Hotly Contested Water Park Approved on Chincoteague

The Chincoteague Town Council approved a campground water park Monday, putting an end to a hotly debated island issue.

The planned water park will be built on just over five and a half acres at Maddox Family Campground's sprawling 97-acre property.

The meeting was moved to the nearby Chincoteague Center after the public filled council chambers with some standing outside in the hall.

During the public hearing, 13 people spoke, with 10 opposing the water park or voicing concerns about it, and three speaking in favor of it.

Concerns ranged from safety to traffic, but most centered on the water park clashing with the area's natural aesthetics.

"It will change the character of Chincoteague forever," said Paul Brzozowski, who added that he and his wife are "passionately opposed" to the water

park as he held up a large photograph of a water park in Ocean City, Md. "We do not believe this to be beauty," he said.

Others in opposition echoed the water park was not in keeping with the character of Chincoteague and pointing to nearby Assateague Island and Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge.

Sue Johnson said people come to the island to enjoy nature.

"It is so contrary to the statement of purpose of this island," she said of the water park.

Reid Thornton, a Chincoteague resident and college student studying tourism, said the construction of the water park is inevitable and that the attraction would be a boost to local tourism.

"Tourism, not only has it provided me with a job since I was 14, but it has also provided the town with a lot of money over the years," he said. "We are a town that is built off that industry and it will continue to grow. You

Parent Convicted in School Assault

A parent who was apparently angered by suspicion that school staff had called social services and allowed the agency access to her child during school hours was convicted Monday of what Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan characterized as a "savage attack on a school employee."

Yashica Tonya Hope, 37, of Chester Street in Mappsville, was convicted of Class I misdemeanor assault and battery against Kegotank Elementary School Principal Jennifer Annis in an altercation that happened last November.

Annis testified that around 10 a.m. on Nov. 17, she was told someone wanted to see her. When she went to the office, Hope told her she didn't have the proofs of residency the school required, and put her finger in Annis' face and said, "You told

Northampton Planners Send Two Special Use Permits to Board

A pair of public hearings for special use permits was before the Northampton County Planning Commission on March 7.

Thomas and Lauren Gardner requested a special use permit to operate a home kitchen for home food processing at 26223 Lankford Hwy. in Capeville, Lauren Gardner said her plan was to prepare baked goods and sell them off-site at farmers markets, craft shows and similar venues. The food preparation will be done in her existing kitchen, so no changes to the interior or exterior of her home would be required, but the application stated the bakery would be required to comply with USDA standards for home bakeries. With all sales being off-site, there would not be a need for customers to come to the location, precluding additional traffic or parking issues.

No one in the public spoke during the public hearing for this permit. The Board of Supervisors will conduct another public hearing on the special use permit at its March 14 session.

The second permit was requested by Christopher Evans to establish a single-wide mobile home on his property at 6350 Cherie Way in Machipongo. Evans explained that his family currently lives in a mobile home on his property but he intends to construct a single-family dwelling on the same parcel.

While a request to construct a single-family dwelling would not ordinarily be an issue that requires a special use permit, because a single-wide mobile home is already on the property, it does. Evans is requesting to change the designation of the mobile home to an accessory dwelling while he continues to occupy it until such time as he can construct the new residence.

The zoning ordinance creates a catch-22: Evans is requesting to designate the mobile home in which


they are living as an accessory dwelling while the new home is being built, but under the ordinance an accessory structure can only be placed on a property after the primary dwelling is either constructed or at least in the process of being constructed. If he leaves the mobile home as the family's primary dwelling, any additional dwelling added to the property — the new residence they intend to build — would be considered an accessory dwelling and limited to no more than 50 percent of the size of the primary dwelling. In other words, the new home would need to be smaller than the current mobile home.

While the commissioners supported the applicant's intention to construct a home, the ordinance was written assuming that most homeowners would add an accessory dwelling only to complement an existing primary dwelling. The commissioners agreed to support

the special use permit request with the understanding that the Board of Supervisors might require the applicant to agree to proceed with his plans to request a building permit in order to construct his new primary dwelling.

The commissioners agreed that because of the nature of the request, the same circumstance could arise in the future, and a zoning text amendment would be prudent. Such a change would require a public hearing by the planners as well as the Board of Supervisors. As has been noted in the past, the one-size -fits-all approach to the zoning ordinances does not always work, thus it is considered a living document that can, and often does, require amendment.

Following the hearings, the commissioners continued to review portions of the comprehensive plan involving the county's demographic data.



CAPITAL LETTERS

This week's report relates to the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC). There were quite a number of bills and budget amendments concerning the agency in this year's session. The bills were submitted by senators and delegates from around the Chesapeake Bay. The bills that survived are on the governor's desk for his input. I suspect that some will fall to his veto but one can never guess at what the governor or his administration will do with legislation. They may sign it into law, amend it and send back for us to agree with his changes, or veto it and we would need a 2/3 vote to override his veto for the bill to become law.

These bills took a lot of time, negotiating with the patron to solve his problem in his district and not create new ones for us in the 100th district. I need to thank some individuals that were valuable resources when these issues were circulating around the Capitol. Mike Osterling, Kim Huskey, Marshall Cox, Tommy Kellam and A.J. Erskine helped me monitor as well as amend the legislation, but not at the expense of the industry or the Eastern Shore. I also need to stop and thank the lobbvists and lawvers of Virginia Beach for their hard work in finding solutions to their problems without infringing on others. Finally, I wish to extend my appreciation to the VMRC Staff and Commissioner Bull, who put in much overtime and yet had to endure grueling committee and subcommittee meetings.

I will not discuss individual bills as their fate is not yet known. I will say the topics range from riparian leases, license revocation instead of privilege loss, dredging channels through leases, changing notice requirements for lease applications, and carrying a dredge across an oyster sanctuary.

The budget amendments are somewhat safer to discuss. I do not see the governor going within the budget and

changing these. He could do this, but I have not seen a governor do such when a political statement is not made. The first budget adjustment from the original was the reduction or the return to the 2016 fee schedule for commercial licenses. The proposed increase in fees was on every license sold by the VMRC. The increased revenue to the agency was small but the burden to the watermen was too great considering all the limitations and restrictions put on their seasons and catch quotas.

Another budget amendment that corrected a bad policy move was the restoration of money to the recreational fishing license fund. The original budget moved the money from the fund to help offset reductions to VMRC's operational budget. The money was returned to its original purpose of improving fishing habitat, improvements to water access for the public, and the popular and most successful saltwater fishing tournament in the U.S., the Citation Program. It is a very successful program that promotes our recreational fishing industry. Taking that money for any other purpose is not only a poor business decision but a break of the public trust, as that fee was sold to Virginians for the purposes mentioned and no other.

The last budget amendment was to restore money moved away from the VMRC's surveying department. I view this department as one of the cornerstones of the success of the leasing program that Virginia has operated since the late 1800s. Our state's leasing program is one reason we lead the East Coast in aquaculture production.

Exmore Council Considering Adding a Splash Pad to "Showplace" Park

Next to Boardwalk, the most valued location on the Monopoly board is Park Place. While the Town of Exmore does not have a Boardwalk, it does have a Park Place.

Exmore Mayor Doug Greer said at the Town Council's March 6 session that the park is the town showplace and needs to be enhanced when possible to encourage residents and visitors to use it. The park currently has a structure that can be used for events, a covered stage, and public restrooms. Town Manager Robert Duer urged the council to consider approving guidelines for the resident and visitor use of the park.

The guidelines Duer recommended included times, fees, uses, and a suggestion that the park be open for the public while reserving portions for town use on holidays. Duer recommended the addition of lighting and security cameras to improve safety. He asked the council to review the suggested guidelines and additions and be prepared to vote on them at their April session.

Duer asked the council for sugges-

tions regarding a vision or ideas for improvements for the town to which Mayor Greer suggested additions for the park. He raised the idea of adding a splash pad, a suggestion that had been raised in 2016. The pad would provide a location where park visitors could run under intermittent water sprays to cool off during warmer months. Examples of splash pads can be found at http://www.rain-deck.com The council requested Duer obtain prices and bids for a splash pad that might be appropriate for the park.

The council reviewed the fiscal year 2018 town budget as proposed by Duer. The \$1.9 million budget will be presented at a public hearing at the council's April 3 session.

Utilities Director Taylor Dukes provided an update on the proposed wastewater facility and upgrades that are in motion for the town. Dukes emphasized the need for residents to complete the surveys in circulation in an effort to obtain a \$1 million block grant that will be used for the project. He said the town needs at least 300 surveys to be completed within the

next two weeks. Dukes stated only 150 have been submitted to the town so far.

The purpose of the survey is to ascertain an approximate income for the residents. The grant is one that is aimed to help communities with a sizable number of lower income residents, and the more surveys that are completed, the better chance the town will have of being successful in obtaining the grant. With a total cost of \$5 million for the new wastewater facility and pipeline upgrades, obtaining the grant will help to dramatically decrease the financial impact on the town and its residents. The survey may be picked up at the town office, downloaded from the town's website at http://exmore.org/town-of-exmore-community-survey/, or by emailing Dukes at tdukes@exmore.org. The Surveys need to be completed and submitted or delivered by March 21.

Eastern Shore Tourism Commission Executive Director Kerry Allison reported that there has been a growth in interest in visiting the Eastern Shore in recent years. According to Allison's report, the commission's website appears to be seeing an increase in younger visitors seeking information on what is available in the region. While her report indicated an increase in the amount of tourism dollars being spent in the region, she did not give a breakdown on the actual amount that has been spent in Northampton County vs. the other parts of the region, including Accomack County.

During the session, Mayor Greer presented Allison with a check from the town to support the tourism commission.

During the public comment session, Exmore businessman Ken Dufty provided the council with information regarding the problems with allowing commercial poultry houses on the Eastern Shore. Among the issues he raised were the problems of disposing of poultry litter in the limited space of the Shore and how the houses and their pollution might affect water quality.

Currently there are no commercial poultry growing houses in Northampton County, although there are a considerable number in Accomack County.

Court Postings

Brothers Answer to Animal Care Charges

Brothers Luis and Jose Berlanga, both of Parksley, were inside Accomack County General District Court on Monday answering charges related to the care of their dogs.

Deputy Levi Higgins testified he was tagged in a Facebook post in early January. The post contained a photo of a dog that appeared to be deceased. He located the home where the photo was taken, and found two dogs: one appeared healthy, and the other was in poor health. There was also ground disturbed in an area in front of a kennel.

Higgins located Luis Berlanga who told him he owned the dog that was in poor health. That dog was provided water in a gas can with the lid cut off, but it was frozen, and there was no food available. Luis Berlanga released the animal into the care of Higgins.

Luis Berlanga also told Higgins that the dog that appeared in good health belonged to his father, and the dog that died belonged to his brother, Jose. He directed Higgins to his brother's workplace where he was interviewed.

Jose Berlanga told Higgins his dog was alive the morning of Jan. 9, and he had fed it tamales because he didn't have any regular dog food. When he returned from work that night, he found the dog dead, and buried it in front of the kennel.

Photographic evidence provided in court showed about half of the floor of the dog house where the dog had been living was chewed out, and several piles of vomit were in the living area.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan asked Jose Berlanga about the Facebook post referencing raising "killers."

"They are guard dogs," said Luis Berlanga. "That's what he means by that."

Morgan disagreed. "This dog was clearly more than a companion animal. Mr. Berlanga trained it to be aggressive."

Luis Berlanga was found not guilty of failure to provide clean shelter for a companion animal and failure to provide adequate food for a companion animal. Jose Berlanga was found guilty of animal cruelty and failure to provide adequate shelter for a companion animal. He was given a 60-day sentence, with 60 days suspended, and a \$650 fine for the cruelty to animal charge, with \$500 suspended,

and a \$100 fine for the charge of failure to provide adequate shelter. He was also sentenced to 24 hours of community service to be completed by June 6.

While the Berlangas were in the

courtroom, a small pack of protesters let their dissatisfaction with the legal standards of care for companion animals be known in the courthouse parking lot with picket signs.

Metompkin Septic Closes Playground

Metompkin Elementary School was again dealing with sewage issues this week, a matter that seems to have plagued the school over the last year.

Jon Richardson, of the Accomack County Health Department, said he was on the school grounds Tuesday examining the source of a sewage spill.

"The farmer had expanded his tilling and it encroached upon the drainfield and had broken the cleanout," said Richardson, causing sewage to flow out of the broken cleanout. Lime was spread over the affected area. No sewage was observed on the playground; the sewage overflow area was all outside of the maintained area of the school grounds, he said.

Accomack School Superintendent Chris Holland confirmed "it's out in a cornfield." He said the school system will pay for the repair. A cost estimate for repairs was not available.

"We want to be good neighbors," Holland said. "He's just as sorry about it as anyone," he added, referring to the farmer who caused the damage.

A survey will be made of the property lines to clearly delineate between the school property and the farm field. "I may put a fence there," said Holland.

Holland said he closed the playground in an abundance of caution, and the damaged system did not cause any plumbing problems inside the school building.

At press time, officials were waiting for a Heath Department inspection so the playground could be re-opened.



them people on me," referring to the Department of Social Services.

It was then that things began to escalate, with Annis raising her voice and saying. "Get your hand out of my face," and Hope responding with a slap to Annis' face. Annis went the office door and told the secretary to call the police.

Then, "I felt a hand in the back of my head," and fingers were wrapped in her hair. "She pushed me," said Annis. "My body landed against the filing cabinet," hitting with such force that it left dents in the cabinet and caused Annis to black out.

Annis suffered a concussion, lacerated thumb and headaches.

Annis testified that Hope had previously had told school officials she was enrolling her child at Metompkin Elementary School, and the child had not been in school the day before. However, the day of the incident, she saw the child coming into school and the child was told to return with a parent. The parent later came back, but without the child, and this is when the alterca-

tion occurred.

School secretary Treketta Harris said she saw Hope lay into Annis. "She snatched her by the back of the head," she testified. Harris was able to get Hope in a bear hug and remove her to the cafeteria. The irate Hope tried to break her grip, but Harris was able to keep her restrained until Accomack County deputy Bobby Taylor arrived. Hope testified that she "was not struggling, but (Harris) shouldn't have held me so tight."

Taylor said that he responded to an altercation at Kegotank Elementary School and found Hope with a couple of faculty members. "Her eyes were glassy and she smelled strongly of marijuana," he said.

According to court documents, he interviewed Annis and two witnesses who all said Hope had slapped Annis in the face, grabbed her by her hair and threw her in the floor against the filing cabinets in the office. He placed Hope under arrest for assault and disorderly conduct. "Upon a pat down of Ms. Hope and her purse I discovered two partially smoked cigars containing

green leafy material. The green leafy material reacted positive for marijuana in a field test kit," the record says.

In addition to the assault and battery charge, Hope was convicted of disorderly conduct, and possession of marijuana. She received a sentence of 12 months, with no time suspended, for the assault and battery charge, and a \$1,000 fine, with \$1,000 suspended;

12 months for disorderly conduct, with 12 months suspended, and a \$250 fine, with \$200 suspended; and 30 days for possession of marijuana, with 30 days suspended, and a \$50 fine. Hope was remanded to jail where she has other charges pending.

According to court documents, she has been banned from all school property in Accomack County.

cannot stop that."

Dean Orsino, speaking in favor of the proposed water park, agreed that the park would help bring in more tourism dollars and added that its construction was going to happen with or without the conditional use permit.

"They are going to build this. Tonight's just for public access, if we don't get public access I can go rent a campsite for forty dollars and still go to the park anyhow," Orsino said.

Local attorney John P. Custis, who represents Oceanside Resort LLC, the company building the water park, gave a presentation following the public comment period answering many of the concerns.

After construction, the park would operate from Memorial Day weekend to Labor Day weekend and would be open daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Custis said.

Addressing specific concerns, Custis said there is no intention to disturb any marshes or tidal wetlands in construction of the park and that several mature trees will remain on the property to act as a vegetative buffer to shield the public's view of the water

slides from Maddox Boulevard.

The Chincoteague Planning Commission voted 3-2 in January to recommend approval of the park with a list of seven conditions.

The discussion amongst council members focused mainly on the a structural height restriction with half the council wanting the builder to adhere to a planning commission recommendation that the water park slides not exceed a total of 36 feet in height.

Councilman Gene Wayne Taylor said he couldn't vote for the project if any portion of it exceeded the height restriction. It was a sentiment shared by councilwoman Denise Bowden who said she has been keeping a tally as she polled residents around the island on their feelings about this issue. Bowden said in her conversations with local residents that 583 were in favor of the water park, with 247 opposed and 117 who didn't care either way.

Councilman Ben Ellis said he was opposed to the construction because "the

community is overwhelmingly" against it and that it could open the floodgates for other such projects in the future.

"It's not consistent with the comprehensive plan of this town," he said. "We

are opening the door to things in the future the we do not want."

Council voted 5-1 to approve a conditional use permit for the park, with councilman Ellis being the lone dissenter.

Taylor-Made to Be a Gamecock

Baseball season is officially in full-swing and for Nandua High School graduate Hunter Taylor, his junior year with the University of South Carolina (USC) Gamecocks will mark a particularly meaningful one, considering last summer, he had plans to transfer.

At the conclusion of Taylor's high school career, the Onley native was honored as the 2A Player of the Year and rated No. 6 best high school prospect in the state by Baseball America, No. 8 best high school prospect in the state by Perfect Game USA and No. 169 in the country for the best high school prospect by Perfect Game USA. He was also named to the 2014 Baseball America High School All-America Second Team and hit .554 with 12 homeruns and 39 RBIs during his senior year with the Warriors.

Taylor was also selected during his junior year to the Virginia High School Coaches Association All-Group A Second Team and was a member of the Evoshield Canes AAU team that won the PG WWBA World Championship in 2013.

The 5-foot-11 catcher stepped behind the plate as a starter for the first time in his collegiate career during a February game against the College of Charleston, where they defeated the Cougars, 8-3.

Taylor finished his freshman season as a Gamecock with 26 starts over 32 games. He batted an average of .238, going 19-for-80 with 11 runs, 15 RBIs, two doubles and two homerups

As a sophomore, Taylor only saw seven starts over 15 games played due to the addition of two new catchers to the Gamecock's catching staff. However, Taylor still made the most of his time out on the diamond, driving in the game-winning run during South Carolina's NCAA Regional baseball tournament 4-2 win over Duke.

Taylor finished his second-year stint hitting .226 and going 7-for-31, with two runs scored, two doubles and four RBIs. He was also selected to NCAA All-Regional Tournament Team with three MVP nominations, but

even still, Taylor was itching for more time on the field.

The Shore athlete found himself at a crossroads after the season concluded; torn between staying in Columbia, the place he has called home for the last two years, or to find more playing time elsewhere with another club.

"I was planning to transfer because I wasn't getting very much playing time after coming back from playing a lot my freshman year," admitted Taylor.

But he realized that deep-down, he was meant to be a Gamecock and Columbia was where he needed to be.

"I changed my mind because I wanted to stay where I had been for the last two years and where I knew everyone," reflected Taylor. "There was a lot of thought put into it, but I decided to stay to hopefully win a championship."

Head Coach Chad Holbrook talked highly of Taylor on the team's website recently, giving credit to both his character and his athleticism.

"Hunter is just a hard worker. He probably has as much respect in the locker room as any other player on our team. He is just a beautiful kid to coach," said Holbrook. "Our pitchers love throwing to him. He's a leader. He has the utmost respect of every player in our locker room and our coaching staff believes in him big-time as well. I can tell you that if the season is on the line, we're not afraid to put him in there. I think we

showed that last year."

The retail management major is a favorite among his teammates, known for his work ethic and complaint-free demeanor, despite not seeing the playing time during his second go-around with the Gamecocks that he expected after coming off a successful freshman season. Sometimes, though, it is about quality, not quantity, and Taylor has proven that he can rise to the occasion each time he steps on the field.

Taylor had his first start of his junior season Feb. 25, against Wright State, where he led USC with three hits, also a career high, going 3-for-5 and he recorded his first career two-double game. He has seen two additional starts over six games played, averaging .333 at bat going 4-for-12, scoring three runs and three doubles so far this year. With already meeting and surpassing some of his previous season stats, Taylor expresses that his goal is to simply just do his best.

"My goals don't really differ from the teams goals; I just want to do well and hopefully win and go as far as we can go."

Taylor confided that although he does not have any one person he can name as being influential in his career, he does have a few major league players he looks to for inspiration.

"There are a few players in the big leagues today that I love and admire the way they [Freddie Freeman and Miguel Cabrera] play," states Taylor.

Cabrera, nicknamed "Miggy," is the first basemen for the Detroit Tigers; Freeman is the first baseman for the Atlanta Braves.

The Gamecocks, currently sporting a 9-5 record and ranked fourth, will host Michigan State in a threegame series at Founders Park this weekend, beginning tonight (Friday), March 10, at 7 p.m. Catch the live broadcast on SEC Network Plus or listen in on the Gamecock IMG Network station or 107.5 FM, "The Game."


Game 7: K&E Marine Capitals 3, Jim Wert Builder, Inc. Penguins 0



On February 2, 2017, Aqua Virginia, Inc. ("Aqua Virginia"); Aqua Presidential, Inc. ("Aqua Presidentia"); Aqua Wintergreen Valley Utility Company ("Aqua Wintergreen"); and Aqua Utilities Captain's Cove, Inc. ("Aqua Captain's Cove") (collectively, "Joint Petitioners" and collectively, absent Aqua Virginia, "Virginia Subsidiaries"), filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") a joint petition seeking approval for the merger of Aqua Virginia and its Virginia Subsidiaries into one corporation with Aqua Virginia as the surviving entity ("Joint Petition"). The Joint Petition requests approval pursuant to the Utility Transfers Act in Title 56 of the Code of Virginia ("Code"), which provides, in part, that "[n]o person ... shall, directly or indirectly, acquire or dispose of control of ... [a] public utility within the meaning of this chapter, or all of the assets thereof, without the prior approval of the Commission."

Aqua Virginia and the Virginia Subsidiaries represent that they are public utilities providing water and wastewater service to customers in Virginia. Aqua Virginia is organized as a Virginia public service company serving approximately 23,474 active water customers and approximately 6,857 active wastewater customers in Virginia. Aqua Presidential is a wholly owned subsidiary of Aqua Virginia and serves approximately 336 active water customers and 296 active wastewater customers. Aqua Wintergreen is a wholly owned subsidiary of Aqua Virginia and serves approximately 403 active water customers and 166 active wastewater customers. Aqua Captain's Cove is a wholly owned subsidiary of Aqua Virginia and serves approximately 955 active water customers and 270 wastewater customers.

The Joint Petitioners propose to merge, leaving Aqua Virginia as the surviving entity. Upon termination of the corporate existence of the Virginia Subsidiaries, Aqua Virginia would serve all of the water and wastewater customers and other assets currently owned by the Virginia Subsidiaries.

The Joint Petitioners state that the proposed transaction will not change rates for the customers of any of the Joint Petitioners at this time. The Commission notes that the current rates charged by Aqua Captain's Cove are the subject of an ongoing proceeding to determine the reasonableness of rates implemented pursuant to the Small Water or Sewer Public Utility Act, Code§§ 56-265.13:1 *et seq.*, which is currently docketed as Case No. PUR-2017-00017. Should the merger proposed in Case No. PUR-2017-00018 be approved, the rates implemented by a final order in Case No. PUR-2017-00017 would be the rates applicable to the customers in the Aqua Captain's Cove portion of Aqua Virginia's service territory. The Joint Petitioners further assert that continuous service will be maintained to customers of Joint Petitioners throughout the merger process by each Joint Petitioner and thereafter by Aqua Virginia.

The Joint Petitioners also assert that the merger will permit more efficient financing and administration of water and wastewater service through one legal entity and allow Aqua Virginia to maintain rates at more reasonable levels in the long term than if each of the Virginia Subsidiaries acts as a stand-alone company.

The Joint Petitioners request that the Aqua Virginia certificate of public convenience and necessity be amended to permit Aqua Virginia to serve the service territories currently served by the Virginia Subsidiaries.

Students from Boston College spent their spring break week volunteering locally on a Habitat for Humanity home build in Northampton County.

More than a dozen students traveled to Virginia's Eastern Shore for the week as part of the school's Appalachia Volunteers Program, which was founded in 1979 and is one of the oldest alternative spring break programs in the country.

For Kim Bretta, helping fill a need is an important part of the program.

"There are 75 to 100 people who apply for these houses every year and only two are able to receive them, so clearly there is a need and we're happy to be a part of that," she said.

Bretta said students involved in the program prepare for their trips by studying social justice issues. It's her fourth year volunteering in the program and her second trip to Virginia's Eastern Shore.

"It's a really welcoming community." she said of the area.

On Wednesday some members of the group were busy building "can houses," a small shed-like structure for the purpose of collecting recyclables. Some worked to cut and secure baseboard molding inside the Habitat house, while others followed along and sealed the molding joints with caulk. A group even worked to construct a set of steps on the house's front porch.

The student group spent nights at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Onancock for the week, and travelled daily to their work site in Treherneville.

Bretta said the church's rector, Rev. C. Berkley Ford, has been very hospitable throughout their stay.

Niko Piperis, another fourth year volunteer, said the program is great for exposing its members to very different overlooked locations.

"I didn't even know there was an Eastern Shore of Virginia," he said. "A lot of these communities, tons of people in the country don't even know they exist."

Piperis agreed that the local community comes together to help during the group's stay.

"We roll in and we don't know anybody. We've got a place to stay, we get lunch and we've got a potluck dinner tonight at the church," he said. "The hospitality is great."

GONE, BUT NOT FORGOTTEN: BRICKHOUSE POST WAS TRIBUTE TO AN HONORABLE MAN

Just north of Eastville along Route 13 lies the abandoned and shuttered "Willie T. Brickhouse Post 400," named by a group of African American veterans of the Korean conflict and the Vietnam War to honor a member of the community who died in Vietnam. The building, though not extravagant, stood as a reminder of his sacrifice. It has been shuttered by the long arm of the American Legion as though its funds had provided this monument. Indeed, the American Legion has its rules and procedures, but its mission is to honor and serve veterans, and it could be argued that its action relative to this post was heavy handed. The building has been sold for other uses.

Growing up, Willie T. "Buddy" Brickhouse lived a few hundred feet away from the American Legion Hall named in his honor. His father was the sexton of Union Baptist Church and they, for a while, lived on the church grounds for which his father was responsible.

A 1953 alumnus of Northampton County High School in Machipongo, Brickhouse received his commission in the U.S. Army through ROTC at Virginia State University (VSU) He was honored recently by VSU, which noted his prowess as a wrestler (1954-57). As an officer, he and many others like him were on the front line in Vietnam.

Major Brickhouse died in action in the Bien Hoa province of Vietnam in 1967. He was survived by his wife and children. His sacrifice is noted on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C. (Panel 32E, Row 61), a permanent monument to his service and sacrifice.

After his demise, Major Brickhouse's widow, Mary Fisher Brickhouse, returned home to the Eastern Shore to raise their children in the Machipongo area. Their oldest, Geraldine, attended Virginia Tech (VT) where she met and married James Barber, a VT football player of some renown. Their twin sons, Ronde and Tiki, had distinguished careers in college and professional football and are sometimes seen on television broadcasts of sports events. Their careers serve as living monuments to their grandfather's life.

Stephen K. Fox was raised in Northampton County and graduated from Northampton County High School in 1967. After practicing law in Fairfax, Va., for 41 years, Mr. Fox is now a full-time resident of Northampton County.

Right To Vote Should be Restored

I was recently reading through the Feb. 24, 2017, edition of your newspaper when I came across an advertisement on page twenty-eight that read "HAD A FELONY? COMPLETED PROBATION/PAROLE? WANT TO VOTE?" I feel that this advertisement, though small in size and tucked deep inside your paper, demands more attention and praise.

Few may know, but the permission of felons to vote is a right that varies by state. While certain states see it as a personal punishment to oust the felon's right to vote, others recognize the importance of having active voters and allowing eligible felons to partake in the system of democracy that our nation was founded on. At first glance it may just look like a ploy to register more voters, but deep down this advertisement has a much larger effect.

The restoration of the right to vote may be seen as a reward for a felon who has put in the time and effort to be reintegrated back into society. Without the right to vote, it is possible for the felon to feel as if they are not worth as much as others who have that privilege and possibly cause them to resort back to crime.

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, 68 percent of released prisoners return to jail within three years, so I find it necessary to implement incentives for criminals who do not return to illegal behavior. The restoration of the constitutional right to vote is a perfect example of one of those incentives to improve successful reintegration rates and reduce the chance that the former offender

will return to crime.

I would like to comment on recent logging activities here on the Shore. Over the last few weeks there have been major clear-cut logging activities in Painter, behind 84 Lumber, and in the Melfa area east of 13. Not only did these activities continue day and night, often they ran every day including Sundays. The harvesters failed to observe reasonable buffers along drainage ditches, and in Melfa, activity actually felled beautiful hardwood trees on clearly flagged private property. In my opinion, it seems out of control and unchecked by officials responsible for protecting affected surrounding property owners, not to mention the ditches that provide vital drainage from our roads and low-lying areas. I do not begrudge property owners from using their land however they wish, but what I do take exception to is lack of mutual respect for those affected by the logging activities. A simple phone call or personal visit from the land owner and/or the logging supervisor to inform the surrounding land owners would certainly go a long way to showing that respect and might serve to diffuse potential problems and ensure all parties affected are clear about the extent of the activity.
