WEEKS BEFORE THE COUNTY DECIDES ITS FATE, ONLEY FIRE COMPANY SEEMS TO IMplode

Chief Allen Nicholson of Onley Fire & Rescue gave up the battle to keep Accomack from dissolving his station last weekend. Other fire medics there said they are glad to see him go and will continue the quest to keep it open.

Nicholson said he thought he had the rest of the members convinced that surrender was the only option. So, on June 30, he resigned his post effective Monday, July 3, and went away for a couple of days with his wife, Angela, who did the same with her job as station secretary/treasurer.

On June 29 he thought they were going to ask the county to "take us out of the dispatch and let us rebuild," Nicholson said. "Next thing I know, they are all fighting to stay open."

When he returned from being "on vacation," Nicholson said, he learned the members had elected new officers and put a truck back on the road that he contends has steering problems and bad tires. He also said a member with medical issues was allowed to come back despite being a liability for the company.

Nicholson said he is no longer living at the station but is still a member and will stay overnight at times. He questioned the experience and abilities of the others and said there is no money for a lawyer to help them.

"The neighbors have been complaining about trash in front of the shed," Nicholson said, adding, there is an old mattress, box spring and refrigerator out there. "It's looks trashy."

"I'm beyond fed up," he continued. "They've got to ac-

cept defeat at some point and time. I promised I would fight but Thursday night was pretty much the end. ... They should have just accepted defeat. The funding has already been cut. It's a shame to see this place. It's a sad situation to see this firehouse go. They are putting up petitions online and people from other areas are signing."

Nicholson said he is "going to take a little break and enjoy time with my lovely wife" and at some point will join another company.

At least two officers, President Royal Governor and Chief Engineer Davion Justice, said good riddance to Nicholson. They said he often called them insulting names. Both also live at the station and contended that Nicholson still lives there too, but they want him out. They also said Nicholson urged them to get new officers, so they did.

A meeting on Saturday, July 1, was called to order by Governor, who accepted the resignations of the Nicholsons.

"We need 100 percent from everyone, nothing less," he said. "No name calling or anything of that nature. We are fighting for everything right now. We have to work together. We are a family. ... If you are here for the wrong reason, please leave. From this day forward, you represent Onley Fire & Rescue."

"The main focus is saving the station," he said. They need to keep the station and outside areas clean, answer calls and support station shift duties. "Training is the

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Exmore Wants More: Residents, Visitors and Followers

Exmore seeks more interest from Facebook followers, visitors, and potential residents as this self-proclaimed “Treasure of the Eastern Shore” continues efforts to improve infrastructure, curb appeal, marketing and social media presence, as discussed at its July 3 town meeting.

Four water leaks on Main Street were stopped within the past month, when two, eight-inch water mains were repaired. A profit and loss report for Exmore's 2016-2017 fiscal year, which ended in June, stated a net income of \$384,645, not accounting for the recent repairs. The council clarified that the town netted a yearly profit of about \$326,000 after including water main repair expenses.

Town Manager Robert Duer said water service continues to be a good source of income for Exmore, even with sales down following repair of the recent leaks. Water income was \$369,637 and water expenses totaled

\$252,405 for the past fiscal year. Exmore water rates are “at the bottom of the barrel” compared to what other Eastern Shore towns charge, Duer said. Water, sewage and trash rates will be discussed at an Aug. 7, 6 p.m. work session.

A concerned citizen asked for “common sense” when water rates are discussed “There's a lot of empty houses sitting around... just because Onancock or Cape Charles charges [a certain amount], doesn't mean we should,” he said.

Duer said Exmore's current water rates are below national standards by about 10 percent.

Duer also said that Exmore's police department “didn't cost citi-

zens a dime this year,” suggesting that few towns can make this claim. Police fines added \$562,539 to the town's income in the past year, while police expenses totaled \$525,921.

In cooperation with the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission and the Virginia Housing Alliance, Exmore is planning town improvements. Specifics will be made public if the Virginia Department of Housing and Community

Development approves funding for the project, which could take up to 30 days.

The council complimented Clarice MacGarvey on the new brochure she produced to promote the town. They announced that Exmore is the num-

ber two Eastern Shore town on Facebook, with 1052 followers, surpassed only by Chincoteague.

The town is selling sponsorships for its annual Shakespeare in the Park event, which is free to the public. Sponsorships can be purchased for \$50, \$100, \$250 or \$500. Sponsors will get their logos printed on banners displayed at the town park, reserved seating for the performance, and an invitation to an exclusive cocktail party. “Hamlet” will be presented at Exmore Town Park on Friday, Sept. 22, at 7 p.m.

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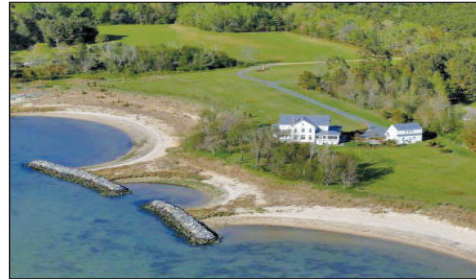


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Cape Charles Heritage Festival Welcomes Home Family and Friends

“Home – It’s a ‘Shore’ Thing” was the theme of the third annual Heritage Festival held in Cape Charles last week.

The yearly festival celebrates the African American legacy found in the history of Cape Charles and Northampton County. Organizers wanted to encourage “former residents, family members and friends” to honor that legacy - “to come back home, to visit home regularly, to re-think the value of home and to invest at home.”

The long-term goals of festival supporters, including non-profit Concerned Citizens of Cape Charles, are to increase tourism and home buying in town.

The Heritage Festival is rooted deeply within the Baptist church. Festivities began at First Baptist Church in Cape Charles on June 30 with a “meet ‘n’ greet” featuring guests from the Cape Charles Ros-

enwald School Initiative, and closed on July 2 with a service entitled, “Home Is Where the Heart Is,” led by Apostle Pearlle Ames-Murray.

The centerpiece of the Heritage Festival was the family and community cookout at the Cape Charles Central Park pavilion where guests enjoyed music, line dancing, relay races and other games. Ames-Murray hosted a book signing for her newly-released title, “God, Why Am I Not Growing?” The theme of the cookout was “Honoring Community Servants,” with four people being recognized for years of community service. They re-

ceived certificates of appreciation.

Foremost of the honorees was Thomas Godwin, who festival organizers announced as the first African American to serve on the Northampton County Board of Supervisors since Reconstruction, and the first African American on the Cape Charles town council. Also honored were Jane Cabarrus, Effie Marie Giddens Spady and Ruth Wise.

Festival attendee Hazel Thomas was “particularly impressed” with Ames-Murray, who spoke of fellow African Americans when she said, “our legacy is intrinsic.” Accord-

ing to Ames-Murray, “everyone can contribute” to the African American legacy on the Eastern Shore, no matter who they are or what they do for a living. The message “really hit home” for Thomas, who lives in Washington, D.C. and believes that African Americans on the Shore are “on the front lines” in the community development effort.

Judy and Dave Brunk, of Jamesville, found love in February 1959 and are still living the happily ever after story. They didn't have to search the globe but both were in the Navy when their paths crossed. They met the love of their lives, each other, on her 21st birthday at Norfolk Naval Station base club, she said in reply to an email survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post. The couple celebrated their 58th wedding anniversary on June 26.

"I just knew," she continued. "Can't say how. When you know, you know ... a marriage will last longer when both parties try to please their mates," Judy Brunk attested. "We have always been best friends and still really do love each other ... as for our long marriage, we had similar family life and wanted the same kind of life. key. This Saturday will be training here at the station - 7 p.m. We have faith that we can save this place. Engine 18 should be tagged in approximately two weeks. Looking for (an) OMD (Operational Medical Director) so we can get the ambulance out and permitted," he said.

Their current OMD gave notice that she was leaving effective July 8. No reason was stated on her letter of resignation. Nicholson said they disagreed about attire. He said he wanted members to be permitted to wear shorts on a hot day. He said he also wanted to prohibit members from wearing gear worn for fire calls on rescues so cross contamination would not occur. Others said it was because of his bad attitude that the OMD left.

Former chief Chris Davis, purchased the fire truck from New York, where engines are not tagged and titled so the company hasn't had a truck with which to run calls. Governor and Justice said they were only interested in moving forward, not figuring out if Davis did anything wrong. "That's up to the county," Governor said.

A new (used) ambulance was bought

by the company, but is not yet on the road.

Before that session, Governor was the vice president and Justice was a member of the board of directors. Josh Ruby was the deputy chief and president, but his name was missing from the new list of officers. Now Oliver Boggs is the chief. He was the fire lieutenant previously. The other new

officers are Megan Artiaco, assistant chief; Brian McLarnon, deputy chief; Andrew Parks, rescue captain; Rene Brady, rescue lieutenant; Ryan Humphrey, fire lieutenant; and Dallas Wilson, first assistant engineer.

Accomack supervisors are scheduled to discuss the county fire and rescue commission's recommendation to dissolve the

station at their July 19 session. Officials say Onancock and Melfa are covering the area. Governor said, "money that's owed to us from the fire tax" should be available.

"If the fire department shuts down, fire insurance is really going to go up," Justice added.

Dominion Energy to Purchase Northampton Solar Plant

Sunny days are ahead for the Cherrydale solar power plant near Eastville, currently under construction on 180 acres in Kendall Grove. Dominion Energy Inc., a Richmond-based power company which supplies electricity to parts of Virginia and North Carolina, announced June 30 that it plans to purchase the 20-megawatt Cherrydale facility sometime in the third quarter of 2017.

The facility will be purchased from Hecate Energy LLC, a Chicago-based developer, which was granted the special-use permit for the plant by the Northampton County Board of Supervisors in March 2016.

The board delayed granting the permit, as a Virginia statute exempts developers from paying taxes on solar power

facilities not exceeding a 20-megawatt capacity. Hecate representatives Patti Shorr and Preston Schultz pledged the company's commitment to pay Northampton County \$780,000 in real estate taxes over the course of the facility's 35-year lifespan. Hecate agreed to pay Northampton an additional \$200,000 following issuance of building permits. Board Chairman Spencer Murray confirmed Tuesday that the county received the \$200,000, which has been invested primarily in computer software and vehicles used by the sheriff's department.

Cherrydale's construction will generate \$1.5 million and \$2 million in wages. Local workers will conduct operations and maintenance at the facility until it is decommissioned in 2052.

Dominion recently purchased Clarke County Solar, a 10-megawatt solar power

plant in northern Virginia, for an undisclosed amount. With the acquisition of the two new plants, Dominion will own 25 solar facilities in 23 locations, capable of generating 409 megawatts of solar energy.

Dominion expects to continue their solar power expansion over the next 25 years to produce up to 5,200 megawatts of solar energy, powering more than 1,250,000 homes.

In November 2015, Dominion purchased Eastern Shore Solar Farms, a 1000-acre, 80-megawatt facility near Oak Hall, from Pennsylvania-based Community Energy Solar. The facility was renamed Amazon Solar Farm U.S. East, after the popular online retailer. Amazon is purchasing the electricity added to the grid by the Accomack solar plant so it may claim its data centers are "green," powered by 100 percent renewable energy.

17-Year Sentence for Convenience Store Robbery

An Accomack man will serve 17 years in prison for robbing a Painter convenience store in 2015.

Akeem Mason, 24, of Church Road, was sentenced to 30 years for robbery and three years for use of a firearm in a felony to run consecutively, with all but 17 years suspended. Supervised probation was ordered for 16 years and good behavior was ordered for the rest of his life. In addition, restitution was set for \$39.

"I ran into the Fast Stop with a BB gun," Mason told police. "I told the clerk to give me the money and I ran out."

In another case, Devin Treye Wesells, 23, of Bloxom, was sentenced to 20 years for burglary and grand larceny at the home of Camesha Handy

on May 12, 2015. The terms were set to run concurrently with half the time suspended. He was ordered to make restitution of \$5,624 and be on supervised probation for five years.

Onancock Man Charged with Malicious Wounding

An Onancock man was charged last week with malicious wounding, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Elwood Edward Miles Jr., 40, of Church Street, is accused of committing the crime on June 22. He was arrested a week later. Miles is being held in the Eastern Shore Regional Jail in Eastville without bond. Deputy C. Hargis of the Accomack County Sheriff Office (ACSO) investigated.

Austin Daniel Watson, 21, of Holland Court Drive on Chincoteague, was charged with possession of a controlled substance on July 3, 2017. Pfc. S. Lenhoff, of the Chincoteague Police Department, investigated.

Sean T. Knaly, 48, of Clarence Christy Drive, in Crisfield, Md., is accused of obtaining money belong-

ing to Tru Blu and Perry Patel by false pretenses on April 2, 2015. He was arrested June 26. Investigator Sam Castiglia of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office handled the case. Secured bond was set at \$3,000.

Wesley Wilson, 38, listed as homeless, of Parksley, was charged with credit card theft, credit card fraud and possession of a Schedule I or II drug on June 28. Deputy Luke Arnold of ACSO investigated. Secured bond was set at \$5,000. Wilson was arrested June 29.

Abduction Charge Won't Be Prosecuted

An abduction charge will not be prosecuted against a Cape Charles man, according to Northampton General District Court files.

Luis Perez, 30, was charged with that felony and misdemeanor sexual battery in May. He was convicted of the sex offense last week and sentenced to 12 months in jail with all but five months suspended. Probation was ordered for three years. Perez was also fined \$250.

Yosbel Rodriguez Rodriguez, of Miami Gardens, Fla., was convicted of petty larceny in connection with an incident that occurred on May 2. Rodriguez was initially charged with grand larceny. He was sentenced to 92 days in jail with 90 suspended and fined \$150.

Shykeva Neashay Mears, of Parksley, was charged with possession of a Schedule I or II drug on June 28. She was arrested the next day.

Jeremy Sharrod Miles, 35, of Onancock, was charged with possession of a firearm by a felon on June 28.

Brandy Elizabeth Golden, of Cape Charles, was charged with two counts of grand larceny in connection with June 16 incidents. She was arrested three days later and then released on her own recognizance.

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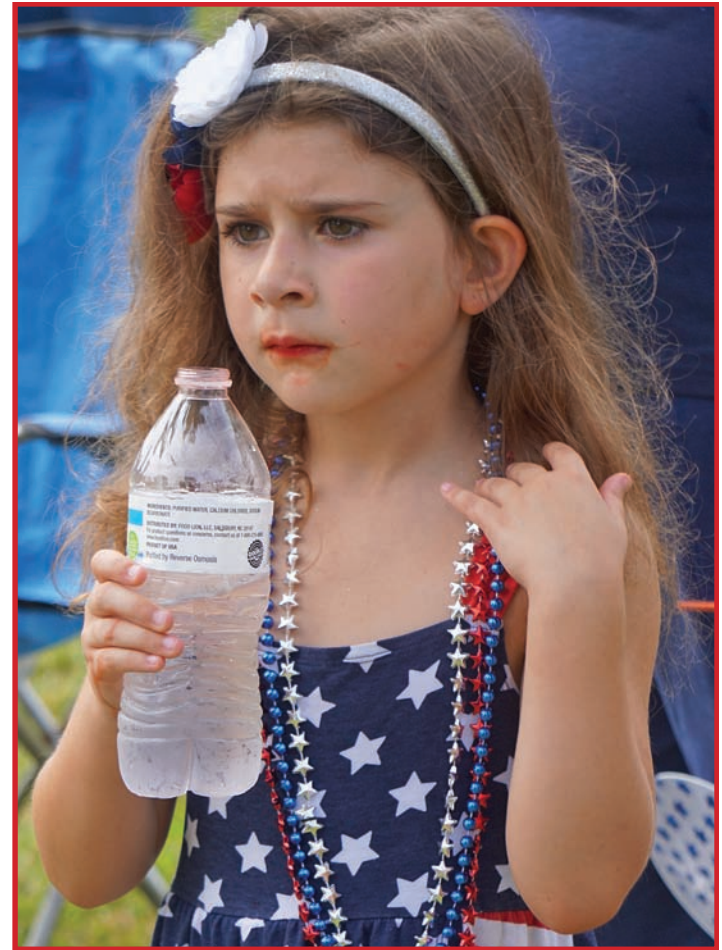

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Local Charity Golf Tournament at Eastern Shore Yacht and Country Club

The 29th H.B. Rew Jr. Golf Tournament, held at Eastern Shore Yacht and Country Club to benefit the Eastern Shore Community College Foundation June 16, had a fitting winner.

When the first-place prize was announced for the first flight, it was the 86-year-old Rew who was among a group of 80-year-olds to collect the prizes. In addition, Rew also was awarded the prize for being closest to the pin on the 17th hole with a shot that stopped six feet from the hole.

"We putted unbelievably," said Rew, who has played the ESY&CC course since it first opened in 1960. "Everyone contributed with some long putts, and I can't remember the last time I even hit the 17th green from the tee," added Rew, a resident of Onley who spent 50 years, much of it as president, with Farmers and Merchants Bank, now PNC.

Rew was joined by longtime golf buddies Gerald Davis and Vince Piazza, both 84, and newcomer Herb Barnes, also 84. The foursome shot a tournament best 9-under-par 61 with the best-ball format, where each player hits a shot and then the team uses the best shot of the group. Using the players' handicaps, the group had a net score of 52.

Rew said, "We had some guys who could make putts, but you've got to remember, our combined age is 338 years. That's quite a handicap right there."

Rew said he has been on the winning team "not all that many times" since he helped to launch the tournament in 1988. Traditionally held at the ESY&CC course, the tournament benefits the Eastern Shore Community College Foundation, which provides scholarships to students who may not otherwise be able to attend college. Rew was a member of the ESCC Foundation Board of Directors.

Rew said he is pleased the tournament has raised many thousands of dollars for scholarships, but these days he has a different goal. "At my age, I am working as hard as I can not to make this the H.B. Rew Memorial Golf Tournament."

Long Involved in Local Sports

Rew recalled the days when almost every major town on the Shore had a baseball team. "Before people were watching television, as many as 5,000 people turned out to watch a baseball game. We had

some really good players on the Shore. A few had the potential to play professionally, but I always said lovesickness halted many a career."

One local player who did make the major leagues was Chuck "Slim" Churn, a Northampton County native who pitched for the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 1959 World Series. Rew recounted one night when he and Churn were double dating, but playing on different teams in a local baseball game. Churn had just returned to the Shore after completing his first season in the minors, but was still playing for his hometown team. "Slim told me on the way to the game that night he had learned in the minors that when you get two strikes on a batter, you brush him back off the plate with the next pitch," Rew recalled. "That night he got two strikes on me lickety-split, but I thought there's no way he was going to throw inside the next pitch because we are friends and double dating this night. But, sure enough, here comes the pitch right at my head and I swung to get away from it and fouled it off, hitting myself in the head," said Rew with a laugh.

Rew also befriended New York Jet linebacker Larry Grantham through mutual friend Harry Thomas, who was from Grantham's hometown, Crystal Springs, Miss. Grantham was a key player for the Super Bowl III champion Jets in 1969 and was the team MVP the following year.

Rew noted that he was saddened to hear Grantham died recently, and was to be buried in Mississippi. "Larry and I played a lot of golf together at the club," Rew said. "He also loved to fish on the Shore. He once invited my wife and me and some friends for a Jet football game. When he handed out tickets, everyone got one but me. I said, 'Where's my ticket?' He said 'Follow me.' I wound up in the locker room listening to Coach Webb Ewbank giving the pregame talk and then found myself sitting on the bench. I'm sure everyone wondered who this guy in street clothes was sitting between two beefy linemen."

For all his sports memories, Rew said winning his own tournament recently would remain a special one because he was with old friends on a familiar course and helping one of his favorite causes.

Winning the second flight with a score

of 68 and a net 57 were Charlie DiMarino, Scott Heneghan, Susan Miller, and Keith Miller.

Taking second in the first flight were Bill Chandler, David Griffith, Glen Tyler, and John Morgan with a 62 and a net 54. Chandler also won the \$200 prize for the putting contest, beating out Peter Regan in a playoff after both finalists were 45 inches from the hole on a putt from beyond 60 feet.

The group of Charlie Cameron, Bill Sterling, Jamie Ibarra, and Michael Leonard was second in the second flight with a 62 and a net 57. Third in the first flight were Gene Elliot, Clarence Campbell, Bobby Campbell, and Eddie Mears with a 64 and a net 53. The Golden Bull Legacy and William H. Smith

This piece is directed in part to the current Northampton Middle School students who have not had the opportunity to know the historical underpinning of the “Golden Bull” mascot. Its history is intertwined with the history and career of William H. Smith, a Cape Charles native and principal of Northampton County High School, Machipongo, for more than 15 years, departing to become an assistant superintendent for Northampton County. This article is also owed, in part, to a Cape Charles neighbor’s prodding to write about Smith, her former co-worker.

Smith received his early education in Northampton at Tidewater Institute, a private Baptist-run school in Chesapeake, now called Cobbs Station. After graduating, he attended Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N.C., where he played

college football. His team’s mascot was then, and is now, the “Golden Bull,” probably known for its image of strength and ferocity.

Returning to the Eastern Shore, Smith taught, and later became principal, of Northampton County High School, having the distinction of being its first principal at the new building, which opened in 1953. There he remained until the 1966/67 term, when he assumed duties in the central office. An avid sports fan, he is credited with introducing competitive sports at NCHS, which participated in a league with other schools in the Tidewater area. The NCHS teams adopted the “Golden Bull” mascot, echoing Smith’s great influence over these programs.

A tall, impeccably dressed man, Smith was affectionately known as “Bill,” or our favorite, “Bear Smith,” a name which most likely derived from his youthful athletic days, but

whispered privately by students. Often, when the circumstances warranted, he would clear his throat with a frightening guttural sound and say, “I know what you call me, and don’t forget what it means.”

He was a friend of his students, a stern and forgiving disciplinarian, having the success of their academic lives at the forefront, but with emphasis on social development as well. Sometimes, it was enough for him to say, “we’re just not going to have that behavior here,” to cast his influence on student actions. He surrounded himself with dedicated teachers and staff. Many of the teachers during his tenure were former NCHS students. Students were inspired by his example and the level of expectations he had for them.

His example caused the NCHS Alumni Association in 1989 to name its sustaining fund, The William H. Smith Memorial Fund. One fundraising campaign centered on turning

alumni fervor into “Golden Bullions,” derivative of the mascot name. Using that fund, and others established later by generous donations of alumni and friends, the alumni association and its affiliated foundation annually award scholarships to graduating seniors in Northampton County and support other in-school projects. Seven 2017 Northampton High graduates received scholarships from these funds, the 28th year of such awards. A great deal of credit for the continuing zeal of alumni is owed to the “Golden Bull” spirit and traditions taught by Smith.

This summer, more than 300 loyal alumni and friends will gather for a biennial reunion weekend in Norfolk at Waterside Marriott, to rekindle old friendships, to celebrate history of NCHS alumni and to plan for continued involvement in the lives of Northampton students. The torch lit by Smith and others continues to burn.

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Fishing from the Shore

Fishing in the lower bay exploded over the week, much like the firecrackers during the Fourth of July celebrations. Flounder action at the bridge-tunnel, and cobia catches inside the lower bay, were responsible for a lot of the fishing fireworks.

Bluefin and yellowfin tuna catches were made by anglers chunking at the Lumpy Bottom, over the Parking Lot and the 21 and 26 Mile Hills, as well as by anglers trolling over the Norfolk and Washington Canyons.

If toothy critters are your target of choice, a wide variety of shark species are available for catch and release in the waters around Chincoteague Inlet.

Chincoteague – Donna Rae, of Captain Bob's Bait & Tackle, reported that good flounder action was occurring in the waters of Chincoteague Channel from Daisey's Dockside up to the section of the old Black Narrows Bridge. Keeper flounder were caught from the town pier, located at the site of the old drawbridge, with one pair of anglers landing 39 flounder over a four day span, including several legal sized fish. The Four Mouths area has produced keeper flounder in the 18-22-inch range for anglers using pink 4-inch Berkley Swimming Mullet baits. Offshore flounder fishing was good along the Blackfish Banks wreck for fish in the 17-24-inch range. Assateague Channel has been producing croakers, kingfish (whiting), a few flounder, and small black sea bass.

The best kingfish action has been out near the inlet. Shark fishing has been very productive in Queen Sound and from the inlet outside to the CI buoy. Hammerheads were caught and released at the 2TL buoy over the weekend. Jimmy, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, verified the excellent shark action and said spinners, blacktips and Atlantic sharpnose sharks were among the species caught recently. The shop registered a 25.5-inch citation flounder catch for Rob Lynch; the fish was caught in Black Narrows. The

waters of the back bay produced a 34-inch cobia release. Triggerfish and spadefish have now taken residence over the inshore wrecks. Tuna catches were being made at the Parking Lot.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul was out taking advantage of the recent run of good fishing, but Kathy at Trident Tackle reported that flounder fishing has been "very good" with anglers doing well using combinations of silversides, live minnows, and squid. Anglers were catching limits of flounder over the railcars. The shop weighed in a 104-0 bluefin tuna. Yellowfin tuna and dolphin were being caught in the canyons, and deepwater bottom droppers were catching blueline tilefish.

Seth Matthews, with a little help from his father, Roger, boated a 50-pound class bluefin tuna while fishing with Bob Titus and Captain Gene Crockett aboard the Bimini Twist. The group found two gaffer dolphin in addition to the tuna, fishing just south of the 26-Mile Hill.

Don's Tackle Shop reported good flounder fishing on the wrecks and inside the inlet in the deeper holes and cooler water. Don said captains Bobby Turner and Nat Atkinson were still finding large numbers of the flatfish. Offshore customers returned with yellowfin tuna and dolphin from the Lumpy Bottom. A few large bluefin were hooked but were broken off. Don said that ballyhoo sales have taken off with the surge in offshore action and that flats of butterfish were in short supply.

Lower Shore – Mark, from Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported there were "plenty" of flounder being caught at the high-rise section of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. The shop had weighed in several citation flounder caught over the Fourth of July weekend. Spadefish, gray triggerfish and sheepshead are now being caught along the bridge pilings and rock islands. Cobia fishing remained good, with a lot of the fish found over the Inner Middle

Grounds and on up to Buoy 36. Red drum have been a by-catch of the lower bay cobia fishery and are still a cooperating targeted species along the Fisherman's Island shoals. The sea mullet (whiting) run continues at the Cabbage Patch and outside of the Kiptopeke pound nets. Croakers are being caught out of Oyster.

Upper Shore – Matt Abell, of SeaHawk Sports Center, reported both bluefin and yellowfin tuna were being caught at the Lumpy Bottom by anglers chunking with butterfish. A nice-size class of flounder were being caught over the rail cars as long as there is a current to aid the fishermen's drift. Matt verified that triggers and spadefish were starting to stack up over the inshore wrecks. Captain Abell led a party to six cobia on a recent trip out of Cape Charles. Speckled trout still remain a possibility in the shallows of Pocomoke and Tangier Sound. Sand mullet (whiting) are the dominant species over the deepwater rocks. A recent trip to Folly Creek produced a catch of approximately 30 flounder, of which only three were keepers.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International

Committee Representative and a long-time member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.

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Health Matters Preventing Ticks and the Illnesses They Carry

In 2017, the Virginia Department of Health identified 1,350 cases of confirmed and probable Lyme disease — the second most ever reported in Virginia.

Lyme disease is just one of the tick-borne illnesses that can lead to hospitalization and death if medical attention is not obtained. If you get sick, and you have been exposed to ticks, be sure to tell your doctor about your tick exposure.

Preventing tick bites is the single best measure for preventing tick-borne illnesses.

- Recognize when you are in potential tick habitats such as leaf litter and vegetation in forest environments.

- Walk in the center of forest trails, keep grass cut and rake leaves/clear brush in wooded/shady yards.
- Wear light-colored clothing so ticks are visible.
- Tuck pant legs into socks or boots, tuck shirts into pants and wear long sleeved shirts.
- Apply repellents containing up to 50 percent DEET for adults or less than 30 percent DEET for children. Repellents with other active ingredients such as bioUID, oil of lemon eucalyptus, IR3535, picaridin, or 2-undecanone may also be effective.

- Apply repellent containing 0.5 percent permethrin to shoes, socks and clothing. Follow directions carefully and do not apply to skin. Clothing

- repellents are very effective.
- Conduct thorough tick checks after you have been in tick habitat; remove ticks promptly.

Tall Ship Virginia to Dock in Cape Charles July 12-14 Schooner to Offer Sunset Tours July 13, 14

On Wednesday, July 12, 2017, the schooner Virginia, the 112-foot long tall sailing ship, will sail into the Cape Charles Harbor. A replica of the original sailing vessel commissioned by the Virginia Pilots Association (VPA) in 1916, the Virginia led the Parade of Sail last month for the kickoff of Norfolk's Harborfest.

Used by the VPA to train apprentice pilots, the Virginia was pressed into service to transfer pilots between convoy ships in Hampton Roads during World War I. She stayed in active service as a Virginia pilot vessel until 1926 and eventually was sold to a private owner. She spent several years in the Boston area until after World War II, then began carrying cargo from Miami to Cuba where she met her demise on a reef. Luckily the crew of seven survived.

The current schooner Virginia, completed in 2004, continues a tradition of education with a home port at Nauticus, the maritime-themed science center and museum in Norfolk.

Captained by Eric Lohse, the Virginia is due to sail into Cape Charles at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, July 12. She

will be offering three-hour sunset sails on Thursday and Friday, July 13 & 14. To make reservations, visit <https://nauticus.org/schooner-virginia-sunset-sail/>

She will be docked at the Cape Charles Yacht Center at 1011 Bayshore Rd., Cape Charles.

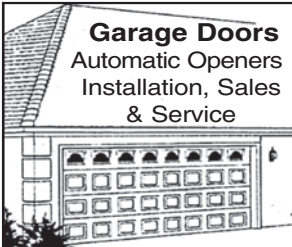

Don't Cut Health Care to Needy Kids

What about the kids?

The American Health Care Act (AHCA) passed by the U.S. House of Representatives in April would reduce the number of Americans with health insurance

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by about 23 million, including about 3.5 million children. The fiscal year 2018 budget proposed by President Trump would reduce Medicaid by \$610 billion and reduce the State Child Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) by 21 percent or \$5.8 billion. Now, the Senate is considering health care legislation that would also cut funding for Medicaid and SCHIP. Statewide in Virginia, half of the people on Medicaid are needy children and all the people enrolled in the SCHIP program are children in low-income families.

Is this what it has come to in 2017 in the United States? We are taking away health insurance from poor children. Are these our new American values? Is this what people expected when they said they wanted Congress to fix Obamacare?

I can tell you that these are not my values, and frankly I don't think they are the values of most of the people on the Eastern Shore. I know I am an optimist, but I really don't think most of the people who voted for Donald Trump really want to see health care taken away from needy children.

Health care legislation is particularly important for young people living on the Eastern Shore, because nearly half the children on the Eastern Shore get health insurance through Medicaid or SCHIP.

Historically, providing health care for children has had strong bipartisan support. You may recall, the SCHIP program was launched in the mid-1990s by Senators Ted Kennedy and Orrin Hatch. These two were about as far apart as one can get in terms of liberals and conservatives, but they both believed in the

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value of health care for children.

If I am right, and most people really don't want to see us cut health care for disadvantaged kids, then we need to communicate those values to members of Congress....and soon.
