Machipongo Crash Claims Life of Nassawadox Driver

Ten people have died in traffic accidents on the Eastern Shore in 2011.

The latest victim is Tayanna Brown, 20, of Brickhouse Drive in Nassawadox, according to Sgt. Michelle Anaya of Virginia State Police. The accident happened at around noon on Labor Day in Machipongo.

Anaya said a 1999 Oldsmobile Alero was stopped on the northbound shoulder of Lankford Highway when a 2002 Honda SUV driven by Brown went off the road to the right, striking the Alero in the rear.

Brown was taken to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital where she died about an hour and a half later. Anaya said Brown was wearing a seatbelt and alcohol was not a factor in the crash.

Preliminary numbers indicate that 14 individuals died in 11 crashes in Virginia during the 2011 Labor Day holiday. This is a slight increase from the previous two years in which the commonwealth experienced 13 deaths. The four-day statistical counting period began at 12:01 a.m. Friday, Sept. 2, and ended at midnight, Monday, Sept. 5.

"Unfortunately, we had hoped to see the number of fatal crashes decline and not increase, which is extremely discouraging to see such tragic and needless loss of life," said Col. W. Steven Flaherty, Virginia State Police superintendent.

More Kids in Accomack Schools

It was the first day of school for the Class of 2024. $\,$

Enrollment was up slightly at Accomack County Public Schools where administrators plan to continue expanding the way students learn instead of just answering multiple-choice questions.

Dr. Rhonda Hall, assistant superintendent for administration and human resources, told the School Board Tuesday night that part of the reason for the increase is the influx of students from private schools like Holly Grove and Broadwater Academy.

The first-day census showed an overall increase of eight pupils compared to last year's opening day, or 4,725 students. But individual schools saw some differences that equal entire classrooms of kids.

Nandua Middle School had 496 students, 63 more than last year. Chincoteague Elementary School was up by 20 at 269. Accawmacke Elementary had 12 additional students for a total of 539. Arcadia Middle had eight more or 427 students and Arcadia High had five more or 565.

Other schools had fewer kids. Chincoteague Combined was down by four for a total of 264. Kegotank Elementary was down by 31 to 530. Metompkin Elementary was down by 25 to 543. Nandua High had 566 students, 20 fewer than last year. Pungoteague Elementary had 16 fewer kids at 454 and Tangier Combined had four fewer, 72 students.

Shifts in enrollment also occurred because school choice is available due to poor AYP (Adequate Yearly Progress) scores. In the last two years, parents of 35 students have chosen to send their children to Accawmacke.

"We had a very good first day," said Superintendent Dr. Bruce Benson. "Teachers and students were glad to be here. ... Expectations have really changed for our kids. The world is different. The community is different. Our kids are different. They have different needs. We're going to have to do something different in our classrooms."

The superintendent said the student who can complete an assignment would be able to answer state and federal test questions that are multiple choice. But he wondered if those who know the correct answers would be as prepared to perform an assigned task.

"We want our kids to be good at critical thinking and problem solving," said Benson. The officials agreed that everyone would succeed if the schools continue to offer alternatives to the traditional teaching methods.

Principal Clara Chandler of Accawmacke, whose school hosted the board session, said a morning book club would be offered. "We're trying to get kids who don't like to read to love to read," she said.

In addition, instead of the standard book report being assigned, students can "sing a song" or "do a play."

Chandler said the school is active in fund-raising for charities because that shows "kids it's our job to give back to the community." Learning manners also helps with future job prospects. Chandler said the students learn to show respect for others, and shake hands while learning another's name and "looking us in the eye."

Chandler said the bullying program has taught students to get along with each other and has provided discussions for problem solving and life skills.

The School Board also informally agreed that Metompkin Elementary should be included in a state-funded program that gives pay incentives to teachers for their performance. Kegotank and Pungoteague already participate and details are being worked out to include the third school.

A review of summer programs also was given. The Jump Start Program served 77 students, assisted with listening skills and taught first-time students about the school setting. The Gateway Program had about 75 participants and included robotics and writing prompts. A Governor's School held at Nandua High hosted 24 students from across the Shore and offered a forensic science program.

It was reported that the summer migrant program was a big success and included 217 students and 128 out-of-school youth. Project graduation served 45 students.

Island Sewage Survey Finds Fewer Deficiencies

Forty-six sewage deficiencies are listed in a recent shoreline sanitary survey of Assateague Channel and Oyster Bay conducted by the state Health Department.

Among those is Chincoteague High School where, according to the July 28 report, "Septic system in front yard failing, with sewage erupting to ground surface over large area, pooling at rear of pump station and submerging holding tank." The notice lists the school as having "prolonged failure."

School Superintendent Dr. Bruce Benson explained, "We had a pump failure" last March. That issue was solved after the division worked with the Health Department and followed its suggestions. "We went beyond the expectation" by checking the system every day for 60 days, he said.

Another deficiency on the list is "directly across the street from the school ... septic tank located on school grounds erupting to ground surface, with evidence of erosion of soils on tank lid. Local Health Department notified by another party."

Overall, the survey found "notable" decreases in deficiencies. "Oyster Bay community is no longer considered a direct outfall of sewage treatment facility waste, as this system exhibits no surface outfall and no signs of failure. The number of industrial waste sources has decreased by three due to changes in operations and definitions. Contributors of animal pollution decreased by three."

More than 1,470 properties were studied in the survey conducted between Jan. 19 and July 1, 2011.

The sewage deficiencies include an 87room motel on Maddox Boulevardwhere "facility laundry has waste discharging to waste pit with evidence of recent overflow to the ground surface. Pit has a makeshift cover (floor mat) that is not sealed from the environment."

The report also points out sewage problems at 26 private residences some of which are vacant recreational vehicles and hunting cabins — plus a burned-out shop on Maddox Boulevard.

It also cites 21 rental cottages plus an office on Taylor Street. According to the findings, "Laundry waste actively discharged to the ground surface of ditch bank, with immediate discharge from ditch into storm drain emptying into Chincoteague Bay."

Of a seasonal restaurant on Maddox Boulevard, the report notes, "Facility peat sewage system is failing, with effluent leaking from system lid. Evidence of recent spillage across the ground surface. Local health dept. working with owner on corrections."


Animal pollution was noted at Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge, a chicken coop on Chicken City Road, a horse pasture and pen for geese on Pinewood Way, and a location on Deep Hole Road where llamas, emus, cranes, peacocks (10+), equines (12+), swans (10+), pheasants, chickens, and turkeys" roam. "Manure disposal is natural, with direct contribution to tidal waters that finds eventual outfall to Oyster Bay."

"Due to the number of properties on Chincoteague, this report encompasses only a portion of properties on Chincoteague and Assateague Islands," it states. "While the economy of both islands is based primarily on tourism, Chincoteague has a growing shellfish aquaculture industry as well as other seafood harvesting and processing operations," according to the report. "Lot development and enhancement is continuous on Chincoteague."

"The sewage disposal systems serving residential and commercial properties on Chincoteague Island are cesspools, septic tanks with drain fields or approved alternative systems, such as mounds and sand filtration systems," the report states. "As cesspools age and experience increased seasonal demand, they are frequently being replaced with alternative systems that are better suited to low ground. Even so, a significant proportion of existing dwellings continue to rely on cesspools and drywells."

"Sludge removal is by private contractor" to a mainland sewage treatment" plant, the report continues. "Assateague Island uses portable and vault privies for sewage disposal."

A separate survey was done in April 2010 for Chincoteague Channel and Tom's Cove.

IRENE LEAVES HER MARK ON LOCAL CROPS

Preliminary damage to the corn crop in Accomack County from Hurricane Irene is estimated at \$2.49 million. Harm to tomato and lima beans was also "significant" but loss figures are not yet determined.

"I estimate that 10 percent of the 19,722-acre corn crop was harvested prior to this event," Extension Agent Bill Shockley wrote in a letter to Accomack County Administrator Steve Miner. "Based on my observations and information obtained directly from growers ... it is my opinion that a minimum loss of 15 percent of the anticipated yield of the remaining 90 percent of this crop will be experienced."

He said that reasoning is "due to stalk lodging and the loss of actual grain due to the excessive wind associated with this system." The fall tomato crop has not yet been harvested. "Excessive damage to the field stakes was observed which will greatly increase the cost of field cleanup of this crop," said Shockley. "At this time we have no information as to exact dollar impact to this crop."

With lima beans, the extent of damage will depend "on the ability of the plants to return to a standing position which greatly affects the ability to harvest this crop," Shockley wrote.

He said the county's 36,688-acre soybean crop "appears to be in good condition. I observed little to no pod loss and the rainfall incurred had a very beneficial impact on this crop. Careful observation will be needed to monitor for disease infestations which can be enhanced by plant damage due to excessive wind ... I anticipate little or no revenue loss to this crop."

Virginia's tomato crop took a beating during Hurricane Irene, and corn, cotton and tobacco crops also suffered damage, according to preliminary reports.

Some 3,000 to 4,000 acres of tomatoes in Virginia's Eastern Shore were partially flattened and swamped, according to Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services board member Steve Sturgis.

Three commercial growers suffered losses: Pacific Tomato Growers, Kuzzens Incorporated, and East Coast Tomato Growers and Packers.

"These tomatoes are grown on stakes sticking five, six foot into the

Virginia farms sustained at least \$60 million in crop losses and damage from Hurricane Irene, the state's secretary of agriculture and forestry said.

That figure is based on preliminary assessments and is expected to increase as more farmers and localities report damage, Secretary of Agriculture and Forestry Todd Haymore said.

According to Virginia Farm Bureau Generally speaking, the areas that expected the most damage, including the Eastern Shore, actually fared well, according to Curtis Parker, a Virginia Farm Bureau agency manager for Accomack and Northampton counties.

"We had minimal damage, which included small limbs and branches on

air," Sturgis said. "So you can imagine, you've got these walls of tomatoes, and when the wind comes and pushes on the wall, it just snaps those stakes off."

Butch Nottingham, the department's marketing representative for eastern Virginia, said the Eastern Shore tomato harvest was "two-thirds to three-quarters of the way through" before Irene. "I think it's a little early to tell just how much damage has been done," he said.

Donna Johnson, president of the Virginia Agribusiness Council, said the corn that was still in the field before the storm incurred "a lot of damage" and would be difficult to harvest while flattened.

Agriculture is a \$55 billion industry annually in Virginia, the state's largest by revenue.

The poultry industry on the Eastern Shore appears mostly to have escaped serious damage and losses.

"We still don't know how the tomato plants on the Eastern Shore and some of the vegetable crops there are going to be impacted," Haymore said, adding that farmers are trying to restake their tomatoes.

the ground, an occasional shingle or two missing and, in rare instances, a larger limb or small tree on a house or shed," Parker said. "Irene was also a tremendous rain event with localized flooding. Due to the near-drought conditions we were under, most of this rain was absorbed readily and didn't cause a lot of problems."

Accomack Circuit Court

An Accomac man pleaded guilty last week in Accomack Circuit Court to abduction and assault charges.

Judge W. Revell Lewis III ordered a presentence report for Isaac Sample Jr., 43, of Church Road. Sample was convicted of the Dec. 13, 2010, crimes. It was the third assault and battery charge involving family members for Sample, according to court records.

In other cases:

What If YOU Were a Candidate? And How Important Is Voting?

As candidates announce their hopes for the November General Election and advertisements are posted along roadways, Eastern Shore residents proclaim their dedication to voting.

The majority also said in an email survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post that they would take the job of an elected official for a day so they could get a shot at improving their communities.

"Voting is a distinctly American privilege and a right earned by our founding fathers," said Vicki Weiskopf of Chincoteague. "No one ever appreciates this!"

Caramine Kellam of Franktown wrote, "If it were possible, it is not but what is wrong with dreaming, I would erase the county line so that the Eastern Shore would begin to think as an area and not a place of redundant services. To accomplish this, I would have to be God for a day, not one of the county representatives."

"Voting is very important to me and

Jane Wolffe of Chincoteague said as a county supervisor for a day, she would push for the board to "rehire the lobbying firm to work in Washington to keep the parking a stable part of Assateague and against the shuttle being located on Chincoteague. If the shuttle is used instead of allowing parking on Assateague, the tourism on Chincoteague will slow to a trickle and the restaurants and hotels will not be able to stay open. Tourism brings big dollars to the county in the way of meals, occupancy, real estate and personal property tax collection, all tied to the parking on Assateague."

Ginny Mueller of Keller said she wants "stricter laws and punishments around child abuse" with "no second chances for them."

The film, "Iron Jawed Angels," ... the story of Alice Paul and several other suffragettes," had an impact on Mueller. "When I saw and understood how hard they worked and what they suffered to get us the right to vote, I felt ashamed that I had been so lackadaisical about voting. I have not missed an election since. ... It is the best way to show you care about the town, county and country."

Ed Kehrig of Jamesville said he wants "all welfare recipients to work for their money." He plans to vote "for anyone who isn't already a politician. ... If you don't vote, don't complain. You want the right to complain, vote."

Janet Dudley of Cape Charles said, "I would change the charging of real estate tax billing to twice a year instead of once a year. It would give more working capital throughout the year and be less of a tax burden on the citizens. I have been requesting this change in Northampton County and Cape Charles for years."

She has occasionally missed going to the polls because "babies were sick," she was "out of town and forgot to absentee vote, vacation, got off from work too late (and) I was sick. I am sure at one or two I felt like my vote was not going to count anyway." Michael Stephano of Cashville said as supervisor for a day, "I would be looking at building our infrastructure and bring it into at least the early '80s." He would focus on "sewage handling in the northern part of the county."

Stephano said he also would "raise property taxes the maximum (amount) annually until our schools and basic services are funded again. This county is like the Third World. You get what you pay for."

Karen Simpson of Quinby said "of course" she votes. "Because it might be inconvenient on that particular day or because you don't particularly like who is running ... is no reason or excuse not to vote. It is a privilege we in the USA have that not all peoples in the world have. Take advantage of it. I am appalled at how many people do not vote. The apathy is staggering."

Max Furr of Captain's Cove in Greenbackville said as supervisor he would push for "Instant Runoff Voting," in which voters rank candidates in order of preference and their ballots are counted as one vote for their firstchoice candidate.

Vic Peppler of Wachapreague said, "If elected supervisor for a day, I would put forth the motion to adjourn early so the real do-nothings would do the least amount of damage. Either that or I would make them run with scissors and pray for a work-related injury."

He always casts a ballot "because sometimes, it comes down to a single vote."

Ann Stubbs of Chincoteague wrote, "I would not want any of those jobs, thank you very much, for any amount of money!"

Gail Ficken of Chincoteague wrote, "One day isn't much time to effect any change."

"As an American, it is my duty to educate myself to the positions of all candidates and choose whomever I feel will protect our country to the best of his or her ability," she said. "I can't complain if I didn't participate."

"I always vote even if I can stand most of choices," said Alex Russell of Wachapreague.

Lois Cooper of Pungoteague said

she always votes because "democracy doesn't work when just a small percentage of citizens vote. Witness the mess we're in now. The average citizen must speak out."

Glenn Muhle Jr. of Silver Beach wrote, "As a supervisor, I would look into ways to gain revenue from the migrant tomato trucks registered in other states. They put wear and tear on our highway and back roads."

Susan Penney of Belle Haven said she always votes. "We are fortunate enough to live in a country where we can elect other citizens to represent us in governing our county, state and country," she wrote. "I also believe people running for office should only be able to accept PAC, campaign, or any other contributions from registered voters and not from or through corporations, unions or any other non-voting entity."

Deb Gilmore of New Church wrote, "I would never be elected to public office because I would never run. It is easy to sit on the moon and say what we would do differently or better. But it is another to actually be sitting in their seats."

She has voted in every election she possibly could. "First of all, it is my privilege and right to vote. Secondly, if I don't vote, my voice will not be heard. And, thirdly, if I don't vote, I have no basis to complain."

Chris Young of Bloxom said she would consider being a supervisor for a day. "I would like to see more jobs generated and more businesses able to stay open."

Someone who only identified himself as "vashoreman of New Church" wrote that as supervisor, he would "do away with the health care for the supervisors. It is just wrong for them to receive when working part time. Don't know how they sleep at night. Leave the fire departments funds alone. They already file a statement into the county every year where the funds are spent and most have audits done. ... I have voted every year since 18. Thanks to my government teacher Mrs. Rounds at Chincoteague High School ... (I) was taught that was one right you have and should do it every election."



IS YOUR VEHICLE CAR POOL READY?

- Tires and tire pressure
- Hoses and belts
- Air filters
- Wipers
- Exterior and interior lighting

• Levels of engine oil; power steering, brake, and transmission fluid; windshield washer solvent; and antifreeze/coolant fluid. In addition, a 21st century tune-up should be performed to make sure the following systems are in proper working condition: battery — charging and starting, engine mechanical, power train control, fuel, ignition, and emissions.

The Car Care Council also recommends that parents, especially those driving longer distances to and from school, keep a roadside emergency kit in their vehicles that includes flares, a first-aid kit, a tire-changing jack, a tire-pressure gauge, jumper cables and a blanket.

Don't Pass Stopped School Bus

Code of Virginia: "A person is guilty of reckless driving who fails to stop, when approaching from any direction, any school bus which is stopped on any highway, private road or school driveway for the purpose of taking on or discharging children ... and to remain stopped until all the persons are clear of the highway, private road or school driveway and the bus is put in motion. The driver of a vehicle, however, need not stop when approaching a school bus if the school bus is stopped on the other roadway of a divided highway, on an access road, or on a driveway when the other roadway, access road, or driveway is separated from the roadway on which he is driving by a physical barrier or an unpaved area."





The Northampton County Planning Commission agreed to recommend approval to the Board of Supervisors for a marine fueling facility in Oyster.

Sugar Run, LLC filed a request to operate the facility, which would handle both diesel and non-ethanol fuel for boats. In addition, the facility would sell bait, tackle and other marine related. pointed out that the facility woould fit in with the county's Comprehensive and Economic Development plans.

Sarah Morgan spoke in support of the special-use permit. "It appears to support the water-dependent use as recommended for waterfront communities in the county," she said. "It would be wonderful to see boats be able to come and purchase supplies and fuel."

Accomack County Officials Need To Protect Atlantic

Atlantic is small-town America, Eastern Shore style at its best.

Atlantic is under assault by an outof-state developer with big plans for the

Atlantic Town Center. The Atlantic Town Center is his vision of a planned unit development for Accomack County. 

Atlantic Citizens Don't Deserve Burden of Wastewater Plant

Dear Editor:

There have been several news accounts about a developer's request to build a wastewater treatment plant in Atlantic. All included information about the developer's plans to move forward, and concern about Accomack County's handling of the matter. The developer's request would permit the building of a sewage treatment plant to treat wastewater from the Atlantic Town Center, planned to be located in Wattsville, several miles to the northwest.

The citizens of Atlantic are left with conflicting information, rumor, and idle speculation. The status of the permit request remains unsettled and no public meetings have been scheduled. In the meantime, the developer has been busy providing press releases and presentations to public officials, detailing plans to move forward.



ordinance to obtain the permit."

Citizens wonder why staff would instruct the developer to proceed under an old ordinance, which was changed in 2010 for the very purpose of denying this type of permit? The developer also indicated "that the actions of the director of zoning/staff had usurped the power of the Board of Supervisors and blatantly deny his constitutional rights." He has gone so far as to declare "that any local decision on this matter is now invalid because the county staff has exceeded the scope of their delegated authority."

In the meantime, the residents of Atlantic have been left with no official ruling on the matter, and given the developer's statements, they don't really know who will decide the matter. It is critical that this issue is addressed, since the developer's proposal to build Atlantic New Town, containing both residential and commercial property, has not been approved, but is linked to this project.

The county attorney is reported to have provided some free legal advice as to how the permit could lawfully be approved. He advised "that the property be rezoned from agricultural to business, include a condition that construction and operation of the facility proceed only when owned by the county or a municipality, and request a change to the agricultural zoning ordinance to eliminate the requirement that such facilities are allowed only when needed to replace failing systems."

The citizens of Atlantic have been provided no legal advice and are left with their concerns about the handling of this matter.
