Justice Finally Served in 1986 Rape Case

This horrendous story is not just about a girl being “controlled and abused” for her stepfather’s “sick pleasure.” It is about a woman’s strength in seeking justice, her inspiration for others to do the same and the gain in making the community a safer place.

Khalil Mohammed Muslimani, 71, of Robins Lane in Onancock, which is at Schooner Bay, was sentenced last Friday in Virginia Beach Circuit Court to life plus five years in prison for raping and taking indecent liberties with his stepdaughter in 1986.

The defendant attempted to justify

himself for a half hour before Judge Frederick Lowe finally stopped his ranting and handed down the terms. Lowe said he had “no words to describe how despicable” Muslimani’s actions were.

The victim, Stacey Spione, now 44, gave permission for her name to be used in this story. She uses her maiden

name, Stacey Johnson, on Facebook, so people will know how to find her.

“They say, ‘let the punishment fit the crime,’” she wrote in a victim impact letter that was submitted to the court.

“That is impossible, especially for a man who sees no wrong in what he did to me. Therefore, I ask the jury and the court to give the highest sentence on each charge in accordance to the law.”

“In my eyes, because of the life he took from me, and all he killed in me, Khalil Mohammed Muslimani is a killer and should be sentenced as such.”

“No one can ever begin to understand what I lived through and what I continue to live with,” she wrote. “My stepfather killed so much of me, stole my life with no remorse or regret. He was proud and pleased with himself. It is a daily struggle trying not to let 13 years of sexual, mental, and physical abuse consume me. Images haunt me when I sleep and when awake. Without trying, I relive the abuse in sight, sound and feeling as if it was still happening. The effects of the abuse have not only scarred me but have also affected my health, physically.”

“This man admitted in a trial in 1989 that he knew what he was doing was illegal but because I was like ‘a little mother’ taking care of my younger siblings he became attracted to me and wanted me for his wife,” Spione wrote. “My stepfather’s actions were deliberate. He knew exactly what he was doing. As long as he got what he wanted, that was all that mattered ... through his own choosing, (he) brought himself to this posi-

tion of punishment and to face what he has done to me,” she wrote.

Spione says Muslimani, who is nearly 30 years older than she is, is the father of all four of her children. The oldest child’s DNA proved that allegation and was the only one needed for the conviction. Muslimani pleaded not guilty to the charges.

Just after the sentence was handed down, the Eastern Shore Post reported it on Facebook and people began to cheer the judge’s decision, which was based on a jury’s recommendation. They also wished worse things for Muslimani.

Her mother, Ruth Ann Carpenter, 61, fared much better. In exchange for her testimony against Muslimani, she got suspended sentences for her crimes.

“Even going back to when I was 4 years old, my birth mother knew my stepfather, her new husband, was sexually abusing me, and physically abusing me. But she did nothing to stop it.”

Carpenter pleaded guilty in Accomack Circuit Court in December but took an Alford plea, which means she conceded there was sufficient evidence for a conviction. She did not admit guilt. Commonwealth’s Attorney Spencer Morgan amended felony counts of rape and indecent liberties against Carpenter, to misdemeanor charges of being an accessory after the fact. He recommended 12 months each for those and 10 years for felony child neglect with all time to be suspended. Judge W. Revell Lewis went along with the deal and sentenced her accordingly. She spent about two weeks in Accomack Jail in 2015 before getting bond.

“I am fine with it,” Spione said. “I thought she was at least going to serve at least two more months. Once I learned

about her health, I didn’t want her to suffer ... in prison.” But Spione said she was not aware that Carpenter took the Alford plea and she is not sure why she doesn’t want Carpenter to suffer.

Carpenter testified in December that Muslimani acted like a father figure to the girls. When Spione got pregnant at 12, “She wasn’t allowed to go to any doctors,” the woman said. “She wasn’t allowed to go anywhere. He didn’t want anyone to know anything ... the entire time I was threatened he was going to take my other kids to Israel and he had the money to do it,” she said.

The name listed as mother on Spione’s child’s birth certificate was Ruth Muslimani. The DNA test showed there was a 99.99 percent chance the parents were Muslimani and Spione.

Retired Investigator Gerald Goga of the Accomack County Sheriff’s Office worked the case and also testified regarding taking buccal swaps from the mouths of the three. He, Lt. Anthony Bright and retired social services worker Gail Walker told the court that Muslimani admitted to them he had a sexual relationship with the young Spione.

“In the summer of 1986, it was discovered that I was pregnant,” Spione testified. “I had been missing my monthly cycles. My stepfather had vaginal intercourse with me. It was almost daily ... in the house, in a guest house there on the property, in the van that he had ... He would come into my room and force himself upon me with oral sex and intercourse. He would have one of my siblings and my birth mother come and get me and tell me that he wants me to go to his room.”

After she got pregnant, “It never stopped,” she said. “He said that this was normal in his country and that even in the Quran it was okay for him

to do that to me because I was not his child,” she said. “He made threats constantly (for me) not to tell anyone. They made me wear baggy clothes, told people I was gaining weight (and) reduced the amount of food. I wasn’t allowed to come out of my room after getting further along in the pregnancy where it was visible.”

“Carpenter is my birth mother, which is all she has ever been,” Spione said. “She never loved me, took care of me, or even protect(ed) me. She did things in life for her gain and selfish desires ... in my eyes, it was her mission to make sure I knew she did not love me nor did she ever want me. For most of my childhood, I do not know where she was. It seemed like she was not around, always gone somewhere ... she would pack some of my clothes in paper grocery bags or garbage bags (and) tell me she was going to drop me off somewhere so I could be put up for adoption. Once when I was 11, she packed some of my clothes in a paper bag, told me to get into the car and she drove me to a social services office in Pocomoke, Md. It was closed, as were the surrounding businesses ... she left me sitting on the ground, leaning against the building with my bag and drove off. I have no idea how long I was there. All I remember was she came back telling me that my stepfather wanted me home.”

“I can honestly say I cannot remember a time she was around and ever wanted anything to do with me,” Spione said. “When she did come back home she would bring me a doughnut or a shirt as if that would make everything ok. It was as if she thought giving me something for leaving me with my stepfather would be a treat that would erase her leaving me behind. Her leaving me behind was intentional. She would leave me behind for my stepfather and tell me I needed to watch my younger sisters.”

Spione said the sexual abuse began when the family moved to Front Royal, Va., where Muslimani owned and operated Shenandoah Motel. “In addition to the abuse, I was given the responsibility of taking care of my younger sisters, changing diapers and make meals that did not require cooking. I was treated like a maid and babysitter at the same time I was being abused sexually by my stepfather.”

They later moved to Luray, Va., where Muslimani owned what is now Skyline Inn & Suites. “I was six years old ... The abuse was no longer restrict-

ed to the home. My stepfather would take me into rooms at the motel. Additionally, he would take me with him to his doctor appointments, appointments with his lawyer, in addition to running errands. My stepfather would pull over on the way to and from these appointments and errands in parking lots and have intercourse and oral sex with me.”

They moved east when Muslimani owned the former Twin Towers in Pocomoke, Md. “The occurrences of all forms of abuse became harsher and more violent.” She became pregnant for the first time at age 11. That child was aborted in South Carolina, where Muslimani and Carpenter made her lie about her age. The two adults drank champagne and feasted on steak and lobster after the first visit to the doctor, Spione said.

In 1986, they moved to Onancock. She became pregnant again and gave birth in February 1987, when she was 12. She was enrolled at Mary Nottingham Smith Middle School in September of that year. But before the term was over, “I became pregnant again by my stepfather, as a result, this would be my last year of school.” She was in the eighth grade.

Carpenter and Muslimani divorced in 1988. Carpenter took one of her five girls with her. “I was pregnant a second time and raising my first son along with my three half-sisters. ... My life was what my stepfather made it. Controlled and abused for his sick pleasure, to put it mildly. By the time I was 17, I was a mother of four and still mothering half-sisters and taking care of the house and meals.”

Spione’s goal is to continue her quest for justice, to help others with their fight, to possibly study the law and become an attorney, to see that victims are educated about their rights, and to change laws that would help them.

“I want to help every way I can,” she said.

All of her children wanted her to pursue justice.

Muslimani was sentenced in 2017 to two life sentences plus 20 years for two counts of carnal knowledge and two counts of forcible sodomy involving his niece when she was a teenager about two decades ago. The sentences, handed down by Lewis, were in accordance with recommendations made by the jury that convicted Muslimani in November 2015.

Muslimani was moved Wednesday to Sussex II State Prison in Waverly, Va.

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Chincoteague to Address Bullying

When officials on Chincoteague Island learned that a child was being bullied recently, they stepped up by planning an information session aimed at stopping the unacceptable behavior.

The event will be held at 6 p.m., Wednesday, April 25, at the Chincoteague Center and is being sponsored by the Chincoteague Police Department.

“When a young child of elementary school level thinks about or talks about wanting to hurt themselves because they are bullied, we have problems,” Vice Mayor Denise Bowden said at a council meeting Monday night. “Bullying is a serious problem.”

“You think that things don’t happen in your community,” she continued. “Mommy and daddy’s little angel” could be the suspect. Bowden said, it is “most important for parents to be there so they can take this issues home and talk to kids about it.”

“Stop Bullying, Stand Up, Speak Out” will be held with separate discussion groups for kids and parents.

“Ok Parents, Kids, Teenagers, Grandparents, Guardians and Any-

one who would be interested: please, please plan on attending this event,” Bowden wrote on Facebook. “WE DO have bullying issues in our schools. WE DO need to address this issue. WE DO need parents involved in this as much as the kids. WE DO need to make a difference in these young lives. I will be posting these flyers. Our Chincoteague Police Department will be posting and passing out flyers as well. Talk it up, show up and educate kids that Bullying IS NOT ACCEPTABLE! Please help the next generation!”

Jessie Duncil, principal of Chincoteague Elementary School, said Wednesday that she wouldn’t comment about anything that happens at the school. Duncil also added, she was not notified about the bullying session.

Another session called Fraud 101 will be held from 6 to 10 p.m., Wednesday, May 23, at the center. This class is limited to 30 people, so register soon by signing up at the police department or by calling 757-336-3155.

What to do if you’re a victim, how to prevent fraud and the different types of fraud, will be discussed.

\$300,000 for Well Water

Chincoteague’s town council voted Monday to purchase a 30-acre mainland property for \$300,000 so the town can have wells drilled there to obtain drinking water for islanders.

Before the tract, at Wallops south of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration’s main base, can be bought, a public hearing will be held, Town Manager Jim West said Tuesday. He hopes the hearing will be offered in May.

“The motion to exercise the option on the property was made by Councilman Gene Wayne Taylor and seconded by Councilman Jim Frese. The town paid \$11,000 for the option, which would be applied to the total,” said West.

Last April, wells used for drinking water had high levels of PFAS (perand polyfluoroalkyl substances) from fire-fighting foam used at a fire training area on the north-central side of Wallops. The use of those wells, which are

on NASA property, were discontinued. Drinking water has been available from other wells there.

Testing at the new site showed no PFAS, no arsenic or other contaminants.

Since 2013, the EPA has detected PFAS in numerous public water supplies serving 16 million people across 33 states.

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Northampton School Budget Numbers

Northampton supervisors will have to crunch a lot of numbers to give teachers raises, in the proposed budget for the 2018-2019 school year.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence and Chief Financial Officer Brook Thomas presented a request for county funding of \$9,081,859, an increase of \$474,782, or about 5.5 percent. Northampton's proposed funding contribution comprises about 42 percent of the school district's approximately \$22 million budget.

Northampton schools expect to spend an additional \$794,556 next year, \$577,177 for increased raises and benefits for teachers and other school employees, plus \$217,379 for additional staff, materials and other needs. They expect a revenue decrease of \$279,351, partly because of a lower student population resulting in reduced state funding.

Those figures would put Northampton schools behind by more than \$1 million. Schools expect to save more than \$500,000 on budget items that will be eliminated. For example, fewer students also means fewer classroom teachers providing direct instruction. The proposed school budget is based on an average daily membership of 1,515 students, down from 1,560 last year.

About half a million dollars would cover the following pay increases: a 4 percent raise for Northampton's 142 teachers, whose salaries are below or substantially below market value, a 3 percent raise to non-teaching school employees whose salaries are below market value, and a 2 percent raise for all other positions.

The raises would be the first step toward offering Northampton teachers and support staff competitive wages. PayPoint HR, the consulting firm that recently conducted a salary study for Northampton schools, recommended raises for all employees totaling \$1.7 million.

The proposed raise for teachers was calculated with the "midpoint method," using the middlemost salary on the teacher pay scale. Each teacher would receive the same amount, 4 percent of \$45,189, or \$1,808. This would equal

about 4.8 percent for new teachers and 3.2 percent for veteran teachers, Lawrence said.

Supervisors are considering pay supplements for both teachers and sheriff's deputies in the county budget for fiscal year 2019. Supplements of \$4,000 each have been proposed for 27 deputies and two animal control deputies, plus \$2,000 each for seven sheriff's department support staff and 52 care and confinement staff.

The proposed pay supplements would cost \$256,736 for 142 teachers and \$226,000 for 88 law enforcement and corrections staff. These figures do not include additional benefits both groups would receive.

Each teacher would receive an extra \$20 per month for employee health insurance costs, totaling nearly \$65,000. Law enforcement and corrections staff would receive an additional 17 percent of their salary supplements in benefits.

Supervisors also want to give all county employees a 2 percent raise.

Budgeting raises will be a challenge for supervisors, who recently announced publicly that county employee health insurance costs have risen 24 percent.

Chairman Spencer Murray told Lawrence he was concerned about the big "swing" the school board is making with the draft budget and its wide range of proposed expenditures and spending cuts.

Lawrence asked supervisors for their serious consideration of the 4 percent teacher raise, which would catch up the teachers up to last year's earnings by Accomack teachers, who will get another 4 percent raise in the upcoming year, he said.

Lawrence said Northampton schools are "good stewards" of county funds and they don't take asking for more money lightly. The request to increase the school budget is vital in "improving student success" and helping them to be "competitive in a global market."

Murray said supervisors would give Northampton schools "every penny possible" and it would be up to the school board to decide how to spend it.

GREER, HINES IN RUNNING FOR EXMORE MAYOR

Douglas Greer and R. Scott Hines are running for mayor of Exmore in the May 1 election.

Greer, the incumbent, has served as Exmore's mayor since 2013, when he was appointed as interim to complete the term of former mayor, Billy Moore, who moved outside the town limits. Greer was elected to a four-year term as mayor in 2014.

Greer, who has been involved in Exmore's town government for 15 years, first as councilman, then as a vice-mayor, and finally as mayor, said, "I remember sitting in a council meeting wondering how we were going to pay our bills. ... We were just about bankrupt with only \$75,000 in the general fund."

Over the past four years, Greer has worked with the council, town manager and staff to move Exmore back "in the right direction." The town now has a formal budget, its financial records are kept up-to-date, and there is more than \$2.5 million in the general fund.

Greer called Exmore Town Park "a

place we can take pride in" that draws interest for a variety of special events.

Exmore's police and public works departments have the equipment they need, Greer added, to keep the town safe, clean and maintained.

"My job is not done yet," Greer said. New town wells and a water treatment facility will be constructed soon, and a municipal septic system is in the works. Greer is seeking another term as mayor "to keep moving Exmore's agenda forward."

Though Greer was born in Miami, Fla., his stepfather was born and raised in Machipongo, and Greer regularly visited the Shore with his family from the age of six. He moved here in 1972. Greer's wife, Dixie, is an Eastern Shore native, originally from Wardtown. They have two children who also live on the Shore, six grandchildren, one great grandchild and another on the way.

Greer has enjoyed a 35-year career in the printing business and hopes to spend time painting in his art studio after he retires.

Hines, the challenger in this mayoral election, has spent the last 12

years living in Exmore and managing his own hunting and fishing retail store on Main Street. Originally from Belle Haven, Hines is a third-generation Exmore business owner.

As both an Exmore resident and business owner, Hines said, "I can understand issues that are important from both perspectives." He believes, "a lot of the business owners don't feel like they have a say" if they don't also live in town, but Hines is committed to help promote all Exmore businesses as mayor.

He agrees, "Exmore has come a long way, but I believe it has even more potential."

Hines said, "I will work hard for the residents and business owners" and "follow the charter of the town."

His primary focus for the town is safety and security, including a police

department with the "manpower and resources to maintain a strong police presence with 24/7 coverage."

Hines said he would work to improve Exmore's issues with water, sewage and drainage.

He also wants to spread awareness about the variety of products and services offered in town.

The entrepreneur is a 1997 graduate of Northampton High School, and he and his wife, Emily, run the family business together. They have a four-year-old son who also likes to help in the store and is now in school.

Hines enjoys hunting and fishing, though his commitment to his business generally prevents him from such leisure pursuits. He recently took time off from the store to travel with his family for spring break.

One Sought for Violent Crimes in Painter

One man was arrested and another is being sought in connection with violent crimes that occurred on Seaside Road in Painter last month.

Armed Robbery

A Tasley man was arrested last Saturday in connection with an armed robbery at Corner Mart in Painter on March 28.

Antonio Lamar Harmon, 36, of Mini Road in Tasley, was charged with possession of a sawed-off shotgun in a crime, robbery of another of property by means of violence, use of a firearm in a felony and malicious bodily injury, all felonies.

Harmon is also accused of misdemeanor counts of reckless handling of a firearm, brandishing a firearm and stealing property valued at less than \$200. He is being held in Accomack Jail.

Sheriff Todd Godwin said the incident was reported to his office at about 11:15 p.m. Deputies responded to the convenience store and determined that a black male entered the store armed with a gun and demanded money from the clerk. He assaulted a customer as he fled

the scene on foot with an undetermined amount of money.

The clerk and customer were not identified. The customer was treated by Painter Emergency Medical Services at the site.

The state police assisted the Accomack County Sheriff's Office. Investigator Meghan Patterson is handling the case.

High-Speed Chase Arrest

A high-speed chase ending recently with the arrest of a Mapps ville man who broke his collarbone when he crashed the vehicle, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Marcos Ortiz-Roblero, 18, of Pettit Street in Mapps ville, was charged on March 25 with felony eluding. Deputy A.J. Turner of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office investigated.

Turner was patrolling the area when he saw a car at the south end of the Royal Farms parking lot in Parksley back up and strike a passenger, who had just gotten out of the vehicle. When Turner approached the car, the driver continued to drive in reverse and ignored commands to stop. The driver then went forward "at a high rate of speed almost striking" a white van and a gas pump before exiting onto Route 13 and heading south, still at high rate of speed.

The driver turned off his headlights, Turner wrote. It was 1:40 a.m. Turner continued to pursue him. The driver was going too fast to make the turn at the intersection of Orchard and Johnson roads and landed in a field. He eventually hit a ditch and the vehicle became disabled. Turner said the driver and a passenger fled on foot. More officers arrived, and the two men were taken into custody.

Ortiz-Roblero admitted to drinking six to eight 12-ounce Corona beers that day, Turner wrote in the file. He also admitted to being the driver and said he did not have a driver's license. An analysis showed Ortiz-Roblero's alcohol level was .112. The legal limit is .08.

He was treated for a broken collar bone at a hospital.

In addition to eluding, Ortiz-Roblero was charged with a seventh count of driving without a license and DUI. He is being held

in Accomack Jail without bond.

Five Times Before

A five-time convicted felon was charged recently with violent crimes involving two incidents, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Victor Dana Jr., 37, with addresses of Cattail Road in Mears and Front Street in Pocomoke, Md., was arrested March 16 and charged with malicious wounding and stealing property belonging to James Carpenter on March 2, and maliciously throwing a missile at an occupied vehicle on Feb. 4.

Deputy Zach Parks of ACSO investigated the March incidents. Trooper B.M. Tripp investigated the February charge. Dana is being held without bail in Accomack Jail.

Ashley Lynn Kenney, 27, of Main Street on Chincoteague, was charged Sunday with credit card theft, credit card fraud and using a credit card without permission. Unsecured bond was set at \$5,000. Sgt. Tyler Greenly of the Chincoteague Police Department investigated.

Preston Allen Kozlowski, 32, of Locustville Road in Onley, was arrested

March 29 and charged with felony hit-and-run involving a traffic accident with more than \$1,000 worth of damage and misdemeanor DUI. The incident occurred on the corner of Drummondtown and Seaside roads on March 15. Secured bond was set at \$1,000.

Two Accused of Felonies in Northampton County

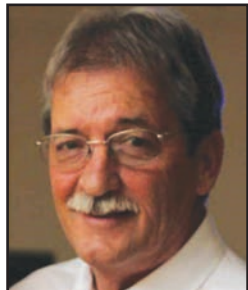

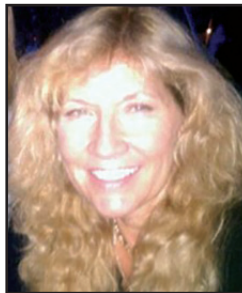

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“Glamping” Movement Bringing Waves of Shore Visitors

One reason people are showing an interest in visiting the Eastern Shore of Virginia is the “glamping” movement.

And in case you don’t know what that is, just replace the “c” from camping and add the “gl” of glamour and you’ve got it. Not convinced that roughing it can be fun? Well, it’s not as unrefined as it used to be.

At Kiptopeke State Park, you can get a yurt, which looks like a screened-in gazebo, perched on a high bluff overlooking the beach, with nearby lighted fishing pier, kayak and bike rentals, and a bird watching station.

“It gives you a cozy house for the night with conveniences nearby, but not too close,” an advertising link states. There is also tent camping there, RV sites, lodges and cabins, the largest of which sleeps 12.

With glamping, nature meets luxury, so all the untamed and unique parts of the world, like the Shore, can be enjoyed without sacrificing anything.

People are interested in Accomack and Northampton counties and they are using the internet to find out what’s happening

here, Kerry Allison, director of the area’s tourism commission, told the Chincoteague town council and mayor Monday night.

Since 2013, the group’s Facebook page

has gotten 22,620 likes with another 1,724 being observed on Instagram. There were 1,020 clicks on the digital advertising for fall oyster roasts that targeted Mid-Atlantic Food & Wine lovers.

The commission has also gotten 26,153 views on YouTube since 2009 and 3,230 Facebook views since 2014 when featuring the “Secrets of the Sewansecott Oyster,” those big, full-bodied and briny mollusks that leave you with a sweet taste and begging for more.

The tourism commission is hooking people up for a stay in an old watch house along the Atlantic that waterman used to guard their oyster crops against thieves. SouthEast Expeditions leads this kayak trip on the lower Shore, where a visitor can search for seafood in the surround-

ing waters and have a feast for dinner.

Or escape to Holly Bluff Island Guest House, a 15-minute boat ride from Cape Charles, adjacent to the Eastern Shore of Virginia National Wildlife Refuge and Smith and Mockhorn islands at the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay. The guest house is circa 1930s and was once a hunting and fishing lodge for wealthy northerners. The power comes from propane gas tanks and the shower is from a rain-catching system.

Today’s camping resorts include swimming pools, playgrounds, restaurants, camp stores, coffee shops, organized games, movie nights, rental and tackle shops, places to juice up your devices and concierges to help you find interesting day trips. Check out KOA Chincoteague Island; Pine Cove Campground and Waterfowl Park, on Chincoteague; Tall Pines Harbor Campground in Temperanceville; Tom’s Cove Campground; Wachapreague Campground; Virginia Landing Campground in Quinby; Cherrystone Family Campground in Cheriton; and Sunset Beach Resort at Kiptopeke.

Allison says 75 percent of people going to the commission’s website are first-time users. The Eastern Shore has been the fastest growing region for four years.

About \$7.5 million flowed into the local towns and counties from tourism meals, other sales and transient occupancy taxes. A total of \$273.7 million was spent in 2016, the latest year for which figures are available. Allison said that is an average of \$749,797 a day.

Priorities for 2018, include completing a new website, exploring new revenue streams and marketing agri-tourism, wellness vacations and local towns.

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Exmore to Celebrate Earth Day with Volunteer Clean-up

In honor of Earth Day, Saturday, April 21, Exmore will host volunteer cleanup on Tower Way and Hadlock Road, from 1 to 3 p.m. Tower Way is on the west side of Route 13, across from H.W. Drummond. Hadlock Road is behind Hardee's and extends to Main Street.

The need for cleanup on Hadlock Road was brought to the attention of town council by Dawn Kellam in February. The ditch across the road from her home prompted several complaints: It is not draining properly, is filled with litter tossed out by customers of nearby fast-food restaurants, is foul-smelling and attracts rats.

All volunteers will be welcome to help clean up the area along the road. Town Manager Robert Duer advised that cleanup would not be done in the ditches for safety reasons.

He added that in the future the town may be interested in getting an excavator attachment designed specifically for cleaning ditches.

Last month, the town invested about \$7,900 in a jackhammer for use by Exmore's public works department and was

approved for a combination \$37,500 grant and \$12,500 loan from USDA Rural Development for a new dump truck.

Some former Exmore businesses will also be cleaned up. In March, it was announced that asbestos will be removed from the Fresh Pride building on Route 13, and the former Trawler restaurant and Sage Diner was bought and will be torn down.

Zoning Administrator Taylor Dukes said he and Police Chief Angelo DiMartino had discussed starting a more effective

program to encourage Exmore residents to keep their property free of trash and leaf and limb debris. Instead of receiving a "nasty letter," offending property owners will be issued a fine that they will take to court, where they will be compelled to clean up their property.

The council revisited the idea of installing lights at the town park. Adequately lighting the area would require two aluminum or fiberglass poles with "shoebox" light fixtures. It would cost about \$6,200

for aluminum or \$6,800 for fiberglass poles. Duer estimated the entire project would cost around \$12,000 installed. Council members agreed the park is not used enough at night to justify the cost, and the idea was reshelved.

The decision seemed to echo Duer's earlier statement, "We (town officials) don't spend a lot of money," and his pronouncement of Exmore as one of the Eastern Shore's largest towns with the smallest budget.

Kenneth Dufty shared good news with council: "For the first time I can remember, we have 100 percent occupancy on Main Street," he said, referring to the proliferation of businesses on the town's main thoroughfare. He said there now is a waiting list for entrepreneurs wanting to join the Main Street vending crowd.

Duer reported he and Mayor Douglas Greer had been invited to join Rep. Scott Taylor at Eastern Shore Community College April 14 for a summit to discuss local infrastructure needs.

The council consented to Duer's suggestion of arranging a "town social" in the park in late May or early June.

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Assateague Island Horse Census Results

The National Park Service has completed its March 2018 population census of the wild horses on Assateague Island. The total population of the Maryland herd is currently at 82 horses, which is well within the ideal population range. The herd currently includes 21 stallions and 61 mares, and at least one mare is known to be pregnant at this time. There have been a total of six horse deaths documented in 2018 so far, including five mares (T3L, N6EL, M17GM “Dee’s Heart”, X15P and T5AFP “AR Arianna”, and one stallion (N6BMS “Llama Boy”). All those lost were mature, aged individuals having lived out their full lives within the national seashore.

The National Park Service completes a full census of the horse population in Maryland six times per year, in February, March, May, July, September and November. Managed as a wild-life population, the Assateague horses are free to roam over approximately 27 miles of the barrier island and can be difficult to find at times.

During each census, horses are identified by their distinguishing characteristics, mapped and counted. Individual horses that are not observed during multiple census periods are presumed dead. The purpose of the census is to monitor the population dynamics of the horse herd in support of the long term fertility control program that was initiated in 1994.

Northampton High School Robotics Team Wins Xerox Creativity Award

Celebrating its 13th year in the For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology (FIRST) regional competition, the Northampton Shorebots (Team 1908) once again competed against powerhouse teams from large cities and small towns.

The fields of battle in this year's district competitions were at Deep Run High School Glen Allen, March 9 -11, and Churchland High School in Portsmouth, March 17 -18. There were 37 schools from Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia represented at these events.

This year's game was called "Power UP." The goal of the game was for teams to earn as many points as they could by robots picking up yellow cubes scattered around the playing field and placing them on either a large tilted scale in the center of the field or in one of two areas called switches.

"Even though the Shorebots did not do well this year in the overall competition, we are proud to say that all was not lost," said Coach Rodney Walker.

Among the 37 teams represented, the Shorebots were selected and awarded the Xerox Creativity Award. The team received this award based on the creativity of their robot design. The guidelines included: a team spokesperson(s) must be able to competently describe the unique features and can trace its conception, design, and assembly; its uniqueness has a practical application and contributes to the objectives of the competition; and the team created a strategy rather than discovered it once the machine was built. The team used an ordinary extension ladder to build an elevator device for lifting cubes and suspending itself off the floor on a bar at the end of the game.

Each year, the competition begins with the kickoff event, where the rules of the game are explained and robot kits are distributed, and is held the first Saturday in January. FIRST challenges high school Robotics teams around the world to design and build a robot that will meet specific standards in district, regional and international competition. Students are given guidance by professional engineers and other adult mentors as they design and

build their one-of-a-kind robot. The knowledge the students gain of sophisticated software and hardware enables them to be competitive not only in tournaments but also for other educational opportunities. It also allows each student, as a participant in FIRST, to qualify for over \$20

million in college scholarships.

The robot's "abilities" are built each year around a different game designed by FIRST. The project takes the time, effort and unique talent of all participants. For six weeks local adult mentors share their expertise and support

students as they design and construct the robot. This involves complex computer programming as well as basic construction using a variety of tools, equipment, and materials. The completed robot is a marvel of design and construction. Each totally unique Robot must meet FIRST's high standards for construction. Festooned with the names and logos of community sponsors, and decorated with school emblems, the robots are a source of pride for all.

FIRST also has a standard of fair play, called "Gracious Professionalism," that is expected in the behavior of all competitors. Sharing between teams is encouraged, as is respect for the skills and talents of others.

"The Shorebots would not be able to participate each year without the money, materials and services provided by our many community sponsors over the past 13 years, and especially to the Northampton County Public School System that provides our meeting space and transportation," Walker said.

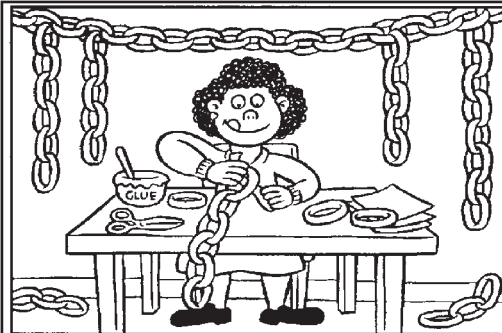

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Northampton Schools Justify County Funding Requests

Northampton schools superintendent, Eddie Lawrence, made his case to supervisors March 29 supporting the proposed school budget, with a detailed explanation of the school district's current financial predicament and the critical need for more local funding.

The composite index, a calculation Virginia uses to determine how much each county is expected to pay for its public education, continues to put Northampton schools at a disadvantage.

Recalculated every two years, the composite index is based 50 percent on true property values, 40 percent on adjusted gross income, and 10 percent on taxable retail sales. Its heavy reliance on real value of property, which Northampton has a lot of on waterfronts, is one of the main reasons the composite index affects Northampton unfavorably.

Northampton's population of homeless students also negatively impacts its composite index. When families "double up" in a single home, Lawrence said, the children are effectively considered homeless and are not accounted for in

composite index calculations.

About 17 percent of Northampton students are homeless, 12 times the statewide rate.

In the last two years, Northampton's composite index dropped slightly from about .49 to .47, which roughly means the county will have to pay 47 percent of the cost of its public education in fiscal years 2019 and 2020. Northampton's composite index never fully recovered to its pre-recession level. It was .55 in fiscal years 2009 and 2010, a jump from .39 in the previous two years.

Acomack, with a population nearing three times that of Northampton, has a composite index of .35.

Each Northampton student is "worth" about \$4,500 in state funding. The average daily membership in Northampton schools has dipped from 1560 to 1515 students since last year. Based on that fact alone, the school district will qualify for less funding.

By its own admission, Virginia is underfunding public education by \$600 per child, Lawrence said, which further complicates the issue.

And fewer students does not necessarily translate to fewer needs.

While fewer students require fewer classroom teachers, Northampton still needs additional teachers to assist students in ways other than direct instruction.

The federal Every Student Succeeds Act, the successor to No Child Left Behind, includes what Lawrence termed a "potential unfunded mandate." Student attendance now affects school accreditation. The Northampton school board included a student success coach in its draft budget to help meet its attendance goals, at a cost of about \$50,000.

Northampton's suspension rate is about 2.5 times the state average. To reduce the number of out-of-school suspensions, the draft school budget also includes a teacher and related supplies to conduct in-house suspensions in the Tech Center at the high school, at a cost of around \$58,000.

Traditionally, the Tech Center has been used as an alternative placement for students who have exhibited exceptionally defiant or disruptive behaviors in the classroom. The new in-house suspen-

sion teacher would work with students with regular classroom placements who have mid-level discipline issues.

The school board is also requesting four percent raises for teachers to help retain and recruit educators in a competitive job market.

Northampton schools Director of Finance Brook Thomas explained to supervisors that the school board figured out how to save around \$575,000 in the school budget to help pay for new expenditures like pay raises and additional staff.

Supervisors wondered if there was any other fat that could be skimmed off the school budget. Supervisor John Coker questioned why 7 percent of the budget was needed for contractual services at a cost of about \$1.5 million.

Thomas explained that "contractual services" covered necessities such as computer software, transportation, occupational therapists and physical therapists.

Though the budget proves challenging to supervisors, Chairman Spencer Murray assured Lawrence, "we share your enthusiasm for teacher pay."

Health Matters **HEALTHY PETS, HEALTHY PEOPLE**

The Eastern Shore Health District encourages the therapeutic value of animals in people's lives.

Many people who work in public health also share their lives with a variety of animals. To create healthier relationships with animals, we would like to share information that can help your family make wise choices and stay healthy.

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From the Centers For Disease Control (CDC), studies have shown that the bond between people and their pets can increase fitness, lower stress and bring happiness to their owners. Some of the health benefits of having a pet include:

- Decreased blood pressure
- Decreased cholesterol levels
- Decreased triglyceride levels
- Decreased feelings of loneliness
- Increased opportunities for exercise and outdoor activities
- Increased opportunities for socialization

The first topic in what will be a series of topics titled, "Healthy Pets Healthy People," is about one of the more popular nontraditional pets – the backyard flock. Backyard flocks can provide the health benefits of pet ownership listed above, as well as provide families with fresh eggs to eat, share or sell.

On the other hand, direct contact with poultry (chickens, ducks, geese and other fowl) also may increase exposure to salmonella and Campylo-

bacter bacteria. Symptoms of illnesses caused by these bacteria are typically fever, diarrhea (sometimes bloody), nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps and dehydration. If you or one of your family members develops symptoms, your doctor can test you for infection and recommend treatment to prevent severe complications. A nurse from the health department will also follow up with you to rule out the risk of illness to other people.

Outbreaks in the past have been associated with baby chicks from a common supplier, for example.

While experiencing symptoms health-care workers, daycare workers or attendees, and food handlers must stay home from work to prevent the spread of infection to others.

Here are recommendations to keep your family members healthy while still enjoying and sharing the benefits of your flock.

•Do not allow poultry inside your home.

•Remove shoes and outer clothes that may have gotten dirty while tending to your flock before you enter your home, especially if infants or toddlers live with you.

•Always wash your hands thoroughly

with soap and water after handling the birds' food and water dishes or equipment, cleaning bird coops, cages or perches and handling eggs

•Always wash your hands before before eating, drinking or preparing food for your family.

•Keep an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol near the bird's enclosure to encourage guests and children to clean their hands after handling birds if soap and water are not nearby.

•Do not eat, drink or smoke while tending to the flock.

•Do not snuggle, kiss or touch your mouth to live poultry or chicks.

•Do not give live baby chicks and ducklings to young children as gifts.

•If any of your backyard poultry appear to be ill, consult your veterinarian.

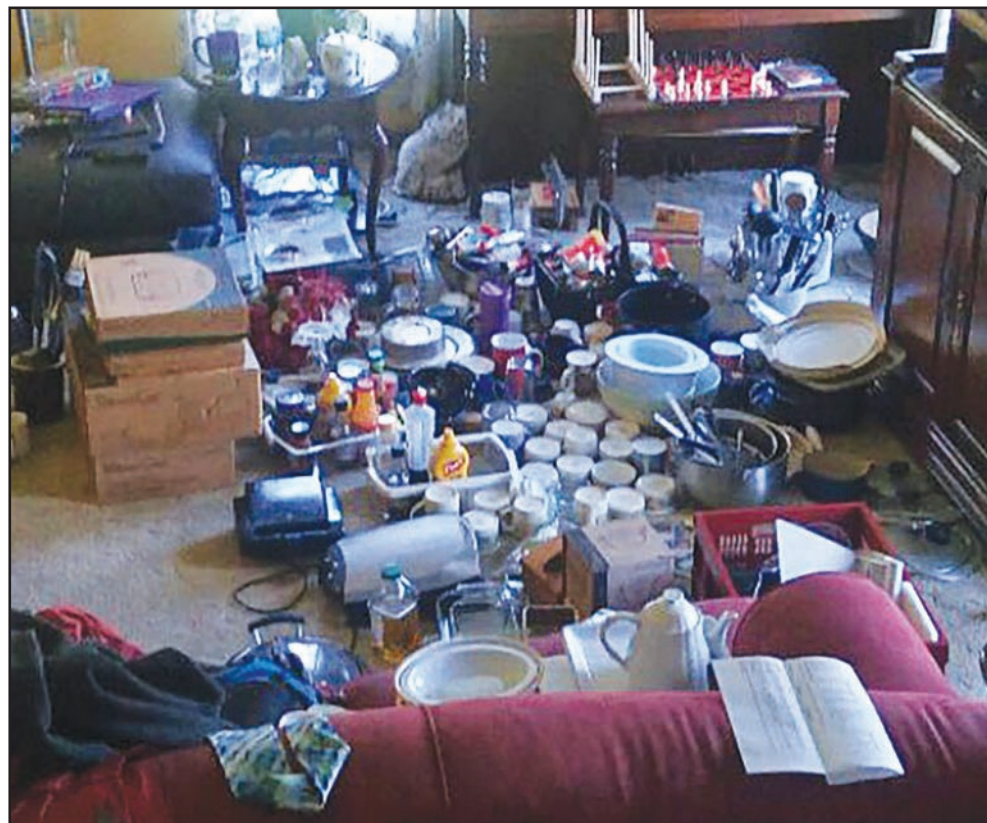

Aren't you just amazed when people ask you what day those holidays will land on? Silly rabbits, Easter is always on a Sunday. Yippee!

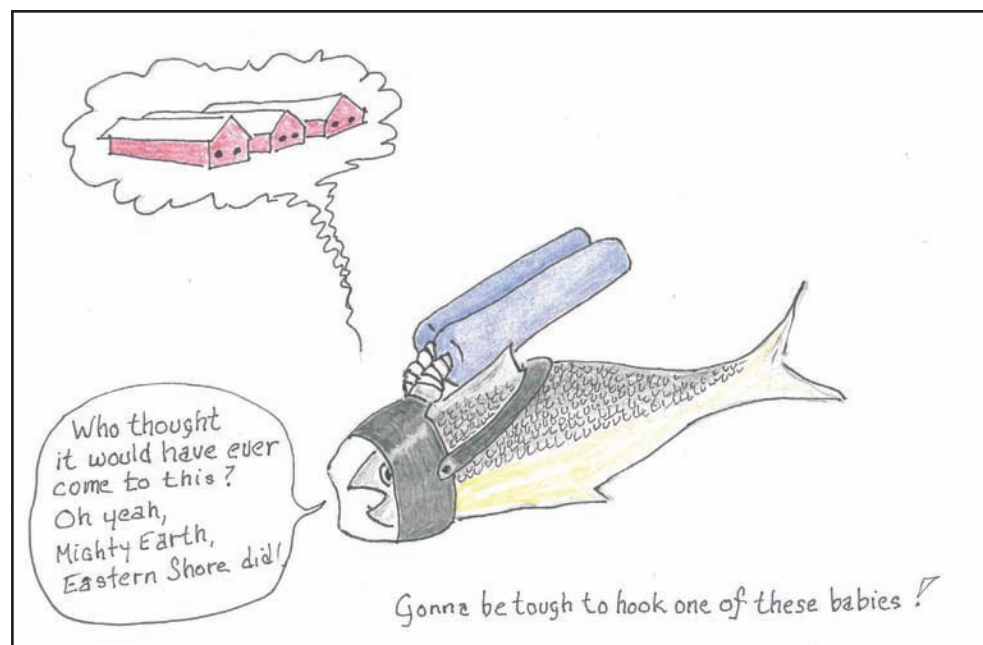


Classifieds manager and professional hand model, Angie Crutchley, holds up a mini Cadbury egg to demonstrate its grape-like size.
