### Fire & EMS Funding Sparks Debate Among Supervisors

There wasn't any impropriety being alleged. But volunteer firefighters and rescue workers were the subject of debate among Accomack supervisors Wednesday regarding a policy that would oversee the way local companies spend \$1.2 million in tax revenue annually.

The plan was proposed to instill "accountability." But instead it wound up glaring of ingratitude and supervisors complained of discrimination and mistrust in the very people who save lives and property.

In a 6-3 vote, the board agreed to continue to allow the companies to have all their allotted funds to spend and save when and how they see fit. Chairman Donald Hart, Vice Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy and Super-

visors Ron Wolff, Reneta Major, Wanda Thornton and Jack Gray favored the motion with stipulations that would require the companies to fill out financial forms and provide spending documents. But the issue didn't end there.

Supervisors Robert Crockett, Grayson Chesser and Sandy Hart Mears were opposed. Crockett and Chesser wanted the initial proposal that had been offered. Mears favored one with an emergency provision that would get funds to the companies when needed in a speedier fashion. She also suggested that audits be done of the companies. "It's a housekeeping item that will have to be done eventually," she said.

"We're not hiding anything," said Jody Bagwell, chief of the Bloxom unit and a member of the Fire and Rescue Commission. "We agree with the concept. We would ask that you ... continue to do business ... with a January, March and July check ... and financial reports at the end of the year ... not too many companies will have money left over."

"Fuel and insurance (and equipment and building payments) will eat that up," said Bagwell. "We feel we've been accountable for what the county's asked for in the past."

In the end, the change proposal was unanimously tabled so staff could rewrite it, taking into consideration the noted concerns of the supervisors. In between there were votes on whether to call for the end of discussions, friendly and unfriendly amendments, the substitute motion and the taking back of motions.

The proposal which was tabled was made by County Finance Director Mike Mason and initiated by Crockett. It called for the funds to be given after spending occurred and receipts were handed in. It also would have required unspent funds to be held in marked accounts by the county that would pay interest to the companies and would be overseen by Mason.

Unused money needs to be invested, Mason said, adding that the financial forms are still on the drawing board, but would be simple documents that "should not impact cash flow."

According to a county report, the issue began in April when the commission requested that the supervisors

### Developer Cites Benefits of Proposed Atlantic Town Center

A Maryland developer said this week that his proposed Atlantic Town Center (ATC) housing and business project in Wattsville and a related wastewater facility planned for 62 acres near Atlantic would bring hundreds of millions of dollars to the area.

Managing Partner Christopher Carbaugh of Atlantic Group & Associates, Inc. of Berlin also said the treatment plant (which is opposed by neighbors) can't be too close to a runway or NASA Wallops and that no one in the area would be required to connect to it.

ATC "will provide a favorable impact on the local economy, as well as the county and state government agencies," he said, citing construction costs of \$386,560,000 and claiming that hundreds of jobs would be created. "Accomack County and the local school districts will share an increased tax base that will grow to approximately \$1,598,660 of annual taxes upon project build out," Carbaugh predicted.

He said the county and state "will

share approximately \$1,987,686 in recordation fees." In addition, Accomack will get \$1,470,000 and Virginia will receive \$30,000 in permit fees, he said. ATC projections show "the potential to create and accommodate 2,455 jobs" for "the proposed commercial, retail, office space, hotel, educational facility and community services."

"When Orbital Sciences Corporation announced their plans to utilize the Mid Atlantic Regional Spaceport (MARS) for ... sending supplies to the International Space Station, many considered this decision to be an excellent opportunity for the Eastern Shore and Accomack County," Carbaugh said. His project would eliminate dysfunctional septic systems likely causing "significant pollution and fecal coliform contamination found in the vicinity of the Wallops Flight Facility."

Carbaugh said his company did an "extensive analysis of available sites. ... The proposed Nocks Landing site is very unique ... it is approximately 40 feet above sea level with substan-

tial depths to ground water and sandy soils that can infiltrate large quantities of water. These conditions allow for recharge basins as a possible means of disposal. Without these soil conditions, other disposal alternatives would be required, such as spray irrigation or drip irrigation that may require 300 to 500 acres to accommodate 1,500,000 GPD (gallons per day)."

"One hundred percent of septic systems will fail. ...Sewage treatment facilities are expensive and heavily regulated ... as a result, it is inefficient, and often impossible, for individual landowners with failed and failing septic systems to design, obtain approval for and construct modern sewage treatment facilities," he said.

"Wastewater facilities are recommended to be located a minimum 10,000 feet (1.9 miles) from airport runways, aprons and taxiways. The ... site is approximately 11,000 feet from the Wallops Flight Facility runways. The planned growth area is not located adjacent to the wastewater facility so to avoid the Wallops Flight Facility Accident Potential Zones that do not recommend dense development within the zones that could result in a concentration of people."

"The wastewater facility will improve the environment and water quality of the coastal waters," he said. "Be-

facility represents a beneficial reuse of reclaimed water for the purposes of replenishing groundwater resources, reducing the potential of saltwater intrusion and protecting surface water quality and shellfish habitats."

The design would "resemble barns and other agricultural uses," he said. "The entire perimeter is buffered with earth berms and vegetated buffers ...

and other agricultural uses," he said. "The entire perimeter is buffered with earth berms and vegetated buffers ... by introducing public sewer to a community land values typically increase. ATC requires approximately 700,000 GPD. Therefore additional capacity is available for other areas ... including Wattsville, Atlantic and Chincoteague.

"Chincoteague has also long been plagued with troublesome septic systems and many businesses resort to expensive and inefficient packet plants for their treatment needs," Carbaugh noted. "Businesses unable to replace failing systems are required to pump and haul sewage several times each week."

Carbaugh said at a public meeting held in April 2009, "The plan is for "the wastewater facility ... to be owned and operated by a political subdivision, municipality or county. Those who choose to utilize the wastewater facility shall be responsible for the cost of construction and operation."

A group about 120 strong signed a petition last month in opposition to the treatment plan. They said the use is not compatible with the agricultural zone and complained that the system would damage the acquifer.







### **Lawyer Says County Could Collect More Taxes**

A local attorney says Accomack officials are not doing everything legally possible to collect delinquent taxes.

The comments came in a letter Wednesday to Wesley Edwards, who lives near Craddockville and is an unofficial candidate for supervisor of District 9. Attorney John Hopkins of Belle Haven wrote that a simple judgment would allow the county to extend the collection period. Edwards brought the matter to the Board of Supervisors Wednesday.

Hopkins wrote, "We can't do anything to resurrect tax debts that are already unenforceable. However, there is much the county can do to enhance tax collections in the near future. For example, if Accomack County will merely bring proceedings in either the General District Court or the circuit court depending on the issue, by the last day of 2011, the time for collection of 1991 real estate taxes and for 2006 personal property taxes can be extended for another 20 years from that date of judgment."

The lawyer wrote that press reports

of county officials "appear to publicly indicate to tax debtors that the county had adopted a policy forbidding pursuit of personal property tax debts beyond five years or real property tax debts beyond 20 years."

"The ... reports indicate that county officials blame the predicament on state law," he continued. "I know that both" County Administrator Steve Miner and County Attorney Mark Taylor "are far too capable as attorneys to publicly state that you can correctly interpret" the law that way.

"For each personal judgment obtained, the county will then have available to it each remedy provided by the judicial system for the collection of a judgment, including wage garnishments or bank account garnishments, executions on personal property (seizure and sale even if the initial tax debt was for real property taxes) and a summons to answer interrogatories to determine what assets or income the debtor might have (allowable every 6 months for at least 20 years)," Hopkins explained.

"Obtaining personal judgments against the delinquent taxpayer does nothing to remove any other remedies or collection means the county might have or might use effectively; but it facilitates those remedies by extending the time they can be used by at least another 20 years," Hopkins wrote. "Other large creditors obtain dozens of judgments each court day in Accomack County Courts, and each court day, the clerk hands out thousands of dollars of checks from garnishees."

"Why doesn't the county announce and actually implement a simple policy of vigorous delinquent tax collection using all of the practical and lawful remedies available to the county for however long the period of limitations remains open in specific cases?" he asked in the letter. "Why couldn't the county issue an immediate clarifying statement indicating that, in many specific cases, it is lawful to collect personal property taxes for much longer than 5 years and to collect real property taxes for much longer than 20 years and that previous


information to the contrary, whatever its source, is erroneous?"

Edwards asked the board, "I would also ask why you aren't tracking the collection or the lack of with some kind of report or graph. It is now \$15 million, \$20 million, who knows? Everyone in this room knows it is an election year, but there is no reason to put this off," he added.

While Edwards said he wanted to talk about other subjects as well, he only gets four minutes a month to do so and feels tax collection is the most urgent issue. "I would like to talk to you this evening about the need for a park in District 9," said Edwards. "I would like to talk to you this evening about the screening of fire departments. I would like to talk ... about illegal campaign funding from churches or non-profits ... about funding of county departments ... about jobs ... about education funding."

"By far the number one item should be \$13 million of uncollected taxes," Edwards said. He complained that the

# New Northampton Superintendent Takes Helm During School Board Back-to-School Discussions

In a show of support for its current leadership, the Northampton County School Board voted unanimously to retain Dr. Richard Drury and Mickey Merritt to remain at the helm as chairman and vice chairwoman, respectively, for another year.

The board also agreed to keep its current committee assignments until the Board of Supervisors selects replacements for Calvin Brickhouse and Richard Bland, whose terms expired this year.

Northampton's new superintendent, Dr. Walter Clemons, addressed the board, stressing his goal of improving student achievement. "We need to set high expectations for our children," he said. His motto for the coming year will be, "Every Kid — Every Day."

The board discussed ability group-

ing of students in classrooms, as well as short-term suspensions that are recommended by school principals. Both matters were tabled for further review.

The Board voted unanimously to recommendations by Dr. Clemons regarding the reorganization and timing of School Board meetings. Under the plan, the monthly work session will be moved to the same day as the regular session, beginning at 5:30 p.m. A closed session will begin at 6 p.m., followed by the open session at 6:30 p.m.

Additionally, there will be Saturday public chat sessions three times per year, one at each of the three schools.

Dr. Drury quoted figures from Eastern Shore Community College that showed a marked decrease in the number of Northampton County students taking advantage of the dual enrollment program.

Board member Kristin Webb stated that one factor in the decrease is likely related to the cost.

Board member Patrick Hand noted that if some of the faculty at the high school could become endorsed as instructors for the college, the classes could be taught in Eastville, thus saving students the travel time as well as expenses.

The board discussed re-establishing an in-house food services program at all three schools, having voted unanimously not to renew the food services contract for the coming year. Director of Operations Chris Truckner indicated he did not see any roadblocks to reestablishing the locally operated food service.

The board also considered a change to the standardized dress code for this

fall. On the recommendation of the three school principals, striped shirts and the color maroon will no longer be allowed. Black pants and skirts will be added to the acceptable list of colors. Principals had expressed concern over the color maroon, as it resembles red, which is a gang color and had reported difficulty in ruling on width of the stripes in some shirts. Dr. Drury suggested that making a change this late in the summer could cause some parents a problem if they had already purchased new school clothing for their children. Following additional discussion, the board voted 7-1 (Drury voting no) to make the color changes, effective this September.

In other business, the board voted unanimously to merge the school dental plan with that of Northampton County.

(Continued From Front Page) strike the Annual Statement of Income and Expenditures Report requirement from its bylaws. After discussion, the supervisors directed Mason to develop the accountability fund plan.

"The county needs to develop a written policy that governs what these funds can be used for and establish mechanisms to ensure compliance," Mason said. "There has been no alleged inappropriate use of county funds or any other negative action that prompted this policy. ... Companies have done nothing wrong. ... The time to clarify permitted uses of funds and to improve accountability is not after a negative event has occurred but rather before to reduce the chance of one occurring."

"We need to be proactive ... so we have a policy in place that is clear," said Crockett, who motioned for the proposal to be adopted. "There is a county in Northern Virginia (that was) cited in an audit ... it's just a matter of time. I'm surprised we haven't already been cited." He said in comparison, departments within the county aren't allowed to roll over funds. If not spent, "that money is gone. In this case, the money does not revert to the General Fund."

"We can't ever do enough to pay these people back for what they do for the county," said Thornton. She complained that the policy would create "twice the paperwork. If we had to pay (for the services the volunteers provide), it would bankrupt this county," Thornton added.

"This would create more work for the county," she said. "I just can't understand why we would put on an additional burden."

Wolff agreed that the county owes the volunteers, but he stressed that the board has a responsibility to see "that taxpayers are getting a fair shake."

Speaking for Painter Volunteer Fire Company, Supervisor Reneta Major, said she doesn't want the department to be penalized. "If there was nothing wrong with the old policy, why fix it?" she asked.

"But there really wasn't

an old policy," said Mason. "I think this is long overdue."

"Of course they should be accountable for the taxpayers' money," said Gray. "I do have a problem with holding the money. They need a rainy day fund like we all do. They have managed their funds well. We're penalizing them. I don't see that. They need every penny."

Gray said his mother's house, which caught fire in 1942 in the middle of a war, is still standing today as the result of the volunteers' efforts. "Being accountable, they don't mind that," added Gray. "But I don't think we should hold their money." He wanted Mason to draw up a bookkeeping method for the companies to follow.

At Mears' suggestion, Mason said he could add a provision for emergencies that would get money to the companies faster when they need it. Gray made the substitute motion.

Gordy thanked Mason for the extra work. But she said, we're "not being fair to them. I think we should give them their money."

Hart also objected to Mason's proposal. He said the companies need the money up front for day-to-day op-

erations, that the board doesn't require other (the library panels board and community college) to follow the proposal and that the money that could be held back as the companies save for equipment sometimes costing up to \$500,000 would be up for grabs "just like what happened with the drainage" funds. "A future board could make a

policy to take it."

Mason said the primary purpose of his policy "is to provide assurance that county funds disbursed to volunteer fire and rescue companies are used only for the public good (and) are accounted for in a clear and transparent manner." Mason said his proposed provisions "are very similar to those imposed by the state as a condition for receiving state categorical aid. We also looked at a number of other locality policies and practices. Most policies were more restrictive or more costly than what is proposed for Accomack," he said.

The proposal involved county fund sources and would permit spending for firefighting and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) vehicles and related expenses, personal protective clothing and equipment, training, education, volunteer stipends, facility construction, operation and maintenance. It would not include fund-raising activities, charitable contributions and inkind services. "Each company's funds (would be) determined during annual budget cycle."

Advances would be permitted for large, upcoming purchases and funds

would be dispersed in February and July. The plan also called for "random sample each year of transactions and test for compliance." The changes for reporting requirements included going from an annual statement of income and expenditures to reimbursement/ advance requests for funds, from a list of volunteers to Line of Duty Act Roster and NIMS (National Incident Management System) compliance reports, from maintenance records for apparatus to DOT (Department of Transportation) inspections, from submittal of PPCR (Pre-Hospital Patient Care Reporting) information to a copy of the current EMS license and any sanctions, and from a pump test for at least one pumper or tanker to tests for all engines used

"An agreement has been crafted whereby the county agrees to provide public funds to companies in exchange for each company agreeing to abide by the accountability policy and to provide the county with required reports," the proposal stated. "Previous reporting requirements were embedded in the Fire Services Commission Bylaws.

### Savage Explains Business License Policy

Accomack Commissioner of the Revenue Leslie Savage said this week that her stand on issuing business licenses to companies that owe personal-property taxes hasn't changed. She doesn't intend to issue licenses to those businesses unless state law or the county ordinance changes.

Savage said when she sent a note to County Attorney Mark Taylor last month saying she would be issuing the license to BIC Inc. of Wattsville in August, she did so with the understanding that the work for the county would be completed and payment from Accomack would automatically be used to pay the tax debt.

"It was my understanding that's what's going to happen," Savage said. "I won't release it (the license) until that's done," she said, adding, it is the same for any of the other 30-35 companies that haven't paid their taxes but applied for a business license.

The issue is only part of the con-

troversy concerning county bids that were awarded to BIC despite its delinquency. The company is working on the Kegotank Landing Walk, Seawall and Boat Ramp project in Modestown and was awarded the project on May 18, 2011. A business license for the company has been withheld for delinquent taxes for three years. Recently it disputed the bill.

Savage said Wednesday that she usually increases business tangible property by 25 percent if companies don't send in their annual property list. Once the changes in property for BIC were noted, she went back as far as she could, to 2008, to make changes.

At the time the contract was awarded, it was believed BIC owed about \$4,000 in back personal-property taxes. But that bill was really \$15,330. BIC's bid on the contract was \$20,000 less than the next lowest bidder, or about \$28,000. Savage adjusted the company's tax bill by \$6,078 once she was alerted of BIC's changes in tan-

gible property, she said.

BIC still owes \$22,725 in real-estate taxes and has signed an agreement with Treasurer Dana Bundick to make payments for all its overdue taxes. Savage wrote to Taylor on June 28, "We will issue BIC Inc. (a) business license when the first payment is made on the payment agreement, which will be in Aug. 2011."

Taylor sent emails to county department directors advising them that when a company signs a payment plan to pay off tax debts, it is no longer considered delinquent.

Savage said she would release a list of the rest of the companies for which licenses have been withheld.

# County Pays for Board's Meals

### **Northampton Circuit Court**

An Accomack woman pleaded guilty in Northampton Circuit Court Monday to 10 counts of forgery.

### New Superintendent Addresses Supervisors

On his 20th day on the job, Accomack School Superintendent Dr. Bruce Benson told Accomack supervisors that he is in "listening mode" as he gathers input from stakeholders inside and outside the school system.

Even so, he was able to report the division's national achievements, the hiring of dozens of new teachers and the millions of dollars worth of scholarships earned by the county's latest graduating classes.

"Public education is a community effort," he said. "Everyone is moving at the same effort for a continued success."

Dr. Benson said 324 students graduated from the county's four high schools last month. The seniors were awarded more than \$4,169,000 in scholarships. "It speaks well of the preparation," Dr. Benson said.

The superintendent further stated that the division gained national recognition recently as third in the country in chapter display for building trades, 19th in welding and first in pipe welding. The program "not only wins awards, but gives kids choice career paths," he said.

In addition, Dr. Benson reported that preparations are being made for the next term. Forty-seven teachers were hired to fill vacancies and six schools will be online with broadband, which will provide instructional and administrative advantages.

Supervisor Grayson Chesser said he recently overheard how children are coming home to tell of his new program to help students with SOLs (Standards of Learning) at Arcadia.

"With 20 days on the job, at this point ... I can't take credit for anything," Dr. Benson said.

"The kids were giving it to you," said

The supervisors welcomed Dr. Benson, who came to the county after serving as the Albemarle County assistant superintendent for operations and system planning. Dr. Benson started as a biology, chemistry and computer-science instructor, moving up the ranks over 28 years.

"I'm very excited to be here," the superintendent said.

### **Cape Charles Council Discusses Town Improvements**

Diane Davis urged Cape Charles Town Council last week to make more of an effort to require property owners to keep their lots in good condition. She remarked that some property owned by absentee owners has unwanted trees growing in their yards and unused construction materials stacked on it.

A letter to Town Council by Steve and Chris Mitchell echoed the comments by Davis and suggested that the absentee owners be held responsible for making repairs to the structures on their property, sell them outright, or have them demolished.

Bill Payne announced that he is working to get a youth vegetable garden established near the entrance to the town.

Town Manager Heather Arcos reported to Council that the golf cart and bike path connecting Bay Creek to the rest of town is open and being used by the public.

Harbormaster Smity Dize reported that income from the harbor slips over the Fourth of July weekend was just short of income received for all of July 2010.

Town consultant Bob Panek and Public Works Director Dave Fauber provided an update on construction of the new Wastewater Treatment plant. Fauber reported that construction was about 100 days behind but the delay is expected to be made up. The goal is to have the plant completed by the end of the year.

The C.A. Lindman Company was awarded a contract not to exceed \$75,000 to repair masonry work on the 1930 Town Municipal Building.

### Historic School Dedicated

An estimated 300 alumni, former staff members, state Sen. Ralph Northam and Northampton County's newest superintendent looked on as a highway marker (pictured at right) was unveiled recently to commemorate the historical significance of African-American public education in the county.


Prior to 1935, educational opportunities for African-American children in Northampton County were extremely limited. There were no publicly funded high schools for African-American children in the county. Tidewater Institute was established just south of Cheriton by the Baptist Association and operated from 1905-35. Families who could not afford to send their children there were left with the option of sending them to live with friends or relatives who resided in localities that did have high schools for them.

In 1935, Northampton County Public Schools began offering secondary education in the former Tidewater Institute building until that site was condemned. In the fall of 1940, Northampton County High School was moved to a small, three-story brick structure in Machipongo, which had been part of the Northampton County system. That building continued to be the only African-American high school in the county until money was appropriated for construction of a new high school in 1953. That building currently houses the county administration offices while offices in Eastville are being renovated.

Northampton County High School continued to provide an avenue for higher education until the end of segregated public schools in 1970 when the building became a junior high and later a middle school.

Calvin Brickhouse, the last surviving principal of Northampton County High School, was the guest speaker for the dedication. He has served for the past eight years on the county School Board.

The Northampton County High School Alumni Association (NCHSAA). formed in 1989 to help preserve the heritage of African-American public education, provides a number of scholarships.



Speaking of the former high school, Stephen Fox, remarked that for African-American children in Northampton, "the chance to attend Northampton County High School was the zenith of their lives."

Former school Superintendent George Young, who helped oversee the transition to integration for county schools, spoke of the importance of the dedication ceremony. He noted the value of former African-American administrators such as William Smith, Otis Bragg, John Worsley, and Clarence Arnold, who helped smooth the way.

Historical archives from the years that Northampton County High School existed are housed and on display at First Baptist Church in Cape Charles. Fox presented a framed photo and news article about Lt. Henry A. Wise, a product of Northampton County High School, to be added to the archives. Lt. Wise went on to attend college and became one of the famed Tuskegee Airman of World War II. After the war. Wise became a doctor and resided in the Baltimore area until his death three years ago.

Dr. Walter Clemens, who took over the helm of Northampton County Public Schools earlier this month, spoke of the importance of parents taking an active role in the education of their children. "It is incumbent on all of us to work together to provide the best education possible for our children that we can," he said. "We need to become role models for our children. ... We cannot afford to have a sub-par school system. It will be my task to get the job done."







supervisors haven't discussed the matter. "Yes, you are funding yet another study/audit. You are famous for studies: EMS, cost cutting, land use, water and sewer, just to name a few, and with little or no action to any. A quote from me (from) five years ago now seems appropriate, 'paralysis by analysis.' "

"If you don't address this issue, it will never be addressed," he said. "We as citizens and you as a board will never be able to have the kinds of things and service we deserve. We don't need new taxes. We need to collect the ones we have. A rate reduction would be nice. Is it a level playing field when 13,000 people or companies aren't paying their fair share?"

Edwards said he came up with that figure by multiplying the 460 pages of the delinquent list by the 30 lines per page. "This does not require rocket science, a collection department or two or three more lawyers which would be at no cost because legal costs can be added to the bill paid by those who are delinquent."

### Wallops Research Park

The supervisors voted unanimously to continue their commitment to make Wallops Research Park a success. But that action did not include spending more than \$820,000 to swap federal park property and add more than 32 acres to the research facility lands.

Supervisor Wanda Thornton raised the issue. She asked for it to be on the supervisors' agenda last month after a majority of the board voted to stop paying a lobbyist to work on getting a bill passed that asks Congress to exempt Accomack from having to replace the property. Rep. Scott Rigell introduced

"I'm not sure the board is fully committed to Wallops Research Park (WRP)," Thornton said. She wanted to know where the others stood on the subject. "I don't want to be spinning our wheels ... if the bill doesn't pan (out), we'll have to buy a piece of land in the county. I'm doing everything I can."

Thornton said others needed to step up as well. Specifically, she called for Supervisor Grayson Chesser, who offered to use his Washington connections to help, and Supervisor Sandy Hart Mears, who also said she had a contact, to get to work. Mears said she was looking for phone numbers.

"I think we need to recognize that the active tenant is not going to work out," Chesser said of BaySys Technologies. He contended it was premature to take a vote on spending money for the land. "We told our folks we couldn't afford to do it," Chesser said of state and federal representatives. "We should wait until the report of the park committee" is made to take a vote.

Thornton complained that she got two calls from Washington this week regarding the high unemployment rate (12 percent) in Florida and how the NASA base in that state wants to stay busy, possibly causing NASA Wallops to have cutbacks. She also complained "respectfully" to Chesser that he has not been supportive of economic development.

Crockett told her there was no need to get personal. He later asked Miner if the rules of order they adopted in January apply to the remark. Miner said comments need to be addressed to the chairman.

But Chesser wasn't alarmed. He "respectfully" disagreed with Thornton. He said he has supported economic development. He thanked Crockett for standing up for him but said it wasn't necessary. "I'm a big boy."

Miner said the bill was in a subcommittee of the House, with the next step being a public hearing. "I don't know how many people will be needed" to speak at the session. He also reported that the WRP Advisory Council would meet this week to discuss the park and the status of BaySys as a tenant. He expects the panel to report back to the supervisors in September.

Crockett said he would need more information before spending \$800,000.

Thornton argued that the county wouldn't have a choice, "It cannot go forward until we rectify this piece of land" — 32.56 acres, she said. At one point, land was discussed for District 9.

Later Edwards said, "We in District 9 feel like we need a park. It would be one alternative. I know we can't afford it now."

For instance, the entire premise of "Gilligan's Island," though ludicrous enough in its day, would be even more untenable with one cell phone on the island, to say nothing of a GPS on the *Minnow*.

And some sitcoms were changed mid-stream by technological progress. Whereas an early segment of "Seinfeld" found the starring quartet, sans cell phones, wandering a parking garage looking for each other, later episodes featured the mobile devices.

And take a movie like "Dial M for

Post Op-

Murder." Not only is its title archaic, but the defining moment of the film would be forever altered if there had only been Caller ID on that phone.

And the original "Rear Window" (yes, I know my Hitchcock) would not have had to rely on that crazy signaling with a flash attachment when a short buzz on a cell phone or even a text message would have sufficed.

Then there was that segment of "Friends" when Phoebe wanted to know where some obscure country is located. Hadn't anyone heard of the Internet? To say nothing of the episode when they all tried to name the 50 states.

And a bit of Caller ID certainly would have killed the comedy in "An American President," when Annette Bening's character mistook the president's voice on the phone for that of a colleague's imitation.

Even that crushing scene in "Casablanca" when Rick holds Ilsa's farewell letter while its ink runs in the rain would have had a totally different am-

biance with a simple text message.

### Tangier Church Opposes Creation of Palestinian State

At the 2011 Virginia United Methodist Annual Conference, Resolution Number 13 was passed which states "that a viable Palestinian state must have a sustainable financial foundation ... affirms strategies that will bring about an independent, sovereign Palestinian state ... (and) recognizes that

a nation, do we believe the Christians there will be allowed to worship openly? History gives us the answer to that question.
