

TROOPER INDICTED FOR FORGING SUMMONSES

A senior state trooper, who grabbed an unattended toddler off Lankford Highway before the child could get struck by a passing vehicle last year, was indicted Monday by an Accomack Grand Jury on six counts of forging traffic tickets.

Johnny N. Godwin, 43, a native of Sanford, who was listed on whitepages.com as living on Jolly Rogers Drive in Greenbackville, is accused of forging half a dozen Virginia Uniform Summonses in November 2016, about five months after rescuing the child. The charges came in direct indictments so there were no warrants issued. A reporter attempted to speak to Godwin Tuesday, but a woman who answered his phone hung up after the reporter identified herself.

Godwin was indicted on two counts of forging summonses on Nov. 25, 2016, in the name of Kevin Cooper Leslie;

two counts of forging summonses on Nov. 26, 2016, in the name of Mitra Elizabeth English; and two counts of forging summonses on Nov. 26, 2016, in the name of Larry Gordon Marsh II.

Accomack General District Court shows a summons for Marsh on Nov. 26 for following too closely/accident. Marsh was found guilty in absentia and fined \$50. A search did not show any summonses filed by Godwin for Leslie or English. The indictments did not state the nature of the summonses.

Special Agent J. Steven Pruitt gave information about the case to the jury. His number with the state police Bureau of Criminal Investigations division in Chesapeake rang unanswered when a reporter called to make queries regarding the indictments.

Commonwealth's Attorney Paul B. Ebert, of Prince William County, was appointed to the case. In a telephone conversation Monday, Ebert said that discussing the details would be "un- ferred other questions to Sarah C. ethical." He was tasked with the job so there wouldn't be a conflict for Accomack Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. Ebert said a court date had not vet been set. He was unsure if he would take on the case personally or assign it to one of his 23 assistants. He did confirm that Godwin had been a state trooper.

First Sgt. Ben E. Jeffrey Jones, the area commander at Melfa, deferred comments to public information officer Sgt. Michelle Anaya. She asked for a reporter to "email me your inquiry so that I may handle accordingly."

Questions about the officer's work status and the nature of the summonses were not answered. Anaya would only respond that Godwin joined the department on Oct. 16, 1996, and resigned from the agency on April 26. 2017. She also would not say whether Godwin was in custody. Anaya reBerning, a prosecutor who has since

Exmore's Economic Growth Discussed at Town Meeting

Exmore residents and employees want economic growth for their town, but they want to achieve it on their own terms.

No public comments were made at Exmore's Oct. 2 council meeting, but a letter from resident and business owner Ken

Dufty was read into the record by town manager Robert Duer.

In the letter, Dufty thanked Mayor Douglas Greer "for participating as the only representative from Exmore on the Northampton County comprehensive plan stakeholder review group on September 13, 2017 ... a work session that was designed to put the final touches on a new comprehensive plan for (this) county."

According to Dufty, he and other "citizens asking to be part of this review group were denied that right." He dis-

agrees with the "attempt to rezone this county into an industrial and commercial zone." Specifically, Dufty's concern is the current draft of the new comprehensive plan "targets ... the lands immediately surrounding incorporated towns to eliminate the Town Edge District where each town currently has a say in what projects are acceptable for that area ... proposing to rename the lands ... a 'Planned Development Area.' This new zone, according to the draft plan, would allow industrial and commercial development 'by right' ... with no input from the town, the citizens who live adjacent to these lands, or even a permitting authority."

Dufty requested that "Exmore's mayor and council will agree to prepare a resolution to the planning commission asking that this planning process be halted until there is full transparency, public involvement, and evidentiary studies produced to support or refute the untested assumptions and direction of the current draft plan." Greer said he would address Dufty's request at a later time.

Cape Charles Discusses County Comprehensive Plan

The Northampton planning commission's draft of the county's proposed comprehensive plan has generated much feedback over the past month, enough that the Cape Charles planning commission placed it on their agenda for discussion at their Oct. 3 meeting.

The deadline for comments from county stakeholders on the comprehensive plan was Sept. 25, and the planning commission received and recorded dozens of comments from both stakeholders and the public. One of those stakeholders is Cape Charles town planner Larry DiRe.

At Tuesday's meeting of the town's planning commission, DiRe acknowl-

edged that some members of the public believe their interests are not represented in the current draft of the county's comprehensive plan. However, any claim that there has been no opportunity for public involvement in the plan's development is a "misstatement," he said. DiRe described a recent open session of the county's planning commission, with many citizens in attendance during the public comments. By the time the commission began discussing the comprehensive plan, DiRe said, he was the only person left in the audience. DiRe also dismissed claims that the stakeholder group, to which he belongs, was "handpicked."

Yet DiRe expressed concern over the apparent "disappearance of the town edge" from Northampton's comprehensive plan. "If that disappears, what's the framework" for the county "working cooperatively with towns?" he asked. The current draft of the comprehensive plan provides no "criteria and timeline" for collaboration between Northampton County and towns like Cape Charles. DiRe said the county and town planning commissions held joint meetings twice over the past eight years, and both were "positive experiences" worth repeating.

Chairman Dennis McCoy wondered (Continued on Page 7)



Chincoteague Asks Governor for Storm Damage Evaluation Money

Chincoteague officials are asking Virginia's governor to include a \$1.5 million match for federal monies in the state budget to be used for a study to evaluate storm damage reduction measures, improve navigation and potential restoration for Assateague.

Mayor Arthur Leonard signed a letter regarding the issue this week. It was sent to Gov. Terry McAuliffe. The letter was briefly discussed at a town council meeting Monday. "Rep. Scott Taylor is aware and supportive of this effort," the agenda stated. "I will be requesting support letters from the county and Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission as well," Town Manager Jim West wrote in his monthly report.

District 1 Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr was in attendance and noted Del. Bob Bloxom "already has an unconfirmed promise from the state" and the Accomack "board of supervisors will be in," as he has spoken to members.

"Congress authorized a Chincoteague Island Study in the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act," Leonard's letter stated. "The next step in the federal process is for the project to secure a 50 percent nonfederal share ... which the Corps of Engineers conducts at a cost of up to \$3 million over three years."

To "increase the likelihood of a Corps new study start," Leonard wrote, "the town needs to show it has matching funds. The study will evaluate the need for hurricane and storm damage reduction, navigation, and ecosystem restoration at Chincoteague. In recent decades, the southern end of Assateague ... has changed dramatically. The inlet has become much larger exposing Chincoteague to the ocean. This study is a critical first step to ... adopting a plan to protect Chincoteague, Wallops ... and the aquaculture industry ... from hurricanes and other storms."

In another matter, after a lengthy

discussion, council unanimously approved applying to the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries regarding the establishment and enforcement of no-wake zones in waters surrounding Chincoteague. Vice Mayor Denise Bowden was absent. Officials agree they could decide where to put buoys later.

The areas include the Assateague Channel from Tom's Cove Aquafarms to Sheepshead Creek, a portion of Lewis Creek and the Curtis Merritt Harbor of Refuge. Most were already in place for decades but were not officially recognized by Chincoteague and could not be enforced. Most are also very close channels where wakes could do damage. Some of the areas would be seasonally enforced zones (May - Sept. 30).


Councilman Jim Frese wanted to wait until depth measurements could be made. He wants buoys put out to help visitors navigate properly. He was also concerned about erosion. "People are losing water front," Frese said. "People are having problems getting bulkhead permission to protect it. What we should do is probe across that whole channel and have the traffic divided into two channels ... for most of the point there's plenty deep water. People are fishing and they (boaters) come in and cut their lines. That shouldn't be."

Leonard was against putting nowake zones for erosion control. "I'm for the no wake zone," he said. "But we have to state correctly why we want it. I live on the water. I'm having a terrible time with erosion." But, he argued, "Erosion is a natural occurrence. For a safety thing, I have no problem."

"Boats are coming up on the wrong side of the channel," said Frese. "That's one thing that needs to be done."

Councilman Eddie Lewis, the town's retired police chief, said, "I've seen this

Candidates for Northampton's board of supervisors and school board, teachers, parents, and other concerned citizens, waited at the county's Sept. 28 school board meeting to hear public comments on the schools' comprehensive plan, which was postponed July 13. But that topic was overshadowed by the announcement that Northampton Middle School was denied accredi-

tation by the Virginia Department of Education.

Northampton school district submitted a letter to VDOE appealing the decision, requesting one more year to allow NMS to improve its SOL performance. The state will review the appeal in this month and will inform the district of its final decision in November.

Muslimani Trial Moved to Virginia Beach

It will be easier to find a jury in Virginia Beach for Khalil (Lee) Mohammed Muslimani, of Onancock, according to retired Judge Frederick Lowe, who granted a change of venue Wednesday in Accomack Circuit Court.

Muslimani, 70, of Robbins Lane, has repeatedly been convicted in Accomack Circuit Court of sex offenses with young girls. In this case, he is accused of raping his stepdaughter, Stacy Ann Spione, three decades ago. Her name is being used with her permission. The trial was tentatively set Wednesday for Dec. 12 and 13 in Virginia Beach Circuit Court.

Spione is "not happy" the case is being moved away from home or that it has been delayed for years, she said afterwards. "I really believe that things are going to happen in Virginia Beach just like they happen in Accomack. It's going to be a matter of convenience, not justice."

Judge Lowe sat on the bench in Virginia Beach for nearly 25 years and lives on the other side of the bridge-tunnel. In July he said he would decide in two weeks if he would approve moving the trial. More than two months later, he started the hearing about 30 minutes late and offered Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan and Defense lawyer Trevor Robinson another chance to add to their arguments. All had already been said.

Lowe called the case "remarkably similar" to one that involved Muslimani's niece, in which he was recently sentenced to two life terms plus 20 years. Lowe also cited the size of the community and how close-knit it is.

Then he gave Muslimani a chance to again hash through the same complaints about the jail he'd made in the past and has been told the judge had no control over. Spione said it will be no different in Virginia Beach, where Muslimani will again be given the chance to "ramble." She says two days will not be enough time for the trial and Muslimani will likely have more motions. "These hoops are going to be occurring."

"Do they care at all what this is doing to me?" she asked. "I'm already going through so much now as a result of the abuse that took place over those 13 years. This is like ripping open the wounds and pouring in the salt. They say victims have rights ... If I, as a victim, have rights, I wish someone would tell me what they are ... I have just been failed. I've fallen through the system in so many cracks" including the "school system that never followed up on me for so-called home schooling."

In 1990, Muslimani was convicted of a sex crime involving Spione when she was between 13 and 15 years old. She was 16 at the time of the last trial and says by then she had borne four of his children. At age 11, he and her mother, took her to have her first pregnancy by him aborted. She said the abuse started when she was four. Muslimani was also convicted nearly 30 years ago of sex crimes against another young relative. Court records show Spione stopped going to school when she was 10 ½.

math and history, but fell short in English and science, with passing rates of 67 percent and 63 percent, respectively. A school is rated "accreditation denied" when it misses a benchmark in one or more of the four core content areas for four years in a row.

Should the VDOE's decision stand on the middle school's denied accreditation, Superintendent Eddie Lawrence, NMS principal Laurel Crenshaw, and other designated school staff will meet with the VDOE's director of the Office of School Improvement to develop a Corrective Action Plan. The CAP will be monitored triannually, and the VDOE will prepare a progress report annually until the school achieves full accreditation.

Only two comments were made on Northampton schools' comprehensive plan. Maxine Rassmussen, chairman of the Northampton County Education Foundation, cited that there were no projected completion dates for any of the plan's goals or objectives. Kevin Schwenk, candidate for at-large member of the Northampton school board, wanted to know which specific programs would support students' "social-emotional development" noted in the comprehensive plan.

Paul Grossman, a Cape Charles resident who could not attend the Sept. 28 meeting, submitted his comments in writing. Most of his recommendations concerned changes to the comprehensive plan that would create accountability. Grossman advised that the document should be "updated (not superseded)" yearly or quarterly by the comprehensive plan committee or school superintendent. Dates should be recorded for the start and projected completion of each activity in the comprehensive plan. Progress towards goals should be noted in the plan. Goals and objectives should be "SMART:" specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound. Tasks should be "tied to

been assigned to the case. An email to Berning went unanswered at press time Thursday.

The Eastern Shore Post first heard about the allegations in late April but was unable to get anyone with the state police to talk about it. Officials would not confirm charges and said they did not comment on active investigations.

In May, an anonymous tipster stated Godwin was allowed to resign while it was decided if he would be charged.

Several officers, who did not want to be identified, said troopers are under a lot of pressure to make quotas and that Godwin was working on being promoted to sergeant.

"Senior Trooper Godwin has been employed with the state police since 1997 and has been assigned to the Eastern Shore since 1999," Jones wrote in a letter to the editor after the child was saved over July 4 weekend in 2016. "He exemplifies the qualities of the men and women in our police forces on the Shore," he added.

The letter also stated that about 6 p.m. July 2, Godwin "was off duty traveling on Route 13 southbound in Temperanceville with his family ... Godwin observed a small child approximately 1 to 2 years old, standing in the middle of the right lane ... southbound ... Godwin stopped his personal vehicle in the roadway to block traffic. He then exited his vehicle and grabbed the child out of the path of oncoming traffic as the child attempted to run toward the left-hand lane. As there were no adults present." Godwin waited for Child Protective Services to arrive. "Without a doubt, Senior Trooper Godwin's fast thinking and reaction saved this child's life. His actions of stopping his vehicle to block traffic and running into oncoming traffic to save the child put his own life in imminent danger."

aloud if the omission of the town edge from the comprehensive plan was intentional or accidental. Joan Natali, though wanting to give the benefit of the doubt, said she had a "hard time believing a whole section went missing by accident." The exclusion of Cape Charles' town edge from the county's comprehensive plan could have a "huge impact on what happens next to our town" and what it looks like along the two mile stretch from Route 13 to the town, Natali said.

Natali asked if Cape Charles had sent a letter to the county planning commission expressing their concern about the town edge, adding that they "don't want to wait a long time to take action." McCoy agreed that they should "fast track" the issue. He recalled Cape Charles' comprehensive plan containing language about the town edge, and asked if the commission could "resurrect old documents." Member Dan Burke recommended using the town's comprehensive plan to "reconcile" the county's comprehensive plan concerning the town edge.

DiRe stated that any public information about Cape Charles' involvement with Northampton's comprehensive plan would be posted on the town planning commission's main webpage so no one would feel "frozen out" of the process.

DiRe talked about the RAFT (Resilience Adaptation Feasibility Tool) workshop that had been conducted in town over the summer, and how Cape Charles

scored in terms of flooding resilience. In addition to educating town council and residents about flooding resilience, DiRe suggested creating "green" zoning ordinances to help reduce stormwater runoff and street flooding. Burke recommended using rain barrels. A reference was made to the harbor master plan, which encourages the use of pervious surfaces for parking.

DiRe discussed density issues with accessory dwelling units in town. Though "old town" Cape Charles is approximately 174 acres, "the acre doesn't tell me anything, the lot does," DiRe stated. His recommendation is limiting each residential lot to six bedrooms, including any accessory dwelling units, with no more than two occupants per room.

the assigned owners' annual performance goals and objectives."

Grossman pointed out that while the comprehensive plan states, "Effective teachers are essential to student success," among the district's core values, "Over the past few months, I have listened to your discussions on teacher retention being a huge problem in each of the schools, yet I find no documented plan or set of activities addressing this issue."

School board member at large, Nancy Proto, identified herself as the person who made the motion at the Sept. 14 work session to disband the teacher retention committee.

Proto read aloud a written statement explaining that a letter was received "moments before" the Sept. 14 meeting, and "strongly indicated that the board would move to terminate the committee," which "I was prevented from reading publicly."

"Had the board been willing to engage in open, public dialogue regarding these documents, I would not have made the motion to dissolve the committee."

"The Teacher Retention Committee anticipated the school board would not approve the recommendations as presented. The only question was whether or not the changes would be enough in keeping with the sense and spirit of them as to be acceptable ... It was not anticipated that the school board would be unwilling even to enter into a discussion of the recommendations."

ESCC STUDENTS LEARN FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

A father frustrated by his children's inability to manage money inspired the new financial management app, Myperfi, unveiled by University of Virginia student and Myperfi co-founder Will Sexauer at Eastern Shore Community College Oct. 2. Created specifically for college students learning to be financially responsible and independent, the Myperfi app officially becomes available in about three weeks.

When students download Myperfi. which stands for "my personal finance," they select the name of their school, and Myperfi automatically adds their tuition, fees and expenses to their in-app budget. Students can link their credit, debit, checking or savings accounts to the app, protected by government certified security, and view all their account activity for the past six months, allowing them to make informed decisions about their spending and saving habits.

Every time students complete tasks on Myperfi, whether they're planning a budget, tracking expenditures, or enhancing their "Fi-Q" (Financial IQ), they earn points to redeem for discounts at local and national vendors, from restaurants to online tutoring services.

Stuart Rosove, of San Francisco, Calif., is the father who created the initial concept and model of Myperfi and brought it to Sexauer and his peers at UVA about 18 months ago during Sexauer's freshman year. Rosove and the UVA team collaborated to acquire funding and make Myperfi a reality, with an outside team developing the final product.

Myperfi is currently available to students at ESCC, UVA, and the University of Alabama. Sexauer expects Myperfi to expand soon, adding more schools and participating vendors from Virginia and across the nation.

Sexauer is originally from Belle Haven and graduated from Broadwater Academy in 2015. He is currently a junior at UVA attending the McIntire School of Commerce. expecting to graduate in 2019.

"The ultimate goal is to increase the financial literacy of college students everywhere, allowing them to make more of their money while in college and then have a base of financial knowledge to prepare them for the real world following graduation," Sexauer said.

Following Sexauer's presentation on Myperfi, a panel of representatives from local banks answered students' financial questions.

Most local banks offer their own apps and other services to help customers track their spending. Wendy Lilliston of PNC Bank said that while mobile deposits and ATMs are convenient, it is important to be aware of

how these technologies work in order to avoid fees. The balance shown at the ATM may not be an accurate reflection of your actual balance, she said.

Connie Campbell of BB&T advised college graduates preparing to enter the work world should be aware of all their debt obligations, from student loans to credit card balances. Shannon Lewis of Xenith Bank explained many employers will check your credit before hiring vou, because a credit score reflects vour level of commitment to your obligations.

They recommended getting a free credit report from all three major credit reporting agencies once per year. Lewis said mistakes happen on credit reports, but are easy to dispute.

Students who want to learn more about financial responsibility should ask their bank what programs are available, Campbell said. Lewis said the resources are out there for you find. Lilliston stated that these financial learning tools give students the assurance of, "I can do it on my own terms."

Mother Indicted in Child Abuse Case

A Mearsville mother accused of neglect and abuse of five of her young children, including using cribs and crib parts to make cages for some of them, was indicted on those charges Monday by an Accomack Grand Jury.

Malista Ness-Hopkins, 39, of Gladding Road, was indicted on counts of willfully acting or failing to act in caring for the children "in a manner so gross, wanton and culpable as to show a reckless disregard for human life" on July 26, 2017.

The children were listed in court documents by their initials and are in protective custody. Three of the children are under 3 years old. All are younger than 18. They were reportedly found filthy and covered with bug bites.

Sheriff Todd Godwin said last month that a "dog that was showing signs of neglect was removed from the home during the execution of the search warrant." No charges regarding the



The children were taken that day. The sheriff's office were alerted of the incident at 10:30 a.m. July 27, and began its investigation, which included a search of the premises. Investigator Meghann Patterson handled the case.

Officer Pelted With Possible Human Waste

Cornell Jamar Nock, 34, of Accomac, was indicted on a count of assault and battery of Deputy K.M. McGregor on March 29. 2017. The officer was serving food trays at the county jail when

he "entered single cell 208. I set the tray into the tray slot and inmate Cornell Nock threw a cup of an unknown substance into my face and eyes," McGregor wrote in court records. "The substance was light brown in color and smelled of a strong odor of human waste."

Juveniles Indicted

Two juveniles were indicted on violent offenses and will be tried as adults. Shane Lee Williams, 17, of Main Street in Painter, was indicted on 11 counts of assault and battery of six officers on May 24, 2017. "These charges do not appear to be premeditated, however they are aggressive in nature," according to court records. Williams will be treated as an adult.

Deputies Coty Hodgson and Mike McCready of ACSO were serving a detention order on Williams (for an issue not noted in the indictment) when he "began hitting his head on the outside of his house." The deputies took him to the back of the home to speak to his mother. When they reached the patrol car, he "began kicking the windows and doors." McCready was kicked in the chest when they were putting leg shackles on him, court records stated.

"As they were attempting to put him back in the car," he "spit on both deputies." Williams also is accused of head butting McCready in the face. He "continued to be physically aggressive ... and was routinely kicking the window, door, and separation portion of ... patrol vehicle." When they got to the sheriff's office, the suspect also threatened all the workers and their families.

Williams was indicted on counts of assault and battery of Deputies McCready, Hodgson, Spencer Rose and Shane Henning; Ann Webb of probation; Officer George Bennett of the Onley Police Department; and Investigator Patterson. Hodgson gave information to the jury.

Shawndele Anthony Fletcher Jr., 16, of Bethel Church Road in Parksley, will also be treated as an adult. He and his brother, Vincent Lavette Stoudmire, 18, of Logan Road in Onley, were indicted in connection with an incident involving Yuuji Yagami, a delivery worker, at Roma Pizza, in Nelsonia, on June 18, 2017. Fletcher was indicted on counts of robbing a business with a gun, grand larceny, robbing Yagami of currency by presenting a firearm, and stealing \$5 or more from Yagami. Stoudmire was indicted on counts of

robbing Yagami, stealing \$5 or more from him and use of a firearm in a robbery.

The victim said he was held at gunpoint, while food and money were taken. He was also hit in the head. Investigator C. A. McPherson is handling the cases.

n Saturday, October 28, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Northampton Sheriff's Office and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 14th opportunity in 7 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to Northampton Sheriff's Office at 5211 The Hornes, Eastville, Va. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last April Americans turned in 450 tons (900,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at almost 5,500 sites operated by the DEA and more than 4,200 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 13 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in over 8.1 million pounds—more than 4,050 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health

issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly diversion. to susceptible misuse, and abuse. Rates of Turn in your unused or prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental



poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

FAA Local Pilot Receives Wright Brothers Award For 50 Years in Aviation

Captain Robert Neil Dobbs, a local pilot and Onancock resident, was presented with a Wright Brothers Award in recognition of his 50 years in aviation. The award was made Wednesday Sept. 6, 2017, by Jeff Slaughter, manager of the Richmond Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Flight Standards District Office and Maury Dacey, program manager for the FAA's Safety Team at the Accomack County Airport.

The Wright Brothers "Master Pilot" Award is the most prestigious award the FAA issues to certified pilots. It is named after Orville and Wilbur Wright, the first U.S. pilots, to recognize individuals who have exhibited professionalism, skill, and aviation expertise for at least 50 years while piloting aircraft as "Master Pilots."

In addition to the award, Dobbs also received a distinctive lapel pin, which was also presented to his wife, Ute Dobbs, in recognition of her support to her husband's aviation career. Robert Dobbs' name will be published in the FAA's Roll of Honor as a recipient of this prestigious award.

Dobbs began his flying career in 1958 at the North Perry Airport, in Broward County, Fla. His first solo flight took place on Sept. 1, 1958, in a Taylorcraft BC-12D. By June of the following year he had also soloed in a Cessna 150, a Stinson and a Cessna 120. On July 1, 1959, Dobbs took his first flight test for his private pilot's certificate and became a pilot.

In May 1960 he received his single engine land commercial pilot certificate, followed by a multi-engine rating to his commercial pilot certificate in 1965 and an instrument rating in 1966. Also in 1966, Mr. Dobbs was hired as a flight engineer for Eastern Airlines. He soon progressed to the position of first officer (co-pilot) on the

Lockheed L-188 Electra, the DC-9, and the Lockheed L-1011 TriStar. By 1982, Dobbs was promoted to captain, flying the Boeing B-727.

Dobbs retired in 1989, after 22 years with Eastern Airlines. In 1992 he started flying as a first officer for Atlantic Coast Airlines on the Embraer EMB 120 and in 1996 he flew with Kiwi International Airlines as a captain in the Boeing B-727.

From September 2007 to October 2013, Dobbs used his superior piloting skills and knowledge of flight safety to fly under a FAR Part 135 Certificate for Carter Crabbe of Chesapeake Aviation, a local charter service based at the Accomack County Airport.

Robert and Ute Dobbs have been married for 25 years. They have four children and four grandchildren. They have lived in Onancock since 1992.

Scout Selected for National Council, Denied Excused Absence

When Skye Lewis left Tuesday as one of two Girls Scouts representing the Delmarva region at the national Girl Scout Conference in Columbus, Ohio, it was without excused absences from the school board.

"It feels like a slap in the face," said Skye. "It feels like they don't care."

Skye was selected for the honor by the Chesapeake Bay Girl Scout Council. The conference is where the national council will be held, which is the governing body of Girl Scouts. It meets every three years to decide matters that affect all Girl Scouts across the country. Skye and the other voting delegate from Delmarva will cast votes that represent the collective opinions of the Chesapeake Council's scouts and leaders.

It's a big responsibility, and one that Skye has taken to heart. She spent months becoming familiar with the agenda and meeting with service units in Delaware, Maryland, and on the Eastern Shore of Virginia — sometimes traveling two and a half hours on school nights — to explain policies that would be voted on

and soliciting opinions.

Skye carried a binder packed with items up for consideration. "That binder is more organized than any of my school binders will ever be," she said.

She was surprised when the school board balked at her request for excused absences.

She pointed to similar experiences students have with organizations like BETA club, an honor society for which students are excused from school to attend the state conference. Skye says she was told those students were excused because BETA is a school activity.

Superintendent Chris Holland said that is precisely the point. BETA, a national organization that stresses achievement and leadership, is a school-sanctioned activity. He praised Girls Scouts as an organization "which assists girls to become compassionate, courageous and confident young ladies, while developing character and leadership skills," however, he said, "in accordance with our attendance policy, absence to participate in an event not sanctioned by ACPS is considered unexcused.

Documentation provided will be used to verify attendance."

The board's policy guide allows principals to excuse absences in "exceptional circumstances with prior approval." The example given in the policy guide is a religious holiday.

Nandua principal George Parker, however, said there is no such thing as approved absences. "There are verified and there are unexcused. Unexcused is when you can't verify where a child was."

He would not open the "exceptional circumstances" exemption for consideration. "I don't want to go into that quagmire," he said. "Then everybody is going to come to you."

One distinction between excused and verified absences is whether the time away from school will count against a student for the purposes of being excused from taking exams. Another school board policy allows students to be excused from exams if they have at least an A or B in a class and have missed no more than two days during the semester. Attendance at athletic events, BETA

conferences and other school-sanctioned events do not count against students for the purpose of exam exemptions.

Skye's mother, Carrie Lewis, sees the distinction as artificial and fears the perceived inflexibility will have a chilling effect. "It discourages young people from pursuing leadership opportunities."

When a reporter caught up with Skye on Sunday, she was undaunted and excited about the learning experiences ahead. "I'm putting Accomack County on the map for Girl Scouts," she said proudly.



Fishing from
the Shore

Finally, a week without the effects of an offshore hurricane influencing the accessibility of local anglers to the productive autumn fishing grounds. As a result, positive fishing reports have come from the offshore canyons to the upper reaches of Pocomoke Sound and everywhere in between.

But first, the long-awaited opening of the Chesapeake Bay fall striped bass season officially began Wednesday, Oct. 4, and the early reports have been positive for the most part. Although we are probably at least a few weeks away from the arrival of any real trophy fish, the bay's shallow waters have produced a good number of smaller rockfish, with many meeting the 20-inch minimum size limit and some stretching up to 26 inches. Puppy drum, speckled trout and even a few flounder have been welcome bycatches for anglers casting curlytailed grubs, swimbaits and Berkley Swimming Mullet.

The current striped bass regulations for the Virginia portion of the Chesapeake Bay allow for the possession of two fish that must measure at least 20 inches up to 28 inches in length. One of the two fish can measure greater than 28 inches. Measurements are from the tip of the fish's nose to the tip of the tail. The season in the bay runs from Oct. 4 to Dec. 31.

The coastal (seaside) striped bass season also runs until Dec. 31, but anglers are allowed only one fish per person and it must measure at least 28 inches in length.

Red drum continue their run from the bridge-tunnel up to the Maryland line and speckled trout has been hit or miss with a few nice fish landed. The autumn flounder run, on seaside, continues to be more productive than it had been all summer long. Snapper blues and sea mullet (whiting) and sharks of all sizes have joined puppy drum catches from the barrier island surf. Chincoteague — Donna Rae, at Captain Bob's Marina, reported that sporadic catches of flounder were still being made in Queen Sound though action has fallen off inside Chincoteague Channel. A majority of the local anglers have shifted their attention to puppy drum and stripers, fishing primarily in the area from Four Mouths to the Wallops Island. Kingfish (whiting) are still available inside Chincoteague Inlet and Queen Sound. Captain Bob's Marina is now operating under its autumn schedule and is closed Mondays through Wednesdays.

Jimmy, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reported that kingfish (whiting) and bluefish to 16 inches moved into the surf, where red drum measuring up to 46 inches have been released. The cooling water temperature has also triggered a speckled trout bite inside with most fish measuring 10-15 inches, with an occasional larger fish.

Wachapreague – No report was received from Wachapreague, though anglers fishing off Metompkin Island were catching a few puppy drum and lots of sharks from the surf. Not many anglers were targeting flounder but those who did, found more undersized flatfish than keepers and some persistent anglers were managing to fill their fourfish limit of fish measuring 17 inches and longer.

Lower Shore – Chris Snooks, of Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported lower bayside anglers were catching a few speckled trout but by Monday, she had only weighed in one big fish in the tournament. Ben Lusk weighed in a 5-3 trout. Big red drum were still being released from the shoals along the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, but puppy drum fishing in the seaside had not been consistent. The Kiptopeke Pier was producing catches of flounder and croaker. The shop is getting in green crabs, just in time for the tautog fishery.

Togs have been caught from the rock islands of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, the Concrete Ships, the Cell as well as off the inshore coastal wrecks.

Upper Shore - Captain Matt Abell, of SeaHawk Sports Center, reported John Brittingham, of Berlin, Md., released a big red drum from the Assateague surf, and Parksley angler Jamie Logan had landed puppy drum from the seaside. A mixture of puppy drum, speckled trout, and small rockfish were being encountered from the shallows of Pungoteague Creek all the way up to Smith Island, Md. Ian Redmond released some oversized red drum and stripers just prior to the opening of the Chesapeake Bay striped bass season, while landing some puppy drum and speckled trout while fishing around some marsh islands in the upper portion of Pocomoke Sound.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing

Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.



estate group in 2008. She resigned after admitting the crimes to the board of directors in June 2015. She was indicted in December of that year.

In another case, Shawna N. Johnson, 32, of Church Road in Tasley, pleaded guilty to assault and battery of a family member. She was initially charged with strangulation. The case was continued until October 2019.

Glen Eric Northan, 59, of Boundary Avenue in Onancock, was given five years in prison with four suspended for distributing cocaine on Sept. 2, 2015. His driver's license was suspended for six months and he was ordered to be on supervised probation for three years. The maximum sentence is 40 years and a fine of \$500,000.

Kendrick Di'ke Duffy, who went to prison for killing a college student in 2009, was back in court last week where he pleaded guilty to felony eluding and reckless driving that included speeds of up to 114 mph last March.

A charge of possession of a firearm by a felon was dismissed. Duffy, 26, of



Parksley Road in Parksley, was taken back to Accomack Jail to await sentencing. A short-form presentence report was ordered. He could get five years and a \$2,500 fine for eluding.

According to court records, Deputy Eric Nottingham of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office said he saw Duffy driving on Route 13 near Temperanceville at a high rate of speed. With his siren blaring and lights flashing, Nottingham said, he followed the vehicle, which turned on Hallwood Road. He said at that point Duffy was going 114 mph and eventually ran into the side of a house. Nottingham said he saw Duffy, the only person in the vehicle, get out of the driver's side and run. The defendant reached Poulson's garage where he jumped in an occupied vehicle and was captured. A loaded gun was found in the glove compartment.

In 2009, Duffy sat on a car window ledge and fired the gun that killed Bobby Oneal Ballard, 20, of Temperanceville. The car was leaving Royal Farms near Parksley. The March incident was the second time Duffy was arrested since serving prison time for manslaughter in connection with Ballard's death. He was sentenced in 2010 to 10 years with four years and four months suspended.

Duffy was out of prison for about a year, when he was accused of pointing/brandishing a firearm. The witness in that case did not show up to testify and the charge was dismissed.

Extraditions

Maryland authorities are seeking extradition for three men being held in Accomack Jail, according to records filed recently in the county general district court.

Zachary Eljiah Thomas, 22, of Triplet Court in Dillsburg, Pa., was arrested in Accomack in August. He is wanted for five counts of second-degree rape and sexual solicitation of a minor in Worcester County, Md., on Aug. 13 and 14. A jury trial has been scheduled in circuit court in Snow Hill, Md., for Jan. 9, 2018.

Extradition is also being sought in the case of Devan Lamar Hinmon, 28, of Saxis Road in Temperanceville. He is accused of failing to report in Worcester Circuit Court for a proceeding in August. When a capias was served in Accomack last month for Hinmon, Deputy Chris Hargis of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office discovered the suspect was wanted in Maryland for two counts of possession of heroin and two counts of distributing the drug in May 2017.

Hinmon, who also gave authorities the address of Lankford Highway in Mappsville, was indicted in Accomack in June on counts of distributing heroin on Sept. 22 and Oct. 18, 2016.

Keshaun L. Coston, 26, of Seaside Road in Melfa, is being held for extradition to Maryland where he is charged with child abuse, second-degree assault and reckless endangerment. He is accused of failing to appear in Wicomico Circuit Court last January.

Hunting Convictions

A county man was fined a total of \$500 and given about two weeks in jail Monday in Accomack General District Court for hunting violations.

Jacob Lucas, 27, of Melfa, was initially charged with 13 violations, some of which involved allegedly breaking federal law. In a plea bargain agreement with Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Randall Fultz, Lucas pleaded guilty to four charges.

He was fined \$250 each for encouraging Corey Riefler to trespass on property belonging to Ritchie Marshall and for trespassing. Lucas was sentenced to six months in jail with five months and 15 days suspended each for two counts of hunting with a revoked license. His hunting license was suspended.

Three counts of violating state law, two counts of taking migratory game birds, and counts of making a false statement to police, killing a deer out of season, unlawful hunting, and being on a railroad track for a reason other than crossing, will not be prosecuted.

Lucas is scheduled to begin serving his time in Accomack Jail at 6 p.m., Oct. 13.

Exmore marketing consultant Clarice McGarvey recommended the town capitalize on the upward economic trend of Eastern Shore tourism by forming its own tourism commission, as Wachapreague and many other nearby towns have done. According to data from the Virginia Tourism Commission, the Eastern Shore was the state's fastest-growing tourism region in 2016, with a five percent increase in visitor spending since the previous year, for a total of \$273 million spent on the Shore for travel-related expenses last year.

Mayor Greer approved of the idea for an Exmore tourism commission, which was the result of conversation between McGarvey and town manager Duer, who agreed to be the commission's first two informal members. Greer expressed his willingness to further discuss and develop the idea. McGarvey mentioned the town's assets in supporting tourism, including three hotels, and "hopefully" a new restaurant and distillery in the near future.

McGarvey reported on the success of Exmore's first-ever Shakespeare in the Park event. Nearly 300 guests gathered in the town park to watch the performance of Hamlet as the Brown Box Theatre took over the outdoor stage. Plans are already in the works for Brown Box Theatre to return for another Shakespeare event next year.

Following a joint public hearing of the town planning commission and town council, the planning commission approved a zoning ordinance that would rezone two sections of the town which are currently designated "business downtown." The section from Bright Avenue south to Main Street/ Business Route 13 would become "business general." The section at the northeast and southeast corners of the intersection of Business Route 13 and Route 13 (where Tile Guys and the former Fresh Pride are located) would become "commercial highway," which is less restrictive.

The town council did not vote on the zoning ordinance, but passed an increase in the minimum monthly water fee of about ten percent, from \$18.50 to \$21.50.

from the other side. The public complain about no-wake zones and members of the council have done nothing. I think the public has waited long enough for this."

Regarding replacing water meters, Public Works Director Harvey Spurlock reported work will begin in a week or two. There are 3.862 meters. In the beginning about 40 meters a day will be replaced. It is hoped after a week or so, 50 a day could be accomplished. "Service disruption will last about 10 minutes," Spurlock said.

West reported drilling on the potential new site for town wells has been delayed for another week or so. We are at the mercy of a very busy contractor," he said, noting, the well-drilling rig at NASA is for monitoring wells due to an EPA requirement. The work will enable more information to be gathered about possible contaminants.
