# 92nd Annual Pony Auction Shatters Record

Every year, the Chincoteague ponies make their aquatic trek from Assateague Island to Chincoteague for the annual auction, which takes place Thursday mornings during Pony Penning week. Held at the carnival grounds, the proceeds benefit the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, who manage and oversee the well-being of the beloved, historic herd.

The auction serves as population control, and draws thousands from across the country since its inception in 1925. Made famous by Marguerite Henry's "Misty of Chincoteague," the event gives the four-legged island natives an opportunity to spread their roots, while keeping the wild herd's numbers from becoming too large.

This year, the 92nd bidding race tallied a record-breaking \$209,900 in sales, shattering the previous record of \$179,700 that was set roughly 10-11 years ago, according to Chincoteague vice mayor and fire company member Denise Bowden.

The first of the 62 foals to be presented for auction was a 3-monthold palomino colt with striking white stockings and a star, which sold for \$4,200.

A 4-month-old buckskin and white pinto colt was the first buyback pony, who went to the Chincoteague Legacy Group, with a winning bid of \$8,400.

This year, the auction consisted of 10 buyback ponies; two colts and eight fillies, chosen by the fire com-

pany to replenish the herd. The ten made the swim back with the rest of the herd to Assateague, where they will remain. Winning bidders do, however, get naming rights.

Also among the ponies were what the announcer referred to as "fall pick-ups"; those foals that are only weeks old, and are not old enough to be weaned from their mothers. They will also return to Assateague with the herd until the set fall pick-up date of Oct. 14.

A little 1-month-old palomino and white filly would mark the first fall-

pick up to be presented to the crowd.

The second buyback of the day, a six-week-old filly, benefitted the Kiwanis Club and sold for \$7,100.

A buyback palomino filly sold to the Chincoteague Legacy Group, marking the highest sale of the day at \$15,000.

The Feather Fund aided Alyssa Jastram of Ridgley, Md., and Kensington Nelson of Monterey, Ca., in fullfilling their dreams of owning their own Chincoteague ponies.

Jastram was the highest bidder on a chestnut and white pinto filly out of CJ Sammin', who she has named Alyssa's Blissful Dream, known as Dreamer in the barn.

Nelson won a bay and white pinto colt out of Cody Two Socks, who she's named Copper's High Tide, or Bongo, for short.

One of the most memorable, "awe" moments of the day was when five-year-old Austyn Mae Manning won a 3-month-old liver chestnut filly by Riptide and Lyra's Vega. Cheers — and tears — erupted throughout the crowd when it was announced that Manning was the winning bidder. She made her way to the booth to settle up, escorted by her father, clutching a Mason jar filled with money she had been saving over the last year in order to buy her very own Chincoteague Pony.

Manning's father, Adrian, explained that his daughter saved a combination of mostly pennies, giving her a total of \$50 to put towards a pony.

She named her, Sandy, formally known as Fleck of Island Sand. Sandy will not have to travel far, as the family resides in Zuni, Va., and also own another Chincoteague pony named Salty.

Sometimes, people come to watch the auction without the intention of purchasing a pony; however, there are instances when a special one comes along that causes an unplanned buy, which is the case for Alyvia Davis' family from New Hampshire.

Davis, who states they own two horses and a pony, were vacationing on the Island for the week, and could not resist the opportunity to get a Chincoteague pony. Davis rides horses in local 4-H shows, and is now the proud owner of a chestnut and white filly.

Another family from Indiana bought their first auction pony, a 3.5-month-old chestnut and white pinto filly, to add to their barn.

Each buyer got a bag full of horserelated items and coupons for their new pony, and foals were able to be hauled home beginning July 28, in approved trailers.

Just before 11:30 a.m, the last pony of the morning, a 3-month old filly, also a buyback, sold for \$9,000.

The lowest price recorded was \$1,100, with the average of \$3,400 a foal – an increase of \$741 – to last year's average of \$2,659 over 57 ponies sold.

The Chincoteague Legacy Group holds the highest bid record at \$25,000, which was recorded last year on their buyback pony.

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

# Serving up the Shore Preview

A plate full of crab meat topped with cilantro cream and queso cheese accompanied by a side tomato roasted beet salad await you at the dinner table this August. Leading up to the variety of entrees, sink your teeth into one-of-a-kind appetizers such as fresh, compressed cantaloupe garnished with shallot marmalade and spiced pecan Florentine or scotch eggs with sofrito mustard. Lastly, satisfy your sweet tooth with sourdough bread pudding with blackberries and caramel served over goat milk ice cream for dessert.

Chincoteague Bay Field Station (CBFS) will host its third annual farm-to-table dinner, Serving up the Shore, on August 18, and tickets are on sale now. Distinguished chefs Jason Van Marter, owner of the café

The Local, Amy Brandt, of Amy B Catering, and Rosie Moot, co-owner of Pico Taqueria will prepare a multi course dinner consisting entirely of local meat and produce from farms across the Delmarva Peninsula.

"The chefs tour the farms and get to know what they have to offer," said Elise Trelegan, event founder and CBFS interim executive director. She explained how the chefs craft the menu based off of each farm's specialty.

Ten farms, as well as the Bakery at Riverside Farm, Eastern Shore Coastal Roasting Co. and Dogfish Head Brewery will donate all of the food and beverages such as clams and oysters, locally raised pork and lamb, and sustainably harvested inseason fruits and vegetables.

"This year's menu is more creative

and cutting edge than years before," Trelegan said.

This gourmet meal celebrates the bountiful harvest produced by the Eastern Shore, but also serves as a fundraiser to help continue to provide environmental education to all ages.

One program in particular that will benefit from Serving up the Shore's profits is Shore People Advancing Readiness for Knowledge (SPARK).

Trelegan described SPARK as a free, intergenerational program that provides the people of Accomack County with reading, math and science education, as well as quality educational family experiences.

"SPARK really teaches parents to learn with their kids," Trelegan said.

SPARK brings families together to engage in environmental science on a local level, such as testing water quality in nearby creeks, and to go on outdoor excursions like fishing and camping.

An Environmental Protection Agency grant largely funds SPARK, however, the grant will expire this November.

"Hopefully [Serving up the Shore] will carry SPARK through next year along with some supplemental grants," Trelegan said.

Trelegan added that SPARK needs the funds to continue to provide transportation and supplies to SPARK families and to continue going on field trips.

"People really look forward to having a really unique culinary experience because there's nothing else like this on the Eastern Shore," Trelegan said.




# Summer Astronomy Night at the Beach Features Perseid Meteor Shower

NASA's Wallops Flight Facility's Visitor Center and the Delmarva Space Sciences Foundation will host the final Astronomy and Night Sky Summer Series on the Virginia end of Assateague Island National Seashore on Saturday, Aug. 12, for the observation of the Perseid meteor shower.

Kim Check, the NASA Visitor Center manager, said, "The Perseid meteor shower is created when the Earth passes through the remnants of the comet Swift-Tuttle every August. We are excited to be able to have this occur during an astronomy night on the beach."

The event will begin with an As-

tronomy 101 presentation at the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge Herbert H. Bateman Education Center Auditorium at 7:30, 8:00, and 8:30 p.m., followed by night sky observations through telescopes and binoculars at the north end of the beach parking lot #1. In addition to the featured meteor shower, participants can view Jupiter, Saturn, the Milky Way Galaxy and the Andromeda Galaxy through telescopes provided by the Delmarva Space Sciences Foundation.

The event is free and open to the public. The auditorium presentations will occur regardless of weather, however, the telescope viewing is subject to cancellation due to inclement weather. Park entrance fees apply.

This series is a collaboration between Assateague Island National Seashore, Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge, Delmarva Space Sciences Foundation and the NASA Wallops Flight Facility's Visitor Center.








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

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Fishing from
the Shore

After spending several weeks in the oceanfront waters off Virginia Beach and outside the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay, Spanish mackerel have finally moved inside the bay with catches being made along the edges of the Baltimore Channel last weekend.

A nice influx of croakers finally showed up in the waters off Kiptopeke last weekend. Let's hope they have moved up the bay far enough to be in range for the fleet of boats fishing in the Croaker Classic on Saturday, Aug. 5th, out of Onancock.

It is time for large red drum to make their late summer appearance along the channel edge from Cape Charles north to the mouth of Occohannock Creek.

**Chincoteague** – Captain Bob's Marina reported that croaker have been unusually scarce so far this year, however, kingfish (whiting) have replaced the missing croaker niche nicely. The top location for kingfish catches continues to be just inside of the inlet. At the mouth of the inlet and just beyond, sharks continue to be the primary quarry, with Atlantic finetooth sharks being the most numerous specie. There is a strict limit of one finetooth shark per boat. Other available species include bonnetheads, sandbars and sandtigers. After windy conditions produced a lot of muddy water last weekend, flounder fishing improved the early part of this week.

Flounder catches were coming from the waters of the Assateague Channel, with the areas in front of Memorial Park and Tom's Cove Campground, the most often mentioned locations. The best flounder rig for this location has been the traditional high/low rig, with a bullminnow or Gulp Swimming Mullet on the bottom hook, and a strip of squid/minnow combination on the top hook. Chincoteague Channel continues to produce mostly undersized flounder, with the northern portion of the chan-

nel seemingly containing a few larger fish. The section stretching from in front of the American Legion building north to the causeway continues to be your best shot at a keeper flatfish.

Jimmy, from Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, added that undersized black sea bass, croaker, pigfish and flounder were being pulled in from the local docks. Spot and kingfish were providing action for anglers fishing from the beach, using bloodworms and Fish Bites for bait. The deep-water offshore wrecks are producing some of the biggest black sea bass catches of the year. Some large sharks are being caught by anglers chumming in some of the inshore deeper holes.

Wachapreague - Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Bait & Tackle, reported that there were a few king mackerel, tuna and dolphin scattered around the 21 and 26 Mile Hills. Tuna and at least one wahoo were caught over the area known as the Lumpy Bottom. A blue marlin release was registered as part of the Eastern Shore Marlin Club's Annual Billfish Release Tournament, although Paul did not have the final results available when I called. Inside the inlet, a few flounder were being caught, but Paul described the keeper ratio as "not too sporty!" A lot of the throwbacks have been in the 10-inch range, far below the minimum legal length of 17 inches. The traditionally dependent flounder fishing along the offshore wrecks had also become inconsistent recently.

Lower Shore – Mark, at Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported "decent" croaker catches off Kiptopeke, where mullet (whiting) catches were also being made. Cobia catches continue to be on the downswing, with most remaining fish being on the small side. The shop has not weighed in a citation cobia in more than a week. Best action on the cobia stretched from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel up to Buoy 36-A. Spanish mackerel catches

came from the Baltimore Channel and spadefishing has been good around the bridge's fourth island. Flounder fishing has slowed, with the best action coming from the highrise section of the bridge-tunnel, as well as the little bridge connecting Fisherman's Island. A few red drum citation releases have come from anglers fishing in the evening over Nautilus Shoals. Anglers had tried tarpon fishing out of Oyster, but no releases were reported. Small croaker catches were being made out off Oyster.

Northern Bayside – Captain Matt Abell, of Sea Hawk Sports Center, was excited about the arrival of Spanish mackerel inside the Chesapeake Bay. He also reported that the first red drum of the season have been caught

off of Bayford. Abell said that his trips were still producing a few flounder during the last half of the flood (incoming) tide. The rail cars off Chincoteague have been hit or miss for flounder, with 3-4 ounce Spro bucktails, and either 6-inch Gulps, 6-inch Jerk Shads or 5-inch Swimming Mullet. Pocomoke Sound was producing primarily spot and small speckled trout. Larger speckled trout were being caught around the Tangier target ships, where nicesized sheepshead were a welcome by-catch.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.


