Martha Simpson, a retired home-economics teacher who lives in Parksley, said she found fried turkey to be "juicy and delicious." Deborah Benson of Exmore said that "except for missing the gravy, it was terrific."

The favorite side dish for survey participants is "stuffing" or "dressing." Thirty-five percent of the participants favor the bread-based mixture.

The side dish runners-up with 11 percent of the vote each were turnip greens and sweet potatoes cooked in a variety of recipes. Macaroni and cheese was the next highest favorite with more than 7 percent.

Pumpkin pie and sweet-potato pie tied for the best desserts this year, with pecan pie coming in third. Participants chose jell cranberry sauce over whole berry or lumpy, three to one.

Nearly 60 percent of the participants said they are most thankful for their families and friends.

"I am thankful for my God, for His having blessed me with a loving and caring family — my husband, children, brothers, sisters and parents," said Pamela Upshur of Eastville. "It is often said, 'You cannot choose your family' and am I so grateful that He did it for me!"

About 30 percent noted their appreciation for good health and nearly 5 percent cited new grandchildren among their most cherished blessings. The rest mentioned their bosses, church activities and salvation.

Nearly 88 percent said they would enjoy having a celebrity sit at their Thanksgiving table. Forty-seven different famous folks were listed.

## New Church Man Charged With Raping 14-Year-Old Girl

A New Church man was charged last weekend with sex offenses involving a 14-year-old girl who lives in Maryland, according to authorities there.

Fifty-five-year-old Alvin Levit Fuller is being held without bond in Accomack County Jail as a fugitive. Maryland authorities are seeking extradition so Fuller

can face allegations there of second-degree rape, a third-degree sex offense, seconddegree assault, second-degree child abuse, and incest.

"He was taken into custody without incident with the assistance of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office," Grace Cocoran of the Worcester County Bureau of Investigation said Tuesday. "This closes a joint investigation of the ... Bureau and Worcester County Child Advocacy Center."

The charges involve his alleged "repeated course of conduct ... over a period of a year," Cocoran read from a prepared statement. "He (allegedly) befriended the victim over a lengthy period ... and learned how to manipulate and prey on her during this period," she said.

The average Eastern Shore gathering has 14 people, according to survey results. Gillingham said her crowd has varied over the years "from a high of 35 to just my husband and myself a couple of years ago. This year there will be three of us sitting down to dinner. ... Our family is scattered from Alaska and Colorado to South Carolina and Massachusetts. It is impossible to get everyone together."

The trend has moved away from seating children separately. About 62 percent of adults said as kids they sat at a table with their siblings and cousins when they were young. Only 35 percent offer a children's table now.

Gary Callaway of Onley said when he was growing up, there was not enough room for everyone to sit together, especially after we got done eating." He preferred the kids' domain. "It was like we were grown-ups at our own table with good conversation also."

"When the kids sit at a separate table I like to sit with them," said Muh-

Baker said she is most thankful for "my family and the love they show to me all year long." "Parade and then movies — NO FOOTBALL!"

Shirley Christian of Melfa is thankful "I'm here to celebrate Thanksgiving after a serious bout with a rare cancer."

Liz Omps of Onancock said she is thankful for "the health and well-being of my family. As the years go rushing by this becomes more and more important."

"In an enormous Italian-American family in N.J., the 'kids' were always at our own smaller table," she added. "I often marvel now how we managed to fit 45 people into a second-floor walkup in Jersey City with all the food, kids, adults, men with their ever-present card game and cigar/pipe smoke, elderly folks watching the game on a 12-inch black and white ... in 1965!!! Crazy, lots of loud voices all talking at once but we did have brief silence when it was finally time to say grace!"

"This year we've made a conscious effort to make the day less about the food and more about each other and our relationships as a family ... we'll still do the mainstays of turkey/yams/ and green bean casserole. We'll pass though on the traditional Italian lasagna, bracciole and heavily laden platter of cannoli and sfogliatelle!"

Allison Pike of Cape Charles said she wouldn't want a celebrity to attend. "I like to enjoy my Thanksgiving with family because it's peaceful. I eat whatever my grandmother makes, which is always delightful," she added.

"I am most thankful for my family and my life," Pike continued. "I thank God for giving me every day to shine and help others to shine as well. I am so blessed to have the friends and family I have!"

## Walker Given 5 Years in Death of Baby

The jury verdict that found Brian Terrell Walker guilty of involuntary manslaughter in the 2010 brutal death of his fiancée's 11-month-old son last June was accepted in Accomack Circuit Court Monday.

Judge Stephen Mahan sentenced Walker, 25, a Northampton native who was living in Parksley at the time of the offense, to five years in prison in accordance with the jury's wishes with respect to infant Isaiah Russell's death.

Mahan also added on a three-year post-release term that holds Walker to more prison time if he misbehaves after being released. Restitution of \$3,698 was ordered to go to the Virginia Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund, bringing the total court costs for Walker to \$11,782.

The jury could have chosen to convict Walker of second-degree murder, which carries a maximum of 40 years. The maximum term for involuntary manslaughter is 10 years. Mahan explained at trial that the basic different between the crimes is "malice." The jury also could have acquitted.

Isaiah died from "blunt-force head injuries," a medical examiner testified during the trial. She said the boy's skull was fractured in three places and his brain was swollen. In addition, his body was covered in bruises.

Other testimony revealed the child's injuries occurred when the boy's mother, Jessica Russell, was at work in a local chicken factory. Walker was on vacation from the plant and was in charge of the daytime care of the boy and his toddler sister.

Walker lived with the family. He told police he was asleep when the injuries occurred and wasn't aware the child was hurt until the younger sister awakened him saying the boy "couldn't breathe."

"The case is circumstantial because we don't have an eyewitness," Accomack Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney Matthew Brenner said at the trial. "He was the one in care of the baby." It was "preposterous" that someone else broke into the house.





## Court Postings

#### **Accomack Circuit Court**

A former Onancock town clerk was found guilty last week in Accomack Circuit Court of two counts of embezzling thousands of dollars in public funds from the town, according to court records.

Sentencing was deferred for Colleen Patricia Reiber, 47, of Wakefield Street in Pungoteague until a presentence report is prepared. She pleaded guilty to the charge and remains free on a \$7,500 unsecured bond. Regardless of the amount of funds taken, the crime is considered a felony under state law when committed by a municipal employee.

The offenses occurred between Oct. 13, 2010, and April 14, 2011. A video recorded Reiber stealing funds. The film showed at least four incidents in which a visitor paid a bill (for either water, sewer or taxes) and Reiber put the money in her pocket.

In another Accomack County court case, Beverly Jackson, 45, of Seaside Road in Melfa pleaded guilty to passing bad checks between June 9 and June 23, 2007, drawn on BB&T bank and made payable to H.W. Drummond. Judgment was withheld and a presentence report was ordered. She was indicted on the charge on Aug. 1, 2011.

Judgment also was withheld in the case of Michael Allen Isdale, 19, of Accomack Street on Chincoteague who was charged with grand larceny of property belonging to William T. Davis on April 23, 2011. A presentence report was ordered.

Samuel Custis, 46, of Christopher Lane in Painter pleaded guilty to possession of a firearm by a felon in connection with an incident that occurred on April 1, 2011. Sentencing was deferred pending completion of a presentence report.

Roberto Sepulveda of Painter pleaded guilty to possession of cocaine. He was sentenced to a year in prison, with all but time served suspended.

William Young, 18, of Fletcher Road in Bloxom was found guilty of receiving stolen property and sentenced to three years in prison, with all but time served suspended. He also was ordered to perform 100 hours of community service. The crime occurred on April 13, 2011.

Sarah Elizabeth Moore, 25, of Chincoteague was sentenced to two years each on two counts of assault and battery of Chincoteague Police Officer Robbie Fisher. All but a year was suspended. Moore also was given a threemonth suspended sentence for a misdemeanor assault and battery charge, a 30-day suspended sentence for possession of marijuana, a 30-day suspended sentence for driving on a suspended license. Her driver's license was suspended for nine months. Moore also was sentenced for DUI to six months, with all but the mandatory minimum 20 days in jail suspended. She also was ordered to attend VASAP class.

Bond was set at \$15,000 for Sheicora (Poodle) Nathaniel Bagwell, 34, of Melfa who is charged with distribution of a controlled substance. He was ordered not to leave Virginia.

Bail was denied for Tyvon Smith, 18, of Diamond Spring Lane in Parksley, who is charged with possession of a firearm by a felon. He was convicted last month of participating in "assault and battery by a mob" in the July 24 Wattsville incident.


### Northampton Circuit Court

Christopher Wayne Elliott, 39, of Cape Charles was sentenced Monday in Northampton Circuit Court to 10 years in prison for two counts of a third or subsequent offense of petty larceny, according to Commonwealth's Attorney Bruce Jones. Half the sentence was suspended. The crimes occurred in January and March of 2011. Elliott was fined a total of \$1,000 and ordered to make restitution of \$200.

Donnie Wirth, age unavailable, of Hallwood pleaded guilty to grand larceny. The offense occurred on May 13, 2007. He was arrested on May 17, 2011. A presentence report was ordered.

Amanda Danielle Budenos, 25, of Eastville pleaded guilty to three counts of passing a bad check in connection with an incident that occurred on April 17, 2011. Sentencing was deferred pending completion of a presentence report.

La'wanda Michelle Jarvis, 33, of Birdsnest was convicted of embezzling funds. A presentence report was ordered.





## 'White House' To Be Auctioned

It's going, going ... to the highest bidder. The majestic former headquarters of BaySys Technologies on Lankford Highway in Tasley is set for auction in December due to foreclosure.

The 11,600-square-foot, two-story brick office building will be offered for sale at 9:30 a.m. Dec. 15 in front of the Accomack circuit courthouse, according to a notice issued by sole acting trustee, Henry P. Custis Jr.

"For Sale" signs were erected in front of the structure in February. Business has not been conducted there in months.

The property is still listed by a real-estate agent for \$999,000 and is described as "the ultimate in quality ... elegant brick Georgian building ... seven offices on the first floor ... 31 x 22 (foot) formal reception area, conference room with the finest reproduction woodwork, full kitchen and two bathrooms ... tons of storage, technical library and copy rooms ... access to second floor using the elevator or formal stairway ... 10 more large offices with additional conference room ... two full bathrooms on second floor ... plenty of

parking and brick patio."

Set on 7.567 landscaped acres, the columned mansion was built by local entrepreneur and former state Del. George McMath for his newspaper chain, Atlantic Publications, in 1989.

According to the county mapping website, the property is assessed at \$836,600. BaySys has been plagued with lawsuits and layoffs.

On Tuesday, the Accomack treasurer's office reported delinquent tax bills (for both real estate and personal property) for BaySys Technologies and Bay-Sys Holdings of \$61,364.77. Current tax bills, due Dec. 5, are \$18,456.97.

BaySys entered the local limelight in August 2010 when its officials assured Accomack supervisors they could come up with money to build hangars at Wallops Research Park (WRP) and thereby prosper. Founder and President Steve Walton urged the spending of \$5.6 million in taxpayer money to construct a taxiway to link the proposed hangar site at WRP with NASA's runway. Walton was required to come up with proof that BaySys could get the funds to build, but never did.



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## Governor Cites New Report as Basis for Bright Prognosis for Wallops

Gov. Bob McDonnell Tuesday released a study on the economic competitiveness of the Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority (VCSFA).

The study, commissioned in response to the 2011 Virginia Appropriation Act, reviewed the governance, organization



and competitive landscape for the VC-SFA in order to identify the necessary steps to make the Mid Atlantic Spaceport (MARS) on Wallops Island the best commercial space launch facility in the country. The study was conducted by KPMG Corporate Finance.

Commenting on the report, McDonnell said "As home to one of only four facilities licensed by the FAA to send rockets into orbit, the Wallops Flight Facility at MARS has the potential to become the leading commercial space flight facility in the United States, all while creating much needed jobs and economic development in all corners of the commonwealth. With our tremendous educational institutions, manufacturing capabilities, workforce, and ranking as the number one state in the nation in which to do business, the recommendations contained in this report will help Virginia seize a growing portion of this critical sector. Opportunities abound for Virginia in today's commercial space flight industry."

The report identifies a number of findings related to the VCSFA and makes the following recommendations to enhance the economic competitiveness of Virginia's commercial space flight industry:

•Make the capital investment necessary to turn MARS into a multi-use facility and attract new customers.

•Develop market-based usage cost rates that reflect the infrastructure, site, facilities, and range equipment at MARS.

·Focus on a long-range strategy for MARS.

•Restructure the Board of Directors to reflect the mission, purpose and size of the VCSFA.

 $\cdot \mathrm{Re}\text{-evaluate}$  and refresh agreements between the VCSFA and other entities.

"Virginia's space industry currently contributes \$7.6 billion in annual direct economic output and supports over 28,000 jobs," McDonnell continued. "Given the job creation and economic development potential surrounding MARS, I will be submitting a promotion bill this session of the General Assembly to implement the report's recommendations. The VCSFA has the potential to become a major economic force in the commonwealth. We must take the steps to ensure that this occurs."

The VCSFA was created in 1995 by the General Assembly to oversee the development of the commercial space flight industry in the Commonwealth. In 1997, The Federal Aviation Administration granted the VCSFA one of only four licenses to launch rockets into Earth orbit. In the years following its creation, the VCSFA has worked closely with the General Assembly to enact a number of policies that led the FAA to recognize Virginia as "the most progressive state in the nation when it comes to supporting commercial space."

"Since the VCSFA's creation, Virginia has become a leader in commercial space flight," said Secretary of Transportation Sean T. Connaughton. "We look forward to working with the General Assembly this session to implement the initiatives recommended in KPMG's report and take the steps necessary to ensure the continued success of the commercial space industry in Virginia."
