Woman Dies After Car Plunges Over B-T

Divers located the body of a Virginia Beach woman and her car after about eight hours of searching Tuesday for a vehicle that crashed through a Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel (CBBT) guardrail and plunged into the deep waters below.

Tom Anderson of the CBBT identified the driver as Jean Calcagno, 51. She apparently was alone in the gold 2007 Toyota Avalon when the accident occurred at around 8:30 a.m.

"The evidence at the scene indicated she veered suddenly to the left at a 60 degree angle," Anderson said. It is unknown why, he added.

Initially, witnesses reported the vehicle was a silver SUV. But Anderson said that based on video taken at the north toll plaza, authorities soon realized it was a gold car. "Pieces of the debris have matched up with that," he said before the body was found.

Agencies involved in the search included in the U.S. Coast Guard, Virginia Beach Police, Virginia Marine Resources Police, CBBT police and bridge-tunnel fire and maintenance workers. The incident occurred at the 8-mile post between the two tunnels. Traffic in both southbound lanes was stopped for nearly two hours.

The Coast Guard Cutter *Beluga*, two 45-foot response boatcrews from Coast Guard Station Little Creek, one 25-foot response boatcrew from Coast Guard Station Cape Charles and a Coast Guard HH-60 rescue helicopter crew from Coast Guard Air Station Elizabeth City, N.C., were dispatched to the scene. A crew from the Coast Guard's Regional Dive Locker East also assisted in the search efforts.

Anderson said a second accident occurred shortly after the first in the same general location, probably as a result of drivers slowing down to look at the scene. No one was seriously injured.

Supervisors Debate Propriety of Administering District Funds

Former Accomack Sheriff Robert Crockett says the "legal" way is not always the "right" way.

Now a county supervisor, the former lawman wants individual supervisors to stop being in charge of district funds because of possible political implications.

In the past five years, the spending has totaled more than \$409,000.

"It looks bad," he told the rest of the board Wednesday. "It looks terrible. Just because it makes it legal doesn't make it right. It's not good business."

When Crockett stepped in to fill an unexpired term in January, he said he immediately wanted to change the situation. "It could become political," he said, adding that it allows supervisors to donate

money to nonprofit organizations and potentially could allow them to withhold funds for other needs, based on favoritism. He specifically mentioned the local Little League. Many of the districts give to local volunteer fire departments.

Crockett said that while the full board must approve the spending, the items are put under the consent agenda and voted on in a bundle. Crockett suggested that Public Works Director Stewart Hall be in charge of the funds to be spent only on drainage, boat ramps and clean-up programs.

"If it's not broke, don't fix it," said Chairman Donald Hart. He asked Hall if he was aware of anything unethical taking place.

"No sir," answered Hall. However, the director lat-

er added that sometimes priorities are chosen among drainage projects.

Hart had reservations about putting the responsibility all on Hall. Hart said that while he knows Hall is honest, a future director could "show partiality too."

Supervisor Wanda Thornton said "equal treatment" among districts would not prevail with a joint fund. She admitted she donated money to the North Accomack Little League but stressed that it was used to make improvements to county-owned property.

"I understand your concern," she told Crockett. "But you've blown (the issue) just a little bit out of proportion."

Accomack Citizens Describe Ideal Superintendent

If the public has its way, the next superintendent of Accomack County Public Schools will hold a doctorate, have high-school teaching experience and be a visionary, creative thinker.

That description was portrayed in results of an online survey conducted recently by the school system and open to the public. Today is the last day applications for the job will be accepted. Superintendent Rick Bull is retiring in June at the end of his third four-year contract.

There were 318 survey takers. Not everyone answered all of the questions and in some cases, more than one answer could be chosen. A breakdown of participants showed 98 parents, 104 teachers, nine PTA/PTO members, 49 who consider themselves "other," four members of a civic organization, 10 school administrators, six chamber of commerce members or business owners, one social organization owner and 37 school employees.

A doctorate is a preferred require-

ment of approximately 40 percent of the participants, while 21.1 percent or 67 said the degree was not important.

Nearly 29 percent (79) said they believe experience as a superintendent is essential, while 53.8 percent (148) said it is preferred and 17.8 percent (49) said it is unimportant.

The majority (44.8 percent, 125 participants) said experience as an associate or assistant superintendent is preferred; 43.1 percent (121) said it should be required and 12.8 percent (36) said it is unimportant. The majority (43.8 percent, 119) said the new job holder should have held a Central Office administration position, while 38.6 percent said it would be preferred and 19.1 percent (52) said it is not necessary.

Nearly 71 percent (201 participants) said the superintendent should be someone who previously served as a school principal, while 23.2 percent (66) said it is preferred and 6.7 percent said it is unimportant.

Ninety-three percent (294 participants) said teaching experience is a

must. Forty-seven percent (136 survey takers) said the superintendent should have experience teaching high school, while 35.5 percent (102) said it is preferred and 17.4 percent (50) said it is not important. More than 40 percent (110) said they prefer the teaching experience be at the elementary-school level, while 38 percent (104) said it should be required and nearly 22 percent (60) said it is unimportant.

The majority (43.1 percent) said they want the superintendent to be someone who has worked or works for Accomack schools. More than 32 percent said they prefer it and nearly 26 percent said it is unimportant.

Most of the survey participants or nearly 51 percent (161) said they want the new superintendent's leadership/management skill to be visionary and creative. Nearly 49 percent (155) said they want a team player who is comfortable with shared decision making, while 47.5 percent (151) said being organized and efficient is vital. Nearly 39 percent (123) said writing and speaking ability is important. Nearly 43 percent said a motivator is needed. Less than 10 percent said a risk taker should be hired. Less than 7 percent said having a high community profile is important.

Personal characteristics also were reviewed. More than 70 percent (223) participants said a good listener who is accessible is important. More than 52 percent (166) said consistency is needed and 37.1 percent (115) said the top job should be given to someone who is enthusiastic. Sixteen percent said sense of humor is needed, 19.5 percent

said the superintendent should work behind the scenes, 16.4 percent said he or she should be creative, 23.3 percent said confidence is a vital trait and 22.6 percent said intellect is needed.

Nearly 170 participants said a superintendent should effectively mediate and accommodate different perspectives. The highest majority (214) also said the superintendent should create an atmosphere of trust and mutual respect. Nearly 245 said the new job holder should be able to effectively advocate school issues and needs.

More than 70 percent (224) said the superintendent should lobby for school funding on behalf of the school district. The majority said curriculum and instruction are the most important areas of expertise a new superintendent should possess.

The School Board expects to hire someone by July 1. An announcement regarding the position was made by the School Board and included the following requirements:

- Experience as a superintendent or Central Office administrator, in addition to principal and teacher;
- Experience in the areas of instruction, curriculum and school finance;
- Ability to lobby for school funding and create an atmosphere of mutual trust and respect;
- Enthusiasm, consistency, creativity, confidence, fairness, and belief that all children have value and the ability to learn;
- Shared decision-making approach to administration; visionary and effective leadership in goal setting and planning;
- Superior code of ethics with proven leadership;
- Evidence of continuing advanced studies; doctorate preferred;
- Positive interaction with employees, parent organizations, students, civic groups, School Board, local governing body and community businesses.

To be considered for this position, candidates must be on Virginia's Superintendent Eligibility List or meet the qualifications for the Eligibility List. The candidate must agree to become a resident of Accomack County within 90 days of assuming the duties of superintendent.

Accomack Superintendent Reports School Statistics

Accomack County Public Schools have nearly 385 fewer students now than a decade ago. It costs \$10,263 each to educate the nearly 4,855 students.

In a letter to Accomack County Administrator Steve Miner written earlier this month, Superintendent Rick Bull said there were 5,239 students on March 31, 2000, compared to 4,855 on the same day in 2010. "Our current projections estimate our March 31, 2016 ADM (adjusted daily members) at 4,845," Bull wrote in his monthly report in answer to an inquiry from Supervisor Wanda Thornton.

The superintendent also wrote about the division's graduation rate in response to a question posed last month by Supervisor Grayson Chesser. Bull said, "The On-Time Graduation Rate for Accomack County Public Schools was 69.9% as documented by the Virginia Department of Education"

on Feb. 11. "This percentage is based on longitudinal student-level data and accounts for student mobility and retention and promotion patterns. This figure reflects the percentage of students who earn diplomas within four years of entering high school for the first time."

Bull continued, "The dropout rate is 16.6 percent. ... This figure reflects the percentage of students who drop out within four years of entering high school for the first time. The annual dropout rate for ... grades 7-12 is 3.35%."

Chesser also inquired about the per pupil expenditure (PPE). Bull said the total cost per student is \$10,263 compared to a statewide average of \$11,316. A breakdown shows the local share is \$3,115 compared to the statewide average of \$5,504. The state cost for each student is \$4,953 compared to the statewide average of \$4,175. The superintendent said the state sales tax spent per student is \$976 in Accomack compared to the state average of \$908. The federal cost per student is \$1,219 compared to \$729 for a statewide average. The results for fiscal year 2010 are expected to be released by the state Education Department in April.

Bull said 27 positions were saved with increased local funding of \$730,000 in the current budget. The superintendent added that the division expects to get \$21,303 in state money above what was received in the current budget. "There are still adjustments pending for students enrolled in virtual public-school programs which have not been included in this template," Bull said.

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Public Comments Sought on Wallops Improvements

NASA is seeking comments from the public on its draft Environmental Assessment (EA) of potential impacts from proposed improvements at the Wallops Flight Facility main base entrance.

NASA is proposing to improve the main base entrance to increase personnel safety and decrease congestion.

From 2006 to 2010, the facility has seen an increase in traffic from an average of 1,200 vehicles to approximately 3,000 vehicles per day, respectively. In addition, the facility processed more than 37,600 temporary badges in 2010. This is up from around 15,600 in 2006.

Currently, the building for issuing badges for Wallops visitors is located at the main base entrance. This results in people walking through traffic and creates congestion at the gate.

The project, which would be implemented in either two or four phases, would first entail constructing a new badging office just south of the main entrance on Atlan-

tic Road. Next, the existing intersection of Mill Dam and Atlantic roads would be reconfigured as a traffic circle. In the final phase of the project, NASA would move its shipping and receiving building from inside the main base to a site adjacent to the new badge office.

Accomack Building Permits Down

The number of building permits issued in Accomack County for the first two months of 2011 was down significantly compared to the same months in previous years, according to a chart prepared for county officials by the Building and Zoning Department

There were 66 permits issued in January 2010 compared to 30 in the same month this year. The first month of 2009 showed 55 permits. In January of 2008, there were 49 issued. The information was part of the county supervisors' agenda packet.

Last month, 33 permits were obtained compared to 50 last year, 61 in 2009 and 54 in 2008.

The report also showed there were 898 permits issued in 2008 compared to 840 in 2009 and 848 in 2010. The most permits (102) were obtained in April of 2008.

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Northampton School Planners Focus on Future Needs

Northampton School Finance Director Brook Thomas provided the School Board an update Wednesday on projected fuel costs for the remainder of the year and noted that with the recent rise in prices, the fuel oil and diesel fuel costs would put the system well over budget by thousands of dollars.

In a related area, the board approved the proposed Capital Improvement Plan, which outlines a series of structural improvements for each school over the next eight years. Thomas noted that the recommendation to construct a new high school was removed for the present time.

Board Chairman Dr. Richard Drury noted that the Board of Supervisors has asked the School Board to endorse a request that Riverside Medical Group insure that a medical facility remain in Northampton County. Board

member Mickey Merritt said that the long distances associated with the hospital moving to the northern part of Accomack County would put students at risk. Additionally, students in the lower end of the county could be transported to a facility in Hampton Roads as opposed to the Eastern Shore, which would place undue transportation and financial problems on family members in the county. The cutoff point for the decision to go north or south would be just below Eastville, thus putting students and staff at Kiptopeke Elementary School in the group that could be sent across the bay for care. The School Board agreed to the need to press Riverside to maintain some form of emergency care facility in Northampton County. Riverside has indicated that an urgent-care facility might remain in the county, but would not likely be open on a 24/7 basis.



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Extensive Sewage System Would Cost Tens of Millions

As the result of a \$50,000 study funded by a government grant, Accomack officials have learned that \$50 million would be needed to build a regional sewer system to accommodate every potential piece of property in northern parts of the county.

A consulting firm representative explained details to local supervisors Wednesday and outlined ultimate growth potential. He said funds could be gained for the project through loans. The plan included mandatory hookup and a link from Chincoteague to Watts-ville, where a housing project is being planned.

"Why would folks with septic and wells be in favor?" asked Supervisor Grayson Chesser. "We're actually losing population."

At press time Thursday, Chincoteague officials were set to meet with the firm. The island plan was estimated to cost \$20 million (which was included in the total).

The firm representative said, "Chin-

coteague doesn't own any land over here (on the mainland). "They need more people to help pay for the cost." He further explained that the growth estimates were "a snapshot view" of the potential.

No action was taken.

In another matter, the supervisors reversed a recent decision and voted to spend \$113,000 to help with the first phase of bulkhead replacement at Quinby Harbor.

The supervisors also received an unsolicited plan to take trash out of the county at a cheaper rate than using landfill operations by using transfer stations and convenience centers. They agreed to open the prospect to other bidders and to further evaluate.

Wesley Edwards, who plans to run for the District 9 seat in November, complained that the board has not taken action as promised to advertise the names of delinquent taxpayers. He further said the government fails to make a monthly receivables report.

After more than an hour in closed ses-

sion, the supervisors voted to dissolve a land swap committee aimed at finding property to trade for parkland in the Wallops Research Park. The committee reported its finds, also in private, at a previous meeting. Edwards, Vice Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy (who was absent) and Supervisor Wanda Thornton served on the panel. Thornton said negotiations are continuing. Also discussed in the closed session was a personnel matter and "possible convenience center property."

The supervisors also unanimously directed staff to come back with property estimates and repair costs for Chincoteague Elementary School gym. Chincoteague officials asked that the county give the building to the town. An unidentified girl was recently hurt there. County Attorney Mark Taylor said underwriters disputed a claim that the injury was caused by peeling tiles.

"It's in deplorable condition," said Thornton. "We need to take a position to fix it up to standards or let Chincoteague have it."

Newly appointed Supervisor Reneta Major said she is glad be back on the board. She reminded the others that they set the public hearing for the upcoming budget without input from District 9. The budget can be reduced but not increased at this stage without being advertised again.

Former AHS Teacher Slain

Former Arcadia High School teacher Karen Hoffman was found slain earlier this month at her Norfolk home, according to various reports.

The 41-year-old was most recently an English instructor at Booker T. Washington High School in Norfolk. Police say she was found dead just after midnight Friday, March 4. They are not disclosing the cause of death.

Donna Price of the Norfolk Medical Examiner's office said there is a note attached to Hoffman's file asking that the cause of death not be released to media.

Reports also say Frederick Thomas Hoskins, 37, was arrested in Jacksonville, Fla., Wednesday on a fugitive from justice warrant. He is wanted in Virginia for questioning related to Hoffman's death. Police are not saying if there was a relationship between Hoskins and Hoffman.

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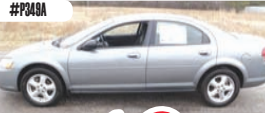

Business Concerns in Cape Charles

Concerns about staying in business highlighted the public comment session of last Thursday's session of Cape Charles Town Council.

Cape Charles business owners Sandy McFall, Dawn Flynn, and Gene Kelley urged Council to find ways to help ease their financial strain. Flynn said some business owners feel they are "circling the drain," on the brink of going under. Referring to Mason Avenue, the business owners suggested that after the tourists are gone, the area takes on the image of a ghost town. Town Manager Heather Arcos pledged support for the struggling businesses with whatever it takes to help them make a go of it.

In a related matter, David Kabler spoke on the possibility of bringing sailing vessels to the town to attract visitors. While Hampton Roads will host OPSAIL 2012 for sailing vessels in just over a year, Kabler stressed the need to focus on bringing in ships now. Kabler's goal is to see a dozen or more ships visit the town by the end of the season. Bill Neville echoed Kabler's support for bringing tall ships to the town. "The ships sail up and down the bay on a regular basis," Neville said. "Put out an appeal to bring them here. Offer them

some perks, such as free docking. It could be a tourist attraction."

Arcos and County Administrator Katie Nunez have agreed to meet and work together to bring the ships to the county. It was pointed out that currently; visiting tall ships, which are open for visitors, do not pay a docking fee.

Harbormaster Smitty Dize reported that construction of the new floating docks is well underway. He said the new slips and the soon-to-be-bid bathhouse would increase the opportunity for new business at the harbor.

Following a public hearing, Council agreed unanimously to lower the water and wastewater connection fees from \$20,000 to \$12,350. The move also includes a refund to three customers who paid the \$20,000 after the fees were increased in 2009.

Council voted to accept a bid of \$37,165 from Eastern Shore Landscape Management Inc. to provide grounds maintenance for the town for 2012.

Council also authorized Arcos to secure a contract for a replacement generator for the Plum Street pump station for \$23,200 from Harris Power and Equipment of Yorktown. Arcos was directed to inquire about a possible deal with Harris Power for a second generator to be installed at the Pine Street pump station site.

Council agreed to support a request by the Police Department to apply for a grant that would be used for an in-car video camera, training, and additional select enforcement hours to improve vehicle safety in the town.

In a final action of the evening, the Council voted to support landscaping improvements for the area known as the hump.

Art must be original and no larger than 16"x20" in any medium. It should depict Onancock harbor/Harborfest.

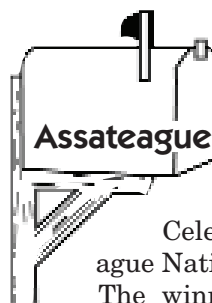
Artwork must be submitted on June 1 at the Red Queen Gallery by the close of business. No late entries will be accepted.

The second-place prize will be \$100 and third place will bring \$50.

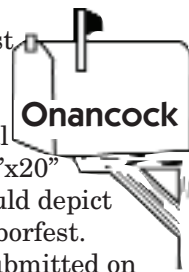
All submitted artwork will become the property of the Town of Onancock and will be sold at a silent auction Saturday at Harborfest.

Supervisor Ron Wolff favors eliminating district funds. He complained that some districts accumulated as much as \$80,000. "That just isn't right," Wolff said. "Perception is perception. We shouldn't have control over this money. Why hasn't the public been up in arms about this?"

Crockett took issue with the use of "I" in discussing district funds. "She told us 'I gave,'" he said. "I think she makes my case."

"I never felt comfortable from the beginning," said Supervisor Grayson Chesser. He added that he always consults with Hall. "I'd like to see them (the individual funds) done away with."

"Projects that overlap in districts have always been able to get done," said Wolff. "It's not a big deal."

Supervisor Jack Gray said he gave \$15,000 to the Bloxom Fire Department so old stores could be torn down before the new facility was built. That fire hall isn't in his district but members are the first responder for emergencies for his constituents. "I think I should be able to do that," he said. "I have talked about this with people in my district."

Gray said when drainage issues come up, residents in his district "want to come to me (not Hall or another county employee) because I'm their supervisor."

In the end, the board agreed with Thornton's motion to have Hall and County Attorney Mark Taylor rewrite county policy and submit their suggestions for the supervisors' approval.

Vice Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy was absent due to family illness.

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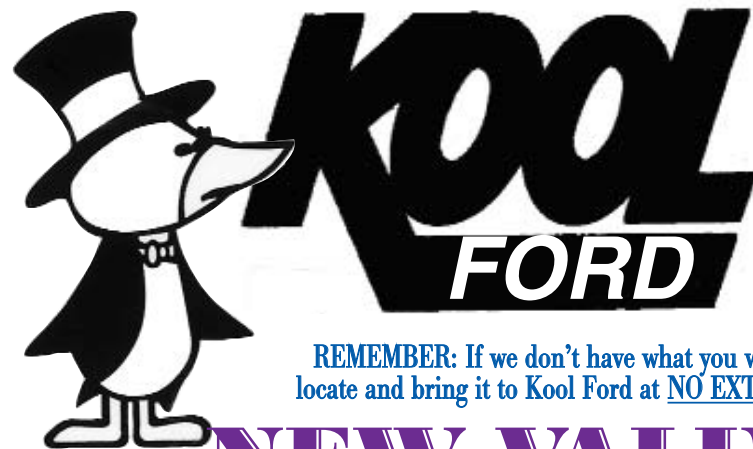

Students Need More P.E.

Dear Editor:

On a recent morning in my pediatric neurology clinic, I saw a straight-A eighth-grade student from Virginia Beach who is a nationally ranked runner. His public school has physical education five days a week, and students still have time for art, music and extracurricular activities. That such a student and school exist in Virginia may shock some who have

read recent news reports citing growing opposition to requiring increased P.E. in schools.

While this requirement would by no means make every student a genius or a track star, the example of this young man, his fellow students and his school proves it can be met without the sky falling on school boards and administrators.

I worked with fellow legislators in this General Assembly session to increase K-12 funding by \$75 million over the biennial budget passed last year. This is not nearly enough to address all problems, but the fact that we chose to put the money there rather than toward other priorities in these difficult economic times shows a strong commitment to Virginia’s children.

As a state senator and pediatrician, I am also committed to Virginia’s children in other ways, especially protecting their health. My background in medicine makes it impossible for me to turn a blind eye to the significant public health problems that surround us.

There was broad bipartisan support for SB 966 in the Senate and House. The bill is simple. It requires students to have 150 minutes of P.E. per week in grades K-8 by the 2014-15 school year.

More important, though, especially given the misinformation and hyperbole swirling around this issue, is what the bill does not do.

The bill does not require schools to hire more teachers. All teachers in grades K-8 are already certified to teach P.E., so hiring additional staff will be

unnecessary. It does not require schools to construct gym facilities. Many elements of P.E., including the health and nutrition education components that will count toward the 150 minutes, can be carried out in a standard classroom. Finally, it does not require schools or children to abandon music or art education: They will remain essential parts of childhood development in our schools.

Childhood obesity is an epidemic in our country and state. One-third of children in the U.S. are overweight or obese, and studies show the rates of Type 2 diabetes and associated medical problems among young people are rising rapidly. Children today are projected to be the first generation in U.S. history to live shorter lives than their parents.

The private and public costs of health care and the diminished quality of life for obese people warrant early intervention, and as much as we would like this to happen at home, the reality is that school is the only support many children have.

Since the General Assembly passed SB 966, some groups have launched a campaign urging Gov. Bob McDonnell to veto the bill. The decision is up to him, but I believe the opposition in the educational community has irresponsibly exaggerated the potential for fiscal hardship and has taken a myopic approach by spending time and resources fighting a good idea rather than focusing on long-term solutions.
