

Johnny Strand's Murderer Sentenced to 35 Years

Popular pizza parlor manager Johnny Strand took home a Dreamland resident one night last year and wound up being in a deadly nightmare. His killer was sentenced Thursday in Accomack Circuit Court Thursday to 35 years in prison.

Fernando Carrillo Sanchez, 24, of the Accomac trailer park bludgeoned Strand to death with an aluminum "Little League" baseball bat, according to a summary of the evidence by Commonwealth's Attorney Gary R. Agar. An autopsy showed eight hits to the side and back of the head — "six of them were skull fracturing blows," the prosecutor said.

The murder took place just days before Strand's 50th birthday. Agar said he was told by a medical examiner that if Sanchez had called 9-1-1 that night, "Johnny Strand might have lived." Instead, Agar said, the defendant turned out the lights, locked the

door and fled in Strand's vehicle.

Sanchez pleaded guilty to first-degree murder in a plea agreement with Agar. Defense Lawyer Garrett Dunham said the defendant admits that sufficient evidence exists so he entered the plea. However, he maintains his innocence.

"I did it in self-defense," the defendant told the judge through an interpreter.

Corrected Crash Details Released

Police have released new information regarding a vehicular accident that killed a Northampton woman on Labor Day.

According to Trooper J.J. Renas, a 1999 Oldsmobile Alero driven by Debra Brown Lane, 46, of Cheriton was stopped about noon on the shoulder of the northbound lane of Lankford Highway near Treherneville when a 2002 Honda CRV driven by Ashley Ferguson, 25, of Newsoms, Va. "veered onto the shoulder, striking the Olds to the rear."

Tayanna Brown, 20, of Nassawadox, a passenger in the back seat of the Oldsmobile, was taken to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital where she died about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours later.

Also in the Oldsmobile were the owner of the vehicle, Vanecia Parker, and an unidentified 7-year-old boy, both of Nassawadox.

Ferguson was charged with reckless driving general. Lane was charged with improper stopping on the highway shoulder.

Initially, a police spokesperson incorrectly said that Tayanna Brown was driving the Oldsmobile and that no charges were filed.

Irene Delivers Serious 'Blow' to Shore Tomato Crop

A final agriculture and aquaculture assessment in Northampton County shows Hurricane Irene caused nearly \$7.34 million in crop damage. The majority of the losses — \$5.7 million was attributed to tomatoes.

"This was primarily to the fall crop which has not started harvest," said Extension Agent William E. Shockley, who compiled the figures based on estimates from producers, crop insurance personnel and the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

"Excessive damage to the field stakes was observed," he said. "This will greatly increase the cost of field cleanup of this crop."

A breakdown also showed estimated losses of \$400,000 for corn; \$250,000 for nursery stock; \$150,000 each to vineyards, soybeans and lima beans; \$25,000 to stringbeans; \$10,000 to other miscellaneous vegetables; and \$500,000 to aquaculture.

A preliminary assessment had an-

ticipated losses totaling \$382,218

"I estimate that approximately 60 percent of the 6,795-acre ... corn crop had been harvested" when Irene came through the area, Shockley said. "The remaining 40 percent suffered obvious wind damage. It is my opinion that the remaining 2,718 acres will experience a 15 percent yield loss due to stalk lodging and actual grain losses due to this damage."

The seven to eight inches of rain "while excessive in such a short period, appear to have created a limited adverse impact to crops due to the prolonged drought conditions we have been experiencing."

In addition, there was thousands of dollars worth of damage to Northampton County property and Cape Charles Beach. A report from Emergency Coordinator Hollye Carpenter showed the hurricane destroyed a house and left major damage to two other residences. Eight other homes incurred minor damage. Carpenter said a local business also had major damage. The

Shore Urged To Report Damages

Virginia Secretary of Agriculture and Forestry Todd P. Haymore has encouraged farmers and producers in localities impacted by Hurricane Irene to report losses of their crops, livestock, and farming infrastructure in order to potentially qualify for federal government assistance. Haymore also encouraged boards of supervisors in localities with agricultural damage to work closely on the reporting process with their impacted constituents.

Haymore also added that locali-

total for the houses and business was estimated at \$41,800.

County and town-owned property damages included \$1,500 to Oyster Harbor, \$1,500 to Cape Charles Harbor, \$2,000 to Cape Charles Fishing Pier and \$15,000 to the north end of Cape Charles Beach.

The cost to repair roof leaks at the county school administration building and the high school were not available.

Carpenter said she "also had several reports from commercial fishermen who had sustained major damages to nets, poles, docks, etc."

Updated figures in Accomack put farm and aquaculture damages there at nearly \$7.88 million: \$4.3 million to the tomato crop, \$2.49 million to corn, \$150,000 million each to vineyards and soybeans, \$250,000 to nurseries, \$25,000 to lima and stringbeans, \$10,000 to other miscellaneous vegetables and \$500,000 for aquaculture.

The total projected loss for the Eastern Shore from Hurricane Irene so far stands at more than \$15 million.

"Hurricane Irene caused significant damage in Virginia," concluded Haymore, "and the farming community in the Northern Neck, Eastern Shore, Southeastern, and Southside regions were hit especially hard. 

Preston Lee Strand Jr., 18, of Tunnels Mill Road in New Church pleaded guilty to the March 29, 2011, possession of a firearm by a felon. The case was continued for guidelines.

Joshua Kevin Wannamaker, 25, of Saxis Road in Temperanceville pleaded guilty to eluding a law-enforcement officer. Sentencing was deferred pending completion of a presentence report.

Robert Edward Giddings, 23, of Painter was sentenced to three years for assault and battery of Onancock Police Sgt. Dean Carroll. All but two years and six months of the term was suspended.



New Marine Facility OK'd for Oyster; County School Enrollment Increases

The Northampton County Board of Supervisors endorsed a request for a new commercial marine facility in Oyster at its meeting Tuesday.

Sugar Run, LLC had requested a special-use permit to construct and operate a marine fueling dock near the entrance to Oyster Harbor. The facility would also include a small bait and tackle shop. The board voted 4-0 to grant the special-use permit. (Supervisors Richard Tankard and Willie Randall were absent.)

School Superintendent Dr. Walter Clemons told the board the school year had begun on a positive note with 1,750 K-12 students, an increase of nearly 100 above the previous school year. Dr. Clemons noted that the FY 2012 budget had been based on a lower school enrollment and that if the current numbers hold for the year, it could mean as much as \$480.000 in additional state funds.

In a related area, Supervisor Oliver Bennett reported that some people are pushing to reopen the former middle school, closed over two years ago. County Administrator Katie Nunez indicated that tentative plans call for the county's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) office to move to the former school. In addition, \$1.2 million has been earmarked for construction of bays to house the three EMS vehicles. If that occurs, it would likely preclude the building's return as a school.

Tourism Commission Director Donna Bozza addressed the need for the county to continue supporting the tourism industry and to adjust the budget to reinstate the \$10,000 removed from the FY 2012 budget. Bozza said that for every \$1 invested, the county would see a \$5 return from those visiting the area. "Tourism is all about getting people here and having them spend money here," she told the board.

The board voted unanimously in favor of an ordinance to provide for the biennial assessment of real estate in the county. State regulations call for the localities to do reassessments every two to six years.

The supervisors discussed the need to streamline the county zoning regulations to make the county more business and residential friendly. Supervisor Sam Long also noted that the board needs to provide the Comprehensive Plan Review Committee some direction with regards to where it should focus its attention. The first of two public hearings on a proposed wind energy ordinance was conducted. The supervisors expressed support for the opportunity that wind turbine energy might hold for the county. A second opportunity for public input will be offered at the supervisors' work session Sept. 23 in the for-

mer middle school auditorium.

Prior to concluding the meeting, the supervisors agreed to change the meeting date of their October session to the third Tuesday, Oct. 18, because the county offices are moving back to Eastville at the time of the regularly scheduled session.

Accomack Has Tax Payment Plan

If you owe delinquent real-estate or personal-property taxes in Accomack County, Treasurer Dana Bundick will let you settle up through a six-month payment plan.

Those who owe can go to her office in Accomac and fill out an application or call and make arrangements. There are no other qualifications, Bundick said Tuesday.

However, the penalties and interest charged on late payments do not stop.

"The interest rate for delinquent taxes is 10 percent per year," she said. Offering the plans allows Accomack to receive all the money according to an installment plan that "suits the person. It can be weekly, semi-weekly or monthly," Bundick explained. "I don't extend the length of the plan or lessen the amount of payment," she added. "If people won't agree to the payment amount and the length of the agreement, there is no plan." Bundick said while she doesn't remember exactly when the first payment plan was made, it was "probably 15 years" ago.

"As far as not paying on time, if it is a rare occurrence and the payment is made up, nothing happens," she said. "If someone totally defaults, the plan is voided and we begin collection action."

Bundick previously said she and her workers have set up about 500 such plans. The real-estate debtors who take part are no longer considered to be delinquent by Bundick and County Attorney Mark Taylor and thereby are eligible to get a building permit.



Cape Charles Treatment Plant Nearly Done

The Cape Charles wastewater treatment plant is fast nearing completion. According to Town Consultant Bob Panek, while construction of the facilitv is about 100 days behind schedule, the \$15.1 million facility is slated to be completed later this fall.

Panek updated Town Council on the Public Service Authority (PSA) and Regional Wastewater System. He stated that revision of the Southern Node (Cape Charles and Cheriton) preliminary engineering report is currently on hold. The PSA has surveyed owners of about 300 residential and commercial properties outside Cheriton and has held meetings to gauge interest before finalizing the service area. Panek said the preliminary engineering report for the Northern Node (Nassawadox and Exmore) has been completed.

The estimated cost for the northern node project is \$11.3 million. The PSA has submitted a FY 2012 financial assistance application to the state Department of Environmental Quality.

Cape Charles Police Chief Sambo Brown announced the receipt of a

Federal Highway Safety Grant. The \$6,073 will pay for a Watch Guard Digital In-car Camera System, tuition for two officers to attend training at a DUI conference, and additional hours for the department's officers.

Chief Brown introduced the department's newest officer, Charles Graham.

Council reviewed a request for use of town property by a company seeking to build a restaurant adjacent to the harbor. The company would rent the property from the town and pay for construction of the structure. A public hearing on the request is slated for Oct. 13.

Public Works Director Dave Fauber provided Town Council with information regarding the previously approved public works building. Fauber stated that the building would be used to house the department's rolling stock to protect it from harsh weather. It was agreed to provide materials for the 30 x 80 foot concrete slab that will provide a foundation for the structure. The metal building will be added later.

In other business, Council agreed to reappoint Matthew Brown to the Building Code Board of Appeals.

Hockey May Be Coming to Exmore

Exmore has been asked to host a new street hockey league.

Speaking for the street hockey organization currently located in the Parksley area, Randall Stapleton noted that it draws visiting teams from off the Shore, which increases business opportunities for the area. Randall said he was not asking the town to foot the \$30,000 bill for a regulation paved rink, but rather to provide a suitable location for the rink. The 120' x 80' rink would be asphalt paved and enclosed by a 10-foot-high chain-link fence for safety.

Several Council members expressed interest in supporting the project. One suggested site was that of the former Center Chevrolet dealership adjacent to the town park. The property has been leased to a group which is interested in creating a farm museum but has yet to generate enough funds to make needed improvements to the structure on the property. It is up to Town Council to decide how best to proceed.

Interim Town Manager Arthur Miles recommended that the town advertise for a code enforcement officer/zoning administrator as it is becoming increasingly difficult for him to handle the responsibilities of both positions. Council agreed to advertise for a part-time official whose job will include working to bring properties within the town up to code.

Council reviewed the mandated regional water supply plan that all localities in the region are expected to adopt. The plan, as presented by the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission (ANPDC), provides for actions to be taken during a drought. It is being reviewed by localities. Council will hold a public hearing on the plan at its Oct. 3 meeting.

Miles reported that there is still a need top fill vacant positions on the Planning Commission, Zoning Appeals Board. Facade Committee and county's Public Service Authority (PSA). Interested applicants may apply for the positions at the Town Office.

Retired Judge John C. Morrison Jr. accepted the agreement, which calls for 15 years of the term to be suspended if Sanchez pays the unspecified court restitution and is on good behavior for 35 years. However, Morrison said since the defendant is in this country illegally, he is not eligible for good-behavior status.

Sanchez could have faced the maximum term of life in prison. He was brought into the courtroom wearing a white jail jumpsuit and was restrained with ankle shackles. He arms were crossed in front of his chest during the entire proceeding. Seven county deputies and the sheriff were in attendance. The interpreter sat beside him and translated the court discussions. Sanchez, a native of Mexico, has been in this country for about two years, living and working with other Latinos. Court records say he speaks little English.

Rather than reading the 10-page police interview and confession in public, Agar gave the document to the judge to examine. "It certainly justified the plea," Morrison said after reading it. "I find Mr. Sanchez guilty of first-degree murder."

The records also show that Sanchez never before has been charged with a crime. He has several aliases, including Fernando Martinez-Alex and Fernando S. Carbillo.

Strand died from "blunt head trauma," according to the autopsy. His body was found on May 1, 2010, by relatives who broke into his Pine Ridge Drive home in Melfa after he didn't show up for work. He was found "dead face down in bed with extensive blood pooling and spatter reported from the scene," court records show. A "blood-stained baseball bat (was) recovered from under the bed." He didn't fight his assailant, the report states.

The defendant claimed Strand forced him to have sex. There was no sign of a struggle at the scene, officers testified. The autopsy showed the head blows caused lacerations that went "done to the bone. Two to three blunt impacts to the front of the head" also were made. "The upper extremities show downward low velocity blood splatter ... there is no visible debris beneath the fingernails ... no defense wounds... It appears from autopsy findings and scene photographs that injuries to the front of the head, although they might have been sustained from impact or falls were consistent with pressure from the vertical uprights of the headboard of the bed supporting the forehead while the back and sides of the head received blows."

"The baseball bat measures 28 inches overall, nine inches of handle, 19 inches of bat," the report continues. "The bat portion is heavily stained with overlapping smears of blood. The weapon is consistent with the injuries identified."

Perhaps they were on the way to the 3rd annual festival in New Hampshire that was held recently. Or maybe when they broke through our atmosphere they gave the world a shake that mimicked an earthquake.

Have you guessed what I'm talking about yet?

Well, here goes. It happened late last month. Wachapreague residents again spotted UFOs (unidentified flying objects). They were quietly hovering around the Little City by the Sea on Aug. 31.

And what does this sighting have

in common with the one reported last November? Both UFOs were seen over Wachapreague on Wednesday nights.

"You've just crossed over into the Twilight Zone."

Are the visitors trying to break up our week or do they just like the lunch special that day?

"Weird lights in the western sky" were seen, said Vic Peppler about the August sighting. He described "at least five lights in close proximity to each other heading in a southerly direction."

Break out the tinfoil and get your iron frying pans ready! (Some people use those to shield body parts.)

"Two of the lights were blinking and three were steady," Peppler added. "I'm just glad that there are other witnesses to this as some folks would be thinking I've stumbled onto the last of the Hog Island hashish that had washed ashore all those years ago."

A Wachapreague woman also saw the activity. "There was no sound," she said on Facebook. "We must have inhaled too much marsh grass" that came up with Hurricane Irene.

Do you think a few people should wrap a little foil around their foreheads to keep the Martians from transmitting their brain data? Me too. What a great recycling measure. There are many websites that have suggestions for what one can do to keep from being abducted by aliens. This one, <u>www.stopabductions.com/</u> shows how to make protective head gear. "The thought-screen helmet has effectively stopped several types of aliens from abducting or controlling humans," according to the website. "Only two failures have been reported since 1998."

Another way to stop the extra terrestrials from taking you to their spaceships, is to put a quarantine sign above your bed," according to <u>www.as-</u> <u>sociatedcontent.com/article/1895986/</u> <u>keep aliens from abducting you in</u> <u>the.html?cat=60</u> "This could make the aliens believe that you are stricken with a deadly disease. About five seconds passed between the changes. Then all 21 windows were lit.

Another Wachapreague report was noted on July 4, 1999, which was a Sunday. According to the National UFO Reporting Center, a cigar-shaped object was seen for about 10 minutes. However, "the time was compatible with the launch of two Black Brant V missiles out of the U. S. Navy facility at Wallops Island. The report said the object disappeared and then returned about five minutes later."

Post Office Mail Onancock Town Attorney Is Wrong Dear Editor:

In weekly reports to Onancock Town Council, Town Manager/Attorney Thomas Robinett advises that

the information (on routine town manager activities) comprises attorney/client communication, subject to the attorney/client privilege, and is strictly confidential. He further advises that his communications are exempt from disclosure requirements

under the Freedom of Information Act. This is not only a gross distortion of attorney/client privilege, but the reports are not exempt from the act.

The attorney/client privilege belongs to the client (Town Council), not to the town manager/attorney. Information is not exempt from public disclosure except as specifically provided for under the Freedom of Information Act. It is the content of the report that determines whether it is exempt, not the label Mr. Robinett puts on it. Nothing in these reports has met the exemption requirements under the act.

Onancock has a long history of violations and abuse of FOIA by town managers and council members. Over the past year there were 20 meetings of committees of council without required public notice given. These committees are involved in nearly everything related to planning the future of Onancock and only a few people were privy to their decisions, which affect every citizen. Now we are told the town manager's communications with council members on these matters are privileged and confidential, and

> citizens' rights under the FOIA are denied.

> Good governance in a free society demands openness and transparency. By this measure, elected and appointed officials in Onancock poorly serve their oath
