

# Area Residents Not Rattled by Earthquake

A 4.6-magnitude earthquake at about 6:30 p.m. Tuesday night, at a depth of 5.6 km (about 3.5 miles), went unnoticed by most Eastern Shore folks. Others felt and heard the vibration.

The United States Geological Survey pinpointed the quake at 219 kilometers, or about 135 miles east of the Shore.

"I was giving my dogs fresh water," said Sandra Williams Wharton, of Tasley. "I ended up spilling some water on the floor."

"Felt nothing," said Connie Louise Cummings of Chincoteague. "But I did hear a rumble that I thought was a truck right outside my door."

"I felt nothing in Wachapreague," said Bonnie Munn. "Didn't know about it until someone posted it on Facebook later."

"We were home in Exmore," said Shavna S. Jordan. "My son asked, What was that?" But I just figured it was a tractor-trailer. We live along the highway. Guess now I've got to tell him it was an earthquake!"

"Here in Quinby, we heard a loud rumble," reported Sheryl Reeves Williamson.

People reporting from Onley, Jamesville, Hack's Neck, Wardtown, Painter, Belle Haven, Cherrystone, Texacotown, Greenbush, Parksley, Bloxom, and Accomac were not aware there had been an earthquake. Most residents in Onancock said the same thing. A few knew something had happened but didn't know what it was.

"Heard a rumble in Onancock but didn't feel anything like we did a few years ago," said Brandon Pruitt. Polly By Linda Cicoira Milliner Ransone said her dog "was acting weirder than usual."

"We felt like the side of the house was shaking apart," Bonnie Ellen Hilton, of Accomac, wrote on the Eastern Shore Post's Facebook page.

"We looked at each other and said. 'That was weird."

# Marijuana Decriminalization Among Bills Before General Assembly

Marijuana will be one of the hot topics in the General Assembly in 2019 with Gov. Ralph Northam already proposing to decriminalize simple possession.

"We want to keep people safe," he said in his annual State of the Commonwealth address earlier this month. "But we shouldn't use valuable law enforcement time, or costly prison space, on laws that don't enhance public safety ... Current law imposes a maximum (of) 30 days in jail for a first offense of marijuana possession. Making simple possession a civil penalty will ease overcrowding in our iails and prisons, and free up our law enforcement and court resources for offenses that are a true threat to public safety."

Del. Steve E. Heretick, who represents Portsmouth and Norfolk cities, introduced a bill decriminalizing marijuana possession with a civil penalty "of no more than \$50 for a first violation, \$100 for a second violation, and \$250 for a third or subsequent violation." Under current law, a first offense is punishable by a maximum fine of \$500 and a maximum jail sentence of 30 days. Subsequent offenses are Class 1 misdemeanors. The proposal states "a person who possesses no more than one-

half ounce of marijuana possesses it for personal use and provides that the existing suspended sentence and substance abuse screening provisions apply only to criminal violations or to civil violations by a minor."

Heretick's bill also decreases the penalty for distribution or possession with intent to sell between a half-ounce and five pounds of marijuana from a Class 5 felony to a Class 6 felony.

Del. Charniele Herring, of Alexandria, also introduced a decriminalization bill. Her proposal provides a civil penalty of \$250 or less and makes "a person who knowingly or intentionally smokes, consumes, or otherwise ingests marijuana in a public place or while driving or operating a motor vehicle, engine, train, watercraft, or motorboat ... guilty of a misdemeanor" with a jail term of 30 days or less and a fine of \$500 or less, or both. "A civil violation will be treated as a conviction for prohibitions on the purchase or transport of a handgun and disqualification for a concealed handgun."

Del. Bobby Orrock introduced a bill that prohibits the advertisement for mar-

# The Lowdown on the Federal Shutdown

On the isolated Eastern Shore of Virginia alone, the federal government shutdown means 122 Coast Guardsmen have been working without pay, about 1,700 employees and contractors associated with NASA are without work, federal approvals for other programs and answers to proposals are unavailable, and funds

for the USDA child nutrition program in local public schools and Section 8 housing could end in a month or two.

Agencies are not answering their phones. And likely more things will go amok.

Wednesday, 25 days after the shutdown began, there was news that President Donald Trump signed a bill guar-

# Accomack Endorses Equal Rights Amendment

Accomack supervisors unanimously agreed Wednesday to urge the General Assembly to vote in favor of Virginia ratifying the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA).

They also approved more than \$1 million in carryover funds for the school division, including \$210,000 for a contingency fund, a previous contention between the supervisors and the school board because the supervisors said the county rainy day fund could provide for the division in the case of an emergency. No one spoke at the public hearing. The policy to allow the appropriation was approved by the board last year.

The action regarding the school and the ERA vote came without fanfare or discussion. An ERA resolution that was prepared was not read aloud as resolutions sometimes are. Instead, it was linked electronically in a grouping of other matters merged for a single vote in what is usually a timesaving effort.

Later in the session, both County Attorney Cela Burge and Vice Chairwoman Reneta Major spoke about it.

"I just wanted to thank the board that we are in agreement about the ERA," said Major, who brought up the matter

last month. "It was prudent for us to go on record. Not just because our neighboring county did, but because we wanted to be part of that history-making as well." Major was referring to last week's action by the Northampton supervisors.

The state Senate approved ratifying the amendment Tuesday, in a 26 to 14 vote. The measure has gone to the House, where it failed last year. If approved, Virginia would become the 38th state or the last needed for ERA to become ratified. Opponents say the amendment can't be passed because it missed the 1982 deadline.

Burge said the House sent it to the Privileges and Elections Committee Wednesday. That panel will meet Friday (today), she added.

The supervisors also appointed David Lumgair, of Craddockville, to the county's Economic Development Authority to the position left vacant by the resignation of Chairman Wesley Edwards which was announced in an email last week without explanation. Jack Tarr, of Chincoteague, was reappointed to the panel.

The supervisors also supported a grant application for the new library in Parksley. They dedicated \$2 million for the project and approved the figure being used to ob-

tain matching funds. Supervisor Paul Muhly reported the library board plans to meet on Feb. 25 to order construction plans before bids will be solicited.

Chairman Donald Hart complained about the former Central High School building in Painter being derelict with windows being broken out. "I wish we'd never sold it," he said. Supervisor Harris Phillips said Bloxom Elementary, which also no longer belongs to the county, was in the same condition. They asked county staff to contact the owners to ask if they would fix the problems.

The board authorized grant applications to the Virginia Port Authority for \$125,000 each for Quinby and Greenbackville harbors. The money would be used to replace deteriorated docks and bulkheads.

The board granted extensions for two conditional use permits that will allow more time for SunTec to start construction on its 180-acre solar project in Tasley. Two longtime Eastern Shore families, the Nordstorms and the Van Kesterens, are working on a plan that will allow Hog Island sheep to graze between the panels. A spokesperson reported they were trying to find ways to bring costs down and that the project had taken longer than anticipated.

ijuana sale in Virginia, making it a Class 1 misdemeanor. Del. Glenn Davis proposed a bill clarifying "products containing a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) that is no greater than that allowed by federal law does not constitute marijuana, as defined in the code." The move would make possession of cannabidiol oil and THC-A oil legal. "The bill directs the Board of Pharmacy to issue additional permits to operate a pharmaceutical processor by Sept. 1, 2019."

There is a bill that deals with industrial hemp in the 2018 Federal Farm Bill. It amends the definitions of cannabidiol oil, marijuana, and THC to exclude industrial hemp that is grown, dealt, or processed in compliance with state or federal law.

Another controversial bill "eliminates the requirement that an abortion in the second trimester of pregnancy be performed in a hospital. The bill eliminates all the procedures and processes, including the performance of an ultrasound, required to effect a woman's informed written consent to the performance of an abortion ... The bill eliminates the requirement that two other physicians certify that a third-trimester abortion is necessary to prevent the woman's death or impairment of her mental or physical health, as well as the need to find that any such impairment to the woman's health would be substantial and irremediable."

Other recently proposed bills include ones that:

- Reduce the watercraft sales and use tax rate from 2 percent to 1.95 percent and removes the \$2,000 cap.
- Allow public auctions held to enforce a lien on property at a storage business to take place online.
- Extend the time that polling places close on election day to 8 p.m.
- Require Criminal Justice Services to collect information about bail determinations, create a uniform reporting mechanism for agencies to submit the data, and submit an annual report to the governor and General Assembly.
- Include alpacas in the definition of livestock in the Comprehensive Animal Care law.
- Change the vote requirement for certain board of zoning appeals de-

- cisions from a majority of the membership to a majority of the membership present and voting.
- Increase the statute of limitations for prosecuting misdemeanor violations when the victim is a minor from a year after the victim reaches the age of majority to five years for carnal knowledge of offender by employee of bail bond company, sexual battery, attempted sexual battery, infected sexual battery, infected sexual battery, sexual abuse of a child age 13 or 14 by an adult, and tongue penetration by adult of mouth of child under age 13 with lascivious intent.
- Require electric utilities to give customers a 10-day notice by mail prior to terminating service.
- Reduce sales tax on essential personal hygiene products to 1.5 percent.
- Provide that menstrual products be deemed a misbranded device unless packaging and labeling indicate whether the product contains synthetic fibers, dioxin, or bisphenol A.
- Require health insurers, health care subscription plans, and

- health maintenance organizations to provide coverage for the diagnosis and treatment of autism spectrum disorder in individuals of any age.
- Add five members to the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities task force for its work regarding the history of formerly enslaved African-Americans.
- Direct social services departments to foster, create, maintain, and coordinate a hospital and community-based multidisciplinary teams focused on the abuse and exploitation of adults 60 years or older or 18 years or older, who are physically or mentally incapacitated.
- Make it a misdemeanor with a mandatory 10-day jail term for theft of a parcel delivered to a residence.
- Direct the State Water Control Board to adopt regulations allowing the owner of residential property in a Chesapeake Bay Preservation Area to deposit appropriate fill material in certain low-lying areas within 50 landward feet of a resource protection area on the property.





## Transportation Group Concerned Falling Asset Values Shown in Audit

The Accomack-Northampton Transportation District Commission was audited for the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, 2018, and not all of its members were satisfied with the results.

The ANTDC operates the Eastern Shore's public bus system, STAR Transit, and monitors the lease of the railroad. The Jan. 7 meeting was the first time since the ANTDC was re-organized in June that its auditor formally discussed its finances with the new commissioners.

"This balance sheet is garbage, and it's not your fault," Vice Chairman John Coker told auditor Jeff Mitchell.

Coker questioned the accuracy of the list of ANTDC's assets and their accumulated depreciation. Some assets are being sold off, and the remaining assets have not been evaluated in years.

"We have a lot of what used to be assets that are now scrap value assets ... they're not worth anything. ... Just look at the barge," Coker said. He was referring to the Nandua, the barge that once transported rail cars from Cape Charles across the Chesapeake Bay.

"That's probably the 1.8 (million dollar asset listed as marine equipment),

which ... frankly, was sold for less than \$200,000," he continued.

The barge's sale less than a decade after Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation and Accomack and Northampton counties had previously invested a total of \$1 million to repair the barge for future use.

A document distributed at the public meeting showed the Nandua was sold to a used equipment dealer, Iron Planet, for \$179,805.

Coker was concerned that many of ANTDC's assets will be "written off" and "all of a sudden, our assets are going to drop by about 3 million bucks, with nothing to show for it."

Former commissioners maintained that ANTDC assets total more than \$10 million.

Assistant Secretary Janice Williams recalled that the previous commission would always say, "We're fine with this number that's on the books, we're not going to go incur an appraisal fee to tell us what this new value is."

Commissioner Spencer Murray believes "beyond a shadow of a doubt" that ANTDC's assets are worth at least \$10 million, but he suggested the organization may want to start new record books as of Jan. 1.

Coker said, "It's time, this year, to fix this." ANTDC's remaining assets are mostly land, and its old railroad equipment is "gone. We don't own any engines and the cars are all junk."

Commissioners don't want to waste money fixing the problem. Williams will assist in searching through old records for more information on ANT-DC's assets and their value.

Since the June re-organization, which occurred around the same time Bay Coast Railroad ceased operations in Cape Charles, public entity ANTDC has shared its board members with private company Canonie Atlantic, and they co-own the railroad.

Murray was concerned with having a clear understanding of the relationship between the two organizations and following proper procedure as old railroad assets are sold.

ANTDC owns all the railroad assets, because it owns 100 percent of Canonie Atlantic's stock, or one sole share, he explained.

Mitchell advised ANTDC to report all the assets and handle any future sale.

The assets include 40.1 acres in Northampton worth \$4 million, deeded to Canonie Atlantic, and the Cape Charles rail yard that was recently cleaned up and is ready to be sold, Murray said.

The railroad no longer runs in Cape Charles, but it is under lease to the Delmarva Central Railroad, operating between Hallwood and Pocomoke City, Md., and Buckingham Branch Railroad, operating across the bay in Little Creek.

anteeing back pay for the federal workers, whether they worked or not.

On Jan. 15, a letter went out from Admiral Karl L. Schultz to the local guardsmen. "To-day you will not be receiving your regularly scheduled mid-month paycheck," he wrote. "To the best of my knowledge, this marks the first time in our nation's history that service members in a U.S. Armed Force have not been paid during a lapse in government appropriations ... I recognize the anxiety and uncertainty this situation places on you and your family, and we are working closely with service organizations on your behalf."

Schultz added the Coast Guard Mutual Assistance received \$15 million in donations from USAA (United Services Automobile Association, an insurance and finance company). The American Red Cross will help distribute the money. "I am grateful for the outpouring of support across the country, particularly in local communities, for our men and women. It is a direct reflection of the American public's sentiment towards their United States Coast Guard; they recognize the sacrifice that you and your family make in service to your country ... Stay the course, stand the watch, and serve with pride. You are not, and will not, be forgotten."

Both Accomack and Northampton public schools receive reimbursement for breakfast and lunch for students who qualify for free or reduced meals. The divisions also get money back for students who pay full price.

James Lane, superintendent of public instruction for the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE), reported to Accomack schools that the federal program is intact through March, but no promises have been made beyond that.

Lane said VDOE "has already been funded for (the) federal fiscal year 2019, through September 30, 2019, and is not at risk of shutting down at this time. (The) federal fiscal year 2019 grants from U.S. DOE should be received by Virginia on schedule this summer. In addition, school divisions are still currently spending previously awarded grants from federal fiscal years 2017 and 2018."

"I am keenly aware of the implications a prolonged federal government shutdown can have on our Housing Choice Voucher Program," also known as the Section 8 program, said County Administrator Mike Mason, who is a member of the Accomack-Northampton Regional Housing Authority (A-NRHA). "We are fortunate that Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has provided the December 2018 and January 2019 funding incre-

ments to the A-NRHA thereby enabling housing assistance payments to be made in full and on schedule. My fear is that if the shutdown continues, it could impact the authority's ability to make housing assistance payments in the future. Granted the shutdown would have to continue to almost March before there is real damage to program participants but with the current stalemate, anything is possible."

Mason asked Elaine Meil, executive director of the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission, for more insight.

"The impact of the federal shutdown on county operations is minimal," she told him. "Yes, there are some federal grant reimbursements that are on hold because of the shutdown but they are not significant and do not materially impact our financial position or our operations ... Our communication towers are due for some ... upgrades but we cannot proceed until the FAA has approved the changes." That division of the FAA is on furlough.

"My real concern is the economic impact to the county in general," she said. "There are over 1,700 employees and contractors working for NASA and its tenants both on the main base and Wallops Island ... local businesses who cater to their needs are being negatively impacted. If local businesses suffer, so does the county. It's as simple

as that," she said."

U.S. Sen. Tim Kaine said he "objected to the Senate leaving town for the weekend while hundreds of thousands of federal employees — many of them Virginians — were set to miss paychecks. My objection led to negotiations with (Senate Majority) Leader (Mitch) McConnell that resulted in the Senate unanimously passing our bill to guarantee back pay ... I'm thankful that both parties were able to hear the urgency we are feeling in Virginia and work with us on getting this legislation through."

Accomack supervisors voiced concern Wednesday about changes to the maps in the Coastal Barrier Resources Act being proposed by the Fish and Wildlife Service. "The county can't get any answers because there are no workers there," Mason said.

The maps "designate which areas are not eligible for financial assistance and federal expenditures. The legislation was designed to conserve the rich ecosystem of coastal barriers that are prone to hurricane and major storm events." Mason said the proposal includes removing 201 acres and adding another 97 acres. Plus, it removes 80 structures and adds 45 buildings. He was unsure if private property is involved. It could keep people from getting flood insurance, he said. "Both Chincoteague and Wachapreague have been alerted."



## Northampton Indicts 12

An Eastville man was indicted Monday in Northampton Circuit Court for the November 2018 strangulation of his longtime girlfriend.

Howard Cornelius Thomas Jr., 34, of Solomon Lane, was indicted on two counts of strangulation and a third offense of assault and battery of a family member. The incidents occurred Nov. 10, 2018. The victim was Kayla McCain. Records state Thomas was convicted of assault and battery of a household member twice in the last 20 years.

"When I arrived I found Ernest and Sheila Washington holding Howard Thomas Jr. down on the floor," Chief Angelo DiMartino, of the Exmore Police Department (EPD), wrote on a warrant. "Sheila advised that Howard attacked her daughter in the hallway and when Ernest pulled Howard off, Howard started choking Ernest. Sheila said that was when she got on top of Howard to get him off of Ernest."

"McCain advised that she was trying to get into the apartment when Howard ran down the hall and grabbed her by the neck and slammed her to the floor," the chief wrote. "Kayla stated that when she started screaming her mom and dad came out to pull him off of her."

McCain and Thomas had been in a relationship for a decade, the record showed. A video at the Exmore Village showed, "Howard sitting on top of Kayla choking her with both hands around her neck," the file stated.

In other cases, three women were indicted for embezzling from the Food Lion in Exmore.

Wykia Shantell James, 26, of Hampton Court in Birdsnest, was indicted on embezzling property valued at \$500 or more Oct. 2, 2018. A video and receipts showed her "letting employees and citizens leave with large carts of food for very little money," DiMartino wrote. "She would scan and then void the items. Total so far is \$980."

Shatoria Monique Thomas, 27, of Tatum Circle in Exmore, was indicted on a count of embezzling property between July 1 and Oct. 26, 2018, while

employed by Food Lion. She admitted to "letting a friend and family have groceries without paying for them," the file concluded. "She stated approximately \$3,000 worth."

Tamekia Nakesha Davis, 28, of Savagetown Road in Painter, was indicted on a count of embezzling from the store between July 15 and Nov. 19, 2018. Sgt. Adam Zieger, of EPD, handled that case. # Teen To Serve 10 Days For Stealing From Walmart

A teenager will spend 10 days in jail for 21 misdemeanor counts of stealing property from Walmart in Onley.

Aliyah Nicole Morris, 19, of South Fork Road in Parksley, pleaded guilty to the charges in October 2018. A felony charge of theft was not prosecuted. The incident occurred in September, October, and November 2017.

Last week, Judge Burke F. McCahill, of Accomack Circuit Court, sentenced Morris to 60 days for each of the charges with all but 10 days suspended.

In another case, Eliezer Nunez Rosado, 61, of Savage Neck Drive in Eastville, was sentenced to a total of five years in prison and ordered to pay back \$336.36 to Walmart for two counts of stealing property in September 2016. He was ordered to be on supervised probation for three years and on unsupervised probation for another two years.

Oskie Lee Frazier Jr., 40, of Wessells Farm Road in Temperanceville, was sentenced to five years with all but two suspended for possession with intent to distribute cocaine and five years and three months with all but three suspended for transporting an ounce or more of cocaine into Virginia. The terms were set to run consecutively. Frazier's driver's license was suspended for six months. After release,

he will be on supervised probation for five years and unsupervised probation for two years. The incidents occurred in October 2017.


## Marion S. Scott Jr.

McClements was shot in the head on July 9, 2018, at 3000 Daniel St., in Carvel Gardens Apartments in Sussex County, Del., a Delaware newspaper reported. "Police said an altercation between multiple people occurred before shots were fired."




Bishop also is a praise dancer at her local church and is a member of her school's track team. She hopes to continue to cheer at the collegiate level.







The large bird of prey with his massive hooked bill and long broad wings soared up and away last Friday in what experts said was a quest to find his family.

An adult male eagle, injured in a fight with another eagle, rescued by kayakers, and then nursed back to health by The Wildlife Center of Virginia, in Waynesboro, Va., was released near the site where he was found at Tall Pines Harbor Campground, in Sanford.

Ed Clark Jr., president and

"That eagle was an incredibly strong flier," said Clark. "The strongest I've seen in the past few years."

The eagle was observed swimming to shore at the campground last October. He was taken to a local rescuer for evaluation before going to the center.





# **Editorial**

Kudos to the boards of supervisors in both counties for their resolutions supporting the Equal Rights Amendment. But the manner in which each of the counties went about its approval is worth noting.

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors placed the item on its consent agenda where items are bundled and voted on together without discussion.

Amendments to the U.S. Constitution are rare occurrences. Virginia could become the 38th state to ratify this one, the magic number needed for an amendment to be added to the Constitution. Doesn't that merit at least a few words of discussion?

Near the end of the meeting, during a time reserved for board members comments, Supervisor Reneta Major thanked supervisors for their votes while noting the significance of the endorsement. She was the only board member to speak about the amendment.

In contrast, the Northampton Board of Supervisors placed the ERA on its agenda and gave it a full airing before its vote. Supervisor David Fauber asked whether anything in the Constitution denies equal rights. It is similar to questions others have raised - is the ERA really needed? It is discussion befitting a weighty proposition.

Some have argued the 14th amendment's equal protection clause already

guarantees equal rights, but does it?

When the ERA was first proposed in 1923, women had just gained the right to vote through the 19th amendment in 1920. Yet it was legal to discriminate against women in hiring and to terminate employment when they were married or if they became pregnant.

It wasn't until the 1970s that the 14th amendment began to be broadly applied to women's rights. The 14th amendment applies as cases are brought before the courts and tested. Wedging protections into the 14th amendment as an afterthought does not afford the same protection.

A constitution is the expression and embodiment of a country's ideals. It tells its

citizens and the world what it holds most dear. In a country built on the noblest ideals of equality and justice, what does our Constitution's silence on equality of sexes under the law say about who we are?

The Virginia Senate passed a resolution for ratification Tuesday and it is now in the House of Delegates. Sen. Lynwood was one of the bill's patrons.

If Virginia ratifies the amendment, it will likely face legal challenges. So let them play out. Ratify the ERA.

### Union Baptist To Host Unity Day Program

We're invited to a special event on Jan. 21, 2019, at Union Baptist Church in Eastville, at 2 p.m. On a day Americans collectively recognize and celebrate the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and his ideals, we can remember all those who have struggled and continue to struggle for equity, understanding, and freedom, with a program led by my dear friend and colleague, Kellee Green Blake.

Two summers ago we spent countless hours poring over the collections of community historian, Frances Bibbins Latimer, discovering and organizing one artifact after another for George Latimer who donated the archives to the Eastern Shore Public Library. Like the archives themselves and my relationship with the Latimers, Kellee's immersion in the work was an invaluable delight as she guided and taught this non-historian and we exchanged ideas.

The retired Director of the National Archives, Mid-Atlantic Division, Kellee Blake, has extensively researched the Shore's Civil War history and will share information regarding the African-American Shoremen who served in the

USCT — African-American men who enlisted to serve in the Civil War — and specifically those that fought with the 10th Infantry, a regiment of 800 men.

This welcome by Pastor George and First Lady Bright is no small thing. A predominantly African-American church, Union Baptist was the first church and school for black people on the Eastern Shore, pastored by Caleb James Burris, who was born into slavery and purchased his own freedom with the help of his friends. Free men, John and Samuel Bibbins agreed to live in bondage until he could return to pay the man who owned him. Caleb Burris became the first ordained African-American minister on the Shore and with members of the Watson, Baker, Collins, Harmonson, Solomon, Church, Fitchett, Taswell, and Bibbins families, Union Baptist was founded in 1865. Six or more soldiers who served the USCT are buried in the cemetery adjacent to the church, including the ancestors of another young friend and historian, Bobby Harmon.

Join us on Unity Day to listen, learn, and get to know your neighbors. The event is free and refreshments will be served in the fellowship hall after the program.
