The State of Our Waters Depends on the Question

State and federal monies are available for local and regional projects. The Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is not adequately staffed to handle the problems ahead. Sea level rise is in the Eastern Shore's future. Air emission regulations are uncertain or don't exist. Conservation efforts for groundwater withdrawals are in the works.

Those were among the issues discussed during last week's 5th Annual State of Our Waters meeting hosted by Shorekeeper Jay Ford at the community college.

State Sen. Lynwood Lewis announced \$1 million was approved in the state budget for the Eastern Shore Public Library building project. About \$6 million was in the package for oyster replenishment.

Rep. Scott Taylor told of \$73 million in federal funds for Chesapeake Bay Cleanup efforts. He officially came out against offshore drilling. "I think we're going to be fine" about the drilling, Taylor said. "They're going to go through a process that is going to take a little time. Wherever you fall politically, there is sea level rise. We've got to do something about it."

"I like a light touch in regulation," Taylor said, which did not seem to go over well with the crowd of environmentalists who attended the session. "We will probably disagree on how much we regulate. I do think there should be some to protect our bay and our environment."

Taylor was asked about mass chicken houses not being addressed in the Farm Bill. "You are representing us," an unidentified woman said. "These are no longer farms they are industrial-size farms."

"I'm not going to know everything about everything," Taylor answered. "It's not going to happen. I'm happy to run it down ... I like a soft touch in regulation," he said.

Kitty Croke, an Onancock resident, stated, "It appears there is a weakening of EPA ... a reduction of accountability. Am I wrong in having understood that?" she asked Taylor.

"I don't see that," he said. "I'm not aware of any example that would make me agree with you." But after hearing of some issues, he promised to look into "accountability."

"Bay Cleanup is one of the top priorities for Ralph," said

State Secretary of Natural Resources Matthew Strickler when speaking of Shore native, Gov. Ralph Northam. "He basically told me to go forth and do good things."

Strickler reported "very good progress" in pollution reduction goals, according to a report card from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. "Great news, we made a lot of progress there." He admitted it will start getting more challenging in the third phase. "We do all we can to exceed our commitments."

Virginia Institute of Marine Science Associate

Dean of Research and Advisory Services Mark Luckenbach reported an improvement in quality standards for 40 percent of the Chesapeake Bay. "Bayside grasses are just over 90,000 acres, that's halfway to the target for Maryland and Virginia ... there's a lot more to do. Oyster populations are rebounding on the bay and seaside. Not so much to do with water quality than better management."

Luckenbach said the challenges are improving water quality in rising temperatures. As for sea level rise, "We can't ignore it any longer. You see this change nearly daily." Luckenbach said plans can be made for coping. "Bad news is it's going to cost a lot of money. There's little doubt that Virginia is going to do all it can, as long as possible. They cannot protect our entire coastline from rising water," he added. "Lower income families are more at risk than others." He mentioned Saxis and Clam where "you can't get to grocery store ... we need to find a way to ease of burdens of places we can't protect."

Under the (former Governor, now Senator) Kaine administration, Strickler said, "There was a climate commission. Unfortunately, a lot of things were left to gather dust on the shelf. We are trying to go back and take a look, update the science. It's been 10 years. We're very committed to addressing this issue."

Luckenbach said, "VIMS is trying to understand the impacts of chicken and chicken manure ... in the past, we tackled a number of those challenges by applying biological indicators ..."

Strickler said stormwater issues are also on the list of regulations that need to be evaluated. Later he discussed monitoring air emissions from chicken houses on the Shore. "Don't have regulatory structure in place. Work with DEQ to figure out if we have regulatory reach, if not we will have to work with the General Assembly."

Someone from the audience asked if DEQ could make up for what EPA is missing and are they adequately staffed?

"We think there's a lot DEQ can do," said Strickler. "Don't think they are adequately staffed ... need to see where the EPA has decided to back away and fill those voids. We're trying to understand where we need to step up."

Regarding groundwater withdrawal,

Strickler said, "New poultry houses ... most certainly present a threat. Importance of clean drinking water on the Shore (is) fragile. We need to protect the quantity. Figure out how much they are drawing down. Got commitments from all of them now." Regarding more conservation protections, he said, "We're not as far along as some of you would like, but it's something we're working on."

Freedom of Information Act Disputes

A Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) dispute came to standstill last week in Accomack Circuit Court.

Dr. William H. Turner, a retired dentist, sculptor, writer, painter, and former Accomack supervisor, asked for a nonsuit to be declared that would allow him more time to answer the arguments of his opponent, legal representatives of the state's executive secretary of the supreme court.

Retired Judge Charles E. Poston granted Turner's request for the voluntary withdrawal of his appeal. The action allows Turner the ability to

bring back his case at a later time. Andrew McRoberts, the lead lawyer for the other side, noted his objection.

McRoberts wanted the case to be dismissed. He said the secretary is a court administrator and as such does not have to abide by FOIA. "The statute says what it says and means what it says," McRoberts argued. The secretary "is a he ... not a bureau, commission, not an agency."

Turner is appealing a district court case in which he claimed Nerissa N. Rouzer, an assistant attorney general, failed to direct him to statutes that would grant immunity to state judges in regard to \$1,500 advances they could

receive annually prior to 2016. Rouzer testified that it was her legal opinion that the judges did not fall under FOIA and that by asking her to clarify her response he was asking for a legal opinion that she did not have to give him.

"Those judges ... they are outside the scope of FOIA," she said. Turner said the attorney general is attempting to block his probe into \$1.8 million in funds that were given to about 175 circuit court judges in recent years. Beginning in 2015, he also sent many FOIA requests to the supreme court executive secretary, which were not successful.

"What is important is this fiasco cost the taxpayers at least \$10,000 to appear and four attorneys were present for the attorney general, two of his own and two or three private attorneys at \$620 an hour," Turner said earlier this week. "Now they must come back and try again.

"The attorney general has spent \$200,000 to \$300,000 on this case since November 2017 for the sole purpose of keeping me from obtaining telephone records of secret communications with our local district court judge," he said. "It is an unbelievable story, but I have complete documentation."



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The Crape Myrtle Murders of Cape Charles

Cape Charles, a town that prides itself on preserving and enhancing its historical value and natural beauty, recently witnessed what many gardeners call a "crape murder."

The term refers to the topping of crape myrtle trees (also spelled as crepe myrtle), which is "the wrong way to prune" and an "unhealthy" practice that can cause the trees to decay or die, according to the Virginia Cooperative Extension website.

The incident occurred on May 22 at 300 Mason Ave., on Cape Charles' main thoroughfare, affecting two crape myrtles in front of a commercial building.

The work was performed by the Virginia Department of Transportation at the request of a tenant who said the trees were blocking the business sign on the front of the building, reported Paula Miller, VDOT's Hampton Roads public affairs officer.

The crape myrtles are planted in a bed in the sidewalk that belongs to the VDOT right-of-way.

VDOT did not notify the town prior to the tree trimming. Miller said VDOT

normally notifies towns in advance when "major work" is planned, but not for minor work such as repairing potholes.

When asked if VDOT would allow a citizen, such as a local master naturalist, to oversee future tree trimmings, Miller said VDOT has many major tree trimming contracts and it would be unable to coordinate its schedule with an outside party.

If Cape Charles could accommodate VDOT's schedule, VDOT administrator Chris Isdell would decide if the town would be allowed to provide oversight on future jobs, Miller said.

Shelly Gorman, the Cape Charles Main Street program manager, released the following statement regarding the pruning that was unsupervised by town officials:

"Main Street is working hand-in-hand with the community and Town of Cape Charles staff to play a key role in shaping the beautification of our special town. We are dedicated to guiding future growth by assisting in shaping guidelines and building partnerships between the Town of Cape Charles Public Works staff and VDOT to en-

sure this doesn't happen in the future."

Cape Charles is currently the only town on the Eastern Shore participating in the Virginia Main Street program, offered by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development to preserve small-town history while fostering economic growth.

New Ravenna Invests \$1 Million for Job Expansion

CEO Richard Walters of New Ravenna, the mosaic tile manufacturer in Exmore doing business across the nation and worldwide, announced last Friday a \$1 million investment and expansion that will add 31 more jobs to Northampton's economy.

Exmore Town Manager Robert Duer welcomed Gov. Ralph Northam as the first sitting governor to visit the town.

Northam congratulated Walters and presented him with a token of appreciation, a Virginia flag that had flown over the state capitol.

"As one of the Eastern Shore's marquee companies, the global success of New Ravenna is an important example of what businesses can accomplish in rural Virginia," Northam said.

The governor reported that the statewide unemployment rate is 3.3 percent, the lowest it has been in 10 years, but acknowledged that unemployment is still higher on the Shore.

As of March, Northampton had the highest unemployment rate in the state at 7.2 percent. That figure dropped

since February, when the county's unemployment rate was 8.1 percent.

While agriculture and aquaculture are successful enterprises on the Shore, its economy "can't rely on one sole industry," Northam said. New Ravenna is currently the only major employer in Northampton in the manufacturing industry.

Northampton unemployment is falling, though it has yet to recover to a rate of 6.4 percent, as it was in March last year.

How significant are 31 new employment opportunities in the Northampton job market? That number is more than ten percent of the total jobs provided by Northampton schools, the county's biggest employer, with just under 300 workers, including teachers.

Bayshore Concrete, which closed earlier this year, employed up to 350 workers during peak operations.

Virginia's Deputy Secretary of Commerce and Trade for Rural Economic Development, Cassidy Rasnick, said that "progress has been uneven" in the Shore's economic development, but her department has been "diagnosing problems" and working toward solutions.

Sen. Lynwood Lewis said New Ravenna serves as an example to be followed by "other companies looking to open or expand the type of success that can be harnessed by investing in the Eastern Shore," and he looks forward to a "brilliant and bright future" for the region.

Del. Robert Bloxom said, "It's great to see a local company with deep

roots on the Eastern Shore expanding," and he hopes to attend "more events like this" in the future.

Walters highlighted New Ravenna's achievement in applying "21st century expertise in an ancient art," while Duer attributed the company's success to "more than technology."

"It's about doing the job right," Duer said.

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Accomack School Board Selects Reese

Gary Reese, a former teacher and coach who retired in September, is the new District 4 representative on the Accomack County School Board. His term is effective beginning July 1.

The Parksley resident was selected on June 5 to replace Margaret Miles, who recently vacated the seat. The seat will expire Dec. 31, 2019.

It was the second attempt by Accomack's school board selection commission to find a candidate whom they deemed suitable for the position.

Connie Burford, who said she was "an advocate for Accomack County school employees and students" with "an extensive background in special education," originally was the only candidate for the District 4 seat. She appeared before the commission at the May 8 public hearing. Jenean Hall, a retired school psychologist, was one of Burford's supporters.

On May 15, the commission voted unanimously against Burford, 0-6.

The vacancy for the District 4 school board seat was re-advertised and another public hearing was held May 29. This time, there were two candidates: Reese, and Arthur "Worth" Saunders. Saunders is a physical therapist whose wife is an English Language Learner (ELL) teacher at Accawmacke Elementary and whose two children attend Accomack schools. He asserted that his experience as a private sector employee

would be an asset to the school board.

Jane Duer, Paul Roache, and school board member Paul Bull spoke in support of Saunders.

Reese had 36 years of experience as a teacher, coach, and athletic director before retiring from Accomack schools in 2017. He is also a parent.

Tom Wilson, Nandua teacher Carla Savage-Wells, former Nandua principal Dennis Custis, current Nandua principal George Parker, and Chincoteague principal Harold Holmes spoke in support of Reese.

Saunders did not attend the school board selection commission's June 5 meeting when it rendered its decision. Aside from the commission, the only people in attendance were Reese, school board clerk Gretta Smith, and a reporter.

The commission went into closed session for approximately 20 minutes to discuss the candidates' qualifications before re-opening the session and taking a vote, which resulted in a 4-4 tie between Saunders and Reese.

Chairwoman Jodi Greene cast her vote for Reese to break the tie.

The commission congratulated Reese, who was sworn in immediately following the meeting.

Before leaving for the clerk's office to be sworn in, Reese was approached by District 1 commissioner Scott Chesson, who said he voted for Saunders to promote diversity on the school board and meant nothing personal against Reese.

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
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

Indictments Include Two Rapes

Two Accomack men were indicted Monday by an Accomack Grand Jury in connection with separate incidents of rape.

Lance Barrett Rew, 26, of Boston Road in Craddockville, was indicted for having sex with a woman against her will on March 17, during a party at his home.

Nakia Keetwon Reid, 26, of Linhaven Circle in Painter, was also initially charged with the crime. The case against him was dismissed in general district court.

The victim, whose name isn't being used because of the nature of the crime, told authorities Rew talked about shooting her in the head on the way home. Investigator Sam Castiglia of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) handled the case.

According to a warrant, police seized bedding, bullet casings, a partial box of ammo, a shotgun shell, and a 9 mm rifle.

In the other case, Michael Lee Camper, 30, of Valerie Drive in New Church, was indicted on counts of rape by force and strangulation in connection with a Feb. 14 incident. Lt. Anthony Bright of ACSO gave information about the case to the grand jury.

Rodney Battle, 49, of Church Road in Accomac, was indicted on counts of credit card theft, grand larceny, and credit card fraud in September 2017. Deputy Kenny Reese investigated.

Francisco Cux, 20, of Parksley, was indicted on a count of assault and battery of Trooper Kurt Johnson in connection with a March 9 incident that occurred after the officer responded to a single-vehicle accident on Front Street in Accomac. Trooper Brandon Tripp investigated.

Murray Tells Schools It's Their Fault Increase Not Fully Funded

Northampton school board members got an earful from Spencer Murray, chairman of the board of supervisors, at the May 29 public hearing on the fiscal year 2019 county budget that will take effect July 1.

Murray began to explain why local funding for public education had been increased by less than \$215,000, or about 43 percent of the school board's requested increase. Supervisors could not give the school board more money for next year without accurate knowledge of the school district's revenues and expenditures for this year, he indicated.

But the situation quickly escalated as Murray raised his voice and lectured a silent audience for eight minutes straight.

"I've been asking for a full-year forecast," Murray asserted. "We're 30 days away from the end of the fiscal (year). The school board should be able to tell me, within reason, what they're spending this year. ... I need to know that to help you."

It was a different response than he offered two months prior. When supervisors and the school board met March 29 to discuss the proposed school budget, Murray called the 79-page document "very thick and very, very, very comprehensive ... an excellent presentation ... a lot of numbers."

But on May 29, Murray continued, "Every year ... you want a half a million to a million dollars more," yet "in August or September ... sometimes you're six, seven, eight (hundred thousand), a million dollars under budget. That's not acceptable."

The school board had requested nearly \$475,000 more from the county than last year, to fulfill goals including a 4 percent raise for teachers and recruiting additional personnel, such as an attendance officer, to address the needs of at-risk students. It was the first year the school board had requested more than \$9 million total in county funding.

A budget cut would eliminate the 4 percent teacher raise that would have helped Northampton compete with neighboring districts when recruiting

new talent, school officials said. The raise would have caught up Northampton teacher salaries to current wages for Accomack teachers, who will get an additional 4 percent raise in the upcoming fiscal year.

"We give you every penny we possibly can," Murray answered. "If you want to take this \$214,000 ... and give that all to the teachers, that's fine with this board. We're not telling you how to spend it."

School board member Randy Parks pointed out that a raise of 4 percent, on average, would have given each teacher an extra \$1,800 – almost half of the proposed \$3,000 raise for each correctional officer at the Eastern Shore Regional Jail. Supervisors had also proposed \$5,000 raises for sheriff's deputies.

Without the help of an attendance officer, Northampton schools will struggle to attain state accreditation, the school board said. Superintendent Eddie Lawrence expects the state benchmark for attendance to be 10 percent or fewer students missing 18 or more days of school each year. About 25 percent of Northampton students currently miss school that much.

The school board's influence on attendance is essentially limited to phone calls and emails that often go unanswered. An attendance officer could conduct home visits and build relationships with families to encourage more student and parent involvement in school.

"I'm committed to public education," Murray stated. "I'm a product of public education. ... I'll raise taxes for schools if I'm sure ... the need is there and I know what the spending is. ... You tell me what your spending is ... give me a number," he told the school board.

When Parks asked for permission to respond to Murray's comments, Murray said, "No," and told him to "respond with your numbers."

Before adjourning, supervisors authorized the purchase of computer software updates for the offices of the commissioner of revenue and treasurer, which will cost nearly \$220,000.

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Hallwood Accepts Affidavit From Former Clerk on Past Taxes

Despite some town officials believing former clerk Angela Hinman "Angel" Taylor was embezzling money from municipal coffers and there is a police investigation being conducted into the allegations, Hallwood's council voted Monday to accept Taylor's word, in the form of a notarized affidavit, that she paid a total of \$3,177.26 in cash for real estate and personal property taxes in 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015.

The panel also accepted paperwork stating she paid \$642 in cash for trash pickup for four households for which she is responsible. Her submissions came about a month after the May 1 deadline given by the town.

In addition, council members agreed to ask collection agent, James Elliott, a lawyer from Yorktown who does the same type of work for Accomack County, to stop proceedings against the Taylor for those back taxes and trash collection fees. The end result would have been to auction the property, including her home.

Councilman Stanley Young was absent from the session. Councilman Harvey Elliott abstained from the vote. Those in favor were council members Rich Se-

linsky, Barbara Ferriell, Sicky Hicks (who is related to Taylor), and Donald Hurst.

Proof of her payment and that of other citizens were destroyed in a fire last October along with all the town records. Taylor was keeping them in her car and was scheduled to take the documents to an auditor for a long overdue inspection within days of the blaze. Selinsky had pushed for the audit suspecting something was wrong.

Taylor resigned right after the fire, leaving the officials to try to figure out how to run things. She attended Monday's session to argue her case but would not discuss the overall situation with a reporter. She previously said she would not make a statement while she is being investigated. State police have given no indication when they will be finished.

Taylor said she was late in getting back to the town about her payments because she did not receive the notice until after the deadline. The letter was not sent through certified mail delivery. She stated the town was not specific about what the deadline was for. Taylor admitted she has not paid 2017 real estate taxes. She also complained the town does not have an ordinance allowing delinquent trash fees to be added tax bills.

In early February, Taylor attended a town council meeting to defend her brother, who also paid his taxes with cash. At that time, she said she got a notice from the town about her back bills. She attended the meeting to complain about how things were being run.

She said there were obvious mistakes in a notice for delinquent taxes she received Jan. 22, and she was upset about an incident in which her brother. Tim Johnson, was told he could either sign an affidavit saying he had paid her in cash for his taxes, which is what he had claimed, or pay again. Mayor Jackie Poulson told him he could be forced to testify in court if he signed. Johnson refused and paid another \$200.

Not everyone was happy with the town's vote Monday. One woman who wanted to remain anonymous said it was ridiculous that Taylor should be let off the hook.

Harvey Elliott became irate during the conversation with Taylor. "By the time it gets around to auctioning you will be properly notified," he said. But Taylor interrupted him and he yelled back.

"Why are you raising your voice at me?" she asked.

"Why are you interrupting me?" Elliott answered. He then went on to explain a notice for auction would be coming from the attorney.

But Taylor said the town has an obligation to notify her and give her ample opportunity to respond. She apparently meant notification should not come through a lawyer.

Taylor also noted the records show she paid her taxes for 2016 and had she not paid them in previous years, the money for 2016 would have been first put down to make her up to date.


"We accepted everybody else's word," Mayor Jackie Poulson said in the end. "It's up to the town council. We've taken everybody's word before. We have no other choice but to take her word ... we've got no way to say she didn't."

The motion was then made by Hicks and seconded by Hurst and the vote was taken.

"We went back through the records," said Poulson at an earlier session. "We think that it started 2012, when Tim (Raynor) was here, that Angel was taking the money. That's what we've come up with so far."

Raynor, the former mayor, was in the

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Concern Over Health Department Fish Notices Posted in Accomack County

Some local residents voiced concern last week about warnings posted on the bayside harbors about striped bass.

The health department notices were posted in Onancock and Harborton and warn, "Eating certain fish from this location (The Chesapeake Bay) may be harmful to your health. These fish may contain chemicals calls PCBs (Polychlorinated Biphenyls). Eating fish that contain PCBs may increase your risk for cancer."

The sign stated "no more than two meals per month" of the bass should be eaten. "Women who are pregnant or may become pregnant, nursing mothers and young children should not eat the fish."

"It's something relatively new," said Keith Privett, an environmental specialist with the local health department. "Just put up this year." The postings are made by the state Department of Environmental Quality, which did the testing, he continued. "The health department provides the advisory language."

Amy Hayes, of the toxic substances section of the state health department, said the PCBs are found in "electric transformer oil and some industries."

The topic was raised during the State of the Waters session with state and federal representatives last week.

Dean of Research and Advisory Services Mark Luckenbach of the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS) attended the session and speculated, "I think this is a result of additional targeting sampling." He said big fish like the striped bass "get around in pretty gross waters. I don't think really big long-life fish should be eaten more than twice a month ... there's an advisory on all large fish," he said.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) website states, "Although no longer commercially produced in the U.S., PCBs may be present in products and materials produced before the 1979 PCB ban. Products that may contain PCBs include: Transformers and capacitors; electrical equipment including voltage regulators, switches, re-closers, bushings, and electromagnets; oil used in motors and hydraulic systems; old electrical devices or appliances containing PCB capacitors, fluorescent light ballasts, cable insulation, thermal insulation material including fiberglass, felt, foam, and cork; adhesives and tapes; oil-based paint; caulking; plastics; carbonless copy paper; and floor finish."

"The PCBs used in these products were chemical mixtures made up of a variety of individual chlorinated biphenyl components known as congeners," the site continued. "Most commercial PCB mixtures are known in the U. S. by their industrial trade names, the most common being Aroclor."

Today, PCBs can still be released into the environment from: poorly maintained hazardous waste sites; illegal or improper dumping of PCB wastes; leaks or releases from electrical transformers containing PCBs; disposal of PCB-containing consumer products into municipal or other landfills not designed to handle hazardous waste; and burning some wastes in municipal and industrial incinerators.

"PCBs do not readily break down once in the environment," the EPA website states. "They can remain for long periods cycling between air, water, and soil. PCBs can be carried long distances and have been found in snow and seawater in areas far from where they were released into the environment. As a consequence, they are found all over the world. In general, the lighter the form of PCB, the further it can be transported from the source of contamination. PCBs can accumulate in the leaves and above-ground parts of plants and food crops. They are also taken up into the bodies of small organisms and fish. As a result, people who ingest fish may be exposed to PCBs that have bioaccumulated in the fish they are ingesting."

TAYLOR TAKEN BY CUBS IN ROUND 23 OF 2018 MLB DRAFT

Former Nandua High school graduate and current senior at the University of South Carolina, Hunter Taylor was attending baseball practice Wednesday during Day 3 of the 2018 Major League Baseball drafts. The Gamecocks are sitting on a Regional Championship that was acquired last weekend in Greenville, and they are now gearing up for a weekend road trip to Arkansas for the Supers, with hope that their next post-season adventure will land them at the College World Series in Omaha.

Seven of Taylor's teammates had been selected already, with 20 rounds still left to go.

Then it happened. The Onley native said he got the news he had been selected in round 23 by the Chicago Cubs just moments after celebrating his teammate Jonah Bride's MLB selection.

"Jonah had just gotten drafted and everyone ran over to him and was yelling,

and then a few minutes later, one of our equipment managers walked over to me and said, 'Hey Hunter, guess what—you just got drafted,' and then the whole team did the same to me [as to Jonah]. It was really, really cool to experience it on our field with all of my brothers," reflected Taylor.

And to think, the 5-foot-11 anchor almost transferred at the end of his sophomore year due to lack of playing time, and then shared his position behind the plate during his junior year.

That all changed under new direction with Head Coach Mark Kingston, who challenged Taylor during the months leading up to his senior season.

"Hunter has totally transformed himself as a player," Kingston reported to the state.com recently. "He lost 30 pounds because we told him, 'If you're ever going to have any impact in this game and this program in your last year, you need to get

in the best shape of your life."

With all his hardwork in the off season, Taylor more than earned the prime spot as the backstop for the Gamecocks this season.

"He's just playing such good baseball at this point we need to play him. He needs to be back there," Kingston said.

"And he may play a while because he does a lot of things that catchers don't do these days. He throws well, he blocks well, he's really evolved as a receiver and now you have a catcher who has eight homers in just over 100 at-bats. That's pretty darn good."

With eight homers and a .481 slugging percentage, Taylor has been just as effective offensively as defensively, with a sniper that has thrown out 15 baserunners

during the regular season.

"I'm feeling extremely blessed and relieved. It was quite a rush when it happened, but it makes you think of all the hard work you've put into it, for me, over the last eight years. It was a very nervewracking couple of days with not knowing for sure, but once it was official, it was a feeling like no other," said Taylor, "Once I could get my mom to stop crying, it was amazing to talk to her on the phone because my friends and family know how hard I've worked and I've wanted this for a long time."

Laura Walker Sets World-Class Records in the Pool

Laura Walker of Pungoteague was rather giddy about turning 80 recently because it means she enters a new age group in Masters Swimming and will likely set national and world records in the pool.

Walker, who has been swimming competitively since she was in her mid-50s, started out with no intention of setting records. "Swimming was a good release for me and helped me so much mentally and physically," said Walker in her home recently. "Then I met so many great people of all ages from all over the country. I never thought I would be at it this long," said Walker, trim and looking much younger than her age.

At a Masters Swimming event in Fairfax, Va., recently, Walker was on a relay team made up of two men and two women that set a new national record in the 200 medley.

Since 1998, Walker has been on the U.S. top 10 152 times for individual events and over 100 top-10 relays. In 2017, she was ranked first in the United States for the 50-meter, 100-meter, and 200-meter backstroke in both the Shore Course Meters (SCM) and Long Course Meters (LCM). In the world rankings, she was ranked fifth in the 200 SCM backstroke and 10th in the 200 LCM backstroke.

In 2013, she was on a 70-year-old relay team that set new world records for the free style 400 LCM, 400 medley LCM and SCM relay, and 800 meter LCM and SCM freestyle. The 400 freestyle record surpassed the previous mark by 21.7 seconds, which is a lot of time in swimming. Walker was also a member of the relay team that held the old record.

"This coming year our relay team will be eligible to compete in the 80-year-old relays. We are looking forward to setting new national and world records for our age group," said Walker, who notes for the most part her teammates have been blessed to enjoy good health as they reach the years when some of their competitors bow out due to illness or physical ailments.

However, Walker, whose best event is the backstroke, continues to swim despite having a rotator cuff injury, a broken hip, and back problems. "Swimming has helped me to heal with everything I've dealt with," said Walker, who did not require surgery for her rotator cuff injury.

Walker is not the only local swimmer bringing ribbons back to the Shore. At the Fairfax meet, Scott Snyder (25-29) won the 50 yard fly and placed in his other events. Scott Belfit (65-69) was fourth in the 500 yard freestyle and with Bill Nelson (65-69) placed in all of their events.

All the local swimmers train at the YMCA in Onley two to three times a week.

U.S. Masters Swimming is a national membership-operated nonprofit that provides membership benefits to nearly 65,000 swimmers of all abilities across the country. One of the benefits is open-water and pool competitions. The Eastern Shore swimmers are members of the Virginia Masters Swim Team. Walker's relay teammates live in various parts to the state and have competed all over the country. She has attended meets in California, Texas, Florida, and Indiana.

The next local Masters Meet will be July 14 at a new 50-meter YMCA pool in Virginia Beach.

Walker invites anyone interested in swimming to join her and other local Masters swimmers at the YMCA. "I had never done anything competitively in my life," said Walker.


"When I grew up, girls were doing water ballet, not racing each other. At first I had no confidence whatsoever and just tried not to do anything dumb, although one time I fell off the starting block. We all inspire each other to get better and have so much fun doing it. Swimming has done wonders for my life."

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

Reports of red drum catches behind the breakers of the lower shore barrier islands have fallen off greatly over the last weekend, but it has nothing to do with a decline in the number of available red drum in the area. It has everything to do with anglers shifting their attention and fishing efforts over to cobia.

Cobia season opened last Friday and the southern portion of the Chesapeake Bay is one of the top areas for catching this tough battler affectionately known as "the man in the brown suit." Cobia anglers can be seen from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel as they cruise the bridge and nearby flats in small boats with large towers, attempting to spot the fish as they glide just under the surface.

Cobia will hit a number of baits including large bucktails, spoons, live spot, small bluefish, and eels, or can be caught by anchoring and chumming with menhaden while using chunks of menhaden (aka bunker) as bait fished from fishfinder rigs on the bottom.

Lower Shore — Jeb Brady at Bailey's Bait & Tackle reports that the cobia bite has been good with keepersized cobia landed along with plenty of throwbacks. Most of the cobia anglers have been concentrating on the area from the Cabbage Patch down to the bridge-tunnel. The shop has received reports of flounder catches from Ship Shoal Inlet out of Oyster, as well as in the Ditch. Catches of sea mullet were reported from the Kiptopeke State Park Pier over the weekend.

Chris Snook at Chris' Bait & Tackle reported that black drum are still available by the bridge and off Fisherman's Island, but they have been smaller in size. Red drum were still in the breakers. The shop had seen a "handful" of sheepshead brought in and spadefish have made their appearance off the fourth island of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Anglers fishing out of Oyster were finding croaker. Flounder

action was reported from Wise Point, the Ditch, and off Kiptopeke's concrete ships, while pier anglers were catching a mixed bag of flounder, croaker, and sea mullet. When conditions were favorable, anglers were spotting up to 20 cobia per trip from their towers, but a lot of the fish have been on the small side. The shop is stocking fresh and frozen bunker, as well as chum and live eels.

Wachapreague — Captain Lindsay Paul at Trident Tackle reports that anglers are finding "a few flounder, but nothing hot and heavy recently." Captains Sam Parker and Nat Atkinson found decent numbers of flatfish over the weekend but had lots of throwbacks just below the 16.5-inch minimum size limit. One captain returned from an offshore trip with a catch of tasty tilefish. Catches of false albacore were made over the Lumpy Bottom and Sam's Hill.

Chincoteague — Donna Rae at Captain Bob's Marina reported that flounder action has improved during periods between the recent wind and rain. Flounder action was reported on the north and south side of Queen Sound bridge, up to the area around Buoy #4. Action in Assateague Channel has fallen off, probably due to the intense concentration of anglers targeting flounder there over the last few weeks. Increasing numbers of small croaker, as well as larger-sized kingfish/whiting, are showing up in the inlet. Keeper gray trout catches have come from the southwest area of Queen Sound, opposite the sandbar, directly in front of the marina and catches of bluefish have come from inside Chincoteague Channel. The annual Captain Bob's Marina Flounder Tournament started on June 7 and will run through Sunday, June 10. The largest flounder will be worth \$1,500 to the angler!

Jimmy Vasilou at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle reported that the waters of Assateague Channel were hot last

island surf.

weekend, producing some nice-sized flounder. Gulp baits combined with minnows or silversides and fished on Aqua Clear rigs have been very successful producers, second only to the East Coast flounder rigs in the chartreuse color version. Bob and Bonnie Jagger enjoyed a successful flounder trip on Monday, using Berkley Gulp and minnow combinations. Black drum are still dominating the action in the Assateague surf, with the biggest recent catch weighing in at 70 pounds and made by Sheryl Turner. King can be found in numbers and are hitting bloodworms or Fish Bites.

Upper Shore — Captain Matt Abell at the Sea Hawk Sports Center reports that anglers have seen a slight increase in the number of speckled trout inside Pocomoke Sound recently. A good bite was reported on Saturday, mostly by anglers casting artificials. Hunter Hickman boated a 26-inch speckled trout on Monday. Flounder action has been very good on the flats during the last of the ebb tide through the first of the flood. A recent charter boated 35 flounder, finding seven keeper-sized fish. Matt verified the good start to the cobia season as customers reported fish up to 47 inches in the lower Chesapeake.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.

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



Trails End Letters Sent

The Board of Directors of Chincoteague Bay Trails End took another step this week in its quest to make about 180 people move out of the development when it sent letters to property owners requesting they prove how old they are and where they permanently reside.

The letter, dated June 1, refers to a 2003 court order in which the board was told to enforce the covenants, including a ban on people younger than 55 years old living on the "campsites" for more than six months at a time.

In the 15 years since the ruling was made, the age restriction has not been enforced, landowners say. And they agree, the area is no longer a campground as it has more than 600 houses with foundations and more than 1,000 septic systems. The development is on about 700 acres and is split into 2.500 lots.

Lynn Owens is 64 years old. She has owned property at Trails End since 2001. She became a full-time resident in 2010. About eight years ago, two of her grandchildren and her son, now ages 14, 26, and 45, moved in with her. She doesn't want them to

leave and is raising the youngest grandson.

"You have to prove how old you are, where you live, that's baloney," Owens said Tuesday of the letter. "They're not getting anything from me. They know I live here. They just want to give everybody a hard time and I'm tired of it."

The board had a meeting in late April and announced it was giving everyone a year to find another place to live. "Now it is six months," Owens said. "They never followed through with anything. It's been 15 years. One of these people is a single mother with four kids. She can't afford (to move) and pay dues on top ... It seems to be a money scheme for the board of directors" to obtain improved lots. "They will send your account to a lawyer in three months if you don't pay your dues."

Owens says the dues are \$800 a year and include the pool, which isn't open yet; a putt-putt golf course that is dismantled: a marina that needs dredging; a basketball court; a playground; a store; a restaurant; and 24-hour security.

"I don't know what the attorneys charged to send these letters," Owens said. "One family got four letters, not one. They are just burning up our money. Fix the roads, dredge the marina ... fix what's here. It's crazy. ... People are scared to open their mouth and say anything. It's sad when you are afraid to open your mouth where you live."

"One hundred and thirty-nine adults and 39 children will be put out," Owens continued. "Once six months is up, Dec. 31, I don't know what they'll do."

Ernest Montley is a 51-year-old retired cop who lives in Pasadena, Md. He owns a lot at Trails End and knows some of the people who live there.

"I support the children, disabled, and the ones who have been there for years and are under 55," he said, calling the rule outdated. "The board of directors just do what they want to do. People are not trash and should not be thrown out like they are."

"I always said I never wanted to get involved," Montley continued. "I purchased the place to relax after working for the Baltimore County Police Department and Prince George's County Police Department for over 23 years. But this hits home," he said.


"This is a bully technique they are trying to use," he continued. "The letter violates people civil rights per the Fair Housing Act of Virginia 2014. ... The Fair Housing Act trumps the court order of 2003."

Residents joined a private Facebook site and are talking about joining forces, hiring their own legal team, and asking for help from social services and HUD.

Owens posted a copy of the minutes of the board's March meeting that stated, "We did not discuss those people who are currently living here full-time who are under the age of 55. Property owners who are over the age of 55 but have legal custody of their grandchildren may continue to care for that grandchild(ren) until he/she reaches the age of 18. Another exception will be an adult caregiver who may not be over the age of 55, but is required to be there to care for a disabled person."

"Even after six months they would have to go to court to evict," another man wrote on the site. "Trails End going to pay for real eviction notice for everyone? It was cheap to make copies in mail to scare people."

"To those of you who are scared to come to our meetings ... I do understand your position," another property owner wrote. "But now is the time that we all need to stand up together and stop this from happening. This letter shows that Trails End is not playing, so we need to show that we are not playing either, in the most peaceful way possible."

A woman wrote, "Unfortunately I am not there. I am five hours away but I do support the people under 55. No one should have their home taken away regardless if it a camper, a mansion, or a cardboard box. How this is being handled is wrong in so many ways."

"Our rules do stipulate that those under 55 can't live there." Board President Chuck Wooten said last month. He identified the law firm Pender & Coward of Virginia Beach, which sent out the letters.

Wooten said the action should come as no surprise since "we have a big sign (at the entrance of the development) that says you're entering a covenant community." He says residents knew about the rule and ignored it. "It's the seller's responsibility to give the covenants," he continued.

When asked about real estate advertisements that include which schools are in the district for the children of prospective buyers to attend, Wooten said, "I can't control what the realtor does." He suggested property owners get a class action suit together for that complaint. (Wooten referred questions to the law firm, which didn't answer an inquiry.)

But instead, some are planning to go to court to argue the board of directors can't make people leave their homes because they allowed the younger folks to live there for years, which set a precedent.

audience. He said two mayors before him thought Taylor was trustworthy so he signed blank checks for her to pay the bills. "No indication until recently that anything was going on," Raynor said. "Obviously, she didn't bring it to anyone's attention."

"We're not in the criminal justice system," said Danny Shrieves, the new town clerk. "We are not cops" or "investigators." The authorities will have to ask her why she paid herself more money than she was due. "She would be allowed to defend herself," he said.

Poulson previously said more than \$32,000 was overpaid to Taylor for her salary or to pay the electric bill for her home and at her husband's auto business, while she handled town business. Later, he said about \$21,000 too much was paid to her for employment. A state police investigator was given bank and electric company records. Poulson also has complained Taylor has not returned a computer the town owns. She has told him she does not have a Hallwood-owned computer.

Taylor sent a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the town asking for the names of others who are delinquent in paying taxes. Poulson said a state official told him she was not entitled to that information.

She said she was entitled and noted lists are printed in newspapers about delinquency.

Poulson has also reported the tires on his vehicle have been slashed twice and someone tried to set fire to his garage. Selinsky has a protective order against Taylor's husband, Greg Taylor. The councilman told a local judge that he and his family have been threatened by the man.

Eight children rode their bicycles to the town hall Monday and came in during the meeting to voice their thanks for renovations to the park. When asked, they said they needed a port-a-potty, water fountain, game nets, metal playground equipment, and a swimming pool there. Selinsky, Poulson, and an unidentified council member who donated funds were mentioned for their work on the project. Later, Selinsky noted Steve Young, a local merchant, had been a big help.

Noise from four-wheelers and the legality of them being driven on roads and on private property were also discussed. People were told to call the sheriff's office with complaints. Selinsky said it would be his goal in the upcoming year to re-establish committees and boards. His plan would establish an administrator who could give citations for ordinance violations.





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

Now there is a perfect beer for everyone. Even me and I don't usually like the stuff. It's called "Cranky," which is probably part of the reason I fell for it. But don't believe the name. It depicts an ill-tempered or irritable grouch, but it is none of that.

In a way, it is typical Eastern Shore. It's described one way and is really the opposite. Example: "That Chincoteague Pony is lame," he said after it kicked him in the ribs. "She's an ugly one," he said, describing a most beautiful woman.

Cranky is a light farmhouse ale created at the Black Narrows Brewing Company on Chicken City Road, on Chincoteague, which is the first craft brewery on the Shore. It is part of the Infinite Sky Collection and includes melon, black pepper, and shortbread. And it is the smoothest beer I have ever tasted.

Okay, so my experience with beer is limited. I drank a few Schlitz in college. And I never fared well with that. I tried the little "pony" Millers that family members drank. Blah. Then, I tasted a beer with lime in it and it left me sour. But now, if there was nothing to drink and I was on a remote barrier island thirsting to death, I would turn and ask for a Cranky. Oh yes, I would. I'm just trying to sound like a true Eastern Shore woman.

Last weekend, I was on the island on my way to the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge with the goal of photographing some of



the awesome birds there. My boyfriend, Doug, came along to check out the brewery. So, we stopped by and he ordered the sample combo. There were six four-ounce beers served in canning jars. They were separated in half and came in crate-like holders.

We were told Cranky was the favorite. I usually don't follow the crowd so I wasn't impressed by that information. But I thought I would give it a try. I thought I would try little sips of a couple of them before asking for a bottle of water. I was surprised to find I could put my stamp of approval on three. Cranky, Salts, and Little Bay, in that order, won. Yippee!

Salts, considered the "Mainstay," has tart oyster and wheat and is described as briny, marsh, and lemon. It had the flavor of oyster juice left in the shell after downing the raw mollusk. I could imagine it with melted butter on top. Yip-pee!

Little Bay, also called Eastern Shore Saison, was described as bright, funky, and floral. It wasn't particularly flowery or funky. But it was a contender for bright.

Doug, who is a beer enthusiast, also favored Cranky and finished the glass. The same went for some stuff called "Good Morning, Good Afternoon, Goodnight," that was a cocoa bean stout described as smooth, roasted, and mocha. That was the strongest and to me tasted bitter. Doug said it was "sweet."

Neither of us was impressed with the beer

called "Plum Wild." We are going to be nice and leave it at that. Well, let me try again, I guess people could rinse their hair with it.

Ulysses' Revenge, a fruited wild ale with strawberry, is also not for me. Ugh, I can't eat strawberries, they make my face breakout. But others seemed to enjoy it.

There were two Philadelphia men sitting on the other side of me. The older one wouldn't give his name or let me take his picture. He was mixing the cocoa bean stout with the Cranky and called it black and tan, a favorite of western Pennsylvanians, he said. His son-in-law was much friendlier. He posed for a photo, spelled his name, Vittorio Meronyck Jr. (above left), and was enjoying Salts. They were visiting Chincoteague for a birthday celebration.



Investigate Investment Opportunities and Financial Advisors

I have put forward in prior columns various methods of and warnings related to fiscal self-defense. Much of the same critical thinking applies when one is trying to grow their money, both for future retirement, or for current improvement of one's standard of living. It is only natural to want to improve your standard of living so as to feel secure and to be able to enjoy more of life's pleasures. Unfortunately, there are those who would turn those natural impulses against you.

The world is full of those who would offer you financial advice (for a fee, of course). Most are honest, hard working and well-educated in the universe of financial products and options that exist today. However, there are those that are not, and the area of financial advice is not well-regulated.

Often financial advisors (or would-be advisors) have an alphabet soup of initials after their names. They look impressive, but what do they really mean? They can be checked out on www.finra.org

FINRA stands for the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority. This is a self-policing industry group that is very good. On its website there is an application known as "broker check" which allows one to check a broker's employment history, disciplinary problems and outcomes, etc. Also on this website is a table that explains most of the alphabet soup designations: what they mean, how they are obtained (some can be purchased for \$99 on the internet), and what continuing education is required to maintain them.

A really good designation is CFP, standing for certified financial planner. This certification requires rigor to both obtain and maintain. However, nothing prevents me from hanging out a shingle that says "Richard Saunders, C.H.G., Financial Planning" where the letters stand for Certified Highschool Graduate. No disrespect is intended here to those who are high school graduates. It is just an illus-

tration of the lack of regula-

tion in the field of financial advice.

If you engage someone to do financial planning for you, be clear on the method of compensation. There are three basic methods, one of which is potentially problematic. Some advisors charge a flat hourly rate. This is simple and clearcut. Some charge a percentage of (your) money under management as of a certain date (end of year). This too is clearcut and actually incentivizes the advisor to do well for you. It is the third method that has potential problems, where the client is charged a commission based on what the advisor utilizes. The conflict of interest potential is obvious here.

Whether one uses an advisor, or simply a broker at a brokerage firm, all statements should be carefully scrutinized, and any questions should be doggedly pursued until you the client fully understand them. Be careful about giving a broker the authority to trade in your account

Post Op-Ed Page on his/her own without con-

tacting you first. The broker gets paid a commission for both buys and sells, so excess activity in your account may benefit you or may not benefit you but it will always benefit the broker. This process is called "churning" (and we are not talking about butter here).

Mutual funds are used by many as an investment vehicle and that is a perfectly good way to go. Certain things should be clear to the mutual fund investor. Is there a sales charge taken off the top of one's investment? Is there a redemption fee should you decide you need to sell shares? Often that is a sliding fee based on how long you've held the shares. What is the annual expense ratio deducted from the share value?

The ultimate takeaway is this: Investigate before you invest.
