# PEDESTRIAN FATALITY IN CAPE CHARLES

A pedestrian died Sunday night in Northampton County after getting struck by a car, according to 1st Sgt. B.E. Jeff Jones of the state police.

The incident that killed Lybren Brian Hart, 64, of Cape Charles, occurred at 9:40 p.m. on Stone Road, also known as Route 184, about a quarter-mile west of Lankford Highway.

Trooper Ethan O. Price reported, the

1993 Lincoln town car that hit the victim was driven by Anthony Lee Brady, 26, of Cape Charles. Stone Road was closed for about three hours.

"The Crash Reconstruction Team responded to the scene to assist in the investigation," said Jones. "The crash is still under investigation and it is unknown at this time if alcohol was a factor. No charges have been placed at this time."

# Chincoteague Water Safe To Drink Wells Above Accepted Levels Removed from Use

Tests done by an independent laboratory show deep-well drinking water for Wallops and Chincoteague Islands is safe to drink.

"We learned that two of three shallow wells had high levels of the PFAS (perand polyfluoroalkyl substances) contaminants, but we had already stopped using the wells on April 8," Chincoteague Town Manager Jim West said Thursday. "We also learned that one deep well had high levels of PFAS and we have discontinued use of that well."

A report states the contaminants "are manmade compounds used extensively in a wide variety of consumer products and are also related to the use of a firefighting foam."

Tests from a "sampling ... of Chincoteague's seven wells, which are on Wallops property, show PFAS at a level above the EPA's Lifetime Health Advisory (LHA) in two of three shallow wells and an adjacent deep water well. Results show PFAS in the town's ... third shallow well, but at

a level below the LHA. The town ... is not using its shallow wells to produce finished water for the town, and has stopped using the one deep water well," the report stated.

The updated information also stated the town is producing finished drinking water from three deep wells, none of which detects "PFAS in independent sampling results." NASA continues to share sampling results with local, state and federal officials and to meet with" town leaders, the EPA, the state environmental quality department and health department "to discuss next steps."

NASA will continue to sample Chincoteague's four deep water wells as well as the Wallops and Chincoteague finished drinking water. The report stated, "Sampling will occur over the next several weeks, and NA-SA will continue to use an independent lab to analyze samples."

# Northampton Man Convicted of Murdering Cousin ond-degree murder of his first cousin, suit and bound by his wrists and an-

Alexander Hunter Picott-Cleveland practiced shooting guns in the vard behind the house where he and his family lived near Cheapside, despite that it was illegal for a gun to be there since his father was a felon.

The younger man got that status too, in Northampton Circuit Court late Friday when he was convicted of using one of those guns to commit secRonald Graves, 30, of Portsmouth, and for attempting to maliciously wound his dad, Alexander Cleveland Sr., on June 18, 2016, the same weekend as Father's Day last year.

Both incidents occurred outside the Arlington Road home where the defendant lived with his parents and sister.

The 23-year-old, who was clad in an orange Virginia Beach City Jail jumpkles, hung his head for most of his murder trial. His father testified dramatically — growling, crying, rocking back and forth and banging on the witness box, while telling that after he learned of a shooting in Exmore that had happened earlier in the day, he wanted his son to turn himself in to avoid being gunned down by police.

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# Body of Tangier Waterman Recovered; Autopsy Confirms Drowning

The body of 70-year-old Capt. Edward Charnock of Tangier was found in the waters of the Chesapeake Bay last week nearly 10 days after his boat, the Henrietta C., sank during a storm while he and his son were crabbing.

Reports show he was found about a half-mile from the site where the

40-foot vessel went down. Arkuie Williams of the state medical examiner's office said results of an autopsy showed Charnock drowned. A funeral is being planned for May 18.

The son, Jason Charnock, 40, was rescued the same day the boat sank, April 24. The two were five miles southwest of Tangier in 20to-30 mph winds with waves of 4 to 6 feet and lots of rain when there was a problem with the bottom of the boat.

The incident occurred at 2:30 p.m. There was poor visibility. Other crabbers had been in the vicinity, but had already left for port when the Charnocks began to have difficulties.

Jason Charnock's father-in-law,

Lonnie Moore, who works on a tugboat, was at the dock and went to find the missing men. An EMT went along with him. Jason Charnock was in the water for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 hours when he was rescued.

Other watermen, the Coast Guard and the Virginia Marine Resources Police also searched for Capt. Charnock.

On April 24, McAuliffe announced \$500,000 in Industrial Revitalization Funds (IRF) was given to the Cape Charles Brewery in Northampton County.

McAuliffe announced awards totaling \$1.45 million in IRF this week. "Building a new Virginia economy starts with a strong, vibrant local economy in every corner of our Commonwealth," the governor said. "From the Eastern Shore to the coal fields and every place in between, these funds ensure localities have the resources to complete projects that will diversify our economy and produce real benefits for communities, like direct business activity and tourism."


Projects were reviewed and evaluated competitively, with an emphasis on those with a high level of blight, impediments to economic development efforts, alignment with regional or local strategies, availability of matching resources, the level of community distress where the property is located and an identified and feasible end use.

Samples were also collected at two points on the west side of the facility near the 10-28 runway and one point on the south side of the facility to confirm whether or not PFAS are present in the groundwater in these areas. Those results have not yet been received.

Firefighting foam with PFAS was used at a former training area on the north-central side of Wallops. The EPA has not established drinking water standards for PFAS. "While not regulated, the EPA has been increasingly sampling for PFAS. Since 2013, the EPA has detected PFAS in numerous public water supplies serving 16 million people across 33 states. In May 2016, the EPA issued updated LHA level guidelines for two PFAS compounds, perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS) and perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA)."

# Northampton Chairman Asks Citizens to Get Involved, Run for Office

Northampton residents need to get involved in county government. That's what Chairman Spencer Murray of the county board of supervisors said at a session Tuesday.

In November, three seats on the board will be up for grabs with only one person seeking reelection. Supervisor Oliver Bennett of District 3 is running again but Supervisors Granville Hogg and Larry LeMond have indicated they will not seek another term.

Murray noted, 35 days are left for candidates to get 125 signatures needed for a name to be put on the ballot. While the job takes time and can be frustrating, Murray noted, it can also be rewarding when efforts help to improve the welfare of citizens.

"Let's get the good government we deserve through strong leadership and widespread participation," Murray said.

The board voted to approve a permit that would allow reopening of a spoils site at Willis Wharf for materials dredged from the harbor there. A portion of the site needs to be excavated and some berm around the site needs to be rebuilt before it can be used.

Daniel Brown, of Cape Charles, read a letter from Julie Wagner, an owner of the borrow pit that would be accepting spoils from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel project. Earlier, Hogg sought to have a discussion regarding the pit's special use permit added to the agenda. A vote of the board turned his request down. Murray said the permit was approved by the board, so the matter was already settled. In the letter, Wagner said she had no issues with the site and materials being tested.

Carolyn Bott, of the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission, gave an update on the condition of the former Northampton Middle School. She said there is mold in the structure, especially in the newer portions constructed in 1992. There appears to be little or no evidence of mold in portions of the building being used by Parks and Recreation, as storage for county records, the extension service or as a polling place for District 4, she reported.

Murray asked Bott to investigate reuses of the building and how much it would cost to correct building issues. The annual cost of operating the building for current

uses was estimated at about \$110,000. A public hearing on the proposed fiscal 2018 budget will be held on May 22. A final vote is expected on June 13.

# Every Day is Mother's Day at Accomack-Northampton Pregnancy Center

Mother's Day evokes visions of finger-painted potato people on handmade cards from little ones who unfailingly think their mothers are the best mothers in the world.

But sometimes motherhood is not begun or carried out under the happiest circumstances, and even when it is, mothers (and fathers) can use a little help.

Shortly after Candy Barnes moved from Kentucky to Belle Haven with her new husband, Accomack County Sheriff's Deputy Michael Barnes, she sought the services of the Accomack-Northampton Pregnancy Center. That pregnancy test was the beginning of a long-term relationship.

"Teresa and Candy just clicked," said Linda Baylis-Spence, the center's director. Teresa Cartwright is a teacher and coach at the center. Baylis says there is no "typical" client. "Everyone's story and situation is different. You see moms and dads from all walks of life."

The pregnancy center, which relocated to Onley in December, offers parent-

ing and life skills classes and coaching, pregnancy tests and information, abortion and miscarriage recovery support, and other services.

Parents can make purchases in the onsite baby store using "baby bucks" earned

by attending classes, which is exactly what Candy Barnes did while pregnant with the couple's oldest child, Abigail. The curriculum includes such topics as what to expect in labor and delivery, how to breastfeed, what to pack for the hospital, how to prepare for bringing home a newborn from the hospital, and sanitation of bottles.

"They make you feel like part of the family." **They make you feel like** 

It seemed natural, then, to continue that relationship with her second pregnancy, even after the baby didn't survive to full term. It helped "knowing there are people praying for us and supporting us," she said.

With Mother's Day looming, she said it is no worse than other times, because

> she thinks about the baby they lost every day. She finds comfort thinking of her deceased grandmother taking care of their little one in heaven until they are one day reunited.

> "It's a blessing waiting for me there. It helps me to strive to be a better mother to those that are here with me," she said.

> Her Christian faith is a strong force in her own life, and is central to the pregnancy center's pro-life operating philosophy.

"It's amazing to see what God is doing with them, for us and through us," she said. When the Barnes' second daughter, Addalynn, was born, Candy Barnes worried about something that is familiar to many parents. "I wondered if I could have as much love for another." The photo on this page answers that question.

Barnes is now enrolled in toddler parenting classes, and still using baby bucks in the center's boutique.

Her own children have helped Barnes to better appreciate her own mother. "I didn't understand what goes into raising them right," she said. "She is a godly woman and taught me be to be a good Christian and mother."


Barnes also had high praise for her mother-in-law, who lives down the street. "She is also a good Christian woman and a good example to my kids and to me and my husband."

She said she used to call and send flowers to her mother, who lives in Indiana. "I have the best mother in the world," she said. It's not on a card with a hand-drawn potato person, but reading that in the paper is probably just as good this year.

### Embezzlement Charges Certified for Former Republican Party Treasurer

When the former treasurer of the Accomack Republican Party waived her right to a preliminary hearing Monday, two counts of embezzlement were certified to a grand jury by Judge Gordon Vincent of the county general district court.

Ann Marie Page, 62, of Arthur Lane in Accomac, was initially charged with one count of embezzlement and one count of stealing money belonging to the party, between May 1 and Dec. 31, 2016. The charges were amended to narrow the time frame from May 1 to Oct. 31, 2016, and the theft charge was changed to embezzlement.

Page was allowed to remain free on \$3,000 unsecured bond.

In another case, Bernard Wendell Wynder, 57, of Banks Road in Cape Charles, was charged with two counts

Joseph Washington Burton, 67, of Cobb Station Road in Cape Charles, admitted to police that he struck Daryl Taylor, also of Cape Charles, with the tool on Jan. 3, 2017, according to court records.

Picott-Cleveland pleaded guilty in January to three counts of malicious wounding. At a party in the New Road section of Exmore, also on June 18, the defendant got upset because he couldn't find his "fronts," also known as grills or grillz, decorative covers that snap over the front of teeth.

He told police that he felt threatened by one of the people who got shot there because he was from Cape Charles. He pulled out an automatic pistol and in addition to gunning down one man, he wound up hitting a woman who had gone to the party with his group and another man, a passenger in a car that had just pulled up to join the party.

Picott-Cleveland told police he meant to shoot Ranquise Coston of Exmore, "They (Coston and others) were going to do something to me. I wasn't going to let that happen ... I was trying to shoot him ... I unloaded my whole clip."

Coston previously testified he was shot four times in the back and spent 2 1/2 weeks in the hospital because of his injuries. "I was doing a lot of ducking, trying to get away ... I got shot four times ... I don't even know who shot me."

Just after the shooting, Picott-Cleveland, his sister, Mona Jones (who got hit in the neck), and Graves left the party. Jones declined going to the hospital although they stopped there. The defendant also fired the gun inside the vehicle during the ride back to Arlington Road and before falling asleep.

According to testimony, when they arrived at the house, Alexander Cleveland Sr. already knew about the Exmore incident because Graves had called him. The father said he went out to the vehicle to talk to his son.

"His eyes were big as I don't know what," Cleveland said. "His eyes didn't look right. He had a wild look in his eyes." He said his son didn't recognize him and thought he was someone from Exmore. "I bear hugged him" and got him out of the vehicle. The two tussled and Graves pulled the older man away allowing the defendant to go into the house. Testimony also disclosed PicottCleveland got a shotgun while inside and jumped out a back window with it.

The father said he was calling police and trying to stay back from his son.

Picott-Cleveland's sister said after Graves was shot, her brother continued to ask about his "fronts." At her instruction that the "fronts" were down the road, he walked in that direction. He then hid in the woods until the next morning. At about 6 a.m. he showed back up at the house. He was taking a shower when police arrived to arrest him.

Punishment for second-degree murder is five to 40 years in prison. The maximum punishment for malicious wounding is 20 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine.

A presentence report was ordered and Picott-Cleveland was taken back to Virginia Beach, where he is being held due to the number of local victims and the likelihood of crossing paths with a friend or relative.



# Surf Fishing at Its Peak -Hook 'Em While They're Hot!

If you haven't hooked a drum or rockfish yet, better get out in the surf soon. Drum and rockfish surfing is at its peak, says Jimmy Vasiliou of Steve's Bait and Tackle in Chincoteague. Can you say, "Rockfish dinner?" So can I, but saying's not eating. Vasiliou says peelers, clams, or bunker on an East Coast hollow rig with a circle hook are just the ticket. Now we're talking and eating. Vasiliou says a few flounder are being hauled in as well.

Don Varney of Don's Tackle Shop near Wachapreague summed up recent flounder action this way: "Lousy. The weather has just tore up the flounder fishing." He reported plenty of black drum being taken at Quinby and Willis Wharf when weather cooperates for anglers to go out. Speckled trout are taking the bite in the Bay on Z-Man lures with jig heads, and many anglers are having luck trolling the Bay for red drum using trolling lures.

Black drum are biting on the seaside and bayside, says James Beasley, of Chris' Bait and Tackle in Capeville. Red drum are in the surf in the breakers off Fisherman's Island. Sea clams are the bait of choice for both. Beasley says flounder can be had, but action is spotty.

If you're tired of coming up empty, too bad. You couldn't have a day-long lesson from the best, like the 18 young people who spent May 7 learning the fundamentals of surf fishing from some of the top surf anglers on the East Coast.

The Surf Hogs fishing team of the Eastern Shore of Virginia Anglers Club worked with youngsters at Assateague National Seashore during the inaugural J.T. Bolding Memorial Youth Surf Fishing Event. Bolding was a Mid-Atlantic surf fishing and distance casting icon, an enthusiastic mentor to many local anglers, and a member of Surf Hogs. The event was to honor his memory. His friend, Dr. Paul Rochmis, funded the purchase of caps and sand spikes for the young anglers, who were instructed by the Surf Hogs team, with bait and extra equipment provided by Matt Abell of Sea Hawk Sports. Another friend, David Page, instructed the anglers on safety. After catching some striped bass, black drum, and bluefish, the youngsters enjoyed snacks, drinks, and pizza. 






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



# Many Hands Lighten the Load in Eastville Health Center Campaign

George McMath has seen a few fundraising campaigns in his time. But he believes the one he is currently chairing might involve the most Shore people ever.

McMath says planning for the capital campaign to build Eastern Shore Rural Health System's new \$9.5 million Eastville Community Health Center started last September. "We are just now entering the solicitation stage, having mailed about 900 letters this week, but there has been a lot of groundwork to get to this point," said McMath. "We have 13 committees with about 120 people taking part in the campaign. They are really motivated and are doing a great job in every regard."

McMath says it would be hard to miss the \$2 million campaign. "We've handed out placemats to 11 restaurants in Northampton County, we have messages on billboards, and we have ads in both local newspapers and radio stations." A social media campaign will also be launched to spread awareness.

McMath says he is gratified by the results thus far. "The employees of

Eastern Shore Rural Health have already exceeded their \$75,000 goal and are now looking to raise \$100,000. We have 100 percent involvement by the Rural Health board." Rural Health employees raised more than \$3,000 at the Bayview Center by conducting a "paper brick" campaign where family mem-

bers and friends can buy a "brick" and tape them up in the center with their name on it. That center also raised \$1,200 in a car wash.

Center and saw there wasn't enough parking available. There's no room to expand either. And then in the building the hallway was so crowded I had to take a different exit to leave the building."

The new center will have 24,000 square feet, almost double the combined size of the Franktown and Bavview centers it will replace. Dental services, now only at Franktown, will be more centralized for Northampton residents with the current six chairs increased to eight chairs, and one acces-

> sible to disabled patients. The new facility will also have digital X-ray which will provide doctors with a radiology report within 20 minutes.


Last year there were nearly 34,000 visits to the two Northampton centers. McMath says residents visited an

McMath says he believes in short campaigns to keep the volunteers fresh and having fun. "We are looking to wrap this campaign up by May 24."

# Debris Cleanup Yields 17th Century Artifacts on Historic Homesite

Story and Photos by Linda Cicoira What started as a felled Maple tree at the end of Eyreville Drive in Northampton County about six weeks ago turned into an archeological excavation Tuesday that promises artifacts from the early 1600s.

A Dutch casting counter, made in Nuremberg between 1580 and 1620 and used by merchants of the time, was found when the tree was removed. There were Dutch pipes with carved patterns, a cream-colored brick believed to be Dutch, British and Irish coins, pieces of pottery and red bricks, too.

"This whole thing was just an accident," said Christopher (Critter) Derwort, who lives on the site and farms in the area with owner Roger Buyrn. "A little back hoe work turned into an archeological dig. We started finding things. This is why they are here," he said pointing to the two dozen others, (mostly from state and local archeological and historical societies) who were carefully using small shovels and trowels in their quest to find a cellar (or anything else) that might hold even more treasures.

The group set up small squares

throughout the yard where the digging would be done. Others would take the dirt and gently sift it so nothing is lost. There were also squares close to a hole where the tree once stood. Other large trunk trees were also in close proximity.

"People think it's just artifacts" that are the important finds, State Archeologist Mike Barber, who was the leader of the dig, explained. "But it's also what they are near or lying on."

Comparably, he said, "Jamestown was in its third decade and it was before the Indian War of 1644. It's a time period of early settlement, obviously Dutch smoking pipes ... influence from Maryland ... a unique setting," Barber said.

The archeologist is concerned important historical sites like this will be destroyed as sea levels rise and more and more erosion occurs. The farm is along Cherrystone Inlet, a tributary of the Chesapeake Bay. One can look out across the water and see two sand bars. It is likely that the farthest one once held a pier. Of course, that would have been before so many feet of land had eroded away.

So, you've got a 200-year-old tree, on

a 400-year-old home site that is about a half mile from the place where more than a decade ago, scientists studied the Chesapeake Bay Impact Crater, that was formed by a large meteor about 35.5 million years ago. And all are in a county that has the oldest continuous court records in the country.

The present dig area "was the site of Col. William Kendall's original house," said Fitzhugh Godwin of Onancock, a direct descendant. "Kendall was a very wealthy landowner." He was also a Jamestown burgess. Kendall owned another farm in Temperanceville that was 10,000 acres and took in the present day towns of Hallwood and Bloxom, Godwin said.

The 1799 two-story brick house on

the site was also once the estate of the Webster family, that owned the processing plant in nearby Cheriton, Godwin continued. The original house is believed to have been closer to the water, where volunteers were digging this week.

Derwort lives in the estate's tavern house (not a bar) that has wide-plank floors and ceilings and is the smaller dwelling on the farm. At this time, no one lives in the larger house, which includes a sanatorium or built-in swimming pool, which is also not being used at this time.

Derwort was excited to have found six white pipes that had not been touched by another human hand in 400 years and were made with kaolin clay that had been burnished. Local clay would have been red. A red pipe was also found that was possibly made by an Englishman, he said.





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# Growing Up in a Small Town and Going Away to College

I am from the small peninsula of the Eastern Shore of Virginia. Yes, you read that right I said Virginia. Most of the time when I explain to people where I am from, I usually say, "Have you heard of Ocean City in Maryland? Well, I live about 40 minutes south on the Eastern Shore in a small town called Parksley." If they haven't heard of Ocean City, most people have heard of Chincoteague Island, which is relatively close to me and known for the "wild ponies."

People who see me across campus would never know I was from a rural area, as some would call it. I don't sport camo on a daily basis, but I do own some. I don't wear my Muck boots and talk about my recent hunting experiences, but I have been hunting before. I'm just an average college student who wears yoga pants and T-shirts about 90 percent of the time.

I come from an area where the main source of income is from working on the water in the seafood industry. For most people that's unheard of. When we have fish or



seafood in the dining hall, my instant thought is, "Is this fresh?" Where I'm from, I know for a fact where my blue crabs, fish, or other seafood have come from.

Most people at least have a neighboring city that they can use to describe their hometown's location. I am from a place that is so secluded to some parts of the world that it's left off of 20 percent of maps or is incorporated into Maryland.


I was drawn towards farther universities because of the limited opportunities I was offered in my local area. We have a local community college and a university in Maryland about 45 minutes away, but I wanted to go off on my own and explore how things work in the city. I wanted the sense of independence and the opportunity to meet different types of people from all over who were experiencing being away from home for the first time. The door to new food and retail stores in close vicinity was open, compared to having to drive over an hour away at home to just get to Chick-Fil-A or Target! I know what most of you are thinking: "How did you survive?"

Where I'm from, we live by a traditional sense of simple living. The food options are limited to maybe five places in a 10-mile vicinity. There were only four high schools in my county and I only had about 200 people in my graduating class. Everyone got excited when we finally got a Walmart.

I opted to go live my dream by going away to college. I chose Christopher Newport University (CNU) for its sense of community, academic success, and beautiful campus. I loved that it was only two hours away from my home. I now live in two different worlds: one when I am at home and another when I'm here at school. There are still things that happen daily on campus that I have to learn and get used to. I had never heard the term "NOVA" until I stepped foot onto CNU's campus, where at least 50 percent of the student body is from.
