## BaySys Headquarters for Sale; Taxes Unpaid

"For Sale" signs were erected within the last week in front of the Accomac office building of BaySys Technologies, LLC, on Lankford Highway. The price of the property was not posted on the real-estate agent's Web site by press time. It is

valued at more than \$830,000, according to Accomack County's Accomap Web site ([accomack.mapsdirect.net](http://accomack.mapsdirect.net)).

Recent reports of lawsuits and layoffs plague the aeronautics company. The most recent involves delinquent tax bills totaling \$45,750 in Accomack for real es-

tate and personal property. Interad Limited, LLC, a research and development company associated with BaySys, at the same address, owes \$675 in overdue taxes.

BaySys entered the local lime-light last August when its officials assured Accomack supervisors they could come up with money to

build hangars and thereby prosper. BaySys Founder and President Steve Walton urged the spending of \$5.6 million in taxpayer money to construct a taxiway that would link the proposed hangar site at Wallops Research Park with NASA's runway.

The majority of county supervisors agreed to spend but required BaySys to show evidence it had the finances to build the hangars. Walton has not produced that proof.

He personally owes \$1,428 in back taxes to Accomack.

Last week at a board meeting, Supervisor Grayson Chesson noted that back when the taxiway was discussed, Walton had said the construction was time critical. "We need some closure on this," Chesson said.

"It's a moot point," said Supervisor Wanda Thornton.

Supervisor Robert Crockett, who was appointed to the post in January, said the matter is not moot in the eyes of the public. "Let the people know that it's moot," he said, asking for the proposal to be put on next month's agenda for discussion.

County Administrator Steve Miner said the board might need to go into a closed session so he can offer a briefing on the matter.

## Sheriff Giddens Plans To Quit

Accomack County Sheriff Larry Giddens said Monday he would be quitting his post five months before his term ends, which is three months before the November General Election. Maj. Todd Godwin of the department will

take over, he said.

"My last day will be August 1," said the sheriff, who announced last year that he would not be seeking election to a second four-year term. He said he made the decision to leave early "just to give Todd a little time to be at the helm."

Giddens said, "Right now, by

law, the next person in line, my chief deputy, will get the position. He's got the experience. He knows the job. If he has any questions, he knows I'll be there for him."

"This was the plan from Day One when I decided I wouldn't run again," said Giddens. "I'm campaigning for him now."



# Where Did Everyone Go?

There were 28,303 housing units on the Eastern Shore of Virginia in 2010, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. The latest figures also reveal more than a third of those dwellings were vacant last year.

More than 21,000 of the units were in Accomack, where 7,204 units (more than 34 percent) were vacant, according to information on the agency's Web site. In Northampton, 1,978 of the 7,301 units (27 percent) were vacant.

It is unclear how many of the falling-down and paint-less houses that have been abandoned in both areas for decades are included in the figures.

The total population for the two-county area was reported at 45,553 — 12,389 in Northampton and 33,164 in Accomack, both down when compared to figures from the 2000 census.

Accomack officials are disputing the results, insisting that many of their residents were not counted. They found numerous errors 10 years ago, including a mistake that listed 5,000 people living on one small lot. The U.S. Justice Department accepted the county's changes for redistricting measures, but officials say the bureau never updated its figures.

On Chincoteague, town and county leaders say the number of vacant housing units was overstated in the 2010 count. While they admit that some units are seasonal or second homes, they contend it's not as many as the bureau claimed.



The census reports that the total population on Chincoteague was 2,941, with 4,519 housing units, of which 1,417 were occupied.

In Accomack County's District 2, according to the report, the population was 4,763 in 2010, with 3,727 housing units, of which 2,093 were occupied.

District 3 shows a population of 3,605, with 1,743 housing units, of which 1,487 were occupied in 2010.

The report states there were 3,660 people living in District 4, with a total of 1,764 housing units, of which 1,478 were occupied.

There were 4,090 people living in District 5 in 2010, according to the census. The area

is listed as having 1,740 housing units, with 1,462 occupied.

In District 6, the report states the population was 3,587, with 1,744 housing units, of which 1,371 were occupied.

District 7 reportedly had 3,265 people in 2010, with 1,884 housing units, of which 1,491 were occupied.

District 8 had a population of 3,671 in 2010, with 2,123 housing units of which 1,572 were occupied.

District 9 had 3,582 people, with 1,758 housing units, of which 1,427 were occupied.

Breakdowns for occupancy by district were not available for Northampton County.

In Accomack, the report shows 21,662 of the population, more than 65 percent, were white; 9,303 or 28 percent were black; 135 or 0.4 percent were characterized as American Indian and Alaska Native; 183 or 0.55 percent were Asian; 40 or 0.12 percent were native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander; 1,302 or 3.9 percent were listed as other races; 539 or 1.6 percent were two or more races; and 2,850 or nearly 9 percent (of any race) were listed as Hispanic or Latino.

In Northampton, 7,168 or about 57.9 percent were white; 4,528 or 36.5 percent were black; 27 or 0.22 percent were American Indian and Alaska Native; 83 or 0.67 percent were Asian; 13 or 0.1 percent were Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander; 393 or 3.1 percent were some other race; 177 or 1.4 percent were two or more races; and 874 or 7.1 percent (of any race) were listed as Hispanic or Latino.

## Constitutional Officers Take Center Stage

The Accomack County Democratic Committee (ACDC), in collaboration with the Eastern Shore of Virginia Chamber of Commerce, will present a series of nonpartisan, informational conversations with the county's constitutional officers.

The purpose of the forum series is to provide the general public an opportunity to

better understand the functions performed and managed by these elected officials, and to have the opportunity to interact with them in an informal setting.

The forums will be held March 2, April 6 and May 4 from 7 to 8 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce building in Melfa.

The series will kick off Wednesday, March 2, with Treasurer Dana Bundick and Commissioner of the Revenue Leslie Savage, who will discuss their operations and how they interact with each other.

On Wednesday, April 6, Sheriff Larry Giddens and Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar will discuss the functions of their offices, and on May 4, Clerk of the Circuit Court Samuel Cooper will wrap up the series.

The terms of all of these elected officials, except Cooper, will end this year and the positions will be on the ballot in November — as will those of the Board of Supervisors, the state House of Delegates and the state Senate.

Plans are underway to offer additional forums covering other components of local government, including boards and commissions.

# Good Cause To Take the Plunge

**W**hile those who took a dip in the Chesapeake Bay last week might have been hoping for gentle breezes, sunny skies, and warm waters, they had to settle for one out of three.

Westerly winds blew at 10 to 15 knots, the water temperature was a brisk 38 degrees and the air temperature hovered near 40 as 44 enthusiastic folks of all ages challenged the elements, all for the sake of Habitat for Humanity.

Feb. 12 marked the 15th year that Habitat has sponsored the event to raise money and public awareness for those less fortunate.

At the sound of a horn, the dippers surged into the water and moments later retreated even faster as they headed for the warmth of a blanket and a warm car. Following the plunge, every-

one headed for lunch at Trinity United Methodist Church.

According to Nancy Gonzalez of Habitat, seven teams and a number of individuals took part in the event. All had acquired donations — which totalled \$4,200 — to improve housing opportunities in Accomack and Northampton counties.

The top-earning team from Northampton High School brought in \$1,216, while Juan Harvey was acknowledged for having brought in \$403, the highest of any of the individual volunteers. Present among those who took the plunge was a group of 11 students from Virginia Wesleyan College who had worked during their fall break to build a home on the Shore.

Tom Gonzalez stated that since the local Habitat for Humanity group was organized, it has built or refurbished 35 homes. Families who receive one of the homes help to construct it or raise funds to

help others. Recipients are expected to perform 350 hours of “sweat equity,” which is paid off by helping with fund-raising, office activities, or actual construction. The av-

erage home is built for \$90,000; each recipient makes mortgage payments of \$300 to \$400 a month or slightly less than many are currently paying for rent.

# Our Choices Are Often Made 'In Name Only'

Accomack and Northampton residents choose Tide laundry detergent, Jif Peanut Butter, Downy fabric softener, Dove bar soap, Lipton tea and Crest toothpaste, according to an e-mail survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post.

Regardless of brand, 65.7 percent like creamy peanut butter better than crunchy. Nearly 35 percent of the participants choose Jif; 28 percent said they don't have a favorite brand. About 14 percent pick Skippy. About 11.6 percent favor Peter Pan. And the remaining choose specialty, generic and store labels. Only one person who answered the survey said she never eats peanut butter.

Participants were not asked to identify themselves.

Nearly 37 percent of the participants said Tide is their favorite

laundry detergent. Nearly 11.7 percent, the next highest number, choose the detergent that is cheapest or on sale. Purex was just behind that, with nearly 11 percent. Arm & Hammer got nearly 9 percent of the tally. Twelve other brands were mentioned.

Twenty-seven percent said they use Downy fabric softener. Fifteen percent said they don't use any product to soften their laundry, while 14 percent use Snuggle and 11 percent use Bounce dryer sheets. Eight percent use whatever is on sale, while 3 percent often use generic or store brands. Participants mentioned seven other brands.

Dove bar soap was the top choice of 27 percent of survey takers. Dial was next with nearly 12 percent. Almost 11 percent choose Ivory while nearly 10 percent use Irish Spring. Nine percent of the participants said they use liquid soap instead. Nearly 3 percent will use any brand. Eleven other

brands were noted.

More than 42 percent said they use Crest toothpaste. Colgate was next with more than 20 percent. Aquafresh followed with 9 percent. Twelve other brands were mentioned. Four percent said they were not picky about toothpaste and will use whatever is available.

Half the participants chose Lipton tea as their favorite. About 3 percent said they don't drink tea. Nineteen other brands were mentioned. About 6.5 percent said they drink generic or store brands of tea.

Pepsi beat Coke 26 to 24 percent. About 10.5 percent said they don't drink soda. Nearly 10 percent prefer ginger ale and nearly 8 percent choose Dr. Pepper. The rest were split among various other sodas and flavors.

Kenmore was the top choice for both refrigerators and stoves. General Electric, Frigidaire, Whirlpool and Maytag also got numerous supporters.

Dell computers were favored by more than 48 percent. Hewlett Packard computers are used by 20 percent. Fifty-six percent of the participants used desktop models. Nearly 9 percent use Apple brand computers. Eight other labels were mentioned.

Hershey was the brand of chocolate selected by nearly 27 percent of survey takers. More than 10.5 percent said they like all brands, while nearly 10 percent picked Godiva and almost 8 percent prefer Dove. Nearly 8 percent said they are allergic to chocolate. About 3.6 percent said they don't like chocolate.

When it came to transportation, 31 percent chose Ford vehicles. General Motors was next with 24 percent. Chrysler got 10.6 percent. Toyota got 10 percent. Eight percent chose Honda and more than 6 percent picked Nissan. Five other companies also were picked. Only one participant said she doesn't own a car and uses a bicycle.

# Local Migrating Birds Catch a Spring Break

More than 7,500 trees and shrubs are being planted on the Eastern Shore to provide feeding grounds for millions of birds during their spring migration.

The Nature Conservancy (TNC), Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and private landowners began the job last week on 418 acres of wetlands and habitat restoration projects slated to be completed over the next two years, according to Tom McCann of TNC.

Volunteers from the Virginia Master Naturalists and AmeriCorps planted 3,500 wax myrtle shrubs at the Mutton Hunk Fen Natural Area Preserve east of Parksley. Later this month, contractors are planning to put in 4,000 shrubs and trees on two privately owned, non-Nature Conservancy properties, near Cheriton and Onancock.

"Restoring this habitat will help millions of birds find the rest and food they need in order to store up enough energy to survive their long migration," said Joe Scalf,

TNC project manager. "The restored habitat will offer immediate benefits to migrating songbirds such as the prairie warbler, but also to resident birds and wildlife such as the northern bobwhite and bald eagle."

The lower Delmarva Peninsula is a globally-important coastal migration corridor for the passage of millions of shorebirds, songbirds, raptors, seabirds, waterfowl, and wading species, according to McCann. They depend on the abundance of marshes, beaches, mudflats and lagoons found along the coastlines.

However, many songbird species rely on woody habitats found on the mainland as they are funneled toward the southern tip of the Peninsula during migrations. Migratory songbirds traveling along the East Coast rely on large and small patches of woodland called 'stopover sites' — sometimes only a few hundred square feet in size — to rest and refuel during migratory journeys that can span more than 10,000 miles.

Bird populations are suffering, in part, because much of their

stopover habitat is being reduced or fragmented by incompatible land uses, McCann noted. Some birds are literally dropping from the sky as they die from exhaustion or hunger. With scientists predicting the potential extinction of 10 percent of all bird species by the end of this century, the work is needed.

The trees and shrubs also will help filter surface water of sediment, fertilizers and excess nutrients, and increase the recharging of groundwater supplies. Most of the work involves planting and protecting fruit-bearing shrubs and deciduous trees that are indigenous to the area and returning agricultural fields to former natural conditions. In some cases, filling ditches that have drained historic wetlands for agriculture will restore wetlands or other land uses for generations.

"The benefits of these restora-

tion sites go far beyond the migrating birds," said Steve Parker, director of TNC's Virginia Coast Reserve Program. "Our private partners are making very important contributions because the actions they are taking on their property will increase the quantity and quality of surface and groundwater, a contribution essential for sustaining our agriculture and aquaculture-based economies, as well as the drinking water supply."

A North American Wetland Conservation Act Grant is funding the project.

Other birds and ducks that will benefit include the peregrine falcon, American oystercatcher, snow geese, bufflehead, goldeneye, upland sandpiper, salt-marsh sharp-tailed sparrow, green-winged teal, ruddy duck, Acadian flycatcher, marsh wren, canvasback, mallard, woodthrush and northern pintail.



# CAPITAL LETTERS

**W**ith only one full week remaining in the 2011 General Assembly session, the House and Senate are working hard to complete action on the budget and other

legislation. Several of my bills have passed both chambers and now await the governor's signature, including measures to ease access for our veterans to birth certificates and other vital records, promote growth in the aquaculture industry, and foster economic development associated with the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport at Wallops Island.

Most importantly to me, however, is the pas-

sage of SB966 which requires 150 minutes of physical education per week for children in kindergarten through eighth grade in our public schools. As a pediatrician, I see every day the toll that childhood obesity is taking on our young people. It is an epidemic that leads to a lifetime of health and financial hardships, and we need to take action to combat it. Rates of stroke, diabetes, and vascular disease in teens and young adults have increased at alarming rates over the past 20 years, and fully one third of U.S. children are now overweight or obese.

While my bill will not by any means eradicate childhood obesity, it is an important tool, and will not, as some have claimed, impose an undue hardship on our local schools. While I fully understand that SOLs and other requirements tax our teachers, finding 30 minutes or so per day for children to exercise and learn about the value of physical fitness is critical to

their development. Active children are proven to be healthier, not just physically, but mentally as well. A sound body and sound mind reinforce each other, and having mandatory PE will improve kids' focus and performance in the classroom.

Although SB966 has passed both the Senate and the House of Delegates, it still must be signed into law by Gov. McDonnell. I met with the governor this week, and I know he understands the importance of taking steps to fight obesity. I also know he will be pressed to amend or veto the bill by those who argue that our schools don't have time to do this; I would counter that our children don't have time not to.

**A**s the General Assembly winds down, with

budget negotiators meeting to hammer out amendments to the final year of the state's two-year budget, I thought it a good opportunity to review what may ultimately be one of, if not the, most important pieces of legislation to result from the 2011 Virginia General Assembly and that is the governor's transportation package.

The governor's package was composed of three parts, with the main part being the Omnibus Transportation Funding Bill, which included the acceleration of previously authorized debt as well as the use of federal GARVEE bonds. The second component was the Northern Virginia and Hampton Roads sales tax retention legislation, and finally, a third piece was a constitutional amendment creating a transportation "lockbox" whereby the transportation funds could not be used for any other purpose but transportation.

The Hampton Roads/Northern

Virginia sales tax retention proposal would have dedicated 0.25 percent of the discretionary sales tax generated in Hampton Roads and Northern Virginia regions to transportation in those regions. Currently, the money goes into the General Fund.

Sales tax receipts are the largest component of the state's General Fund, which is the fund through which we pay for core services such as K-12 public education and public safety, as well as our healthcare obligations under Medicaid and other mandated programs. Transportation has always been a self-funding function of government in that there were certain fees and taxes assessed which were transportation-related and which funded Virginia's road maintenance and building projects in addition to federal highway funds. To me, this portion of the governor's proposal was too much of a deviation from that long held division. I voted against this particular portion of the governor's package.

The constitutional amendment protecting transportation funds was another matter entirely. I believe that the transportation revenues which go to the transportation trust fund and highway maintenance fund should not be used for any other purpose. In these

tight budgetary times, there has been a tendency to use transportation revenues to fill budgetary gaps in General Fund programs. Just as I did not like using General Fund money to any great extent for transportation purposes, I also believe that transportation funds should be used for the purposes for which they are raised. I supported the governor's constitutional amendment protecting transportation funds by creating a lockbox for transportation monies.

Finally, the most important part and the most heavily debated portion of the governor's bill was referred to as the Omnibus Transportation Funding Bill. It would result in the use of about \$4 billion in bonds to jumpstart Virginia's transportation program. Specifically, this calls for the issuance of \$1.8 billion in capital project revenue bonds (which were already authorized by the General Assembly in 2007) at an accelerated rate. This would enable the commonwealth to take advantage of historically low interest rates and construction costs to get projects moving and completed.

Ultimately, the governor argued persuasively that this would result in a tremendous long-term savings to the commonwealth. It also would create many jobs and help our commonwealth's econo-

my. There are sufficient existing revenues to support this debt service on these bonds without the need to raise any taxes. It also keeps us within our self-imposed conservative debt capacity limit and the proposal was reviewed and "approved" by the credit rating agencies during the governor's visit to New York earlier this year.

The governor also proposed using \$1.1 billion in GARVEE bonds. These bonds have no effect on the state's bond capacity as they are backed by future federal highway reimbursements. With GARVEE bonds, VDOT can now construct major infrastructure projects without spending a single state dollar. While not a perfect bill and not without troubling aspects, I chose finally to support this portion of the Governor's plan because it is a step, just a step, toward breaking the deadlock and solving our transportation crisis.

# Shore Land Trust Earns Accreditation

Virginia Eastern Shore (VES) Land Trust recently was awarded national accreditation, one of just 130 land trusts throughout the country to earn approval from the Land Trust Accreditation Commission, an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance.

"Accredited land trusts meet national quality standards for protecting important natural places and working lands forever," said Commission Executive Director Tammara Van Ryn. "The accreditation seal lets the public know that the accredited land trust has undergone an extensive, external review of the governance and management of its organization, and the systems and policies it uses to protect land."

To VES Land Trust, "accreditation recognizes the quality of our conservation program and gives our easement donors, contributors and partners greater confidence in our ability to preserve and protect resources on the Eastern Shore forever," said Executive Director Peter N. Henderson. "Our land trust is a stronger organization today, having gone through the rigorous accreditation program last year."

VES Land Trust was formed in 2003 by an eight-member board led by chairman Lucius J. Kellam III of Belle Haven, with guidance from founding Executive Director Megan Gallagher of The Plains, Va. In the past eight years, the land trust has helped Eastern Shore landowners protect 57 properties, a total of nearly 12,500 acres of working farms, forests, wetlands and historic houses and sites in Accomack and Northampton counties.

Current VES Land Trust Chairman Timothy Brown of Greenbush said that land represents "our nation's most important and valuable resource. Protecting land will ensure that we have clean air and drinking water, healthy local food, scenic landscapes, habitat for wildlife

and places to hunt, fish or just enjoy the outdoors." Brown and his family donated the land trust's first conservation easement in 2003, in partnership with Ducks Unlimited/Wetlands America Trust.

Accredited land trusts are able to display a seal (see inset) indicating to the public that they meet national standards for excellence, uphold the public trust and ensure that conservation efforts are permanent. The seal is a mark of distinction in land conservation.

A VES Land Trust team — Brown, Henderson, Gallagher and board member Suzanne Wescoat of Church Neck — spent most of 2010 on program assessment and improvement and completing the comprehensive accreditation application. Henderson said the final notebooks documenting the land trust's easements, stewardship and other activities rose more than a foot high when stacked.

"Accreditation made our organization dissect and study very closely how we operate, improving practices wherever we could," Wescoat said.

"We hold easements in perpetuity,

so it was vital to strengthen our organization as best we can. The process also enhanced the moral bond that our board and supporters feel to protect the land, that we must forever strive to do the best job we can," Wescoat added.



The U.S. House of Representatives' House Appropriations Committee has announced it will be sending a bill to the House floor that includes \$1.3 BILLION in cuts to health center funding, per the National Association of Community Health Centers (see NACHC.com).

Nationwide, per the health center associa-

tion, the proposed cuts would end the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (stimulus bill) funding for health centers, eliminating the capacity of health centers nationwide to treat 11 million patients. In Virginia, NACHC predicts that with the cuts to health centers, 93,519 patients would lose access to care, five health centers would close and just over \$5.5 million in funding would be lost.

Locally, Eastern Shore Rural Health Systems Inc.'s ability to care for its patients would be negatively impacted. Nearly 27,000 people chose one of ESRHS' five medical centers and three dental locations for their healthcare needs in 2010. ESRHS remains a key provider for the area's vulnerable populations — elderly, Medicaid/Medicare, uninsured, underinsured, Hispanic residents and children.

The Eastern Shore is a medical, dental and mental health manpower shortage area. We are challenged when it comes to recruiting physicians, dentists and mental health providers. These proposed funding cuts would inhibit our ability to recruit healthcare professionals.

Recognizing the need for our country to have a balanced budget, access to comprehensive, quality medicine should not suffer in this effort. The federal dollars that are invested in community health centers have yielded a return on investment measured not only in dollars, but in health outcomes. Community health centers like Eastern Shore Rural Health have been recognized as an affordable solution to the healthcare crisis. Eastern Shore Rural Health is able to return \$4 in health services for each of your tax dollars. In addition, this investment afforded over \$1 million in pharmacy assistance to uninsured patients and provided over \$49,000 in pediatric safety services.


