Sharone Bailey's Killer Given 50 Years

Sharone White Bailey spent most of her adult existence counseling the mentally ill and helping other needy folks on the Eastern Shore, only to be "tortured and terrorized" during her last moments of life by a man suffering from a psychotic disorder.

Her killer, Derrick Demond Epps, 37, of Exmore was not taking his medication around the time of the incident, according to testimony. He was sentenced Friday in Northampton Circuit Court to a total of 50 years in prison for first-degree murder and related charges.

Epps appeared in a bright orange jail jumpsuit with matching handcuffs. He apologized to Bailey's family, "claiming full responsibility" for the crimes. "I had been doing so well for so long" and because of that didn't think he needed the medicine. "What was taken I can never replace and for that I am truly sorry," Epps said. He asked for forgiveness and for the court's mercy.

"Few people in this world ... have enjoyed such love and respect" by a community as Bailey, said retired Judge John C. Morrison. "I intend to go above the guidelines, but not as far as the (prosecution) asks."

Bailey, 57, was stabbed to death on July 9, 2010. Epps first attacked her outside her home on Occohannock Neck Road in Exmore. He lived across the street. Part owner of Therapeutic Interventions, Inc. of Belle Haven, where she worked with at-risk kids, Bailey had recently been named Eastern Shore Citizen of the Year for her work in the community.

Defense lawyer Garrett Dunham

suggested Epps be sentenced to 50 years, with half suspended. Prosecutor Bruce Jones called Epps "the operational definition of dangerous" and said "two life sentences and five years is little enough, Your Honor."

Morrison gave Epps 53 years for murder, 10 years for burglary and two years for assault and battery of Northampton Deputy William E. Smith. The judge suspended 15 years of the murder sentence and set the terms to run consecutively, for a total of 50 years. Epps also was ordered to be on supervised probation and good behavior for 20 years after release.

Dr. Angela Torres of Central State Hospital diagnosed Epps as having a "psychotic disorder not otherwise specified." She said that at the time of the offense, he believed "the victim's family owed him a debt from 400 years ago." He held those thoughts until her third visit with him. It was unclear how much time elapsed between visits. "My conclusion was there was no evidence that he did not know what he was doing."

Dr. Thomas Sugden of Virginia Beach said Epps is a paranoid schizophrenic. Neither doctor evaluated Epps for "future dangerousness." Both agreed with the prosecutor's assessment that the "best indication of future behavior is past behavior."

Epp's mother, Joann Davis Wilson, testified she could tell her son was having an episode about a week before the incident and made a doctor's appointment for him.

Guidelines for the crimes advise that the judge sentence Epps to between 25 years and five months, to 42

Man Killed in Scooter Crash

An Onancock man was killed Wednesday night in a head-on crash between a scooter and a pick-up truck near Parksley, according to State Police Trooper K.J. Johnson.

Everette Summerville, 54, was driving a 50cc scooter on Bayside Road about 0.4 of a mile from Lee Mont Road.

Johnson said that when he arrived at the scene, he found the scooter in a ditch and Summerville dead. Sgt. J.P. Koushel said he was not wearing a helmet.

Kaleb Parks, 18, of Parksley, the driver of the 1997 Ford pickup truck, was charged with hit and run. According to Johnson, Parks, who returned to the scene, thought he had struck a deer.

Northampton Sets Wind-Energy Standards

After months of discussion and hearings, the Northampton County Board of Supervisors has reached a decision regarding the standards for wind-energy facilities, including test and energy-producing units.

The Northampton Planning Commission had spent months battling the zoning change around, with several members opposing the change in favor of protection for birds and bats that might be killed by flying into the devices. Delsea Energy of Toms River, N.J., has been seeking the change that would allow it to erect energy test facilities in Northampton.

While no company has approached the county to erect energy-production towers, some Planning Commission members feared that the zoning change would open the door for them.

Sue Rice, manager of the Eastern Shore Wildlife Refuge at Wise Point, addressed the board and suggested changes to the proposed zoning that would lessen the impact on birds and

bats. Rice suggested that the maximum sound levels produced by a wind turbine be set at 50 decibels (dB) at a distance of several hundred meters. Rice also requested that all towers be of mono-pole construction rather than using guy-wires to it. Additionally, she requested that bird- and bat-warning devices be attached to guy-wires if they were to be used.

Planning Commission members Mary Miller and Roberta Kellam both outspoken opponents to the towers, sent letters opposing their approval. Kellam pressed for the sound produced by the towers to be no higher than 35 dB at night. Additionally, a letter from the Department of Defense requested that it be advised of any wind towers so their effect on military operations can be determined.

Supervisor Spencer Murray said there is no way to predict the economic impact of wind turbines or wind testing towers. He also noted that it would be almost impossible for a company to comply with the 35 dB requirement.

Supervisor Sam Long Jr. asked if the proposed testing tower would be of mono-pole construction or if it would require guy-wires and was informed that the latter was the case.

Supervisor Richard Tankard stated that while he supports the concept of using test towers in the county, he opposes any wind-generating turbines on the mainland. Instead, he said, they should be erected offshore.

The board voted 5-1 (Tankard opposed), to approve the zoning change to allow for the use of wind turbines and/or testing towers in the county. A special-use permit is required for the erection of wind turbines and towers, thus giving members of the public an opportunity to speak if such a request is made.

The board received a report from the Fire and Rescue Commission regarding services provided by career and volunteer agencies in the county. Kenneth Brown of the Virginia State Firefighters' Association said the report shows one main concern expressed by those interviewed: lack of communica-

tions and trust between the career and volunteers, as well as with county government in general.

The report recommends that a strategic communications session be conducted to help resolve challenges and barriers between the groups. Brown suggested that a communications model be developed, with all stakeholders having input in public-safety decisions. Other suggestions were focused more on ways to improve vehicle and equipment purchases by focusing on standardization of items purchased. Brown stated that recruiting and retention issues need to be addressed to insure that there are adequate numbers of volunteers for all stations.

With 74 percent of all fire and rescue calls involving Emergency Medical Services (EMS) as opposed to fires, the commission recommended that all new members of a fire department be trained to the level of emergency medical technician.

While not carrying the force of a regulation, the board voted to accept the report of the Fire Commission.

Changes to the makeup of the Planning Commission and the School Board are required due to the elimination of one voting district in the county. Though Calvin Brickhouse has served the maximum number of years allowed on the School Board, a replacement still needs to be found for Richard Bland, who has served two terms and indicated that he does not wish to continue representing District 4. Residents living in District 4 may obtain an application for the position from the County Administrator's office in Machipongo.

Thornton Unopposed

Wanda Thornton, who represents Island District on the Accomack Board of Supervisors, is seeking re-election in the November General Election. She is unopposed.

Thornton has been on the panel since 1996. Prior to that, she served on Chincoteague Town Council for more than seven years.

"I believe we are facing the most difficult challenges that we have ever faced in this economy," Thornton said this week. Her goals include supporting economic development that will bring jobs to the county, insuring that spending and taxes are kept under control, maintaining beach parking at Assateague Island while working toward dune stabilization and beach replenishment, and completing Wallops Research Park.

"Many of our elected representative in all levels of government have forgotten why they run for office," Thornton added. "They promised to serve and protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens. We are overwhelmed with regulations, which equates to more taxes.

The public cannot afford it anymore."

"It has been an honor to serve my community and Accomack County," she said.

Married to Donald Thornton, the supervisor and her husband have owned and operated Pine Grove Campground for 40 years. They have two children and four grandchildren.

Thornton has been chairwoman of the Board of Supervisors, vice chairwoman of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge and Tunnel Commission and vice president of Delmarva Water Transport. She also has served as a member or officer on most of the boards and commissions for Accomack County, including the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission, Accomack-Northampton Transportation District Commission, Eastern Shore Railroad, Groundwater Commission and Public Service Authority.

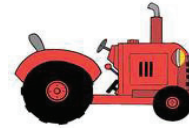

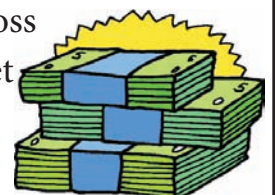

Northampton Superintendent Wants Middle School

For three years, Northampton County has lacked a middle school, the result of inadequate funding, structural issues with the old school, and a declining school enrollment.

With the closing of the middle school, students in grades 6 and 7, traditionally located in a middle school setting, were shuffled back to the county's two elementary schools while students in grade 8 headed to the high school.

At a recent School Board meeting, Superintendent Dr. Walter Clemons expressed a desire to resurrect a middle school in Northampton County. A recent assessment by a visiting review panel spoke highly of the local schools, but stressed the need to provide a true middle school experience for students.

School Operations Director Chris Truckner stated that while the middle

school building, nearing 60 years of age, could be reused for students, it would need substantial improvements to make it usable for children.

Clemons said it is one of his goals to get a middle school back in place, whether at the former building, at a joint facility near the high school in Eastville or built onto the current administration building. He stressed the need for the Board of Supervisors to work with the School Board to seek a solution and to find sufficient funding either to renovate a current structure or to move forward with a new building, within the next few years.

To add to the urgency, the number of pre-K students is increasing and the possibility of adding 2- and 3-year-olds to the program is just over the horizon. The School Board agreed that Chairman Dr. Richard Drury and Clemons

would meet in the next few days with the supervisors to discuss funding for a middle school.

Clemons provided information on the contract with Edison Learning Systems to help with school improvements for Kiptopeke Elementary School.

The \$2.4 million contract, funded by grants, will run for three years and can be terminated with a 60-day notice.

The School Board voted to change the regular meeting date for October from the 19th to the 17th due to scheduling conflicts.

Winter Crab Dredging Prohibited

The Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) voted unanimously Tuesday to close the winter crab dredge season for the fourth year in a row.

Members "decided it was necessary in order to continue to rebuild the crab stock," according to the agency's website. "While great progress has been made, more work remains to be done to bring the populations back to healthy, sustainable levels."

In a 6-3 vote, the commission kept on a waiting list 320 commercial crab licenses that were deactivated in 2008. The panel "signaled it would consider re-instating them when the crab popula-

tion returns to target abundance levels and remains there three years in a row."

Voting against that move were Commissioners Bryan Plumlee, Joseph C. Palmer Jr. and Whitt G. Sessoms III, all of Virginia Beach.

The commissioners also voted to:

- establish the 2011-12 public oyster season and adopt a 10-bushel daily limit per license holder, with a maximum of 30 bushels per vessel per day for all harvest areas, except the seaside of the Eastern Shore and the James River hand tong area, where there are no daily limits;

- grant relief from submerged aquatic vegetation obligations to Bay Creek Marina & Resort, LLC, adjacent to the Marina Village subdivision in Cape Charles;

- set a public hearing for October to modify summer flounder trip limits and pick a date for the winter 2011 fishery.

Our Neighbors Share Their Heroic Tales

Local heroes are abundant in Accomack and Northampton counties. Readers of the Eastern Shore Post say they have found them in their families, neighborhoods and in local businesses.

"A hero is someone who looks out for the people, does tasks not because of personal gain and is above all, respected," said Kim Ferguson of Onley. Her choice is educator Dennis Custis.

"I am amazed at the wealth of knowledge that he can remember," she said. "The knowledge is not only historical but also of his former students, what sport they played, their jersey number and, of course, any game they played in. ... There aren't too many people who don't know Mr. Custis. He served as principal at Nandua and I had the pleasure of working for him ... he knows no strangers and would help anyone in any way he could. He is the epitome of a gentleman and I am honored to call him my friend."

Kay Lewis of Lee Mont said her hero is Charlene Parks. "This lady was my 'beautician' when I was about 10 and continued to try to do something with my hair as long as she stayed in business. She had many happenings in her life health-wise and some tragedies along with it."

Parks handled knee replacement and a stroke in stride. "When I see her, I think, 'I just hope I can have her stamina as I go through life, her outlook, her per-

severance. ... I just always look forward to seeing her and I tell her, 'You are my hero.'"

Pam Crandol, formerly of Saxis, said her mother, Kathryn Glenn, is her champion. "She has been a great parent to me and my siblings," Crandol wrote. "Mother was a teacher for over 30 years. She has taught so many children and influenced their lives. At 89, she continues to be an inspiration to her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren."

Angie H. Crutchley also picked her mother as her hero. She said Debbie Rouse of Nassawdox "worked her tail off to provide a better life for me. ... She put me through private school until fifth grade making a third of what I do today, never asking for help from anyone. Then she put herself through college when I was in middle school and later went on to get her master's degree. She was one of the best teachers Accomack County has ever seen. She retired this year and I'm so glad she's finally getting a break. ... She's a phenomenal woman, teacher, friend, sister, worker, wife and above all, mother."

"One name stands out: Ruth Wise," said Hal Koenig of Exmore. "Ruth left a job at the college to help New Road in Exmore reinvent itself. The results are remarkable. Her vision, dedication and resolve, often at low, slow or no pay, are largely responsible for the new New Road."

Roxane Ward said her hero is her son, Colton. "He is disabled. Even though he can't walk or talk, he has

been my greatest teacher and most treasured gift."

Lisa Doyon of Wallops Island picked "my husband, Jerry, who is the most faithful, decent, honest, hard-working, disciplined, loving man I've ever known!"

Amy Eckard of Temperanceville named her parents, Jimmie and Nell Eckard of Parksley. "They've kept me going through thick and thin!"

Glenn Muhle Jr. of Silver Beach said his parents, Glenn and Trilly Muhle of Melfa, are his superstars. "They are active, listen to what I have to say, supportive, all the things that parents are supposed to be and then a whole lot more."

Gail Ficken of Chincoteague named her neighbor. "His name is Donny Dunn. He quietly goes about the neighborhood, helping folks unobtrusively. He does little kindnesses for anyone he sees who needs help and never looks for a thank you. He is an unknown angel for many in our town. Donny is my choice for a hero."

Janet Fosque of Onancock said, "My hero is my husband, Fletcher Fosque, because he has served this community without thought for personal gain or advancement since we moved here in 1984." Fosque has served as a volunteer firefighter, soccer and Little League coach, and referee. He has been on the Onancock Planning Commission for the last 20 years and on Town Council for the last 10 years "without ever making a self-serving decision or acting in his own self-interest. family, the home we live in, which was built by his great-grandfather, and which he has been renovating for the last quarter century, his dental patients, and ... Onancock. He can make a perfect gold crown for a patient and come home and build a beautiful picket fence and then make a gourmet risotto and salmon dinner. He has never met a stranger and treats every person as his equal and taught his four children to do the same. He is a good man and he makes it look easy!"

"My hero has always been my dad," Don Foster, said Faith Sturgis of Painter. "I have always been a daddy's girl and have looked up to him. He is honest and trustworthy and has always been there for me. My mom (Faye) is great too!! Both have taught me the values that I have today and put an example for me to live by."

P. Upshur of Northampton said, "My hero, Ms. Darlene Brown, teaches first grade at Kiptopeke Elementary School. "She works hours after school and on weekends planning for her kids. ... She believes in teaching them how to follow the rules and to stay focused. She is tough, but in the best sense of the word. ... She has tact when it comes to helping the parents get on board with their children's real needs."

Every year, Brown "gets excited to get back to work" and meet the children and learn "where she can most help!" She does "exactly what you would want a teacher to do, to have a rapport with your child individually and as a group/classroom," Upshur wrote. "You have got to love her."

Ann Stubbs of Chincoteague said her husband is

her hero. "He keeps me strong. He is my personal trainer in the gym and he keeps me slim by watching my diet. I have no control if I see sweets, but he will say 'You don't need that; it will go to your hips.' If I am sick, he holds my head, cleans me up like my mother did as a kid. If I was operated on, he feeds me and does all things for me as needed. Any problems we all have he fixes for us. He is a good guy, been with him now for 48 years, so plan on keeping him 'til the end."

Judy Morgan of Greenbush said her champion is Larry Baines of Bloxom. He "retired twice from Verizon, worked as a home repair handyman for a few years and has been widowed 12 years or so. Who I am and what I believe is a direct result of having Larry as my mentor, friend and partner in fun."

She said some of the things she has learned from him include: "Your life is the result of your choices, not what happened to you. Doing nothing is a choice. Staying ignorant is a choice. Not managing your money is a choice. Taking advantage of someone is a choice. People are human; they are going to offend, annoy and frustrate you. Don't take it personally. It's not about you. Stop thinking that way and stop acting that way."

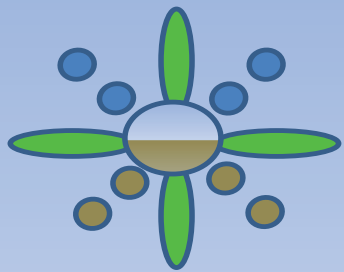

If he saw someone broken down on the street, he was the first to stop and offer help. He helped with the local food pantry and served on many committees at Trinity UMC. He would cut a neighbor's grass just because he could and not because he was asked to. He took great pride in his family, community and church."

Gary Callaway of Custis Neck said, "To me, heroes are those who put their lives on the line without regard to their own safety in times of disaster" or defense of "our freedom — police, firefighters, emergency service people and each and every one of our troops overseas and here on the home front."

Tanna Mullner of Cape Charles said she doesn't have a specific hero, "but those volunteer firefighters who put their lives on the line to protect and save others are very admirable."

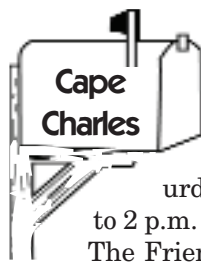

The resignations leave five officers in the department. Miles said the jobs have been advertised and applications will be taken until Oct. 7. He would not discuss the matter any further, saying it was not for public disclosure.

Potts began working for the police force in 1996. He left for a year in 2000 to work for the Northampton Sheriff's Department. He took over as Exmore's police chief after the death of Chief Steve Elliott in April 2010, Miles said.

Hodgson took the position with Exmore in July 2008.

Chincoteague Objects to Some National Seashore Plans

Chincoteague officials “strongly oppose” some of the concepts included in the General Management Plan for Assateague Island National Seashore (AINS).

“After waiting for two years since your last newsletter, we learned about new ideas and new policies for the first time in your open house presentation and have only been provided a limited window of time for community participation,” Mayor Jack Tarr wrote to Superintendent Patricia Kicklighter of ANIS. “The alternatives planning process is frustrating because there are very good ideas mixed with very bad ideas.”

Tarr said the town is opposed to: “alternative transportation systems”; the concept of a Marine Research Reserve until more information is provided regarding restrictions to public or commercial use of the Chincoteague Bay; “National Park Service (NPS) regulations for ‘watch houses’ that remove state authority over wastewater treatment and disposal and/or require re-

moval of private structures that serve as a traditional cultural resource”; commercial use permit regulations that restrict access to Assateague Channel; resource management “policies that limit or ban commercial fishing and aquaculture within the seashore boundary; and the policy that would permanently close areas to over sand vehicle (OSV) use if coastal storms or other natural processes create breaches/inlets that cut off access to portions of the beach.”

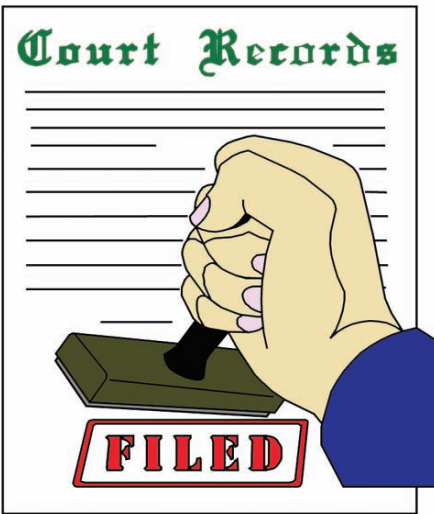
Tarr wrote that if permits continue to be administered along Tom’s Cove, “this policy would permanently remove public access to the Hook forever.” He added, “The town is also opposed to any options that abandon the public trust and allow existing visitor use facilities and infrastructure, specifically bridge access from the mainland to Assateague Island, to be subjected to natural coastal processes without maintenance, repair or replacement.”

According to the letter, the town supports many of the planned concepts.

That includes the current management plan used for the last 20 years; use of management zones, including new zones with strong emphasis on traditional beach recreation; policies that defend the visitor areas; expansion of partnership between the NPS and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers related to erosion control; a study for dredging or other improvements to maintain tidal flow to the north end of Chincoteague Bay as an active management solution to the reported decline in water quality of the central bay area; a policy that allows continued commercial fishing and leasing of submerged lands ... for commercial aquaculture; no action related to privately owned structures associated with submerged land leases in Chincoteague Bay within the seashore boundary; a policy that recognizes the potential for natural forces to temporarily close OSV access until the beach is naturally restored or restored through active management; a policy that would replace area lost to OSV use by opening other portions of the

island to OSVs; and a continued bridge access at both the north and south end of Assateague Island for both public access and emergency services.

The town wants the NPS to initiate a study of the Tom’s Cove shoreline to determine the best way to continue recreational use and protection of public health and safety. It also wants “significant investment in recreational facilities and infrastructure listed as a fundamental resource; ... any communication between NPS and VMRC regarding shellfish leases and commercial fishing to be shared with the town; a plan for active use of the historic Coast Guard Station; the NPS to support OSV access to the CG station for summer activities; NPS support for OSV secondary or emergency access to the Wildlife Loop or Beach Road if the Virginia recreational beach area is relocated to the north by FWS; and preparation of a socio-economic impact study be made that evaluates each alternative with its effect on Chincoteague as a gateway community.

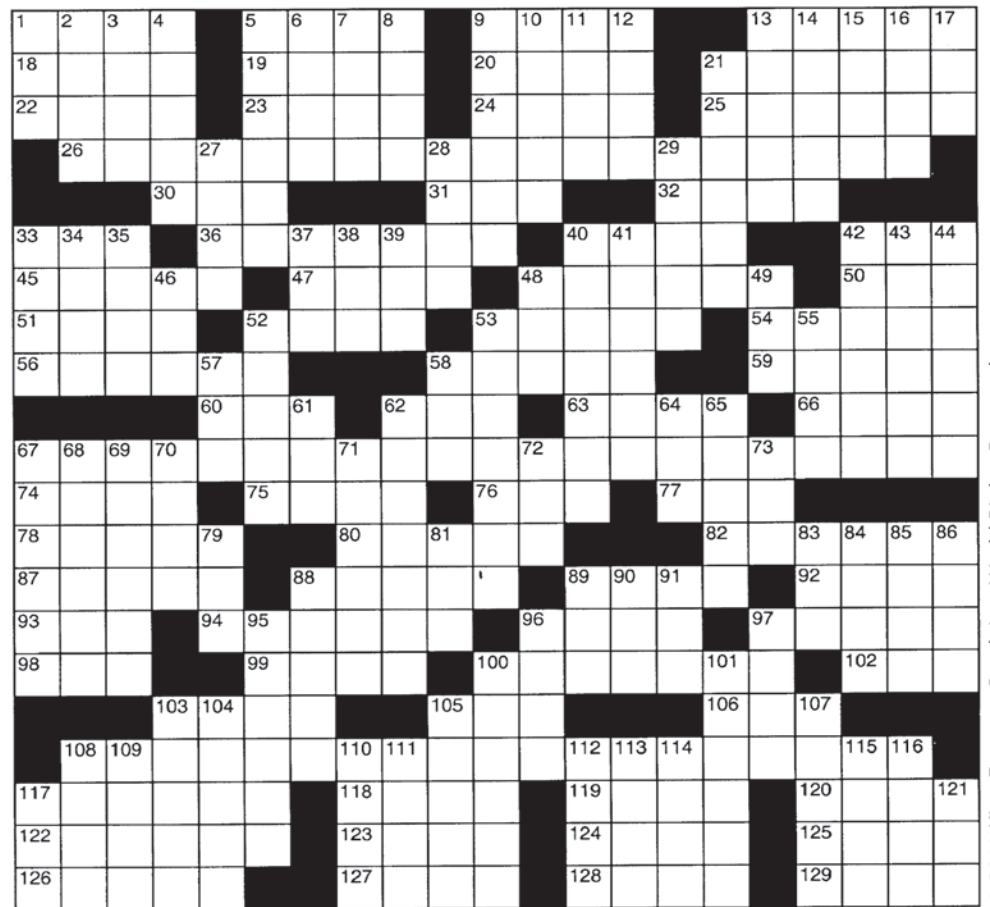

'And the Survey Says ...'

A majority of Accomack and Northampton folks prefer hot weather to cold, books to television, PCs to Macs, dogs to cats and the death penalty to life in prison.

They also said in an email survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post that they are worse off than they were 10 years ago, sing in the shower and believe in UFOs (Unidentified Flying Objects).

Half of the participants sing in the shower. One said he even takes requests while others contend they only belt out opera verses and/or oldies while soaping up.

The most votes for all-time favorite television show went to "M★A★S★H," starring Alan Alda. "I Love Lucy," featuring Lucille Ball and her then husband, Desi Arnaz, took second place.

Honorable mentions included "Dancing with the Stars," "Happy Days," "The Waltons," "Gunsmoke," "Star Trek,"

"Jeopardy," "Friends," "Golden Girls," "Miami Vice," and "South Park."

Forty percent said they are better off than they were a decade ago — many gave the empty nest as a reason. Fifty percent said things are worse due to the economy, wars and their health and age. About 10 percent said things are about the same.

Sixty-one percent believe in UFOs, 36 percent do not and 3 percent aren't sure. Fifty-two percent prefer hot weather while 38 percent like it cold. Another 10 percent said they want the temperature "warm."

Fifty-eight percent prefer books to TV. Nineteen percent would rather watch television. About 23 percent couldn't choose between the two forms of entertainment.

Sixty-three percent said capital offenders should get the death penalty while 23 percent said life in prison is a better alternative. The other 14 percent either couldn't decide or said indi-

vidual circumstances would alter their opinion. One man suggested that the condemned choose their fate.

Fifty-seven percent said dogs make better pets than cats. About 21.5 percent prefer felines, 18 percent like both equally and 3.5 percent don't want either animal.

The favored chore is doing laundry, followed closely by cutting grass. The most hated tasks are washing dishes and other housework that involves "cleaning."

"Mowing the lawn gives me a great deal of satisfaction," said Kay Lewis of the Parksley area. "Dusting furniture does nothing for me." She doesn't sing in the shower but she said she has "always done my best thinking" there.

Lewis' financial situation has not improved since 2001. "There is a lot you learn about retirement after you retire that you wish you had known earlier," she wrote.

"Death penalty or life in prison?"

That's a toughy," she said. "I think the thing that irks me about life in prison is that we are paying dearly to house, feed and keep them while they watch TV, exercise, and even educate themselves, usually after killing someone."

Natalie Rinker-Good of Seaview doesn't believe in UFOs because she hasn't caught sight of one. "Seeing is believing in my eyes, so until then I'll chalk it up to good stories."

"I've lived many years and not much on TV these days makes me laugh out loud except ... South Park," she added. "It's current and they are not afraid to speak their mind!"

Regarding the last 10 years, Rinker-Good said, "There are many levels to this question. What are you asking? Spiritually, emotionally, physically or financially? On all accounts, I'm a happy woman."

She prefers Apple computers to PCs. "Been a fan of Macs since Apple stock was affordable, many, many, many

moons ago! I would never have a PC. They are a waste of money.”

Larry Baines of Bloxom said he thinks there are UFOs “absolutely. I do not believe we are the most advanced form of life in the universe.” He prefers dogs to cats “because dogs understand me better.”

Gary Callaway of Custis Neck is a big fan of Star Trek, the original series with “Kirk and Spock. I still have all the gadgets like a phaser, tricorder and communication pin. I used to take my phaser to the Star Trek movies and help shoot the Romulins and Klingons. Afterwards, I would pull my tricorder out and check myself to see if I had been hit by a phaser. Got more than one look from people. ... Those were the good old days. ... It always got a good laugh.”

“I have seen things in the night sky that seemed to be something other than a plane and I could not explain it,” Callaway said. “I have seen lights in the sky toward the east over the water that were traveling very fast and then just stop and then take off again

out of sight. As much as I would love to witness” a UFO, “I haven’t — YET. But, I have not a shadow of a doubt that life exists somewhere out there. If you stand and look at the sky at night, just think of what is beyond. ... I can’t wait for the actual Area 51 files to be released.”

“Of course,” Callaway also sings in the shower. “Anybody and everybody who can or can’t carry a tune can surely sound fantastic in the shower. Or so they think,” he wrote. He favors a lot of the old Motown songs and “a few I make up as I go along.”

Callaway is better off then he was a decade ago. “Probably the most important reason ... is because I have gotten so much more closer to God and learned to trust more in Him to lead my life instead of trying to take full control ... makes for a lot less stress if you just let Him have the reins to your life.”

Teresa Wimbrow of Greenbackville said her favorite chore is taking care of her dogs. “Love my pooches.” She hates “dusting.” She said the world would be a better place “if only people’s lives today could be like ... ‘The Waltons’ ... close-knit family and time set aside for each other every day.”

“There have been a few times when I have been for the death penalty,” Wimbrow wrote, “but then again if the crime was bad enough, the death penalty is too easy. I am definitely not a cruel person, but if the criminal made their victim suffer, then they need to suffer some too, so life in prison might be the way to go. I don’t know. I have kind of mixed feelings on that.”

years and five months

Dunham said his client “did not have a grudge against Ms. Bailey; voices in his head pushed him in a terrible direction.” He added that Epps smoked marijuana on a daily basis, which exacerbated his condition.

Epps stabbed Bailey outside her house and then chased her to the nearby home of her husband’s aunt and uncle. She managed to get inside but Epps broke down the door and continued the attack.

“It would seem to me that she (Bailey) would not be a person who would say just lock this person up and throw away the key,” said Dunham. “Public safety is a concern here,” but “he can be rehabilitated.”

Jones said Epps was convicted twice before of assault. “It is well established that Derrick Epps knew what he was doing ... he knew what he was doing was wrong ... he was morally culpable.” The prosecutor said that was obvious when Epps said, “I ran from police because I just cut this damn woman.”

“He never claimed a voice told him to confront or hurt her,” added Jones. “I’m not saying he wasn’t or isn’t mentally ill ... he was motivated ... he thought he was entitled to a share of the Bailey family success ... he thought medicines degraded his sex drive. He was dangerous before this offense. There is no reason to believe he won’t be less dangerous in the future. ... All those she was helping and would have helped ... that’s gone forever.”

“This happy smiling person left the world ... in the worst way possible,” Jones said. “Think of the terror she was experiencing ... he was carving at her like a piece of meat ... this was a monstrous crime” against an “almost saintly life.”

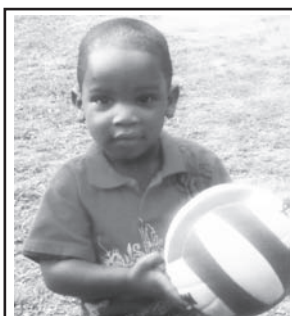

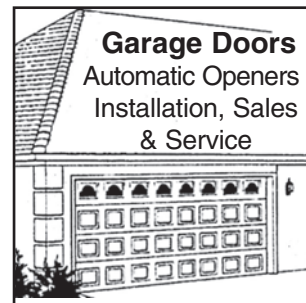

Here's How To Handle Chincoteague Beach Parking

Dear Editor:

As a long-time waterfowl hunter, birder, and vacation rental property owner, I come to the Chincoteague beach access and parking question with a mix of strongly felt concerns, some about protecting natural values, others about ensuring vacationers the best time ever.

Here I wish to share with your readers what I deem to be a few great notions (not yet fully fleshed out) about making the Chincoteague beach experience truly enticing and unique.

First, I think the plan under review by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to replace the existing public beach and parking with an equivalent beach access facility a mile and a half to the north should

be greatly expanded and enriched. Instead of closing the present beach to all public uses during the shorebird nesting season, March to September, why not allow part of this beach to be available in all seasons to visitors coming by foot, by bike, by water, or by shuttle?

Second, the mix could be further enriched by creating a modest stretch of public beach in front of the historic Coast Guard station at the elbow of the Tom's Cove hook. Coming by water taxi or their own kayaks or motor skiff, visitors could enjoy a few hours on the beach as well as learning how this life-saving station was run.

Third, if the existing road for all beach visitors is to end in a traffic circle near the pony penning corral, parking should be afforded visitors having specific justification, as for instance those unloading kayaks for water excursions either to the existing beach or to the Coast Guard life-saving station.

Shuttles would proceed beyond the traffic circle to take other visitors out to the beach. Note, too, that maintaining the existing road would be critical to moving heavy equipment to the hook to stop new inlets from forming during major storms.

A big plus for all the above is that the cost need not be all that great. Among other advantages would be salvation of the National Park Service's handsome, robustly-built Tom's Cove visitor center at the present beach, a facility which otherwise presumably would be abandoned or torn down.

By contrast, in this time of national financial stress, acceptance of costly proposals such as the one to buy Maddox Campground as a base for shuttling beach-goers or to undertake major engineering programs of sand replenishment and dune rebuilding, would be very much in doubt, especially since many disagree as to their merits and justification.

Just as funding for the Bateman Educational and Administrative Center at Chincoteague National

Wildlife Refuge turned on vigorous lobbying by all the principal parties affected, the multi-million-dollar appropriations necessary for the new public beach and parking to the north isn't likely to happen unless the Fish and Wildlife Service, National Park Service, and Chincoteague Town Council and business community present a solid front.

In sum, these are my thoughts for redefining the scope of the ongoing debate about how best to access our wonderful beach.
