Terra Pascarosa, a one-time Cape Charles resident and a representative of Oceania, "the world's largest ocean conservation group," was the first of

several speakers to ask the town council to take a position against offshore drilling June 21.

She requested that town council write a resolution stating Cape Charles' opposition to offshore

See Page 2 for the full story. drilling and seismic exploration (using shock waves to search for crude oil, natural gas, or minerals below the earth's surface for commercial gain).

Pascarosa said there is only about a 30-day supply of oil deposited along Virginia's coasts, and with 86,000 jobs, \$4.8 billion in the state's gross domestic product, and the health of marine life at risk, it amounts to "a really little, potential reserve off the coast of Virginia, for no reward for all of our towns on the coast."

Accomack and Northampton counties have passed resolutions opposing offshore drilling, and Pascarosa believes the towns should follow suit.

Wayne Creed agreed and encouraged Virginia citizens to form a "coalition, as they did in Florida, to pressure the governor ... to go to the President and say, 'You have to take us off the list."

Tim Krawczel said, "Big energy companies will be just fine if they don't have Virginia to drill offshore of."

Jay Ford, representing the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, offered a slightly different perspective: what would happen if offshore drilling occurred on the Virginia coast and there was no disaster.

"We would get zero jobs, and we would get zero tax dollars," Ford said.

Even without an oil spill, the everyday operations of offshore drilling would put the Shore's aquaculture at risk, he added.

Also, the NASA Wallops Flight Facility would not be awarded contracts to develop technology for the Mars mission because the presence of offshore drilling wells would cause unaffordable insurance costs, he said.

Ford asked the council to join "the Eastern Shore in saying 'no' to offshore drilling."

Virginia Secretary of Commerce and Trade Brian Ball announced from Strawberry Street Plaza in Cape Charles on Wednesday that Gov. Ralph Northam has selected the town to be the first participant in the Virginia Downtown pilot program run by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD).

Last year. Cape Charles became the first town on the Eastern Shore to get involved in Virginia Main Street, the existing program of VDHCD that "creates an environmentally, socially, and economically sustainable downtown ecosystem" in small-town Virginia, Ball said.

"Since 2012, we spent almost ... 300 million (dollars) on these kinds of initiatives. ... You can see when you do this and you get everybody together – you get the community, you get entrepreneurs, small businesses - you can see what can happen and that is so positive ... and it's paying off here (in Cape Charles) in large measure," Ball continued.

"We look forward to continuing talking with you and finding ways that we, at the state level, can try to be helpful ... we don't come here to try to tell you how to do things, we come here to listen and see what you need."

"We see nothing but good things coming Cape Charles' way," Ball concluded. "You are so blessed with the natural resources here ... and the governor who's got a sharp eve on what's going on, on the Eastern Shore."

Ball and Erik Johnston, director of VDHCD, had just come from a meeting on expanding high-speed, broadband internet access across the Eastern Shore, another initiative in which their departments are involved.

Gov. Northam will be in Cape Charles on July 27 to make his own announcement about the new Virginia Downtown program.

The pilot program will allow Cape Charles Main Street, Inc. to obtain additional support and funding from VD-HCD for the continued revitalization of the town's commercial district.

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
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

taurant, but instead of a complaint, the incident generated kudos to town staff for volunteering to help clean up the flooded dining room before extensive damage could be sustained.

The June thank-you note from the Oyster Farm at Kings Creek dockmaster (and Cape Charles mayor-elect) Smitty Dize appeared in stark contrast to the April letter of complaint written by Jeff Dawson, a Maryland resident who owns a home in Cape Charles that was severely damaged after a January water line break that caused a 300,000-gallon leak.

Dawson reported that public works staff failed to notify him after finding the leak and shutting off the water, and he requested a credit on the \$5,700 water and sewer bill he received after the flood occurred.

He originally had been offered a \$3,400 credit to the sewer portion of the bill, but nothing for the water portion, as per town policy. Dawson was awarded a similar credit on the water portion of his bill by town council on May 17.

A water line broke at the Oyster Farm's C-Pier restaurant sometime after closing on June 10, which was discovered the following morning, along with a flood covering more than half the dining room floor.

Public works crew, who were nearby attending to another matter, happened on the scene and "immediately jumped in (without being asked) and helped us get the water off the hardwood floors as fast as we could to prevent major damage ... if it wasn't for the assistance of town staff members we may have had to replace them (the floors) during our busy season," Dize wrote.

The note personally thanked public works staff Billy Powell. Dan Dabinett, Gerald Elliott, and Ralph Bowen for helping "when they didn't have to and the professionalism they showed while assisting us in an unexpected situation."



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


Voters will choose between two wellknown Onley men on Nov. 6 for the mayor's seat.

Councilman Matt D. Hart, 37, a local real estate broker and contractor who owns The Matthew Hart Corporation and is co-owner of Crossroads Coffee Shop, wants the job.

Former Councilman W.R. "Bill" Ferguson, 55, a retired NASA Wallops Flight Facility firefighter and EMT

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Mayor Jack Pierson will not be seeking another term.

There are 11 people vying for six seats on the Onley Town Council.

Members Susan M. Rillo, Melvin T. Bliss Jr., and Woody W. Zember are seeking re-election to the panel.

The other candidates include Planning Commissioner Rose Mary Pierson, the current mayor's wife; Vice Mayor Henry S. "Ned" Finney; former Mayor Billye D. Custis; Custis' husband, former Councilman John L. Dennis; Claudia Carpenter Harmon; Theodore F. Cathey Jr.; Jason E. Byelich; and Jerry D. Savage.

Three other towns will also select leaders in the November General Election.

In Bloxom, former Councilwoman Jenny K. Kreisl is running unopposed for mayor. Five are running for the six council seats. Council Members Samuel H. Bloxom Jr., Louella H. Fox and Christopher F. Kreisl (the mayoral candidate's husband) are looking for another term. Michael P. Barnes Jr. and R. Scott Callander are also running. Callander is the current mayor of Bloxom.


In Melfa, Charles R. Wilbur is running unopposed for mayor. Three registered for election to the six council seats. They are Councilmen James R. Wilson and David Allen Peffer and newcomer James D. Brown.

June 29, 2018 = Eastern Shore Post = 7 Northampton Supervisors Still Not Sold on Building New School

After more than a decade of reports by a structural engineer documenting the poor and declining condition of the 1950sera Northampton High School building and numerous pleas by school staff, the board of supervisors and school board scheduled a joint meeting for June 25 to begin hammering out a timeline for replacing the crumbling facility.

Doug Gebhardt, vice president of financial consulting firm, Davenport & Company, reported on Northampton's finances, followed by comments from supervisors. School board members were not given the opportunity to add their own comments.

According to Spencer Murray, chairman of the board of supervisors, the main difference between Davenport's new report and the one it presented in 2016 was the \$40 million cost of a new school assumed by the firm in its calculations.

Murray said the county's original plan was to save about \$8 million and borrow \$20 million, spending no more than \$28 million on a new school.

The strategy Northampton supervisors had planned for the county's fiscal future and capital needs was to increase both revenues and debt at approximately the same rate.

"Could we accumulate \$8 million? Probably. We probably got five (million dollars) now," Murray said.

He suggested Northampton may be able to borrow \$20 million for a new school by 2023, and revenue growth would help make it possible.

"But the dark side of that is that a recession could mean a declining of (real estate) assessments and we might have to raise taxes to get the same amount of revenue to run the county," Murray added.

One circumstance that reflects positively on Northampton's current financial health is its undesignated fund balance, which was nearly \$9.5 million in 2017.

The undesignated fund balance acts as an emergency fund that can be used in the event of a natural disaster such as a hurricane or to cover revenue shortfall. In an unexpected event, the fund protects Northampton from having to borrow money for cash flow to keep the county running.

County policy dictates an amount equal to 10 percent of current expenditures be set aside in the undesignated fund balance. An amount equal to about 24 percent of current expenditures is in the emergency fund now, more than double the required minimum.

Gebhardt noted that Northampton does not have a credit rating, but if it did it would have an A or AA rating. The highest possible rating is AAA and the lowest is D. An institution needs at least a BBB- credit rating to be eligible to borrow money.

One number of high priority to supervisors is \$3.1 million, Northampton's current debt service, or how much the county pays on its debts annually.

Supervisors want to keep the debt service as close to \$3.1 million as possible, even if the county takes on more debt to build a new school.

Gebhardt supplied supervisors with three possible scenarios for paying for a \$40 million school.

The first scenario involves a 20-year loan with a closing date in 2020 and payments on both principal and interest beginning in 2021. Debt service would jump to more than \$5.6 million by 2022 and gradually decrease to around \$3.5 million by 2028.

The second scenario also assumes a 20-year loan with a 2020 closing date and payments on interest beginning in 2021. Payments on principal would not begin until 2025. Debt service would rise to only about \$4.3 million in 2022, but would not drop to around \$3.6 million until 2034.

The third scenario stretches out payments over 25 years. In the first five years only interest would be paid, beginning in 2021, through a bond anticipation note. Payments on principal would begin in 2025. Debt service would not reach \$3.2 million until 2028 and would stay around that amount until the debt is paid off.

Northampton has a policy stating debt service must not exceed more than 12 percent of expenditures. In none of the three scenarios would debt service exceed that amount.

But none of the scenarios were satisfactory to Murray, who said, "This sounds harsh, but I don't see a scenario where this county in any kind of future can borrow \$40 million."

In 2013, Dills Architects estimated combined renovation and new construction of Northampton High School would cost nearly \$30 million, and nearly all-new construction would cost about \$33 to \$35 million.

He later asked Gebhardt if Daven-

port could create an alternative scenario that would keep debt service at \$3.1 million; Gebhardt agreed.

Supervisors are wary of increasing debt service for a new school when the county may also need to borrow money for other future capital needs.

Another number of concern to supervisors is the tax-equivalent impact. The higher the number, the higher county tax rates would have to be to cover revenue shortfalls in the event of a recession. The tax-equivalent impacts of the first, second, and third scenarios are 14.1 cents, 6.7 cents, and 4.8 cents, respectively.

Supervisor Robert Duer guessed that Northampton citizens would not tolerate a tax increase of more than 2 cents.

Neither did Supervisor David Fauber support any of the scenarios presented by Davenport.

He reported walking around the high school that past weekend and said, "it's old but ... built pretty well and has got possibilities ... I don't see the need to build a new school, quite frankly."

In lieu of rebuilding the school, Fauber recommended repairing the exterior and replacing the roof and HVAC equipment.

After supervisors finished making their comments on the presentation, they adjourned.

Supervisors John Coker and Oliver Bennett were absent from the meeting.

Bail Set for Craddockville Man

Judge W. Revell Lewis III of Accomack Circuit Court set a secured bail of \$3,000 last week for a Craddockville man accused of rape.

Lance Barrett Rew, 27, of Boston Road, was also required to wear a GPS monitor bracelet and have no contact with witnesses in the case.

Defense lawyer, Tom Northam, argued new developments had arisen since Rew was arrested in March.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan said probable cause was found at a preliminary hearing. There is "no reason to believe he didn't do it," Morgan added.

The 21-year-old victim went to Rew's house with him to attend a party. She told officers that after she had been raped and was being taken home, Rew threatened to shoot her.

Another man was also charged with the crime. Court records later indicated he would not be prosecuted.

Malissa Quintina Mason, 48, of Nelsonia Road, admitted she forged a prescription, attempted to forge a prescription and attempted to obtain a prescription. Three other charges were not prosecuted. The offenses occurred Sept. 25, and Oct. 24, 2017.

When she went to the pharmacy, her prescription wasn't filled because not enough time had elapsed since the last time it was filled. She went to another drugstore also trying to get the drugs. Her lawyer, Paul Watson said she suffers from severe back pain and has been getting pain management and counseling since she has been on bond.


A pre-sentence report was ordered. She was allowed to remain on bond.

In another case, Fred Douglas Lykes, 61, of Church Street in Onancock, pleaded guilty to petty larceny instead of a felony because it was unclear how much money he actually took. The incident occurred Jan 21, 2017, at Matthew's Market in Mappsville, and involved confusing a cashier by continuously asking her to make change. At one point, he put his hand in the drawer and helped himself. The register was reconciled just after he left the store and was short by \$449.

Judge W. Revell Lewis called it a flimflam scam. He gave the maximum sentence of 12 months in jail. Restitution was ordered. Upon release is was banned from going to the market.

Dorian Antione Noncent, 18, of Matthews Street in Mappsville, was sentenced to five years in prison with all but time served suspended for maliciously shooting at an occupied vehicle Nov. 21, 2017.

Carlos M. Wise, 38, of Pearl Drive, was sentenced to five years in prison with all but the 87 days in jail he had served suspended for unlawful wounding of Michael Milligan. He was put on indefinite probation and five years of good behavior. The incident occurred June 13, 2017.

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

A historic and legendary native red oak in Cape Charles that died nearly two years ago will live on in spirit in the New Roots Youth Garden, thanks in part to the donated time and talents of a local park ranger.

Stan Osmolenski, also known as Ranger Stan because of his work as a Kiptopeke State Park ranger, volunteered to create a chainsaw carving out of the tall stump, which is roughly 15 to 25 feet high.

Osmolenski, who is also a substitute teacher, was discovered by master naturalist and New Roots volunteer. Judy Illmensee, who approached him to do a lesson on fall migration for the kids in the garden club.

A preview of Osmolenski's artistic skill was displayed at the garden's Blessing of the Worms in late April when he carved a whale for the children who attended the event.

The concept art for the carving in the red oak stump is slightly reminiscent of the Tree of Life at Disney's Animal Kingdom theme park but on a much smaller scale with a lot of local influence and significance. The upcoming project was announced as a sculpture "coming to life" in the garden.

Repurposing the wood will honor the 73-year-old red oak that unexpectedly died in the fall of 2016. Another master naturalist and regular volunteer at New Roots Youth Garden, Phil Goetkin, said that "half of it died sud-Photo courtesy of New Roots Youth Garden denly" and turned brown; the other half of the tree met the same fate about a month later.

> At first volunteers were unsure if the tree had turned brown because it was dormant for the winter or if there were more serious implications. The town had an arborist do an informal evaluation of the tree and confirmed the tree had died due to saltwater intrusion.

> Goetkin could not recall if the saltwater intrusion was caused by excessive rainfall or drought. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency website, saltwater intrusion "may be further exacerbated by drought, reduced rainfall or changes in water use and demand."

> By the early spring of 2017, it had become clear to garden volunteers that the deceased tree posed a "serious hazard" and had to be cut down. Tammy Holloway, who was the New Roots Youth Garden coordinator, provided oversight for the job "to make sure it was done respectfully," Goetkin said.

> Once towering over the garden at about 80 feet high, with a canopy nearly as wide as the tree was tall, the red oak gained legendary status in the tiny town of Cape Charles when it was dubbed "the lighthouse tree" for its ability to be seen from the middle of the Chesapeake Bay and used as a landmark by boaters.

> A lighthouse is incorporated in the design to be carved into the stump as a reminder of the red oak's place in local lore.

> Portions of the tree's trunk and limbs were also saved to be made into tables and chairs for future use in the garden.

> Local gardeners and master naturalists hope that through the tree's repurposing and reuse, both artistic and practical, the memory and meaning of Cape Charles' old red oak will endure.

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

The 2018 spring surf fishing season was one of the best in recent memory, producing nice catches of black drum, red drum, and striped bass. However, like all good things, it had to eventually end. The summer's warmer water temperatures have ushered out these species until the autumn months, with smaller species such as whiting and croaker as well as sharks of all sizes, rays, and skates dominating the action for the next several months.

The lower Chesapeake Bay cobia season is still underway and producing good numbers of fish, though many more smaller-sized specimens than trophy catches.

Lower Shore — Jeb Brady of Bailey's Bait & Tackle reported that cobia action was still going strong from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel to buoy 36A, with a lot of small cobia in the mix. He had received reports of spadefish at the fourth island of the bridge-tunnel, as well as around the Plantation Light. The top flounder catches were coming from inside the Ditch and along the Fisherman's Island bridge.

Chris Snook of Chris' Bait & Tackle reported cobia fishing has been great between Lattimore Shoals and buoy 36. Spadefish were available at the fourth island, but bigger fish were swimming around the Chesapeake Light tower. Red drum were hitting around buoys 16 and 13 in the evenings. Nice-sized flounder were starting to come from along the bridgetunnel, while sea mullet/whiting were hitting along Lattimore Shoals. Croaker catches were coming from buoy 262 out of Oyster, but the fish have been on the small side.

Wachapreague — Captain Lindsay Paul of Trident Tackle reported that anglers were managing to find some keeper flounder among the large number of throwbacks. Scott Taylor had two keepers inside of Metompkin Inlet on Sunday. Croakers of mixed sizes are also showing up for anglers using strips of squid, peeler, or bloodworm. A few red drum were reported from the surf, but the last two outings have produced mostly stingrays. Paul said that the influx of unstable weather over the weekend kept most offshore vessels in port.

Chincoteague — Jimmy Vasilou of Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle reported that kingfish/whiting were being caught off the beach at Assateague. Circle hooks (#2) with small red floats. baited with bloodworms, Fish Bites, or Gulp bloodworms were the most effective kingfish rigs according to Visilou. A weekend trip on the inshore wrecks produced a mixed catch of spadefish, gray triggerfish, and flounder, as well as a cobia sighting. Keeper flounder up to 20 inches were caught off the docks over the weekend. Croaker fishing has been spotty, with most of the fish on the small side. As the waters continue to heat up, so does the shark fishing. A hammerhead was caught in Chincoteague Bay over the weekend.

Donna Rae of Captain Bob's Marina reported that fishing has been "pretty good overall." Lots of flounder but more throwbacks than keepers. Popular flounder catching locations include buoys 17, 19, and 21 inside the Chincoteague Channel, as well as inside the canal across from the Inlet View Campground up to the area in front of the Waterside Inn. Top baits have been live minnows with white Gulp 4-inch swimming mullet, Gulp shrimp, or strips of squid. Kingfish/whiting are in the canal, off Mariner's Point and out to the inlet and are readily hitting bloodworm-scented Fish Bites and bloodworm-scented souid. Lots of shark action inside the inlet, but retaining most of the species is prohibited; check the VMRC shark regulations and seasons before venturing out for sharks if you plan to keep any. The subway cars were producing flounder up to 24 to 26 inches in length as well as some spadefish. Large yellowfin tuna have been hitting trolled ballyhoo rigs in the Washington Canyon. The shop will be holding three inshore coastal finetooth shark tournaments during the third weekends of July, August, and September.

Upper Shore — Captain Matt Abell of the Sea Hawk Sports Center reported a good catch of flounder has come from the rail cars. He described the cobia fishing off Kiptopeke as "spectacular." Two charters last week produced 17 cobia to 44 inches and a trophy red drum release. The tuna bite fell off a little bit mid-week but had rebounded by the weekend. Spadefish and triggerfish were over the coastal wrecks. Rockfish and perch catches were coming from the mouths of the Wicomico and Manokin creeks in the lower Maryland portion of the Chesapeake Bay.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.

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

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Man's Hand-Drawn Maps Of Chesapeake Bay Revive a Dying Craft

Nineteen of 20 children can't find the state of Florida on a map. That's according to Joe Tarella, a mapmaker from coastal New Jersey.

It's a hard thing to understand for a man who has always enjoyed maps. Before heading out anywhere, he said, "I'd always get a map of where I was going."

Not only is map reading falling out of favor with navigation apps at everyone's fingertips, but the art of creating maps by hand is also becoming a lost art. For 18 years, Tarella has kept the craft alive by mapping sections of the East Coast.

It all started because he wanted a map to hang on the wall of his home, which was on a barrier island in New Jersey. The most recent one he could find was 50 years old. "I said to my wife, 'I'm going to make a map."" It was purely for his own use, but soon people were admiring the map and asking for their own.

He now has 36 maps in circulation including a complete set of 10 maps covering the entire Chesapeake Bay and surrounding areas. His bestselling map has been Long Beach Island, N.Y, which has sold more than 1,000 copies.

A landscape architect by training, Tarella had his first taste of mapmaking while working on the development project for Battery Park City, a planned community on the southern tip of Manhattan (where the World Trade Center was located). "My job was to make that map with 20 different trades," he said, including gas lines, electric, water, sewer, roads, and the Hudson River, among other features. "I spent more than a year making that map. It was incredible the discrepancies" among the maps he consulted to make the master map.

"It's one of the things people like about my maps," he continued. "They are pretty accurate. I see people go up to them — so an area they are familiar with — to see if they jibe" with their own knowledge of the area.

Tarella picks areas that interest him and pulls as much information as possible for the focus area, including local maps, information from chambers of commerce, and talking to local people to try to resolve discrepancies. If there is any kind of historical context, he finds that local people are the best resource. "The minutia is what enriches the maps and makes them different from mass-produced commercial maps," he said.

"I try to go almost everywhere I map," he added, ideally before the map hits the public.


The response has been very good. "To me, these things are very personal (and) are almost always bought by people who live in or use an area. They are detail-oriented people."

Tarella views his maps as pieces of art. "I hope no one navigates by them." But they do emphasize where the water meets the land. "People's rivers and streams, sand dunes, jetties: those are what's really important to people who look at my maps," he said.

Road maps emphasize roads. In navigation maps, the most important features are water, shoals, and water depth. "My maps incorporated all these things together. People get a good visceral sense that all these are taken into account and placed together."

He originally printed the maps in two sizes — a 16-inch by 67-inch on canvas and 10-inch by 30-inch print on paper, but most are ordered in the smaller wall size. His wall maps are printed on high-quality watercolor

paper, using UV protected inks.

Tarella says his careful handdrafting has given his maps an unmatched level of quality and distinction. It has taken on a certain caché, with people asking, incredulously, if he really draws by hand.

"Even though it was done that way for the last 5,000 years, people have almost forgotten that is how everything was done" before the computer, he said.

"Architecture is the same. The computer is helpful, but it's just a fancy pencil."



Feather or swoop flags are strictly prohibited in the downtown area from Church Street to Cropper Street. The area of any such flags shall not be included in determining the total permitted sign area.

Supermarket Shenanigans

Getting what you paid for, or what you thought you paid for, is a natural desire that we all take for granted. In today's world, unfortunately this, too, requires vigilance.

Much of this vigilance is required in the supermarket. There are lots of things there that are not quite what they seem. Nothing illegal here as it is labeled, but you have to look carefully.

A perfect example is coffee, which used to come in 16-ounce containers, clearly marked. Now (for the past few years, actually) the container only has 12 ounces. It is so marked, but you really have to look for it because the container looks the same as it did when it had 16 ounces. Some containers have even been downsized (only in terms of contents) to 10.5 ounces. The container looks the same but unless you read the label you are not getting what you think you are getting. This is the flip side of inflation. Instead of paying more for a product, you pay about the same but get less of the product for your money.

Another occurrence is in the nature of the product itself. Take ice cream. One would think ice cream is ice cream, but sometimes it isn't. The container might look the same, including an illustration of what appears to be a scoop of ice cream, but the product is labeled (not in big letters) frozen dairy dessert or something similar as opposed to being called ice cream. Also, ice cream containers might be shaped similar to what they used to be for a quart, but actually contain less. They are accurately labeled, but most people (includ-

ing me) don't always pay attention. To best defend your money in the supermarket, take the time to *read*.

Expiration dates (or "use by" dates) can be another issue in the market. Often, items remain on the shelf beyond their expiration or "use by" dates. This can be problematic for your health, or the taste of the product, depending on what it is you are buying. Sometimes it is difficult to find the date on the product container, but you should look, especially for perishables like dairy products. There is an element of politics that go into these dates. In Pennsylvania, for milk the expiration date will not be that far out, in Virginia it is a good bit further out. The product is the same, milk. The difference is politics. In Pennsylvania the dairy farmers have political influence so that the expiration dates will be closer to the purchase date and more of the prod-

uct will be

you may be paying extra in the market just for a certain word. The word is "organic." Generally, products labeled organic are costlier than their counterparts that do not contain this word. But are they truly organic, and what is the exact definition of "organic"? The real truth is that since there is not to much in the way of universally identifiable and measurable standards as to what constitutes organic, you may just be paying extra for a word, without any identifiable benefit. This is not to be taken as a criticism of socalled organic products but rather a caution as to paying extra. It is up to the consumer as to what to do about this.

As with other things I have written about, practice vigilance in defense of your money.

Seismic Offshore Oil Exploration Poses Risks

Dear Editor:

I recently had the good fortune of visiting Charleston, S.C., to take part in a press conference warning of the potential danger of using seismic airgun blasting to explore for oil in the Atlantic. On June 19, I took that same message to the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management in Washington along with three South Carolinians representing coastal small businesses, mayors, and the commercial fishing industry.

I am a retired U.S. Navy Bomb Squad member and a recognized expert on underwater munitions. My message has been very clear.

Seismic testing presents an imminent, irreversible, and avoidable threat to the geographic stability of offshore toxic waste deposits. Using this old, destructive technology would be inviting all manner of toxic substances to migrate onto dolphin feeding grounds, into the marine food chain, or onto shore. The precise location, content, and scale of these deposits were not accurately recorded at the time the federal government dumping took place, so avoiding these materials based on what we know today is not possible.

However, the locations of this material can be determined by using modern marine technology to nondestructively collect such data. This would be valuable to all seeking responsible access to offshore resources. In short, avoiding seismic disruption of our radioactive, chemical, and explosive waste deposits is possible; not avoiding them is reckless.

Thanks for Medicaid Expansion


Dear Editor:
