DEQ Waives \$13,500 Fine for 120 Tons of Trash on Sanford Property

Lance G. Fisher, who dumped an estimated 120 tons of trash, including more than 100 tires, on his property on Shad Landing Road in Sanford last year, will not have to pay the \$13,500 fine proposed by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ).

He "claimed an inability to pay," filled out the appropriate form and was granted the waiver.

During one visit to the site, according to a DEQ investigation report, Fisher "arrived driving a dump truck labeled Fishers Environmental." His son, Lance Fisher Jr., is an owner of that Maryland company, which advertises on its website as providing services in asbestos abatement, mold remediation, lead paint abatement, demolition services, water damage restoration, fire damage restoration, duct cleaning, air quality control, wet crawl space solutions, hazardous material clean-up and emergency response.

"The consent order was signed by Lance G. Fisher in his personal capacity, not on behalf of the company," Russell Deppe, Enforcement Specialist Senior II with DEQ, said this week. "As such, the "inability to pay" application was evaluated based on his personal financial information. ... Due to the confidential nature of the information submitted by Mr. Fisher, the documents that led to the inability to pay determination are not available for disclosure."

"What we pursued was (removal of) the waste on that site," Deppe continued. "He just accumulated this. He said that it was his and he had just gathered it up over time. He removed all the solid waste appropriately. ... The site is back in compliance. ... Our goal is not to bankrupt someone."

Deppe said a model obtained from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) was used to determine his inability. Tipping fees, totaling \$8,303 and charged by Accomack's Northern Landfill for bringing the debris there, were taken into consideration when the waiver was granted.

"In this situation, I'm actually very pleased," Deppe said, adding, he runs into other situations across the state in which violators refuse to clean up their sites.

Fisher signed the consent order Feb. 1. It was notarized by Lionel Fisher, another principal in the Maryland environmental company.

An interagency memorandum states, "The applicant's sole source of income is his monthly retirement benefit from social security, therefore, at this time, it is concluded that the applicant is unable to pay the penalty amount in question. In the event the applicant's financial condition improves, the department may reevaluate this conclusion."

According to county records, Fisher owns parcels in Sanford assessed at a total of about \$300,000. He owes back real estate taxes from 2016 of \$193.88 and from 2017 of \$2,071.26.

Accomack Supervisor Paul Muhly, who pushed for the investigation after coming upon a fire at the site during a routine drive of his district early last year, is not happy with the outcome.

"I'm very disappointed that he gets off the hook so easily," Muhly said. "Just him taking the material to the landfill, which he should have done in the first place, is no penalty," the supervisor added.

"I thought there was a clear violation, between the dumping and the Chesapeake Bay Act" regulations, Muhly decided the first time he saw the trash

Interest in Groundwater Protection Rises

Water withdrawal, wastewater runoff and unlined dumps are all sources of concern on the Eastern Shore in the quest for a safe environment and clean water for all.

The state requires groundwater withdrawal permits to be obtained if the usage of a well or well system exceeds 300,000 gallons per month, according to the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) website.

A pond that is recharged by groundwater with mechanical assistance and goes over the maximum is also required to have a permit. The authorizations are given for up to 10 years and there is no fee for agricul-

tural use.

These requirements don't just pertain to poultry houses, but those are the users who have been in the limelight lately. Permits are also needed when one plans to expand the usage of wells.

"As I understand it, DEQ has been working to get poultry growers to voluntarily apply for groundwater withdrawal permits and that 35 poultry growers have made application," Rich Morrison, Accomack's deputy administrator of building, planning and economic development, said this week. "The 35 number includes both existing and new

Northampton High Is Crumbling, But New School Is Nowhere in Sight

The 2007 report on the poor physical condition of Northampton High School may have been titled, "Another Brick in the Wall," but over a decade later, the story of the original 1954 structure and 1978 addition may be better titled, "Another Brick Out of the Wall."

A recent tour of both the exterior and interior of the school, conducted by Northampton schools Director of Operations Chris Truckner, revealed shifting, misaligned brickwork, large cracks in walls and floors, and, most notably, a hole in the wall of the music room where a concrete block popped out one night and was found on the floor the next morning.

The 1954 structure has two major strikes against it: It has sustained nearly 65 years of wear and tear, and was constructed solely of brick and mortar, with no metal supports to provide stability as the structure is continually exposed to freezing and thawing weather conditions, and building materials expand and contract.

Structural engineering firm, Speight, Marshall, & Francis, P.C., first inspected the school building in 2007 and reported the condition of the 1954 construction "can best be described as poor." Structural damage was said to be "extensive and needs to be addressed immediately or the level of damage will increase exponentially." The firm recommended completely reconstructing the 1954 building since the cost to repair would be more than 60 percent of the cost to reconstruct.

About 10 years ago, structural engineers reported the condition of the 1978 high school addition as "good," and "not progressed to the point of no return," but acknowledged there were structural issues requiring attention "in the near future."

Unlike in the original 1954 structure, the brick and mortar walls in the 1978 addition are fitted with metal expansion joints, but they are insufficient, said Truckner, who is also a civil engineer. Some of the structural damage is worse in the newer construction than in the older construction, he continued. In the 1978 section of the school, it appears the mortar has fallen away at most of the expansion joints and was replaced with putty.

In the summertime, Truckner has found damage so severe, he could raise his hand to an exterior wall and feel the air conditioning blowing outside from the classroom.

Inside, the flooring is cracked, the roof leaks and ceilings have been replaced. The gym was intended for use as an emergency shelter, but does not meet safety standards. Accomack has emergency shelter locations it shares with Northampton.

In the mini gym, or wrestling room, the walls shifted so much that they pushed a section of padding off the wall and onto the floor.

The most dramatic structural damage appears to be in the music room, where a concrete block fell out of a wall, and there are several large, vertical cracks. Cracks

begin forming at a wall's weakest points, Truckner said, explaining why they usually appear in the layer of mortar binding the bricks together, forming a staircase pattern. When cracks run vertically down the wall, straight through bricks or concrete blocks, it indicates the walls are bearing an enormous amount of pressure, Truckner said.

In Truckner's opinion, a new high school is in order, but thousands of dollars that could help pay for it must be funneled to endless projects repairing structural damage posing safety issues. Northampton's schools and community continue to wait for supervisors to make a hard commitment to a new high school, and in the meantime, Truckner keeps plugging the holes in the dike as best as he can and hopes the dam doesn't break.

Northampton Supervisors Get 'Clean' Bill From Financial Auditors

An audit of Northampton's financial statements, conducted independently by certified accountants, Robinson, Farmer Cox Associates, confirmed for supervisors Feb. 13 the records are "clean." Auditors had no major concerns with the financial statements and agreed with Chairman Spencer Murray that supervisors are "fiscally responsible" with taxpayer money.

Auditors noted one "weakness" in county financial statements - they did not contain all "year-end adjustments" necessary to reconcile the numbers with "internal documents" reflecting some accounts receivable items such as sales taxes and communications taxes.

The audit of Northampton's financial records for fiscal year 2017, ending June 30, had been delayed, conducted in the interim between former Finance Director John Andrzejewski's departure and new Finance Director John Chandler's arrival.

County revenues totaled \$32,337,385 for FY 2017. Northamp-

ton gets 55 percent of its revenue from general property taxes, which auditors assured supervisors is normal for a rural county, with some counties receiving up to 75 percent of revenues from property taxes.

Northampton's two biggest expenses are education and public safety, each consuming 29 percent of county funds - 58 percent combined.

Northampton is carrying about \$30 million in debt. In FY 2017, the county devoted nearly 7 percent of its funds to pay down debt, and supervisors guaranteed that figure will never exceed 12 percent.

Supervisor David Fauber noted that 18 of every 83 cents per \$100 citizens pay in property taxes is spent on paying down Northampton's debt - that's 21 percent of total property taxes.

Murray acknowledged the county needs to borrow more money for capital improvements, and said, "we're seeking new economic engines" to generate more revenue to help fund future projects.

Eastern Shore Rural Health System is moving forward with its capital

improvements without funding from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development. A letter dated Feb. 6, from ESRHS CEO Nancy Stern to Dr. Tamarah Holmes of VDHCD, stated the rural health system will build the new Eastville Community Health Center without the community development block grant the housing department offered in a letter of intent. No reason was given why ESRHS is no longer pursuing the \$700,000 grant.

Mary Ann Roehm and Clelia Sheppard spoke on behalf of Renata Sheppard, founder of nonprofit Global Exchange Arts Roundtable, who was absent due to prior obligations. Renata Sheppard is organizing Experimental Film Virginia, a global artist residency and film festival held every summer in Cape Charles. The nonprofit is participating in a grant-matching program through the Virginia Commission for the Arts, and if the application is approved, GEAR will receive \$5,000 from both the arts commission and Northampton County, for a total of \$10,000.

The summer event series includes Art Soaked Weekends, which combine "art, food, and retail," at events like Art in a Barn and Reel and Raw - the latter of which premieres the experimental films produced by the resident artists, and features oysters and other seafood for refreshment.

Renata Sheppard plans to extend Art Soaked Weekends beyond the scope of Experimental Film Virginia, partnering with art districts in Virginia Beach and Norfolk in a project dubbed, "Eat Your Art Out," which Clelia Sheppard explained will "liven up the towns even in the off-season."

Supervisor John Coker supports the arts nonprofit and called the county's proposed \$5,000 contribution, "very cheap marketing."

Chandler presented school budget amendments to accept funds from the Virginia Department of Education: \$7,500 in National Board Certification Incentive Awards, for three qualifying teachers, and \$1,000 for the Career Switcher New Teacher Mentor Program.

There were two budget decreases of \$41,447 for truss repair at Occohannock and Kiptopeke elementary schools, and \$766 to reflect the final award of state incentive funding for school breakfast.

Study: Northampton Teachers Underpaid by \$1.4 Million Annually

Northampton County Public Schools would have to give teachers and support staff an additional \$1.7 million annually to pay them what they're worth, according to consulting firm Paypoint HR, who recently completed a compensation study for NCPS and shared the results publicly Friday, Feb. 9, at Northampton High School. More than \$1.4 million of the proposed pay increase would go to teachers.

Rick and Karin Campbell conducted the "objective, unbiased, third-partv study" to determine the salaries NCPS should offer to "attract and retain great employees" in a competitive marketplace.

They discovered that Northampton teachers with bachelor's degrees, and the superintendent, earn at least 10 percent less than market value.

Northampton teachers with master's degrees earn at least 5 percent less than market value.

The Campbells' research included measuring Northampton school employee salaries against those of 18 other school districts, comparable by one

or more factors such as proximity, population, unemployment rate, household income, property value, and cost of living. Among Northampton's comparators were Accomack County and the cities of Virginia Beach, Norfolk, and Franklin.

They evaluated and categorized all 294 positions in Northampton school district, from bus driver to superintendent. All NCPS employees combined earn an average yearly salary of \$35,818. NCPS employees in "classified" or support positions - such as bus drivers, custodians, and cafeteria workers earn an average of \$21,940 annually.

As part of the Campbells' evaluation of Northampton school job classifications, they asked each employee to take a job analysis survey, called a "position vantage point," with almost 100 percent of employees participating. Employees answered questions about their professional background, skill level, working environment, and level of authority in their respective positions. Managers were allowed to review and comment on PVPs, but not change employee answers.

Employees also participated in focus

groups which revealed a desire for more communication and further opportunities for community outreach. The Campbells noted the impression made during the focus groups by the department of operations, which does "an admirable job with the resources available," and cafeteria staff, who serve as a "role model" for a positive school culture.

Paypoint HR recommended raising salaries for classified positions at Northampton schools to a "living wage" for the area, which Rick Campbell estimated at about \$11 per hour.

The firm also recommended raising the salaries of 142 teachers whose earnings are below or substantially below market value, at a cost of \$1.424.896.

New teachers with a bachelor's degree currently make \$35,323. Bringing their earnings up to market value would require raising the entry-level teacher's salary to \$39.835.

Paypoint HR suggested changing the classified and certified salary scales from 31 to 21 steps. This would allow employees to reach the top of the salary scale more quickly, with a larger raise at each step, which Superintendent Eddie Lawrence said would benefit employees by making their progression up the scale more apparent.

The proposed salary scale would have a 60 percent spread, meaning an experienced teacher at the top of the scale would make 60 percent more than a new, inexperienced teacher.

Another Paypoint HR suggestion was "no breaks" on the salary scale. Currently, Northampton school employees with four to nine years of previous experience share the same place on the salary scale, meaning fifth through tenth year teachers make the same base salary. Paypoint HR's proposal is giving employees step raises every year, until they reach step 21.

Lawrence clarified that grouping employees with differing levels of experience on the same pay step does not equate to a "salary freeze."

Paypoint HR's proposal includes phased implementation of the recommended salary increases, and availability of the job classification program the Campbells used in their study for future re-classification of existing positions or classification of new positions.



Rehab Sale Complete

Riverside Shore Rehabilitation Center (RSRC), also known as the Parksley Nursing Home, sold for about \$984,100 recently, or less than a third of its "actual value," according to documents filed in Accomack Circuit Court earlier this month.

W. William Austin Jr., chief financial officer and senior vice president of Riverside Health Systems, signed the papers Jan. 30 selling the facility and 14.5 acres to Accomack Health Investors LLC, a subsidiary of Smith-Packett.

The State Corporation Commission lists several health-related limited liability corporations with the address on Pheasant Ridge Road in Roanoke. In a previous announcement, Riverside described Smith-Packett as "a limited liability company that has developed or acquired more than 150 senior health and housing facilities with a total value of more than \$1.5 billion."

The assessed value of the RSRC was listed on a deed as being \$3,213,700.

On Aug. 22, 2017, Riverside announced its plan to close the facility's doors, a move that would have left nearly 90 residents homeless and 120 unemployed. About two weeks before the Oct. 21, 2017 deadline, an announcement was made that Smith-Packett had signed a letter of intent to purchase the facility. Accomack Health Investors LLC was formed on Sept. 1, 2017.

'REALITY STORE' TEACHES STUDENTS TO NEGOTIATE ADULT LIFE

Northampton High School and Broadwater Academy ninth graders went shopping at the "Reality Store" for an education in the expenses of living in the real world.

The 4-H program, conducted by Vir-

ginia Cooperative Extension, organized the Feb. 13 event held in the NHS gym.

Christina Murray, VCE extension agent, coordinated the event with Northampton and Broadwater guidance counselors.

The Reality Store is a lot like playing

household finances.

Murray prepared students for their visit to the Reality Store with four lessons presented during assemblies at Broadwater and English classes at Northampton, about the relationship between education and income, payroll deductions, prioritizing needs and wants in a household budget, and checking and savings accounts.

Students choose their own careers or

the board game, "Life," except instead

of randomly drawing playing cards and

spinning a number wheel, students gain

real knowledge about the cost of educa-

tion, careers, salaries, and managing

Students choose their own careers or draw random job titles from a hat. There are 81 career choices grouped in four categories based on the level of education they require: high school diploma, technical school or associates degree, 4-year college degree, or 5- or 6-year college degree. Job choices in the curriculum include advertising sales agent, veterinary assistant, automotive technician, welder, architect, teacher, pharmacist, and physical therapist.

Once students arrive at the Reality Store, they role-play as 25- or 26-year-old workers, married with or without

children. All are assigned credit card debt, and student loans if they attended college. Students visit each of 13 tables, where adult volunteers help them decide how to spend their hard-earned money and provide their household needs, recording each expenditure on the worksheet representing their "checkbook."

The balance in their checkbook reflects a student's net income after they have deducted federal, state, and local taxes, Social Security and Medicare taxes, health insurance premiums, and retirement and savings account contributions.

Choices made in the Reality Store include buying or renting a home, driving a new or used car - or taking public transportation, purchasing clothing at a department store or thrift shop, and putting food on the table.

Students pay for utilities like electric, gas, water, sewer, and trash pickup; purchase home, auto, and/or life insurance, and pay for phone, internet, and/or TV services.

If they have children, students must decide whether they can afford daycare or a babysitter.

Malicious Wounding Garners 5-Year Sentence

A Bloxom man was given a five-year suspended sentence for maliciously wounding another local resident in 2015.

Larry Thomas Bailey, 58, of Nelson Road, was also ordered to be on good behavior for the rest of his life. He was convicted in 2016 of using a machete or lawn mower blade to wound Sherwood Bailey of Adams Road in Greenbush on Aug. 23, 2015. The incident occurred in Onley. It is unclear if the two men are related.

A charge of possession of cocaine was continued for a year because it was a first offense for Makalia Elaine Boole, age unavailable, of Main Street in Hallwood. She was given 100 hours of community service. The charge will be dismissed if she remains on good behavior until next February. The maximum sentence for the crime is 10 years in prison and a fine of \$2,500.

Austin, 36, of Ellihu Wallop Lane in Horntown, was sentenced to five years in prison with all but three years suspended for stealing property belonging to Royal Farms in Parksley on Aug. 23, 2016. He was given 12 months in jail with nine suspended for giving false identification to a police officer. Austin was put on good behavior for 10 years.

A charge of shooting from a vehicle, which is a felony, was reduced to a misdemeanor against Ronrecus Harold Wharton, 31, of Nocks Landing Road in Atlantic. A charge of possession of a firearm by a felon was not prosecuted. The incident occurred Feb. 9, 2017. He was fined \$500 with half suspended when he completes the Virginia Alcohol Safety Action Program. Alexes Tazewell told authorities the defendant came to her friend's house "flashing a light in my vehicle. When I left, he followed me, shot at me once ... stopped in front of me, got out of his vehicle and shot again towards me. Then he called my phone and told me if he really wanted to shoot me he would've done it by now."

Finney is being held in Accomack Jail without bond. Deputy C. Hargis of ACSO investigated.

Stuart Eyler, 46, of Silverside Drive in Hallwood, was charged with threatening to burn property on Jan. 15, 2018. He was arrested Feb. 10. Deputy M.R. McCready of ACSO investigated. Court records stated the weight of evidence was "sufficient." Unsecured bail was set at \$3,000.

Subutex Guilty Plea

A Tangier man pleaded guilty Monday in Northampton Circuit Court to two counts of possession with intent to distribute Subutex, a drug used in the treatment of opiate addiction.

The case was continued for 36-yearold William Brent Laird until a presentence report could be completed. The offenses occurred on Aug. 10, 2016.

They also are given opportunities to obtain financial advice, manage their credit, and make charitable contributions.

There is even a "Chance" table, for those unexpected expenses in life like flat tires and broken appliances.

Students complete the exercise by

crossing the "finish line," where they must answer one final question: "What is your balance?"

The Reality Store helps prepare students for the "real world" by giving them practical knowledge and skills that home economics classes — now uncommon in high schools — once provided. It also takes a burden off parents who

may be uncomfortable sharing their financial information with their children, Murray said.

The curriculum was created by The Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio, as part of their PEAK Program (Providing Early Awareness and Knowledge), which began in 2009. It was designed to encourage students, starting as early as second grade, to pursue a college education.



poultry operations."

In a 2015 county memo, Tyson Foods representatives stated for a house of roughly 40,000 chickens, the water usage is about 129,000 gallons over the course of the seven-week growing cycle for each poultry house.

A breakdown showed 5,000 gallons in the first week, 10,000 in the second, 15,000 in the third, 20,000 in the forth, 23,000 in the fifth, 26,000 in the sixth and 30,000 in the last. "This is approximately 30 gallons per minute, 40 gallons per minute in a worst-case scenario," the memo stated.

In some locations, there are as many as 24 massive poultry houses, known as concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs). The U.S. Department of Agriculture defines a CAFO as an animal feeding operation that raises more than 1,000 animals in confinement for more than 45 days a year.

At a recent locally-held DEQ public hearing, residents who live in or near an influx of new chicken houses near Pungoteague and Wachapreague voiced their concerns about water usage, contamination from runoff and possible air pollution.

Not far away, are two unlined dump sites — the county's southern landfill, which is closed, but was started before regulations required a lining to prevent seepage into the groundwater, and sewage disposal lagoons, off Drummondtown Road near Wachapreague, that were closed by the health department several years ago.

There is also an old dump, used about 50 years ago with no restrictions on what could be left there, on Pennyville Road near the Virginia Tech Eastern Shore Agricultural Research and Extension Center. At the time the dump was used, most people burned what they could in an old oil drum.

Leaks must be prevented by well construction "or interaction between aquifers." Water withdrawal is regulated by DEQ but the local health department issues permits for well construction.

Jon Richardson, environmental health manager senior, for the Eastern Shore Health District, said every time a well is being drilled, he gives the DEQ a heads up. Richardson also mentioned a groundwater compliance initiative that is being worked on locally.

He said 14 chicken farms have applied for 113 wells since May 2016. "They (the poultry growers) generally apply for several wells together," Richardson said. All but six applications were permitted. Those were made recently and are still in the process. "Not all (the wells) have been installed yet," Richardson said Wednesday.

Those having wells drilled are also required to contact DEQ at least two weeks prior to installation to ensure compliance with permit requirements.

"Most applications for new or expanded groundwater withdrawal permits are required to include" a pre-application meeting with DEQ; an explanation regarding the need for the water withdrawal; well construction documentation; geophysical log data and location data for all system wells; hydrogeologic information such as, but not limited to, aquifer properties transmissivity and storage coefficient. "Aquifer testing may be required before, at or following the pre-application meeting."

Also required is "a plan to mitigate impacts to pre-existing users." A water conservation and management plan is also necessary.

It must include the use of water-saving plumbing and processes; a waterloss reduction program that defines the leak detection and repair program; a water-use education program; evaluation of potential water reuse options; mandatory use reduction during water shortage emergencies with ordinances and penalties in place for municipal systems; an evaluation of the lowest quality water needed for the intended beneficial use; and an alternative water supply source evaluation for the proposed withdrawal. Applications must contain all required information and be deemed "complete" at least 270 days before the start of construction or operation of a new or expanded use permit or before the expiration of an existing permit.

The growers who are applying for groundwater withdrawal permits with DEQ are not necessarily the same ones asking for permits to drill new wells from the health department. It is hard to compare since two different agencies are involved in the process.

Super Bowl's 'Philly Special' Playmaker Has Shore Ties

Trey Burton will never forget the moment he heard Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Nick Foles say "Philly Special" in the huddle at the Super Bowl, where the Eagles faced a fourth and one with only 31 seconds remaining in the first half.

"I had no clue that call was coming. I had my head down in the huddle, but when I heard him call the play, I looked up and made eye contact with Nick. As we broke the huddle, I told him, 'Let's do this.' I felt confident about the play."

The rest is history, and many football experts are saying "Philly Special" will go down as one of the gutsiest calls in Super Bowl history. Many coaches would have elected to kick a field goal and take the sure points rather than chance it on fourth down, much less run a trick play.

The play had the ball hiked to a backup running back who pitched it to Burton, the backup tight end, who then threw a perfect pass for a touchdown to a wide-open Foles, the backup quarterback leading the Eagles after an injury earlier in the season to their star quarterback, Carson Wentz.

The play was featured in a twopage spread in the most recent Sports Illustrated, with Burton, number 88, at the center, the ball at his fingertips as the photo was taken.

Burton's wife and three small children were in the stands at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis. Also there was his grandfather, Lawrence Burton, who grew up in Wachapreague and had some athletic exploits of his own.

By phone this week, the 26-yearold Burton said he was well aware his grandfather once was co-holder of the world record in the 60-yard-dash, was a NCAA 200-meter national champion, was fourth in the 200 meters in the 1972 Olympics, was a consensus All-American wide receiver at Purdue University and first-round draft pick by the New Orleans Saints.

"But the next time he brings any of that up. I am going to remind him I've got something he doesn't — a Super Bowl ring," said Burton with a laugh.

Lawrence Burton agreed, speaking



from his home out in Los Angeles. "For Trey to make a major contribution in one of the great plays of any Super Bowl is unbelievable. I was there with my daughter. Shaneva, and we just turned and hugged when that play happened. There are no words to describe how proud I am of Trey."

That pride goes far beyond football, however, Lawrence Burton said. "I am most proud that Trey is a great father to his three children, a great husband to his wife and a disciple of Christ."

The younger Burton said his faith is the number one priority in his life. "I want to be known as a family man and a man of God. Those things come first and football is secondary behind all that."

The thrills did not stop for Burton with that play, which led to a 41-33 Super Bowl win over the defending-champion New England Patriots.

Burton was featured with several other players on the risers for the postgame press conference. He answered questions with his son, Jaxon, on one knee and his daughter. Ariella, on the other. His wife, Yesenia, was nearby holding their baby, Kaia. In the ensuing days, he appeared on several national sports telecasts.

A few days later, Burton was prominent in one of the largest parades in sports history when Philadelphia celebrated its first football championship since 1960. "I never dreamed the parade could be so great," he recalled. "The city deserved that day, and you could see how happy they were to celebrate with us."

It's not like Burton has not had any

highlights in his life prior to the past two weeks. A two-time all-state quarterback at Venice, Fla., who signed with the University of Florida as the top-rated quarterback in the state, Burton made national headlines when he scored six touchdowns in a single game against Kentucky as a freshman. "That was a big day I will never forget," said Burton when asked about it, "but scoring twice against Georgia, our biggest rival, in a game we won in overtime, and scoring

my first SEC touchdown at Tennessee in a packed stadium were also days I will always remember."

Burton's biggest day this season prior to the Super Bowl was catching two touchdown passes against the Los Angeles Rams on the road. His grandparents and other family members were there.

Lawrence Burton is married to his high-school sweetheart, the former Ida Needam of Greenbush. The couple will be returning to the Shore this summer for her family reunion.

Trey Burton married his college sweetheart, and he calls her "awesome" for juggling duties at home with three young children while he pursues his football career. An unrestricted free agent, Burton is not sure where he will be playing next year, although he would love to return to the Eagles if salary considerations with the Philadelphia roster can be worked out.

"I would love to know where I was going to be next year, but I always put my faith in the Lord that things will work out," said Burton.

Whatever happens down the road, Burton will be well prepared with a degree in Family, Youth and Community Science from Florida.


His younger brother, Clay, also played at Florida and was on the Buffalo Bills roshe coached at their former bardi Trophy

high school in Venice, which won the state football title.

Academics and community service have always been important to the Burton family.

Lawrence Burton was valedictorian of his 1970 Mary N. Smith class, a member of the Iron Key Fraternity at Purdue, based on academics and service, and left the NFL in his prime to be a youth counselor at Boys Town USA. In 1993, Sports Illustrated did a 16-page feature on his work at Boys Town USA as he was about to relocate to California to start the first-ever Boys Town facility outside Omaha, Neb. Today, Lawrence is a fitness counselor and also handles marketing for Fitness International. He has run four marathons, including two with the daughter who attended the Super Bowl game with him. She is an OB/GYN physician.

Like his grandfather, Trey Burton seems to have his priorities in place and will be well prepared for life after football. But, for today, he is a Super Bowl hero enjoying the success and attention it brings.

Northampton will travel to compete in the 1A State Tournament, beginning tonight (Friday) in Salem.









'History Detective' Finds Family Connections Through Francis Latimer Collection

Thomas Nelson Baker Sr. is remembered as the first African-American in the United States to earn a Ph.D. in philosophy in 1903. After he graduated from Yale in 1903, no other African-American graduated from Yale until 1946. Baker was born on Robert Nottingham's plantation near Eastville in 1860. Not only is Baker from Eastville, he is also my third great-uncle.

My career as a historical detective began at the early age of 10 with a blackand-white composition notebook. During an annual summer stay on the Eastern Shore with my grandparents, I found time to sit with each one of them and record the name of every relative or ancestor they could remember. Every person had a story and I had the clue to every story - their name.

As I grew older, I began investigating my heritage through visiting the records room at the courthouse in Eastville and doing research online. Upon discovering my blood relation to Thomas Nelson, I found an article encompassing his life story entitled, "Not Pity But Respect: Thomas Nelson Baker." This article was presented to The Monday Evening Club on Jan. 14, 2013, by Robert G. Anderson. The Monday Evening Club was founded in Pittsfield, Mass, in 1869, and as of 2013, the club was reported having 16 active members and one honorary member with emeritus status. Membership is obtained by invitation only; Baker received an invitation to join The Monday Evening Club in 1931 and became a member shortly after. Within "No Pity But Respect" was a rich history of Baker's early years including information about his parents, his grandparents, and even the man who enslaved his mother. This article was one of the biggest finds of my historical career.

The Frances Bibbins Latimer Collection was donated to the Eastern Shore Library, by her husband George A. Latimer. The collection is housed at the Eastern Public Library Foundation Office where Karen Hatch, Brenda Holden, and other volunteers like me are sorting through it to archive Frances Lattimer's work and make it available online. Upon the completion of the new regional library in 2019, the collection will move to Parkslev where it will be housed and maintained for the use of all historians. Holden is a close and long-standing friend of the late Eastern Shore historian and Holden's non-profit organization, The Center for Community and Family Development, was received a grant from the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities to preserve Lattimer's work.

I did not have another big break in my historical career until I met Hatch, also a close friend of Latimer, who invited me to view her collection at the library foundation office. We spent the day looking through Latimer's things and sharing historical clues, and over lunch at Kendall's Kountry Kitchen, she confessed her love and admiration for my uncle Thomas Nelson, and even had her own copy of "Not Pity But Respect: Thomas Nelson Baker."

Latimer collected and preserved many historical documents and pictures relating to Baker. Some of the more interesting items are hand-painted portraits of the spouse of my fourth great-aunt, Tabitha Baker. She passed away Jan. 20, 1918, and is buried at Union Baptist in Eastville with Uncle Alexander Baker and many of my other ancestors.

I was also pleased to find Latimer saved many other treasures such as Baker's fam-

ily tree tracing back to the 1700s, copies of original marriage and death certificates of his immediate family members, an autobiography of his life written by Baker himself, Baker's obituary, and also information about Baker's grandfather's role in the founding of Union Baptist Church in Eastville. Moreover, many forgotten and late relatives were rediscovered while reading the obituary of my great-uncle; some living distant cousins were even found in New York City. Newman Baker is the famous grandson of Thomas Nelson Baker Newman and is a successful percussionist who has performed at Carnegie Hall. Plus, Baker's autobiography yielded many unknown facts about the Baker family such as when he stated, "My father was a soldier in the Civil War, and six of my uncles also." Additionally, Latimer identified Baker's grandfather, Nelson Baker, as an original deacon and founding member of Union Baptist Church in 1865. Nelson Baker; my fourth great-grandfather, is the reason my great-grandfather Allen Baker was buried at Union Baptist more than 100 years later in 1984. Meeting Karen Hatch and finding the Frances Bibbins Latimer Collection has proved to be my greatest historical find of 2017.

As I began digging deeper into my heritage and genealogy, I never imagined that anyone in my family attended Yale or fought in the Civil War. Genealogy research is essential and provides a direct doorway to the past. Knowing how triumphant my family was in the past gives me a sense of pride and a stronger sense of connection to the Eastern Shore and my family roots. After all, Nelson states in the sketch of his life, "My purpose is to teach; I hope to come into touch with the thinking youth of my race and help them lay the foundations for a thoughtful and ethicized religion." In 2018 my purpose is to teach as well; therefore, the legacy of Thomas Nelson Baker and the entire Baker family lives on through me.

Union Baptist is the home church of both the Bibbins and Baker families. On Sunday, Feb. 25, the church will host an event, "Honoring Our Ancestors, Learning Our History." As keynote speaker, I will be discussing my career as a history detective and talking about the inventory of the collection in more detail, with time for discussion afterwards. piled at the site from which the nearby waterway can be viewed. At that time, he saw metal, lumber, drywall pieces and a few tires. "Trash that belonged in the landfill, not in that location," Muhly said.

He started asking around and learned it had been going on for a long time. That didn't settle quite right with him. On May 4, 2017, he took a detour when going to visit someone in Saxis. As he went down the dead-end Shad Landing Road, "the amount of trash was 10 times and tires — dozens easily — were burning and not just smoking. They were burning with flames," he said.

Muhly called 9-1-1. Deputy Tom Willett, of Accomack's Code Enforcement Division, was nearby and responded to the scene. He in turn called for firefighters. It was May 4, 2017.

The next day, Willett sent photos of the site to DEQ. On May 9, Willett returned with two DEQ officers. While the three were there, Fisher Sr. drove up in a dump truck with more debris, the supervisor said. "Stuff," Muhly said he had gotten from Chincoteague.

During the visit, according to a DEQ

investigation report, Fisher arrived in the company dump truck. Fisher told the officers "he had dumped the material (there) because it was his property."

In August, another complaint was made about debris — pieces of concrete block and charred wood at the waterfront about .28 miles from the first dump site and at the end of the road at Fisher's former oyster house.

"Fisher indicated that this material was from the demolition of a structure on the property and that it would be properly disposed of along with" the waste at the first site, according to the consent order.

Fisher violated four sections of state code, the order stated. On Nov. 9, DEQ staff inspected the properties and found the issues had been corrected. Fisher was presented the consent order on Nov. 6. He claimed an inability to pay on Nov. 9. He filled out the proper forms through DEQ's Office of Financial Responsibility & Waste Programs on Nov. 20. About a month later, the office accepted his claim.

Muhly's constituents have told him about ponds on Fisher's property being used as dumping grounds for old cars and other debris. Deppe said a complaint has not been filed. Muhly plans to file the complaint.

Local Opera Company Hopes To Attract New Fans

Anna Sterrett is on a mission to change the way people see opera.

"Less than 5 percent of people have seen an opera," said Sterrett. "I hope to be a part of changing the perception of it being dated, old and stodgy."

That's part of the reason the Salt Works Opera company founder chose to stage Vincenzo Bellini's "The Capulets and the Montagues," better known as "Romeo and Juliet," as its first full-length, fully-staged opera.

The story is a familiar one, she said, with lots of action. "They're having sword fights, climbing through towers, and going through secret entrances," she said. "It's intense."

Sterrett cast traveling opera singer Megan Case as Romeo. It might sound like an unconventional choice, but Sterrett says the part was written for a woman's voice - a mezzo-soprano. "It's indicative of youth. He (Romeo) is so young and impulsive," she said.

Itinerant tenor Andrew Ellis lends his voice to the part of Tibaldo, the man Juliet is being forced by her family to marry. Richard Williams, familiar from his many local performances, is cast as Lorenzo, the family physician whose plan to help the lovers goes tragically wrong.

Other cast members were found

through a voice competition held last fall at the historic Palace Theatre in Cape Charles. The competition winner, Andrew Potter, brings his booming bass voice to the role of Capulet. Since he is head of the household, said Sterrett, the part was written for a commanding bass voice.

Sterrett was scouting during the voice competition for a Juliet. As an accomplished theater and opera performer, Sterrett has sung the role of Juliet and knows the vocal demands. "When Christine (Lyons) sang, I knew" Lyons was perfect for the soprano role, she said.

Meg Morrison and Graciela Diaz won internships for placing first and second in the competition's high school division. Participating in the chorus is part of their internship experience. "I wanted to give interns a chance to work with professionals in the industry," Sterrett said.

Sterrett believes opera offers much to interest young people. "So many operas were written to poke fun at the establishment," she said. "There is lots of sexual innuendo and edginess," although she concedes what constitutes "edginess" has shifted over time. It's part of the challenge of mounting a historical work: "to make it contemporary and accessible," she said.

Raised on the Eastern Shore, Ster-

rett moved with her family to Raleigh, N.C., about a year ago. The ties she forged over a lifetime became lifelines for her fledgling opera company. "I couldn't do it without really great help," she said. Her long-time friend Richard Williams co-created a vision for the set through phone calls and texting. Robert Bridges joined in building the set, and photos were sent to Sterrett at various stages for approval. Amy Betit conducted the early choral rehearsals, and Jo Ann Molera helped manage the logistics.

In addition, a chorus consisting of Croxton Gordon, Kevin Cornwell, Bruce Gittinger, Mark Nuckols, Marilyn Kellam, Elizabeth Wolfe, Pam Knight, Ryan Pidgeon, Gracie Diaz, Meg Morrison, Brittnae Patterson, Jo Ann Molera, and B.J. Rogers has been rehearsing since December. The pianist is Natasha Smoot.

"I do come home for the production period of two weeks. Thank God my parents are OK with their kid and grandson moving in for two weeks!" she said.

"Romeo and Juliet" performances are Feb. 16 at 7:30 p.m. and Feb. 18 at 3:30 p.m. at Franktown United Methodist Church. Tickets are \$20 and are available at Rayfield's Pharmacy in Nassawadox, the Book Bin in Onley, and at the door.

"The Post" Comes to Roseland Theatre

Steven Ginsberg said he first learned about the making of the motion picture, "The Post," last spring when Stephen Spielberg, Meryl Streep and Tom Hanks came to a news meeting at the Washington Post, where Ginsberg is the national editor.

That was just one of the tidbits of information learned by a capacity audience at the Roseland Theatre last Saturday night when the Roseland Cinema and Entertainment Center (RCEC) sponsored a pre-movie reception and the showing of the six-time Golden Globe nominated "The Post" with five Washington Post staffers in attendance. A question-and-answer session with the Post staffers followed the movie.

Two of those staffers are Onancock natives. Ginsberg, a 1990 graduate of Broadwater Academy and the son of Gary and Diane Ginsberg, has made a meteoric rise through the ranks after latching on to a position as a nightside copy aide at the Post in 1994.

Emily Heil, a 1995 graduate of Nandua and the daughter of Mary and the late Nick Heil, is today the co-author of the "The Reliable Source," the Post's about-town gossip and celebrity column, writing about Washingtonian VIPs, and other personalities.

They were joined by Dan Balz, the Post's chief correspondent and a staffer since 1978; Devlin Barrett, its national security reporter and also the grandson of Dot Gibb, a former teacher at Broadwater; and Amy Joyce, Ginsberg's wife and the editor and writer for the Post's parenting section.

Ginsberg said he is often asked what it is like to be a journalist in today's world. "It is both exhausting and exhilarating," he told the crowd. "Half the country thinks we're tearing the country apart, and the other half thinks we are performing a valuable service."

Balz, who worked under famed Washington Post editor Ben Bradlee, said he is often asked how one gets a job at the Washington Post. He joked, "Now I just tell them you need to be from Onancock or have someone here adopt you," drawing a big laugh from a crowd obviously proud of their hometown journalists who have succeeded at the highest level.

Adding to the hometown fervor was

the appearance of Virginia Gov. Ralph Northam, another Onancock native and a 1977 graduate of Onancock High School. He received a standing ovation before offering a few brief remarks to the crowd.

Northam said he is proud to be from the Eastern Shore, adding, "I want to hear more people say they are proud of living, working and raising their children in rural areas."

Northam also noted that the work of journalists, like the group attending the event, is important to our society.

Heil covered the premier of the "The Post," attended by Spielberg, Streep and Hanks. She said she feels the movie, which tells how the Washington Post published information from the Pentagon Papers about the government's handling of the Vietnam War, conveys an important message for this time in history. "Spielberg speeded up the production of the movie because he wanted it to come out in 2017," said Heil.

She added, "The Trump Administration has ushered in so many good stories. It's not business as usual. They do not know the rules, or at least they choose not to abide by them."

Barrett, with ties to Machipongo, covers national security issues and provided insightful answers to questions concerning the Russian investigation, classified memos and other current topics.

"The Post" shows the extreme pressure that the paper's owner, Katharine Graham, withstood to make the courageous decision to print information contained in the Pentagon Papers. Balz said that decision was a "watershed moment" which elevated the paper from a local paper that happened to be published in Washington, D.C., to one of national prominence.

The Graham family sold the Post fours year ago to Amazon founder Jeff Bezos, regarded as the richest man in the world. Ginsberg said although the Graham family was beloved and respected, he has found Bezos to be an outstanding owner. "We see him about every six months, which is about right.

He is not involved in the news process, but he is committed to seeing we have the resources we need," said Ginsberg, who noted the news division at the Post has approximately 800 employees, up from


about 500 four years ago.





We have reached the halfway point for the 2018 General Assembly session and Feb. 13 marks the crossover date. That evening, all the Senate bills that passed head

to the House to be deliberated in subcommittee and committee, and all of the House bills that passed come to the Senate for consideration. As of the writing of this column on Friday, Feb. 9, there are still more than 1,000 pending action in the House, indicating that the days leading up to crossover will be long and jam-packed.

The Senate still has more than 400 bills pending. This includes my executive-level coastal resiliency and flooding adaptation bill that will be heard again just before crossover after changes would make the position a senior advisor rather than a cabinet secretary. This was a compromise, but if passed will still be a significant step forward in addressing what is a pressing problem in our region.

Over the past week, we saw committee dockets dwindling and floor sessions lengthening as bills made their way through their first and second readings on the Senate floor calendar. One of the most-discussed and heavily-debated bills has been SB966, regarding electric utility regulation and grid modernization. This

bill is the product of a large stakeholder group convened by Gov. Ralph Northam. The group included but was not limited to the commonwealth's utility companies Dominion Energy and Appalachian Power, environmental interest groups such as the Sierra Club and the League of Conservation Voters, leadership from both sides of the political aisle, business entities and consumer representatives.

While not all groups involved in the stakeholder process have offered their support of the legislation, the bill has improved as it has gone through the amendment process, though there are still valid concerns. The purpose of this legislation is to lift the controversial "rate freeze" that occurred in 2015, administer refunds, modernize our grid and move forward with significant investments in renewable energy. The bill passed through the Senate after heavy debate and may see more changes to assuage concerns raised by consumer protection groups and the State Corporation Commission.

The majority of my legislation had already been taken up prior to this week, but I did have one bill of interest to the Shore before the Rules Committee on Friday morning. SB930 is a bill that seeks a conflict-of-interest exemption for the Virginia Marine Resources Commission. A similar exemption was created for the Virginia Soil and Water Conservation Districts Board in 2016 with my SB652. Because this conflict-of-interest clause has a blanket application across all state-appointed boards and com-

missions, VMRC lost vital members serving on the commission in recent years.

Post Op-Ed Page

Virginia code states that members of VMRC shall be representatives of commercial, recreational and environmental interests. The rationale for having a commission that is partially comprised of industry members is so they might contribute their expertise and practical understanding to the regulatory process. Many past and current VMRC commercial industry members have been part of the Virginia ovster industry and bring valuable insight that only they can provide. Additionally, our state code actually requires that shuckers/packers of oysters sell to VMRC up to 20 percent of their oyster shells, unless the shells are planted in Virginia waters. Some oyster processors voluntarily sell shells to the commission, recognizing the potential benefits that accrue to the commercial oyster fishery.

The current conflict of interest language could inhibit knowledgeable, qualified industry members from agreeing to serve on the commission for fear of a perceived conflict, cause oyster processors to not sell shells to the commonwealth or not participate in other public fishery projects. In all cases, the commonwealth loses, as does the aquaculture industry and the communities whose economies depend on aquaculture. My bill removes this conflict of interest danger while preserving the unbiased nature with which ovster shells are purchased or services are contracted by the VMRC. It passed the Rules Committee and if it passes the full Senate and the House, where it is chief co-patroned by Del. Gordon Helsel, of Hampton, SB930 will return and protect the valuable knowledge of our shellfish growers to the VMRC. The bill is supported by Gov. Ralph Northam's administration, the Seafood Council, the shellfish growers and the Chesapeake Bay Foundation.

This past Wednesday was Aviation and Aerospace Lobby Day in Richmond. This day is always a great opportunity to showcase the achievements of the aerospace industry, the benefits of which we are privileged to bear witness to here on the Shore with the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport at Wallops. Advancing aerospace technology has bipartisan support in the General Assembly and is recognized as a vital economic driver in the commonwealth. This means it has been well-funded in our budget in previous years and I expect to see that prioritization continue in this year's budget.

We still have a month left before session adjourns on March 10. If you are able, please visit. Setting the Record Straight

To the Editor:

With regard to the article "Public Gets Its Say With DEQ on Chicken House Permits" in the Feb. 2 issue, there were a couple of details that I wanted to correct. First, in discussing the sampling, it is important to note that this only includes visual and odor inspection, with no third-party testing of nutrients or contaminants.

Second, the statement was made that "Other [speakers] were afraid all growers would want DEQ to issue them permits." If anything, the sentiment should be the other way around — although many would like to see these new VPDES permits applied to all of the poultry farms (which currently have the more general VPA permit, assuming no discharge), currently only the three farms specified would

be covered by the new permits. The growers themselves certainly don't want any additional permits/regulations.

Finally, poultry farmer Mark McCready was referred to as "[complaining that] pollution was caused by sludge from the Baltimore Harbor that was dumped on the marsh." First, this was taken out of context, since the inference could be made that he's deflecting the "pollution" issue from poultry farms to sludge from the harbor. Second, he was actually saying that this wasn't "pollution" – the dredge material used actually led to a rise in rails, according to McCready.

Thank you for the opportunity to correct these issues.

I recently went to a public hearing that concerned changing the DEQ permits for three existing poultry farms. But it turned into a forum for people with anti-poultry views.

A grain market and litter for fertilizer help farmers stay in business, which in turn allows the farm land to stay as farm land. I think that there is a lot of misinformation and speculation concerning the poultry industry that is being used to instill fear in local residents. We need to use some common sense and look at everything that's involved here. Don't throw out the baby with the bath water! We need the poultry industry.
