpectedly resigned Mark Trumbo, who led the majors with 47 homers and was testing the free agent market. He joins first baseman Chris Davis, who had led the majors in homers the previous year, as a solid one-two long ball threat.

Fans were obviously concerned, how-

ever, by the Orioles lack of interest in resigning catcher Matt Wieters, a popular player in Birdland. Qualls acknowledged Wieters' significant contributions to Baltimore over the last eight years but said the management feels comfortable with free agent Wellington Castillo taking over the backstop duties with Caleb Joseph serving as backup.

He also said acquiring Seattle outfielder Seth Smith in a trade for pitcher Yovani Gallardo will bolster the outfield, led by Gold Glove winner Adam Jones.

After suffering through 14 consecutive losing seasons, the Orioles have now reached the postseason in three of the last five seasons. The message by Oriole officials at the Hot Stove League was that the team hopes to go the distance with largely the same team that reached the playoffs last year with a few tweaks and maybe a boost from its minor league system.

Through Whale Watching Tour, Girls Glimpse Powerful Possibilities

Eleven teenage girls experienced a full day of education and empowerment recently thanks to a new program by a local non-profit and some of extra help from the community.

"The girls were excited and fearless in their determination to see the whales, no matter how cold the waves were, crashing over the boat and soaking them completely," said Polly Boyd, program coordinator for ESTACI, the non-profit that coordinated the day trip.

Packed into a van on loan from Rev. Felton Sessoms of First Baptist Church in Cape Charles, the girls headed across the Bay on Jan. 28 for ESTACI's first Empowering Girls – Overcoming Racism, Sexism & Poverty field trip. The tour experiences and meals were all donated by local businesses and individuals.

During the excursion, the girls enjoyed a two-hour whale watching boat tour, visited the Virginia Aquarium, and learned from local marine biologist and Eastern Shore native Sarah Mallette's lunch presentation about different types

of whales. Malette answered questions about how to become a marine biologist, along with inquiries about whales' migration, feeding, mating and survival behaviors and how the Chesapeake Bay environment impacts them.

Organizers reported a fun and inspiring time for the participants from Nandua and Northampton middle schools, Northampton High School, and Kiptopeke and Occahannock elementary schools, and their Empowering Girls chaperones and Empowering Women coordinators.

"All of us made new friends," said ESTACI ntern Jessica Shedlack. "We were thrilled to see our girls developing relationships, learning about whales and our local environment, and enjoying this trip that none of us had ever previously had a chance to experience."

Boyd said it's important for girls to have access to opportunities which they might not otherwise have a chance to explore, and to have the support and bonds with each other and the mentors that form through these experiences. "Once they participate in field trip like this, they

can see themselves in these careers. They are no longer unimaginable."

A critical piece of diagnostic equipment at the new Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital (RSMH) was delivered and installed on Jan. 11. Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) is a cornerstone

partment. MRIs produce detailed digital pictures of the inside of a patient's body. It is especially useful for soft structures such as organs or for areas of bleeding, and

it is commonly used to diagnose and monitor conditions within the chest, abdomen and pelvis.

Riverside's state-of-theart wide-bore MRI will make scan times shorter. so the patient spends less time in the MRIs 'bore'. Additionally, the bore is shorter than traditional MRIs and is larger in diameter. This makes for a more comfortable patient experience without sacrificing image quality as can

happen with open MRIs.

Riverside's new MRI was installed inside the Imaging Department in a shielded room which keeps the magnet from affecting other equipment nearby. The MRI suite was designed for privacy and includes a private changing room, bathroom and waiting area.

"Our patients are going love their MRI experience, and our physicians will love the image quality from this new machine. Our investment in this machine is just one way of many that Riverside is focusing on providing care that is comfortable for the patient.





I need to preface this week's report with some events from last year. I would say 2016 was a banner year for the Eastern Shore. In the spring, I accompanied the House Appropriations Committee to various locations in Northampton and Accomack counties. We visited an aquaculture facility, spaceport, state park, and University of Virginia's facility in Oyster. In the fall, both the Senate and the House Agriculture Committees had a joint tour through Northampton County. We visited fields on land and on water. We also visited a string bean packing facility, and our visit was concluded at the state park.

These tours are invaluable to the members of the committees. It also helps me gain standing with the members when issues arise that affect the industries that were toured. I want to thank the many people that made these tours successful. The members are still talking about the red carpet that was rolled out for them.

The third week's pace did not slow as we plowed through the bills that the delegates introduced. Most of my subcommittees are finishing their work and sending the bills that pass our scrutiny to the full committee. Those that pass that test are sent to the floor for debate of the full House. If we vote to pass a bill, it will then have to go to the Senate for the process to start over again. This is referred to as "crossover" and we are fast approaching that midway point.

Most of my free time — when I wasn't in committee meetings or on the House floor — was spent working on bills that would affect the Eastern Shore. Many hours of negotiations were held with bills concerning VMRC and leased oyster grounds. It is still a work in progress. My hope is to solve some issues without collateral damage.

The House has narrowed its focus on the budget, and plans to adjust the governor's proposals. I need to work with caution as the Senate will have their budget and the governor will get a chance to change it once again. However, I am very happy with what I know about the House budget. It focuses on the core functions of government: education, public safety and transportation. We have made some hard decisions about tax credits and tax loopholes, but the results should be well received.

The pace continued to be brisk at the General Assembly with a Feb. 25 adjournment date, there were a lot of bills with which to deal in addition to the budget. Each committee continues to work on its own budget version, which will go public today. Negotiations will then begin between the two legislative chambers for a final version. Both seem committed to a three-percent raise for state employees and a significant pay increase state troopers.

The incredible uncertainty in Washington has led many to indicate that we would likely return sometime in late spring or early summer to make changes. In particular, the Medicaid Program, could become a Block Grant Program allocated to the states, which would have a significant and likely detrimental impact on Virginia's budget.

Feb. 8 is the deadline for Crossover, when the House must dispose of the bills filed by its members. My legislation on Working Waterfronts has thus far been favorably received by committees and the full Senate. In addition, my bill for a cabinet-level Coastal Flooding official was acted on favorably by the Senate Finance Committee with the contingency that appropriate funding is in our final budget for the post. Redistricting legislation advances in the House with my constitutional amendment being made a part of a bill carried by Senator Emmett Hanger, Senate bill SJ 231. This is an issue I am very passionate about and one that I think is very important to the commonwealth's future.

I am also the patron of bill SB1487, that requires automatic suspension without pay, subject to judicial review, of an elected official convicted of a felony.

We are also anxiously awaiting results of a budget amendments for funding at the Virginia Institute of Marine Sciences facility in Wachapreague and for agricultural Best Management Programs. My bill, which was carried at the request of the Secretary of Transportation, is going forward to the Commercial Space Flight Authority Board and requires a more business-oriented approach to its mandated six-year plan for operations. This will be important to the future success of the spaceport.
