

Chincoteague Bay Field Station Future Uncertain

The Chincoteague Bay Field Station, a campus where marine science research and related programs are performed, needs money for operations and to pay off \$12 million worth of debt.

Officials from the 11 Pennsylvania schools that operate the facility at Wallops Island are hoping some undisclosed colleges or agencies will come to their rescue.

"The field station is for sale," Elise Trelegan, CBFS's acting executive director, said Wednesday. She also serves as education director for the campus. "We are not closing by any means. We're definitely looking for some universities in Virginia to see if they are interested in partnering with us."

"General money issues" at the Pennsylvania schools "go beyond the field station," Trelegan explained. "Basically, we're looking to diversify by acquiring more partners ... East Stroudsburg University, Millersville University and Kutztown University pay the most," she said. "They are looking for others to come on ... or another university to take over the field station with the same diverse program."

There were no "for sale" signs this week at the property, which includes 400 beds in traditional and more comfortable (air-conditioned) dorms, eight wet labs, an auditorium, classrooms and a cafeteria. And a listing for the property was not found. The faculties of the three top universities affiliated with the field station have been doing research there for 49 years, Trelegan added. "Nobody has been told we might close. I think that it has been put on the market

but in Pennsylvania," she added.

"The goal is to maintain the programs that we have," the executive director continued. "We might grow and

Baked Potato Bars: Coming to a Northampton School Near You

Student nutrition was on the menu for the Northampton County School Board at its June 22 meeting.

The board also announced Occohannock Elementary is fully accredited for the first time in nine years.

Ursula Deitch, Virginia Cooperative Extension Agent for Agriculture and Natural Resources, presented the board with a new purpose for the three currently unused salad bars in the schools: baked potato bars. The Association of Virginia Potato and Vegetable Growers have offered to donate \$500 to reinstate school salad bars, with more funds to follow if schools remain committed to the salad bar program throughout the next school year.

Serving baked potatoes on the salad bar was a suggestion by the association, not a requirement to receive funding. It was also suggested that the baked potato bar need not be offered to students and teachers

daily, but could be a special weekly occurrence.

Kids eat more vegetables when they have a choice about what goes on their plate, Deitch said. She also noted that Richmond schools have implemented salad bars successfully, reducing student-generated "plate waste."

A baked potato from the salad bar would count as part of a "reimbursable meal." If a student chooses at least 3 of 5 menu items offered at one meal, the county is partially reimbursed for the meal by the state government.

The association is unable to donate the potatoes for the salad bar, since locally-grown spuds are not harvested when school is in session. Donations of green beans from C&E Farms in Cheriton may be possible in the fall.

Northampton will test the baked potato bar next school year, beginning with Kiptopeke Elementary

fourth, fifth, and sixth grades. Volunteers will assist students at the baked potato bar. Some toppings, like cheese, will be pre-portioned.

Northampton also plans to implement the new "Grab and Go" service model for breakfast in the middle and high school next fall. Previously, students were shuttled from the buses to the cafeteria in the morning to be served breakfast. "Grab and Go" will allow students to bypass the cafeteria and purchase their breakfast directly from a hallway kiosk upon arrival to school, choosing from both hot and cold breakfast items, which they carry to their classrooms to eat. The intent is to persuade more of the county's 1,651 students to eat school breakfast: currently 377 do not participate. It would cost an estimated \$17,000 per year for additional cafeteria and custodial staffing to execute the new service model.

Since January, Northampton

public school students have been improving their reading skills with Achieve 3000, a newly purchased computer program used to read and test comprehension of non-fiction texts. The program measures reading skill by "Lexile" levels, not grade levels. Texts with longer sentences and fewer repeated words have a higher Lexile level. On average, students gained 27 Lexile points over the past six months, logging into Achieve 3000 about once per week.

The school board is considering whether to continue paying for accreditation services from both the "AdvancED" organization and the state. Only state accreditation is required. Superintendent Eddie Lawrence stated that this "redundancy... costs too much" and the schools "need teachers and other things more." Northampton currently pays more than \$13,000 per year for both accreditation services.

How Would the County Go About Dismantling Onley Fire & Rescue?

Accomack County is working on possible scenarios this week regarding a recommendation to dissolve Onley Fire & Rescue.

"I expect options to be presented to the board of supervisors at their July meeting for consideration," County Administrator Mike Mason said Wednesday. "I can tell you that the county does have the authority to dissolve the company if it so chooses" in accordance with state code.

"It has been done in other localities in Virginia," Mason added. "Warren County comes to mind. If the board decides it wants to dissolve ... the crux of the discussion will be what becomes of the company's assets and who will be responsible for distributing them. The court may have to be petitioned depending on the direction the board wants to take," he said.

According to law, "whenever the fire department of the county, city, or

town to which any fire company belongs ascertains that such company has failed, for three months successively, to consist of 20 effective members, or ascertains that it has failed for the like period to have or keep in good and serviceable condition an engine, hose, and equipment and other proper implements, or the governing body of the county, city, or town for any reason deems it advisable, such governing body may dissolve the fire company."

Earlier this month, Accomack's Fire & Rescue Commission recommended county supervisors "begin the process of dissolving" the Onley company. The issue has been put on the supervisors' July 19 agenda so members would have time to review the commission's report.

Chief Allen Nicholson of Onley asked the board to give him six months to get the company back on its feet. He took over the company in May. He will be allowed to come back next month to speak.

Among the things cited were resignation of the station's Operational Medical Director (OMD), effective July 8; the company stopped providing firefighting services in early February and has not had EMS transport since mid-March; a member was convicted in 2014 of embezzling money from the company, there was another conviction of a member who set a truck ablaze in 2016, and a former chief's report said the company would close in early 2017.

Four members, including Nicholson, who took over as chief in May, and his wife, live at the firehouse. The hospital's move to Onley earlier this year also has had an impact on the need for service in the area. But officials say Onancock and Melfa are covering the area.

Nicholson said he got legal advice. In 2009, two Gainesville fire stations were taken over by Prince William County, Va. The chief's family lived in the firehouse in one instance and a hostile work environment was cited. All the volunteer department's equipment and assets were transferred to the county. The chief and his family were evicted, according to reports. The plan was for willing volunteers to become volunteer firefighters and medics for the county.

Seven years later, in the same county, another company was dissolved due to ongoing personnel issues. Again in that case, county staff took over.

Fire companies were also dissolved in Loudoun County and Middleburg, Va. In Woodstock, Va., dissolution was threatened in 2014.

"You're asking me the same thing I'm working on right now," County Attorney Celia Burge told a reporter Tuesday. At next month's meeting she will advise the supervisors on options and answer questions. She

said Chairman Robert Crockett has not vet specified how he would like her findings prepared.

Burge said Accomack formally recognized all in the fire companies in a resolution in 1985. Prior to that the board recognized the existence of the companies "but hadn't formally adopted a resolution approving the formation." She said that was necessary for fire companies to receive the benefits of the Line of Duty Act and to be recognized for their endeavors.

Burge said while the board will hear about options next month, it is not required to conduct a public hearing on the issue. The supervisors could dissolve a company without the recommendation of the fire commission, she said, adding, "It seems like an appropriate thing to do ... for the board of supervisors to receive that."

"Sometimes the court will direct assets go to a like organization," Burge said.

do a couple of new things, have more partnerships with NASA, or whatever partner might come on board. We're certainly not closing I can assure you of that. We have more students than we've ever had."

"At this time, it is not currently on the market," said Marcia Welsh, president of Stroudsburg University and chairwoman of the field station's board of directors. "We do want to seek new ownership. It is not the board's intent to close it."

Welsh said the board is looking for a deal that would allow the station to continue and not to turn the station into apartments or the like. "There are a lot of field stations" that have one owner. "We think the partnership is the best way."

Welsh said only three of the 11 schools involved in the station pay \$1.5 million a year each "to keep it open and that's not sustainable." The other universities pay "an annual fee that's pretty minimal." The others haven't stepped up to help, she said.

"We are trying to find other options. We have been trying to find other universities. It's a great field station probably one of the nicest on the peninsula."

In 2016, a two-year \$91,000 EPA grant

was awarded to the station for 800 students from the Eastern Shore of Virginia and Maryland. Seventh graders from Arcadia and Nandua Middle schools and Northampton High School participated in "100 percent" free classes and a field trip last spring that has spots open for the fall. Trelegan said they have also offered teacher workshops.

The SPARK (Shore People Advancing Readiness for Knowledge) program is also funded by the EPA and helped 125 families in Accomack "to learn and grow together through outdoor experiences" at the station, according to the website. "We believe that learning as a family is a key component in building a well-rounded community."

Another focus of the station, Trelegan said, is getting students in their undergraduate years to pursue research as an occupation. Summer campers are at the station right now participating in a mammal survey.

Locally, the field station, which was pre-

viously known as the Marine Science Consortium, partners with the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge and NASA.

Mike Mason, Accomack County's administrator, was contacted about the station's status Wednesday. In an email, he replied, "I have heard that the universities that support its operations have voted to look for another owner because of the financial stress it is placing on them. I do not know if it has been officially 'listed' or what the facilities staff has been told or even a timetable."

HIGHTOWER AIMS FOR LOWER VET UNEMPLOYMENT


While the unemployment rate for veterans has fallen overall, finding full employment for all veterans is the goal of one Eastern Shore man.

Alex Hightower is the veterans representative for the Virginia Employment Commission (VEC), a position that has been vacant for the last two years.

Hightower, a veteran himself, was in the Navy, retiring with 21 ½ years under his belt. During the course of his Navy career, he spent five years in Japan and time in many other countries. Hightower wants to use his post-service time "sup-

porting those [vets] seeking employment."

In order to qualify for the employment services Hightower offers, there are certain guidelines that have to be met: Veterans



unemployed for 27 weeks in the current year, or have been incarcerated.

Hightower said these guidelines represent significant barriers to employment. The veteran does not have to meet all of these guidelines; any will qualify them for services. Veterans who don't meet the guidelines can utilize the services of other VEC staff to help them obtain employment.

Hightower's ultimate goal is "to help all vets find work." He invites all employers to work with the VEC and wants to let them know that the agency can offer free space for recruiting events and assistance posting job openings.

Every third Tuesday, from 10 a.m. - 12 p.m., the VEC has a veterans workshop where veterans are able to receive information. The VEC's ultimate goal is to help everyone find work.

Fireman Sentenced for Arson

A former resident and member of Onley Volunteer Fire & Rescue was sentenced last week in Accomack Circuit Court to five years in prison for setting a truck ablaze in 2016.

All but 30 days of the term was suspended for 21-year-old Brandon Travis Haynes, who now lives in Virginia Beach. He was ordered to be on good behavior for five years and supervised probation for two years. Haynes was also ordered to pay restitution of \$10,000 to Antonio Logan, who owned the 1993 Freightliner.

The defendant could have gotten as much as 10 years in prison and a fine of \$100,000, according to court records. He admitted guilt in January in a plea bargain that allowed him to remain free on an existing bond until a presentence report could be completed. A promise of leniency was not included in the agreement.



In other cases, Kyle Cole McCabe, 23, of Atlantic Road in Atlantic, was sentenced to five years each for burglary and grand larceny with all but six months suspended. New evacuation zones on the Eastern Shore are calcuated down to street level and will be easier to understand when emergencies occurs.


In Accomack, there were nine zones and "no real method to (the) numbering system," officials said recently. "It was confusing to the public and not very detailed."

Now there are four zones and "evacuation will be less confusing as we can base it on the actual need," a report passed out at an Accomack supervisors' session stated.

There are also four zones in Northampton.


Accomack shelters would be at Arcadia High and Middle schools, Metompkin and Accawmacke Elementary schools and Nandua High and Middle schools.

In Northampton, the shelters would be at Occohannock and Kiptopeake Elementary schools and Northampton High.



"If you live in an area ordered to evacuate, or in a mobile or manufactured home, leave immediately," the document stated. "Failure to obey evacuation orders may result in loss of life.

"Emergency services personnel will not respond when wind speeds are in excess of 50 mph and transportation routes are flooded."

The Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) approved a staff recommendation ending the crab pot season on Nov. 30 with a restart date of March 17, 2018. Dredging was prohibited from Dec. 1, 2017, to March 31, 2018.

Officials said due to an advertising error, the issue was heard as an emergency regulation.

The VMRC also asked staff to bring the issue of cull ring use and practices involving recreational crab pots before the Crab Management Advisory Board and the Regulatory Review Committee for further discussion.

The commissioners took no action on a request from the Virginia Saltwater Sportfishing Association to repeal the ban on using a gaff to land cobia caught recreationally. Mike Avery, who represented the group, presented a petition with 562 signatures of people who never wanted the gaffing prohibition and he said using a net to land large cobia is a safety issue.

Commissioners were advised they

would have to hold a public hearing to change the regulation. The panel agreed it would be setting a dangerous precedent if it repealed this rule without new information. Several members noted the prohibition was part of a list of regulations set for 2017 for cobia, so all would need to be discussed again before action could be taken.

Yoga on Kiptopeke Beach Unifies People With Nature

Yoga: It's not just for hippies.

Yoga on the Beach is a new program made possible by Friends of Kiptopeke State Park, a non-profit organization whose mission is "to enhance our community through recreation, education, advocacy and land conservation."

The yoga class is held every Saturday at 9:30 a.m. on the Kiptopeke State Park beach, led by certified instructor Emily Adams, of Norfolk.

According to Adams, yoga can help

people of every age, size, fitness level, gender, or religion to become stronger in body, mind, or soul. It is a holistic experience, providing multiple benefits no matter why you choose to do it. It simultaneously promotes physical and mental well-being.

The word "yoga" literally means "union." Yoga encourages unity "with all that is created." Practicing yoga on the beach, surrounded by nature, completes and authenticates the experience, Adams suggests. Yoga at Kiptopeke State Park is set to run indefinitely, and is expected to continue on the beach until late October. Classes are open to campers and the general public. Equipment is provided onsite.

"Yoga is designed to end suffering," Adams says. She strongly believes in the "devotional aspect" of yoga, which anyone can experience. The original practitioners of yoga were Hindus, but yoga practice is not exclusive to any one religion. Yoga students may chant, recite scripture, meditate, or pray. They may concentrate their senses on their surroundings, focusing their minds on a single thought, feeling, or nothing at all.


The practice of Yoga heightens physical fitness through low-impact exercise which gently stretches and strengthens muscles while promoting cardiovascular health. It is not for rapid muscle gain or weight loss, but increases strength, endurance, flexibility, and balance. It is recommended for anyone who wishes to improve overall physical well-being, whether a youth or senior citizen, fitness novice or expert. Yoga is about practice, not perfection.

Yoga also benefits mental health, says Adams. When you're stressed, the sympathetic nervous system reacts with a "fight or flight" response. When you're relaxed, the parasympathetic nervous system initiates a restorative state of "rest and digest." The slow, deep breathing practiced in yoga triggers the parasympathetic nervous system. "Our bodies have no choice but to relax," Adams explains. Focusing our breath while challenging our bodies "retrains our brains," allowing us to manage stress more successfully. We learn to control our emotions instead of letting our emotions control us.

Adams became a yoga instructor and advocate after her husband, a children's pastor, died suddenly two years ago. At the time, they were expecting their first child. She first tried yoga as a teenager, but had not committed to serious study of the practice. On the first night in her new apartment after her husband's passing, feeling alone, Adams considered pouring a glass of wine. The drink would have relaxed her temporarily, but it would do nothing to change her situation, she concluded. She reached instead for her yoga mat.

Park Ranger Max Lonzanida introduced Adams to the Friends of Kiptopeke and made Yoga on the Beach possible. He is closely involved with the program, along with fellow park ranger Bill Dyas, who still enjoys yoga and shares happy memories of learning it with his stepmother in the '60s when the practice first became popular in the United States. Yoga on the Beach was promoted for National Get Outdoors Day, held annually on the second Saturday in June.

the Charleston RiverDogs in 2013, before eventually being promoted to Scranton/ Wilkes-Barre the following season. He was invited to the Yankees' spring training in 2015 and 2016, and was selected in the 2016 Rule 5 Draft by the Pittsburg Pirates, where he spent this year's spring training before being released back to the Yankees.


Following his release, Webb began the 2017 season with Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, posting a 47/3 strikeout-to-walk ratio in 33.1 innings with the RailRiders, with a 3.24 ERA and 1.08 WHIP. He currently owns the second-highest strikeout-to-innings pitched ratio for minor league relievers (12.69K/9.0IP) and the second-lowest walks-to-innings pitched ratio (0.81BB/9.0IP).

Webb's major league debut Saturday afternoon was a perfect 1.1 innings, as he retired all four batters he faced. He threw an inning Sunday afternoon, allowing two walks and striking out one. Following the game, he was reassigned back to the RailRiders, but he did not stay long, as the 26-year-old was called again to join the Yankees on their road stint against the White Sox in Chicago.

Wednesday night's game would notch another MLB inning for Webb. The lefty stepped on the mound as the team's closer, allowing a solo homerun to leadoff and two strikeouts. With three games now under his belt, Webb has a 2.70 ERA and .90 WHIP.

The Yankees will head to Houston for a three-game series against the Astros before returning to the Bronx July 3, to take on the Toronto Blue Jays in a threegame homestand.

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

The offshore fishery continues to improve, with large bluefin tuna making a brief appearance off Chincoteague and yellowfin tuna catches are becoming a little more consistent out in the canyons. In the lower bay, the cobia bite remains steady, while undersized rockfish continue to dominate the action in the shallow waters of the upper bay.

Chincoteague – Mark and Donna Rae, of Captain Bob's Bait & Tackle, reported that croaker are slowly starting to move in, with the larger fish measuring 12-14 inches. Kingfish (whiting/ sand mullet) have been a dependable catch in the surf of Assateague, as well as in the inlet between Buoys 11 and 14. Fresh bloodworms and Fish Bites have been the top baits for these tasty bottom fish. Undersized flounder still outnumber keepers by a large margin, but patient anglers working the channel between the Rt. 175 bridge north in front of the high school are producing some keepers. Mark recommended that anglers concentrate in depths of 10feet. Pink is still the hot bait color, with pink Berkley Gulps and pink Mylar tandem rigs tipped with live minnows producing. The deep hole adjacent to Tom's Cove Campground has also produced catches of keeper flounder. Shark catches have been coming from the inlet near the CI Buoy on cut mackerel and bunker baits.

Tom, from Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reported that anglers found some bluefin tuna over the Lumpy Bottom this weekend, with some very large fish hooked, but not landed. As recently as last Thursday, false albacore and sharks were the dominant species on the Lumpy. Tom agreed that the best flounder fishing has been occurring from the new bridle north to the high school. The surf is holding kingfish, a few bluefish and lots of sharks. Cockle Creek is also holding some large

sharks. Black sea bass catches on the wrecks have been very good, with lots of "knotheads" boated. Large hammerheads and duskys are prowling around most of the offshore structures.

Wachapreague - Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, reported that anglers were finding a few keeper flounder and lots of throwbacks. Flounder fishing was very good last Thursday and Sunday. Unfortunately, stormy conditions on Saturday adversely affected the ladies flounder tournament. Captain Paul recommended the waters of Green and Drawing Channels, as well as in front of the old Coast Guard Station, as areas for anglers to concentrate their efforts. Minnows, fished with strips of fresh squid or Berkley Gulp, have been the old standby baits. Offshore vessels found a few yellowfin tuna in the Washington Canyon. Wreck fishing for seabass has been good if you can find structures that has not recently been hammered. Don's Tackle reported that the nasty weather on Saturday resulted in only two fish being caught in the ladies' flounder tournament. On the bright side, nice-sized flounder are coming from the offshore railcars.

Lower Shore – Mark, from Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported that cobia fishing remained good in the lower Chesapeake, with the top action coming from the areas around Buoys 13, 16 and outside the highrise section of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Flounder fishing in the lower bay is improving, as quality catches of fish measuring 18-24 inches coming from the bridge-tunnel, as well as under the small bridge connecting Fisherman's Island and the tip of the Eastern Shore. There is a large school of spadefish hanging around the bridge-tunnel's fourth island, but the fish are small with most weighing 1-2 pounds. Sea mullet (whiting, king-

fish) are being caught just outside the Kiptopeke pound nets and off of Sunset Beach. The pier at Kiptopeke State Park is producing catches of sea mullet, croakers, and ribbonfish. Croaker catches are coming from Marker #4 out of Oyster and around the inlet.

Upper Chesapeake Bay – Matt. from SeaHawk Sports Center, reported that local Brooks Bailey enjoyed a catch of quality sized speckled trout in Tangier Sound. Cobia fishing seems to have leveled off in the northern bay, but quality sized fish continue to be caught to the south. One of his clients landed seven cobia on a trip out of Cape Charles last weekend. Anglers fishing for flounder over the rail cars caught limits of large fish. Smelt, large strips of squid and flounder bellies were the most productive baits. Matt said some of his customers found yellowfin tuna in the Washington Canyon. Coastal Killer's Kyle Krabill fished with local legend C.L. Marshall near Saxis at the mouth of the Pocomoke, landing a 24inch keeper rockfish while casting for

speckled trout. The duo caught an estimated 30 rockfish, but did not see a single trout. In an earlier trip, Krabill landed a small black drum and some specks near Watts Island. A recent trip on the Pungoteague Flats produced one small cobia.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.



Experimental Films Virginia Brings Two-Week Art Wave to Cape Charles

Get ready to be inundated with Art Soaked Weekends - "Weekends drenched with dance, film, art, theatre, opera, local food, local brews and wines on the Eastern Shore of Virginia." Art Soaked Weekends run from Saturday, July 1 to July 15.

Artists from L.A. to Taipei are gathering in Cape Charles for a twoweek residency to produce the fifth annual Experimental Film Virginia project. Forty or 50 global artists, plus local talent, will work together to develop 15 short experimental films, covering the entire creative process including casting, filming, editing and screening.

This project was made possible by the non-profit organization, GEAR (Global Exchange Arts Roundtable), founded by Renata Sheppard and operated within Cape Charles' Lemon Tree Gallery.

Art Soaked Weekends are the local community events celebrating and sharing in the visiting artists' residency. A concert will kick off the two weeks. The band Mercy Creek will entertain on Saturday, July 1, at 6 p.m., at The Oyster Farm Seafood Restaurant's "C" pier, located at 500 Marina Village Circle in Cape Charles. The concert is followed by three other special events surrounding the two-week creative filming period.

The public will be introduced to the Experimental Film Virginia experience on Monday, July 3, at 8 p.m., in Cape Charles' Palace Theatre. A free "retrospective film screening" will showcase all 15 of the films produced at last year's event. The result of a "free-themed challenge to all," each film is three- to- five minutes, but uses the artistic elements of music and movement to convey a story or theme, often with little or no dialogue.

The following Saturday, July 8, Experimental Film Virginia presents "Art in a Barn" from 6 to 10 p.m. at Seaview Creek Farm, 24021 Seaside Rd. in

Cape Charles. Admission is \$10 per adult or free to guests age 18 and under. Performances will take place in a restored, 100-year-old barn, presented by EFV local and international artists Ann Carolyn-Bird of the Virginia Opera, harpist Federica Magliano, Italian dance company Balletto Teatro di Torino, and Italian artist Stefano Giorgi. Art Bridgman and Myrna Packer will present "Truck," an interactive media and dance film piece. The casual event will offer picnic-style food and local wine and beer at a cash bar. Special guests and staff from the Virginia Oyster Trail and Virginia Film Office will be present. Art Soaked Weekends conclude with "Reel and Raw" on Saturday, July 15, from 7 p.m. to midnight at the Cape Charles Yacht Center, 1011 Bayshore Rd. This event, held outdoors overlooking the Chesapeake Bay, is the premiere of this year's 15 short films. Oyster specialties from Virginia Oyster Trail will be served with local beer and wine. "Culinary booths" will also feature local restaurants. EFV artists will provide music, dancing and surprise entertainment throughout the night. 





One of These Days or None of These Days?

Why, Yes! "Today's greatest labor-saving device is . . . tomorrow." "Things may come to those who wait, but only the things left by those who hustle." "Never put off tomorrow, what you can do today." These three quotes are attributed to Presidents Woodrow Wilson, Abraham Lincoln, and Thomas Jefferson, respectively. Let me paraphrase Psychology Today's definition: Procrastination reflects our struggle with self-control as well as our inability to predict how we'll feel tomorrow, or the next day. "I don't feel like it" takes precedence over goals. Then begin the self-defeating thoughts and emotions that tend to discourage future goal-oriented effort.

Putting off for later, what should be done now, is a character trait that surfaces at some point in most of us. At least two types of procrastinators exist. There are those of us who say we work most efficiently with a deadline staring us in the face. There are also perfectionists among us who delay tackling a task rather than facing the possibility of falling short of our own, sometimes unrealistic, push toward perfection. It all comes back to the self-control referenced by Psychology Today. With information at our fingertips via the internet and other media, there is little to no reason to procrastinate any longer.

As a member of the first category, my only goal here is to offer tips for "productive procrastination." For some people, a looming deadline is what drives us to deliver high-quality work. We thrive on that pressure and stress. If we know we work well with under deadlines, let's use them to our advantage. Consider breaking down each assignment into smaller tasks with deadlines of their own. Our future selves will thank us. For example, the paper that's due on Friday will benefit from a thesis statement written on Monday, a bibliography completed on Tuesday, a rough draft written on Wednesday with the final paper (now with fresh, focused and informed eyes) completed at the usual 2 a.m. on Friday morning.

To promote productivity in the procrastinating perfectionists among Post readers (read that aloud three times quickly), I offer this suggestion: If you want to make quick work of a task and do it right the first time when you finally do start, there are likely Pinterest boards or YouTube videos dedicated to whatever job you find before you. Like the pen and the pistol, the power of the World Wide Web is dependent upon the user.

Tax preparation apps and programs can connect you to the IRS from your bedroom. Online tutorials make studying for finals, SATs, and industry certifications available to anyone with an internet connection. Stamps aren't needed to compliment or complain about customer service. Even with the simplest of cell phones, there's no surcharge to make long distance calls to connect with a college roommate or childhood friend.

Don't let "one of these days" become none of these days. The summer has just begun. What could we accomplish by the fall, if we start today?

Chesapeake or Cobb Station -As You Prefer

Many have wondered what happened to the old community names everybody had been accustomed to using. Changes have occurred throughout the Eastern Shore. For example "Willow Oak" Road in Eastville was always known, as was the surrounding community, as "Eastville Station." Machipongo is a vastly expanded area, reaching northwest to Vaucluse and beyond. Simpkins was known as "Simpkins Siding" and "Little Salisbury." There are many other examples; disconnects between how the community identifies a neighborhood and the manner in which streets and communities are now designated or known. The assignment of street and route names for 911 emergency systems played a central part in these changes. Other changes resulted from legislative actions.

Located just north of the Town of Cheriton and east of Route 13 and the entrance into Eyre Hall lies the community historically called Chesapeake, until the incorporation of Norfolk County around 1963 spelled the end of the name Chesapeake for this Eastern Shore community. My father called it a "hamlet" — a small neighborhood.

The new Tidewater city was chartered by the General Assembly as the City of Chesapeake, signaling the demise of use of the name for the tiny hamlet in Northampton County which had no official designation other than, perhaps, a post office operated under contract in a general store. Thus, posing no legal conflict, there was no competition for the name.

However, the community of former Chesapeake survived by its alternate name, identified by the train station, "Cobbs Station," where mail was once delivered by a bag hooked onto a pole from the slow moving train. For a period, this identity prevailed — even into the GPS technology era, and until recently when a highway sign marked it as

"Chesapeake," noting its location on State Route 636.

There was, of course, some confusion. Small wonder, local folks proud of its name and history, and harboring a belief that the name had been stolen, did what they could to hold onto the name. For a time, mail to the local post office (operated by Mr. George Rayfield — yes — father/grandfather of the Rayfield Pharmacy family), was addressed: "P.O. Box ____, Chesapeake; Cape Charles, Virginia." Mail to the neighborhood is now served through the Cape Charles post office. Zip Codes were not in universal use. In the mid-1960s motorists turned from the highway, thinking they had arrived at the location across the bay, finding only farm fields; one such group identified themselves as "The Isley Brothers" en route from New Jersey to play a concert in Chesapeake.

Chesapeake on the Eastern Shore was a community of proud traditions. It was foremost a community of family farms extending from Route 13 to the Seaside Road. Stevenson, Talbot, Nottingham, Press, Bibbins and Mapp, Brokenborough: These farms provided a means of income to many local families. The community also hosted a private school with primary grades through high school operated by the Baptist Association, and drawing attendance from the county and outside areas, arriving via the passenger train at "Cobbs Station." Tidewater Institute was the source of formal secondary education for many residents before Northampton County assumed the task in or about 1935. Several of its dormitory buildings remain intact as private residences. After its closure, our mother still displayed affection for it, introducing us to her former school. As children, we relished pretending to be actors on the auditorium stage. A historical plaque notes the school's former location, the central building having been destroyed by fire in or about 1958.

My grandfather, whom I never knew, is reputed to say routinely that he was "going to Chicago," his term for receiving packages by train from Sears & Roebuck at Cobbs Station, a concept not invented by Amazon.com. The train was also used as a commuter line to Exmore and Cape Charles for shopping forays.

Given its history, it is not difficult to imagine that the name Chesapeake is still used among a narrow group of residents. Its use is mostly generational. If speaking to persons knowledgeable of its background, it is "Chesapeake," but when making reference to the area to others, it is known as "Cobbs Station," the current designation of this community, a name which too could be similarly lost as its borders are not incorporated or otherwise officially set. In the meantime, however, this area of Northampton will continue its dual-named identity, both with equal historical grounding.
