March of Dimes Ambassador Is All Heart

When Maya Nowicki trots into a coffee shop, all heads turn. At 2 years old, she already carries herself with style. Little white Chuck Taylor shoes, hot-pink glasses, ringlet brown curls, and the cutest gold earrings marked Maya as she ran up and down the inclined coffee shop walkway in Onley last Friday. Her parents took rapid sips of their coffee as Maya stayed active. What none of the shop's patrons knew is that they were in the presence of walking miracle.

Maya was born with hypoplastic right ventricle, a congenital heart defect where the right ventricle of the heart doesn't develop properly. Maya and her parents Tabatha and Martin Nowicki are the 2017 March of Dimes (MOD) Ambassador Family.

"One in 100 babies is affected by a birth defect of the heart," said Susan Turner, Eastern Shore community director for the MOD. "Our little Maya is one of these children. We're just elated to have them as our ambassador family because not everyone realizes that we also focus on birth defects and promote education."

When Tabatha Nowicki was seven-and-a-half-months pregnant, she stopped feeling Maya move. During a doctor's visit, her condition was discovered. Maya was born two weeks early via cesarean section. She had her first open-heart surgery at a little over one week old at Children's Hospital of The King's Daughters (CHKD). Complications and setbacks prevented her mom from fully holding her until she was almost two months old.

Just after the first surgery, Martin and Tabatha thought they were going to lose their little girl. At 2:30 a.m., on a cold winter morning, Maya went into cardiac arrest. The doctors and staff at CHKD did CPR for 45 minutes and went into a bedside surgery. The doctor massaged Maya's heart in his hands and kept her alive. The first surgery had produced a clot and the massaging of the heart helped dissipate it, according to her parents. For the next two weeks, Maya's chest was left open.

"She had less than a ten percent chance of survival," said Tabatha No-

FINANCE DIRECTOR ADDRESSES SUPERVISORS' BUDGET CONCERNS

Accomack County Public Schools Finance Director Beth Onley explained it all away Tuesday night when she spoke before the school board about the Board of Supervisors confusion with understanding school spending.

There is "no smoke and mirrors. It's all transparent. All have been discussed in open meetings. There are no surprises," said Onley. "Every dime is earmarked for

projects." She contended that Superintendent Chris Holland spoke at length with eight of the nine supervisors about the projects that are earmarked with the millions in carryover monies.

"Yes, there are a lot of account numbers," she said, adding the reason projects are referred to that way is they haven't gone to bid yet. It is to ensure that contractors don't know how much they have to spend.

Onley also included textbooks that had

not yet been purchased and usually weren't bought until after the end of the fiscal year; buses that the division needs and metal roofs that are going to be installed at some schools. "We are securing quotes for roofs at elementary schools, going with metal. Clearly we're not going to have them on by June 30, 2017. It's not that they are new items. It's not that we are not spending the money. It takes

Cape Charles Council Bans Tethering of Unattended Animals

The Cape Charles Town Council has enacted a provision that will make leaving a tethered animal unattended a Class 4 misdemeanor.

The amendment to the current animal tethering ordinance was recommended to the council by the planning commission. Councilman Andy Buchholz stressed the need to update the current ordinance in light of recent instances of animals being reported as improperly tethered in Accomack County.

Councilman Sambo Brown pointed out that if enacted, the ordinance would pose an issue for visitors as well as residents who tether animals, even for a few minutes, to enter a merchant's shop. Police Chief Jim Pruitt said that if enacted by the council, his officers would have no opportunity to issue a warning for the offense. He added the case would require the town's attorney to prosecute and that anyone who was charged would need to return to the county for the trial. Class 4 Misdemeanors carry a \$250 fine for the first offense. Brown noted that a conviction of a Class 4 misdemeanor stays on the person's record for life.

Following additional discussion, the ordinance amendment passed on a vote of 4-2, with Brown and Councilman Chris Bannon voting against.

Council reviewed a request to support a possible movie that was being proposed for production within the town. A similar request for support was made at a recent board of supervisor session in Eastville. According to the proposal, the county, the town, the county's tourism commission, and the industrial development authority would each be asked to invest \$12,500 in the project, with the expectation that there would be a return on their investment if the movie is successful. Additional funding for the project is being sought from other sources.

Mayor George Proto questioned if it was legal for a municipality to invest in such a project, and said he thought it

was better to invest in the community as opposed to the movie. Several council members echoed the mayor's concerns and expressed opposition to the proposal. Following additional discussion, the council chose not to invest in the project.

Council reviewed a recommendation by Director of Public Works and Utilities Dave Fauber to accept a one-year contract extension for Browder-Hite company for grounds maintenance services. The contract calls for a total mowing service of \$24,025. Council agreed unanimously to accept Fauber's recommendation.

In a financial action of the evening, the Council agreed unanimously to accept a grant/loan contract for the purchase of a new police vehicle. The contract will provide \$10,100 in grant proceeds with the remaining \$18,800 to be obtained by the town as a loan.

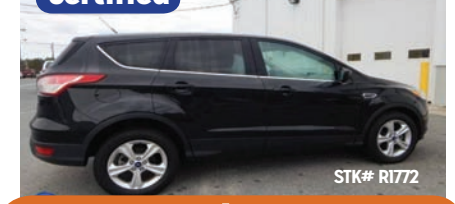

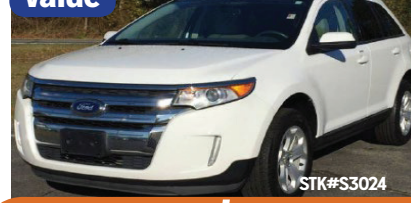

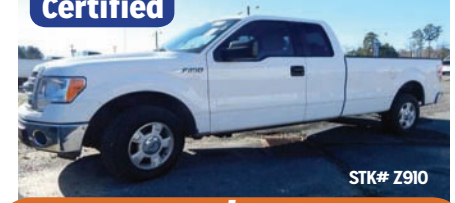

time," she said. "It's a huge project."

Chief of Operations and Management Mike Tolbert said it was because they are careful about how the monies are spent.

"I'd be happy to extend the Power Point to board of supervisors," Onley added. But there was no Power Point presentation visible on the online school board agenda.

Accomack supervisors discussed the school board's request to carryover \$5.7 million while requesting hundreds of thousands to help balance the next fiscal year plan. The 15 categories that were in a memo from Onley totaled \$5,744,959.37.

Onley also said the issues noted in a county audit regarding the school board were wrong because the division uses a different process than the county. She said had she been asked by the auditor, she would have explained.

Another controversy involved the Virginia Aerospace Science & Technology

Scholars (VASTS) program that was discussed with the school board by Tamara Sterling, director of secondary schools. While students have been participating in the program for eight years, members wanted to know why there were students who did not know about the program's dual enrollment.

According to the presentation, "VASTS does not have a formal agreement in place with every school division in the state to provide high school credit as well. Therefore, you will need to talk with your guidance counselor to determine if the VASTS online course meets any of your school division's requirements for a science or elective course."

The presentation also noted, "The VASTS program is posted on all the school websites. Program information is posted in the high school guidance office. TAG teachers meet with students and encourage them to apply. VASTS program information is announced over the intercom during the designated announcement times. VASTS is open to any student that would like to apply that meets the qualifications for the program. Household income is not taken in-

to consideration in the application process. Accomack students have applied and are accepted each year since the start of the program."

A parent complained that the pro-

gram was not on the website and that his daughter did not know about it. She was first in the class but lost that status because someone else got credit through the program. "It's unfair," he said.

Funding Available for Duck Habitat

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NCRS) is now accepting applications from Virginia farmers and landowners interested in installing conservation practices to help bring the American black duck back to the tidal marshes and mudflats of the Atlantic Flyway.

Once the most abundant dabbling duck in eastern North America, the American black duck is now facing a significant decline due to habitat loss and degradation. NRCS is offering financial and technical assistance to restore and manage tidal and floodplain wetland habitats; non-tidal wetlands on crop and forestland; and healthy riparian areas or streams in targeted areas in Delaware, New Jersey, Maryland, and Virginia.

Black ducks thrive in the brackish pools between salt and fresh waters with adjacent croplands — sites tradi-

tionally found along coastlines. Funding is available for retiring crop production on lands affected by saltwater intrusion and planting salt tolerant species to create ideal black duck habitat. Other available practices include shallow water areas for wildlife, forested wetland restoration, and invasive Phragmites control to restore salt marsh habitat. Interested applicants are encouraged to sign up before April 21 to be eligible for limited fiscal year 2017 funding.

"This focused habitat restoration will also benefit the northern pintail, mallard, teal, and many other waterfowl and wildlife species," said Jack Bricker, Virginia state conservationist. "These targeted conservation practices will also improve water quality and help producers facing tidal flooding and saltwater intrusion to improve the condition of their crop fields."

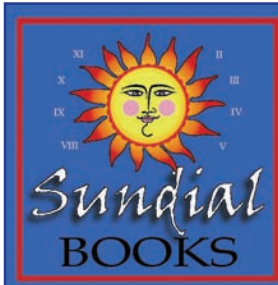

wicki. "She was fighting the odds. On paper she shouldn't be here."

"Our goal is to raise awareness. We have been focusing on heart awareness over the last year with the American Heart Association and the Mayo Clinic," said Martin Nowicki, amidst chants from Maya of "Up, Upp, Uppp!"

The next open-heart surgery will take place later this year in October. This is the third surgery in the Fontan procedure, which redirects blood to the pulmonary system and helps reduce the strain of the already overworked ventricle.

But there's a lot more in the future for the little girl who likes Curious George. She's also quite the social kid, although she does get tired quickly. "She meets new friends wherever she goes," said Tabatha Nowicki. Thoughts

of pre-school have circulated between her mom and dad, but concerns over her immune system have paused the conversation for now. Her long eyelashes bat against her doll-like fuchsia spectacles, as she curls against her mom's chest. Nap time is very close now.

This year's walk will be held at the Historic Onancock School on May 7 starting at 9 a.m. Turner and an expected turn-out of 200 to 250 people are trying to raise \$54,000 this year.

"Without the sponsors and teams that have participated on the Eastern Shore, we would not be able to do this," said Turner.

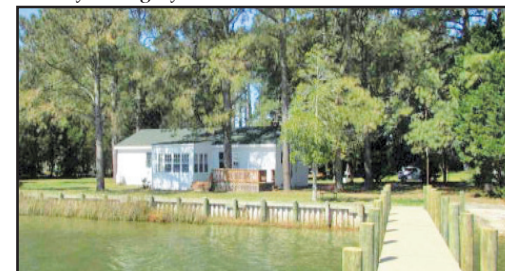

Shore Folks Share Mixed Feelings on Daylight Savings Time

Daylight savings time is here to give light and rejuvenation to some folks in Accomack and Northampton counties. But to others it provides irregular sleep patterns and weeks of feeling off kilter.

"I don't like ... it because I lose an hour of sleep and have to adjust, but I also like a longer day," Matt Cormons, of Hopeton, wrote in an email response to the Eastern Shore Post. "It bothers me that the main reason may be commercial (because) more daylight leads to more business. I'm sure those who profit from it love it." Cormons has two clocks in the house and one in each vehicle. "All have been changed."

Sam Serio, of Melfa, has the opposite reaction. "I have a feeling of re-birth and revitalization," he said. "The eight clocks in my house are all updated - vehicles, not so much."

Amy Eckard, of Temperanceville, said she had no issue with setting her clocks ahead an hour. "I didn't have to because I never set them back in the fall! The change really doesn't effect (sic) me. I use my cell phone for my alarm clock, so it automatically changes. Darkness doesn't bother me in the morning or early afternoon. I just go with the flow."

"We Love It," John Ward, of Captain's Cove, said of daylight savings time. His six clocks were changed.

Sheila Walker, of Onancock, said, "Setting my clock ahead was wonderful! I enjoyed extra daylight and adjusted well to losing an hour of sleep. It surely will motivate me to walk after 5 p.m. I have five clocks, all have been changed including my vehicle."

Jane Silveria, of Florida, grew up on Chincoteague and owns a home on the island. "I hate it," she said of the time change. "My dog can't get used to the time, I can't go to sleep on time and am tired in the morning." Silveria has six clocks and has changed the time on each of them.

Carrie Jacobson, of Wachapreague, loves "having more light at the end of the day, but I'm a morning person, and regret that dawn is coming later. I do believe that the long afternoons cheer me up. Five clocks in the house, two in the car, I changed all of them. We used to let them go for ages and ages, some-

times until the time changed again. But I'm trying to do things instead of thinking about doing them, and so I got on the clocks right away."

Ken and Mary Dufty, of Exmore, wrote, "Frankly, we could do without it. We try to anticipate the change by go-



ing to bed earlier in the week before the event, but this year it snuck up on us. We are tired as we write this reply. As we are in the clock repair business, at any given time we have anywhere from 10 to 20 clocks running on a daily basis. Thus, another reason for not being fans of having to change all those clocks on a sleepy Sunday morning."

Gladys Sample Andrews, of Northampton, currently lives in Portsmouth and isn't concerned about time. "Now that I am retired, I don't bother to change the clocks. "Computer will auto adjust," she said.

"I love Daylight Savings Time," wrote Robert Doughty, of South Chesconessex. "The effects are purely positive. I can spend more time in the yard, garden and on the water, fishing. We have about 14 time pieces including alarm clocks. Yes, all have been changed including the ones in the vehicles."

"I don't like that it was a 23-hour day for Sunday," Angie H. Crutchley, of Exmore, said.

"BUT I am glad that it does fall on

Sunday and not a day of the week. I like the dark and cold better than the light and warmth, so I prefer when the clocks 'fall' back. I have my clock on my stove and coffee maker (there's also one on the microwave, but I never change that anyway). I have changed

not the one on the microwave. My vehicle changes automatically."

"Wish we didn't have it but it probably benefits something," wrote Nancy Kemble of Bloxom. "Makes one cranky for a few days! Lots of clocks. Lots of laughs trying to remember all the different directions on changing each of them."

"Although I like it being light longer, the time change affects my body clock in a negative way," wrote Heather Finch of Sanford. "I am a night person and you would think it is a good thing for me but I get all out of whack. It's even harder to get out of bed in the morning. My boyfriend Joe Martin is a morning person. I don't think it affects him. He wakes up at around 4 every morning (from) years of being a waterman."

Bill Payne, of Cape Charles, says, "It takes a day or two for the internal clock to adjust; however, DST is the right environmental/ecological thing to do." He was about 10 clocks and has changed them all.

Julie Kelley, of Exmore, enjoys the extra day light. But, she hasn't changed any of the three clocks in her house yet. "Not even the one in my car," she added.

Richard McDowell, of Pungoteague, says it's "OK on my electronics but my wrist watch is a ... to change." He has four clocks "but the Atomic clock changes itself from WWV radio."

"It doesn't bother me to change the clocks forwards or backwards," Denise Bowden, of Chincoteague Island, wrote. "Time marches on one way or another. One clock in the house, four vehicles and all are changed. I'm kind of OCD like that."

Nancy Goffigon, of Capeville, said she loves "having more daylight hours in the evening. I have six clocks that are being used. All of them were changed Saturday night and the clock in our vehicle was changed the next day even though I had to read the manual to figure it out."

"I am from a farming family, so our clock has always been the sun," wrote Rita Kelley of Silver Beach. "But it does mess me up for a couple of days."

"It gives me a lift, knowing that I'm closer to getting the boat in the water again," said John Boddie of Onancock. "I wish they would leave it alone one way or another," added Judy Brunk of Jamesville. She had six clocks to change.

them all and in my car too."

Blandy Davis, of Onancock, wrote of her "LOVE" for the time change. "I like it staying light later in the evening, so many things to do outside after work!" She set the clocks back last Saturday night and on Sunday did the car clock "when I got in it."

Linda Rew, of Onley, also loves daylight savings. "It seems I have lots more energy in the mornings and evenings after getting off work. I get more things done with daylight. Six clocks in the household. My husband gets excited and wants them all changed the day before and then I am running around the house saying, 'Oh my, it is 5 o'clock already' and it is actually 4! We definitely will not forget as long as he is in the household. Yes, the vehicles have been changed as well."

"I really do not like losing the hour, but it is a small price to pay for longer days, which I really like," wrote Lisa C. Johnson of Horntown. "The time change has minimal negative impacts, normally not much beyond adjusting the first few days. Three clocks, which had to be changed manually. Two are changed,

Two Charged Earlier in Northampton, Now Charged in Accomack

Cape Charles Man Sentenced for Bad Checks

A Cape Charles man was sentenced Monday in Northampton Circuit Court to two counts of forging checks, ac-

ording to Commonwealth's Attorney Bruce Jones.

Fred Kennedy Kellam, 27, was given three years on each count to run concurrently with all but 10 days suspended. The incidents occurred Sept. 16, 2015.

Locals Fear Effects of Coast Guard Cuts

Local officials are seeking the help of Rep. Scott Taylor in continuing to secure the presence of the U.S. Coast Guard in local waters despite a proposed 14 percent or \$1.3 billion in cuts to the agency's fiscal 2018 budget.

John W. Joeckel, Chairman of the Eastern Shore Regional Navigable Waterways Committee, started the crusade in a letter he sent to Taylor earlier this month. Local supervisors have joined him in voicing their dismay.

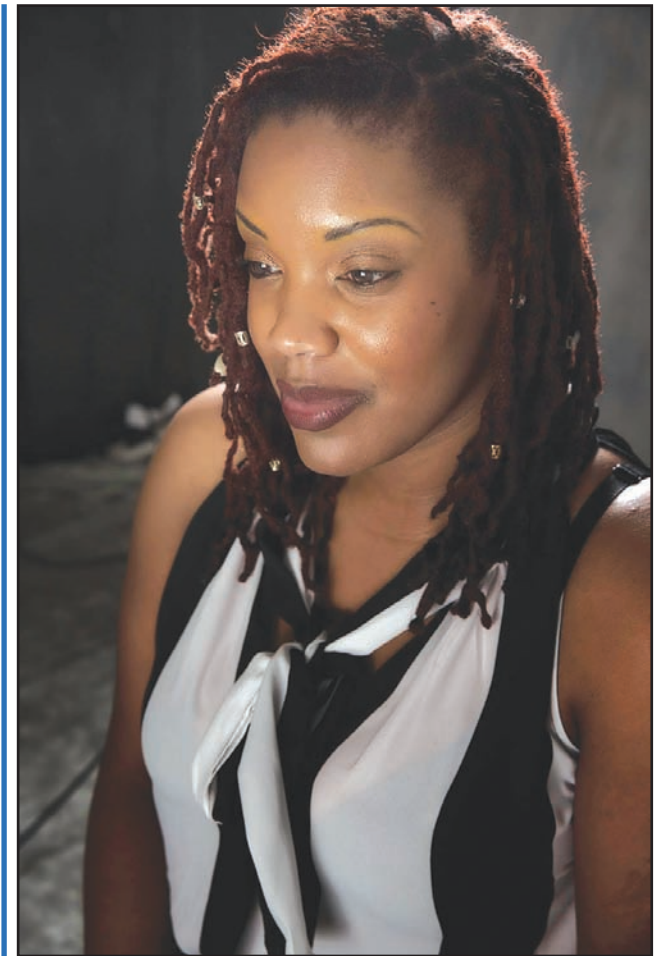
"News reports advise that these budget cuts will likely come about from the reduction of 'Maritime Safety and Security Teams' which have, among other duties, conducting the boarding of vessels during law enforcement actions such as drug interdictions," wrote Joeckel, a Wachapreague resident. "In addition, the media reports also indicate that additional reductions to the budget will be the result of a potential cancellation of the acquisition contract for the Coast Guard's ninth National Security Cutter."

Northampton and Accomack counties have about

1,400 miles of shoreline along the Atlantic Ocean, the Chesapeake Bay and their tributaries. "Both counties have substantial interest in activities on our navigable waterways that provide access to commercial and recreational fishing, boating, and tourism. On the Eastern Shore, tourism alone is calculated to have contributed over \$261 million to the economy of the two counties. The navigational safety and potential life safety of those that utilize our waterways depends upon our Eastern Shore US Coast Guard Small Boat Stations located at Chincoteague, Wachapreague and Cape Charles."

Joeckel said the Coast Guard has had "a presence in the Wachapreague area since 1880 and in the Chincoteague area since 1883 ... It is our grave concern that budgetary reductions to the overall ... budget, may require U.S. Coast Guard to reduce, if not eliminate, the needed presence ... here on the Eastern Shore."

Joeckel also sent copies of his pleas to Admiral Paul Zukunft, Commandant, U.S. Coast Guard, and Rear Admiral Meredith Austin, Commander, Fifth Coast Guard District.

Local Angle to the NCAA Tournament

Tonight's (Friday's) NCAA Basketball Tournament 7 o'clock game featuring North Carolina and Butler has a strong local connection — and it's not with the Tar Heels, the lone survivor of nine Atlantic Coast Conference teams that entered the tourney.

Keithan Savage, a 6-foot-3 guard who started in both of Butler's two tournament wins last week, is the son of Keith and Pat Savage, both graduates of Onancock High School; he in 1978 and she in 1979.

A point guard, Savage averaged eight points in his senior season at Butler, located in downtown Indianapolis. He transferred to Butler after playing three seasons at George Washington, where he averaged 11.7 points and 4.8 rebounds as a junior and was a member of the school's Athletic Academic Dean's List.

"We are extremely proud of Keithan and the season he is having, especially after battling back from injuries earlier in the year," said Keith Savage Tuesday night, making plans for the 12-hour trip from their Fairfax home to Memphis, site of Friday's game.

Pat Savage has been a road warrior all season, making every home game and missing only about four road games that were played out west. "With Butler being in the Big East, many of the away games were actually closer. Playing Georgetown was great, and many games were easy drives for us. I often flew to Indianapolis and returned the same day," said Pat, who works for a defense contractor supporting the Navy and has a flexible schedule.

Pat added, "The aura of being in the Hinkle Fieldhouse is unbelievable. There is so much history there."

Located on the campus of Butler, Hinkle Fieldhouse was the largest basketball arena when built in 1928, and retained that distinction until 1950. State championship high-school games were held there, including the 1954 contest won by tiny Milan High School, made famous by the movie Hoosiers. Scenes involving that game were filmed at Hinkle.

"It has been a roller coaster ride for Keithan, and I wanted to be there any

time it was possible," added Pat, who played two years of high-school basketball at Onancock before deciding she preferred being a cheerleader.

Keith, the vice president of a funeral home in Forestville, Md., played for Coach Trent Serini at Onancock and knows the game well.

"This year at Butler has been tremendous for Keithan in his development as a basketball player. Sitting out a year after transferring also allowed him to mature. He's also more comfortable at the point guard after playing the two guard at George Washington," said Keith, raised in Accomac, where his father Frank follows his grandson Keithan on television every chance he can.

Butler finished second in the Big East to Villanova with a 23-8 record and was ranked 21st in the final AP poll, earning a four seed in the tourney.

Savage scored five points in 23 minutes in a 74-65 win over Middle Tennessee on Sunday, after dropping in six points in 28 minutes of action in a 76-64 opening round victory over Winthrop on

Thursday. The two wins put the Bulldogs in the Sweet 16 up against the top-seeded Tar Heels.

Savage averaged 19.7 points as a senior to lead Episcopal High School to a 24-4 record and an appearance in the Virginia Independent Schools Athletic Association state championship game, earning first team All-Met honors.

Pat said she and Keith dated for two years at Onancock and then parted ways for 10 years before reuniting. "And the rest is history," she added. The Savages have an older daughter, Kiara, who graduated from William & Mary and then earned a graduate degree from Vanderbilt.

Multiple degrees from prestigious universities is nothing new for Pat's family. The youngest of four children of the late Theodore and Greta Taylor of Onancock, her oldest brother, Teddy, is a West Point graduate and a career Army officer. Another brother, Jerome (Jerry), was graduated magna cum laude from Dartmouth University and then earned his medical degree from Harvard Medical University.

Her older sister, Cynthia, has an undergraduate degree from The College of William & Mary and eventually earned her PhD in software engineering.

Pat said the next generation is surpassing her siblings.

"Jerry has two children who are doctors, one a psychiatrist at Yale and the other a pediatrician at the University of Chicago. Cynthia's son will graduate from Stanford in May and then enter a master's program there."

As far as Keithan, Pat says he will pursue his dream of playing in the NBA or somewhere else after earning his degree in sociology this spring.

"He will attend NBA workouts this summer and be ready for any opportunity to continue playing basketball."

But for now, the focus is advancing in the NCAA tournament.

"We are hoping this ride continues after Friday night," said Keith. "We are ready to follow Butler all the way to the Final Four."

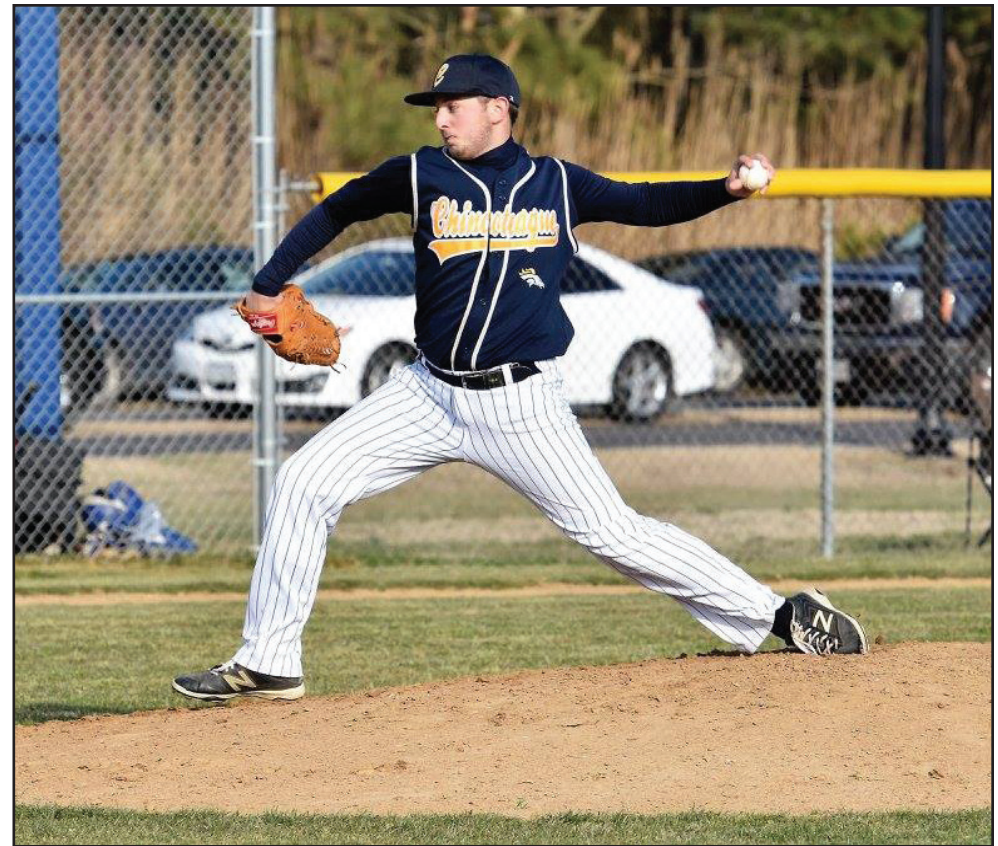

Farm Bureau's Learning Barns Introduce Children to Farm Basics

Northampton County Farm Bureau has donated learning barns with a collection of agriculture-related books to all six elementary schools in the county. Over the past few years, each elementary school has been presented with a learning barn to help encourage children to learn more about the agriculture industry. Each elementary school student in the county has the accessibility to these books and can learn more about an industry that is prevalent over the Eastern Shore.

A learning barn is a barn-shaped shelving unit that holds children's books about farming and farm products. Northampton joins county Farm Bureaus around the state who are ensuring agriculture literature is available for children to learn about how farmers supply the needs of the world.

"Learning barns have given us a tool to build a relationship with our schools, while teaching children about the importance of farming," states Steve Sturgis, Northampton County Farm Bureau president.

Virginia Agriculture in the Classroom partners with County Farm Bureaus providing a list of agriculture accurate books that support state educational standards and appeal to children in kindergarten through

fifth grade. Each year volunteers from the Northampton County Farm Bureau participate in AITC's Literacy Week (which took place March 6-10) by reading the Book of the Year to classrooms at each elementary school. This year's AITC Book of the Year was "Sleep Tight Farm: A Farm Prepares for Winter," a children's book by Eugenie Doyle, and copies were donated to the schools' libraries to add to their learning barn. The book connects children to agriculture by describing what happens on a farm throughout the seasons. A nonprofit affiliate of Virginia Farm Bureau, the AITC foundation aims to connect children to agriculture through education initiatives and projects such as this. The program offers educational resources, classroom grants and student centered projects to integrate Virginia standards across the curriculum and agriculture. Northampton County Farm Bureau is one of 88 county Farm Bureaus in the Virginia Farm Bureau Federation. With 126,000 members, VFBF is Virginia's largest farmers' advocacy group.

Farm Bureau is a non-governmental, nonpartisan, voluntary organization committed to supporting Virginia's agriculture industry and preserving the Virginia way of life.

47TH WARD WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP WILDFOWL CARVING COMPETITION COMING UP

Each year the Ward Museum of Wildfowl Art, Salisbury University, plays host to the Ward World Championship Wildfowl Carving Competition and Art Festival, bringing talented artists from across the globe to Ocean City, Md., allowing them to showcase their carving talent.

This year's event will be held at the Roland E. Powell Convention Center on April 28-30. The wildfowl carvings are highly meticulous decorative works of art that can be used as functional hunting decoys. These spectacular sculptures, coveted by celebrities and avid collectors alike, mimic wildfowl species such as red tail hawks, bald eagles, saw

whet owls, wood ducks and thousands of other species from around the world.

On display will be more than 1,400 wildfowl carvings by artists representing all levels of experience - from youth to world champions each competing for a share of nearly \$65,000 in cash and prizes. Since the first competition, more than four decades ago, the World Championship has awarded carvers with over \$2.6 million in prize money. It is a great opportunity for anyone attending to learn about eclectic bird species through the carvers' interpretation of nature.

"You will have a chance to enjoy the beauty of many of the more than 600 bird species in the United States, in

addition to species from around the globe," said Lora Bottinelli, executive director of the Ward Museum. "For anyone who adores nature, enjoys birds and has an appreciation for fine art, the World Championship is the place to be to experience the best wildfowl art the world has to offer."

Show hours are 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Fri-

day, April 28, and 9 a.m.-5 p.m., Saturday, April 29. The awards ceremony begins at 5:30 p.m. April 29. On Sunday, April 30, show hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tickets are \$10 for adults and \$8 for seniors and students. Children under 12 are admitted free when accompanied by a paying adult.

Scouts Learn Search and Rescue Techniques at Wildlife Refuge in Kiptopeke

Boy Scout troops typically spend a weekend hiking, camping, or learning how to fish. Most Boy Scout troops don't envision a weekend spent learning how to apply tourniquets, using a stretcher to evacuate an injured hiker, or how to control shock on a trauma patient. A very special scouting weekend at Eastern Shore of Virginia National Wildlife Refuge allowed a combined group from Boy Scout Troop #419 and EMS Rescue Explorer Post #800, both from nearby Virginia Beach to do just that.

The group of 24 scouts and scout leaders converged on the refuge one Saturday in February for the start of a full weekend. The group spent the morning under the direction of maintenance staff member Jacob McCauley getting their hands and boots dirty. They filled an entire eight-yard dumpster with tires, rusting cans, cardboard, fish nets, old crab traps, plastic bottles and assorted marine debris that was removed from the Wise Point Boat Ramp and Bunker Overlook trail area. Afterwards, they spent nearly two hours hiking the Magothy Bay Natural Area Preserve with Eastern Shore Master Naturalists Frank Renshaw and Ruth Myers. As if a two-hour hike wasn't enough, they carpoled across the street for a very special evening hike at Kiptopeke State Park for an Owl Prowl and evening hike with Ranger Bill Dyas. And that was their first day.

The combined group converged on the refuge's bunkhouse area in the early morning hours to complete the requirements of their search-and-rescue merit badge on

Sunday. Around the bunkhouse they learned how to apply basic first aid techniques to control bleeding, splint a compound fracture, treat for shock and dehydration, and how to treat ankle and knee sprains. Instructors were on hand to teach the course, including members of the non-profit Tidewater Search and Rescue, and the Search and Rescue Tracking Institute. The Ocean Park Volunteer Rescue Squad from Virginia Beach was also there with a 12-passenger rescue van filled with rescue equipment for practice sessions. Additionally, a member of the Northampton County EMS was on site to assist.

This adventure-filled weekend allowed scouts to explore careers as EMTs and paramedics. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment as EMTs and paramedics is estimated to grow by 24 percent through 2024; much faster than the average for most occupations. Continued demand for part-time and volunteer EMTs and paramedics in rural areas is also forecast. The work can be physically strenuous, stressful, and involve decisions that can mean life or death for a patient. These were skills and traits that Boy Scout Troop #419 and EMS Rescue Explorer Post #800 gained to complete the search and rescue merit badge; along with a healthy dose of wildlife dependent recreation that was provided by time spent in the great outdoors on the Eastern Shore.

Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority Builds Bloxom Tower

As a community service, the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority (ESVBA) planned, built and paid for a 100-ft. open access telecommunications tower in Bloxom to help spur economic development and 21st century connectivity.

The Bloxom Tower, which opened in November 2016 and is located at 26129 Shore Main Dr., now provides broadband services to the town of 380.

Since the Bloxom Tower’s service launch late last fall, ESVBA has worked with a variety of last-mile service providers to bring expanded wireless broadband internet to the town.

Under the Broadband Initiative Program, wireless internet service providers can connect to the tower for 12 months free as they work to establish broadband services to local customers.

“By building infrastructure like the Bloxom Tower we are investing in the economic viability and future sustainability of the Eastern Shore Community as a whole,” Nicholas Pascaretti, Executive Director of the ESVBA said. “Broadband is crucial to economic development, and the investment is already showing positive impact.”

In addition to this economic devel-

opment push to support local businesses, the ESVBA has installed a free wireless hotspot at the Bloxom Tower for all citizens and visitors.

Chris Kreisl of the Bloxom Town Council said, “We knew how important it was for us to have this kind of infrastructure,” he says, “without it, we were being left behind as the information economy continued to push citizens around the globe online. Now, Bloxom businesses have the opportunity to compete on equal footing.”

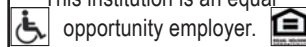

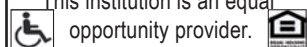



Don't Eliminate Health Care for Children

Dear Editor:

A very large share of children on the Eastern Shore of Virginia have health insurance through two government programs (Medicaid and State Child Health Insurance Program, called SCHIP). Both programs serve children in low-income families and Lord know we have plenty of low-income families on the Eastern Shore. Based on the most recent data from the U.S. Census Bureau, 42 percent of children in Accomack County are covered by one of the two programs mentioned above. In Northampton County, 44 percent of all children get health insurance through one of these programs. Statewide, the comparable percent of children covered by Medicaid and SCHIP is 23 percent and nationwide it is 34 percent. In other words, children on the Eastern Shore of Virginia are much more dependent on these two government programs for health insurance than children in other parts of the state or the nation as a whole.

On the other hand, only 33 percent of children in Accomack County get health insurance through their parents' employers and only 28 percent in Northampton do so. In other words, in Northampton County there are twice as many children covered by Medicaid and SCHIP as covered by employer-based health insurance. Let's face it, the economic reality for many firms on the Eastern Shore is that it is just not feasible to pay for employee's health insurance.

This information is particularly important right now because new health care legislation is being debated in the U.S. Congress. There are many facets to the new legislation (called American Health Care Act) but part of the bill would jeopardize Medicaid and SCHIP. For an area like the Eastern

Shore, eliminating these programs, or reducing the number of children covered by the programs, would be devastating for the health care available to our children.

In my opinion, there is no better investment we can make in our community's future than making sure our children grow up healthy. When one's health is compromised, it can affect every aspect of life. Kids who grow up healthy typically make better workers and more involved citizens. For the future of our kids and the future of our community, we need to make sure that whatever Congress does regarding health insurance legislation, it does not compromise the health of our children.

Solar Farms More Sightly Than Poultry Farms

I have recently read in the Post (March 4) and elsewhere, that zoning and placement requirements are being discussed for solar farms within Accomack County. Apparently there is some concern that solar farms damage the "viewshed," and should not be allowed within ½ mile of Rt.13. At the same time, I see that yet another industrial poultry farm has been sold on Rt. 13 at Bloxom (Sanns Poultry LLC). I believe that solar farms are in fact more beautiful and indicative of a healthy landscape than industrial poultry operations. The practice for locating industrial poultry on the highway, and not solar farms is inconsistent, and shows bias for one land use over another.

Solar farms are an advancement toward sustainable, cleaner energy, and in fact, send a positive

message about our locality to all who view them. In contrast, industrial poultry operations may send negative impressions about our locality, especially as the numbers continue to increase rapidly with the potential for air pollution, and stormwater runoff hazards, vermin problems, and increased disease threats.

It is a mistake, and inconsistent, to force solar farms away from Rt. 13, while allowing industrial poultry within just a couple hundred feet from the center of the highway. Please reconsider the allowable placement of solar farms within Accomack County. Let them be on Rt. 13, and show pride in the fact that we are moving toward energy solutions which minimize coal and fossil fuel consumption. Solar farms are an asset, and a sign of good planning for the future.
