NORTHAMPTON GRADUATES 86 33 GRADUATE WITH HONORS

Eighty-six Northampton High School students earned diplomas at the school's annual commencement ceremony held June 17.

Thirty-three students — over one-third of the graduating class — were honor graduates, led by valedictorian Alexandra Froehlich, salutatorian Stephanie Kellam, third honor student John Curry,

Manslaughter Conviction in Route 13 Shooting Death

Tyquon Demetrius Robins got angry while shopping at a Nelsonia convenience store last June because he thought he was disrespected by another customer who appeared to not appreciate his turf.

So the 25-year-old, who is also known as Otis and lived on Deer Drive in Nelsonia, left the business in a tirade yelling, "You all don't want this." He waited in the parking lot, waved what authorities believe was a gang-colored bandana, followed a car full of people and then shot at the vehicle several times killing one of the passengers.

The victim, Fardale (also known as Fairdale) Antonio Johnson, 39, of Mappsville, died a short time later.

An Accomack Circuit Court jury convicted Robins Wednesday of voluntary manslaughter and shooting from a vehicle, both felonies, following a two-day

trial. The panel recommended Robins be sentenced to 10 years in prison for each offense, the maximum terms he could receive for the crimes.

The jury chose manslaughter over first-degree murder, for which Robins was indicted. They also could have chosen second-degree murder or acquittal. In addition, the jury found him guilty of use of a firearm in a murder. However, since they didn't convict him of actual "murder," Judge W. Revell Lewis ruled the conviction to be "null and void."

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan agreed with the action saying it "could avoid a mistrial."

Defense lawyer Carl Bundick wanted the other firearm charge to be struck as well.

"That is overreaching," said Morgan. "Count three is a separate offense."

Lewis said he would not consider Bundick's request because Johnson died from a gunshot wound.

Bundick previously argued for all charges to be dismissed because the evidence was circumstantial. "Things that didn't get presented are things that don't exist," Bundick said. "You just can't believe maybe what could have been. That is speculating," he later told the jury.

A gun was not recovered and no one testified who actually saw the defendant fire the shots. However, the sequence of events has him following the car when a passerby heard the shots and the casings hit his vehicle, which

Proposed Fee Nixed for Advanced Placement, Dual Enrollment Classes

Changes to the 2017-2018 Accomack County Course Offering Guide occupied most of the discussion at Tuesday's School Board meeting, especially a proposal to charge a \$100 nonrefundable fee for each advanced placement or dual enrollment class in which a student enrolls, or \$50 if the student receives free or reduced lunch. The course fee was ultimately defeated, but several other changes did pass.

The proposed changes to the guide were prepared by a committee of high school and middle school principals, teachers, and staff "familiar with high school credits and what [the school division is] required to offer," said Assistant Superintendent of Instruction Rhonda Hall in a later interview. The revisions were initially presented to the board at its June 6 meeting, at which time additional changes were suggested.

Copies of revisions to the guide were not made public prior to either school board meeting. Parents were not invited into the process, said Hall, because the committee was comprised of those with the knowledge to ensure compliance with federal education and content guidelines.

Two board members said they received phone calls from parents. "I got 10 phone calls today," said school board member Camesha Handy, about the proposed \$100 fee.

The intent of the proposed fee was to create student buy-in. Handy said at the community college she observed where there were no expectations on students beyond showing up for class, those students tended to have worse outcomes than those more personally invested in the class. "When the parents show up with a checkbook, those students are there diligently," she said.

Board member Audrey Furness objected to charging anything for the advanced classes. "I just don't agree," she said. "I think it's going to cut down on the number of students taking the courses."

Board member George Waldenmaier also argued against the fee. Dr. Antonio

Baines, who was the graduation keynote speaker at Nandua and a former student of Walendmaier, "was frankly outraged that we would start charging for the courses that got him where he is." Baines' ability to take those classes, was "a deciding factor in someone who is a Ph.D. cancer researcher," Waldenmaier said.

Ultimately, the fee was not approved, but the board did approve a modification to an existing policy that requires a \$75 fee if an advanced placement or dual enrollment class is dropped more than five days after classes start. The modification is that the fee must be paid before a student can enroll in another advanced placement or dual enrollment class, superceding a requirement to make students wait one semester before re-enrolling in those classes.

A final recommendation the board accepted before signing off on the revised guide was to allow parents to require their children to take exams, even if they are able to be exempted based on a combination of grades and attendance.

Waldenmaier argued that college students "live and die" by exam grades, and by exempting high-achieving students, "We're sending students to college unprepared." A majority of the board agreed to let parents decide whether to override in writing the exam exemption.

Other changes to the course offering guide reviewed June 6 included computing final class rank after senior exams, and eligibility requirements for dual enrollment classes.

Hall later said the revised guide will be rolled out to parents before the start of the school year. "We are going to have a forum so parents will know what's in this guide," she said. Copies will also be made available online, in schools, and at the public library.

The night marked board member Travis Thornton's last meeting. Chairman Ronnie Holden recognized him, as two rows of family looked on. "He's been a great board member for 18 years," he said.

Cape Charles Police Chief Commends Force for Handling of Recent Cases

Cape Charles police chief Jim Pruitt stood up at the end of the town's council meeting Thursday evening, June 15, to praise his team and thank the council after learning Tuesday of the conviction of Lenny Kenner, who had committed sex crimes against a six-year-old girl.

Pruitt announced that the town is "watched over by an amazing group

of men," in particular, Jake Leuer, the primary officer who worked on the Kenner case.

For nearly two years, the police were working on two separate cases involving sex crimes. Frederick Baker, a Cape Charles teenager, was convicted last year of sex crimes against a 21-year-old woman and the recommended sentence was 30 years in prison. Kenner's recom-

mended sentence is life plus seven years.

Pruitt is "extremely proud of Jake" and the other officers who reliably completed their regular shift work while handling the challenging criminal cases. He noted that Leuer spent long hours traveling across the Chesapeake Bay and testifying in forensic and FBI interviews on the disturbing details of the emotionally exhausting

Kenner case, yet Leuer never asked for a break when Pruitt offered one.

Pruitt personally thanked the town council for allowing him to hire his own backup team.

Also present at the meeting was Nancy Stern, CEO of Eastern Shore Rural Health System. She answered questions from the town council about the East-ville Community Health Center, expected to undergo construction in November.

Tammy Holloway, new president of the Cape Charles Business Association, introduced herself and announced her intention to focus on providing more "outreach" for new businesses.

Carol Evans, of the Eastern Shore Tourism Commission, discussed her strategy for attracting visitors who are interested in local culture and who prefer a "customized tourism experience." She suggested the town increase its online presence via Instagram, which is growing at a faster rate than Facebook. Fifty-three percent of vacationers have changed their plans because of something they saw on Instagram, she said.

New Eastville Health Center Clears Another Hurdle

The Northampton County Board of Supervisors approved a grant funding review for the Eastville Community Health Center at its June 13 meeting.

To fund construction of the new health center, Eastern Shore Rural Health System is seeking financial assistance through grants and loans from USDA Rural Development in addition to running a capital fund campaign. The purpose of the June 13 review was for the board of supervisors to decide whether the proposed project would "conflict with any adopted plans, policies, goals, or projects of this jurisdiction or agency." Chairman Spencer Murray stated that there was "no competing interest with the USDA."

Granville Hogg was the only board member who disapproved. In reference to the new health center, he emphasized, "It's a great project; it's needed," but the current plan for the new establishment "doesn't give the town the opportunity to expand" in terms of infrastructure for water, sewage, or otherpublic services.

Hogg said that the town was "missing a golden opportunity." His was the only dissenting vote; the review was approved 3-1. Oliver Bennett was absent for the vote. The board also approved amendments to the 2017 budget, including a \$96,797 grant from the Shore Health Foundation for a new ambulance.

Commission Recommends Disbanding Onley Fire & Rescue

There's about to be a fire fight and someone is probably going to get burned.

Accomack's Fire & Rescue Commission voted Tuesday to recommend that county supervisors "begin the process of dissolving" Onley Fire & Rescue Company. Commission chairman Harry Thornton of Chincoteague reported the action to the supervisors Wednesday. He said 12 of 16 commissioners favored it.

The issue will be put on the supervisors' July 19 agenda so members would have time to review the commission's report. At that time, Chief Allen Nicholson of Onley will be allowed to speak publicly to the supervisors. At Wednesday's meeting, Nicholson asked for six months to get the company back on track. He took over in May after former Chief Chris Davis left for a job in Suffolk.

"I really hate to see it dissolved," said Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy, who lives in Onley. "There's got to be something done. The people in Onley are really complaining about things that have been happening," Gordy said.

There will be "no effect on service be-

cause neighboring companies are taking care of the service now," Thornton said. "I'm sorry it has to come to this."

Dr. Denise Harrison recently gave notice that she will no longer serve as the company's Operational Medical Director (OMD) effective July 8. The commission report stated, Nicholson made "inappropriate comments toward Dr. Harrison." He told the Eastern Shore Post last week the reason was a difference of opinion regarding procedure. Meanwhile he is working with an agency to get a new OMD.

The Onley company stopped providing firefighting services in early February and has not had EMS transport since mid-March. The purpose of the commission study "is to gather information regarding the lack of service and financial responsibility of the organization." A time of events included a 2014 conviction of a member who embezzled money from the company, a 2016 conviction of a member who set a truck ablaze and Davis' report that the company would cease operation at the beginning of 2017.

Officials talked several years ago

about combining three companies -Tasley, Onancock and Onley. The decision was left to the volunteers. Tasley is preparing to build a new firehouse.

When a committee met with Nicholson, he questioned why the other two chiefs were part of the group. Jeff Flournoy, the communication center director, and C. Ray Pruitt of Accomack County Public Safety, were also on the committee and met with seven members of Onley. The committee wanted to know why Onley sold "good equipment" and hasn't borrowed from another company to stay in service. Nicholson said the decisions were made before his time and he has been unable to borrow.

The Onley chief told the committee an ambulance response company was going to be contracted until the station could get its new ambulance up and running. But Pruitt said permission from the county supervisors to enter such an agreement would be needed and Pruitt did not support the move. Also according to the report, Nicholson would not give the committee a list of members or say who the four people were who are living in the firehouse. Two of them, Nicholson said last week, he and his wife — who is also a company member — live there.

Nicholson and Deputy Chief Josh Ruby told the committee Davis created questionable bills. Davis was working for public safety before he went to Suffolk. Pruitt told the chiefs to contact the state police about the bills and he would let the county attorney and county administrator know.

In a separate report regarding rescue calls county-wide, Pruitt said 95 percent of the calls to the Onley area are being answered by Onancock with the rest going to Bloxom and Melfa. Tasley does not have EMS. A chart showed Onley answered none of the 30 calls in its area in March within the 20-minute requirement, one of 36 in April in the requirement and zero of 34 in May. In 2016, they answered none of the 36 calls in 20 minutes in March, none of the 40 calls in April and none of 44 in May.

The hospital's move to Onley earlier this year also has an impact on the need for service in the area.

A new map of evacuation zones and shelter locations was also submitted to the supervisors by Pruitt. The new division is easier for the public to understand and is more detailed. Pamphlets about the four zones are going to be sent to citizens in a mass mailing.

The supervisors also recognized the four valedictorians. They were Hallie Leah Daley of Tangier Combined School, Emilie Rose Hollingsworth of Chincoteague High, Alexis Monet Kellam of Arcadia High, and Tanner Lewis Troyer of Nandua High.

Superintendent Chris Holland said, \$2.2 million in scholarships were given to graduates this year. "Very proud and I need you all's support."

The board will hold a public hearing next month before they hand over (for \$10) the old Veterans Affairs Office, next to the county's new courthouse, to the town of Accomac. "The building has significant structural issues and is no longer used by the county. It is more of a liability



than an asset at this time," Crockett said.

The supervisors also made commission and board appointments. Mary Ester Leonard was appointed to the Accomack Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission for the first time. She will be filling the unexpired term of Karen Hipple until June 2019. Tony Washington, Lisa Cropper Johnson and Gary Miller were reappointed to the panel, all through June 2021. T. Lee Byrd and Earl Frederick were reappointed to the Wetlands Board through 2021. David Elebash was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Jim White. Gwendolyn Turner was reappointed to the Accomack Northampton Planning District Commission through June 2018. The board appointed Terry Ewell, Ted Lewis and Robie Marsh to the Eastern Shore Community College Board through 2021. Peter Lalor and Elaine Meil were put back on the Eastern Shore Broadband Authority. Members Bill Burnham, Supervisor Donald Hart, John Joeckel, Wayne Merritt and Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr were reappointed to the Eastern Shore Regional Navigable Waterways Committee. Ace Seybolt will serve on the Eastern Shore Tourism Commission at the pleasure of the supervisors in an at-large capacity.

A&N OPENS NEW TANGIER ISLAND FACILITY

The residents of Tangier can look forward to more reliable electric service thanks to a newly upgraded island facility.

A&N Electric Cooperative held an open house and ribbon cutting ceremony to officially open its new Tangier Island facility on Wednesday, June 7.

"We're here to showcase our commitment to the community of the Eastern Shore," A&N Electric Cooperative President and CEO Butch Williamson told a large group of Tangier residents gathered for the event.

The new Tangier facility includes a new office building, an upgraded substation and a renovated generator building which contains two 1,200 kW generators that can operate simultaneously for a peak output of 2,400 kW.

"This is as good as any facility on the mainland," said A&N Board Chairman Addison Nottingham. "I'm really impressed with it. It's going to make things better for the people of Tangier. When the weather is bad, you'll have this to count on. This will do a good job for you."

Upgrades to the new facility will allow A&N Electric Cooperative employees to better control service on the island and on nearby Smith Island, Md. Some new features also will allow A&N's Tasley headquarters to control some of the facility's operations from the mainland.

"The Eastern Shore is fortunate to have A&N as our electricity provider," said Accomack Board of Supervisors Chairman Robert Crockett. "The watermen here realize how important it is to keep the electricity going. They have thousands and thousands of dollars worth of crabs shedding and they need power to keep those pumps going. Without a service like A&N to keep the electricity going it would cost them their livelihood for that season."

Carjacker Sentenced

An 18-year-old man was sentenced recently in Accomack Circuit Court to 32 years in prison for his part in the carjacking and related charges involving Supervisor Reneta Major.

Dontrail Atqwan Johnson, of Main Street in Melfa, got 15 years with 11 years suspended for the carjacking and three years for use of a firearm in a felony. After he serves the time for the gun charge, he will be allowed to be in a youthful offender program for the rest of his term, which is four years.

He got a suspended three-year term on each of three counts of grand larceny and a count of property destruction. A two year term was also suspended for maliciously shooting at a vehicle. After serving three years for use of a firearm, he would go to a youthful offender program for four years. Further orders included 10 years for good behavior, five years for supervised probation and restitution of \$1,603.57. His driver's license was suspended for six months.

His accomplice, Dabreon Lamant Tankard, 15, of Woodland Avenue in Melfa, was also given a total of 32 years, with all but 10 suspended.

In another case, Marcus LaCurtis Joynes, 36, of Chincoteague Lane in Wattsville, was sentenced to five years for burglary with a year suspended and 12 months for sexual battery in connection with September 2014 incidents. He was ordered to be on good behavior upon release for 20 years.

Tyler Jermaine Ladson, 22, of Dockview Street in Harborton, was convicted of petty larceny of property belonging to Frank Havens and two counts of felony shoplifting from Walmart in October 2016.

Rontari Malik Warren, 23, of Diamond Road in Birdsnest, pleaded guilty to grand larceny of a vehicle belonging to Rachel Chandler. The crime occurred in August 2015. A presentence report was ordered.

Three Felony Charges in Accomack

was third in line.

Evidence during the sentencing phase of the trial included Robins' convictions for disorderly conduct, intoxication in public, reckless driving by speeding 82 mph in a 55 mph zone and driving without a license in his possession.

Johnson was out of jail for less than 24 hours when he was killed. He had thought he was going to spend his first night of freedom celebrating and shooting pool with three other men including the father of his grandchildren, Ja'mes Nelson of Mappsville.

Nelson, who was sitting in the front seat of the car when the shots were fired, testified, "We were trying our best to get away and we couldn't. He was right on us." Nelson said he shook hands with another man in the store but didn't extend it to Robins because the defendant's hands were full. "He just got hotheaded ... he threw his beer down on the counter and cursed ... he was waving his flag ... he circled the gas pumps around us ... we got in car and ... he darted out behind us on the highway."

The cars both went north towards Mappsville on Lankford Highway.

"We heard these caps and thought it was nothing but then Fardale yells out 'I'm hit," said Nelson. "We heard a few more shots ... the tire goes flat" and the car that Robins was driving passes them at a high rate of speed, he added.

Bundick asked Nelson about his

criminal history in an attempt to discredit the witness. Nelson admitted he had been convicted of a felony. At one point he told Bundick, "Don't toy with me, I have a lot lost by this."

Evidence included a forensic study of seven Winchester caliber 9 mm Luger cartridge cases identified as being fired from the same gun and found in and around the road and in the car just after the shooting occurred. A bullet was recovered from Johnson's body during an autopsy and three bullet fragments were also found at the scene. Johnson was shot twice. The one in the back caused his death. The other was in the forearm.

Claudia Garcia, Robins' girlfriend, was in the car with the defendant when the incident occurred. She hadn't gotten the brakes repaired and thought they might crash, so she closed her eyes. She said she heard the noise but didn't see anything. Garcia also admitted she still cared for Robins. The prosecutor said she changed her story on the witness stand.

After the verdict was read, Robins bumped his wrists together and a snapping noise could be heard. It was heard again from a row where his brothers sat. Before he was taken back to jail, he asked if he could hug his mother, who was in the courtroom. Lewis denied the request.

Morgan was elected as commonwealth's attorney last November. It was his first murder trial.

Two of those people are Margaret Webb and Bessie Wynn, next-door neighbors in Nassawadox whose homes were repaired by Smith and toured as part of the award event. They qualified for USDA grant funds for seniors 62 and older to make health and safety improvements in their rural homes.

In addition to the home repair grants for senior citizens, USDA provides loans for current and future homeowners to repair existing homes or purchase new homes in rural areas. To qualify for assistance, you must have a dependable household income less than 50 percent of the average in-

come in your area, and the ability to make loan payments. You need to show that you have good credit, but cannot obtain an affordable loan elsewhere. You must be a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident and live in the home you are repairing or purchasing.

A direct home loan through USDA Rural Development requires no down payment, has a one-percent fixed interest rate and can be repaid over 20 years or longer. Loans can be used to purchase or refinance an existing home, or construct a new home. Applications are accepted year-round as long as funding is available, and processed on a firstcome, first-served basis.

For fiscal year 2017, USDA's investment in Eastern Shore homes is approaching \$500,000. In Accomack and Northampton counties, the average home loan obtained through USDA in 2016 was about \$70,000. In Accomack County, home loans acquired through USDA in 2017 averaged more than \$150,000. For home repair, a \$20,000 loan, \$7,500 grant, or combination of both is the maximum amount of assistance available.

In Webb's home, safety repairs included the removal of an old-fashioned ceramic bathtub and replacement with a walk-in shower. Ceiling damage caused by roof leaks was repaired. Hand rails on the front porch were replaced. A hole, through which birds had entered the home, was repaired with vinyl.

Wynn's roof was replaced – in the same distinctive shade of blue as the original. as she requested. Rain gutters and downspouts were installed. Her front porch, front door and storm door were replaced. Bathroom repairs were completed.

Both women smiled throughout the ceremony, expressing appreciation of everyone involved in their home improvements. "It means a whole lot to me. I enjoy it," said Webb.

9-1-1 Center Phone Instructions Revive Child After Fall into Pool

When the 9-1-1 Communications Center received a call that a 2-year-old child in the Melfa area was not breathing and had turned blue after an accidental fall into a swimming pool, dispatchers did two things.

They verified the address of the emergency and immediately dispatched an ambulance. Then they provided life-saving CPR instructions using emergency medical dispatch guide cards, which includes how to perform chest compressions and rescue breathing.

After almost two minutes of CPR instructions, the caller reported the child was starting to breathe and it wasn't long before he could be heard crying in the background of the call. The communications officers remained on the telephone with the caller until medical personnel arrived from the Melfa Volunteer Fire & Rescue Co. and the Wachapreague Volunteer Fire Co.

The child was taken to the hospital for treatment and evaluation. and released the following day. The family reported the child is fully recovered.

Communications officers at the 9-1-1 Center are all trained in emergency medical dispatch, better known as EMD. This training includes techniques on proper call questioning during emergency medical incidents, as well as how to provide pre-arrival medical instructions and following the guidelines and procedures of the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials. Recertification in EMD is required every two years for

Leatherbury Elected to State Bar Executive Committee

The Eastern Shore is now represented on the Virginia State Bar Council's Executive Committee. Beverly Powell Leatherbury. Northampton's Assistant County Attorney and Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney, recently became one of six elected members on the twelve-member committee.

The purpose of the 81-member Virginia State Bar Council is to monitor professional and ethical conduct of Virginia attorneys and to provide them with continuing education. As Leatherbury states, it serves "to make lawyers better people... and citizens." The council also promotes pro-bono work, maintains a lawyer referral service, and provides other services for lawyers and the public. The council regularly meets three times per year. The executive

committee to which Leatherbury was elected provides "overall governance for the state bar," and functions as needed when the council is not in session. "It's a further opportunity to serve... and represent the bar in a larger way."

Leatherbury was appointed to the Virginia State Bar Council in 2012 by the Virginia Supreme Court. She noted that in the past, it was difficult for an Eastern Shore attorney to have an opportunity at an elected position, as Accomack and Northampton counties belonged to the same judicial district as Norfolk and Virginia Beach - more prominent and populated areas. The Virginia Supreme Court made it possible for the two counties to be represented on the executive committee, and Leatherbury is now that representative. She said it is an honor to be able "to achieve a higher level of recognition for the state bar on the Eastern Shore."



Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

The offshore fishing season began in earnest this week with the arrival of yellowfin tuna within reach of Eastern Shore ports, as well as the first reported white marlin release of the year. Shark numbers are increasing from the surf line to the canyons.

Inshore, bait fishing while chumming has out-produced sightcasting for cobia in the lower Chesapeake Bay. Flounder fishing has been up and down, depending on the water clarity, and the first big influx of croaker has been reported on the lower seaside off Oyster.

Chincoteague – Jimmy, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reported that some of the best trophy flounder fishing of the season occurred last weekend as the shop weighed in four fish exceeding six pounds, the largest doormat tipping the scales at an impressive 7-2! Surf fishing has produced catches of sea mullet (whiting) and sharks, measuring up to 76 inches. Blacktips, spinners and dusky sharks are prowling the warm inshore waters. Triggerfish have taken up their summer residence over the offshore wrecks.

Donna Rae, of Captain Bob's Offshore Tackle, reported that the shop weighed in a 124-pound make shark for Pennsylvania anglers Brad Shaffer and Jason Ganese. The pair were fishing along the 30-fathom line, some 45 miles east of the inlet. Donna said that large sharks are patrolling the waters around the inlet. The best reported flounder action came from the two deep holes in front of Tom's Cove, in Assateague Channel. Queen Sound produced some undersized trout as well as some juvenile cobia. Pink Berkley Gulp Swimming Mullets and pink Mylar rigs have been the hot color and combinations.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, reported that flounder fishing has not been very con-

sistent, with lots of undersized fish. He estimated some days there are 10 to 12 throwbacks for every keeper fish. The big news is there was a brief push of warm water into the Washington and Norfolk canyons producing a limited run of yellowfin tuna. The Fin Seeker, Bite Me, and the Heat Wave were among the vessels that were able to capitalize on the bite. A recent inshore trip with Matt Abell produced five keeper flounder out of a catch of 25 to 30 fish out of Folly Creek. Don's Tackle Shop reported flounder fishing was "pretty decent" out of Wachapreague last weekend. A charter fishing trip last weekend with Captain Bobby Turner aboard the Bobby Sue produced 20 flounder, 10 of which were keepers measuringmore than 17 inches.

Lower Shore – Chris, from Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported flounder fishing has been hit and miss, depending on the water conditions. She recommended the waters inside of Oyster Inlet as well as the ditch off Kiptopeke for your best shot at a keeper flounder. Anglers targeting flounder inside Oyster experienced the first good croaker numbers of the season as a bycatch. The cobia bite continues to be good in the lower Chesapeake Bay. Sightcasters have been hindered by the bright sunny days, but anglers chumming and fishing with chunks of menhaden continue to have the best success, though sharks and rays have become unwelcome bycatches. Sea mullet fishing has been good in front of Sunset Beach and the fourth island of the bridge tunnel has been the most consistent spot for spadefish.

Upper Bay – Speckled trout continue to be caught in the shallows of Pocomoke Sound, but undersized rockfish continue to dominate the shallow water action. Larger speckles have been reported in Tangier Sound. Sea

Hawk Sports Center reported that one party recently landed five fish more than 20 inches in length in a single trip. MirrOlure MirrOdine suspending jerk baits have been the hot lure during the first of the flood tide. Popping corks have also enjoyed success. The deep water rocks continue to produce a variety of bottom fish, including sea mullet, croaker, spot, bluefish and flounder.

Offshore – Boats willing to make the long run offshore north to the Poor Man's Canyon, the Hot Dog, or the Washington Canyon, as well as south to the Norfolk Canyon have been rewarded with catches of nice sized yellowfin tuna. Chincoteague's Josh Harrison registered the first locally reported white marlin release of the year on a recent trip. Makos, hammerheads, and large dusky sharks are being caught from the 30- to the 50-fathom line, especially in the vicinity of offshore wrecks.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia


