# Hacks Neck Man Killed in Collision With ATV

An Accomack County man was killed over the 4th of July weekend in a traffic accident in Onancock. Police said another resident was charged in connection with the crash.

Larry Lee Ricketts II, 39, of Hacks Neck died at the scene, according to Sgt. Michelle Anaya of State Police. Ricketts was driving a 2004 Pontiac GTO east on Fairgrounds Road in Onancock at about 1:15 a.m. on July 3.

Anaya said he swerved to avoid hitting a 2002 Kawasaki ATV that

was also in the eastbound lane and driven by Robert Brownlie, 28, of Accomac. Ricketts lost control of the vehicle, ran off the road, overturned and struck a tree. His passenger, Andrew Netherv, was seriously injured and was flown to Sentara Norfolk General Hospital.

Brownlie was charged with operating an ATV on the highway, having no taillights and riding without a helmet. Anaya said alcohol was not a factor in the accident.

# Northampton Planners Give Mixed Reviews to Wind Power

The Northampton County Planning Commission gave mixed reviews to proposed changes to the zoning ordinance that would allow for a wind energy overlay district and set standards for large and utility-sized wind turbines.

Steve Parker of the Nature Conservenancy spoke of the importance of the Eastern Shore as a stopover resting area for songbirds as they move from Canada to the Caribbean. He claimed that turbines pose a threat to birds as they search for food.

The planners showed a map of limited areas where wind energy turbines and/or test facilities could be placed. The map indicated that no wind energy devices could be placed along the eastern side of Northampton County from the ocean west to the mainland, as well as along the lower bayside from Kiptopeke north to the area around Cape Charles.

Commissioner Roberta Kellam stated that birds use virtually the entire Eastern Shore and that wind turbines are not a viable source of power as local winds are not that dependable. She stressed the need to protect the birds and bats flying over the Shore and argued that wind turbines would bring few, if any, jobs to the area.

Sue Rice of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife (F&W) Service indicated that the maps need to be aligned more with other maps that give a better picture of bird migration routes in the county.

Commissioner Mike Ward quizzed Parker about the differences in the zones depicted on the migration map. Parker replied that the eastern zone covers the barrier islands, the shoreline of that area and the seaside marshes. The bay-side area encompasses properties of the Nature Conservancy, F&W and Kiptopeke State Park, as well as some nearby agricultural and residential areas.

Commissioner Mary Miller indicated that, in her view, wind energy projects are not compatible with agricultural land. She noted that with

## Citizens Express Opposition to Wastewater-Treatment Plant

A petition that opposes a conditional-use permit for a wastewater-treatment plant to be constructed near Atlantic was sent to the Accomack Board of Supervisors this week. Nearly 120 area residents and property owners signed the document.

"It would adversely affect the Atlantic community," the appeal states. "It is our belief that the proposal would be of immediate economic benefit ... to develop the New Town Project in Wattsville and to the Town of Chincoteague while imposing economic and quality of life burdens on the property owners in Atlantic, who should not suffer any adverse impact."

William (Bill) Paige, one of the movers and shakers of the petitioning group, said Tuesday that a conditional use is not applicable because the project is not a public, central or remote wastewater-treatment plant. Paige further complained that the area it will serve is seven miles away.

"We're organizing to be at every meeting about this," he said. "This system involves 12 basins ... ranging from  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  acres each." The water will be treated with chemicals in a threestep process. He said it then "sits there (and) seeps into the ground and recharges the aquifer."

The petitioners were among more than 130 citizens who attended a community meeting at the Atlantic Volunteer Fire & Rescue building on June 22. Most have addresses near the proposed site, but some reside in Temperanceville and Wallops Island.

According to a letter sent with the petition, "the attendees ... expressed an appreciation for the need of Accomack County to address the long-term issues related to wastewater and sewage treatment. ... Issues were raised about environmental harm to non-deep water wells used by some residences in the area and on nearby property values."

"The possible adverse consequences that would result should the developer fail to meet the financial obligations required to operate the wastewater treatment plant" also were noted. The letter further stated, "Entry to the plant would be from Nocks Landing Road, which is clearly not designed

to accommodate traffic necessitated by the wastewater-treatment plant ... possible adverse health affects (sic) and the potential for runoff into surface waters and oyster beds in the nearby seaside bays."

While the town project has been approved, the petitioners argue, "No construction has commenced and there is no indication that he (the developer) has purchased the property for the development."

According to county records, Atlantic Town Center Properties, LLC wants to build the wastewater facility on the north side of Nocks Landing Road about 1,300 feet north of Atlantic Road. The parcel is zoned Agricultural. The developer is Chris M. Carbaugh of Berlin, Md. Carbaugh got a certificate to construct the sewage treatment plant on May 24 through the state Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), but still needs the county permit to proceed.

Fred and Steve Darby own the proposed plant site, county records show. According to county records generated by the Accomack County Department of Planning, "Adjacent parcels are zoned agricultural and the current land use of adjacent parcels are a mix of farmland and woods, there are also two residences adjacent to the proposed project."

The Planning Commission reviewed the project on June 6, but did not take action. That panel's job is to make recommendations to the Accomack Board of Supervisors. A staff review shows the facility is allowed with a conditional-use permit.

County documents show the "conditional-use permit is required ... to develop a Clean Water Plan and Groundwater Recharge Basins to accommodate the wastewater treatment and disposal needs for the Atlantic Town Center Planned Unit Development (PUD). It will be located on 62.22 acres. The basins will account for approximately 8.5 acres of the site. The parking pad and building make up approximately .9 acres of impervious area and the gravel road adds up to approximately 2.9 acres."

According to the applicant, county records continue, "The system proposed will meet or exceed all DEQ requirements in a manner intended to protect and enhance the environment. The full build out flow projected for the ... PUD is 700,000 gallons per day. Initial construction to serve the first phase of the development will have a capacity of 100,000 gallons per day with incremental future phases to match the needs of the project ... one new private well will provide the water supply."

The executive summary of the "Conceptual Regional Sewer Plan for Northern Accomack County," dated January 2011, states, "A regional wastewater system is envisioned ... in the Wattsville

area where the most pressing needs appear to center around a desire to provide sewers to the Town of Chincoteague (in phases) and the potential of the Atlantic Town Center and/or the Wallops Research Park ... properly coordinated, an initial 450,000 gallon/day ... facility is conceivable in the Wattsville area that may have the potential and capacity to serve the first phase of sewers in Chincoteague along with the Phase I and Phase II of the Atlantic Town Center and part or all of the Wallops Research Park ... to be expanded to a 700,000 gal/day capacity under a second phase."

# **Business Gets Accomack County Contract, Owes Back Taxes**

An Accomack business is working off thousands of dollars worth of tax debt by renovating Kegotank Landing Walk, Seawall and Boat Ramp in Modestown.

"I really think it's a win/win for the taxpayers," County Administrator Steve Miner said Wednesday. "The message, I think, is the county is going to do all it can to collect taxes."

County Purchasing and Contracts Manager Darlene C. Burton knew BIC Inc. of Wattsville owed back taxes when she awarded it a contract for the project (on May 18, 2011) with the understanding that back personal-property taxes of \$4,000 would be paid, Miner said. "She was on it. She and Commissioner of the Revenue (Leslie Savage) were working with BIC to get it" straightened out, he added.

Then it was realized the tax bill was higher. Miner said the company decided to dispute it. "I don't think they paid anything. ... I'm not too worried about it," he said. The company won't get paid for the job. Their earnings "will take care of those taxes."

"That's not saying we're here to barter," said Miner. "This was not set up in advance. What are you going to do — not award, not save the county \$20,000? BIC is out there doing the work. The taxpayers are getting full value. As long as people have been around, they've bartered."

Treasurer Dana Bundick said BIC

owes \$22,725 in real-estate taxes and about \$15,330 in personal-property taxes. Miner said the winning bid made by BIC was about \$28,000. The second runner up was a Crisfield, Md., company that promised to do the job for around \$48,000.

Savage said BIC paid for the business license, but she did not issue it. "If someone owes business personal-property taxes, they will not be issued a business license," according to county and state regulations, she explained.

In another twist, a building permit also was needed for the job and is not given if real-estate taxes are owed. However, Bundick said Building Director David Fluhart recently read her an email opinion sent to him by County Attorney Mark Taylor. It states that anyone who signed up for a tax payment plan with Bundick should not be considered delinquent. She sets up these plans on a six-month basis.

"In my eyes, anyone who is on a payment plan is still delinquent," said Bundick. But she followed the lawyer's advice and signed off on the deal. Miner said Taylor is on vacation this week and the ramp work is about half done.

Burton did not return a reporter's phone call by press time Thursday.

According to the county code, "All businesses who wish to engage in business with ... Accomack must possess a valid Accomack County Business License or must document why they are exempt from licensure."

### Chesser Will Seek Re-Election to Board

Supervisor Grayson Chesser will seek re-election as the District 3 representative on the Accomack Board of Supervisors in the November General Election.

"One of the things that I'm proudest of is that the county is in better financial shape now then when the recession started," Chesser said this week. "I don't think many counties — many governments period — can say that."

"We've got a lot of really, really important and tough decisions to make in the next few years," he added. "In this economic climate you really don't have much margin for error." Chesser said budget and school matters are big issues. "How do you divide up the pie? How do you get the most out of what we do have? How do you attract jobs? How do retain the jobs that you already have?"

Chesser is seeking a second fouryear term. He first applied for the office after Supervisor Tommy Matthews died in 2006. The rest of the board sought to appoint a new member, but failed to do so in a 4-4 tie. At that point, Judge Glen A. Tyler appointed Eveline Cropper of Horntown to the post until a special election was held. Chesser beat her in that race and finished out the remaining year on the term before winning a regular election as an unopposed candidate.

Raised in Assawoman, Chesser and his wife of more than 40 years (the former Dawn McCready of Oyster) bought his maternal grandfather's former home at Jenkins Bridge where they now live. The couple own and operate the Holden Creek Hunt Club, which they started in the mid 1970s. The Chessers

He is a waterfowl guide, a renowned decoy carver and a former farmer and game warden. Chesser graduated from Atlantic High School in 1965 and attended Eastern Shore Community College when it was a branch of University of Virginia at Wallops Island. He graduated in 1970 from Old Dominion University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Management.

have a daughter and a granddaughter.

Chesser was a special Virginia game

warden for five or six years and farmed until about 1982. He started carving around 1960 but didn't do so commercially until the 1970s. Chesser was

named Carver of the Year for the Eastern Shore, Chincoteague, Pocomoke, Western Henrico, Richmond and Pender County, N.C., chapters of Ducks Unlimited and was named Living Legend by the Easton (Md.) Decoy Festival.

The Chessers participated in the Smithsonian Folk Life Festival featuring Mid-

Atlantic Maritime Heritage in 2004. He carved and she cooked. They went back to the Smithsonian in 2007 for Roots for the Virginia Culture 400-Year Anniversary celebration. Chesser was also the featured carver at the Congressional Sportsman's Caucus at the (Sam) Rayburn House Office Building and at the Smithsonian Exhibit of American Bird Sculpture in conjunction with the Ward Foundation Museum at the Museum of Natural History, both in Washington.

He exhibited at the 50th anniversary of the Duck Stamp Contest and was a judge for the 1984-86 event. In 2009, he was given the Virginia Heritage Award from the Masters and Apprentice Program for Humanities for passing on traditional crafts.

Chesser co-authored "Making Decoys the Century Old Way" with Curtis Badger in the 1980s. He wrote a column for several years about decoy collecting for Wildlife Art Magazine and penned the chapter on the Eastern Shore of Virginia in the book, "Chesapeake Bay Decoys: The Men Who Made and Used Them."

Chesser also serves on the Eastern Shore Land Trust Board. He was recently appointed as supervisors' liaison to the Accomack County Sheriff's Office. And he serves on the county's Agriculture and Forestal District Committee. He previously served on the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission and the Virginia Marine Resources Commission advisory board for 20,000 plus acres of coastal lands.

"I don't like serving on boards and commissions unless it's absolutely necessary," Chesser said. "If possible, it should be a citizen on there."

# Who Should Judge Judges? Or Grade School Boards?

If results of a recent email survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post are indicative of the Shore as a whole, 60 percent of residents want to elect their Circuit Court judges, while 78 percent say School Board members should be chosen that way.

Virginia's General Assembly currently selects the judges for each district in the commonwealth but has yet to pick one to regularly sit at both local circuit benches that serve the Eastern Shore. That position has been empty since Judge Glen A. Tyler retired in December 2010 due to mandatory age restrictions.

In Accomack, a School Board Selection Commission, appointed by a circuit judge, picks School Board members. In Northampton, the Board of Supervisors appoints the School Board.

Some of the survey participants had more than "yes" or "no" answers to the election questions.

Vocational education teacher Glenn

Muhle Jr. of Exmore said Circuit and Supreme Court judges "should be elected by the people." He suggested the ballots be cast every four years not to coincide with district and state elections. But Muhle wants school boards to continue to be appointed. "Politics needs to stay out of the schools," he said.

Jim Frese, a former Chincoteague councilman, also favors elections for Circuit Court judges. "All Americans are experiencing continuing erosion of their freedoms due in large part to the lack of voice and control of their way of life, beliefs, and very futures," Frese noted. "Judges, among governmental positions, are almost totally immune from oversight or recall, regardless of the severity and repugnance of their actions." He also supports four-year terms for judges and thinks School Board members should be elected.

Harold Smith of the Keller/Melfa area wrote that "The People" should elect judges "to represent the people

of the community they serve, not the whims of politicians who often have a private agenda to serve when making decisions." He said elections should be held every four years. Smith also said School Board members should be "elected by the counties they service."

Mike Custis of Onancock said the people should elect Circuit Court judges every three years. He also favors the election of School Board members.

Karen Simpson of Quinby wants judges to be elected. "Favors given, under the table deals made, hands washed and not necessarily the right person chosen, if appointed by the General Assembly," she said.

Simpson suggested the votes be taken "every six years like senators with stipulation they can only serve a maximum of 12 years." The election "absolutely" would be for all judges in our circuit.

"School Board members ... need to be elected by the general public," she continued. "Hopefully, that way public interest will be generated in the workings of our counties." There has been "too much apathy in last several years. I have always been stymied at the lack of candidates for most electable positions on the Shore."

Jack Mason of Accomac said Circuit Court judges "should be elected by the people." Otherwise, "there are too many people for the lobbyists to buy."

He also favors four-year terms, but stipulated that only three terms be allowed with retirement "at the average annual pay of their tenure."

Mason said Accomack School Board members should be "elected for specific and non-recurring terms and paid well so their jobs require great thought because they would be responsible for each school equally."

"Northampton County is like Brigadoon and only occupied by special people," Mason said. "I wouldn't presume to advise them on any subject."

A Northampton man, who asked not

to be identified, wrote, "I desire to be judged by my true peers. This includes the person wearing the robe. I can request a change of venue if needed. The individual that serves on the bench does not need to be an attorney. In the past there have been persons that served as judges that were not attorneys and justice may have been better served."

He suggested a six- to ten-year term "with the ability of recall." Regarding the judicial districts, he wrote, "The population demographics of Northampton and Accomack are different than the make-up of Virginia Beach."

Regarding the judicial seat, Caramine Kellam of Franktown wrote, "Usually I would think that the way it has been done is a good, one but lately I am not so sure. I hate to think that politics plays so much importance in our court system. ... I think that the election process would be worse. They elect the judges in North Carolina and it is a very expensive process. I would not be opposed to the bar submitting a recommendation and going with that."

If the people elected the judges, she suggested the term be for 10 years.

"If the election process is instigated, I would hope that we could do ours and Virginia Beach could do theirs; otherwise, we would never have another Shore judge, the population base being what it is," Kellam wrote.

Bobby Crutchley of Melfa said Circuit Court judges should be elected "by the people. It would take the politics from a chosen few." He suggested the judges be elected "every six years, with a three-term limit. ... Accomack and

Northampton should not include Virginia Beach in any election cycle."

He also favors School Board elections. "Judges have no business appointing School Board members."

Clifton Isdell Sr. of Bloxom said the judges "should be elected by the people because I think that we know more (about) what we like" then "the ones over at Richmond." He added that elections should be

held every four years and the election should include the entire judicial district. Isdell said School Board members also should be elected.

Connie Bonniwell of Belle Haven agrees that citizens should elect judges; otherwise, "there is too much politics in it." She said an election should be held every 10 years. Bonniwell favors a separate district for the Shore. She also said School Board members should be elected.

Dan Harris of Eastville is opposed to elections by both the people and the General Assembly. "They should be appointed by the governor for a set term, not life. Maybe four years." Harris said if elections were held, voters should go to the polls to pick a judge every four years.

Oral Lambert of Cape Charles said he is opposed to judicial elections. "Judges should be appointed based on their professional qualifications and experience with input from the legal community... they should not be elected based on public popularity. They must be as free from public influence as possible and ... be guided by law and justice, not public opinion."

"I would favor elected School Board members, just as the members of the Board of Supervisors are elected," Lambert continued. "Positions which decide public policy, unlike judges, should be accountable to the citizenry who elects them to public office." Hal Koenig of Exmore said the General Assembly should pick Circuit Court judges in Virginia. "We do not need the third branch of government to be more politicized and we do not want the situation (like) in West Virginia where contributors come before the judges they helped elect. Qualifications can also be considered by the Assembly," he wrote.

Koenig said having a School Board Selection Committee "makes sense, but appointment by county supervisors may be preferable. In any case, the process should be open and transparent. Elections are a reasonable choice, too, but I prefer one of the others so that, as with judges, there is an assessment of a person's ability to do the job."

Marjorie McCaleb of Craddockville also favors the General Assembly for selection of judges. That way "the positions get filled by the 'head' rather than by the 'heart.' This gives a broader view for all concerned." For School Board members, McCaleb favors the current mode of selection.

An anonymous Eastville resident also favors judges being picked by the General Assembly "because if we want justice to work, then we need not be concerned with who serves it as long as it is just. If we had to choose locally, it would definitely be a case of who you know! ... I believe that School Board members should be chosen by the people and not

by the Board of Supervisors" because that would mean "who you know" not "what you know!"

Patrick Belote of Onancock said regarding judges, "The judicial branch of our federal government was left to appointment for a reason. I think our founding fathers had a much clearer vision of accountability than any modern politician. For this reason only, I feel localities and states should follow suit. Our state, like the federal government, has branches elected by the people, where politics can be too much of a factor. A stable branch unhindered by a political future is not a bad idea."

Belote said he would change the process regarding School Board section. "This I would change and leave up to the people. An appointed judge making appointments is a little much."

Sharon Yon of Melfa favors elections for judge. "Politicians pick friends," she wrote. "On the other hand, they do know who's most qualified." She favors two-year terms and an exclusive judicial district for the Shore. She also wants School Board members to be elected.

Steve Stokes of Accomac said, "The people of a district should have the say in the matter" of selecting a judge and

the term should be set at six years. Stokes also favors an elected School Board in both counties.

Rhet Tignor of Hacks Neck said judges "should be appointed by the General Assembly. Election by the people makes it a political/popularity contest. The last thing I want to see is a candidate for Circuit Court kissing babies! Not that the General Assembly does a great job."

He favors the supervisors appointing the School Board. "In the final analysis, the education of our children is a responsibility of local government," Tignor said. "When I lived in another locality, the appointed School Board persons were far superior then those elected. Seems not smart for a Circuit Court judge to be involved in this legislative process. At the end of the day, we want to go to our locally elected folk to find out why our schools do or do not meet our expectations, not to a circuit court judge."

"A judge is neither a Legislative or Executive Branch of government person. Their task is to review and apply the law," he continued. "When we task them with (those) tasks, we muddy the water, put them in positions that they are not qualified for and water down the importance of their primary function."





the county's population scattered in agricultural and residential areas, the placement of turbines could be an issue. She voiced concern about the noise caused by the turbines as well as the need to protect the people from them.

While opposing the use of wind energy towers in the county, Kellam did note that she considers the two uses compatible.

Commissioner John Wescoat Jr. noted that the county could expect to see issues with agricultural property owners who find out that their lands are excluded from the possible placement of wind energy equipment.

Commissioner Michael Ward said that while he didn't see wind turbines as we know them popping up in the county in the near future, he does not want to place limitations on them that might hinder future placement as their technology develops.

Ultimately, the Planning Commissioners voted 5-3 to support the zoning changes that include the maps where the projects would be allowed. Commissioners Ward, Wescoat and Severn Carpenter voted against the plan, which now will go to the Board of Supervisors.

A second round of discussions regarding the definitions related to the standards for utility scale wind energy projects ensued. Many of the same issues raised by the commissioners as well as the public were aired. The primary one was the danger posed to birds by wind energy towers. Gordon Campbell noted the possible issue of farmers not being able to get their crops sprayed by crop dusters due to nearby wind energy towers.

Sally McNeilan, speaking for Fugro Atlantic, gave a brief presentation on a wind energy testing project proposed by that company. It is investigating the possibility of erecting a wind energy test facility in the county. Up to 10 test towers would gather data on their effectiveness and would have a life span of five to seven years. The towers could be several hundred feet high. She noted that a project being reviewed by the state for possible placement in the bay west of Cape Charles would have towers up to 600 feet tall. The towers installed by Fugro Atlantic would be 2,000 to 3,000 feet apart.

"Northampton County would be unique in that it would be the only such facility in the world," said McNeilan.

Its location at the entrance to the Chesapeake Bay would enable transportation of wind energy equipment anywhere along the East Coast, Mc-Neilan said, noting that if too many objections are raised to opposing the project, the company would have to seek another site.

The commissioners could not reach agreement on the zoning text amendment concerning the definitions and consequently tabled the issue. Additional information on Fugro Atlantic is available at www.fugroatlantic.com

In the only other business, the commissioners considered requests for four reviews and/or additions to agricultural-forestal districts in Northampton County. Ward asked for a report on how much tax money the county would lose if the additions are approved. County Planner Sandra Benson indicated that she did not have that information available. The commission voted 7-1 (Ward voting no) to support the requests.

The recommendations by the Planners will go to the Board of Supervisors at its meeting July 12 at which time public hearings on the issues will be conducted.







### **Senators Support Virginia Offshore Drilling**

U.S. Senators Jim Webb (D-VA) and Mark R. Warner (D-VA) have introduced legislation that would allow oil and natural-gas exploration and production off the Virginia coast.

The Virginia Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) Energy Production Act of 2011 would also expand the federal government's map of the mid-Atlantic exploration area to more accurately reflect the extent of Virginia's coastal resources.

The bill directs half of any leasing revenues to be paid to Virginia to support a range of projects, including land and water conservation efforts, development of clean energy resources, transportation and other infrastructure improvement projects across the commonwealth.

"This legislation builds on an earlier proposal that I introduced with Sen. John Warner in 2008," said Webb. "We must pursue robust policies that include the expansion of our domestic energy resources in a safe and secure manner even as we develop conservation, renewable and efficient energy measures. Opening up and expanding Virginia's offshore resources to responsible natural-gas and oil exploration holds significant promise for boosting needed domestic energy production, while bolstering the commonwealth's economy."

"Our economy and national security will be

strengthened by an 'all-of-the-above' approach to energy, including the expanded production of our own domestic energy resources," Warner said. "We should not be sending hundreds of billions of dollars each year to oil-producing countries that do not like us. This legislation jumpstarts a multi-year process that will include responsible environmental reviews, close consultations with NASA and our military partners in Hampton Roads, and this process will include multiple public hearings. Sen. Webb and I firmly believe that Virginians should benefit from any energy resources that are developed off of our coast, and our legislation specifically requires the federal government to make reasonable royalty payments to the commonwealth."

The legislation would direct the secretary of treasury to assign 37.5 percent of revenues derived from Virginia's OCS resource development to the commonwealth.

It also would direct the president to assign an additional 12.5 percent of any revenues toward land and water conservation efforts, public transportation projects and alternative energy development projects in Virginia.





#### Post Wrong To Print Strand Death

Dear Editor:

How I wish that people would do the right thing! It would be far more helpful if more would take the "high road." Someone on your staff did not do the right thing or take the high road.

I refer specifically to the "reach beyond the grave" your paper made to inflict even in death a final sentence of shame on the family of Mr. Percy Strand. His grandchildren who were not yet born when this alleged crime was committed are now exposed to something thay may not be ready to face.

I would like to think the placement and format were not done for a spiteful purpose. However, several observations demonstrate otherwise. In the first place, the text is shaded, which is a device used to cause the "obituary" to stand out from the others. Secondly, all the men in the obituaries were given the title of "Mr." Percy Strand was just "Percy Strand." Finally, the obituary does not follow the pattern of the others. Remember that we are encouraged to speak good of the dead.

I was disappointed at the intentional discrimi-

nation your readers were forced to endure. No rightthinking individuals excuse the alleged crime. By the same token, someone chose the "low road" in reporting in this instance. The Post was given an opportunity to prove that we are moving forward and failed miserably. *Jesse S. Poulson, Onancock*
