Birdsnest Woman Dies In Sunday Night Fire

A house fire Sunday night in Birdsnest claimed the life of one woman who has not yet been positively identified by authorities.

The Eastern Shore 9-1-1 Center received the call at 11:25 p.m. Fire stations responded from Wachapreague, Painter, Exmore, Cheriton, Cape Charles, Nassawadox, and Eastville. Nassawadox Fire Chief Jim LeCato was in command at the scene, the 11000 block of Sealey Road.

Eastville Fire and Rescue reportedly spent 7.5 hours at the scene and used more than 18,000 gallons of water, one engine, two tankers, nine air pack tanks, and two attack lines to battle the blaze. Controlling the fire

was complicated by windy and icy conditions.

Emergency Medical Services units from Exmore and Machipongo also responded, and two deputies from the

Northampton County Sheriff's Office assisted.

The Virginia State Police were called at 1:10 a.m. Monday morning to conduct the continuing investigation.

Nelsonia Woman Dies at the Scene of Crash

The driver of a car that crashed Friday on Nelsonia Road died at the scene, according to Sgt. Michelle Anaya of the state police.

Julia Marie Vermeal, 28, of Adelaide Street in Parksley, was going east, in a 1999 Ford Escort, when she ran off the road, "overturned in a ditch, and came to rest against a utility pole."

Two passengers, Joseph Vermeal,

27, of Onley, and Robert Donovan, 24, of Parksley, suffered injuries that were not life-threatening. Anaya reported the passengers were not wearing seat belts. "Alcohol does not appear to be a factor," she added.

A spokesperson for the Eastern Shore 9-1-1 Center said the incident occurred 5:19 a.m. Fire and rescue crews from Bloxom and Parksley responded.

Murder-for-Hire Trial Enters Third Day of Testimony

Evron Terrell Strand Sr. was her partner in love and crime. That's what Cynthia Harmon told the jury at Strand's murder-for-hire trial Wednesday in Accomack Circuit Court where she contended she was testifying against him in hopes of getting a reduced sentence for herself and "because it is the right thing to do."

Wearing a white jail jumpsuit, the 52-year-old Parksley woman walked over from the Accomack facility, where she's been an inmate since November 2017, stepped up into the witness box, and reported Strand ordered the death of a Nathaniel "Nate" Johnson, the police informant who snitched on him.

Harmon admitted to selling drugs and setting up three-way calls between Strand, while he was incarcerated, and several others whom he asked to kill Johnson.

Harmon said after Johnson, and his girlfriend, were shot in the Linhaven area of Painter, on Halloween night 2017, Harmon was instructed by Strand to pay \$1,000 or a "stack" for the attempted hit.

Harmon testified that she and her son, Debrandon Harmon, met one of Strand's contractors, Aaron Bowens, at Walmart in Onley. She gave her son ten \$100 bills which he took down a store aisle to Bowens, while she waited in another part of the store.

Debrandon Harmon, 30, testified

had sold drugs he obtained from Strand, before the defendant was arrested for cocaine selling. The witness said the nine ounces of cocaine seized from the house he shared with his mother and other family members did not belong to him. He is not be allowed to speak to his mother as a condition of his bond. Debrandon Harmon is the only suspect charged with the plot to be given bond. He said he earned the \$700 police confiscated from him at his jobs at Perdue and Hardee's, not by selling drugs.

Strand's trial started Tuesday and was continuing at press time Thursday with hours of additional testimony anticipated from prosecution witnesses. Strand, 44, of Deer Drive in Nelsonia, pleaded not guilty to 16 charges including four counts of soliciting first-degree murder, capital murder by a prisoner, obstruction, drug/gang conspiracy, and malicious wounding. He is being held in

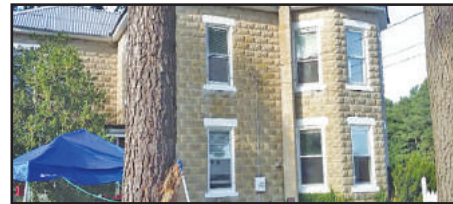

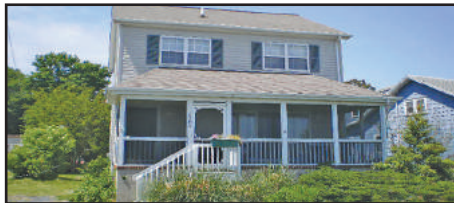

the Eastern Shore Regional Jail. Cynthia Harmon testified she has known Strand for at least a decade and was aware he was married, so she didn't visit him while he was incarcerated at Accomack Jail. That was the way he wanted it while he was awaiting trial for cocaine distribution in 2017.

She tried to be content talking to Strand on her cellphone every day. Cynthia Harmon admitted to sometimes connecting Strand to third-party calls so he could arrange the murder. She said he told her without Johnson's testimony, there would be no drug case against him.

Debrandon Harmon said he talked to Strand about Johnson when his mother passed the phone to him.

Johnson, 30, and his then 19-year-old girlfriend, Dezarae Smith, were shot while walking in the Linhaven Circle area. Johnson said Roquan Lee'teq "Cake" Rogers, 19, of Benjamin Banneker Road in Exmore, shot him and Smith. Rogers is accused of taking the job at Strand's urging for revenge for Johnson testifying against his brother Akeem Markiese Rogers, 27, of Ma-

dame CJ Walker Lane in Exmore, earlier in October 2017. Akeem Rogers was convicted of drug offenses. Smith said she recognized Roquan Rogers as the shooter when his trial was held. She changed her testimony Wednesday, saying she was going by what Johnson had said and that she didn't know he was an informant until after the shooting. They are no longer in a relationship.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan suggested she was afraid because Rogers brothers' father was in the courtroom and had been sitting behind her. At Roquan Rogers' trial, Judge W. Revell Lewis told another unidentified man to stop intimidating Smith during her testimony.

Johnson was shot in the back and buttock. Smith was hit in the ankle.

Defense lawyer Kenneth Singleton asked for the trial to be moved to another location because of the amount of press coverage the shooting gained. "It's easy to assume he is guilty," Singleton warned the jury. "It's okay to assume watching television shows ... But it's not okay for the jury. You guys are the judges in this case ... you are the deciders."

Deshawn Drummond, 28, of Savageville, said he worked at New Ravena, in Exmore, as a water jet operator. He

also admitted to selling cocaine, which he sometimes bought from Strand before the defendant was arrested. Drummond pleaded guilty to obstruction of justice in a plea bargain with Morgan who dropped conspiracy to commit murder charges. Drummond said he could be sentenced to five years in prison but was hoping for less time in exchange for his testimony.

Drummond testified Strand called

him about a dozen times from the jail, using street language and code to urge him to kill Johnson with promises of a car and money. "At first he said whatever I needed and pick a car out of his yard," said Drummond. "I made no attempt ... I didn't try to do no murder." The witness said he was friends with Johnson and used to give him rides to work.

Tangier Island Is Tapped Out

Surrounded by water but not a drop to drink. That was life this week on Tangier Island after the water tower was drained when a new water line burst last Sunday night.

"Of all things, I never thought we'd have a problem for lack of water," Mayor James "Ooker" Eskridge said Thursday of his home in the middle of the Chesapeake Bay. "We were able to get a trickle so water lines wouldn't freeze but some did" and there was "no pressure to use fire hydrants. That's a major concern."

VDOT was replacing two bridges on the island of about 400 people. The

existing water line had to be moved so it was replaced with a new line. When the freeze came on Jan. 20, there was a break. The lack of flowing water then caused lines to some homes to burst.

There was no water Monday, Eskridge said. Town workers went to the mainland and were helped to load and transport pallets of water.

Residents are managing by using creek water to flush toilets. They are heating drinking water to take what is known as bird baths. "We're trying to maintain ourselves best we can in the situation." Businesses are unable to operate, the mayor said.

Internet Provider Says Broadband Authority Poses Unfair Competition

Internet service provider Eastern Shore Communications, one of three local ISPs, met with Northampton supervisors Jan. 8 not to discuss the ISP's latest contributions in increasing broadband access on the Shore, but to protest its perceived lack of opportunity for local expansion.

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority (ESVBA), providing high-speed internet access to ISPs that sell the service to end-users, is "directly competing with us" and causing an "imbalance" in the local market, Eastern Shore Communications CEO Ronald Van Geijn said.

ESVBA was established by Accomack and Northampton counties in 2008 to provide high-speed internet access to the Shore. ESVBA received grant funds from both counties to help cover startup costs, which it paid back even though it was not required to.

Van Geijn's visit with Northampton supervisors was scheduled after a press release was issued by the offices of U.S. Sens. Mark Warner and Tim Ka-

ine, which mistakenly stated the ISP received a \$1.8 million grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development office to benefit several areas including the Eastern Shore.

The grant was for the Cape Charles-based company to expand its wireless broadband internet business to North Carolina, Van Geijn said. But correcting the record was not his only concern.

He seemed to disagree with ESVBA's authority to sell internet directly to consumers even though the resolution that established ESVBA stated the broadband authority was needed to provide high speed internet "to local businesses, local government, and the public."

ESVBA acted as a last-mile provider, supplying high-speed internet directly to government organizations and businesses starting in 2010 and homes beginning in 2016.

"ESVBA is not a middle-mile provider," ESVBA Executive Director Robert Bridgham recently emphasized. A middle-mile provider typically offers wholesale pricing to companies that provide end-users with high-speed internet at

retail prices.

ESVBA was serving the last mile before Eastern Shore Communications signed its contract with the broadband authority in 2012 or Neubeam (another ISP that has publicly criticized ESVBA) signed its contract with the broadband authority in 2015.

ESVBA has an open access network, meaning anyone can subscribe to it, including another ISP.

Bridgham stated, "We do not limit who can buy services" because "allowing any and all to subscribe" will "advance our mission to proliferate broadband on the Eastern Shore."

Eastern Shore Communications plays a role in that mission. "Developing rural areas is of critical importance," Van Geijn said. "The incorporated towns have service ... but the rural areas – people living out on the necks ... those are the ones we're focusing on bringing service to," he said.

Eastern Shore Communications and other ISPs, like Neubeam, supply customers with high-speed internet by transmitting it wirelessly from towers, poles, and other tall structures.

"Fixed wireless is a technology that allows for the cost-effective, rapid deployment of high-speed internet service," Van Geijn said.

Anyone who can see the tower can get service, and towers that can see each other can expand service farther away. The longest distance linking two Eastern Shore Communications towers is about 10 miles, Van Geijn said.

But CEOs of wireless ISPs say they're losing customers to ESVBA's fiber-to-the-home service, a "superior product," Van Geijn said. A wired connection using fiber optic cable provides more secure, reliable, and faster service.

"Once broadband is in there, you're out of the game?" Supervisor David Fauber asked Van Geijn.

"Correct," Van Geijn said.

Eastern Shore Communications wants ESVBA to offer wholesale pricing so it can resell ESVBA's fiber-to-the-home service. Under ESVBA's current pricing structure, resale of fiber-to-the-home would be "cost prohibitive," Neubeam/Declaration Networks Group CEO Bob Nichols said.

ESVBA's open access network is one reason why wholesale pricing isn't offered; the broadband authority treats all its customers alike.

To offer wholesale rates to the ISPs, ESVBA would have to raise rates for everyone else. Keeping prices down is "the right thing to do," Bridgham said.

"My goal isn't to make the ISPs money ... my goal is to cover the Shore," Bridgham said.

ESVBA does not offer wholesale pricing, but it does have a program that helps ISPs do business at a reduced cost. The program has two restrictions – the service must be wireless, and it must be beamed from a pole at least 50 feet high. (The minimum height requirement helps ensure signal quality.)

Fauber said to Van Geijn, "I think the market for you in Northampton County is going down to the southern end and ... out into the rural parts." He suggested Eastern Shore Communications continue to develop its wireless service. "If I can get broadband (wired) to my house, you cannot compete against that," he said.

"Your market is ... out to the areas where the wired network is not going," Fauber said.

"What's prohibiting them (ESVBA) from going there, too?" Van Geijn countered.

Nichols previously blamed ESVBA for a "lack of cooperation" with the ISPs and said ESVBA's fiber-to-the-home service is "by definition, almost, it's overlapping 100 percent of what's already in place" to provide Shore homes with broadband internet access.

But Bridgham said lawyers have advised against ESVBA and the ISPs "carving out territories" because it could violate the antitrust laws that ensure fair competition in the open market.

Complaints against ESVBA appear to be linked to a misunderstanding of the broadband authority's intended purpose. ISPs and local politicians continually refer to ESVBA as the middle mile, but Bridgham maintains that "ESVBA is not the middle mile ... and never agreed to be."

Accomack and Northampton's resolution that established the broadband authority stated it was needed "to provide high speed data service and internet access service to local businesses, local government, and the public," a description consistent with a last-mile service provider.

Furthermore, ESVBA is not "taxpayer funded," as some have said. Its operating costs are covered by the revenues it receives from its subscribers.

“to promote economic development” and “for the comfort, convenience, and welfare of the citizens,” according to the resolution.

Though ESVBA is considered a “government entity,” it is neither a governmental department nor taxpayer funded.

ESVBA customers do pay taxes included on their monthly bills, but those consist of a 5 percent Virginia state communications tax and a 15 to 22 percent Federal Communications Commission tax, both of which are mandatory.

ESVBA is a not-for-profit business and neither collects nor pays sales taxes. All revenues are re-invested in the authority to further build out its broadband network across the Eastern Shore.

Ultimately, county supervisors and the broadband authority share the same goal: to act in the best interest of the public.

“We don’t pick winners and losers up here,” Northampton County Board of Supervisors Chairman Spencer Murray said. “Our winners are the citizens of Northampton County. ... We have an obligation to them, to get every one of them affordable, high-speed internet as soon as we possibly can.”

Supervisor Robert Duer interjected, “What is not fair is to allow the private sector to develop the market and then have the public sector root them out of that market with unfair pricing, and they go pick up their customers.”

Brothers Bag 59 Birds Too Many

Two brothers were cited earlier this month in U.S. District Court in Salisbury, Md., for charges related to “grossly” exceeding their daily bag limit of clapper rail birds near Chincoteague. The incidents occurred in September 2018.

The defendants were Howard Lee Whealton, 66, of Burton Street in Hampton, Va., and Daniel E. Whealton, 75, of Beebe Drive on Chincoteague.

“These suspects are not hunters,” said Sgt. Steve Garvis, of the Virginia Conservation Police. “They are simply selfish individuals who robbed the sportsmen and women of the commonwealth of this wonderful game bird ... This over the limit case is the largest ... that has been made by natural resource law enforcement officers on the Eastern Shore in the past 25 years.”

Howard Whealton was operating the boat while his brother shot the birds. “He picked up the harvested rail birds from the water and assisted in the hunt during the observation period,” according to court documents. Howard Whealton pleaded guilty to aid and abet to take over the daily limit and was fined \$500.

“The birds that had been harvested that morning were in an orange oyster basket” that the Whealtons “concealed under Cockle Creek Bridge near Route 175,” Officer D. Dick wrote on the violation notice. “Upon retrieving the basket and examining its contents, I discovered the basket to contain 74 clapper rail.”

Daniel Whealton pleaded guilty to exceeding his daily bag limit by 59 birds and was fined \$1,500. His privilege to hunt was revoked for three years and he was put on supervised probation for three years. He was required to forfeit the shotgun he used to commit the violations.

Initially, both men were also charged with two counts of illegally transporting the chicken-like marsh birds. The fowl live in salt marshes with extensive vegetation they use as refuges, especially at high tide. They live most of their lives on the ground and rarely fly.

The case was heard Jan. 19. It was filed with the U.S. District Court in Baltimore Dec. 15, 2018. The incidents occurred Sept. 10, 2018. Magistrate Judge C. Bruce Anderson heard the cases. The crimes are considered petty offenses.

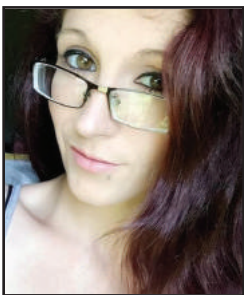

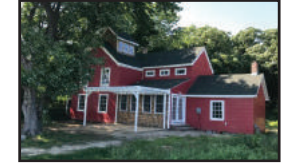

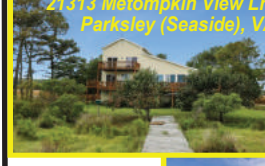

Northampton Sheriff Announces Run for Another Term

David Doughty Jr. is seeking a third term as Northampton County sheriff. His career with the Northampton County Sheriff's Office has spanned 25 years to date, beginning in 1994 when he became a jail deputy.

grounds.

The sheriff's office is currently developing the Offender Re-Entry Program at the Eastern Shore Regional Jail. The program will assist eligible offenders to gain the skills they need to be successful citizens upon release. It is expected to launch this summer.

Doughty credits his staff with managing the programs available through the sheriff's office. "Since being elected sheriff in 2011, I can reflect on the many things that we have accomplished as a department. This success is because of the hard work of my staff and the strong support we receive from the citizens."

He commended his staff for pursuing additional education and training opportunities. "This provides a better service to our citizens."

During his career, Doughty has earned law enforcement certifications in crime scene photography and evidence collection, homicide investigation, interviewing and interrogation, basic radar training, general instructor and firearms instructor training, Glock Armorer's certification, and Sheriff's

Compensation Board training.

Gray belongs to the Virginia Associa-

tion of Local Tax Auditors and the Commissioner of the Revenue Association of Virginia. She is on the planning committee for the Commissioner of the Revenue Association's 100th anniversary.

She was a leader at the Northampton Youth Cultural Enrichment Camp in 2017 and has served as a Boys and Girls Club mentor and coach.

Gray graduated from Northampton High School in 1979 and received her associate degree in computer technology from ECPI (East Coast Polytechnic Institute), in Norfolk.

She is the daughter of Bennie and Annie Gray, of Eastville, and the mother of Army Staff Sgt. Charmarletta Mapp, serving in Anchorage, Alaska.

"As your Commissioner of the Revenue, my team and I remain committed to providing polite, prompt, and professional service. We will continue to ensure fair and equitable assessing," Gray said.

African-American Troops in Civil War Proved Their Mettle

Pastor George C. Bright opened the doors of Union Baptist Church in Northampton County to a multi-ethnic audience on the day set aside to honor Martin Luther King Jr. They gathered to hear a presentation about enslaved men who enlisted in the Union army to fight in the Civil War. Some of those soldiers are buried in the cemetery of Union Baptist.

According to the research of Kellee Green Blake, retired director of the National Archives, Mid-Atlantic Region, about 200,000 African-American men served in "one of the mightiest fighting units ever in United States history, the United States Colored — in the vernacular of the day — Troops" (USCT).

Blake estimates 1,100 to 1,300 men from the Eastern Shore fought in the USCT. "That's 20 percent - one out of five Eastern Shore men served in the USCT." Several hundred more fought in the Union Navy. The USCT comprised about 10 percent of the total federal force. One in five USCT soldiers lost their lives, whether in battle, or wounded and died, or died in a hospital.

The 10th USCT regiment, what Blake calls "the Shore's own regiment," was made up of 800 soldiers, of which at least 500 were from the Eastern Shore of Virginia. They were sent to Craney Island

for training, then sent back to the Shore as the occupying force. "They came in, the white soldiers went out."

They knew the world was watching, and "they served without blemish," said Blake. Nevertheless, their presence caused an uproar and they were eventually recalled from the Eastern Shore to Ft. Monroe and sent into action.

The 7th, 9th, and 10th regiments and the 2nd Calvary, all USCT units, were together at Petersburg and fought against Eastern Shore "refugees" – Confederate Shoremen. Men of the 7th regiment were among the first to enter Petersburg after the Union victory there, and men of the 9th and 10th regiments were among the first to enter Richmond when it fell to Union forces.

Blake had begun her presentation holding a faded red ribbon that once bound archived files.

"In these cotton strings are tied the stories of our nation," Blake said. She has been the first to unwrap many of the stories about the Eastern Shore, but the volume of material limits what she is able to do. Calling it "a great and noble story," she said it is out there waiting "for someone to tell more fully in the future."

That is exactly what the late Frances Bibbins Latimer had in mind with all her historical research — especially African-American history — on the Eastern Shore, said Union

Baptist's First Lady Marlene Bright. She wanted "to get young people excited and involved (through) the legacy of her research."

One young historian, Bobby Harmon, found his family connections through the Latimer collection. "We gave Bobby a welcoming home," said Marlene Bright. "He is one of a new generation working with enthusiasm to bring our history alive." And some of his ancestors served in the USCT and are buried in the Union Baptist Church cemetery.

Chincoteague Supervisor Announces He Will Seek Second Term

Billy Joe Tarr, a 64-year-old island native who represents Chincoteague on the Accomack Board of Supervisors, will seek a second four-year term in the November general election.

"It has been a learning experience," Tarr said this week. "It is a pleasure to serve with this group of elected officials who are pretty much on the same page. The economy of Accomack County, keeping people employed, and bringing visitors to

our unique area, along with preserving our natural resources are top priorities of the board. Chincoteague is very easy to represent, because we, Chincoteague, work to take care of ourselves."

In a prepared statement issued by Tarr, he said his top priority was to get the plans approved and permits submitted so funds could be secured to build a new parking lot for the recreational beach at Assateague. He also served on the Eastern Shore Nav-

igable Waterways Committee, which makes recommendations to the Army Corp of Engineers about dredging.

Tarr said the Chincoteague Inlet was dredged every year he has been a supervisor and is on the schedule to be dredged in the spring. Tarr, Chincoteague Mayor Arthur Leonard, and Chincoteague Town Manager Jim West made final site selections for the parking lot that were closest to beach access.

Land that parallels Maddox Boulevard was given to the town by the county during Tarr's term. He also worked to get paid EMS at Saxis and Greenbackville, which keeps island workers from going to the mainland when Oak Hall EMS is busy.

Tarr said his goal for the next four years is to secure funds for a study regarding the widening of Chincoteague Inlet. He hopes that research will find ways to keep it from expanding. He said he supports launches at Wallops Island and Navy operations in the Chincoteague and Atlantic areas, which are "crucial" to the district's economy "by keeping the workforce employed and drawing visitors to view the operations."

Tarr recently became vice chairman of the Eastern Shore Tourism Commission. He said he is motivated to bring more visitors to the Shore.

In 1994, Tarr retired from the U.S. Coast Guard after serving 20 years. He worked for the Chincoteague and Onancock police departments and for 15 years as an officer of Accomack County Sheriff's Office, before again retiring.

He is a life member of the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, serving for 40 years. Tarr has been president

of the company three times and has

of the company three times and has been the treasurer for the last nine years. In the next few months, the department plans to move to its new firehouse, a project that has taken more than eight years.

"Being the treasurer, pretty much everything has to cross your desk," said Tarr. "It will be nice to get into the new building!"

Tarr is an active deacon and member of Union Baptist Church. He described himself as "nothing more than a sinner saved by the grace of God," who visits members and their families for sickness, death, or just when they are going through a rough time, he said. Along with others in the group, The Baptist Men, he visits nursing homes in Maryland and Virginia every month "bringing a gospel message with plenty of ol' time Christian hymns to the residents and staff."

Tarr also belongs to the Temperanceville Masonic Lodge No. 121 and the Chincoteague Royal Arch Chapter No. 75. He is a past member of Malta Commandry 24, which moved to the Portsmouth, Va., area. Tarr and his wife of 38 years, Tammy, live on the island. They have two adult sons: Dustin, a radio personality with WCTG, and Chris, a detective sergeant in Ocean Pines, Md. The couple has two grandchildren.

The event commemorated King's life and legacy and recognized citizens who have fostered unity through community service.

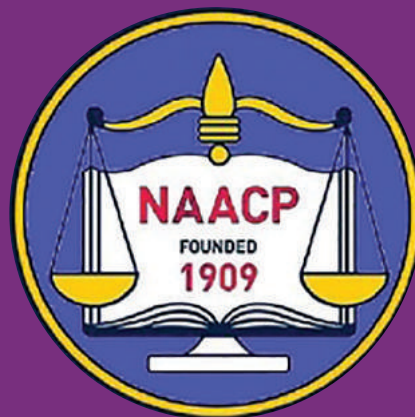
Four individuals posthumously received the Martin Luther King Jr. Trailblazer Award.

Readers Share Opinions on Bills Introduced in General Assembly

Local opinion varies about four controversial bills that were proposed to the General Assembly in 2019, according to comments made this week to the Eastern Shore Post in an email survey.

The proposals included decriminalization of simple marijuana possession, making age restrictions for gun owners, increasing the minimum wage, and changing abortion restrictions.

On Jan. 16, a House subcommittee vote of 5-3 recommended “passing by indefinitely” the marijuana bill. A minimum wage increase failed in the Senate.

“I think a lot of money and resources are wasted attempting to prosecute marijuana possession charges when there are more important battles to be fought such as the opiate epidemic and heroin,” wrote Eric J. Dawson, of Horn-town. “Marijuana has many health benefits and eases pain to patients who have chronic pain.”

The gun bill would require a gun purchaser to be 21 or older, or 18 by July 1, 2019, or be 18, 19, or 20 and have a high school diploma or GED, or be a member of the U.S. Armed Forces or the Virginia National Guard, or any other state and must consent in writing to have the dealer obtain criminal history record information. It also redefines “assault firearm” by reducing from more than 20 to more than 10 the number of rounds of ammunition that a magazine for such firearm will hold.

“If you can die for your country at 18, you should be able to have all the rights of an adult,” Dawson continued. “Not really sure what having a diploma has to do with purchasing a gun. I agree with criminal background checks. Reducing the number of rounds in a magazine is not going to reduce injury or death. In the hands of a skilled shooter, 10 rounds are just as effective as 20 rounds.”

“As a small business owner, I believe in fair wages for employees,” Dawson said. “However minimum wage being raised makes it harder for business owners to be competitive. Wages go up but what consumers are willing to pay remains the same ... minimum wage jobs are designed to be a stepping stone,” he said.

“For the safety of the patient, abortions need to be done in a clinical setting,” Dawson said. “I believe before committing to having the abortion, an ultra-

sound should be required so that the mother can see and hear the living being that is growing inside of her hopefully changing her mind about going through with the abortion.”

Thom Henderson, of Birdsnest, favors decriminalization of marijuana. “Pot is too common, too harmless,” he said. Putting restrictions for the age of gun owners “does not sound like a bad idea.” Regarding minimum wage, Henderson said, “It’s a truism in economics that if you want to spur investment you give money to rich people, but if you want to spur spending you give money to poor people. Raising the minimum wage would stimulate the economy while helping those most in need.”

“The law requiring ultrasounds (before abortions) is not an honest law,” Henderson said. “It’s really an anti-abortion law proposed by people who lack the courage to say what they’re really after.”

Beverly Lynch, of Painter, favors decriminalizing of marijuana possession. “It is an individual right to use as long as it doesn’t harm anyone else.” She said possession “clogs up the court system.” She is against the age restrictions for guns. It “violates the second amendment and would not reduce gun crimes,” she wrote. Lynch is also against raising the minimum wage. “Will raise the costs of everything and create unemployment.”

“This appears to be the direction that the nation is going and is seen by many as a new revenue stream for the govern-

ment much like taxes on alcohol and cigarettes,” Michael Dillenburg, of Onancock, wrote about marijuana. “If the possession is to be decriminalized, then other laws must be prepared to address the consequences of a user driving under the influence or committing crime under the influence ... if the decriminalization bill doesn’t address this, then I’m not in favor of passing it.”

“Not in favor of an age requirement” for gun ownership “unless it also ties the right to vote with it,” wrote Dillenburg. “If you aren’t responsible enough to purchase a firearm, then you likely aren’t responsible enough to vote. When the age to vote was dropped from 21 to 18, it was to recognize the young veterans ... Today, service ... is provided by a small minority of this nation’s population and the majority ... providing no service to the nation other than volunteer work or paying taxes. Raising the age and redefining ‘assault firearm’ does nothing to address the hatred, mental health issues, and general lack of respect for human life that are core to the mass shootings of today. Nowhere have I read that local, state, or federal governments are addressing the violence portrayed in television shows, movies, or video games ... disarm them first before talking about restricting Americans’ rights.”

He also is against the minimum age proposal. “Many jobs are entry level type work and not considered to be ‘living wage’ jobs. When you look at cities

that have raised the minimum wages there, jobs have either been reduced or kiosks/artificial intelligence bots have been used to replace the human being. With AI just really getting started, there will be much greater pressure to replace any minimum wage position with AI where possible. This also places far more pressure on small businesses ... working on narrow margins.”

“I most strongly disagree with any elimination of the ultrasound first” for abortion “or the requirement that has abortions in the second trimester be performed in a hospital,” said Dillenburg. “I firmly believe in the rights of the human being in the womb. I believe that multiple options exist to both preclude conception or offer other alternatives to abortion including abstinence; contraception, including the day after pill; sterilization for the parents; and adoption for the child. ... The ultrasound provides a ‘window into the womb’ and provides the ultimate reality of the life that would be terminated by abortion.”

“Drugs are drugs and I don’t think they should be legal for any reason,” said Julie Nash, of Parksley. “I know they cite other areas that have decriminalized its use and they claim that more people have benefited from it, but those studies are new and few. Drug use including marijuana kills brain cells. Many of the people who use really can’t afford to let go of any more brain cells.”

“I am against any increases in restriction on guns,” Nash continued. “The founding fathers put the Second Amendment in place for a reason. When a person has an evil intent in his heart, he is going to carry it out one way or another ... children should be taught from a young age how to handle a gun. This would restrict us from teaching our children to hunt and shoot properly.”

Nash disagrees with a minimum wage change. “All that does is create inflation. If you pay people in non-skilled positions higher wages, prices need to increase and professionals become more valuable and their salaries increase.”

“I am against abortion, but I am against this bill because it is simply formed to make abortion easier and more accessible,” Nash wrote, adding the bills makes “it more convenient. I am for the rights of the unborn child ... I am a

graduate from the college of science and I believe the unborn child is a human being that deserves the decision at life for their body.”

“Marijuana is a narcotic and a gateway drug to more dangerous, addictive narcotics,” wrote Harry Rivell, of Cape Charles. “We have a severe drug problem in our country and we seem to be sending the message that some drugs are OK while others aren’t?”

He is also against the age restriction for guns. “Gun laws only affect the honest citizen,” he said. “Criminals don’t care what gun laws are passed ... they aren’t going to suddenly stop using high capacity magazines because the law bans them. Gun laws are just ‘feel good’ laws that do not address the real problems — mental aberrations, family disarray, social inequities ... Guns and the number of rounds they hold are not the problem. A fully loaded, cocked firearm will never fire until someone picks it up.”

Rivell is against raising the wage. “You are putting undue pressure on small businesses who could stay open and employ people at lower hourly wage levels but might have to close and not employ anyone with higher wage levels.”

“I don’t see marijuana as any differ-

ent than alcohol,” said Denise Bowden, of Chincoteague. “If anyone thinks that keeping it illegal is going to keep people from using it, then you need to crawl out from under the rock you’re living under.”

Bowden said she has been around guns all her life, has been taught how to use and respect them. “I do believe that you should be able to purchase a gun at 18 years old. If you can join the military at 18 and go off to war then you should be mature enough to purchase one. I don’t see the purpose of requiring a diploma. Some of our politicians need the diploma. I’m a firm believer in background checks and anyone who has a criminal history of assault should not be able to own a gun. If people were taught the way the majority of us were taught about guns, we wouldn’t need this conversation.”

“Minimum wage definitely needs a hike,” Bowden said. “There is no way on God’s green earth that anyone can live off of that. I mean seriously, one gallon of milk and a loaf of bread would wipe out one hours work before taxes.”

Regarding the abortion bill, she said, “There are enough precautions out there to prevent pregnancy that abortions shouldn’t need to be an option. Noth-

ing makes me madder than when someone is ‘surprised’ by finding out she is pregnant. Give me a break! You didn’t use birth control ... and you are surprised. Yeah right.”

“Sounds good to me,” Michael Stephano, of Cashville, said about decriminalization of simple marijuana possession. “It is a pity all those folks ... ended up in jail or with criminal records over a plant. Legalize it and convert the taxes to healthcare and social programs,” he said.

“I believe it is 18 now for rifle and shotgun, and 21 for handgun,” Stephano said. “That seems to have worked OK in Virginia. Any weapon is an assault weapon. It is not determined by how it looks. It is about the intent of the user. As far as big magazines... 10 is certainly reasonable for most sport shooting. Background checks seem reasonable. I was put off by the part of the bill that restricted use by young people. I started my kids with (a) .22 pistol and (a) rifle when they were seven or eight. When I was a scout there was a shooting merit badge. Learn early to respect and handle firearms and it will not be such a novelty. I consider myself a gun-toting liberal.”

Stephano called the \$7.25 minimum

wage “ridiculous. I paid people \$10 an hour and more ... I also had great and loyal employees. You know who you are.”

He said abortion is a “woman’s choice. Keep politics and religion out of the womb.”

Sheila Spelman, of Onancock, supports simple marijuana possession. “Marijuana use is ubiquitous and reminiscent of the prohibition years (when) despite being illegal, alcohol use continued and gave birth to criminal operations. Law enforcement efforts are better focused elsewhere. No, I am not nor have ever been a user.”

Spelman said she would support the age requirement for guns if it was “21 period. Remove all references to anyone younger.” She also supports minimum wage increases.

“I don’t believe a pregnancy should be measured in terms of trimesters for abortion purposes. I support a women’s right to choose but believe weeks of gestation should be the eligibility criteria. A fetus is viable at 26 - 28 weeks which is 2nd trimester. Therefore, ultrasound should be done on 2nd-trimester pregnancies to verify gestational age. Regardless of where the procedure is performed, abortion of a viable fetus should be illegal.”

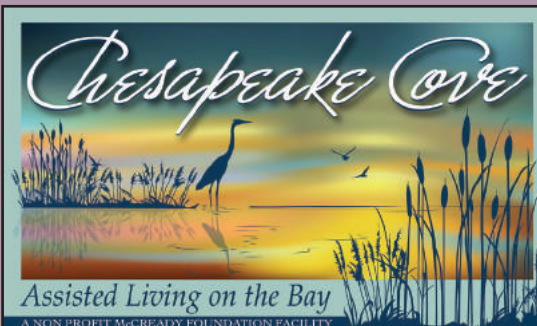

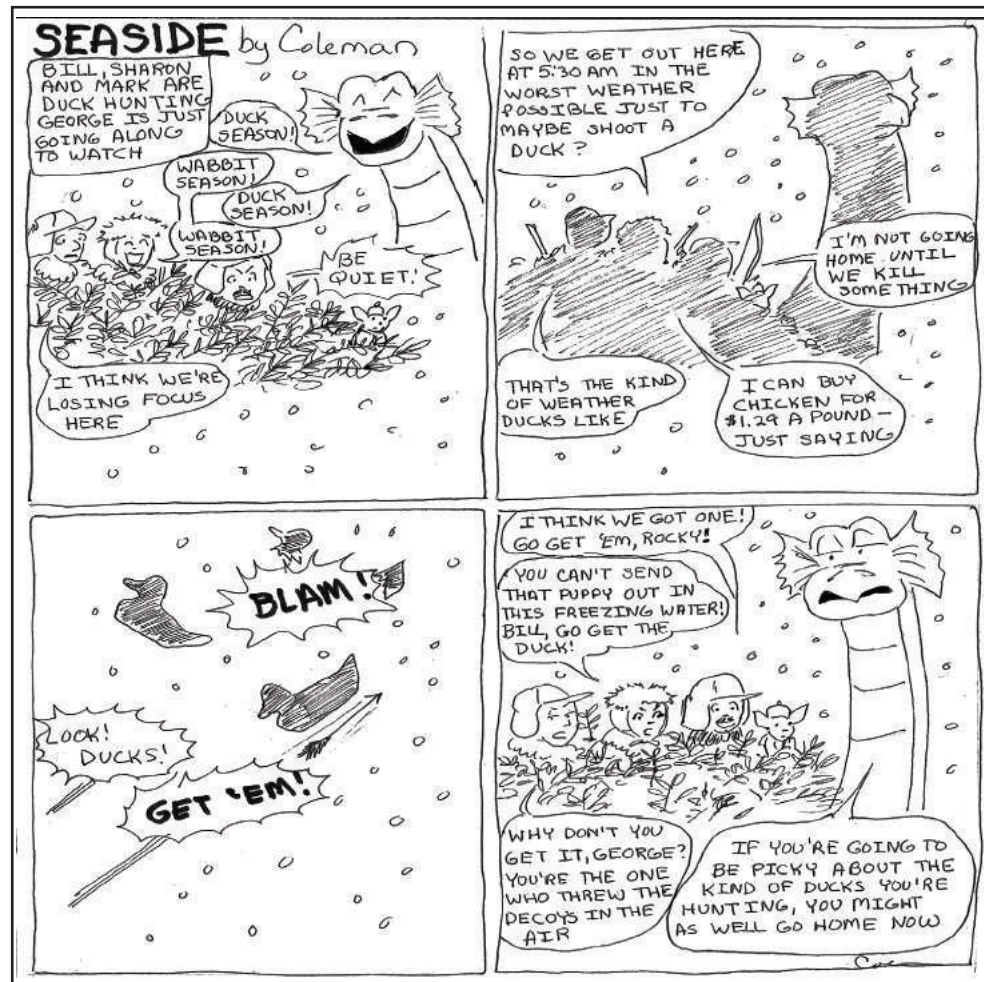
Museum organizer Gerald Boyd said repairs are still being made to the museum building but it is expected to open later this spring. "Of course we'll invite the governor to come back," he said.

This year's re-election is looming large in most delegates' minds. This overshadows good policy decisions in many cases. Delegates have

submitted bills to fire up their base and to catch delegates of the other party in a "bad" vote. Those votes will become a political flyer or a television ad. I understand the game, but do not enjoy this part of the job. Hot button issues always overshadow some of the big decisions that really move the need

to help Virginians move forward.

Some of the major issues that will be discussed and hopefully will be decided are the funding and improving of Interstate 81, the incentive package for Amazon, and the Internet Sales Tax Wayfair Bill.

Interstate 81 is the most important artery of commerce in the western part of the Commonwealth. Truck traffic as well as high volume car counts and years of neglected maintenance have now made this a must-do project. The differing views on how to improve and fund this four billion dollar project is top priority — for the region. The problem is asking the rest of the state to help.

The Amazon incentive deal is the top priority for northern Virginia. What I have seen of this incentive package is a combination of transportation improvements, higher education expansion, and tax credits on jobs created. It is hard to argue the Amazon deal is a big catch for Virginia.

On the other hand, you are giving the richest man in the world huge incentives to locate here. This would be such a tremendous economic driver for northern Virginia, but similar to the Interstate 81 issue, the other regions of Virginia would need to help.

The other topic of discussion that is hidden in the background is the Wayfair sales tax on internet purchases.

This is a simple way to level the competitive playing field, requiring the same collecting of tax that brick and mortar stores have done for decades in our state.

All these projects that affect specific areas of the commonwealth, along with many others, are presently being contemplated in Richmond. As I previously mentioned, I sincerely hope that smart policy decision-making will rise above concerns relating to November's election.

We've finished up our first full week of the 2018 General Assembly session and things are moving quickly. While most of my bills have not yet

come before committee, long committee meetings with full dockets have kept us all busy.

I have had one bill come before committee and before the full body of the Senate thus far; this bill is SB1588 and contains the enabling language to codify the recently passed Constitutional Amendment related to flooding remediation. In November, 71 percent of Virginia voters voted to pass this amendment, which would enable local governing bodies to provide appropriate tax abatement to property owners who undertook approved flooding remediation measures on their existing properties. SB1588 sets forth certain guardrails to ensure the amendment carries out its intended purpose while allowing lo-

calities flexibility in its implementation. The enabling legislation passed out of the Senate Finance Committee on a bipartisan 14-2 vote. Friday, Jan. 18, it passed the full Senate 31-9. It will now head to the House to be heard after Crossover Committee.

Though the majority of my other bills have not come before a committee, there are several directly pertaining to the Shore. In addition to SB1588, I have also submitted legislation requested by the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission to incentivize use of the surficial aquifer in the Eastern Shore Ground Management Plan. This legislation (SB1599) was crafted with input from several stakeholders and hopes to direct use to the surficial aquifer through incentivizing this move rather than mandating it. I've also submitted a related budget amendment requesting \$700,000 for a saltwater intrusion monitoring study and subsequent prevention strategy for the Eastern Shore Groundwater Management.

In addition to groundwater legislation, I've submitted legislation to begin a conversation around an issue that has gained significant attention

across the state, including here on the Shore. The financial abuse of elderly Virginians has been on the rise in recent years and I was surprised and disappointed to learn that there are relatively few measures in place in the commonwealth to effectively prosecute those who have perpetrated the abuse of a vulnerable population from continuing to do so. Because of this, I have put forth legislation that would create an Adult Abuse Registry housed under the Department for Aging and Rehabilitative Services. Similar to the Child Protective Services Registry of known child abusers, this would model other states that have sought more stringent measures to protect elderly residents. As it turns out, this will be a significant and expensive undertaking by the commonwealth and one that we want to be sure to get right. Because of this, I will be asking the chairman to direct the Department of Aging and Rehabilitative Services to spend the next year determining the costs and overhead maintenance of this registry as well as a plan for implementation with the intent to reintroduce the legislation in a more developed form in 2020.

I'm carrying several budget

amendments with potential impacts for the Shore this session. One of these amendments relates to rural broadband; it includes language to amend current budget language as to allow the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority in its capacity as a public body and broadband service provider to also be eligible for Virginia Telecommunication Initiative funds. The language would also permit other publicly formed broadband authorities who simultaneously provide broadband service to apply for these funds.

I am once again carrying a budget amendment to provide the non-federal match money necessary to carry out the 3x3x3 Chincoteague Inlet study. The amendment provides for \$300,000 to support the development of a wave, hydrodynamic, and sediment transport model for the region around Chincoteague Inlet, including southern Assateague Island, Wallops Island and Chincoteague Island. This model would be used to inform erosion control and assist in stabilization management. I am cautiously optimistic that we will see some movement forward in the budget process for this amendment.

In her full and comprehensive article, she never once mentioned the reason for the shutdown: the failure of the Democrats to allow the building of a wall on our southern border to keep illegal immigrants out of our country. She writes only of the problems that the shutdown has created.

How about an equally comprehensive article about the effects on the economy of Accomack County of all the illegal immigrants who have descended upon us, some of whom may have been prevented from coming here had there been a proper wall?

I'm talking about the crises in our schools caused by the large number of kids who cannot speak a word of English, the waiting rooms in the emergency rooms filled with illegal immigrants, the number of illegals having babies and the subsequent drain on the services required to care for them, the jobs that they are taking away from those who are looking for employment. The list I'm sure can go on, with the costs of food stamps, unemployment benefits to be added to the economic costs that illegal immigrants are imposing on the residents of our county.

From a national perspective, the verified costs that are spent every year on illegal immigrants include: \$90 billion on welfare and social programs; \$22 billion on food assistance programs; \$2.5 billion on Medicaid; \$12 billion on primary and secondary education; and \$3 million (a day!) for incarceration costs (30 percent of all inmates are illegal immigrants).

Tax conformity does not address what the commonwealth does with revenues or the greater conversation around tax reform. Conformity refers to adopting the federal definitions of income laid out by the IRS within our state tax code. Whether to conform or not is not a discussion; Virginia must conform. How we conform and where we choose to decouple from the federal tax code are a matter of debate, but we must conform soon in order to ensure individuals are not left flat-footed when filing their taxes after Jan. 31.

With so much happening in Richmond, it is always great to see visitors from home. We've already had a good number of visitors, including folks from Eastern Shore Rural Health, public education advocates, watermen and supporters for nonpartisan redistricting. I hope to see more of you over the next few weeks and am excited to see our calendar filling up with visits from back home.
