## New Virginia Laws

Hundreds of newly enacted or updated laws took effect in Virginia this week. Among the biggest was the expansion of Medicaid to about 400,000 low-income adults.

Virginia joined 32 other states and the District of Columbia in expanding Medicaid coverage under the Affordable Care Act after years of debate. It will not actually start until 2019. The expansion is an enormous win for Gov. Ralph Northam, a Shore native and pediatric neurologist, who ran his campaign on expanding access to healthcare.

Another top law change was raising the felony level for larceny from \$200 to \$500. Accomack Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan said Tuesday he is not expecting the law to have a significant change on his caseload. "Our office will continue to be involved in cases for values under \$500 at the request of the victim or law enforcement."

Morgan was also "very pleased" with the bill regarding the Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund and another which "strengthens the ability of the court and the commonwealth to enforce payment of restitution."

"Senate Bill 457 gives further protection to victims and witnesses, which is always helpful," Morgan said. According to the Virginia Legislative Information System, a victim or witness in a criminal prosecution of a violent felony can request his or her phone number or email address be withheld "except to the extent that such disclosure is required by law, necessary for law enforcement purposes or permitted by the court." A judge may also prohibit testimony regarding any victim's or witness' telephone num-

ber or email address if the information is not material to the case.

Morgan said he is also thankful for the work of local legislators regarding opioid fatality review legislation, which was brought up by Scott Wade (a state police special agent and head of the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force) and Ann Wessells, head of probation for Accomack and Northampton counties.

"Raising the grand larceny threshold from \$200 to \$500 will have little effect on my office," said Northampton Commonwealth's Attorney Beverly Leatherbury. "Recognizing how low that threshold was and recognizing the devastating consequences of a felony conviction, it would not be at all unusual in our office to reduce a first-time theft offense in the \$200 to \$500 range to a misdemeanor if restitution efforts had been made by the defendant. A third offense petit larceny of any amount remains a felony, as I believe it should."

"Of greater significance to victims of theft ... are the changes made to the monitoring of restitution payments," said Leatherbury. "The probation agency ordered to monitor restitution payments must notify the court and the commonwealth's attorney of the amount of unsatisfied restitution either 60 days before the defendant is released from supervision or at the time probation requests the defendant be released from supervision," she continued. The court would then review compliance and "continue to conduct hearings for up to 10 years following the first review hearing, and adds additional remedies for the court if the defendant continues to fail to comply with the restitution order."

"Other legislation I find needed and significant includes the increasing of the criminal penalty for female genital mutilation from a class 1 misdemeanor to a class 2 felony," she said. "I have never seen such a case and hope to never see one, but certainly that sort of offense is most heinous and should not be punished like driving 20+ above the

speed limit or simple trespass."

The criminal penalty for female genital mutilation of a minor increased from a Class 1 misdemeanor to a Class 2 felony.

There was also a bill to undertake research through the establishment of an educational and state-run indus-

trial hemp program. In another, school boards are now able to increase recess time for their students through a new provision. Slot-like machines were legalized at horse tracks and other places. Feminine hygiene products are available to inmates at no cost. Hunting raccoons on Sunday, which previously had to stop at 2 a.m., is now permitted all day.

There was also good news for teachers as the state board of education is required to provide licenses "for any spouse of an active duty member of the Armed Forces...who has obtained a valid out-of-state license, with full credentials and without deficiencies, that is in force at the time the application for a Virginia license is received."

Another interesting law will allow localities to retain officers of election as independent contractors.

Another law clarified that screening tests performed on infants born in the state shall include ones for Pompe disease, mucopolysaccharidosis type 1 (MPS-1), and other lysosomal storage disorders for which a screening test approved by the

U.S. Food and Drug Administration exists.

A bill increased the maximum hookup and towing fee for passenger vehicles from \$135 to \$150. A law prohibiting the use of unmanned aircraft by knowingly and intentionally entering the property of another and coming within 50 feet of a dwelling house to coerce, intimidate, or harass another person, took effect July 1.

Custodians of a scholastic record are now prohibited from releasing the address, phone number, or email address of a student in response to a Freedom of Information Act request without first obtaining the written consent of either the student or the student's parent or legal guardian.

Animal testing: A new law requires an alternative test method, when available, or the fewest animals possible for a manufacturer or contract testing facility. The provision does not apply for medical research or for testing related to developing devices, drugs, or biomedical products, or to certain other products regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Violators are

subject to a civil penalty of up to \$5,000 plus court costs and attorney fees.

Dogs are allowed within designated areas inside or on the premises of a winery, distillery, or brewery, except where food is manufactured.

The Alcohol Beverage Control board's general license application fee went from \$65 to \$195 and the application fee for mixed-beverage special event licenses increased from \$15 to \$45. The law also increased the state tax on wine shippers' licenses, beer shippers' licenses, and wine and beer shippers' licenses from \$95 to \$230. Additional revenues will be used to support Virginia ABC Bureau of Law Enforcement operations.

A new law allows full-time students, who attend classes at an accredited public or private institution of higher education, to request deferred jury service.

Another regulation aimed at protecting juvenile inmates from more violent juvenile offenders would place the latter in adult facilities. The law also allows those juveniles to be separated from adult offenders.

Misdemeanor violations of assault and battery and trespass (with exceptions) were added to the list of offenses for which an adult convict must have a sample of their blood, saliva, or tissue taken for DNA analysis.

A bill became law that prohibits school employees from "lunch shaming" students who can't afford to buy food, or who have school debt, by making them do chores or wear a wristband or hand stamp. The maximum long-term suspension was reduced from 364 calendar days to 45 school days unless the offense involved weapons, drugs, or serious bodily injury or aggravating circumstances.

The installation and maintenance of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in rental property are now mandated. The bill requires "a landlord to install a smoke alarm but does not permit a locality to require new or additional wiring or the upgrading of smoke alarms under certain conditions and to certify annually that smoke alarms have been installed and maintained in good working order in a residential dwelling unit pursuant to the Statewide Fire Prevention Code and the Uniform Statewide Building Code. The landlord is also required to install a carbon monoxide alarm upon request by a tenant."

In addition, the red salamander or Pseudotriton ruber, was designated as the state salamander. The Virginia Critically Missing Adult Alert Program was created for local, regional, or statewide notification of an adult whose whereabouts are unknown.

# Coast Guard Proposes New Anchorage Site Off Cape Charles

Two years ago the U.S. Coast Guard originally proposed building a second anchorage near Cape Charles, much to the disapproval of local residents and leaders.

"We have the only public beach on Virginia's Eastern Shore, which will be an eyesore to our tourist industry" if a new anchorage is built close to Cape Charles, Councilman Andy Buchholz wrote on Aug. 31, 2016.

"I'm concerned with the possibility of spillage, broken anchor, or even worse! ... Please take a look at the economic impact this will have on this area if there's a catastrophic disaster."

After review of the public comments and environmental studies, the Coast Guard has a new proposal to build an additional anchorage three nautical miles from Cape Charles and to move the existing anchorage to a "more secluded" location in the lower Chesapeake Bay, six nautical miles southwest of Fishermans Island.

The new anchorage is needed to accommodate ship traffic that is growing

in both size and volume so Hampton Roads anchorage grounds may continue to "safely and effectively support current and future deep-draft vessel anchorage demands," according to the Coast Guard.

But dozens of past public comments have asked not to put the small town of Cape Charles at risk with its summer tourist population "attracted by the sunsets and the clear, unobstructed view of the bay," as former Mayor George Proto wrote.

"One oil spill, even one that is not considered major ... could put us out of business for an entire season" and "would likely deter visitors from coming in following seasons."

Proto noted Northampton County's \$40 million seafood industry additionally would be put at risk.

Locals also want to avoid an incident like the one that occurred in May 2014 when a ship called the Ornak was at the Lynnhaven anchorage and caught high winds, dragging its anchor and running aground in Virginia

Beach, as former Northampton Supervisor Granville Hogg pointed out.

"Cape Charles has struggled for over 15 years to get to the point where it is today and all that could be lost in one relatively small event," Proto emphasized.

At press time, one new public comment on the Coast Guard's proposal had been submitted online since public comments were re-opened for the first time in two years.

Chris Kelly, of the Hampton Roads area, wrote that his "major concern is the volume of large vessels lined up directly in front of this populated town and vicinity."

Kelly said he views the Cape Charles anchorage almost daily online and has seen up to 22 ships lined up at one time. He is concerned that a drawing he saw of the proposed new anchorage may indicate it could accommodate up to 37 vessels at once and that is "too much for a community that attracted its population through the years by the fishing, water sports, surrounding calm, quiet, scenic, pristine waters of

the Chesapeake Bay."

He is also concerned about increased maritime traffic causing light, noise, and water pollution.

Kelly suggested possibly building smaller anchorages near less populated areas like Kiptopeke State Park, or, weather permitting, anchoring vessels on the east side of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel in the Atlantic Ocean.

Two public meetings on the Coast Guard's anchorage proposal will be held on Tuesday, July 10, at the Cape Charles Civic Center at 500 Tazewell Avenue, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

#### Chincoteague Town Council Votes Money for Paramedics

The population of Chincoteague is aging and when the tourists are in town the need for rescue operations increases.

Two additional full-time paramedics will respond to calls for help from Chincoteague residents and visitors (and when needed on the mainland) and will be funded with \$150,000 provided by the town coffers.

The Chincoteague Town Council voted unanimously Monday to amend the budget to allow for the spending. The move brings the total funds allocated for such services to about \$834,000 annually.

"People of my generation are too old, too decrepit" for the job, said Accomack Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr, treasurer of the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, which oversees the paid rescuers. "It takes two incomes to have a family and there's no time to volunteer," he said of the younger folks. Tarr said the fire company is able to buy the ambulances and maintain them but cannot pay the workers.

Accomack county voted recently to put staff in Greenbackville and Saxis on the mainland. Tarr hopes that will lessen the load for Chincoteague. "But they don't have the staff for it yet," he said.

Town officials discussed getting volunteers to drive the ambulance but that too takes hours if a patient is taken to the hospital.

"I'm a driver," said Councilwoman Denise Bowden. "I don't get out as much as I used to — obligations. I remember when I was in high school, half the class would leave for a fire ... Those days are over ... It's nobody's fault, but life happens."

"Those guys are running as hard as they can go and they need all the help they can get," Mayor Arthur Leonard said.

"Being a volunteer is one of the hardest things you'll ever do in your life," Bowden said later. "You could learn how to drive an ambulance," but she said the regulations placed on the volunteers grows every day. "It is hard. All together we have a job to do to make this place safe."

"I'm fully in favor of it," Vice Mayor Ben Ellis said. "All you have to do is listen to the scanner." Ellis was elected to the vice mayor's position by the other council members at the session. He said Chincoteague residents can buy ambulance insurance for \$100 a vear to cover the costs that insurance doesn't pay. "I think we need to pass it (funds for the paid workers) but I think we need to have some discussion with the fire department. I know they are buying ambulances and that is expensive." But, he added, revenue sharing needs to be considered. "I'm just throwing that out there."

Tarr said the \$230,000, to which Ellis was referring, is always put towards buying an ambulance. "Volunteering has become a thing of the past," said Tarr. "Public safety is going to wind up suffering." He gave examples of maintenance costs. "A battery is \$500." It costs \$1,500 to replace two tires, he said.

Former Councilman Jim Frese, who

spoke during the public participation portion of the session, said, "We're approaching \$1 million in costs for emergency services for ambulances. We can't continue to have the fire company be under the gun ... They told us they can't get volunteers. We can't afford that. Take it in as an arm of the town, the same as our police department ... We're hearing now where it's taking longer and longer to get an ambulance to someone who is in trouble. I don't think we can put it off any longer."

Next year the plan is to add another two workers for another \$150,000, officials agreed.

Island residents also voiced concern about the influx of food trucks on the island. They agreed that ones on Maddox Boulevard are in the commercial corridor and are not in question in comparison to a new one on Church Street that is taking parking spaces from local churches and the funeral home there. Complaints were also made that the truck is close to houses. They asked that improved regulations be made. At one point, Mayor Leonard said the planning commission would look at the situation.

In contrast, Daryl Chrisman said he wanted to use a hotdog pushcart for his existing business but was told he would need four additional parking spaces for a wayside side stand, which is a permanent structure. "All I'm asking for is common sense here," he told the council and mayor. "It could be moved by one person. It's pretty small," Crisman added.

There was also a plea for action to formally oppose off-shore drilling. Town officials took no action on the request.

The town planned to demolish what was deemed an unsafe structure on Cleveland Street after the owners took no action to secure or repair the structure. They got one bid for \$9,450.45 from Allen Clark Construction Co. for the job. The owner threatened to take the case to court saying the structure was not a safety hazard and that he wanted to work with the town. In the end, council voted to give him 60 days to investigate a solution. The zoning official will report back in September regarding the situation.

"We live next door," the owner said.
"It's always been our intention to refurbish. It's been like that for half a century, another year wouldn't make any difference."

Zoning Administrator Kenny Lewis explained the structure's condition could adversely affect other nearby property if a hurricane came through and tossed the structure about the neighborhood.

Planning for the proposed dog park is continuing, according to a report. "The delineation of the park has changed slightly as we learned that part of the proposed layout was on school board property. The layout now has the park entirely on town property. The area has been reduced slightly from .6 to .5 acre. We continue to work toward a permit."

# Northampton School Contracts Reviewed

Northampton schools spend about \$1.5 million every year on contractual services, accounting for 7 percent of school expenditures. Contractual services are the second largest school expenditure after salaries and benefits, which account for 79 percent of school expenditures. Total annual expenses for Northampton schools are nearly \$21.7 million.

During a March review of the school budget, Northampton supervisors raised concern over the amount being spent on contractual services. In response, Northampton schools Chief Financial Officer Brook Thomas prepared a line item report of all contractual service expenditures.

Nearly one-third of contractual service expenditures, or about \$477,000, are classified as instructional expenditures.

Almost \$213,000 of that amount is spent on services provided through special education such as physical therapy and occupational therapy (helping individuals with physical or mental disabilities learn how to do everyday tasks), including about \$173,000 at the elementary schools and \$40,000 at the middle and high school. Some of these costs are offset by Medicaid revenues.

More than \$82,000 is spent on software programs for instruction, student data tracking, and professional development that are not covered by grants. Familiar software titles in this category include Imagine Learning and PowerSchool.

About \$42,000 is spent on benchmark testing and other assessments such as advanced placement testing and the pre-SATs. Another \$3,225 pays for testing for teachers pursuing national board certification.

Dual enrollment at the high school and Eastern Shore Community College costs a 50 percent subsidy of \$20,000, and a career coach costs \$8,000.

About \$433,000 is spent on contractual services under the category of administration, attendance, and health expenses. This includes more than \$122,000 for the school division's copier lease and maintenance agreement.

It also costs about \$71,000 annually for Northampton schools to have broadband internet access and related services like network backup, website hosting, and content filtering.

Computer software not related to instruction is listed in this category, used for timekeeping, accounting, and substitute teacher management at a cost of more than \$45,000.

Included in this category as a health expense is more than \$49,000 the school board contributes annually toward health insurance for qualifying retirees up to age 65.

Nearly \$318,000 in federal grants or federal grant matching programs is spent on contractual services. Occohannock and Kiptopeke elementary schools spend nearly \$135,000 and \$87,000, respectively, through Title 1A for parental involvement workshops and instructional software like Achieve 3000, which improves children's reading skills using nonfiction texts.

Contractual services for building operations and maintenance total nearly \$186,000 for various inspections and maintenance programs. About \$96,000 is spent on roof repairs. painting, septic maintenance, and fire extinguisher inspections. More than \$20,000 covers parking lot maintenance, snow removal, and playground inspections. Security monitoring costs nearly \$12,000 annually.

Less than \$35,000 is spent every year on contractual services for transportation. Radios used to monitor student transportation require Federal Communications Commission licenses and contracts at a cost of \$17.500.

Transportation to services required by special education students' Individualized Education Programs costs more than \$12,000, and driver training and testing adds another \$4,500. The latter two expenses are required by law or by the Virginia Department of Education.

The smallest contractual service category is school food expenditures, which covers point of sale system hosting and monitoring and other school food-related expenses at a cost of \$32,500.

Thomas' report demonstrates that even though teachers and school employees drive most of Northampton schools' day-today functions, there are some products and services that must be provided by outside contractors, most of which involve technology and computer software used to increase the efficiency of operations and effectiveness of instruction.

#### Man Sought for Malicious Wounding Surrenders

A Northampton man turned himself in to authorities recently after being sought for malicious wounding, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Secured bail was set at \$5,000 for Javon Lee Thomas, 20, of Lankford Highway in Nassawadox. Thomas is accused of the June 18 crime. His release was on the condition he "avoid all contact with Kiara Capers," the victim, and to "stay away from 31146 Drummondtown Road in Wachapreague."

The case was transferred from Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court on June 28 because the suspect and victim are not related. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for Aug. 20. Deputy B.K. Misener of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) investigated.

Paul Alan Cavey, 32, of Shore Acres Road in Arnold, Md., was charged with possession of cocaine on June 23. "While investigating a breaking and entering, I came into contact with Paul Alan Cavey," Sgt. Tyler Greenly of the Chincoteague Police Department wrote in the file. Criminal cases for three men were filed recently in Northampton General District Court. William Jerome Reid Jr., of Machipongo, was charged with two counts of possession of a Schedule I or II drug and a count of eluding, all felonies. He was accused of the crimes on Monday, July 2.

Sean Patrick McGinley, of Philadelphia, Pa., was charged on June 30 with possession with intent to distribute marijuana. He was arrested the next day. Officer P.W. Spreder of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel Police investigated. A preliminary hearing was set for Aug. 16.

Marcus 42, of Brooks, Manhattan Avenue in New York City, was convicted of hit-and-run misdemeanor that occurred May 11. Trial Continued for Attempting to Kill Deputy

in Accomack Circuit Court, the case of a Norfolk man accused of attempting to kill a county deputy was continued for nearly two months to allow more witnesses to be called for the defense.

Motions were scheduled in early August for Deandre Breshon Ayers, also known as De'Andre Breshon Ayres and Deondre Brashaun Ayers, 29, of Hanson Avenue, previously of Painter. The trial will continue on Aug. 23.

Ayres waived his right to a jury. Instead, he asked for a bench trial in which Judge W. Revell Lewis will determine his guilt or innocence. Ayers pleaded not guilty to the attempted capital murder of Cpl. Eric Nottingham of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, use of a firearm, possession of a firearm by a felon, shooting from a vehicle, and unlawfully shooting at a police cruiser.

According to court records, Ayers was convicted of assault in 2007 and unlawful wounding in 2008.

Nottingham was on Route 13 in Temperanceville on the day the shooting occurred when he was alerted that three men in a silver Chevy Malibu with Virginia tag JYU-4323 were being sought by authorities following a bank robbery in Po-

comoke, Md. He then saw the vehicle and followed it as it turned right on Nelsonia Road and headed towards Bloxom. When the vehicle ran a stop sign Nottingham attempted to pull it over.

"The vehicle was acting like it was stopping," according to Nottingham. "It rolled to about five to 10 miles per hour ... and then floored it and went up to 80 to 90 mph." The deputy said the car then just jammed on the breaks. That's when he saw an arm come out of the driver's window with a gun pointed towards him.

"It started popping off," he said. "I heard metal clanking around. I just heard a whole bunch of shots." Nottingham put the squad car in reverse.

The Malibu took off again. The deputy tried to chase it but he could smell something burning and then his car stopped. He said the gun fired twice as the vehicle was driving off. "Three bullets struck my vehicle, one of them hit the transmission core." he continued.

The defense contended someone else in the vehicle shot the gun. Ayers was arrested on Oct. 4, 2016. Since then he has been held in Accomack Jail without bond.

These interests included fine bobbin lace, French hand sewing and smocking, hand-sewn quilt making, and "sheep to shawl" - the taking of hand shorn fleece, spinning it into yarn using antique spinning wheels, then dyeing the yarn with natural dves and finally weaving the yarn on a huge jack-loom into incredibly beautiful fabrics. All of this was accomplished by her own hand. Ever the consummate craftsman, she perfected on her own so many other beautiful handmade treasures which she shared with a few, always self-deprecating in describing the beauty of her finished projects.

Mrs. Alexander was a lifelong member of the Girl Scouts of America, having earned a First Class Girl Scout designation. Girl scouting was just another of her loves which followed her belief that lifting young women up in life was paramount to our future. She was also known for designing beautiful, functional, and historically accurate gardens for museums in Montauk, Long Island, and other areas. She was an avid Montauk Garden Club member, a member of the Montauk Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary, a staunch feminist and activist, a volunteer Red Cross swimming instructor, and avid environmental conservationist. # Exmore and Derelict Building Ordinance

Exmore officials are working to get private property cleaned up and free of debris and derelict buildings so the town can shine like the "Treasure of the Eastern Shore" it aspires to be.

Town Manager Robert Duer suggested at Monday night's town council meeting that Exmore request inclusion in Northampton County's upcoming, new real estate tax abatement program benefiting property owners who either demolish or renovate derelict buildings on their land.

A building is considered derelict if it has been vacant, boarded up, and disconnected from any utilities (electric, water, and sewer service) for six months, and it poses a risk to public health, safety, or welfare.

Property owners who wish to participate in the real estate tax abatement program must plan to either fix up or tear down the abandoned building and have the commissioner of revenue assess the property in its current condition.

The property owners must submit a building permit application noting the cost of the demolition or the materials and labor for the renovation.

At the property owners' request, once the demolition or renovation is complete, the commissioner of revenue will determine the fair market value of the demolition or building improvements, which will be reflected in the real estate tax assessment records.

The financial benefit for the property owners is a 15-year reduction on their real estate tax bills. The property owners would still pay real estate taxes during the 15-year period, but not on the value of the demolition or building improvements as de-

termined by the commissioner of revenue.

Duer claimed, "It's not as good as it sounds," but the program does provide an incentive for property owners to either remove or improve buildings in poor condition, he said.

If the county determines a building is derelict, the owner must be notified in writing. Upon delivery of the written notification, the owner has 90 days to submit a letter to the county declaring plans to demolish or renovate the building. If the county receives no such declaration within 90 days, it may secure the building and either repair or remove the nuisance, according to Virginia law.

Exmore Police Chief Angelo DiMartino reported that enforcement of the town's blight ordinance, regarding the removal of trash or debris from private property, is going well and residents have been generally cooperative.

DiMartino continues to work toward gaining control of the muskrat population infesting the drainage ditches along Hadlock Road. He has spoken with representatives of both the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Virginia Department of Transportation.

DiMartino said VDOT will allow town workers to eliminate the infestation in the drainage ditches provided they stay on the sides of the ditches that are farthest from the road. The next step is to obtain a kill permit, he said.

Brenda Holden is concerned about tree overgrowth on Temple Drive at the railroad crossing. Duer said he was unsure if the crossing belonged to the railroad or VDOT, but he would find the answer and notify her.

In another matter, the town council passed a motion to write a resolution stating Exmore's opposition to offshore drilling.



# Monitoring Chicken Water

The Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) released an upbeat statement regarding poultry houses this week about the same time a citizens' group leader wrote to the agency to complain about the regulating of water withdrawal for the massive coops.

"(DEQ) has committed to undertake water quality monitoring of key poultry operations on the Eastern Shore after taking into account concerns from the community, the Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF), and other stakeholders," according to the agency press release.

"Virginia recently issued its first poultry pollution discharge permits for three large operations on the Shore," the agency stated. "DEQ's new plan to monitor water quality at these specific poultry operations will help guarantee that their pollution controls are working properly."

The announcement also quoted Jay Ford, who recently joined CBF as its Virginia Voices Outreach Coordinator after serving as Shorekeeper for several years.

"There are still a lot of unanswered questions about the risks to waterways from poultry operations." said Ford. "Fortunately, DEQ is taking a very positive step forward. This monitoring program will verify that these new poultry permits effectively control pollution. We are grateful to DEQ Director David Paylor, Virginia Secretary of Natural Resources Matthew Strickler and others in the administration of Gov. Ralph Northam for this monitoring commitment," Ford said.

The three precedent-setting discharge permits for operations on the Eastern Shore are the first of their kind in Virginia. Inspections of these operations in 2010 and comments from the Environmental Protection Agency indicated pollution discharges into local waters. The farms were required to obtain discharge permits under the Virginia Pollutant Discharge Elimination System for Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations.

"DEQ's study will begin this August and take water quality samples up-

stream and downstream of four sites, including the three permitted operations," the agency reported. "It will include at least six separate samples over the course of a year, including at least four within a day of rainfall and two during dry weather. The samples will be tested for pollution including nitrogen, ammonia, phosphorus, bacteria, and sediment. Results will be made public after the study."

Ken Dufty, a local environmentalist, wrote to DEQ Monday regarding water withdrawal issues and the limited water supply in local aquifers.

"In order to comment on DEQ's proposal to allow groundwater withdrawals at rates that may now exceed 109 million gallons/month, a withdrawal that is indeed illegal under the Groundwater Management Act, the citizens must know what impact this proposed allowance will have on their private drinking water supplies now and into the future," he wrote. "What is being allowed here represents a regulatory thumbing-of-thenose to those here on the Shore who need potable water to be able to stay here on this fantastic and unique peninsula and to be able to expand our revenues through economic development and growth-residentially, commercially and industrially."

He wants groundwater withdrawal renewals to be prohibited until modeling has been done "to assess what impacts the proposed withdrawal will have on neighboring residences, agriculture, commercial and industrial uses and the long-term viability of our sole source aquifer; cancellation of the public comment period until and unless full information is provided to the public regarding this enforcement action including a physical address of each facility, number of houses per facility, number of flocks a year for each facility, breakdown of water use for process — watering of birds verses cooling use, which aguifer will be accessed and at what depth, the CAFO permit for each facility, and a copy of all the GW-2 for each facility including those for the 58 that are now illegally withdraw-

#### Northampton School Board Seeks New Strategy for High School

The opening of the Northampton school board's June 28 meeting - the first since the board's joint meeting with supervisors three days earlier on the possible cost and affordability of replacing the county's rapidly deteriorating high school - was like a pep talk in the locker room after the home team got crushed seconds before halftime, with Superintendent Eddie Lawrence as the coach prepping his players for a new strategy in the second half that might include a Hail Mary or two.

At the previous meeting, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors Spencer Murray had suggested the county might be able to borrow more money in 2023, but he couldn't "see a scenario where this county in any kind of future can borrow \$40 million" for a new school.

Northampton schools Director of Operations Chris Truckner said that during the tenure of former County Administrator Katie Nunez, the two boards were in agreement about the

pressing need for a new high school. The new group of supervisors in authority has yet to be convinced, despite the availability of ample photographic evidence of deterioration and reports by a structural engineer.

Back in 2007, structural engineering firm Speight, Marshall & Francis stated, "A strong cost-based case can be made to tear down the 1950s portion of the facility and completely rebuild it. The cost to address the structural issues will exceed 60 percent of the cost to rebuild the facility."

Eleven years ago, the 1950s-era high school building was already in "poor" condition, according to the firm.

The school board noted their concern with Supervisor David Fauber's remark at the June 25 joint meeting that he had toured Northampton High School and believed "it's old but ... built pretty well and has got possibilities ... I don't see the need to build a new school."

School board members believe they are back at "square one" and instead of forming a plan to build a new school, they must once again convince county public comment. officials that it's necessary.

Northampton County Education Foundation member Helene Doughty spoke during the public comment session at the June 28 school board meeting, not as a representative of her organization, but as a concerned parent of a Northampton student.

She said comments like Fauber's cause confusion for citizens like her who are trying to assess the issue objectively and determine whether or not a new school is needed.

Fauber's tour was not guided by Truckner, who has extensive knowledge of the school's structural issues and could have pointed them out.

School board member Jo Ann Molera said the public has partly been "lured into a false sense" of security regarding the condition of the high school because Truckner does such a good job of maintaining the building and making it appear presentable.

Doughty said the meetings between the school board and supervisors have not been well-publicized or solicited

She was also concerned that a local news headline had upset Northampton citizens by giving the impression that building a new school would double their taxes.

Doughty asked the school board members if they could hold town meetings to explain their position to parents and voters and share information such as the cost of repairs needed at the high school.

Lawrence was open to the idea of holding a public meeting close to the first day classes resume in the fall, when school issues are more often on parents' minds.

In his opinion, "the time for renovation passed 20 years ago" and the only solution now is to knock down the high school and rebuild.

The school board will rejoin supervisors in the county administration building on Tuesday, July 10, where members will be allowed to make the comments they had prepared but were not asked to share at their previous meeting.

# Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

Few fish in our waters combine the sheer beauty, fighting ability, and table value as the dolphin fish, now more popularly recognized by the name of mahi or mahi mahi to avoid being confused with the mammal of the same name. Dolphin fishing has been red hot off our coast in water depths of 30 fathoms and deeper. Dolphin are often attracted to almost any type of floating objects from seaweed to buoys, even pieces of floating trash. The recent formation of floating Sargassum weed lines in our offshore waters has created ideal conditions for attracting this fast swimming predator. These fish put on an acrobatic display when hooked and played on light tackle and can be prepared a number of different ways on the grill and in the frying pan.

Chincoteague — Jimmy Vasilou, of Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reports a few croakers have shown up in the waters of Queen Sound. In the Assateague surf, kingfish, and even a few early season spot, have been hitting live bloodworm baits early in the morning and late in the evenings. The inshore wrecks have been producing limit catches of flounder to 22 inches on jigs with 6-inch Berkley Gulp baits. Spadefish and gray triggerfish are hanging out over the same wrecks and several cobia have been sighted, but he had not heard of any cobia boated. Further offshore, two blue marlin and a white marlin were released and anglers retuned with nice catches of dolphin for the table.

Donna Rae, of Captain Bob's Marina, reported the inshore flounder fishing has been very good recently, specifically at the south end of Chincoteague Channel from buoy 17 north to buoy 27. Anglers fishing here have enjoyed up to an average of one legal keeper for every four fish caught, and boats have caught their whole limit in five- to six-hour spans. Jumbo live minnows with 4- to 5-inch Gulp Swimming Mullet baits in pearl white, pink, or nuclear chicken color patterns have produced most of the larger fish. Croaker and kingfish have been caught in the canal towards the inlet. Fish Bites and bloodworm-scented squid strips have been the best baits. Small snapper bluefish have been hitting near the pilings of the Queen Sound bridge. Sharks up to 5 and 6 feet in length have been landed from buoy 11 out to buoy 10. Blackfish Banks has produced catches of large flounder, spadefish, trout, and sea bass. Farther offshore, anglers trolling ballyhoo have produced yellowfin tuna, dolphin, and an occasional white marlin.

#### Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, reported offshore anglers were finding "bunches" of dolphin along the scattered weed lines in 30 fathoms. One boat recently had the rare opportunity to release four make sharks on the troll over a two-day period. All of the sharks were under the 83-inch minimum size

limit, according to Paul. Several blue and white marlin releases have been registered for fish caught in the Washington and Bob's canyons. Offshore bottom fishermen were successful with catches of blueline tilefish. A little closer inshore, keeper flounder were being caught over the wrecks. Inside the inlet, small flounder and croakers have been the primary catch.

Lower Shore — Chris Snook, of Chris' Bait & Tackle, reports the spadefish bite has turned on around the fourth island of the bridge-tunnel, as well as a smaller bite around the Plantation Light. Small croakers were being caught just outside the concrete ships as well as on the seaside out of Oyster. Sea mullet were being caught on Latimer's Shoal. Cobia catches were coming from buoys 13, 16, and 36 during the day, while these same areas were producing large red drum releases late in the afternoon. Snook recommends that anglers carry plenty of bait and hooks, as shark bite offs have become an increasing problem. The shop recently sold 3,600 pounds of bait over a two-day period!

Jeb Brady, of Bailey's Bait and Tackle, reported that the cobia bite is still good between the bridge-tunnel and buoy 36. Sight fishermen were starting to see an increase in the number of surface swimming fish. Brady said the spadefishing was "awe-some" at the fourth island and Plantation Light over the weekend. Flounder fishing was described as slow, with a few catches coming from around the bridge and offshore wrecks.

Upper Shore — Captain Matt Abell, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported that the cobia and red drum bite down near the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel was still going strong. Offshore, a handful of tuna and some dolphin catches had been reported. The railcars were producing large flounder for anglers drifting and jigging Gulp baits. On the Chesapeake Bay side, the deep water bottom fishing has been a disappointment so far, with a few sand mullet making up the bulk of the catches. Abell recently fished surface lures for rockfish at the mouth of the Little Annemessex River near Crisfield, Md., with limited success on fish up to 25 inches. The early summer water temperature was already up to 89 degrees in the shallows!

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to

He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.





ing groundwater without a permit, and establishment of multiple public hearings on individual groundwater withdrawal permits.

"Listen to the citizens, take into account what they have to say, balance the needs of the environment and natural resources with necessary economic development and, then, act accordingly," Dufty said. "It is clear that your agency has now decided to let citizens comment on your ministerial act to allow unchecked withdrawal of our limited drinking water supplies in direct contravention to established law,

regulation, and precedent. Yet all we really know is that 58 industrial poultry facilities are now being allowed to withdraw 109 million gallons of water each month in clear violation of the law. We hold that there is no possible way for the public to do that without divulging the information that we need to make that informed decision, and therefore, for the reasons stated above, we are petitioning your agency to suspend this public comment period until and unless we have the information necessary to submit responsive comments."

# Health Matters Summer Food Safety

ummer has begun, which means that many people in Virginia will be taking out their grills and spending more time outdoors. Follow these tips for your cookout for safe and enjoyable outdoor cooking all summer long!

#### Bringing perishable or raw foods to a picnic or cookout?

Bacteria grows faster in warm temperatures. Be sure that these foods don't spend more than:

- · one hour sitting out when the temperature is above 90°F or
- · two hours when temperatures are below 90°F.

Use an insulated cooler to help keep foods colds. Foods that need to be kept cold include:

- raw meat, poultry, and seafood;
- · deli and luncheon meats or sandwiches:
- summer salads (tuna, chicken, egg, pasta, or seafood);
- · cut up fruit and vegetables; and perishable dairy products.

To help keep your food cooler for longer:

· keep your cooler full,

- · place the cooler in the shade, and
- · avoid opening the cooler.

#### Cooking on a grill?

Keep your food safe by remembering these four steps: clean, separate, cook,

- · Clean: Start with clean surfaces and clean hands.
- Separate: Keep raw meat and poultry separate from your veggies. Keep cooked foods away to avoid potential cross-contamination.
- · Cook: Your food thermometer is your grill's most important tool! Check the temperature of your meats, poultry, seafood, and other cooked foods before taking them off the grill to make sure they have reached a safe internal temperature.
- · Chill: Bacteria grow most rapidly in the temperature "danger zone," between 40°F and 140°F. It's essential to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Hot foods can be kept on the grill and cold foods can always be chilled with packs of ice or in a cooler.

Wash your hands with soap before and after handling raw meat, poultry, and seafood. Wash work surfaces. utensils, and the grill before and after cooking.



#### Cook

Use a food thermometer to ensure meat is cooked hot enough to kill harmful germs. When smoking, keep temperature inside the smoker at 225°F to 300°F to keep meat at a safe temperature while it cooks

145°F beef, pork, lamb, veal, fish hamburgers and other ground meat 165°F poultry



#### Don't cross-contaminate

Throw out marinades and sauces that have touched raw meat juices. Put cooked meat on a clean plate.



#### Refrigerate

Divide leftovers into small portions and place in covered, shallow containers. Put in freezer or fridge within two hours of cooking (one hour if above 90°F outside).



Why am I telling you all of this? Because last week a gunman with a grudge entered the Annapolis newsroom of the Capital Gazette and murdered five of its employees. It was a shocking act of violence. Yet in its wake, in the midst of shock and grief, the employees of the Capital Gazette put out their next daily edition. Newspapers have an obligation to their readers to carry on and keep them informed, but as a newspaper person, I also understand getting out the paper as a familiar and comforting action, and an act of protest. "We will not be silenced," it says.

There have been times when many of you have disagreed with what we have written. At times, some businesses have pulled their advertising in protest of an article with which they disagreed. Some of you have been angry enough to call and yell at us or come into our office and threaten us. And yet we write and we publish. Not for ourselves, but for you, our readers.

When you contact us about an article, your comments are taken to heart and we continually ask ourselves, "Were we accurate? Were we fair? Were we thorough?" There will be times that we come up short and we will try to make it right. There will be times that we answer "yes" to all three and still find ourselves in disagreement. It is the nature of the world that we see through different eyes, but these disagreements can always be handled civilly.

At a time when many community newspapers are on the ropes or closing, you have supported us and given us the great privilege of being part of your lives. We love that you feel you have a stake in this newspaper. Because you do. And we are all joint stakeholders in this community.

As your local newspaper, we wouldn't have it any other way.
