Accomack Treasurer Dana T. Bundick defeated challenger Gregory L. Duncan Sr. in Tuesday's election. She will return for a fifth four-year term.

Bundick garnered 53 percent of the bal-

lots to Duncan's 47 percent. With the same margin, Supervisor Sandra "Sandy" Hart-Mears of District 4 lost out to activist Kay Lewis. Sheriff Todd E. Godwin, who was appointed several months ago to fill the unexpired term of retiring Sher-

iff Larry Giddens, took about 60 percent of the vote, leaving two opponents in the dust. Accomack voters also returned Supervisors Laura Belle Gordy and C. Reneta Major in contested races.

Bundick took all but four precincts in the treasurer's race, capturing 4,620 votes to Duncan's 4,104. Bundick received the majority of votes in Chincoteague, Atlantic, Greenbackville, Bloxom, Parksley, Saxis, Accomac, Tangier, Onancock, Onley, Bobtown, Melfa and Wachapreague precincts. Duncan took Oak Hall, Mappsville, Rue and Painter and a majority of the absentee ballots.

Godwin took all 17 precincts and the majority of the absentee ballots that were cast in the sheriff's race. He got 5.305 votes. Challenger Walter E. Marks, a retired state trooper and Onley's police chief, got 2,508 ballots and David A. Rogers Sr., a former deputy, took 942.

Gordy of Onley, vice chairwoman of the Accomack Board of Supervisors and the District 7 representative, got 820 votes to easily defeat challenger Emory F. Hurst Jr., a retired pharmacist from Cashville, who received 260 ballots. Mayor Bruce Paone of Onancock, who dropped out of the race and then died a few days before the election, got 78 votes, 6.25 percent. Troy J. Farlow, who also withdrew, took 88 of the ballots.

District 9 Supervisor C. Reneta Major of Boston, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Phil McCaleb, beat out McCaleb's choice, activist Wesley Ed-(Continued on Page 2)

Voters overwhelmingly cast their ballots for Northampton Acting Treasurer Cynthia S. "Cindy" Bradford of Exmore Tuesday.

Bradford won all five precincts and more absentee ballots than her opponent, T. Charles Renner Jr., a former banker who lives in Franktown. She got a total of 2,327 (72.05 percent) votes. Renner took 817 (25.55 percent). Both were Independent candidates.

Carol A. Glowacki, who dropped out of the race, received 70 ballots or 2.17 percent. Glowacki asked her voters to support Bradford for the four-year term.

Bradford was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Ilva James, who retired in May.

A precinct breakdown showed Bradford with

62.48 percent of the votes in Precinct 1 (Cape Charles area), 73.77 percent in Precinct 2 (Cheriton area), 81.41 percent in Precinct 3 Nassawadox area), 68.07 percent in Precinct 4 (Eastville area) and 79.05 percent in Precinct 5 (Exmore area). She also took 62.9 percent of the absentee ballots.

District 5 Supervisor Larry J. Trala of Exmore was returned to office with 467 (63.71 percent) votes. Trying to unseat him was M.E. "Betsy" Mapp of Jamesville, a former supervisor. She garnered 266 votes (36.28 percent).

Richard L. "Rick" Hubbard of Eastville beat out Yvonne Bagwell of Smith Beach for the redrawn District 4 seat. Bagwell ran a write-in campaign. Hubbard got 544 votes (76.72 percent). There were 165 write-in ballots (23.27 percent) recorded. It was unclear at press time how many of those were for Bagwell. The other three supervisor posts are on staggered terms and were not up for grabs.

Commonwealth's Attorney Bruce D. Jones Jr., Commissioner of the Revenue M.A. "Anne" Sayers and Sheriff David L. Doughty Jr. ran unopposed. Jones got 2,744 votes, Sayers got 2,810, Doughty, who had been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Jack Robbins who retired, got 3,011 votes.

Robin L. Rich-Coates and W. Rawlings Scott Jr. were elected to the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District Board. Rich-Coates got 2,177 votes and Scott got 2,088. Raymond Salopek, who dropped out of the race, got 274 votes.

wards of the Craddockville area. Major got 594 ballots (54.74 percent) to Edwards 491 votes (45.25 percent).

McCaleb resigned for health reasons. Major was selected over Edwards for appointment by the Board of Supervisors. She previously served on the board. Her late mother, Julia Major, was the first black to be elected to the post.

Lewis, a Lee Mont resident who retired from the Northampton Social Services Department, took the District 4 supervisor's seat with 523 votes, nearly 53 percent. Incumbent Hart-Mears, a selfemployed businesswoman who was seeking a third four-year term, got 464 votes.

The rest of the Accomack candidates who ran unopposed and therefore were returned to office include District 1 Supervisor Wanda J. Thornton of Chincoteague, District 2 Supervisor Ron S. Wolff of Assawoman, District 3 Supervisor Grayson C. Chesser of Jenkins Bridge, District 5 Supervisor John C. (Jack) Gray of Modest Town, District 6 Supervisor Robert D. Crockett of the Onancock area, District 8 Supervisor Donald Hart, Commissioner of the Revenue Leslie Mears Savage of Park-

sley, and Commonwealth's Attorney Gary R. Agar got 7,214 votes. Thirtyfive voters wrote in another candidate.

This was the first election for Crockett, a retired Accomack sheriff who was appointed in January to fill the unexpired supervisor term of Steve Mallette.

Voters selected Jim A. Evans and Frederick W. Holland II for the Eastern Shore Soil and Water Conservation District Board. Evans got 4,946 votes and Holland received 4,713.

Three Accomack towns also had elections for Town Council. Two candidates were selected in Onley: Jack J. Pierson with 130 votes and E. Don Strautz Jr. with 138 votes. In Parksley, Laura A. Atkins took a Council seat with 209 votes. In Wachapreague, results show the newest member of the council won by a single vote. John Joeckel got 14 write-in ballots while Valerie Vincent took 13.

Northam and Lewis Re-elected

Pediatric neurologist Sen. Ralph S. Northam, a Democrat and native of the Eastern Shore, retained his post in the state legislature during Tuesday's General Election by beating his opponent, Republican Ben Loyola Jr., owner of a Virginia Beach contracting firm.

With all 59 precincts reporting, Northam took 56.58 percent of the votes (16,492) compared to Loyola's 43.34 percent (12,633). Voter turnout was about 34 percent.

Northam got 4,800 votes in Accomack (54.33 percent). Loyola received 4,033 (45.65 percent). In Northampton, Northam got 61.77 percent (2,048 votes) to Loyola's 1,264 (38.13 percent).

Loyola won in Chincoteague, Atlantic, Greenbackville, Parksley and Tangier in Accomack. Northam took Oak Hall, Bloxom, Saxis, Mappsville, Rue, Accomac, Onancock, Onley, Bobtown, Melfa, Wachapreague and Painter. The doctor also garnered the majority of absentee ballots.

Northam won all five precincts in Northampton and most absentee votes.

Del. Lynwood Lewis of Accomac was returned to office in an uncontested race. He got a total of 12,357 votes. He received 7,408 votes in Accomack, 2,805 in Northampton and 2,148 in Norfolk City.



Chincoteague Grapples With Cemetery Issue

Chincoteague Vice Mayor Ellen Richardson and resident Chuck Ward urged Town Council Monday night to establish a Cemetery Authority that could acquire grants and other funds.

After discussion, Mayor Jack Tarr asked Town Attorney Jon Poulson and staff to investigate the options and report back to Council.

"At this point. I don't think the town has the authority," said Poulson. "I don't see anything in the charter provision."

Ward said the town should adopt an ordinance to allow for it. "Ask for provisions from the state legislature," he said. "I strongly recommend it. Many would rather donate money" than labor to keep the cemeteries clear, he added. Ward also wants two members of the authority to be elected.

He said if the town started the authority with \$5,000 "it would self fund after that. I don't have children," he added offering to leave an endowment for the cemeteries. "My father and can't do anything for them."

Richardson showed pictures of cemeteries before volunteers recently cleared them. Vines and other thick growth covered the tombstones and surrounded properties at Reed's Cemetery and Holly Ridge. Richardson said three of the town's main cemeteries also were recently cleaned at a cost \$1,200. The town will wind up paying \$60 because the fund was emptied by the expense.

Both Poulson and Tarr suggested that interested parties set up a nonprofit organization to handle the situation. They said the group could apply for grants and the town could work with it. "You can't just stick things on a ballot," said Poulson. He added, the town could accept donations without a Cemetery Authority. Tarr said that while a mechanism is needed, he is concerned that the government would not actually be in control as is the case with the nearby civic center.

"There's a lot of non-profits out there not run properly," said Ward. The au-

mother are buried in perpetual care. I thority "just seems like a more positive way to get people involved." Ward suggested the Virginia Municipal League be contacted to learn what other localities do. "It's in your charter," he said. "You have to do upkeep."

Councilman Terry Howard wants the problem to be given more consideration. "It looks bad on us as people," he said, explaining that visitors will think they don't care about their ancestors.

On Monday, Town Council also:

•made adjustments to its sign ordinance, whereby a banner is described as a temporary sign "attached to any non-rigid surface such as cloth, fabric or paper," limited home occupation signs "shall not exceed a total of four square feet" and on-premise "banners shall not be more than 32 square feet in area";

•renamed the old gym recently acquired from Accomack as "Island Activity Center" and appropriated \$29,000 to insulate the structure and make other refurbishments, including new light fixtures;

•adopted a mooring guideline for

Curtis Merritt Harbor that allows Harbormaster Wavne Merritt to sublease slips that are not being used and decide whether boats are seaworthy. Councilman Terry Howard was opposed. Councilwoman Nancy Conklin was absent.

Town Manager Robert Ritter reported that the current year's meals tax fees amount to \$399,524, an increase of \$19,568 over last year; sales tax revenues are at \$37,758, down by \$3,603; the transient-occupancy tax is up by \$9,601 at \$474,578; and water income is up \$15,253 to \$451,854.

Ritter said 32 new water services were installed and sidewalk replacement was done on Anderton Avenue, storm water pumps and a broken drain pipe were repaired on Maddox Circle, decorative bricks were installed in downtown restrooms, Christmas light preparation work was completed and and an electric junction box was installed at Robert Reed park. Ritter also reported that Kevin Krome and Steve Potts collected nearly \$10,980 in donations for Christmas decorations for the town.



The report shows that not-for-profit Arcadia Nursing and Rehabilitation Center in Gargatha had 20,237 patient days for the reporting period, \$122 paid per patient day, 4.49 hours per patient day (the average number of hours the facility paid to employees or an agency per adjusted patient day), 5.86 percent total margin and 76.9 percent Medicaid participation.

Heritage Hall in Nassawadox, a for-profit business, had 47,840 patient days, \$125 paid per patient day, 3.81 hours per patient day, 6.47 percent total margin and 68.58 percent Medicaid participation.

Shore LifeCare at Parksley, a notfor-profit, showed 47,650 patient days, \$142 paid per patient day, 4.45 hours per patient day, 0.78 percent total margin and 71.74 percent Medicaid participation.

Northampton Convalescent Center, a for-profit company, had 20,600 patient days, \$188 paid per patient day, 4.15 hours per patient day, 9.88 percent total margin and 48.63 percent Medicaid participation.

The regional medians for the nursing facilities were \$152 per patient day, 4.26 hours per patient day, 4 percent total margin and 68.37 percent Medicaid participation.

curbs and street markings," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "Add to these hazards the fact that road conditions can change from ideal to miserable in a matter of minutes, and what you have is a potentially dangerous situation."



Tires can affect the car's ride, handling, traction and safety, and are a critical connection between the car and the road in all types of driving conditions. To maximize tire life and safety, check the inflation pressure and the tread depth, and inspect the sidewalls for cracks or punctures. As a general rule, tires should be rotated and balanced every 6.000 miles.

The brake system is the car's most important safety system. Brakes are a normal wear item for any car, and brake linings, drums and rotors, as well as brake fluid, should be checked at each oil change.

To help ensure the performance and safety of wipers, blades should be replaced every six months or when cracked, cut, torn, streaking or chattering. Windshield wiper fluid should be checked monthly and only washer fluid should be used.



Exmore Gets New Police Chief

Exmore Town Council has selected a new chief to head up it police department. Angelo DiMartino was promoted to the position after former Chief Tom Potts Jr. resigned the post earlier in the fall.

DiMartino told Council an additional officer is needed in the department, now down two positions from its eight-member force. He listed a number of serious crimes that the short-handed de-



partment has had Chief DiMartino

to deal with recently, pointing out that on several occasions, officers have had to be backed up by county or state officers. Council agreed to advertise for one additional officer.

County Animal Control Officer Mindy Elliott addressed the increased risk posed by unleashed animals in the town. In recent months, several instances of dogs attacking citizens or other animals have occurred. She said the town needs to update its leash and tether ordinances to insure that someone charged with an animal-related offense can be prosecuted. Council agreed to have Interim Town Manager Artie Miles update the dog ordinance for review.

In other business, Town Council agreed to advertise for sale eight properties owned by the town.

The zoning issue regarding the town's firing range was resolved, thus allowing area law-enforcement officers to again make use of it.

Miles reported that unsightly buildings and debris are being removed. Councilman David Scanlan noted that the property being rented from the town for possible use as a farmers' museum appears to be beyond repair short of a major funding source. He indicated that the Farm Museum Committee is actively seeking an alternative property and would not likely oppose the town's use of the property for other uses. One recent request has been made for it to be used for a street hockey facility.



ping a relatively shallow brackish acquifer underlying Assateague Island. But during dry periods, any surface water is likely to quickly disappear into the sand.

A necessary remedy is to truck in enough clay from the mainland to make the pond bottoms relatively impermeable. The National Park Service is regularly trucking in clay to maintain the present parking lot at Tom's Cove.

But the cost of all of this wouldn't be trivial. That's why a dependable new source of income is critical.

Septic Issue Is Warning to Others Dear Editor:

I attended Supervisor Ron Wolfe's recent standing-room-only meeting and learned the particulars of a developer's expected proposal to pipe sewage offsite from Wattsville to a farm field adjacent to the old incorporated Town of Atlantic.

I also discovered that the five-year Comprehensive Development Plan, which bans remote septic systems, can be changed by an amendment, a \$450 county application fee and a majority vote of the supervisors.

Little was spoken of the possible loss of a lifetime home/farm investment in Atlantic because of this remote sewage system.

Developers look at the extra millions they can make by increasing the number of lots allowed. Developers aren't required, unless through the courts, to pay homeowners for their losses.

The supervisors must vote to approve or deny any changes in the Comprehensive Development Plan, and later vote on the Atlantic Remote Septic System. We believe many would be in favor of the private septic field in Atlantic because of the potential enlargement to a public regional septic system for the northern part of the county. A private system would enable the county to avoid the "eminent domain" laws that require a just payment for any resulting loss of home value.

Tell me. What chance does a small town like Atlantic have against big money and big government? Don't think it can't happen in any other Accomack village. Milton Hill, Greenbackville

A few weeks ago I suggested in this space that the plan under review by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to replace the existing public beach and parking with an equivalent beach access facility a mile and a half to the north should be enriched by creating two all-season beaches that would be off-limits to private cars.


Now I suggest that this be done in such a way as to raise the money for Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge to create an extensive array of ponds and boardwalks behind its Bateman visitors center. This would allow visitors opportunities for up-close contact with waterfowl and other wildlife.

One of the two new beaches would be in the vicinity of Tom's Cove visitor center and would be accessed only by foot, bike, kayak, water taxi, or shuttle. The other, in front of the historic Coast Guard life-saving station at the elbow of Tom's Cove Hook, would be reachable only by water. But to persuade the Fish and Wildlife Service to dedicate more beach to allseason use would clearly be out of the question without the promise of significant compensation.

What I'm suggesting is that visitors would pay a modest fee that's significant in the aggregate, given the many tens of thousands of visitors these beaches might attract over a year's time.

If only a tenth of the 1.4 million annual visitors to the refuge chose to visit these two beaches, their total visitation would be on the order of 140,000.

An abundant source of nonpotable water attractive to waterfowl for ponds behind the Bateman center could come, by special state permit, from a well tap-
