

# Board Baffled by Fund Balance Coupled with New Budget Request

Accomack supervisors were baffled Wednesday night that the school board wants to carryover \$5.7 million while requesting hundreds of thousands to help balance the next fiscal year plan.

A memo from Finance Director Beth Onley listed 15 categories totaling \$5,744,959.37 that was left over from the last budget in state revenues. Supervisors said the school system needs nearly \$500,000 to balance its upcoming 2017-18 plan.

Supervisor Donald Hart said he wanted a detailed report about the unspent monies. The categories were indistinguishable since they were referenced only by a series of numbers. Supervisor Grayson Chesser suggested that the total includes unspent funds for projects like for a new school gym at Kegotank Elementary that is forthcoming. He admitted however, that would not account for all the money.

Last year the school system was accused of hoarding \$6.2 million since 2010, scheming to buy the former

Shore Bank office building in Onley for its central office and building a Rainy Day Fund when the county's plan already includes emergency money for the school system.

Bonds were obtained for the Kegotank project and interest was accruing because the supervisors were unaware the school had a surplus.

Thus the mistrust and lack of communication continues. In the past, supervisors complained that the school division deliberately spends local money first so the county can't take back leftovers.

Acting Administrator Mike Mason,

who also serves as the county's finance director, said while the schools need a small contingency fund to deal with emergencies, the county already has a Rainy Day Fund and another is not needed.

No one from the school system spoke at the session.

## AUDITORS: ACCOMACK FINANCE DEPARTMENT ONE OF STRONGEST IN VA

Accomack got the cleanest possible financial assessment for the last fiscal year, according to the accounting firm that audited county records recently.

"I do think you have one of the strongest finance departments in the state," the auditor from Robinson, Farmer, Cox Associates told the board of supervisors.

The firm also had a few recommendations that pointed to county schools and the treasurer's office. "We noted certain matters involving the internal control structure and other operational matters that are presented for your consideration. This letter does not affect our

report ... on the financial statements. We've never seen any issues but we think it would enhance" the departments to make changes.

In the treasurer's office, it was noted "multiple employees ... have the authority to enter tax write-offs in the system. While there appears to be supporting documentation for the tax write-offs done, there are no procedures in place to review tax write-offs done in the system to ensure that no unauthorized tax write-offs occur. We recommend that the treasurer on a consistent basis (monthly) review a listing of tax write-offs ... to ensure that no unauthorized tax write-offs were entered into the system and document the review that is done."

"During the course of our audit we noted the school board did not file the June reimbursement request for Title VI-B on a timely basis. Title VI-B reimbursement request for the period of June 1, 2016 to June 30, 2016 in the amount of \$237,655.96 was not requested as of October 4, 2016. We recommend the school board establish reimbursement procedures on a monthly basis if expenditures exceed \$10,000 during the current month and that reimbursement requests are filed on a timely basis after the expen-

# Northampton Supervisors Consider Unusual Investment


Northampton supervisors are considering investing in a film being planned for Cape Charles under the direction of television star Corbin Bernsen.

Real estate agent Bill Parr gave an update on a film this week. The entire production would take place in Cape Charles. Bernsen, who is best known as attorney Arnold Becker from the television series L. A. Law, will also act in the movie.

Parr said Bernsen is seeking local investors to assist with production costs. The realtor asked the supervisors to consider investing \$12,500 in the project. He noted that Cape Charles is considering a similar investment. Parr noted he would be asking for funds from the Tourism Infrastructure Committee and the Industri-

al Development Authority for a total local outlay of \$50,000.

Parr said the county would see a return on their investment with the potential for aiding tourism efforts. The supervisors agreed to the concept and said they would study the possibilities.

# Murder Suspect's Charges Would Not Allow Suspended Time if Convicted

Two violent crimes previously committed by murder suspect Winston (PeeWee) Leroy Burton will likely haunt and follow him when he goes to trial for the November 2016 stabbing death of his former girlfriend.

Burton was initially charged with first-degree murder of Shelli Lou Crockett, 42, of Keller, a hospital worker, who was attacked just outside the walls of the now shutdown Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital in Nassawadox.

She died a short time later in the emergency room around the time that Burton confessed to the crimes when he showed up at the sheriff's office that day.

This week, a Northampton Grand Jury indicted the 58-year-old Cheriton man on two charges, first-degree murder and abduction. Both counts are under third-strike provisions that carry mandatory life sentences as opposed to 20 years to life for murder and 10 years for abduction. The statute does not allow the circuit court judge to suspend any of the sentences.

So while Commonwealth's Attorney

Bruce Jones will try to get in as much evidence about prior convictions as he can, defense lawyer Carl Bundick will try to get any reference to Burton's criminal record kept away from a jury.

Sealed were evaluations made in February regarding Burton's sanity. The results of competency to stand trial were not discussed at his preliminary hearing, but the hearing proceeded as scheduled, with indictments being handed down Monday. The finding of his sanity at the time of the offense has also not been disclosed.

Bundick might use the evaluations "to assist in the development of an insanity defense," according to court documents. The evaluations would include whether Burton "had a significant mental disease or defect, which rendered him insane at the time of the offense."

Crockett worked at the hospital for about 10 years. A member of the environmental services team, she arrived at the facility on Nov. 28, 2016, like she did most mornings. Before she could get inside, she was stopped by a man she apparently didn't want to see anymore.

Crockett was in the parking lot behind the hospital when she was stabbed multiple times. She tried to fend off the blows. The assailant fled. Crockett died a short time later. Burton was later brought back to the hospital for treatment of wounds he sustained in the attack. He had an injured and bleeding hand and admitted to officers at the jail that he had stabbed Crockett. He said he had been hearing voices.

# CHINCOTEAGUE GRABS \$1.5 MILLION GRANT

Main thoroughfares for bicycles and pedestrians on Chincoteague Island that lead to the National Wildlife Refuge will get safety boosts with \$1.5 million that was transferred to the town recently by the agency, according to an announcement made by the refuge.

Since 2008, the refuge, town and Accomack County have joined together on several projects including the paving of refuge bike trails, the installation of an elevated bike path and the addition of bike lanes along Maddox Boulevard.

As partners, refuge officials said they recognize the importance of providing safe access for tourists, who

help generate an estimated \$50 million annually in tourism for Chincoteague and \$200 million for Virginia's Eastern Shore.

Tourism is the main economic generator on the island. The refuge is a popular destination, with over a million tourists a year, who visit for beach recreation, wildlife viewing and photography opportunities.

The funds were obtained by the refuge from the Federal Transit Administration through the Paul S. Sarbanes Transit in the Parks Program. Funds from Sarbanes Program are used to conserve resources, reduce congestion, enhance the visitor experience and ensure access for all in and around public lands.

# Board Blesses Boundary Adjustment and Grant Request for Eastville

Northampton Supervisors voted Tuesday to support Eastern Shore Rural Health's quest for a \$700,000 community development block grant that could provide additional funding for a new medical center south of the Eastville traffic signal.

Attorney Denise Bland, who represents Rural Health, said the facility is needed to replace two aging centers in Franktown and Bayview.

Chairman Spencer Murray said he was hopeful the new center would encourage additional growth in Eastville. Town leaders also asked that the municipality's boundary be adjusted to encourage commercial and residential growth.

Mayor Jim Sturgis said some residents who received the benefit of town water are not actually living in the town limits. He read letters from many of the same residents who want to become official residents of the town.

Those areas extend to the south

along Business Route 13 to a point just north of Stumptown Road. To the north, the new boundary would extend to a point near Old Town Neck Road and to the east to an area near Seaside Road.

Resident Denise Drayton stated she saw it as a plus for residents who have to pay for their own streetlights and do not benefit from the town's police department nor have sidewalks.

The supervisors briefly discussed the plan and then voted unanimously to endorse Eastville's request, which can now go to the circuit court for final approval.

The board also approved a special use permit for Thomas and Lauren Gardner that would allow them to operate a bakery from their home at 26223 Lankford Hwy. near Capeville. Lauren Gardner explained she would bake the goods in her kitchen and sell them off-site. She added she would comply with USDA regulations.

The supervisors also gave a minor

special use permit to Christopher Evans for an accessory single-family detached dwelling, a single-wide mobile home, on his property at 6350 Cheri Ln. in Machipongo. Evans said he intends to construct a 50-foot by 70-foot home but needed to live in the mobile home until the project is finished.

The supervisors also approved emergency spending for Northampton High School due to repair the HVAC system. When the system failed, it resulted in substantial flooding in the office area and damage to the facility. Superintendent Eddie Lawrence advised the county's insurance policy would cover the cost, minus a \$1,000 deductible, and that once the insurance check was received, the county would be reimbursed.

The board reviewed its delinquent tax policy and fielded a concern by Birdsnest resident Jeff Walker. Walker wanted the county to identify delinquent business owners, who in some cases are listed as limited liability companies. The board sent

the issue to the county's legal staff for review.

# TASLEY FIRE CO. GIVING AWAY "FREE" WHISPERING PINES HOUSE

The best things in life are free. That statement includes a house that is being offered up right now by the Tasley Volunteer Fire Company.

A bungalow that was once part of the town's historic Whispering Pines Motel is being given away by the fire-fighters. They want it moved so the land and an adjoining parcel can be cleared to make way for a new fire house and storage building between Tasley Road and Lankford Highway at the traffic light near Accomac.

"If we cannot find someone to take the house," company President Don Amadeo said Tuesday, "we will have to tear it down. We would really rather someone have it than to destroy it. It's a nice little house with ties to a Shore landmark."

The circa 1930s two-bedroom wood-frame structure was once a manager's house where people who ran the motel lived. The cozy entryway has a view of French doors that open to the living room. There's a dining room, kitchen, laundry and utility room. It would be perfect for a first-time owner or retired couple. In addition, the attic is floored and could easily be turned into more living space, Amadeo said. "So make a commitment to move it and it's yours."

The cost of taking it away has been estimated at about \$30,000. The height

will cause the roof to be moved separately. According to county records, the house and lot was sold in 2016 for \$50,000. The house was valued at \$34,000.

Chief Jeff Beall said the house was first offered to nonprofits, which either didn't have the funds to move or store it or didn't have the property to put it on. Others have shown interest but haven't committed.

That lot and an adjoining parcel are going to be cleared so the 10,400 square-foot fire house can be erected. A 1,600-square foot storage facility will also be installed along with a new septic system and parking lot. The project is estimated at \$650,000.

The tall pines on the lot will be cleared as well. "It's going to be land-scaped," said Amadeo. Eastern red cedars will line the highway side and azaleas, which were a trademark of the motel, will be added. "We just want to start fresh and not build around other trees."

The project is slated to begin this summer. Another house on the site burned down in the 1990s but the foundation remains and will also have to be removed.

Anyone who is interested in the house, should email the company at tasleyfireco@gmail.com or call the station at 757-787-7870 and leave a

message. "We're going to ask that you sign a letter of commitment, that the house would be removed in 45 days," Amadeo said.

There are 27 active members in new station next spring.

"The School Board's budget had not been entered into the accounting system," a letter to the board continued, "We recommend the school board enter the budget amounts into the accounting system near the start of the fiscal year. This provides a mechanism ... to track budget to actual results as well as timely track budget amendments made throughout the year ... Not having the budget infor-

The letter also stated, "One of the intermillion in monies and pledges, a new nal control procedures the county has in place is to reconcile state and federal revenues recorded in the general ledger to the quarterly disbursement reports ... to ensure the completeness and accuracy" of state and federal revenues.

"Statements of Economic Interest forms are required to be filed semiannually by the board of supervisors, school board members and constitutional officers. These forms are to be filed by June 15 and Dec. 15 each year. We noted several instances in which these forms were filed after the due dates. > Officials have mentioned that the current library could serve as office space, possibly for the school division.



We can take "advantage of Library of Virginia," Burton said. "We haven't really been taking full advantage of because we didn't have the staff person."

The latest step is to retain architectural services for the project. Burton said they are unsure at this point if the library will be built in phases. There is a potential that Parksley will receive a \$700,000 grant, she also stated.

The town already got a \$5,000 downtown revitalization grant. In addition, a festival is being planned for 1 to 4 p.m., April 30, at the library site, for the hispanic celebration of Day of the Children.



# Felony Indictments Include Battery of Deputy

A Capeville man whose son is being held for attempting to kill him was indicted by a Northampton Grand Jury on several felony and misdemeanor charges.

Alexander Cleveland Sr., 58, of Arlington Road in Capeville, was indicted on counts of assault and battery of a family member, disorderly conduct, drunk in public, assault and battery of Deputy Barry Randall and resisting arrest in connection with incidents that occurred last Christmas.

## Shooter Arrested With Gun

A man responsible for the 2009 shooting death of a local college student is out of prison and was recently charged with two felonies.

Kendrick Di'ke Duffy, 25, of Parksley Road in Parksley, was arrested last week and accused of disregarding a police officer's command (eluding) and possession of a firearm by a violent felon. He is being held in Accomack Jail on the alleged March 8, 2017, offenses.

Deputy Eric Nottingham of Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) investigated the incidents. The cases were continued in Accomack General District Court until May

Duffy was initially charged with murdering Bobby Oneal Ballard, 20, of Saxis Road in Temperanceville, in August 2009. Ballard, a college junior, was at the Royal Farms at Fisher's Corner when he was shot in the head and died a short time later.

In a bargaining agreement with former Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar, Duffy pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter and was sentenced to 10 years in prison with four years and four months suspended.

Evidence showed that the men in a car with Ballard assaulted those in another vehicle with Duffy and attempted to take the car keys to keep them from leaving the scene. Ballard was not involved in the altercation.

Three seconds after the car with Duffy drove away from the fight, Duffy sat on the car window ledge and shot at the group of adversaries. The victim, who was sitting in the back seat of the other car, was hit with a 32-caliber bullet.

# Case of 100 Marijuana Plants

A charge of illegal drug distribution that was made against a Hallwood man who was caught last summer with 100 marijuana plants valued at \$300,000 will not be prosecuted, according to records filed Monday in Accomack General District Court.

A judge found probable cause to certify a count of distributing less than five pounds of the drug against Donald Wyanne Rice, 59, of Marshall Street. The grand jury will decide whether to indict Rice on that charge next month.

In addition to the plants, which were in various stages of growth, hydroponic tubes, lights, ventilation systems and electric converters were found at Rice's home last July. The value was based on a high-quality plant having the potential to yield a pound of high-quality marijuana valued at an average of \$3,500.

# VDACS Advises Poultry Farmers To Protect Against Avian Flu

The United States Department of Agriculture has confirmed the presence of highly pathogenic H7 avian influenza (HPAI) of North American wild bird lineage in a commercial chicken breeder flock in Lincoln County, Tenn. This strain is not a concern for human health. The flock of 73,500 is located within the Mississippi flyway. State officials quarantined the affected premises and birds on the property were killed to prevent the spread of the disease. Birds from the flock will not enter the food system.

Dr. Charles Broaddus, State Veterinarian with the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS), advises bird owners to protect their flocks by the following:

- · Practice biosecurity every day diseases are often spread by animals, equipment or clothing, so focusing on these areas can reduce the chance of infection. This is the time to take all measures possible to prevent the spread of disease.
- · Prevent poultry from accessing areas where waterfowl may be present and minimize the chance of spreading disease

from tracking infectious waterfowl droppings into poultry housing areas.

- · Wear separate, clean footwear and clothing used just in the poultry area when working with your birds.
- $\cdot$  Don't share any equipment between flocks.
- · Don't move birds between flocks. For backyard poultry owners who obtain new birds, isolate them for two weeks and monitor them for disease signs before adding to your flock.
- · Report any signs of sickness in birds or increased deaths in your flock to VDACS.

For more information about biosecurity measures and plans, or to report increased poultry mortality, flock owners should contact the VDACS State Veterinarian's Office at 804.692.0601 or their local Office of Veterinary Services at one of the Regional Animal Health Diagnostic Laboratories. # Firebirds' Cheerleading Aims to Fly to New Heights Next Season

In the midst of afterschool cancellations on a wet and dreary Tuesday afternoon, the coaching staff of the Arcadia High School cheer squad held their second session in what would be a three-day try-out process for the 2017-18 team.

They have seen a lot of talent – young talent at that – and want to give everyone an opportunity.

"It's not always about what you can do, it's how you use what you have," Smith tells the group.

In order to find the right people for the upcoming season, they are using a point-system scoring process for the tryouts, with two days of practice beforehand to properly teach, help and prepare the aspiring cheerleaders. Each part is worth up to ten points, with every person eligible to score a maximum of 90 points; for anyone who is able to tumble, they have the opportunity to earn up to 10 additional points.

The team will lose two guys and five girls of their 16-person roster. Next year, he hopes to take 18.

"It's definitely a rebuilding year," notes Smith.

During his senior year, Smith, who

was a captain, states they broke Nandua's 11-year district championship winstreak. He and Matthews went on to claim 10 more titles, dropping the 2010 championship to Nandua, but coincidentally, earned their best finishes to date at regionals and states, second and fourth, respectively.

Smith was also the only male on the team until 2006, when he reflects that a group of guys came in, joking about trying out. They could tumble; something the team was lacking at the time. Since, the Firebirds have over half of their squad with tumbling skills.

With rebuilding on the horizon, Smith wants to make sure the team is as prepared as possible to succeed, but also, he wants to make some unique, exciting changes.

"This year, basically what we want to do is get out of the box. Do things that are different and not-so-normal. Just like having the JV and varsity teams. Shake things up a bit," explained Smith, "But, the main thing is team building. Making sure we are one. Our motto last year was, 'You are my teammate and I can't win without you.' We said that before every competition; before every practice. It will continue to be our motto, but for this year [our new motto] will be, 'Chasing states."

Smith also feels that the key to find-

ing a place at states is to work hard and aim high.

"I feel like if I prepare them to try and make it to states, they should do well at the other competitions. Aim high. We expect a lot, so they already know we are going to push them to their limits. I am excited," says Smith.







# Irish Soda Bread:

#### By Connie Morrison

Makes two small loaves.

\*\*The secret to tender bread is to use a light hand with the dough, as you would with biscuits.

#### **Ingredients**

- •1/4 cup (1/2 stick) unsalted butter
- •3 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- •1/2 cup old-fashioned or quick oats
- •2 tablespoon sugar
- •1 tablespoon chopped fresh rosemary or 2 drops rosemary essential oil
- •2 teaspoons baking powder
- •1 teaspoon baking soda
- •1 teaspoon salt
- •1 3/4 cups buttermilk
- •1 egg white, beaten to blend

#### **Preparation**

Preheat to 375°F. Stir butter in heavy small saucepan over medium heat until melted and golden brown, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat.

Stir flour, oats, sugar, rosemary, baking powder, baking soda, and salt in large bowl to blend. If using rosemary essential oil, add to buttermilk, then pour buttermilk and melted browned butter over flour mixture; stir with fork until flour mixture is moistened.

Turn dough out onto floured work surface. Knead gently until dough comes together. Divide in half. Shape each half into ball; flatten each into 6-inch round. Place rounds on ungreased baking sheet, spacing 5 inches apart. Brush tops with beaten egg white. Make an X in top of each dough round, cutting about 1/2" into the dough.

Bake breads until deep golden brown, 35- 45 minutes. Cool breads on rack at least 30 minutes. Serve warm or at room temperature.

# Colcannon:

By Connie Morrison Makes four large servings:

#### *Ingredients*

- •5 medium Yukon Gold potatoes (about 1¾ pounds)
- Kosher salt
- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, divided
- •2 leeks, white and pale-green parts only, sliced in half lengthwise, thinly sliced crosswise
- 2 garlic cloves, thinly sliced
- •2 cups (packed) shredded cabbage (from about ¼ large head), divided
- 1 3/4 cups half-and-half
- Freshly ground black pepper--

#### **Preparation**

Boil potatoes over medium-high heat, then reduce heat and simmer until fork tender. Drain, let cool slightly, and peel. Meanwhile, melt 4 Tbsp. butter in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add leeks and cook, stirring frequently, until soft, about 8 minutes. Add garlic and cook, stirring frequently, until garlic is fragrant and leeks are just beginning to brown around the edges, about another 2-3 minutes. Add 1 cup cabbage and cook, stirring constantly, until wilted. Add milk and cream and bring to a simmer.

Add remaining 1 cup cabbage, cook until wilted, then add potatoes, cut into quarters. Allow to warm slightly, then coarsely mash together with cabbage and leeks with a potato masher. Season with salt and pepper.

Transfer colcannon to a large serving bowl. Top with remaining 2 Tbsp. butter and sprinkle with scallion.

- 11/4 CUPS SOUR CREAM
- ·2 EGGS
- Powdered sugar for dusting (optional)
- ~1 rectangular aluminum foil pan or cake pan, approximately 13 X 9
- ~2-INCH DEEP BAKING PAN

#### DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 325. Grease 13 X 9 pan.

PUT THE BUTTER, SYRUP, DARK BROWN SUGAR, STOUT, GINGER, CINNAMON AND GROUND CLOVES INTO A SAUCE PAN AND MELT SLOWLY OVER A LOW HEAT.

Take mixture off heat and whisk in the flour and baking soda. Whisk thoroughly to remove any lumps.

Whisk the sour cream and eggs together in separate container, then beat into the gingerbread mixture, whisk until batter is smooth.

Pour batter into pan, and bake for about 45 minutes; when it's ready it will be gleamingly risen at the centre, and coming away from the pan

# "50-Something" Student: Dream It, Do It

Dreams can come true. But they take courage, hard work, support, and finally, a place for it all to begin.

Deborah Eder understands this elusive truth very well. She worked for 20 years as a cook and manager in a local business, but there was no real opportunity to grow or earn much more than minimum wage.

"I always wanted to work with kids," she said. "I had an inkling that was something I was supposed to do with my life.

"But I was scared. It's hard to step out of the box that you create for yourself over time, but a few people kept pushing me, encouraging me, my friends and family, but especially my sister, Robin, and my daughter, Melissa Jones. My daughter was my cheerleader, my everything, and she helped me believe in myself and believe I could make a change in my life. She finally talked me into going up to Eastern Shore Community College (ESCC), and she helped me with the application and all the other paperwork. She was right there the whole time. So I took the placement test and did pretty well, even though I was a little bumpy with the math.

"When I started classes I was so scared. Here I was, 50-something, going back to school. I was afraid I wouldn't be able to do it. But everybody at the college was so helpful and kind. It was amazing.

"I had always wanted to work with kids. That was my dream. My original plan was to become an IA, which is an Instructional Assistant. That is why I enrolled in Professor Stephanie Zodun's Early Childhood Education Program. And I have to tell you she was wonderful, awesome. She helped me so much. She has always been right there; always there no matter what I needed. I can't tell you how grateful I am to her.

"So I was still working as a cook while I was taking classes, and I thought it would be a good idea to get started in the school system. So I went to the Northampton County Schools central office in Machipongo and put in my application to be a substitute teacher. Then in the summer of 2015, in July, I got a call from the central office about working as a BSA; that's a behavior support aid. Even though I had applied to be a substitute, they knew I had a grandson who is non-verbal autistic and had experience working with him. So I started working that summer as a be-

havior support aid in a special education classroom that serves students with disabilities, including children with autism. I've been there ever since. I also work at the Migrant Head Start with kids 6 weeks to 4 years of age. I like that very much. You know, I look around now and realize I'm doing it: I'm making my dream come true.

"I only have one more class and I will complete my degree," she says proudly.

But Deborah Eder is not finished. "Now it is my goal to continue my education and get a bachelor's and even maybe a master's degree. I want to become a

certified teacher, have my own classroom and work with special needs students."

The tone in her voice is full of confidence, gratitude and even a little wonder.

"When I look back now," she says, "I can't believe how far I've come. I would encourage anyone with a dream, anyone who has some idea for a better life, to believe in themselves, to believe in their dreams. And I would especially encourage them to come up to the community college and get started. Make that first step, because it's better than I ever imagined, and ESCC is just such a wonderful place to begin."







ginia Agriculture Week and the ideal time to give some thought – and some thanks – to our farmers for all they do, all year round, for all of us.

No matter which food tops your list – barbecued chicken, juicy steaks, fluffy scrambled eggs, sweet strawberries, peanut butter sandwiches, steamed crabs, corn on the cob, ice-cold milk, thinly sliced country ham, local wine or beer, and more – you can thank a farmer for all the plowing, planting, growing, cultivating and harvesting it took to put it on your table.

Virginia farmers also deserve a pat on the back for agriculture's amazing diversity in the Commonwealth. Food is just the beginning. Also consider horses, lumber and wood products, wool and cotton fiber, bedding and garden plants, Christmas trees, tobacco, sod, foliage plants and cut flowers. For more than 400 years, farmers have provided Virginians with food, fiber and other essentials despite soaring temperatures, plummeting prices, daunting regulations and fluctuating market conditions.

Thank them, too, for constantly striving to improve agriculture over the last four centuries. By using innovative technology, the latest scientific information and a lot of hard work, farmers have increased agricultural efficiency. In the 1930s, one farmer supplied enough food for 9.8 people in the U.S. and abroad; by the 1960s, the number had grown to 25.8 people. In the 1990s, each farmer was feeding 129 people, and today a farmer is able to feed his or her own family plus 155

additional people around the world.

If you need another reason to thank a farmer, consider this: they are the people who provide you with green meadows, clear streams, beautiful vistas and a bunch of really cool equipment and adorable animals that they might let you ride, feed or pet if you stopped by. The least you could do during Virginia Agriculture Week is to thank them by buying Virginia grown or raised products wherever you shop.
