CHINCOTEAGUE COUNCIL MIRED IN INDECISION

Chincoteague Vice Mayor Denise Bowden wants things to move ahead on the island.

She told the town council to start making decisions instead of tossing issues back and forth from the panel to committees. But she didn't make any headway.

"I know that there has to be committees," she said this week. But, "We're not getting anything done."

Councilman Jim Frese wanted a remedy for the island's west-side "where boats zoom up and down and create tremendous wakes" causing erosion. "One property owner was forced to move a propane tank ... a former council member lost water frontage." Frese saw a 28-foot vessel pushing water comparable to a hurricane. "Enough is enough ... that's been going on for 20 years. Maritime law says you're responsible for your wake. If I drove my car like some of these people drive their boats, I'd be in jail."

"We have to look at all sides of the issue," Mayor Arthur Leonard said. "We have to investigate it. That's where you start I guess. We can post the area ... We can definitely see about putting buoys out there."

Bowden said she wants to get things done "today ... We have a responsibility."

"Get it on the agenda and lets vote on it," Councilman Gene Taylor said. "If it doesn't happen you are absolutely right, it's our fault." Police Chief Randy Mills said his squad would patrol the area if they had the money to do so.

Leonard told Frese to make a request to the appropriate committee.

Bowden also wanted to discuss getting air-conditioning for the gym as was requested by the pickle ball league at a previous session. Public Works Director Harvey told Bowden that was with the parks and recreation committee.

Town Manager Jim West said the town has heard concerns about a developer's plan to build a hotel at Landmark Plaza. "The hotel is permitted by right. Nothing we can do to curtail that. What council could do is consider changing zoning," West said.

Accomack Man Convicted of Child Pornography Charges Had More than 1.7 Million Images

An Accomack man, who collected more than 1.7 million images of child porn in the last decade, was sentenced Wednesday in U. S. District Court in Norfolk to 15 years in prison for receiving "images of minors engaging in sexually explicit conduct."

That was the mandatory minimum term that John Martin Bowen, 56, of Keller, could receive due to "his previous conviction of a qualifying sex offense." He was remanded to the custody of the U.S. Marshal and is being held in Western Tidewater Regional Jail in Suffolk. Upon release at 71 years old, he will be on supervised probation for the rest of his life.

After agents came to his home with a search warrant and "seized ... a staggeringly large collection of child pornography including many extremely disturbing images and videos," Bowen confessed and was arrested in October 2016.

Authorities state "a handcrafted doll, the size of a young child" was among the items confiscated. "This doll, located in the same room as many of … Bowen's electronic devices, chock full of illicit images, suggests that the defendant was not a mere passive viewer of child pornography. Instead, his ... interests extended to actual sex with a child-like doll."

An FBI special agent downloaded images from Bowen's computer "on two occasions ... once in June 2016 and again in October 2016." The downloads involved a total of 68 images. Six devices were seized. "Two contained so many videos and images that they were not fully reviewed" so "the sheer volume of his collection ... is unknown. One of ... Bowen's laptops contained over 700,000 images, and another held more than one million images."

"His oldest file was created in December 2006, nearly a decade prior to his arrest, and just barely five years after his release from incarceration," records show. Bowen was convicted in Accomack Circuit Court in 2001 of aggravated sexual battery of a minor and indecent liberties with a girl by a custodian. He got two years in prison each, with all but six months suspended. The terms were set to run consecutively for a total of a year.

Last November, Bowen was indicted on nine counts of receiving and possessing the images. In a bargaining agreement, he pleaded guilty to one charge. The others were dismissed. Prosecutors recommended the term because the defendant accepted his "responsibility" and "timely notified" them of his plea, which allowed the government to avoid trial preparation and costs.

In the presentence report, Bowen was "attributed with a total of 43,179 images." His collection included 100 "known child victims of sexual abuse, as identified by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children." Twelve victims submitted victim impact statements "... recount(ing) ... emotional, psychological, and physical trauma ... and their feelings of being re-victimized by current consumers of child pornography."

Bowen moved frequently as a child because his father was in the U. S. Coast Guard, the prosecution stated. He "was provided with a stable, middle-class upbringing ... involved in extracurricular activities, played a musical instrument, and developed a love for photography ... he acknowledges ... he did not want for anything." After high school, he served 14 years in the Navy and was honorably discharged. From 2003 to 2016, he was employed at a Cheriton farm as a shipping manager.

He could have been given a maximum of 40 years. The prosecution is hoping the sentence would "provide a deterrent" to "Bowen and other pedophiles ... tempted to hoard child pornography."

He is remorseful and "harbored secrets," the defense said. Bowen was "unable to effectively deal with years of ... depression (and) delved into viewing child pornography as an escape from the realities of his tortured life. Perhaps for his own survival," he "somehow kept those secrets compartmentalized over the years ... he desperately wants to address and understand" what "led him down a shameful and destructive path."

"Noteworthy is the fact that he has never received sex offender treatment," the defense stated. He "would benefit from gaining insight into his triggers, learning how to manage and control his deviant sexual interests and urges and the high-risk situations that he should attempt to avoid to decrease his risk for recidivism."

Two Life Sentences Plus 20 Years For Muslimani in Charges Involving Niece

Child molester Khalil Mohammed Muslimani of Onancock was given maximum terms of two life sentences plus 20 years in prison last week in Accomack Circuit Court for four offenses involving his niece when she was a teenager about two decades ago.

The sentences, handed down by Judge W. Revell Lewis III, were in accordance with recommendations made by the jury that convicted him in November 2015.

The name of the niece, who lives in Maryland, is being withheld due to the nature of the crimes. At that time, the jury of 10 women and two men took about 25 minutes to find Muslimani guilty of two counts of carnal knowledge and two counts of forcible sodomy. Another halfhour was used to fix the punishment.

Muslimani, who is around 70 years old, has been scheduled many times for another sex trial that involves his stepdaughter Stacey Spione, of Bloxom, who gave permission for her name to be used. Spione says at 12 years old, she bore the first of her children by him. By 16, she had four kids. She said at age 11, he and her mother, (who was also indicted for sex crimes) took her to

have her first pregnancy (by him) aborted.

Charged with rape, indecent liberties and child endangerment involving Spione, Muslimani's trial has been postponed several times for health and legal reasons.

"I would like to point out that I never consented to any sexual relations with my stepfather," Spione wrote in a letter to the commonwealth's attorney's office. "Both my stepfather and birth mother had been abusing me since I was four years old. That man abused me for 13 years."

"At that time we had this relationship dynamic in which he made me trust him," the niece testified. "I felt as though we became confidants. We were close. That he had my back. That I could trust him. That I would be his friend. I did not have friends back then. He became sort of the only person I would talk to, confide in."

The niece said she was abused by another of her mother's brothers when she was 10 and it caused her to have panic attacks.

Muslimani said at the trial that he was living with his sister and her family and took care of his niece who needed guidance, help with her homework, rides to school and other places and help with her anxiety. "I had a lot of guilt," the niece said. "It was very shameful because I didn't understand it and I didn't know why he was doing it and I didn't know what I would have even said" to tell her parents about it. "By 16, I was completely dependent on him. He made me feel like I needed him for everything. I became very self conscious about my abilities. Things I always excelled at school ... he'd make me feel like I was inadequate like I couldn't do anything on my own ... I had to give in to his punishment or I was not going to be helped by him and that scared me. Because I didn't know what else to do."

A date has not been set in the stepdaughter's case.

Eventually, that quest was sent to the planning commission.

"Chincoteague looks like a fort," said Bowden. "Pretty soon there isn't going to be a strip of land. If we could prevent or... have regulations on it, maybe we wouldn't have our people in such an uproar about it."

While voting in favor of the Burbage water park plan, Bowen said, "If they wanted to put that water park on Landmark Plaza, I would vote against it. We're losing out big time."

"We were anxious to have development," Frese said. "We like to think we are heavily burdened with taxes. The biggest taxpayer group is the big hotels and motels."

"Another hotel. I just don't think this town can sustain that," Bowden added.

"It isn't fair." said Frese.

Leonard sided with Frese. "It's easy for the public to uproar when it's someone else's property. It's going to be a tough situation for us. What you're doing is putting the rights of some people above the rights of other people."

Bowden took some criticism about overregulating. "We tell them how high their grass has to be," she said. "We do have restrictions on people ... I just personally feel the development has gotten out of hand in this town."

Resident Pat Farley got her answer to questions regarding a closed meeting where a reorganization of workers was discussed and a plan to cut the position of director of planning was accepted.

"There was no vote taken on this matter at the March 16 meeting," town worker Karen Hipple emailed to say. "There is no record of a vote this year."

So when was the vote taken? Farley wondered. "I hope town manager and council will not continue to be secretive." She said one member "pushed for transparency" during the election. "You failed in this case to do so."

After a public hearing, council voted to allow tattoo and piercing businesses in all four commercial zones. Resident Jeanne Knight asked the members not to add it to the C4 zone. "We need to downgrade," she said.

Cape Charles Hit with Double Punch: Flood, Then Beach Closure

Schools are letting out for the summer and families are planning to head off to the beach. Those plans — at least for visitors to Cape Charles Town Beach — are temporarily moved to the back burner.

As of June 7, 2017, the Northampton Health Department had placed a swimming advisory into effect for the beach. Bacteria levels in the water were found to exceed state water quality standards for enterococci, a bacteria present normally in the gastrointestinal tract of both animals and humans.

The advisory comes on the heels of an intense downpour that left the downtown area with flooded streets and waterlogged businesses.

The National Weather Service recorded two inches of rain from Monday's fast-moving storm, but the flooding was a surprise to meteorologist Bill Sammler. from the NWS office in Wakefield, when a reporter called to check on details. He said it was the first he had heard of it.

Local residents and businesses, however, felt the full impact. "It was like 'A River Runs Through It' in my shop," said Suzanne Golibarth, owner of Periwinkles, a consignment shop on Mason Avenue. Golibarth said it was not her first flood in downtown Cape Charles. "I learned early on: Nothing goes on the floor." No merchandise was damaged.

Her adult children made short work of the water with a shop-vac, and by 7:30 Monday night had the water out, with dehumidifiers clearing out the residual moisture.

Everything will be high and dry in time for her big June 16 event, when Golibarth will celebrate being named by Virginia Living Magazine as the best consignment shop in the eastern region of Virginia.

But there was no timely clearing of the beach advisory, which was still in place at press time Thursday. "The coastal waters of Virginia are generally very clean, and we test them frequently to confirm this. On the occasions when waters do fail to meet the standards, we need to protect

June 13 Primaries Will Select Governor, Lieutenant Governor Candidates

Voters in Accomack and Northampton counties will go to the polls Tuesday, June 13, to cast their ballots in either the Republican or Democratic primaries for governor and lieutenant governor of Virginia.

Voters do not have to declare themselves a party member to vote. Participants may only vote in one of the two primaries.

Seeking the Republican nomination as the party's candidate for governor, are Edward W. (Ed) Gillespie, of Alexandria, who served as the 61st Chairman of the Republican National Committee and counselor to George W. Bush's administration; Corey A. Stewart, of Bel Air, a lawyer who is Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Prince William County; and Sen. Frank W. Wagner, of Virginia Beach, who was a delegate from 1992 to 2001, and has served as senator of the 7th District since 2000.

Seeking the Democratic Party's

nomination for governor are Lt. Gov. Ralph S. Northam, a pediatric neurologist in Norfolk who grew up in Onancock and was a state senator; and Tom S. Perriello, of Alexandria, a lawyer and former congressman.

In the Republican Party race for lieutenant governor vying are: Sen. Bryce E. Reeves, a small business owner who lives in Spotsylvania County; Del. Glen R. Davis Jr., of Virginia Beach, a former member of the Virginia Beach City Council; and Sen. Jill H. Vogel, of Fauquier County, an attorney.

In the Democratic Party race the contestants are: Justin E. Fairfax, of Annadale, a former federal prosecutor serving as deputy of the Major Crimes & Narcotics Unit and as a member of the Human Trafficking Task Force; Gene J. Rossi, a former federal prosecutor, with over 110 federal trials (90 jury) in district and bankruptcy courts; and Susan S. Platt, of Great Falls, a former campaign manager and Virginia Tourism Corporation Board member.

Saturday is the last day to vote absentee, in person, at registrar's offices in both counties. In Accomack, the registrar's office will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1 to 5 p.m., Saturday. In Northampton, the registrar's office will be open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday.

June 13 is also the deadline for candidates to get their petitions in to run in the November General Election.

In both counties, voters will select a delegate and an attorney general in November.

In Accomack, there will also be a referendum asking voters to decide if the school board should continue to be appointed by a commission that is selected by the circuit court judge or by election.

In addition in Northampton, voters will select school board members in Districts 1, 2, 3 and at large. District seats on the county board of supervisors in District 1, 2 and 3 will also be up for grabs.

On the school board, the District 1 seat held by Shannon Dunham is being sought by Maxine Rasmussen. In District 2, Paul Bibbins is the incumbent and candidate. The District 3 seat, held by Regina Elmandorf has no candidates by press time Thursday. Randall (Randy) Parks holds the at-large seat and will seek another term.

On the board of supervisors, District 1 Supervisor Granville Hogg will not run again. Two candidates have thrown their hats in the ring. They are John R. Coker and Jacqueline Chatmon. In District 2 incumbent Larry LeMond is not seeking another term. David Fauber wants that seat.

In District 3, Oliver Bennett is running for another term. At press time, he was not opposed.

Accomack Indictments

Kendrick Di'Ke Duffy, of Parksley, the man who shot a gun out of the window of a car killing a college student during the summer of 2009, was indicted Monday by an Accomack Circuit Court grand jury on counts of eluding police and possession of a firearm by a felon.

Duffy, 26, of Parksley Road, has been held without bond in Accomack Jail since the latest incident occurred on March 8, 2017. At a preliminary hearing, Deputy Eric Nottingham, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, testified he saw Duffy driving on Lankford Highway near Temperanceville at a high rate of speed that day. With his siren blaring and lights flashing, the deputy said, he followed the vehicle onto Hallwood Road clocking Duffy at 114 mph. Nottingham said Duffy eventually hit the side of a house, got out of the vehicle and ran. He later told the officer he fled because he had been smoking marijuana. A loaded gun was found in his glove compartment.

In 2010, Duffy was sentenced to 10



In August 2014, when he was out of prison for about a year, he was accused of pointing/brandishing a firearm. The witness in that case did not show up to testify and the charge was dismissed.

In another case, Jacques Pierre, 28, of Bennett Street in Parksley, was indicted a count of malicious wounding on Feb. 14. The victim was Dieutaite Tanis of Salisbury, Md. Deputy B. K. Misener, of ACSO, investigated.

Stanley Avon Ames, also known as Arthur Crutchfield, 60, of Boston Road in Painter, was indicted on a count of maliciously shooting at an occupied vehicle on Jan. 28. 



Shrieves Recieves All-American Honors, Burrows Earns Ninth at NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships

Broadwater Academy graduate Wesley Shrieves, now a junior at Christopher Newport University and a member of the track and field team, earned All-American in the men's high jump last Friday during the NCAA Outdoor Championships at the SPIRE Institute in Geneva, Ohio.

During the competition, the Captian's fourth-place finish at 2.10 meters is the third-best jump recorded in the program's history. Shrieves is also only the second member in the program's history to be awarded the All-American accolade. Although the third-best overall for CNU track, Shrieves' performance is the highest placing at the national level by a Captian.

Shrieves jumped his way to nation-

al qualification with a 2.07 mark in the high jump, to rank him the 12th seed entering the NCAA competition.


His freshman campaign marked his first conference championship in the indoor long jump. Shrieves earned a conference championship his sophomore year in the outdoor high jump and was an All-Region performer. He also earned All-Conference honors in the high and long jumps during indoor track.

Another Broadwater Academy graduate and Shrieves' teammate, Brendon Burrows, placed ninth in the men's discus during the NCAA Outdoor Championships on the first day of the Geneva, Ohio, competition.

Burrows, also a junior at CNU, unloaded a 46.42-meter throw to earn the ninth-best finish in the country, and the second-best effort in the CNU track program's history. His bid to nationals was by way of a 49.25-meter qualifying mark in the discus, seeding him 20th.

During his time as a Viking, Burrows collected a state championship in track and field. His freshman season at CNU marked a conference championship in the CAC Outdoor Championships with a 46.11-meter toss in the discus. He went on to earn All-Region honors his sophomore season and was ranked third in the South/Southeast in the discus.





Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

For once, a controversial new federal regulation brought a positive result for Eastern Shore of Virginia anglers.

Delayed opening of the 2017 cobia season, which began June 1, allowed a larger than normal population of the highly popular gamefish to avoid the relentless fishing pressure of the southern tidewater cobia fishing fleet. The result was a sizable group of fish in the upper bay.

As of last Saturday, cobia catches had been reported out of Cape Charles, Bayford, Morley's Wharf, Saxis, and as far north as Bloodsworth and South Marsh Islands in Maryland. The fishery off Onancock has been reminiscent of the early days when the town billed itself as the "Cobia Capital of the World."

The ESVA Anglers' Club is hosting a Kid's Fishing Day on June 11 from 1-2:30 p.m. at Morley's Wharf fishing pier. The event is free and open to kids 3-15 years old. The first 50 participants will be provided with rods and reels. Registration begins at 12:30 p.m., and a cookout will follow. The pier is at the end of Morley's Wharf Road near Wardtown. For more information, call 757-824-1485.

The club's next meeting is Monday, June 12, at 7:30 p.m., at the Sage Diner in Onley. A free presentation on trolling for red drum will be given by Andy Dize. The public is invited.

Upper Bay – Matt Abell, of Sea Hawk Sports Center, confirmed that cobia were getting most of the attention over the last week with catches coming from Onancock to South Marsh. Most anglers were chumming and fishing chunks of fresh or frozen bunker on fish finder rigs. Speckled trout and small rockfish continue to be caught by casters throwing jigs around the marsh islands. Red drum catches were still being made by anglers soaking soft crab baits, but cow-nosed rays, known locally as bullfish were becoming unwanted by-catches. Chase Byrd landed a black drum in the vicinity of Stone Rock. Tangier Sound was producing speckled trout and some keeper rockfish.

Chincoteague – Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle reported that limit catches were the norm for anglers targeting black sea bass on the offshore wrecks. The shop registered a couple of mako shark catches over the weekend. Flounder fishing was still productive, with anglers seeing an increase in the number of throwbacks; however, fish to 23-inches were brought in. Watts Bay near Four Mouths, the southside of Assateague Bridge, and the main channel in front of Donald Leonard Park, all produced flounder catches. The shop registered a 45-inch red drum that was caught off the surf on Wallops Island as well as a 36-inch bluefish from the beach on Assateague. Captain Bob's reported flounder catches in front of Tom's Cove Campground, under the Assateague Bridge in the "junkyard," and in Oyster Bay. There was a "scattering" of flounder in the Chincoteague Channel, where bluefish were being caught from in front of the American Legion Building up to the town fishing pier. Sea mullet (whiting, kingfish) catches came from between Markers 11 and 16 near the inlet. Coastal shark catches in the two-foot to four-foot range were being made inside the inlet on the shop's "shark snack" rigs. A 412-pound thresher shark was landed by Tim Nielson.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, reported flounder catches were being made in Bullshead Channel on the flats, as well as Drawing and Green Channels. The old staple of live minnows and strips of squid were the most successful combinations. Capt. Abell led his party to limit catches of flounder in Folly Creek. A couple of boats ran offshore for some deep dropping and returned with nice catches of blueline tilefish. Surf fishermen found good catches of tasty whiting, a few red drum and increasing numbers of large southern stingrays. Donald, from Don's Tackle echoed the flounder activity in Folly Creek, as well as off Quinby. He had not received any reports from offshore.

Lower Shore - Red drum and cobia are getting most of the attention here. James, at Chris's Bait & Tackle, reported that the trophy red drum release fishery was still going strong off Fisherman's Island. Cobia have shown up in good numbers inside the bay, with catches coming from nine-foot Shoals and Buoy 13. Sand mullet were described as being "everywhere!" Spanish mackerel have arrived with catches coming from vessels trolling the oceanfront as well as the mouth of the bay. Expect this fishery to improve as the waters warm. Limits of spadefish catches were made around the pilings and the rock islands of the Chesapeake Bay

Bridge-Tunnel. Anglers were still enjoying success with flounder off Oyster.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.



Play Dramatizes Civil War Experiences of Eastern Shore Women

Civil War history books are filled with re-tellings of strategy, troop movements and battles. What are less known are accounts of those on the homefront where, although removed from the battlefield, the hardships of shortages and uncertainty were keenly felt as women held together families and farms with resourcefulness and determination.

"Stronger Than Steel: Civil War Voices of Eastern Shore Women," is a 10-women play that was researched and written by Kellee Blake, former director of the National Archives, Mid-Atlantic Region.

To craft her narratives, Blake drew on public records, but was also given access to local family archives. In letters, diaries and other family papers she found the colorful details that brought the stories of "Stronger than Steel" to life.

"The play sold out last year and is being returned to the stage by the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities," said Blake. It is also being professionally filmed by Isdell Photography. Among the experiences chronicled," said Blake, are "enslaved women in Onancock and Cheriton, plantation mistresses of Eastville and Onancock, a "Yankee" schoolteacher at Locustville, a Belle Haven widow, a teenager from Bradford's Neck, and even a Shore woman of ill-repute!"

Wallops to Host Groundwater Information Session June 14

NASA, in partnership with the town of Chincoteague, Environmental Protection Agency, Virginia Department of Health, and the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality, will hold a public information session on recent groundwater and drinking water testing from 5 - 7 p.m., Wednesday, June 14, at the Wallops Visitors Center.

NASA has been testing the facility's groundwater monitoring and drinking water wells, and Chincoteague's drinking water wells, for the presence of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). These tests were done because of historic firefighting activities located on the northcentral portion of Wallops mainbase. Firefighters conducted training with a commonly-used firefighting foam that contains PFAS compounds. The firefighting foam was also used to extinguish fires from two aircraft crashes that occurred on Wallops' runways.

All tests results of the Wallops drinking water and Town of Chincoteague's drinking water show that the water is safe to drink. These tests were done using an independent laboratory for analysis and reviewed by state and federal health agencies.

NASA will have environmental experts staffing information booths to provide information on the actions NASA has taken to date related to PFAS and to outline future plans and actions. Additionally, health officials will be onsite to answer questions.

Chincoteague Refuge To Increase Fees

Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge will increase fees, effective June 23, according to a press release issued by Refuge Manager Kevin Sloan.

Sloan said public input was sought and considered before making the change.

Under the plan, daily passes will be eliminated. Weekly passes will be \$20, an increase of \$5. Yearly passes will be \$40, an increase of \$10. Refuge passes are also good for entrance to Assateague Island National Seashore in Maryland. Entrance fees will be waived for passengers of local courtesy shuttles, such as those typically used by hotels and motels. Hikers and cyclists can still enter at no cost.

"The increase in entrance fees is sorely

needed to cover ever-increasing costs associated with maintaining and improving refuge infrastructure that supports visitor activities," said Sloan. "This astonishing beautiful refuge is the gem of the Atlantic Coast, offering exceptional wildlife viewing, surf fishing, and beach recreation found nowhere else."

The refuge is estimated to generate \$50 million for the town of Chincoteague and \$200 million in economic benefits for Virginia's Eastern Shore each year.

Sloan said the fees are an important source of revenue for repairs that maintain beach parking lots. Without the collection of entrance fees, refuge and seashore maintenance staff would be unable to make needed repairs to the parking lots, which are built to support 1,000 vehicles.

"It's hard to know how this will effect the business, but I hope the beach closing will be short term," said Severn Rayfield, owner of Rayfield's Pharmacy in Cape Charles. "I do think that business will be booming for the length of time the beach will be closed."

Signs were posted to warn visitors. "We encourage the public to protect their health by complying with this advisory," said Matson.

When water again meets the standard, the public will be notified.

GROWING OYSTERS TO RESTORE WILD REEFS

Special to the Eastern Shore Post The fertile waters fed by the tides of Nassawadox Creek have proven to be a productive spot for Steve Cibik's burgeoning oyster garden. A day after closing on his new home on the creek last summer, Cibik went to a Chesapeake Bay Foundation oyster gardening seminar to pick up five wire cages full of peasized baby oysters, called spat, reared on native oyster shell. After almost a year hanging from his dock, those have now multiplied to 15 cages, as the original oysters have grown and are joined by wild oysters setting on the shells.

Although the oysters now look delicious, Cibik isn't raising them for meals and roasts. Instead, later this year they will be planted on a Virginia sanctuary reef to restore the wild oyster population. Oysters in Virginia have been decimated by years of disease and pollution, but are slowly staging a comeback thanks in part to restoration efforts, including those of oyster gardening volunteers.

Cibik says he is a self-professed oyster lover giving back after years of oyster roasts. "I always joke that oysters crashed in the Chesapeake Bay because I ate them all," he said. "This is just me trying to do my part to help rebuild the population and improve water quality."

The Chesapeake Bay Foundation holds

seminars on the Eastern Shore each June to teach new growers the ropes. Gardeners receive two wire cages to hang in the water off a dock or bulkhead. One is filled with spat about the size of your pinky nail. These will outgrow their cages after a few months, and gardeners eventually split their broods into the second cages.

Over time, the oyster-filled cages become homes to all sorts of critters, recreating the habitat offered by wild oyster reefs. Baby blue crabs are often curious, entering when they can still slip between the cage's wires. After a few molts, the blue crabs grow too large to exit the cage and look at the oysters as a buffet. Gardeners remove these as soon as possible before they make a meal of too many of their oysters.

The oysters in these cages spawn as they mature, increasing the local population. At the same time, they play an important role cleaning the water by feeding on algae and other particles from the water. A single adult oyster can filter up to 50 gallons of water per day.

After a year, growers part with their adult oysters to be planted in sanctuary reefs off-limits to harvest. At these roundups, the gardeners also receive a new set of baby oysters to repeat the cycle.

As a fisherman, Cibik likes the idea of bringing back this historic habitat in the Chesapeake. Reefs are good fishing spots because they provide structure, shelter for baitfish, and improve water quality. "I think the whole idea of trying to rebuild these sanctuary reefs is really cool." Cibik said. "How are we ever going to restore the Bay if we don't rebuild those ecosystems?"

An oyster gardening workshop will he held at the VIMS Lab in Wachapreague on Tuesday, June 13, from 6 - 8 p.m. New oyster gardeners must register ahead of time at www.cbf.org/vaoystergardening

Bay Restoration is Succeeding! Dear Editor:

On Saturday, 20 volunteers collected approximately 390 pounds of litter including automobile tires, plastic bottles, and aluminum cans. I participated and worked with three other people to clean up Ware Point at the mouth of Onancock Creek. We traveled to Ware Point by boat and anchored off the beach, placing a bow anchor on the beach and a stern anchor out into the creek. The stern anchor did not hold well, but I was very pleasantly surprised to find it had been fouled by eel grass. What a surprise!

About 30 years ago, I used to participate in the annual Fish and Wildlife "Submerged Aquatic Vegetation" survey. At that time, there were very few grasses in Onancock Creek, and over a few vears, that dwindled to no grasses anywhere in the creek. So, when I found the eel grass at Ware Point, I was very pleasantly surprised. Then on Sunday, I noticed for the first time what looked

like horned pondweed growing alongside my dock on Onancock Creek. What a shock: There has never been any grass there in the past 30 years! There are also native oysters growing along the edges of the creek. The bay is recovering; great news!

Over the last few years the EPA has done a lot of work to clean up the bay. There is a down side to the picture, though. President Trump's budget had emasculated [made weaker] the EPA and has eliminated all funding for bay restoration. Just when we are seeing significant progress to restore the economy of the bay — oysters, crabs, and fish — President Trump is cutting the program. I hope everyone who loves the bay will express their concerns to Scott Taylor, Mark Warner, and Michael Keane. We have made great progress. Now is not the time to stop bay restoration; the EPA's plans are working!
