A Decade Of Punishment For Killing a Boy

Nicholas Martinez White told authorities he planned to get a haircut with his "homeboy" on his 23rd birthday in October 2015. Instead, he wound up killing a 13-year-old middle school boy, the brother of his teenage girlfriend, in a shotgun standoff at the house where they all lived near Keller.

Thursday, in Accomack Circuit Court, he was sentenced to a total of 30 years in prison for voluntary manslaughter and use of a sawed-off shotgun in the death of Breonya Collins, a seventh grader at Nandua Middle School. All but 10 years was suspended.

Judge W. Revell Lewis gave him 10 years for the manslaughter with three suspended and 20 years for the firearm offense with 17 years suspended. He was ordered to pay \$5,000 in restitution to the Virginia Victim's Fund. Upon release, he will be on indefinite supervised probation and good behavior for the rest of his life.

"Mr. White you killed another person," Lewis said. "You went and got the shot-gun. It was loaded. ... That's about as serious as it can get ... it's a killing ... you need to be punished for taking the life of another human being and also our society needs to know we're not going to tolerate this kind of behavior."

"It was a terrible accident," White had earlier told the judge. "And I'm sorry. I wish I could take this day back. Most of all I'd like to apologize to Rosetta, the mother ... I'm sorry. I know they can't forgive. Nobody's ... going to forgive that.



Attempted Capital Murder Charge Certified to Grand Jury

A teenager was identified Monday in Accomack General District Court by a police informant as the assailant who shot him and his girlfriend as they were leaving a Painter area home last Halloween night.

Roquan Lee'teq (Cake) Rogers, 19, of Benjamin Banneker Street in Exmore, was initially charged with attempted murder for hire. Retired Judge Robert Phillips was impressed enough with the victim's testimony that he amended the charge to attempted capital murder and certified the count to the grand jury.

"He said he saw him shoot," Phillips said. "That's pretty good evidence."

The preliminary hearing is the prosecution's chance to show probable cause. Evidence is not typically presented by the defense until later.

Nathaniel Johnson, 31, told the court he was shot in the back and but-

tocks that night. Dezarae Smith, 19, was hit in the foot. The two were going back to his car, which was parked at his grandmother's nearby home when they heard noise in the bushes.

When he turned to look, Johnson said, he saw Rogers with a gun. "I saw the dreads ... he got a haircut (since then) ... I saw his teeth, his mouth. ... I knew his walk. I know who shot me," the victim added. Johnson also added

Sullivan Exits Cape Charles Town Council Too Late To Replace in May Election

Cape Charles officials are vacating their seats as monumental decisions are mounting on their desks, on issues such as the future of the town harbor.

In less than six weeks, three Cape Charles officials announced their departures, with Councilwoman Dora Sullivan being the most recent. Her four-year term expires in 2020.

Mayor George Proto disclosed during the Jan. 18 town council meeting that he would not pursue a second term at the May 1 elections, nor was it ever his intention to serve more than one term.

Later that evening, during closed session, Town Manager Brent Manuel underwent a performance evaluation. One week later, Jan. 25, a special meeting was held; during the closed session, Manuel submitted his resignation effective April 6.

Dora Sullivan resigned effective immediately on Feb. 26, citing "changes that have occurred in my personal life." A special meeting was held March 8 to adopt a resolution 153 votes. petitioning Northampton County Circuit Court to schedule a special election to fill the position on Nov. 6, the same date as the next general election.

Sullivan's replacement cannot be chosen at the May 1 election, since her resignation occurred less than 90 days from the election date. At press time, appointment of an interim council member was on the agenda for the next regular town meeting, March 15.

Sullivan first joined Cape Charles town council in October 2002, when she was appointed to replace David Flora, who had resigned. She completed his term in 2004, and was elected for another two years. In 2006, Sullivan was elected mayor of Cape Charles and served a four-year term. She was re-elected in 2010. and served four more years, ending June 30, 2014.

Sullivan retired in 2014, but ran for council again in 2016 and won one of the three available seats with

One of the last town council meetings Sullivan attended was a Feb. 1 work meeting, when council discussed hiring an outside company to manage the harbor. It's an issue "near and dear to many people's hearts," staff is quoted as saying in meeting minutes.

Revenue from the harbor has declined, though other tourist revenue, such as transient occupancy taxes and meals taxes, has increased. Council acknowledged it changed the method for calculating slip rentals in 2017, contributing to harbor revenue losses.

But it was argued that a management company could better market and promote the harbor, which lacks curb appeal and needs major improvements, such as landscaping. During the current harbor master's first year, many maintenance issues were discovered which were not immediately addressed, council said.

According to meeting minutes, Sullivan stated, "The town did not

give the harbormaster and his staff enough time to turn things around," therefore, it was "premature" to put out a request for proposal for an outside management company.

Councilwoman Joan Natali disagreed with criticism of the harbormaster, who she said was "doing a good job with repairs and maintenance and keeping expenses down." She had "mixed emotions," but was unopposed to submitting an RFP, as were Councilmen Steve Bennett and Andy Buccholz. Vice Mayor Chris Bannon also approved of beginning the RFP process, though he preferred to keep management "in house."

Proto asked Manuel to draft an RFP for future consideration by council.



Employee Health Insurance Major Challenge to Northampton 2019 Budget

The cost of Northampton county employee health insurance, covering medical and dental care, increased more than 24 percent last year, posing a major financial challenge to supervisors grappling with the county's proposed expenditures for fiscal year 2019.

Chairman Spencer Murray said some advisors presented a simple solution — not offering employees health insurance — but that suggestion definitely would not be considered.

The county pays 82 percent of each employee's health insurance premium. That figure was once 100 percent. Finance Director John Chandler, during his March 13 presentation to supervisors, proposed a modest savings by reducing the amount the county pays for health insurance to 80 percent.

Northampton employees currently have five health insurance plan options, with deductibles ranging from \$0 to \$2,000. Chandler recommended eliminating the zero-deductible plan. The lowest health insurance deductible available would be \$500.

Chandler's recommendations offered some savings, though supervisors worried what would happen if health insurance costs rose another 24 percent next year.

If Northampton paid 80 percent of employee premiums, it would cost the county an additional \$186,600 over a nine-month period from October to June 2019.

The report of proposed expenditures included a 2 percent raise for all county employees, both full and part time, at a cost of \$225,000.

Chandler also included an additional salary supplement for law enforcement officers, a priority of supervisors for FY 2019. In the sheriff's department, 27 full-time officers would receive \$4,000 each, and seven full-time support personnel would receive \$2,000 each.

Two animal control officers each would receive a \$4,000 supplement, and correctional officers at the regional jail each would receive a \$2,000 supplement.

Supervisors also support raises for teachers, but are waiting to receive the school board's preliminary budget before engaging in any meaningful discussion on the matter.

EMS is requesting salary step increases totaling \$80,165; the department has not received step increases in several years.

The regional jail is asking for a \$40,989 budget adjustment for overtime.

The victim witness advocate position was changed from part time to full time at a cost of \$22,600.

In the sheriff's department portion of the budget, the salary of one school resource officer was inadvertently omitted last year; correcting the error will add \$45,453 to the budget. An increase for speed enforcement will add another \$24,808.

Two part time solid waste service jobs also were not accounted for in last year's budget, totaling \$25,173.

A sum of \$52,500, or 15 percent of the transient occupancy tax, must be budgeted for the tourism commission's capital fund.

New equipment and maintenance also will create more necessary expenditures.

Several county departments need new vehicles; most county vehicles have been driven well over 100,000 to 150,000 miles or more. The sheriff's department needs

two Dodge Chargers at a cost of \$92,210. EMS is applying for a grant to help purchase a quick response vehicle; if approved, the county will be responsible for 20 percent of the cost, or \$12,000.

Solid waste needs a service pickup truck for \$33,075. Facilities management also requested two pickup trucks at \$30,000 each, and a Bobcat that will cost \$45,000.

The county treasurer and commissioner of revenue need to replace outdated computer software, which will cost each department \$72,000. Last year, the county spent nearly \$46,000 on computer hardware for the sheriff's department.

New requirements by the Department of Environmental Quality will cost Northampton \$53,000 annually for groundwater testing.

Supervisors noted the county expenditures for FY 2019 as discussed March 13 were "very preliminary."

Accomack May 1 Elections Will Have Familiar Faces and New

Former Chincoteague Mayor Harry Stanley (Cupcake) Thornton, who left that post about 20 years ago after a spending scandal that included a trip to Florida with two other leaders on the taxpayers' dime, is asking voters to put him on the town council in an election on May 1.

Support of the endeavor has been rolling in on Facebook with members of the island's famous fire company, where he is the chief, cheering him on, and others from the county sheriff's office, where he is a deputy, giving him thumbs up. People even said they wished they lived on the island so they could cast a ballot in his favor.

Among the supporters were Vice Mayor Denise Bowden, former Mayor Jack Tarr, and longtime firefighter and pony expert, Roe Terry.

"So happy for this decision," wrote Joseph Jeffries, the island's public works director and town manager from 2000 to 2006. "You have my full support."

"Yay!" Wrote islander Jessica Walker Lewis. "Harry is an excellent candidate and will be a fantastic councilman."

In addition to Thornton, four others will vie for the three seats. Incumbent Ellen W. Richardson, who has served as vice mayor, has a following as well. She's been on panel the longest, since 2000 (according to state election records), when she won a two-person race in a special election with nearly 56 percent of the vote, and often gives the others advice on how things need to be done.

Councilman Ben G. Ellis Jr. is seeking a second four-year term. Councilman Jim Frese is not seeking another term. Alex R. Tucker, who works for the Marine Resources Commission and Matthew T. Reed, owner of Matthew Reed Construction Company, are also vying for the seats.

In 2014, Richardson garnered more than 31 percent of the votes when four candidates were competing. Ellis got nearly 29 percent.

The four-year terms for Bowden and Councilmen Eddie W. Lewis Jr. and Gene Wayne Taylor do not expire until June 30, 2020. Mayor J. Arthur Leonard was elected to serve until the same date.

On Tangier Island, 10 candidates are competing for the six council seats. They are D. Lee Crockett Jr., James R. Parks, Edward V. Parks Jr., Norwood C. Evans, Paul R. McCready, Cynthia S. Wheatley, Rebecca A. Dunivan, Isaiah J. McCready, Lynda L. Clary and Timothy Thomas Trumble. Mayor James W. "Ooker" Eskridge is also asking voters to return him to the top spot. He is unopposed.

In Wachapreague, Mayor Frederick M. Janci Jr. is running for another term without contest. There are eight running for six council seats. They are incumbants Robert G. Williams, Sandie M. Puchalski and Robert F. Bilicki: former council members Stuart P. Bell, Aileen Z. Joeckel and John W. Joeckel and first timers Katherine Niepold Bilicki and David W. Gouak.

In Onancock, Mayor Russell Jones is not seeking another term. Long time Councilman Fletcher D. Fosque, a local dentist, is unopposed in his quest for mayor. Five are seeking the three seats up for grabs on the council. They are former Councilwoman Maphis M. Oswald, Councilwoman N. Catherine Krause, Jov S. Marino, Matthew D. Spuck and Councilman Joshua A. Bundick.

In Hallwood, where a controversy is ongoing regarding a former town clerk and records that got burned in a car fire. Mayor J. W. "Jackie" Poulson Jr. is running for another term, as are council members R. F. "Rich" Selinsky, Barbara Ferriell, E. Stanley Young and Gladys E. "Sicky" Hicks. Former Councilman Timothy C. Clougherty Sr. is asking voters for another chance too. John W. Smith Jr., who has been trying to get on the panel for years and once filed a lawsuit against the others, is seeking the empty spot left by Donald Hurst, who is not asking for another term.

In Saxis, Mayor Denise Drewer and the six council members are seeking another term. The council consists of Aubrey Lee Miles Jr., Darrell Dean Marshall, Jan Rae Foerster, Richard M. Byrd, Wayne E. McCleary and Donna M. Croushore.

In Accomac, Mayor Richard P. Wallace and council members Joyce M. Lewis, Patricia T. Smith, Paul A. White Jr., James M. Johnson Sr., Charles Craig Cropper and Steven Ray Troyer registered for election.

Mayor George H. Ludlow Jr. of Belle Haven is asking to be returned. H. Allen Floyd III, the town recorder, is running for council. No one has registered for election for his post. Council members Elizabeth M. Pase, Larry S. Baxter, Douglas R. Wehner and Edwin R. Long also want a seat on the panel. O. Zach Pase also wants to be elected.

No one filed for mayor in Keller. Rose Ann Moore and Councilwoman Janis A. Wingfield are running for council. The other four seats are up for grabs and could be filled by write-in votes.

In Parksley, Mayor Wayne Marshall, who was the vice mayor, took the top job recently after the unexpected death of Mayor James Eichelberger. Marshall was appointed to fill out the term by the town council. That spot is not up for election in May. Four are vying for three council seats and include incumbents Frank A. Russell II, John Carter Parks and Rodney L. Smoot and resident Daniel Matthews. Julie Nash and Vince Savona were appointed recently to the six-person panel and are not yet up for election.

Onley, Painter, Melfa and Bloxom have elections for town posts in November.



Hats in Ring for Northampton Elections

Cape Charles, Cheriton, and Exmore will each select a mayor in town elections May 1. Cheriton will also elect six council members, while Cape Charles and Exmore will each elect three.

Having met the March 6 deadline to get on the ballot, the candidates are as follows:

Cape Charles will choose between W.S. "Smitty" Dize Jr. and Terry Carney for mayor. George Proto is not seeking a second term.

Cape Charles will choose three town council members. Current council members Joan Natali and L.G. "Chris" Bannon are seeking re-election; Charles "Sambo" Brown is not. Also running are Andrew Follmer, Paul Grossman, Tammy Holloway, David Gay, and Nioaka Marshall.

Gay and Marshall both ran for Cape Charles town council in 2016, earning fourth and sixth place, respectively, behind current council Andrew "Andy" Buccholz and Steven Bennett, and Dora Sullivan, who recently resigned. A special election will be held later this year for Sullivan's post.

Cheriton will choose as its mayor Warren "Ski" Wisneski or Larry Le Mond, who has been serving as interim mayor since the February resignation of Joseph Habel.

Cheriton will elect six council members. With the exception of Mary Mears, all current council are seeking re-election: Dan Dabinett, B.B. "Barry" Downing, Robert "Bo" Lewis, Norma Spencer, and J. Wesley Travis. Also running are Jacqueline Davis, Gregory Hardesty, Jason Van Marter, Christie Mills, Bruce Nutter, Donnella Romeo, and Matthew Yancy III.

Exmore Mayor Douglas Greer Sr. is seeking another term, running against R. Scott Hines. Council members G.W. Adkins III, T. Bradley Doughty, and Bryan Heaster are all seeking re-election, and are unopposed.

The Eastern Shore Post will provide voters with more information on the candidates in the weeks leading up to Election Day.



Chicken Farmer Given A Month To Comply

A Northampton man who has built chicken houses in Accomack County was given about a month to get his site under compliance.

Retired Judge Robert Phillips of Accomack General District Court gave Mohammad Chattha, 59, of Cheriton, who has facilities just south of Seaside Road near Wachapreague, until 9 a.m. April 16 to adhere to the law. He is accused of two misdemeanor offenses and was served with two summonses in connection with the construction.

Accomack Director of Environmental Programs Chris Guvernator told the judge that several attempts to urge Chattha to update his soil erosion and site plan have gone unanswered.

Chattha was sent a notice requiring modification on Aug. 18, 2017. Another letter requiring him to make modifications to his plan was sent Sept. 18. A notice of violation was sent Oct. 3.

Guvernator said he saw land being disturbed outside the approved limits and that Chattha needed to make a new plan that would have to be approved. The site was approved for 25 acres and has expanded beyond another two to five acres.

Two Charged With Felonies in Accomack

Two Accomack men were charged with felonies last weekend, according to records filed in the general district court.

Warner Byrd Jr., 36, of Airport Drive in Melfa, was accused of stealing more than \$200 worth of property from Walmart in Onley on Aug. 28, 2017. He was arrested March 9. Deputy B. K. Misener of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office investigated. Secured bond was set at \$1,500.

Eduwardo Francisco Cux, 20, of Parksley, was charged with assault and battery of Trooper Kurt Johnson on March 9. The officer wrote in the file that the incident occurred after he responded to a single vehicle accident on Front Street in Accomac. A preliminary hearing was set for May.

... It was just senseless. It should never have gone that far. I see that. I have to live with that. I know they have to live with that also. ... I should have just left."

Breonya was blasted in the right side of the head, with a wound that traveled from front to back, and died on the way to the hospital, which was then in Nassawadox. It happened on a Friday morning when the boy should have been in school. His sister had been expelled from school, testimony disclosed. The reason was not given.

The day started with White and the girl arguing about his getting text messages from another female, testimony at the trial disclosed. "I have a lock screen on my phone" and she wanted to see the messages, White told Lt. Anthony Bright on the day of the death in a video-taped interview. "She started punching me and digging her nails in my skin."

Her brother tired of the bickering and came into the room. White said he feel something cold touch his side and realized it was a shotgun. "I pushed it out of the way. He (the boy) turned around and he was going back in there" to his mother's bedroom where he gotten the shotgun. "He brought it back out again. And then he ... had it pointed at me. I had gone in the bedroom and I had a little gun. So I said, 'man go ahead."

"It was already loaded," White said of his gun. "I always keep it loaded. In case anything happens. I don't use it for no

reason. I just had it in my hand. I was talking back and forth. I had it in the hallway. ... The gun just went off."

White had been living at the Keller Pond Road house for about four months. He said he had been seeing the girl for about eight months and her mother let him move him because he had no where else to go. His parents are both deceased and his sister had her own family.

White told the investigator the girl scratched him, charged at him and stabbed him that day. At one point the argument involving money he had given to the girl for rent to give to her mother.

Coast Guard Unable To Find Overboard Cargo Ship Crewman

An unidentified, 33-year-old Chinese man fell overboard near Cape Charles early Tuesday morning, and has not been found.

He was last seen wearing orange coveralls and a dark blue jacket, with no life jacket.

The crewman of the 770-foot cargo ship, Lara Venture, fell overboard while attempting to secure a ladder to the starboard quarter of the anchored vessel.

Watchstanders at the Coast Guard Sector Hampton Roads Command Center in Portsmouth were alerted at 2:10 a.m. They immediately issued an urgent marine information broadcast, and the Coast Guard air station in Elizabeth City, N.C., sent an MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter crew

to begin the search. Crews of the Cutter Sea Horse, from the Portsmouth base, and the Cape Charles Coast Guard station assisted.

Navy helicopter squadron, HSC2, from Chambers Field at the Norfolk naval station, and a Virginia Pilot Association vessel also assisted.

After about 12 hours, covering an area approximately 112 square miles, the search was called off.

"Suspending a search is one of the most difficult choices we have to make in the Coast Guard, and several factors — water temperature, weather conditions, and length of time the person has been missing — inform the decision," Coast Guard Capt. Rick Wester, commander at Sector Hampton Roads, said.



that he had "hung out" with Rogers in the past.

Johnson testified in the drug case of Rogers' brother, Akeem Markiese Rogers, 26, also of Benjamin Banneker Street, on Oct. 24, in Northampton Circuit Court. Both men are being held in Accomack Jail without bond.

Another murder-for-hire scheme suspect was Evron Strand, 43, of Deer Drive in Nelsonia. Judge Phillips dismissed the charge against him saying there was not enough evidence. Officers told of telephone conversations between Strand, while he was in jail, and Cynthia Harmon, 51, of Dennis Drive in Parksley. But the talk made references in code and was not enough for Phillips.

Strand was convicted recently of three counts of distribution of cocaine, according to court records. He got three years in prison each, to run consecutively. He is being held in the Eastern Shore Regional Jail in East-ville. Strand's record includes convictions for forgery, possession with intent to distribute drugs, eluding and protective order violations.

Harmon is being held in Accomack Jail for being an accessory before the fact with premeditation to kill Johnson. Her lawyer, Tucker Watson, had a conflict in representing her and a new attorney has not yet been appointed.

The preliminary hearing for another suspect, Aaron Jamarcus Bowens, 22, who lives on A.S. Road in Painter, which is near Linhaven, was continued to give his new lawyer time to prepare. Attorney Paul Watson was appointed for Bowens. But the defendant instead retained Jarrett McCormack, of Virginia Beach.

Bowens was also charged with attempted murder for hire. He was once referred to in open court by former Northampton Commonwealth's Attorney Bruce Jones, as the "widely" suspected killer in another case.

Jones was speaking of the death of Terrell (Juice) Devone Mason, a 26-year-old father of eight, who was gunned down in 2015. Mason was killed through the window of a shed, where neighborhood family and friends gathered to play cards in Exmore. No arrests have been made in

that investigation.

Since then, Bowens was also involved in an incident at the former Sage Restaurant. He was hit in the leg by gunfire there, which was followed by a high-speed police chase.

DeBrandon Pierre Harmon, 29, of Dennis Drive in Parksley, is Cynthia Harmon's son. He was charged with possession with the intent to manufacture, sell, give or distribute a controlled substance and possession of a firearm while possessing more than a pound of marijuana.

His arrest came during a search of

the Harmon home in connection with Johnson's shooting. Harmon's charges were certified to the grand jury Monday. He is free on \$5,000 secured bond and was ordered not to go back to the Dennis Drive home but reside only at a Dogwood Drive residence in Melfa, according to court records.

Josh Marsh, an agent with the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force, testified cocaine packaging and scales were located inside the Harmon home. The cocaine was not field tested due to its suspected fentanyl content. Authorities are still waiting for lab results.

Draft Northampton School Budget Gives Teachers Four Percent Pay Hike

Northampton's school board proposed a 4 percent raise for all teachers in its draft budget for next school year, but county supervisors, who currently allocate about \$2 million more for public education than the law requires, would have to approve the half-million-dollar-plus pay increase before teachers could see the difference in their paychecks.

According to a compensation study conducted by consulting firm Paypoint HR, Northampton teachers with bachelors degrees are paid more than 10 percent below market value, and teachers with masters degrees are paid more than 5 percent below market value.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence said budget cuts are "the most difficult, distasteful part of the job," but teacher pay was one of the school board's top priorities.

The proposed budget, as presented March 8 at Northampton High School, also included a 3 percent raise for non-teaching positions with salaries well below market value, and a 2 percent

raise for positions with salaries near or above market value.

To fully pay teachers what they're worth, according to the compensation study, Northampton would have to offer teachers a pay increase nearly three times larger than the one proposed, totaling \$1.4 million. The proposed 4 percent raise for teachers is the first step toward offering Northampton teachers competitive wages.

Salaries and benefits for all school employees comprise 79 percent of the approximately \$20 million budget.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence said that as of 2016, the "living wage" in Northampton is \$10.80 per hour, but some school employees are paid as little as \$9.20 per hour. The first step toward providing school employees with a living wage is a proposed raise of 25 cents per hour for all positions earning below \$10.80 per hour. Hourly positions possibly affected by this change include bus drivers, custodians, and cafeteria workers.

All budget requests for new teachers, staff, materials and supplies were

categorized as priority 1, 2, or 3, with priority 1 items as most important and priority 3 items as least important. Only priority 1 and priority 2 items made it into the budget proposal to be presented to county supervisors.

Northampton teacher and former president of the Northampton County Education Association, Justin Wheeler, asked Lawrence if he would reveal the priority levels assigned to all budget items. Lawrence indicated the priority levels become irrelevant once the school board finalizes their decision on which items to include.

Dr. Arthur Carter gave the school board a "gentle reminder" to consider implementing "restorative justice" in Northampton schools, a non-punitive form of discipline.

Among the higher-priority requests for the new budget was \$57,717 to add one new teacher in the tech center at Northampton High School to conduct in-house suspensions, part of the school district's proposed strategy to reduce the number of out-of school suspensions. Northampton's suspen-


sion rate is about two-and-a-half times the state average.

Another request was a "student success coach" to reduce absences and truancy, budgeted for \$50,929.

Carolyn Handwerk, a special education teacher at Northampton Middle School, had this message for the school board: "If we want our schools to be accredited, it starts with reading." She was advocating for the reading program, "Read 180," to be included in the final draft of the proposed school budget.

Handwerk said "Read 180" is a research-based intervention that helps students improve their reading comprehension and fluency as well as writing. Handwerk prefers "Read 180" to "Achieve 3000," a reading program currently in use in Northampton schools, which is not research-based and only uses non-fiction texts, she said.

If the budget is approved, Northampton's share of funding to its public schools would be raised from about \$8.6 million to \$9 million, an increase of 4.6 percent.

Tyson Seen as 'Susceptible to Pressure' Under New Leadership

Tyson Foods' footprint on the Eastern Shore is the focus of preservation groups that appear to be allowing other environmental concerns to go unnoticed. But one organization representative explained Wednesday the reason is the outlook is so promising on that front.

Celeste Pepitone-Nahas is the local voice for Mighty Earth, a national conservation group which has targeted Tyson because CEO Tom Hayes is the first ranking officer in the company "outside the Tyson family."

"We believe he is more susceptible to pressure," she said, adding that since he came on board in 2016, the company has expanded its brand to include meatless products and he has promised sustainability, the avoidance of the depletion of natural resources in order to maintain an ecological balance. "Investing in the new companies is a really good sign," said Pepitone-Nahas.

In January, Tyson Ventures, an arm of the company, invested a "minority stake" in Memphis Meats, which touts "a world without slaughter," and markets "cultured meat produced directly from animal cells," according to the Tyson website. Two years ago, Tyson also invested in Beyond Meats, which makes a plant-based protein burger.

"We would like Tyson to live up to its claims of being a good neighbor on the Shore," she said. That would mean encouraging a shift in the way meat and grain are produced and "locating a centralized processing facility for manure to keep it from getting into watersheds."

"We decided to start with Tyson," she continued, "hoping others like Perdue would fall into line. In a perfect world, companies would just want to do for the public health. Their main goal is profit and we understand that," she said.

While Tyson provides a large economic base on the Shore so does tourism and aquaculture. "Those other businesses will see negative impacts" if the area becomes industrialized. "Tyson picks (areas to expand) where they won't see very much push back," Pepitone-Nahas said.

Meanwhile Citizens For Open Government (COG), a local group, also has its eye on Tyson.

"At this time, our primary focus is on

the illegal withdrawals from the upper and middle Yorktown aguifer by the existing and proposed industrial poultry facilities," COG leader Kenneth Dufty said. "As information cascades into the hands of the general public about the pressures and threats our drinking water supplies are facing, the next step in this process of enlightenment should be to get ALL agricultural uses off the Yorktown (the deeper aguifer that is replenished at a much slower rate) and onto the Columbia. We ... are still untying the knots that have kept the issue of the threats to our drinking water supplies tightly bound. We are not done, but merely just beginning."

Dufty reflected on his response and later added, "Everyone should put this issue at the very top of their priority list ... and work to protect the very resource that is every bit as important as the air we breathe. It is either now or never, and if we all love the Eastern Shore as much as we say we do, we will grab our pens, signs, and lend our voices to protect the Yorktown aquifer, not only from the pending poultry assault, but from uses of this finite source that are not solely dedicated for human consumption."

Tyson has promised to take from the Columbia when possible. However, the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has not mandated such action. All users of 300,000 gallons or more per month are required to get a permit for withdrawal.

Jim Belote, a retired extension agent, said each additional mega chicken house of today equals two houses from the past. He explained that means there are 48 houses between Keller and Pungoteague not 24.

Regarding Mighty Earth's goal to push best management practices, Belote said farmers began using that approach voluntarily years ago. Corn and soybeans are already no till. "They don't put a cover crop because the leftovers (after harvesting) serve that purpose."

Because farmers don't till they can't put the chicken manure under the topsoil so the odor is worse. Mighty Earth wants farmers to use only the amount of fertilizer that can be absorbed by the crops. Belote said that is already done. "You don't want to be buying and using what you don't need because it's expensive," he said.


Mighty Earth also wants farmers to plant "rotationally raised small grains ... to help diversify our agricultural system beyond corn and soybeans." Pepitone-Nahas suggested oats. Belote said there is no market here for oats or alfalfa.

He also said the problem occurs when there is no diversified farming. Large-scale chicken farmers are not using the manure themselves. "They don't grow crops," he said. "A factory farm should be a different classification." He also wondered about diseases that could kill masses and how those chickens would be disposed.

Waste Watchers, an anti-litter group, is the only organization that has taken a public stand on the case of Lance Fisher, who was cited by DEQ for dumping on his property at Sanford.

No organization has protested NASA for contaminating wells or investigated the fallout from a rocket explosion a couple of years ago, Tyson proponent Supervisor Grayson Chesser commented recently.

There are also piles of tires in locations across the Shore, waterways in condemnation for the taking of shellfish and unlined dumps from years past that have not been closed to today's standards, none of which have been addressed by local environmental groups.

The Virginia Independent School Athletic Association (VISAA) coaches huddled in Richmond and voted four Broadwater Academy student-athletes to its Division III All-State football team for the 2017 season.

Gunnar Gustafson, a Grade 9 student, was selected First Team All-State kick returner. He returned a kickoff 79 yards to score the go-ahead touchdown in a win against Brunswick Academy and another kickoff return for 81 yards and a touchdown against Isle of Wight Academy. 





CAPITAL LETTERS

The 2018 General Assembly session adjourned March 10. Many bills were agreed upon the last week but the most important bill, the

budget bill, was not.

The current budget runs until July 1, but counties and cities are working on their budgets. The state provides a large portion including support for schools, sheriff's departments, public works, etc. This leaves many municipalities in the dark. We

hope to reach an agreement soon so that local governments may craft their budgets for the upcoming year.

The disagreement this year is not only where to spend the taxes but on the amount there is to spend. The difference between the House and Senate budget is three billion dollars. Six delegates and seven senators were negotiating the budget but the temperature in the room became too heated, and the legislators thought it best for everyone to go home in order to cool down a bit. The heart of the debate is Medicaid expansion. The introduced budget included expansion and the House could not remove it from the budget. Instead, several safeguards were

added to keep the program manageable. The Senate removed Medicaid expansion from their budget. Governor Northam has already stated that any budget sent to him without the expansion will be amended to include the expansion, without any safeguards or modifications. The Governor, as of this week, has called us back for a special session April 11 to continue to work on the budget.

There were other bills aimed at controlling health insurance costs. One bill would allow insurance companies to sell a more economical health insurance plan than what is available in the commonwealth today. Another would allow people to form a group in order to purchase

group health insurance. My bill to form a catastrophic pool to cover major health expenses, similar to a worker's compensation pool, was sent to the Health Insurance Reform Commission for further study. I recognize a huge challenge in the cost of health insurance and the rising cost of care. I will continue to work to try to help solve these problems.

We adjourned from the General Assembly "sine die" Saturday afternoon, March 10. However, we will soon be headed back to Richmond for a spe-

cial session as the House and the Senate were not able to produce a budget bill to send to the governor for signing by the end of the 60-day session. Coming to a bicameral consensus was difficult due to a significant gap in the two budgets – more than \$600 million - because the House Budget included Medicaid expansion while the Senate budget did not. Majority leadership in the Senate and the House are currently at odds on expansion, and the budget conferees will have to work in the interim to come to some form of an agreement. When we return for the special session, it will be to address the budget issue as well as revenue bills that await action.

While the need for a special session and the looming budget question are the biggest headlines from the past week, there is positive news surrounding legislation that will affect the Eastern Shore. My bill SB693 to create the Virginia Waterway Maintenance Fund and provide an organizational structure to ad-

minister funds for shallow-channel dredging projects has passed and awaits Governor Northam's signature. SB693's success was the result of a big bipartisan push here in Richmond, with both Del. Bloxom and Del. Hodges working with me to ensure its passage. It is currently funded with 1.3 million dollars in the House budget and I am hopeful that we will see a comparable level of funding in the final budget bill when it is produced.

After years of bipartisan work, Del. Stolle and my companion bills to create a special assistant to the governor on coastal resiliency and flooding adaptation has passed both the House and the Senate and is headed to the governor's desk. This position was also funded in the House budget, and I believe it will be funded in the final budget bill as well. As we continue to see an increase in flooding and flooding-related issues here on the Shore, this is a critical step to finding long-term solutions and funding for coastal flooding.

I was also a co-patron on SB883, Sen. Bill Stanley's bill to encourage economic growth and development in rural and/or economically struggling localities. SB883 and companion bill HB222 establish an income tax modification for companies that, from 2018 to 2028, either invest at least \$5 million in new capital investment in a qualified locality and create at least 10 jobs

paying at least twice the minimum wage in a qualified locality, or create at least 50 jobs paying at least twice the minimum wage in a qualified locality. A company is eligible to claim the modification only if it had no property or payroll in Virginia on the effective date of the act. Both Accomack and Northampton counties are included in the bill's provisions, and I believe this will establish additional incentive in attracting companies to set up shop on the Shore and provide much-needed jobs and investments to our residents and community.

As more information becomes available regarding the budget and

the special session, I will be sure to update you. I would also like to thank everyone who came to visit while we were in Richmond as well as anyone who called, wrote or e-mailed with their opinions and questions. I will be hosting a series of town halls on the Shore following April 18's veto session. It is my hope that by that time we will have a budget and a more complete picture of the results of this year's General Assembly session.

Protect Your Finances: Be Alert Even When You Are Not Alert

It is 3 a.m. You are sound asleep. Your cell phone or landline rings. Still groggy from having been awakened at such an ungodly hour, you answer it. On the line is your grandson (or any other close family relative). He is telling you in an agitated tone of voice that he is about to be locked up in Mexico for some crime unless he can post \$5,000 bail. Can you go to a Western Union and wire it to him? This is what is called the "grandparent scam." Do not wire the money, do not call back the phone number that the scammer may have provided — it is part of the scam. Though your brain accurately tells you this is almost certainly a scam, your gut may not be quite certain. A solution to this uncertainty would be providing this grandson (or any traveling members of your family) a key word that has to be mentioned in any call for aid to verify the legitimacy of such a call. This grandparent scam happens quite frequently, and if one falls for it, there is little chance for monetary recovery. Once again, you are your own best defense.

It is 3 a.m., and you are sound asleep in your hotel room. The phone on the night table next to your bed rings. Groggily, you answer it. The front desk is calling; it seems there was a problem with your credit card and they want you to repeat the number to get things squared away. Don't repeat the number, tell the caller that you will come down later to fix the "problem" in person. It is not the front desk calling you, it is an outside scammer

trolling for usable credit card numbers with which to enrich himself/herself. Once again, you are your own best defense.

You are in a supermarket. You've bought a lot of items. You are standing on the checkout line in a hurry to get out of the store and on your way. You pay with a debit card and stuff the register receipt in your pocket or bag without looking at it because you are in a rush to get to your next stop or to get home. Big mistake, when you have paid with a debit card. A debit card allows for a consumer to get money back in addition to paying for the purchase. A cashier can ring you up and include cash back of, say, \$40. The cashier can then pocket \$40 after you leave the register without you ever knowing if you do not look at that register receipt. The store register will balance at the end of the day because the \$40 taken will be reflected on the debit card record. The register will not say into whose pocket that \$40 went. Two things to defend against this: Don't use a debit card, your recourses are more limited than with credit cards; if you do use a debit card, examine the register receipt before you leave the store.

There seems to be a proliferation of so-called "dollar" stores on the Eastern Shore, perhaps due to economic demographics. When patronizing a certain one I have repeatedly had items ring up at a higher price than marked on the shelf. This is illegal, the advertised price on the shelf controls. Hopefully, this is not part of a more general trend

to victimize consumers already trying to stretch their dollars. Pay attention to the shelf price and price on the register receipt and demand a correction when necessary.

To paraphrase someone from history, eternal vigilance is the price of financial security.


