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Light Shed on Murder Case

The murder of a Guatemalan native near Parksley in July was an attempted robbery gone wrong, according to a document filed in Accomack General District Court. The record also shows that the suspect, who is a felon, admitted to carrying a BB gun during the alleged shooting.

Devonte LeShawn Davis, 18, of Airport Road in Melfa was charged in August with the first-degree murder of Belarmino Escalante, 25, of Greenbush. The father of four died from a single gunshot wound as emergency workers rushed him to the hospital.

Police said the victim and other poultry employees regularly gather at the incident site to catch a ride to various locations for work. Escalante was found at about 4 a.m. in a grassy area just off Lankford Highway near the former Godwin's Nursery, now a church.

"On Aug. 15, 2011, suspect Devonte Davis advised that on July 21, 2011, he and his friends were at a convenience store and observed a Hispanic male's vehicle at the gas pumps," according to the court file. "The Hispanic male's vehicle began to drive off and one of the subjects in the vehicle with Devonte said, 'Let's follow him.'"

"Devonte stated that he and his friends had decided to follow the vehicle to rob the Hispanic male," the document states. Eventually, the two vehicles went to 18347 Lankford Hwy. "The Hispanic male parked his vehicle at this location and Devonte and his friends parked beside him," the file says. "Devonte stated that he had a BB gun and one of his other friends in the vehicle had a gun also. A brief conversation had begun with the Hispanic male and Devonte and his friends when several other vehicles drove into the parking lot. ... Devonte advised that when the other vehicles drove into the parking lot, he and his friends decided to leave."

As they were driving off, "one of the subjects in the vehicle with Devonte said, 'Back up,' " the court document continues. "The driver of the vehicle that Devonte was in backed up and stopped ... beside the Hispanic male's vehicle that they were going to rob ... Escalante was approaching the Hispan-

ic male's vehicle that Devonte and his friends had started to rob. Devonte and his friends began a conversation with ... Escalante when one of the subjects ... shot the victim. Devonte and his friends drove off after the victim was shot."

According to the records, Davis is an unemployed high-school graduate who was getting financial assistance from his family. He was on probation for juvenile offenses that included burglary and larcenies. Davis is being held without bond at Eastern Shore Regional Jail in Eastville.

Also in connection with the alleged July 21 incident, he was charged with attempting to rob the other man of property, conspiring to rob him, possession of a firearm by a felon and use of a firearm in a felony.

In an alleged incident on July 24, 2011, Davis was charged with "being a person in a mob" that maliciously caused bodily injury. Court records state that suspects "Kevonte Bell along with Tyvon Smith, Devonte Davis," and two others "assembled to fight (a) victim ... while at the Wallops Island Royal Farms." The victim "was walking towards his vehicle and then was assaulted by these suspects." He "was punched in his face, kicking and kneeing to his rib section" and "received a cut to the back of his head behind the ear."

Bell, 18, of Gaskins Road in Onancock was arrested and charged with the Wattsville incident and another alleged crime at Melfa Post Office, according to Sheriff Todd Godwin. Bell is accused of malicious wounding by a mob, two counts of brandishing a firearm and two counts of possession of a firearm by a felon.

Tyvon Smith, 18, of Diamond Spring Lane in Parksley was arrested and charged with brandishing a firearm at all three of the alleged crime locations, Godwin said. Court records show he has worked at a poultry plant since June. Smith also was charged with malicious wounding by a mob, malicious wounding, four counts of brandishing a firearm and four counts of possession of a firearm by a felon. Godwin said both Bell and Smith are being held in Accomack County Jail with bond denied.

October hearings are scheduled.

Wolff Running for Re-election

Accomack Supervisor Ron S. Wolff of Assawoman has announced his quest for re-election as the District 2 representative. He is unopposed.

"I would like to thank my constituents and all citizens of Accomack County for the opportunity to serve," Wolff said Tuesday. "I'm looking forward to working with the new configuration of District 2," he added, referring to recent redistricting.

The 59-year-old Independent is seeking a third four-year term. He has owned and operated Wolff's Sandwich Shoppe in Atlantic for the last 27 years. Wolff graduated from the University of Maryland in 1975 with a bachelor of arts degree in education and a minor in history. He taught history at Atlantic/Arcadia High School in Oak Hall from 1975 to 1979 and then taught in Somerset County, Md., from 1979 to 1984.

Wolff has served as both chairman and vice chairman of the county Board of Supervisors. He serves on the 9-1-1 Commission, the Accomack-Northampton Transportation District Commission and the Accomack County Library Foundation Board. He recently was appointed by the supervisors to serve as the their liaison to the Economic Development Authority.

Wolff also served on Accomack's Fire & Rescue Commission, Economic Development Committee

and Wallops Research Park (WRP) Advisory Committee. He was appointed by the governor and legislature to serve on the Joint Commission on Technology for Aerospace.

Wolff said he is very supportive of the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport (MARS), NASA and the Navy

and "would like to continue to see that work completed, especially Wallops Research Park and the Orbital Taurus II launch project."

He will keep offering constituents' meetings, which he's held monthly for the last eight years. Being a supervisor has "certainly been a learning experience," he said. "I hope to continue the work that needs to be done for Accomack County."

Wolff is also a member of the Eastern Shore Anglers' Club, the Chincoteague Coast Guard Auxiliary and the Eastern Shore Soccer Referee's Association.

He is married to the former Rebecca Lewis and has three grown children and six grandchildren.

Accomack Circuit Court

Jamar Hinmon, 26, of Saxis Road in Temperanceville was sentenced last week in Accomack County Circuit Court to two years for attempted burglary, 12 months for property destruction and two years for maliciously shooting at an occupied dwelling. The incidents occurred in March 2010.

The terms were set to run consecutively, with all but a year and five months suspended. Hinmon also was ordered to be on good behavior for five years and placed on supervised probation for two years. Hinmon also was directed to pay restitution of \$977 to Ashley Fletcher.

Storm Carter, 61, of Second Street in Keller was given a three-year suspended sentence for grand larceny of A-Z Furniture on June 20, 2010.

Irene, Which Means Peace, Betrayed Her Name

Eastern Shore residents are counting their blessings following the hurricane that held us captive for several days. The storm raged through Accomack and Northampton counties, bringing floodwaters, high winds and general havoc. But there wasn't nearly the devastation that was anticipated.

"Here in Onley we have a lot to be thankful for," said Rose Pierson. "We didn't lose power and we had minimal tree damage. THANK GOD."

Believe it or not, Tangier Island didn't lose electrical service. "No problems," said Town Clerk Renee Tyler. "A couple of homes might have gotten some water. We did have some tide, of course we did." Tyler said some watermen lost crabs as well. It was "just like a nor'easter," she added.

On Sunday, an Accomack-Northampton Electric Cooperative (ANEC) worker said 3,400 outages were reported at 6 a.m., but they were down to 1,000 by 1

that afternoon. That was narrowed to about 60 by Wednesday morning and all were repaired by day's end. Most residents couldn't say enough good things about the company, which was assisted by crews from other areas of Virginia.

One weather watcher near Cheriton reported 76 mph winds. More than six inches of rain were collected outside Painter. Branches and shingles shook loose all over the Shore.

Four shelters in Accomack were used by 998 people, according to Jason Loftus, director of the county's Public Safety Department. In Northampton, Emergency Medical Services Coordinator Hollye Carpenter reported that 225 people used the shelter at the high school. Lowland residents were told to leave across the counties and some took mini-vacations north and west of the Shore.

While there was no loss of life, farmers took a heavy blow. A preliminary report compiled by Sara Seaman, also of Public Safety, shows \$2.9 million worth

of damage to agriculture in Accomack. Corn was blown over or sitting in pools of water. Figures were not available at press time for Northampton.

The Accomack document also shows a total of \$122,825 worth of damage to nine single-family homes and loss to two businesses totaling \$49,450. More than \$1.5 million was spent on the storm, the report continues. Debris removal cost \$69,235, emergency protection measures took \$167,160, roads and bridges required \$5,000, public buildings and equipment expended \$11,170, public utilities cost \$200 and parks and recreation facilities required \$1,294,780.

Accomack Public Works Director Stewart Hall said that last figure was attributed to damage at fishing piers in Harborton, Saxis, Deep Creek, Hunting Creek and Hammocks.

"It went better than (Hurricane) Floyd," said Saxis Volunteer Fire Company President Aubrey Justice. "We just had a little bit of tide. The fishing pier got beat up" and for several hours the main road from the island was not passable.

"We were very fortunate," said Saxis Mayor Denise Drewer, nonetheless noting that the pier "broke up pretty bad. It's just going to happen again," she added, contending that the pier should have been built higher.

Carpenter said there was little damage in Northampton County. Flooding was "nothing that people weren't typically used to" in a major storm, she said. Carpenter said she had heard there was damage to the Oyster dock, school administration building and the roof at the high school, which leaked. A single-family house in Northampton had major damage after a tree that fell on it.

She said officers of the Northampton County Sheriff's Office reported to work at 6 a.m. Saturday. Twenty additional State Police troopers were on the Shore to help out. State Police also sent a dive team whose members stayed in lodges at Kiptopeke State Park in case they were needed.

Bryan Rush, Chincoteague's Emergency Management coordinator, said two mobile homes on the island suf-

fered major hits — one was destroyed when a tree smashed into it. No one was injured. There were also 12 single-family homes and one multi-family structure with minor damage, and three mobile homes in need of repair. Nineteen businesses there also had some damage.

Rush said flooding occurred on the southern and eastern ends of the island. "It came in some areas a couple of feet deep," he added. "When winds turned, it pulled it all out."

Ive Chubb of Eastville said that before the storm, she put pictures of family and friends in the trunk of the car. "Everything else is replaceable," she said. "I spent the day praying, doing Sudoku, playing cards ... reading and pacing the floor ... we are approximately 15 yards from the water." She later reported, "A few trees fell down, but not on the house."

"We lost power at 12:30 p.m. but it came back on at 11 a.m. God has been good to the Eastern Shore," Chubb added. "This was supposed to have been a Category 3-4 hurricane. We were blessed to have it change to a Category 1. My heart goes to the mother (across the bay) whose child died in his own bedroom by a tree."

Chincoteague was reportedly a ghost town as tourists were ordered to evacuate and many full-time residents left as well.

"We had lots of rain and wind," said Ann Stubbs of her Island Resort. "No damage except one pole lamp on the street blew over. Tide did not come over our boardwalks. ... All guests headed out by Saturday a.m. We had seven state troopers sent in to assist that stayed with us from the western part of Virginia. They were very nice! We never lost power or cable so we mostly watched TV."

On Saturday afternoon, they took a drive around town to check things out. "We passed two other cars in 30 minutes of riding. It would have been much better if the media had shut up and left us to make out on our own. The governor even sent in the National Guard, first time since 1962 Ash Wednesday storm. They were all thinking of Katrina, but we are not 30

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"I saw people on TV in gas lines trying to flee — fighting over their place in line," she said. "I expect more people died on the highways than ones staying home. We have never left and I never will. We have been here through all the storms and we have been extremely lucky. Have had damage in the past but had it cleaned up in few hours or so. We never asked the government for help and we never expected anything from them; it is our property and we take care of ourselves."

"Chincoteague Island was blessed," said Shane Whealton, who lives there. "Actually, the island seems like the best place to be."

John Waterfield of Atlantic Road reported, "Our family is doing fine, lost a few limbs from the large pecan tree in our yard, but none hit the house, and we had no other damage. Everyone on the Shore was very lucky with this one. I hate to think how things would have been if it had been a Cat. 2 or 3 as they were talking about in the beginning."

Waterfield said that while surveying the area, "I ... took some pictures of standing water on the adjacent property in the soybeans, not 30 paces from the corner of the proposed Wastewater Treatment Plant site, and this only after 24 hours or so of rain, as dry as it has been."

Assistant Pastor Sharon Stratton of Building Brothers Up Outreach Ministry in Accomac said she and her family left home, which is surrounded by trees they feared might fall. They stayed at the church and opened it up to "anyone who needed a safe place. ... We returned home Saturday afternoon to find that God had blessed us and there wasn't any water standing on any of the roads leading to our home." She reported that the marsh along Drummondtown Road in Locustville and the road to Onley did not flood, "although the ditches were full."

The wind was blowing and the rain was pouring when C. Lee Davis and family left for the mainland. "We are hunkered down in our motor home in the shop here at the hardware store in Oak Hall," Davis reported. "We decided to leave our home in Chincoteague in case we couldn't get off the island after the storm to open the store. If the power goes out, we can run the generator

to keep the batteries up. We hope and pray everyone will be safe."

Just before the storm, Chatham Vineyards of Machipongo harvested 34 tons of Chardonnay. "The grapes are being held in two refrigerated tractor trailers set at 34 degrees until the storm passes," said Jon Wehner, who owns and operates the business with his wife. "Hopefully, we can begin processing tomorrow once power is restored."

"I still have 50 tons of reds on the vine," he reported. "Harvest is early because of the dry weather and pressure to pick before the hurricane. The reds will hopefully be harvested in two to three weeks depending on their condition after the storm."

Jack Mason of the Accomac area said, "We are about 100 feet from Metompkin Bay with raised house and generator. Lost a dead pine that the eagles used as perch to eat fish. Have a yard with dead reeds from Metompkin Island. They belong to The Nature Conservancy and I think they should retrieve them. If my tree wound up on their office, I think I would be hearing from them. Since they're probably the largest real estate company in the USA, they could afford the restitution. ... We didn't consider evacuation since this is the greatest peninsula in the world," Mason continued. "I watched The Weather Channel terrifying people, then listened to the Red Sox games on ... radio. Finished the evening watching about 25 marsh hens desert

At NASA, Keith Koehler said the damage was "minimal. A few downed tree limbs (and) some overwash on the island of sand on the roads. This was cleared Sunday." He said there were "some small puddles from the rain in the Horizontal Integration Facility. There was no damage to Taurus II components or the support equipment."

their marsh homes for my wet woods."

Natalie Rinker Good of the Cheriton area said she and her husband Bob are "in the process of raking up all 10,000,000 sticker-balls and should have that completed by first snowfall ... we have huge oak and old sweetgum trees on three sides of us, very close to the house. The sweetgum produces golf-ball size seeds w/stickers. In the spring and summer they are green and hang onto the tree; in the fall they do just that — fall in the yard and are brown, dry and painful if stepped on."

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Irene Leaves Mess at Refuge, Spares Ponies

Hurricane Irene didn't bother the famous Chincoteague wild ponies last weekend, but she did wreak havoc at Assateague Beach, tossing 4 to 18 inches of sand into the main surf's parking areas and causing Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge to close until workers could assess the damage and get some of the mess cleared up.

Refuge Manager Lou Hinds said Tuesday that the plan was to clear be-

tween 200 and 300 parking spots before today. "Doing any more would be a waste of taxpayers' money," he added, explaining that from September to May, the refuge doesn't need more parking than that. "It's June, July and August that our vehicle numbers swell to 1,000."

Hinds said waiting to clear more sand would "save hundreds of thousands of dollars. ... We've always put the parking lots back. This is the responsible and sustainable thing to do."

The manager said he is concerned about what the limited spaces will mean over Labor Day weekend, this weekend. "We are not going to accommodate all the people ... we're going to try our best to make their visit a successful one," he said. Meanwhile, "Swan Cove Beach is beautiful and is open."

Parking will be available in three parking lots inside the refuge. However, those using the lots will have to then walk or bike to Swan Cove. It is a round trip of more than two miles.

In cooperation with the refuge, the Chincoteague Natural History Association will offer bus transportation to and from the Swan Cove trailhead for beach access until beach parking lots reopen, said Michael Dixon, the refuge's visitor services manager.

The bus, which started running Wednesday, picks up passengers near

the flagpole in the Visitor Center Parking Lot and in front of the old Visitor Contact Station in the Wildlife Loop parking lot.

Dixon said, "While times are approximate, pick-ups will occur on the hour and the half-hour through 5 p.m. Return passengers will be picked up from the Swan Cove Trailhead approximately every half-hour starting at 10:15 a.m. The cost is \$1 a person for round-trip passage and will be charged as passengers board the bus. Only cash will be accepted. Space is limited. Passengers will be limited to one beach chair and one tote bag per person. No large items such as coolers will be allowed."

Dixon said that after Irene passed, trees were down on the main road and bike path and had to be cleared. "There was also a noticeable breach between Swan Cove Pool and the ocean," he said. "It looked like a raging river going through there." It subsided Monday, he said.

Denise Bowden of Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company said their ponies "made out fantastic" in the storm. "Friday we went over to the beach ... and opened up about 14 of the compound gates and let them get on higher ground," she said. "We put out extra hay, just in case. We went back Sunday and found them. They were back on the low-land. Not a scratch on them. Nothing."

- •A full cooler or freezer will maintain its cold temperature longer than one partially filled, so it is important to pack plenty of extra ice or freezer packs to insure a constant cold temperature. If available, 25 pounds of dry ice will keep a 10-cubic-foot freezer below freezing for three to four days. Use care when handling dry ice and wear dry, heavy gloves to avoid injury.
- •Thawed food usually can be eaten if it is still "refrigerator cold."
- •Eggs and other foods need to be stored in 41° F or slightly below. Do not eat foods that may have spoiled.
- •Always wash your hands with soap and water that has been boiled and cooled or disinfected. Wash your hands after using the bathroom or changing a diaper; after handling uncooked food or garbage; after touching a pet; after tending to someone who is sick; after blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing; after participating in flood cleanup activities; after handling articles contaminated with flood water or sewage;

before preparing or eating food; before treating a cut or wound; and before inserting or removing contact lenses

•Fight cross-contamination, which is the transfer of harmful bacteria to food from other foods, cutting boards or utensils. Never place any type of food on a plate that previously held raw meat, poultry or seafood.

- •Use a meat thermometer to ensure that food reaches a safe internal temperature: hamburgers and ground meat should be cooked to 160° F; poultry should be cooked to 170° F.; roasts, steaks and other large cuts of beef should be cooked to 145° F (rare) and 160° F (medium); fish should be cooked until the meat is opaque and flakes easily.
- Use sanitized food and water bowls for your pets and be sure that they do not drink from flood-contaminated surfaces.

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Hurricanes can cause flooding. Although skin contact with flood waters does not, by itself, pose a serious health risk, health hazards are a concern when waters become contaminated. Flood waters may contain fecal material, associated bacteria and viruses.

The Virginia Department of Health recommends the following precautions to prevent illness from flood waters.

- •Basic hygiene is critical.
- •Avoid eating or drinking anything that has been contaminated with flood water.
- •Do not wade through standing water. If you do, bathe and put on clean clothes as soon as possible.
- •Avoid contact with flood waters if you have open cuts or sores. If you have any open cuts or sores and cannot avoid contact with flood waters, keep them as clean as possible to control infection by washing well with soap. If a wound develops redness, swelling, or drainage, seek immediate medical attention. Residents who sustain lacerations and/or puncture wounds and have not had a tetanus vaccination within the past 10 years require a tetanus booster.

•If there is a backflow of sewage into your house, wear rubber boots and waterproof gloves during cleanup. Discard absorbent household materials, such as wall coverings and sheetrock. Clean walls and hard-surfaced floors with soap and water and disinfect with a solution of 1/4 cup of bleach to one gallon of water. Thoroughly disinfect food-contact surfaces (counter tops, refrigerators) and areas where children play. Steam clean all carpeting.

•If your plumbing is functioning sluggishly, you should conserve water as much as possible; the less water used the less sewage the septic tank must process. Minimize use of your washing machine. If you can't use your plumbing without sewage being exposed, consider moving to a new location until conditions improve.

•Do not have the septic tank and drainfield repaired until the ground has dried. Often systems are completely functional when unsaturated conditions return. Any repair must have a permit and be inspected by your county health dpartment.

•Other people's generators also provide an unpleasant aroma when your windows are open. But if you haven't

gotten around to meeting your neighbors, you might find they are people who will lend a chainsaw.

•My husband, Lloyd, learned that his ole chainsaw has seen better days and that clearing out a fallen tree is not as easy as it looks. Plus, the tree that fell was kind of sappy and that sticky stuff is hard to get off the skin.

•Our friends are the greatest. They offered us their showers and Internet while our power was out. And before the storm, they offered us refuge and other help.

•Insurance companies raise your deductible during a named storm. That could mean a more than triple deductible. Did you hear that last noise? That was my husband hitting the floor after he fainted.

Thanks to all those who patrolled the areas and kept us safe. We really appreciate it.
