# First-Degree Murder Charge Sent to Grand Jury

Murder suspect Michael Anthony Press repeatedly shook his head "No" while evidence against him mounted during a preliminary hearing Monday in Accomack General District Court.

Testimony included gory details about the Nov. 8, 2014, death of Accomack Schools bus driver Leon Sylvester Harmon. Eventually, Judge Gordon Vincent found probable cause to certify to a grand jury a charge of first-degree murder against Press, 46, of Fleming Road in Horntown. The judge also ordered Press to continue to be held in the county jail without bond.

And for the first time the cause of death for Harmon, better known as Mother Child, 61, also of Horntown, was discussed publicly. Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar presented the autopsy report to Judge Vincent, who read from the document that Harmon died of "blunt force trauma to head" with an "attributing wound to neck" which was also caused by "blunt force."

Lt. Gerald Goga of Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) took photographs of Harmon, who was found in his pick-up truck. "The first wound was across the throat," Goga testified, adding that a cut was made "from the side of the neck to the lower part of throat (that was) at least an inch deep."

The officer said there were "more wounds on the forehead to the right." There was so much damage it was "impossible for me to say how many actual wounds there were," Goga told the court.

Sgt. Anthony Bright testified he spoke to Press after reading him his rights and before the defendant requested a lawyer. Bright made notes on a form, but Press never signed it.

"I believe it was self-defense," Bright said Press told him. Bright said Press was "coming down" from a drug. "When I told him that Mr. Harmon was dead ... he advised that he might need a lawyer."

Deputy Vincent Lee said when Press was

# Body Found at Horntown Blaze

An unidentified body was found Tuesday night at the scene of a fire in Horntown, Sheriff Todd Godwin reported the following day.

The blaze was called in to the Eastern Shore 9-1-1 Center at about 10:50 p.m. from Trails End campground

"After firefighters arrived at the scene and extinguished the fire, a body was discovered inside the structure," Godwin said. The Accomack County Sheriff's Office and Virginia State Police were notified and responded to the incident.

"An investigation into this incident is ongoing and the body of the deceased has been transported to the Medical Examiner's Office in Norfolk for identification and to determine the cause of death," Godwin said.

A spokesperson for the 9-1-1- Center said units from New Church, Greenbackville, Atlantic, Oak Hall, Greenbackville and Stockton, Md., responded to the call.

### **Parent Charges Schools With Illegal Hiring Practices**

Margaret Hampton of Onancock has been complaining for a while that Accomack County school officials fail to adequately advertise job openings, while practicing "nepotism and cronyism."

She recently claimed to the School Board that the whole truth was not disclosed by the division regarding the hiring of relatives of administrators in a response to her Freedom of Information (FOIA) request.

"Rather than accept gossip, I seek (to) gather facts about alleged nepotism, cronyism or favoritism," Hampton wrote in a letter to School Board Chairwoman Margaret Miles, Vice Chairman Travis Thornton and Superintendent Dr. Kregg Cuellar.

"To be clear," she stated, "it is not nepotism simply to have an employee who is a relative. It is admirable when multiple members of a family dedicate their careers to public education. Nepotism, cronyism or favoritism — hiring one applicant over more suitable appli-

cants — is not to be tolerated."

Hampton's FOIA request garnered two responses from Assistant Superintendent Dr. Rhonda Hall, who left out her "own mother, son and sister, and the daughter and sister of Marybeth Haines, Elementary School coordinator," according to Hampton.

She asked for a list of all relatives who worked with the division between 2007 and when the request was made would be listed.

"Dr. Hall's response is the last straw for me," Hampton said. "She had no problem digging up Margaret Miles' relatives and (School Board member) Paul Bull, but somehow could not remember her mother and son. And cousin ... I cannot think that this was a 'mistake' or 'oversight,' but instead was an intentional attempt to mislead."

In her letter, Hampton charges, "This constitutes falsifying an FOIA request report and is grounds for license revocation." She references 8VAC20-22-690 of the state license regulations, "A license issued by the Board of Education

may be revoked for ... falsification of school records, documents, statistics, or reports."

Hampton got the response from Hall on Feb. 2. But after she publicly told the School Board about the omissions on Feb. 3, she received another answer from Hall which added relatives who were previously omitted.

"Why has it come to the point that a parent is investigating this at all?" Hampton asked. "Have you all investigated and found HR performance to be stellar, and clear of any nepotism, cronyism and favoritism? Do you care more about the jobs of a few than the future of the children of Accomack County? And how has that been working for us?"

"If you think I am alone, you are wrong," she continued. "I have been encouraged by a diverse cross-section of our community to continue to address this. To the public, it looks like School Board oversight of Human Resources has been so lax that nothing is out of bounds."

Hampton also cited "accusations of resumes of non-favored applicants being 'lost.' Jobs go unlisted yet are filled by family and friends of the Assistant Superintendent. As late as November 2014, a position was filled by the son of the Elementary School coordinator without the position being posted and with no recruitment. I have many, many names and dates for hires like this."

"In your buildings there is outrage. Building faculty and staff will not confront this issue out of fear of retribution. The fact that the School Board has not taken action regarding underperformance, nepotism, cronyism and favoritism results in frustration and low morale at the building level."

Hampton also complained that on Jan. 20, the division's budget priorities included a behavioral specialist at \$65,000. Dr. Hall's son, Chester Hall,was moved to that position with a \$9,000 increase in pay. Hampton questioned his qualifications as a previous marketing teacher.





# **Controversial School Retirement Program To Be Eliminated**

Accomack's School Board voted Tuesday night to phase out its Early Retire Option (ERO) in an effort to please the Board of Supervisors.

But when supervisors met Wednesday, some still weren't happy despite last month's threats to withhold money from the school system if it didn't abolish the benefit.

After much debate, the supervisors ended what was supposed to be their last budget work session without setting a financial plan for public hearing. The consensus was that more time is needed to study the school's nearly \$46 million proposal that includes salary hikes for teachers, classified workers and bus drivers and comes with a shortfall of about \$379,000.

Superintendent Dr. Kregg Cuellar left the room after taking a Hilary Clinton village stance. "I hope we can find a resolution soon (regarding ERO) because I want to get back to the subject that matters ... children," he said. "Our children need every single person on the front line ... to get every single student ready" for their future. "I know every single one of you want to see our children be successful and we're hitting a road bump."

The new retirement benefit requires eligible employees to apply and be accepted into the program on or before May 8, 2015. Effective July 1, the newest participants can participate for seven years.

Those who aren't ready to retire or don't have quite enough time in, could be out of luck. The fear is that teachers would hurry to join and create a bigger problem for the division — large numbers of vacancies.

"They are starting to sign up as we speak," Cuellar said. "It's not going to be easy ... we have to be ready." Cuellar said the most experienced instructors are feeling "unappreciated" and "disrespected."

The new program won't allow former Superintendent Rick Bull to participate. Officials have complained Bull was paid as much as \$1,200 a day to serve as a recruiter with the old policy. The amended plan limits participants to 10 percent of his or her contracted salary earned during the last

year of full-time employment with the school division or \$605 per day to fill in, whichever is less. Participants must sign a contract that requires them to work 10 days annually.

The old plan allowed workers with 30 years of experience in Virginia and at least 15 years with Accomack to retire early. The School Board "reserved the right to terminate the plan if it is not in the best interests of the school division" or if adequate funding isn't available.

Supervisors Wanda Thornton, Kay Lewis and Ron Wolff wanted to stop the program immediately. Supervisor Donald Hart, a retired teacher who participated in the incentive for a "short time," said he'd have to abstain from a vote. Supervisor Jack Gray, a former school administrator, favored the phaseout.

Thornton also asked staff to determine how much it would cost to provide such a benefit to other county workers.

"Why in the world would you encourage a teacher to retire at 50 years old when they are some of your best?" Thornton rhetorically asked. "All of that money could have been used to increase salaries. I can't support something that costs over \$400,000 a year." The 20-year veteran supervisor was "disturbed" because she was unaware of the retirement plan until former Superintendent Bruce Benson told her of it a couple of years ago.

Wolff had no sympathy for the workers as none was given to him when paid health insurance was taken away from the supervisors. "To this day, I don't get paid by the county," he said. "I pay the county every month ... for insurance ... there's nothing guaranteed in this life."

"There's no way anyone can straighten up this mess without hurting someone," said Chesser. "I hate it. I hate to think about the kids who are going to lose good teachers (and) the teachers who have made their plans counting on this... I don't know the answer."

Only Supervisor Robert Crockett offered a plan to balance the budget. He suggested cutting back from 11 new school buses to seven, reducing spending by \$360,000. Crockett praised the school's proposal because 71 percent goes to instruction while the national goal is 65 percent.

A volunteer firefighter and his family were left homeless Monday after flames and smoke destroyed their single-story, wood-frame home near Temperanceville, according to Atlantic Volunteer Fire & Rescue Company Chief David Grant.

Pocomoke, Md., firefighters came to the general area to be on alert in case another call came in, Grant said. Firefighters arrived at the scene to find "heavy fire coming out of the rear of the structure," said Grant. They stayed on the scene for about 3.5 hours. A State Police fire investigator is investigating the cause of the blaze, the chief added.

#### Northampton Looks To Pare Budget; Finance Director Leaving

The Northampton Board of Supervisors conducted a special budget session Wednesday to whittle the multi-million-dollars in requests for funding.

As the session began, Finance Director Leslie Lewis announced that she would be stepping down later this month to accept a position in Maryland. The supervisors thanked Lewis for her efforts to keep the county's finances on an even keel.

One by one, Chairman Rick Hubbard called on each of the more than 30 non-county agencies. Each was given five minutes to plead its case. Most asked for the same funding they had received in FY 2015 while some, such as the 911 system, asked for additional money.

Following a brief break, county agencies addressed the board to detail the reasons for requesting additional funding. The additional funding requests covered such things as painting and upkeep for the county's water system and replacement vehicles for several agencies.

The supervisors began to look at ways to increase revenues to help offset the new budget requests.

Supervisor Larry LeMond suggested a business tax that would take the place of the current \$30 flat fee for a county business license. Other suggestions included raising tipping fees at the solid waste facility or even a tax increase.

Once the board finalizes the budget proposal, a public hearing will be scheduled.



oysters and, if not recovered, will represent a significant loss for the Tangier watermen. As many as 175 of the floats have gone missing, some washing up on beaches as far south as Virginia Beach.

He will notify the watermen, who will arrange to retrieve the cages, which should be kept in water and secured to a dock or pier, if possible, to increase oyster survival.

The missing floating cages (pictured) are approximately 3 feet long, 3 feet wide, and 2 feet deep and are attached to black plastic floats approximately 3 feet long and 1 foot wide.

#### **Exmore Town Employees Garner Praise**

Exmore Mayor Doug Greer and Police Chief Angelo DiMartino formally promoted patrolman Marc Marshall to the rank of corporal with the town's police force at Monday's Town Council's session.

Council praised the force for answering all requests for assistance during recent wintry weather. Additional praise was given to the Public Works and Public Utility departments, whose employees repaired the town's many broken pipes and water leaks resulting from the excessively cold temperatures. Greer noted that the employees had worked all hours to stem the flow of water pumping needlessly from the ground.

Councilman G.W. Adkins asked Public Utilities Director Taylor Dukes if the town should begin setting aside money to replace the town's aging water pipes, some of which date back half a century. Dukes and Town Manager Robert Duer replied that there is no way to save enough funds since the cost would be approximately \$1 million per mile of pipes and there are about 10 miles of large water mains in addition to a number of smaller ones that weave through the community.

Asked by Greer during a discussion on the budget whether the Police Department has body cameras, DiMartino noted that most already wear them and he hopes to outfit the remaining two officers with them soon.

Council discussed the option of purchasing a backhoe and/or skid loader to help access underground pipes and valves in town. Dukes said he had investigated options that could run as much as \$40,000 should council wish to move in that direction. Duer noted that he and Dukes will continue investigating the matter and report back to council before the next meeting.

Council agreed to award a \$192,000 contract to drill new wells for the town's water supply to Somerset Well and Drilling Company.

Duer presented the proposed 1,905,282 FY2016 budget to council for review prior to making a decision on it later in the spring. It would require no tax increase.



#### Planning Commission Forwards Plan for New Restaurant to Supervisors

The Northampton County Planning Commission conducted a public hearing Tuesday to solicit comments on a proposed restaurant in Kiptopeke.

Kiptopeke Villas, LLC requested approval for a small restaurant of less than 2,500 square feet near the intersection of Kiptopeke Drive and Butlers Bluff Drive, on the approach to the entrance to Kiptopeke State Park.

Speaking for the applicant, Bill Parr said the current Comprehensive Plan supports small commercial interests and therefore, the project fits the scope of the plan.

The one-story building would have a wrap-around covered porch and would be designed to fit in with other buildings in the immediate area.

Noting that a service station had been located in the area, Parr said the state Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has investigated the site and found no indication of soil contamination.

The applicant had previously re-

ceived approval by the Board of Supervisors to construct a three-unit residential facility on the same parcel. While the parcel once was zoned commercial, it is currently identified as part of a "hamlet."

Charles Bruckner of Kiptopeke expressed concerns over the possibility of underground fuel storage tanks that might remain from the earlier service station. Bruckner claimed the supervisors acted improperly by approving the applicant's request to build three residential units on the site. He also expressed concerns that the residential units were designed without firewalls between the units.

In response, it was noted that the units would be required to meet the county's building codes to be approved for occupancy.

Roberta Kellam also opposed the planned restaurant echoing Bruckner's concerns over possible fuel contamination from the service station that ceased operation half a century ago. Kellam also said it is unusual for one parcel of property to receive two special-use permits.

Tom Ramsey and Dick Churchill spoke in opposition to the planned restaurant, voicing concern that parking would be an issue for recreational vehicles and boats.

Christine Snook spoke in opposition to it being on the same site with other structures.

County Long Range Planner Peter Stith introduced petitions and letters of support into the record from eight individuals, as well as one in opposition.

Following the public comments, Commissioner Mike Ward noted that other parcels in the county are designated with multiple uses. He added that any concern can be addressed by County Attorney Bruce Jones.

The commissioners agreed to forward the application to the Board of Supervisors for review at its session March 10.

In other business Martina Coker voiced opposition to the way the Planning Commission is handling the Comprehensive Plan. She charged that commissioners had not listened to public comment during the past three years of the review process.

Roberta Kellam, Wendy Martin, and Mary Miller echoed Coker's comments.

Willis Wharf resident Art Schwartschild charged that the county has ignored the desires of his community, as well as those of Ovster.

Additionally, Schwartschild pressed for the county to keep the provisions of the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act in place for the seaside.

Wardtown resident Ken Dufty charged that the county is reviewing the Comprehensive Plan and revising the Zoning Ordinance in an improper manner. He said the results of surveys conducted by the county several years ago are being ignored and he criticized some members of the Planning Commissioners and the Board of Supervisors for the way they are handling the process. He concluded that the work has been a waste of taxpaver money and should be started over.



# CAPITAL LETTERS

s the 2015 Virginia General Assembly closes, agreement was reached relatively early on Virginia's budget.

All three versions of the bud-

get — the amendments submitted by the governor, the Senate Finance version, and the House Appropriations version — contained approximately \$36 billion in General Fund spending, and the conference version was at \$37 billion.

Throughout the budget-writing process, tax revenues continued to improve leveling what appeared to be a severe constraint on Virginia's budget. An additional \$642 million in higher than expected tax collections, along with a limited set of reduction in tax credits programs and technical changes eased the pressure on budget writers to make cuts additional to the significant cuts in state spending that were made last spring and through 2014.

Unfortunately, part of that restructuring involved lowering the land preservation tax credit program cap from \$100 million to approximately \$75 million. We have a robust and very successful land preservation effort on the Eastern Shore, and it was unfortunate

to see the reduction in this cap. While the cap has not been reached in recent years because of the depressed economy, it is still, I believe, a setback for the program, one of the best in the nation. I was one of a handful of senators to vote against the bill which changed the structure of the program.

K-12 public education funding was held harmless and was essentially even throughout all versions of the budget, including the final Conference Report. The Governor's Access Plan ("GAP") to provide limited medical and mental-health coverage to people with serious mental illness was weakened considerably in the Conference Report. The report contained \$153 million for long-delayed pay raises, including 2 percent for state employees, 4.5 percent for teachers, and additional funds to deal with salary "compression" issues which have plagued a number of state employees and, in particular, the State Police.

The budget also includes a \$130 million deposit into the state's Revenue Stabilization or "Rainy Day Fund," which is the state's emergency savings account.

In the closing days, we continued to deal with somewhat contentious issues. In particular was a frequent issue before the Virginia General Assembly which this year made significant headway, and that was HB 1626, the "Tebow Bill," which sought to allow home-schooled children to participate in public high-school athlet-

ics. Over the years, I have consistently voted against this bill. However, this year, the bill was improved by placing certain requirements for the homeschooled students before they could participate, including a fee for participation. I still had some concerns about the bill and voted against it when it came before the Health and Education Committee; however, on the floor of the Senate, an amendment was added, for the first time since it has been coming before the Assembly, to make it a local option. That is, each local School Board can decide whether home-schoolers will be allowed to participate. While I do not believe it is the correct policy to impose upon the commonwealth as a whole, making it a local option changed my mind and I voted for the bill.

HB 2114, "the Bake Sale Bill," would specifically allow a limited number of fund-raisers to be held in schools that use "non-competitive foods" to raise funds. It is what we used to simply refer to as a bake sale. It is somewhat troubling that we have to have bills on things such as allowing bake sales in our high schools. I think we are all keenly aware of a need for emphasis on better nutrition, but I do not think bake sales pose a significant threat to the public health of the commonwealth.

I served on the conference committee for HB 1298 which imposes stricter limits for stopping noncommercial vessels on Virginia waters. The bill requires a reasonable suspicion that a violation of law or regulation exists to make a stop. This was similar to SB1439 which I supported in committee and on the floor of the Senate. The bill also includes adequate safeguards

so as not to unreasonably impede law enforcement.

I was very pleased that the budget contained enough funding for agricultural best-management practices costshare to reach the hold harmless level so that we are not going backward. This funding is important for agriculture and certainly agriculture is important to our local economy. It is also very important as we continue progress and momentum on improving the health of the Chesapeake Bay. The value of that resource to our entire state's economy, whether from fisheries or tourism, cannot be overstated. I was pleased to be a part of that effort by sponsoring a budget amendment increasing cost-share funding.

I was also very happy to see a budget amendment which Sen. Kenneth Alexander and I co-patroned become part of the final budget. It provides important funding for Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters.

We return to Richmond on April 15 for the constitutionally required "Veto Session," also known as the "Reconvened Session." We receive and deal with the governor's vetoes, as well as his suggested amendments to various legislation.

After that session, I will hold my usual series of post-General Assembly town halls across the Sixth Senate District.

This has been a productive and civil session. It continues to be a privilege to serve the Sixth Senate District.

The legislators adjourned the 2015 General Assembly session a day early and will reconvene for the veto session in approximately six weeks. At that

time, the governor will have signed the bills into law or sent them back to us with amendments or vetoes. We passed some innovative measures that move Virginia in the right direction. The first and most important thing is appropriating money. The budget this year is \$1 billion less than last year, but we focused on core functions of government. We gave state employees a much overdue raise. We also made protecting the Second Amendment a focus, but many of those initiatives will be scrutinized by our governor. We reformed SOL testing and gave local school districts more flexibility. In higher education, we put a cap on student activity

fees and asked the colleges to figure a program that could charge a flat fee for degrees in high-demand fields. We adjusted the transportation funding formula, which should help localities with local road projects and we made the Virginia ABC an authority, away from a government board so it could be run more like a business.

Much of our energy was spent on adjusting laws to accommodate federal mandates.

The last issue that made a lot of press was about ethics. After all the problems of the last governor, the leaders in the House and Senate wanted to ensure the public that we are not for sale. The basic meaning of the new law is the legislature will not take any gift, tangible or intangible, valued at more than \$100 and must report on a public searchable website all gifts over \$50. All travel needs to be pre-approved by an ethics committee.

The \$5 clinics are held each year in late January, to coincide with the pet license year, and to bring pet vaccination opportunities to remote and underserved areas of

arrested, the front of his shirt and pants were blood-stained. Blood was also on the tops of his shoes. Lee collected the clothes for analysis. "There were no scratches or bruises on his body" when Press took the garments off, the deputy added.

According to a search warrant filed in circuit court, a razor blade and other items were confiscated from Press' home. Harmon was found dead in the truck at the end of Coal Kall Lane, near his home. He had "blunt force trauma to the head area and the chest, which is consistent with murder," the warrant states. It also notes that Press' hand was swollen.

Witnesses said they gathered at Warren Lee Ross' house in Horntown to play cards on the night of Nov. 7.

Michael Mills said he and Press got a ride there. The witness said he had smoked about \$20 worth of cocaine and was drinking beer and watching television while others played cards. About an hour after they arrived, Mills said, Press pulled a gun on Clifton Marshall of New Church, accused him of cheating and struck him with the firearm.

Marshall had been betting with Harmon when Press (who wasn't playing cards) hit Marshall, according to testimony.

Mills decided to walk home and was on his way when Harmon and Press passed him in Harmon's pick-up. Harmon was driving, he said. When Mills got to Press' house, he saw Press beating Harmon.

"Leon was not moving. He (Press) just kept beating. I hollered, 'Michael Press, what are you doing?' He never looked up at me or nothing." Then, Mills said, he watched as Press grabbed Harmon and dragged him to the truck.

Mills said Ross drove up and "I told him to call 9-1-1 because Michael Press was beating on Leon ... he didn't have a phone and he pulled off" to alert police.

"No, sir," Mills told Agar, "I didn't see him (Harmon) move. He (Press) got in the driver's seat and started driving ... he almost ran over me."

Several men drove to Harmon's

house, but stayed back because they knew Press was armed, according to testimony. They said they saw Press run from the yard and into the woods. When they approached the pick-up, the passenger side door was open and Harmon's body was hanging out.

"He was beat up and no sir, there was nothing I could do for him," Mills testified.

Gardner Fosque, another Horntown resident, said that during the card game, when Press "pulled a gun out, I took off running. I didn't see anything. I didn't leave. I just ran outside."

When he did depart, he said, he saw Mills along the road and was told about the beating. "I told Mike Mills, 'Jump in, man, and we'll go up there and stop him' ... When I got up there, I turned my headlights toward Mother Child's house. Michael Press was standing ... behind the truck. He took off and started running in the woods ... he's got a gun, so there ain't nothing we can do."

Marshall said he saw Press "patting Leon's pockets" before he ran off. Harmon "was motionless. He was just lying in the yard."

# Local Players Competing on College Diamonds

Somewhere in a sunnier land they are playing baseball. Sometime soon, after the last snowflake is gone, baseball and softball will start on the Shore.

But the college season is in full swing despite frosty temperatures and frequent snowfalls.

Down in Columbia, S.C., Hunter Taylor has started four of the 11 University of South Carolina baseball games, sharing catching duties with sophomore Logan Koch.

The freshman out of Nandua High School has impressed Gamecock coach Chad Holbrook, who said after Taylor's first start, "I love what Hunter Taylor did behind the plate."

After going 0-for-3 Monday against a tough Clemson pitching staff that shut out fifth-ranked South Carolina while allowing only four hits, Taylor is hitting .214 with a pair of RBIs.

Coach Holbrook has often stated he believes Taylor will provide some offensive punch to his lineup, and as the temperatures warm, look for Taylor to start making contributions at the plate in addition to handling the Gamecock pitchers.

The 5'11", 210-pound Taylor caught several of the South Carolina hurlers for several seasons as a member the Evoshields Canes, one of the nation's top travel teams that won the 2013 PG WWBA World Championship.

At Nandua last year, Taylor hit .554 with 12 homers and 39 RBIs while being named Player of the Year for 2A baseball in Virginia.

Ryan Haynie, Taylor's teammate at Nandua last year, is the starting shortstop for Hampden-Syndney this season as a freshman.

Haynie is hitting .375 with six hits in 16 at-bats, including a double and four RBIs.

Haynie, who was Honorable Mention All-State at Nandua last year and the Warriors' top pitcher with a 6-1 record and a 1.13 ERA, also will pitch for the Tigers as the schedule gets packed with make-up games. Hampden-Sydney's last six games have been postponed due to inclement weather.

Austin Heenan, who led Nandua to consecutive appearances in the Final Four in 2012 and 2013, is now pitching for VMI. He has pitched only two innings thus far as the Keydets have played just three games in a Florida tournament but have yet to get in a game at Lexington.

Last year, the southpaw made 18 appearances for VMI, pitching to a 3.75 ERA in relief. Heenan is expected to see some starting assignments as VMI gets into its season. Heenan was 7-0 his senior season at Nandua with two no-hitters while being named to the first team All-State 2A squad.

Whitney Davis, a three-sport star at Nandua, is making a significant contri-

bution for the Radford softball team as a junior third baseman.

Davis is hitting .368 with a teamleading two homers and nine RBIs in only seven games for the Highlanders.

At Nandua, Davis was the Region A and Eastern District Player of the Year in softball and a two-time first-team state honoree while also garnering four All-District first-team honors in volley-ball and three more in basketball.

Janay Joseph, a sophomore at Virginia State who was a key player in Nandua's softball dominance during her high-school career, is a sophomore for the Trojans, playing behind an All-CIAA selection at catcher. She has one hit in limited action as Virginia State has played only five games to date.

In addition, South Carolina games often appear on the SEC network or

one of the ESPN stations.

And here's a shout-out to Liz Hipple, who finished her softball career at Chowan last season. I wrote two years ago about her remarkable comeback from a serious brain injury to rejoin her team as a junior outfielder. But I never recapped her senior season, when she was the only Hawks player to start all 48 games. She led her team in hits (57), RBIs (48), and doubles (39) while hitting .370.

The former Chincoteague star was

a Dean's List student at Chowan, despite missing almost a month her sophomore season recovering from an accident and spending time at a trauma center.

Belated congrats to Hipple on a great comeback.

Undoubtedly, the town needs a better website. (For the past two


