Supervisors, Walton Comment on Relationship Between BaySys, County

"Wallop Research Park will succeed even if BaySys doesn't."

That is the thought of at least two Accomack supervisors who are on opposing sides of a push to use tax money to fund a \$5.6 million taxiway that would link the aeronautics company with the NASA runway.

Meanwhile, BaySys Technologies CEO and founder Steve Walton continues to tell the Board of Supervisors that he will raise the money to build two hangars at Wallop Research Park, even though he recently laid off 60 workers. The county officials have vowed not to spend county money for the taxiway until Walton proves he has the funds to build the hangars. BaySys now rents hangar space at NASA.

In an e-mail sent to supervisors Monday, Walton said, "Facing tough business decisions to protect the ability of any organization to

survive is a part of leadership. We do not take these actions lightly as these are our neighbors and our co-workers, our friends."

"Just as a new hangar shall bring hundreds of new jobs, adverse conditions shall cause job losses," Walton wrote. "As CEO, the cause and effect of daily decisions is real and measurable in jobs gained or lost. It is the same with those decisions made by the board. We ask you to please remain strong in your support for the bond issue. Those whose opinion (is) that this discussion is a 'bridge to nowhere' likely has nowhere to go. The Wallop Research Park is a bridge to the future."

Supervisor Ron Wolff, an adamant supporter of spending county dollars for the taxiway, said he is not happy with the way the layoff was handled.

"I would like to have seen a lot of different

Accomack Property Owners At Risk of Identity Theft After Laptop Stolen

An Accomack County employee returned from a personal holiday to Las Vegas without a computer that belongs to the county. Files in that laptop contain vital information, including the Social Security numbers of local personal-property owners.

No, Josh Taylor, who works in the Information Technology (IT) Department, didn't gamble away the equipment. Sources close to the situation say it was stolen from either his hotel room or the vehicle he rode to the airport. Taylor was not available for comment.

The taxpayers could become the victims of identity theft. Local officials said Wednesday they aren't sure how many files were stored in the computer. They aren't saying if it was acceptable for Taylor to have taken the laptop on the trip. But they don't suspect foul play by any of their workers.

Finance Director Mike Mason said the computer was stolen on Oct. 7 and was reported as such to the county on Oct. 8. Another source said Mason sent Taylor home from the job on Tuesday to await further action. Central Accounting told a caller that Taylor was expected back at work Monday. Part of his duties reportedly will be fielding calls from property owners concerned about this issue.

Now officials are trying to figure out how they are going to keep the thief from accessing the programs, how they will deal with Taylor (who is still on the clock), what policies they will enact to keep this mishap from being repeated and what will happen when property owners start complaining. Sources said hiring a company to help with the problems could cost \$300,000 to \$500,000.

After more than an hour in a closed session Wednesday evening, Accomack supervisors voted to release a brief statement. Supervisors Ron Wolff and Steve Mallette were absent. Supervisor Phil McCaleb voted against going into the private meeting where personnel issues were discussed and advice from County Attorney Mark Taylor (no relation to Josh Taylor) was obtained.

"I voted no because I did not believe that all of what we were to discuss was covered by the 'Closed Meeting' criteria," McCaleb said on Thursday in an

These Folks Give ‘Family Emergency’ a Whole New Meaning

In 2001, Lisa Baines, a CNA with Eastern Shore Community Services Board, decided to join Melfa Volunteer Fire Company as an emergency medical technician (EMT). It didn't take long for the fire to catch, so to speak, in her family and less than a year later her husband, David, decided to follow in her footsteps.

Over the years, all three of their children — Daveonte, 18, Tiara, 21, and Ciera, 23 — became interested in serving their community by volunteering and becoming certified EMTs. The whole family is CPR- and first aid-certified. They all can drive the ambulances, Lisa and Tiara are certified as emergency medical technicians, and Tiara, David and Daveonte all have extrication certificates.

David, a Northampton sheriff's deputy, who works at the regional jail in Eastville, assumed the role of Melfa VFC president three

years ago.

“We got involved because we wanted to help people,” said David. “Our parents and grandparents were getting older and we wanted to be able to help them and others if an emergency hit.”

The family sticks together through everything. Lisa and David have made every effort to keep the family moving in a positive direction, and that includes grandchildren Zynaija, 2, and Zykeese, 6. David also volunteers for the Little League where Zykeese is a proud batter for the Grasshoppers.

Son Daveonte also is involved in firefighting for the company. He is currently enrolled in “fire class” and just took the state test last Tuesday. He is still waiting on results as he finishes up school. His passion seems to lie in the firefighting aspect of the company, because most of his stories involve training.

“I can fight fires right now from the outside. I change out air-packs and can extricate people from vehicles,” said Daveonte. “I’m going to

take Haz-Mat training next month.”

Ciera works in home healthcare as a CNA. She has studied nursing ever since high school and has always known that she wanted to help out in the community in some form of health service. She likes spending time with her family and recalled a story when all five were at the station and there were two calls at the same time.

“We all just seemed to instinctively know what to do. Mom and I got in one vehicle with some other members of the company and Dad, Tiara, and Daveonte got in the other. There is never a dull moment around here. If we get a call, we all do our part,” said Ciera.

Tiara, the youngest sister, just became an LPN. She enjoys going out and talking to members of the community, especially the lonely.

“You don’t think it means much, but it really does,” she said. “Sometimes I realize that people are lonely and that being there for them is the best medicine.”

Lisa remains proud of her children and family for keeping to the straight and narrow despite outside temptations.

“I’m so proud of them, especially my son. There’s a lot worse stuff he could do. Instead he stays in the community. He made really good choices,” said Lisa.

“Being in the fire department keeps me out of all the crazy stuff and out of trouble,” agreed Daveonte. “It gives me something to do and occupy my time. And besides that, I get to be with my family.”

Melfa VFC remains committed to keeping families together. Fire Chief Randy Parker is another example of “family togetherness” as his wife and three kids are also members. The Parkers and the Baineses often have a chance to work side by side.

“They’re great people and tremendous help to the fire department,” said Parker of the Baines family. “They help out in every kind of way from running calls to fund-raising and cookouts.”

When the Baines family isn’t working swing shifts or on call with the fire department, they spend time together bowling and playing bingo — though Lisa says they don’t win very much — and are active members of Snead’s United Methodist Church in Keller.

Even with all the training and preparation that they go through, there is still one subject that gets them all a little choked up. “You never get over seeing children hurt or killed,” said David. “You can be an EMS provider for 30 years and when it comes down to a child, it’s the worst part. It makes you think about your own kids or grandkids.”

The department does have counselors who come in to provide counseling after an especially traumatic incident.

As far as dating within the department is concerned, Dad David has the final say. “I have to remind them that we’re all a big family, so there shouldn’t be any dating in the company,” he said with a laugh and quick glance at his giggling girls.

Northampton Plans Building Improvements

Northampton supervisors reviewed bids for renovation and stabilization of buildings on the Courthouse Green in Eastville Tuesday.

Daniel DeYoung of the Williamsburg-based engineering firm DJG, Inc. recommended that the low bid of \$2,545,000, by Armada Hoffler Construction be accepted for renovation of the old courthouse and the County Administration Building.

Bids received from eight contractors from Virginia and Maryland ranged from \$2.5 million to \$3.5 million, with options for additional work on the 1899 and 1914 jail buildings.

Supervisor Spencer Murray said that any decision on what and how much, if any, funding will be used to stabilize or renovate the two jail buildings will depend on the needs of the county for additional office or meeting space as well as the historical significance of the buildings. The county set aside funds, which were previously borrowed for the new courthouse and regional jail complex, to cover costs associated with the renovation project. The courthouse renovation is expected to take roughly eight months to complete.

County Administrator Katie Nunez told the board that information received from the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) showed costs for the Cobb Station Road project had come in

under budget. As a result, VDOT was able to save approximately \$1.2 million, which may be available for another county road project in the Six-Year Plan. Supervisor Richard Tankard suggested that the funds be used for the upgrade of Cemetery Road, which runs from Belle Haven to Occohannock Neck Road near Wardtown.

The board conducted a public hearing regarding a request from the Eastern Shore Area Agency on Aging/Community Action Agency (ESAAA.CAA) to obtain Virginia tax-exempt status. ESAAA.CAA Chief Executive Officer Diane Musso cited reduced government funding as a prime reason for requesting the status. According to county records, ESAAA.CAA was recently billed \$5,419.39 for personal-property and real-estate taxes. Musso noted that this was a first and asked that the fees be waived.

The supervisors voted unanimously to support the request.

A report by Nunez recommend-

ed that the board approve recent tax sales for delinquent properties in the county. The supervisors supported the request.

The county purchased five lots adjacent to the high school and agreed to allow the school to use the property for its athletic program.

A report from the Northampton County Farm Bureau showed that damage to local crops from an increasing deer population has reached a point where action needs to be taken. The Board agreed to support a request to the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (DGIF) to change the designation for deer from Stabilize/Increase to Herd Reduction. The change may allow the DGIF to allow additional bag limits during hunting season as well as allow farmers to apply for a kill permit to reduce the number of deer on their property.

In other action, the board began discussion on Agricultural-Forestal District (AFD) policies. Board Chairman Larry Trala stated his

concern that county residents were done a disservice when they were allowed to apply for the creation of AFDs at the cost of \$500 when the county cannot afford to approve them. The board agreed to continue the discussion at a future work session.

The supervisors rescheduled their next regular session for Wednesday, Nov. 10, due to scheduling conflicts.

Meals Tax To Be Discussed

Katie Hellebush, director of government relations for the Virginia Hospitality Travel Association, will be the guest speaker at Accomack Supervisor Ron Wolff's monthly constituent meeting at 7 p.m. Monday Oct. 18 at Wolff's Sandwich Shoppe.

Hellebush is expected to speak about the proposed meals tax in Accomack and the proposed statewide ABC privatization.

A Little Calcium-Fortified Hay Does Wonders for Sick Mares

With another winter approaching, both herds of Chincoteague wild ponies were rounded up Oct. 8 and 9, checked over individually by veterinarian Dr. Charlie Cameron and his staff and given de-worming medicine.

This is one of three times a year when the ponies are herded into corrals from the ranges on Assateague Island, where they live, for a visit with their doctor. Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, which owns the ponies, pays Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge \$1,500 a year for a grazing permit which must be renewed each November.

This time around, Dr. Cameron did not find any medical surprises. At the July roundup, he was pleased to find no evidence of a calcium deficiency which had appeared over the past year, and he gave the herds a clean bill of health. Dr. Cameron of Eastern Shore Animal Hospital in Painter and his associates have been taking care of the ponies since the spring of 1990.

Over these past 20 years, the lactating mares have been treated occasionally for hypocalcaemia, a calcium deficiency, which can be life-threatening. Usually two or three mares will be deficient, said Dr. Cameron. Some years there are none. But about 10 mares suffered from this ailment last year.

"Last year was the worst year we had had in a long time," said Dr. Cameron. "We had one other year that came up to about that level about 15 years ago when we had something very similar."

"Last year, we were actually on boats for the swim when they called me from the fairgrounds with mares down," Dr. Cameron recalled. "The day of the swim, we had a mare down in the pen that morning before they took them out of the holding pen. That's not the first time, but we're prepared for it. We give them at least 500 ml of calcium, dextrose, magnesium and a little phosphorus, sometimes, 1,000 ml, dependent on how they respond."

"This is really more common in dairy cows. ... It's not a real common phenomenon in horses, although it does occur commonly in this herd," said Dr. Cameron. "I think it's because there's deficiencies in the soil. There may be hereditary factors, too."

Years ago, the ponies began receiving intravenous calcium treat-

ments in an emergency. Dr. Cameron explained, "You can save their life if it's given in a timely fashion. We've been doing it for years."

Their caretakers know what to look for. "The firemen have been trained. So we usually get them before they actually fall," said Dr. Cameron. "We're ready for it. What happens when an animal becomes hypocalcaemic, whether a horse, a cow, or a person, is the muscles start firing out of control and they'll literally fall over. The first signs we'll see is their jaw muscles start twitching and they start breathing in very rapid thumps. Their diaphragm is firing out of control. Calcium is essential to proper muscle tone and control."

"This year, we didn't have the first case," said Dr. Cameron.


Mares that were tested in the spring were either slightly low or right on the borderline of calcium deficiency. "They'd had a rough winter. In the spring, they didn't look good; but when that grass comes in lush, they put on weight."

Dr. Cameron directed that the ponies' diet be supplemented with calcium-fortified hay and mineral blocks at the round-up. Test blocks were initially put out about a month before the roundup. "We supplemented them with alfalfa hay, which is high in calcium. We also had these mineral blocks that Southern States donated, which are high in calcium and magnesium," said Dr. Cameron. "These two minerals are important in a mare's diet as far as helping them make milk and keeping their blood calcium levels in a normal range. The overall condition of the herd was very good," said Dr. Cameron. "A lot of them were fat."

"The jury's still out. I think what we have done has helped, but this could've been one of those years. It was a little cooler week and I think that's an important factor, too. With the heat and stress, the ponies start sweating and they lose electrolytes," said Dr. Cameron. "The firemen spot mares in trouble during roundup which puts some stress on them. That's not their normal routine. They're usually mares with older foals that are taking a lot of milk. Then, it's the hottest week of the summer very often. You combine the stress, the heat and boom, it pushes them over the edge."

These dietary supplements are the result of Dr. Cameron's research. "I consulted with Dr. Julia

McCann from the VA/MD Regional College of Veterinary Medicine located on the Virginia Tech Campus and Dr. Vivian Allen from Texas Tech," said Dr. Cameron, "as well as other sources."

"I think the Chincoteague ponies are more hardy and brave" than other ponies," Dr. Cameron remarked. "They're basically survivors. They're tough and their dispositions are gentle, which is why I think they work well as children's ponies or horses," he said. "There are exceptions. There are a few you have to watch out for," said the doctor.

Dr. Cameron's parents owned two Chincoteague ponies before he was 5. His father would lead him around in an old Army Calvary saddle. These ponies lived to be about 30.

At the spring and fall roundups, Dr. Cameron gives the Chincoteague ponies their vaccinations, checks them over and gives them de-worming medicine which is taken by mouth.

Roundup weekends are demanding for Dr. Cameron and his staff, as well as the Salt Water Cowboys. The routine is almost always the same. Late Friday the riders report to the western edge of the southern herd grazing compound, spread out and move those ponies along to a holding area off Woodland Trail. When all the ponies are in, the cowboys run them across Woodland, through the trees and marsh where they enter the corral area from the back side.

Dr. Cameron's work begins early Saturday. The rear of his truck is set up like a mobile pharmacy.

The pen, where he treats the ponies, is divided in half by a fence, separating the ponies that have been treated from those that haven't. There is space to move around that keeps the ponies comfortable until Dr. Cameron is ready for them.

While the vet is getting ready, various helpers chase the ponies into the other half of the pen. One-by-one, the ponies are run through a chute, and then into a wooden stanchion that allows for little movement. An assistant takes a wand and waves it around on the left side of the pony's neck. The wand actually reads a micro-chip put in the horse's neck so Dr. Cameron can identify the pony.

When they find the micro-chip, numbers and letters will appear on the screen.

Next, Dr. Cameron, with the help of an associate, opens the pony's mouth and places a metal tube near the back of the throat where there is a space with no teeth. He inserts a worm pump, or a long metal tool called a liquid drench and injects the medicine by pushing a handle pumping it into the pony's mouth.

When the pony has swallowed the medicine, the assistant opens the front of the stanchion that leads to the other side of the pen. This procedure is repeated until every pony has been treated.

Dr. Cameron finishes his work on the southern herd by about 9:30 a.m. Then it is time to load up and move much farther into the wilderness of Assateague Island to the pen that will later that morning hold the northern herd.

When the southern ponies are released back to their range, the cowboys are already rounding up the northern herd, numbering 50 to 60 ponies more than the southern group. They do not bring this herd to the same pen; the northern herd's pen is located nearly four miles out on a service road. The only way to get out there is to walk, unless you are part of the veterinarian's crew or one of the cowboys. Then it is accessible by vehicle or horseback. In recent years, however, Lou Hinds, manager of the Refuge, has made available a bus that visitors can take to the northern corral.

The northern herd is wilder than the southern herd, so it's harder to give them the medicine. When the cowboys get a pony into the stanchion and Dr. Cameron tries to open its mouth, the pony often will kick the back of the stanchion and try to get its head out of reach of the assistant. If the ponies get really riled, they will turn and charge at the people. Dr. Cameron has been bitten and kicked in his years of working with the ponies.

Sometimes when a stallion has been given his medicine and has been moved to the other side, he will stand and wait for his mares to come out, counting them to make sure that each has returned to where she needs to be, with him.

Northhampton Planners Continue To Ponder Energy Options

Northhampton's Planning Commission continued its review of alternative energy sources last week as Commissioner Roberta Kellam discussed the capacity of the local power company to make use of additional power that might be generated by a commercial wind farm.

The commission has reviewed a proposal to construct a meteorological tower (MET tower) which could measure wind speed and direction. Resulting data could help determine if a wind farm is viable for the Shore.

Kellam said there probably is not enough incentive to commercially install wind turbines. The commissioners discussed the concept of residential wind turbines and possible regulations for them. Kellam wondered whether the county might be better served if the Planning Commission spent its time reviewing solar power alternatives as opposed to wind farms.

County Planner Sandra Benson advised the commissioners that it is

time to begin the review process for the Comprehensive Plan, which was last done in 2006. Regulations call for the Comprehensive Plan to be reviewed every five years. The commissioners agreed to begin the review process at their next meeting.

In conjunction with this, Commissioner Robert Meyers suggested that the commissioners need to be informed about other projects being proposed in the county, such as two new convenience stores that have been mentioned for the lower end.

The only speaker to address the commissioners was David Boyd, who urged them to oppose any boundary adjustment that would place the Tower Hill subdivision in the incorporated Town of Cape Charles. Boyd said the vast majority of the residents in Tower Hill are strongly opposed to any planned expansion for Cape Charles that would result in their subdivision becoming part of the town. "Tower Hill residents want to be their own autonomous group," Boyd said.



Jury Finds in Favor of Town of Onancock

When Steven Key signed a waiver in order to get his vacation and "sick" pay after quitting his job with the Town of Onancock, he gave up his right to take future legal action, according to an Accomack Circuit Court jury.

The verdict handed down by a seven-member panel Tuesday was accepted by Judge Glen A. Tyler and will likely void the \$18.4 million lawsuit filed by Key. The jury deliberated for about 25 minutes and was deciding only the merits of the written agreement and not Key's allegations that he was "methodically abused, assaulted, battered, berated, belittled, teased, ridiculed and sexually harassed" while working for the municipality.

Town Manager Susan Scott was fired after Key's complaints became public and has denied any wrongdoing. On the list of com-

plaints, Key accused Scott of giving him birthday whippings with a two-inch wooden stick.

"There was never a time where anybody hurt him. He knows that," Scott said in an interview soon after the initial lawsuit was filed. "He's just out for a big payout. It's all been bogus."

Town Attorney David Rowan drew up the agreement and testified on behalf of the town.

J. Edgar (Jesse) Demps, a Chesapeake lawyer who represents Key, wrote in the lawsuit that Rowan told Key "if he dropped his EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission) claim and agreed not to file for unemployment, the town would pay him his vacation and sick pay."

The suit says the money Key received "in no way represented a sum for settlement for the defendants' ... liability."



action on his part," Wolff said of Walton. The supervisor said he'd heard that health insurance policies were immediately "cut off," action not usual when expecting to call workers back. "That's pretty sad when you do that."

But, Wolff said, "BaySys was just one part of the bigger picture. The park is going to move forward." Walton "certainly has not helped himself. He's made a lot of promises and he hasn't lived up to them." Wolff said the supervisors expected to see proof in mid-September that Walton could build the hangars. Then the date was moved to Oct. 1. "Now it's October 13," he said Wednesday. Wolff first heard about the layoffs from customers of his sandwich shop.

Supervisor Grayson Chesser continues to be outspoken in his opposition to funding the taxiway project. "I'm opposed to it for several reasons," he said. "When the board voted to do this, Mr. Walton was supposed to supply us with proof he had financing within 10 days to two weeks. ... He continues to talk about financing but he shows no proof of it."

Chesser said being opposed to paying for the taxiway "which benefits only one company does not mean you're opposed to the Wallops Research Park. Everyone would like to see BaySys succeed. Wallops Research Park will succeed even if BaySys doesn't."

The Post's request for e-mails between BaySys and the supervisors also disclosed that an employee was urging the supervisors to

take tours at two BaySys sites. In addition, there was an update on a federal bill.

Senate Bill 3729 was introduced on Aug. 5 and has been presented to the president. Also known as the NASA Authorization Act of 2010, the bill would authorize appropriations for FY2011-FY2013 for "programs, activities, and reports respecting NASA, including those with regard to the International Space Station (ISS), the Space Shuttle, commercial crew and cargo transportation, earth and space science, aeronautics and space technology, space traffic management, near-Earth object threats, space weather and national and international orbital debris mitigation." It "requires NASA to initiate development of a space launch system as a follow-on launch vehicle to the Space Shuttle" and "establishes a NASA launch support and infrastructure modernization program, a science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) commercial orbital platform program, and an information security awareness and education program at NASA."

In another e-mail, County Administrator Steve Miner wrote, "All Virginians have a lot to gain from this bill ... we have had wonderful support from the governor and he is leading the way for us to be the best spaceport on the East Coast! While we will never rival (nor threaten) Florida, we truly have a lot to offer the New Space privateers who are gaining opportunities with this bill."

e-mail. "Our deliberations on what to do and how to handle the employee should be closed. The stolen computer was the result of 'brain vacuum' idiocy and in all likelihood the result of either a lack of a clear written policy regarding laptop computers or a failure to consistently enforce same. I made the comment in the meeting that I do not believe this is a 'fireable' offense unless there is a written policy requiring it."

According to the statement released by the supervisors, "The theft is under a separate criminal investigation. There is no allegation of criminal wrongdoing by the employee or anyone else affiliated with Accomack County. Accomack County believes that the stolen computer contained a file or files from which taxpayer identity might be extracted. Any citizen who is concerned about the security of their identity may request a fraud alert on their credit report by calling 888-766-0008, 888-397-3742 or 800-680-7289. Citizens who may be affected will receive a more specific written notice from Accomack County. This is Accomack County's entire comment on this matter pending advance of the ongoing criminal investigation and the internal personnel issue involved."

Board Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy called for Wednesday's meeting in a special notice faxed to the Eastern Shore Post that afternoon. The announcement stated that the meeting would be closed and would only be used to discuss personnel. The session started at 5 p.m. and began with the usual prayer and Pledge of Allegiance. Before a motion was made, Gordy said, "I know we can go into closed session for personnel, but that's not the real reason." The attorney suggested that they also meet under another

section of law that allows the group to speak privately with him.

County Administrator Steve Miner defined taxpayer identity as name, Social Security number, perhaps address and the personal property owned. He said real-estate holdings are not in question.

Josh Taylor did not attend the session. Miner, Mason, County Treasurer Dana Bundick, Commissioner of the Revenue Leslie Savage and another IT worker attended the private session.

Asked about the IT Department, Miner said there is only one person "who reports back to me" and others who work in IT are under other departments. He said he is unsure if the employee in question regularly takes the laptop home. "I'm not sure but suspect the answer is no," Miner said.

"I don't provide anyone with Social Security numbers," Savage explained Thursday. "Josh Taylor has been part of the project team" working on software that provides the county with the capability of twice-a-year billing.

Las Vegas Police Officer Marcus Martin said Josh Taylor reported the incident on Oct. 8. Taylor was staying at the Mandalay Bay, an upscale hotel and casino. Upon awakening that morning he found that clothing was thrown on the floor and the laptop and a red backpack were gone, Martin said.

An investigation of the electronic entry to the room showed that between 10:53 a.m. and 12:35 p.m. on Oct 7 and from 8:14 p.m. Oct 7 and 9:21 a.m. Oct 8, the door to Room 16122, where he was staying was "not properly latched." Martin said it is unclear why. Taylor was out of the room between 8 p.m. Oct 7 and 2 a.m. Oct 8 and hadn't noticed anything missing or in disarray upon return. Martin added that the case just landed on a detective's desk and he had not had time to check a video of the hallways.

"It appears the suspect also drank (the contents of) two mini liquor bottles" while in the room, the officer said.

I just watched the live video of the miner foreman coming out. He was the 33rd and final survivor. Yippee! A happy ending!


