No Tax Increase in Proposed Budget

Accomack supervisors moved about \$500,000 from their \$51.2 million draft 2011-12 spending package Monday night and put it in an undesignated fund. The proposed budget, without a tax increase, was unanimously approved for public hearing, to be held at 7:30 p.m. March 23 at Metompkin Elementary School.

About \$30,000 was taken from the supervisors' health-insurance kitty and put into another category that covers the cost of all county government workers' health plans. Previously, supervisors could get 75 percent of health insurance paid for them and their families, while the same portion of a single subscriber was provided for other employees. With the change, Finance Director Mike Mason later said, 76.44 percent of a single subscriber for all workers is paid, saving the average employee \$6 a month.

The measure was unanimously approved, with Supervisor Jack Gray abstaining. It was noted that not all supervisors take advantage of the insurance benefit. Chairman Donald Hart, Vice Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy, Supervisor Wanda Thornton and Gray (who declined voting for that reason) don't use the county plan. Supervisor Grayson Chesser had not been taking the supervisor's \$7,000 salary. but said he would do so in the future to help offset the health-insurance increase. Supervisor Robert Crockett said he has always paid for family members on his plan.

The board nixed spending \$287,000 for an addition and renovation of office space in the Sheriff's Department. Crockett, the county's former sheriff, said he spoke to both Sheriff Larry Giddens and his second in command.

Maj. Todd Godwin (who will fill the unexpired term of Giddens in August) and they agreed the construction could be delayed.

County Administrator Steve Miner wanted the supervisors to get new electronic equipment for themselves. But they declined that, too, as well as the entire information system, totaling about \$45,000. Miner estimated the cost of electronic tablet computers to be about \$600 each, with a \$20 per month download fee. Staff urged the supervisors to accept the plan so all could receive information at the same time and lessen the workload.

"Old computers didn't stop the paperwork," said Crockett. "I'm trying to save money here."

Thornton agreed. "I print most of my stuff out" at my own cost, she said. "But, I've not complained about it. Robert has a valid point. I wouldn't take the tablet if you got it. I'd get my own."

Supervisor Sandy Hart Mears disagreed. She said using the electronic system would make the process easier. But in the end, she voted along with the others to get rid of the plan.

The board left the proposed Information Technology position in the budget. Mason said the position would actually be his deputy finance director, who would oversee IT. He said the salary could be cut back from \$95,000 to \$80,000.

The supervisors also eliminated \$35,000 for a strategic planning and community survey and \$95,000 for a proposed Human Resources position.

They ignored pleas for help from volunteer fire and rescue companies that could have cost taxpayers an additional 4 cents per \$100 valuation on real estate. The fire com-

Redistricting Woes

The 2010 Census tells us not only that Northampton County's population has shrunk, but that it has shifted to the north a bit.

The numbers show that five of the six towns have seen a small decline in population; only Exmore has seen an increase, partly because its boundaries have changed over the past decade.

The total county population has decreased from 13,093 to 12,389. The bottom line, according to County Administrator Katie Nunez, is that the current voting districts will need to be changed prior to the fall local elections. The county currently has six voting districts, half identified as having a white majority white and half a majority African-American population.

Nunez presented four different redistricting plans Monday for the supervisors to review as a way to realign the voting districts. Previously, the supervisors had indicated a desire to avoid splitting towns, necks, and neighborhoods when redrawing the district lines. Supervisor Spencer Murray suggested that the county look at possibly shifting to five districts. For years, Northampton County had only three districts

with one supervisor each.

Supervisor Richard Tankard suggested that it is time for the county to get past the need to organize the districts along racial majority lines. "We should be color-blind when selecting voting districts." he said.

In response, County Attorney Bruce Jones indicated that the U.S. Department of Justice had been a major player in deciding how the districts would shake out because Virginia is one of several states with a history of racial inequality. Any change in district lines, polling places, or the number of districts and representatives must be approved by the Justice Department.

Supervisor Oliver Bennett said his primary concern regarding redistricting is that it treats everyone equally. "I will not support any plan that does not fairly represent all citizens of the county," he said.

Nunez told the supervisors they need to move forward with redrawing the district lines as they will need to be reviewed by the Justice Department and be ready for the November elections. She suggested that the required public hearing be held in June to allow for any changes that might be needed to meet Justice Department approval.

Four Candidates Vie for Supervisor's Seat

Two former supervisors, a dentist and a local political activist are each hoping to fill the vacant District 9 seat on the Accomack Board of Supervisors. They applied for the position in letters submitted to the county by the deadline last Friday.

At 5 p.m. yesterday, just after press time, the applicants were expected to verbally state their intentions to the board, which has until later this month to fill the vacancy or a Circuit Court judge will make the appointment. The board could vote after hearing the comments Thursday.

Seeking the appointment are:

•Former Supervisor C. Reneta Major of the Boston area, who is supported by Painter Town Council and served in the position after her mother, Supervisor Julia Major, died. The Democrat works for the Northampton Department of Social Services. She lost her bid for office in the last election to former Supervisor Phil McCaleb, who resigned recently after learning he has cancer. Painter Mayor Connie Cambell

said her Town Council voted to support Reneta Major's application based on her experience as supervisor. Major wrote to the supervisors, "I have had the privilege of serving these constituents and would deem it a great honor to be allowed to serve them again." Major also has the support of former Planning Commissioner Herb Thom of Belle Haven, who said he would have sought the position if Major hadn't.

· Former Supervisor Ken Tucker, who represented Metompkin District from 1992-96. He gets his mail at a post office box in Accomac and said he has lived in Belle Haven for the last five years and recently changed his voting district. "I believe public service is a meaningful way to support both the county and its citizens," he wrote to the board. "I have no political agenda as I will not run in the election for the seat in November. Finally, my desire to fill the vacated seat is simply to complete the unexpired term, thus allowing all who are interested in the upcoming four-year term to prepare and run their campaigns."

*Dr. Barney E. Selph, a resident of the Creek Bluff subdivision near Shield's Bridge in Belle Haven. Dr. Selph has a dental office in Cape Charles and has been a dentist on the Shore for 23 years. "I would very much like to be involved in the process of making Accomack County and the Eastern Shore of Virginia a better place to live and work," Dr. Selph wrote.

•Wesley Edwards, a 30-year veteran of the textile industry, who lives near Craddockville and was McCaleb's pick for the seat. Edwards was McCaleb's campaign manager and is an active member of the Republican Party. He also serves on the Wallops Park Land Replacement Committee, is a former Utility Cost Committee member and has attended nearly all the supervisors' meetings in the last five years. "I ran companies with \$50MM to \$150MM in revenues," he wrote in a brief synopsis. "I was responsible for as many 1,200 people. The employees came from all walks of life — from blue-collar worker to science specialist to corporate management. I know what it means to meet the payroll on Friday and I know how to responsibly run a business."

Board Chairman Donald Hart announced Monday that each candidate will get 10 minutes to speak at yesterday's meeting. Their supporters would each get three minutes. The candidates would be called upon to speak in the order in which they applied: Edwards, Major, Selph and Tucker.

Deputy Under Investigation

Virginia State Police are investigating an incident that occurred last. Saturday around Townsend when a Northampton County deputy shot a neighbor's hunting dog. The beagle was later euthanized.

Posting on poultrycommunity.com, Deputy Chuck Graham contends he was protecting his chickens when he shot in the direction of the dog with a pellet gun. Seven of the chickens are named after "female cops that I work with."

The 61-year-old officer wrote that he was awakened by the sound of his "chickens freaking out and a barking dog." He said he chose his pellet rifle because he'd "rather not kill any animals. ... I cranked off a shot from about 100 feet. Didn't know if I hit it or not. ... I saw the fellow who lives

behind me walking in the woods shout to the dogs. I yelled to him to get them out of the area. He yelled back that they were hunting rabbits."


According to Graham, a state trooper came to his house to take a report and a few hours later, his supervisor called to say the dog had been euthanized. Graham said he was told by the trooper that he would talk to the commonwealth's attorney about bringing charges against Graham. "Looks like a Class 6 felony of animal cruelty," Graham wrote. "Just being charged will mean the loss of my job. What a drag. And I'm really burnmed out about the poor dog."

Assistant Commonwealth's Attorncy Beverly Leatherbury confirmed that the case is being investigated by the State Police. She referred questions to Sheriff David Doughty.

Of the "unfortunate incident," Doughty said Wednesday, "I've got one of my patrol deputies currently on unpaid administrative leave pending the outcome of an investigation by the Virginia State Police. The suspension is resulting from an incident that occurred when he was off duty." Doughty said the deputy has been working for the department since January 2007.

The owner of the dog is Bill Heath. He declined to comment.

Sgt. Michelle Anaya of the State Police said, "Currently there are no charges, awaiting review of the case by the commonwealth's attorney."

"Share and share alike," he said. Mrs. Moscatello said her parents like him, too. "My sister was kind of jealous because she would like to have married him herself."


Ten of their children are scattered across the country. Robert, The two, now retired and living in Joseph and Michael all live in

STAR Transit May Travel Farther

Accomack supervisors unanimously agreed Monday to spend up to \$5,500 to help resurrect STAR Transit routes to locations north of Parksley.

The one-time spending is a grant match. Supervisor Wanda Thornton, who brought the topic before the panel, later said the northern runs should start in October and would include service to Chincoteague.

The Accomack-Northampton Transportation District Commission hired the Virginia Regional Transit (VRT) last year to study and restructure the system after it ran into financial problems. The transit cut northern routes because of the low usage. It also lowered fees in other areas to increase use. The transit recently reported that usage was up by 11,723 rides when comparing March through December of 2009 with the same months in 2010.

mission and Director of Public Safety Jason Loftus had asked that they add funds for more paid emergency workers to help companies meet their goal of answering rescue calls within 20 minutes, at least 90 percent of the time.

Loftus said several years ago, he recommended the goal be 15 minutes. He noted that the national standard for a rural locality is 14 minutes. "Twenty minutes is a long time," said Loftus. "The problem is we're not making the 20."

"We're doing OK on fire because we're alerting five companies at a time," he added. He said one of the problems with rescue is that citizens call for an ambulance for non-emergencies.

The budget also includes a 2 percent (average) performance-based salary increase for employees, totaling \$200,000. Another \$220,000 was included for upgrading the heating/air-conditioning system at the county office building.

Navy May Want Melfa Airport for Training After All

Accomack Airport is again in the running for a Navy contract. Airport Commission members say use of the airstrip to conduct landing practice is likely to be discussed at their next meeting at 7 p.m. March 10 at the terminal.

The Navy's interest in the facility faded in October when the service began negotiating with Franklin City for exercises involving its E-2C Hawkeye and C-2 Greyhound. But a couple of weeks ago, Franklin officials turned the Navy down, citing noise concerns. The majority held firm in its decision when the issue was again debated before them this week.

So the Navy is looking elsewhere.


"We have been notified that they are re-opening the RFP (request for proposal) process," County Administrator Steve Miner said Tuesday. "If the commission doesn't request it (the proposal would need to be submitted by the county), I suspect it is a dead issue here."

"The question ... is whether there is interest in such a proposal," Miner added. "I have not had any requests to add it to the Board (of Supervisors') agenda."

The Melfa facility was one of eight locations within a 100-mile radius of Norfolk initially listed as possible choices for the Navy. Residents here also expressed concern over the possible noise, despite the Navy's insistence that the two turboprops are "significantly quieter than jet aircraft."

Other airfields in Virginia that satisfy the Navy's runway and proximity requirements include facilities in Richmond, Newport News, Norfolk, Emporia-Greensville and Chesapeake, and Chesterfield and Hanover counties.

hen it comes to tornadoes, there's no such thing as a "tornado season." Tornadoes can strike anywhere, anytime, and you need to know the drill. It's really important to practice tornado safety by holding a drill in your home, workplace and school. Plan now to take part in the 2011 Statewide Tornado Drill, set for Tuesday, March 15, at 9:45 a.m.

Tornado Basics

Know the signs:

- ·Strong, persistent rotation in the base of a cloud.
- ·Whirling debris on the ground under a cloud base - tornadoes sometimes have no visible funnel.
- ·Hail or heavy rain followed by dead calm or a fast, intense wind shift. Many tornadoes, especially in Virginia, are wrapped in heavy precipitation and can't be seen.
- ·Loud, continuous roar or rumble, which doesn't fade in a few seconds like thunder.
- ·If it's night, blue-green to white flashes at ground level (as opposed to silvery lightning up in the clouds). These lights are power lines being snapped by very strong

wind, maybe a tornado.

·Persistent lowering of the cloud base.

Prepare a Home Tornado Plan

Develop a safety plan for you and your family for home, work, school and when outdoors. Make sure you practice the plan. Review the plan on days when severe weather is forecast for your area.

·Pick a place where family members could gather if a tornado is headed your way. It could be your basement, center hallway, bathroom or closet on the lowest floor. Keep this place uncluttered.

·If you are in a high-rise building, you may not have enough time to go to the lowest floor. Pick a place in a

hallway in the center of the building.

 Assemble a Tornado Safety Kit containing a first-aid kit and essential medications, battery-powered radio, flashlight and extra batteries, canned food and manual can opener, bottled water, sturdy shoes and work gloves, and written

your home's utilities. ·Have a NOAA Weather Radio with a warning alarm tone and battery backup to receive updated

instructions on how to turn off

forecasts and critical information such as watches and warnings.

Responding to Tornadoes

Stay tuned to your local radio or TV for weather reports, or listen to a NOAA weather radio for more detailed information when weather conditions are favorable for the formation of tornadoes.

When a tornado watch is issued, tornadoes could develop in your area. When a tornado warning is issued, a tornado has been sighted or has been indicated by radar. If you are in or near its path, seek shelter immediately.

orking to restore the economic viability of Virginia's Eastern Shore communities, Representative Scott Rigell (VA-02) called on Secretary of Interior Ken Salazar to address issues impacting recreational opportunities at NASA/Wallops Flight

Facility in Accomack County and Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge.

In two separate letters to the Secretary,

Rigell called on the department to work with the Eastern Shore on a land swap agreement, as well as preserve vital beach parking that plays an integral role in the local economy.

In working to implement a land swap between Accomack County and the NASA/Wallops Flight Facility, which would help preserve a local park while moving forward on a new Wallops Research Park, Rigell urged Salazar to "consider relaxing or modifying" policies that regulate land deals in accordance to monetary gains. Rigell recommended the department adhere to an acre-for-acre land swap rather than a dollar-for-dollar land swap, allowing for the development of a new Wallops Research Park that Accomack has agreed to lease at market rates.

Rigell also petitioned Salazar on efforts by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) to move beach parking on Assateague Island. This is part of FWS's 15-year conservation plan for Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge and the Virginia portion of Assateague Island. In his letter, Rigell emphasized the local communities' desire to meet the refuge's purpose as a wildlife sanctuary while at the same time preserving all beach parking and public recreation.

"Economic viability for Virginia's Eastern Shore communities and recreational opportunities for the Mid-Atlantic Region rely on a continued public investment that must be successfully managed at the refuge and seashore," said Rigell. "It is essential that any alternative presented during the ... review not negatively impact the local and regional tourism based economy."

As I write this column, we are almost at the finish line of Sat-

urday, Feb. 26, for the 2011 General Assembly. We also do not yet have a budget. While not unusual, the negotiations between the House and Senate conferees can be frustrating for the other 130 members of the House and Senate. The brinksmanship involved often results in considerable anxiety on those not a part of the direct negotiations.

While early on, the negotiations seemed to be proceeding smoothly, they soon hit a snag, as is typical. Gov. McDonnell introduced an \$80.2 billion budget bill in December, which was based upon a modest increase in state revenues. The House amendments to the governor's budget sought to deal more significantly with the state's pension system (VRS) and building back up the state's rainy day reserve fund and further taking more aggressive moves to deal with the accelerated sales tax provisions of last year's budget, which sought to balance the budget upon earlier collection of sales tax.

On the Senate side, the effort centered more around restoring funding cut from education, health care, and the core services of government during the "Great Recession." The fundamental divide had been the differences between the spending requests of both chambers. It appeared as though they were almost in agreement to split the difference. Obviously, an agreement as to the spending targets is a key to moving forward in developing a budget.

The Eastern Shore is impacted by funding for our Circuit Court judge position and also in the mix is a significant amount of planning money for a new building at Eastern Shore Community College.

You will recall that in the oddnumbered years, we adjust Virginia's two-year budget and this is initiated by amendments proposed by the governor. His amendments work their way through the committee process of the Senate and the House and are changed and amended themselves. The House of Delegates' version more closely reflects that of the governor's introduced budget amendments. It is possible, procedurally, and has happened at least once before during the Gilmore administration, that since we do have a two-year budget in place if negotiations completely fail, the commonwealth can proceed under that unadjusted budget.

If our Circuit Court position is funded, it would likely be filled at our reconvened session, also known as the Veto Session, which is constitutionally mandated and will occur on April 6, 2011. We also will take up redistricting at that time. After that reconvened session, I will have another round of Town Hall meetings to discuss the 2011 Session.

The work on redistricting continues around the budget negotiations, constructing the census data into newly redrawn House and Senate districts. In addition to the budget, the governor's transportation bill also was placed recentlyinto conference with a hoped-for compromise between the House and Senate versions before we adjourn.

I will follow up with one more report next week giving the details of the finalized budget.

Funds Allocated for Judgeship

Funding for a resident judge for Accomack and Northampton Circuit Courts was approved Sunday by the Virginia General Assembly as part of the 2011 budget, according to Del. Lynwood Lewis.

"Now interested parties will apply through legislation services," the delegate said. According to the schedule, the Joint Senate and House Courts of Justice Committees will interview the prospective candidates on April 5. Lewis said he expects the Assembly to select a judge on April 6.

In November, the Eastern Shore Bar Association endorsed attorney W. Revel Lewis III of Accomac. Del. Lewis said three other local lawyers — Thomas Northam, Thomas Dix and General District Court Judge Gordon Vincent — also have expressed an interest in the job.

In addition to handling civil and criminal cases in the two counties. the resident Circuit Court judge makes appointments to county and town boards of zoning appeals, the Accomack School Board Selection Commission. Accomack Northampton Electoral Boards. Accomack and Northampton Boards of Equalization, and to both county Boards of Supervisors if a vacancy occurs before an election and the majority of the remaining supervisors cannot agree.

Tangier Council and the Tangier History Tangier Museum and Interpretive Cultural Center (THMICC) Board of Directors have named Debra Howard director of the museum. She succeeds Drs. Neil and Susan Kave, founders and directors of THMICC, which opened June 5, 2008. The Kayes were part-time Tangier residents who have medical practices in Wilmington, Del. They left the island in September.

Howard arrived on Tangier to be the new artist-in-residence for the island in August 2010 with her husband, David Sorenson, on their sailboat Ling Ling. "It looks like I will be juggling two jobs," she said. "Being artist-in-residence is a dream job for me and I want to finish the series of daily paintings that I've committed to. However, I am also motivated by the challenge that the responsibility of museum director presents." She concluded that the key to her success "will be in relying heavily on the invaluable museum volunteers; it is they who make the museum run smoothly."

Northampton Planners Focus on Tourism

Virginia is for tourism, according to Lynne Lochen, tourism development specialist with the Virginia Tourism Commission.

Lochen spoke to the Northampton County Planning Commission this week about the opportunities for the development of tourism and related businesses on the Eastern Shore. She stated that for every \$1 spent to enhance the tourism industry, the state sees a \$5 return. "Tourism is not an expense for a locality; it is an investment," she said.

Lochen noted that tourism is a clean industry and that its goal is to have people come to visit an area, spend their money and leave. One area of tourism that could be developed for the Shore is the film industry. Lochen said the Virginia Film Office has been working to encourage the film industry to make use of settings and communities within the state when possible.

Commissioner Dave Kabler discussed the need for the county to


work to piggyback on the events surrounding OPSAIL 2012, which will occur just over a year from now. OPSAIL 2012 will involve tallships and warships from around the world. The ships will a tour several port cities on the Gulf and East Coasts of the United States. According to Commissioner Kabler, it will be an opportunity for localities such as Cape Charles to encourage vessels as well as tourists to visit.

He stressed the need for the planners and county leaders to make the area business friendly. Kabler suggested that efforts be made to encourage ongoing visits by tall ships as a way to establish a base for tourism.

In other business of the evening, the planners reviewed zoning regulations regarding small catering and food service businesses. Commissioner Bob Meyers urged the group to avoid over regulating very small businesses that might grow from hobbies, such as quilting or woodworking. Commissioners Kabler

> Miller urged caution, stressing the need to protect neighbors from obnoxious noises or odors that might be generated by such business forts in residential areas.

Planning Director Sandra Benson indicated that the size and location of such businesses, including catering operations, would determine the need for regulations and special-use permits. The planners took no formal ac tion on the matter.
