Local Beekeepers Don't Always Get Sweet Rewards

Beekeeping is a risky business.

Doug Hollingsworth, of the Painter area, was one of the luckier people in the occupation. Hollingsworth was sitting on the back deck late Sunday morning. He was looking at the weather forecast on his cellphone, drinking coffee, and enjoying the mild spring day.

Then suddenly the quiet environment got very loud. There was a buzzing noise that broke Hollingsworth's concentration. When he looked up less than a second later, he saw exactly what he feared he would see. About 10,000 bees had left one of his hives, formed what looked like a screen, and were moving across the yard.

A swarm was following its queen to make a new home.

Four hives of seven had made it through the long cold season — quite the achievement for a beginner with only two years of beekeeping behind him.

"I watched where they went — into a little bush in the yard about 50 feet" from the wooden box they had called home since last June, Hollingsworth said. The swarm included about a third of the colony he had extracted from two gothic porch columns at a Franktown house, not quite 15 miles away.

"While it is scary to view, when a swarm occurs the bees are the most docile and less likely to sting," he said. "People should call a beekeeper if they see a swarm land. Don't try to kill them," he said. "The ecosystem needs them."

He kept both eyes on the plant while opening the sliding glass door to the house and grabbed his bee suit. Hollingsworth quickly

got dressed in it, armed himself with a pair of loping shears, and approached them. They had covered three branches. Hollingsworth was able to shake the branches into an empty hive box. Many of the bees landed on the ground but the queen fell inside. He backed off and kept a careful watch.

"After I gave them about an hour, they all went into the box to be with their

queen," he said. "Then I went into the hive that they swarmed from, found probably a dozen swarm cells or unhatched queens that are usually found in the bottom of a frame. I divided those cells into three other hives with frames of brood, honey, pollen, and extra bees."

The long harsh winter was quite lucky for Hollingsworth. He had managed to

double his colonies. But he could still wind up losing them if the queens leave to mate and don't return.

Hollingsworth said he's heard local bee losses were between 75 to 90 percent. But there has been no confirmation yet. The national group, Bee Informed Partnership, is still conducting its 2017-18 survey

School Officials Plead for New High School as Current School Crumbles

An update on needed repairs at Northampton schools, provided to supervisors April 23, escalated to a plea to replace the county's rapidly deteriorating high school.

Professional engineer Daniel Speight, of structural engineering firm Speight, Marshall & Francis, conducted the most recent inspection of the building March 28, emphasizing the auditorium.

The high school auditorium walls. which have bowed eight to 10 inches, are "in danger of experiencing localized partial collapse" and must be braced and either repaired or replaced immediately.

The overall condition of the high school "can best be described as fair to poor," Speight's report said.

Northampton schools Director of Operations Chris Truckner attributed much of the high school's recently sustained damage to the early January nor'easter and a "harsh winter."

In the last six months, many new cracks, up to 3/4 inches wide, have appeared in the walls, Truckner said.

A single hairline crack caused by a build-

ing settling over time is "not that a big deal," Truckner said, but multiple wide and intersecting cracks are a sign of structural failure.

There is a one-inch crack in the wall of the classroom used by Northampton teacher and supervisor Oliver Bennett, who said the crack was only a half-inch wide last year.

Moreover, the rooftop HVAC unit over the school cafeteria has reached total failure and must be replaced. The unit was in such poor condition there were holes in the condenser coils, Truckner said.

Insulated pipes on the roof had frozen and failed. The main water line from the chiller is unable to deliver cold water to individual HVAC units in the building, meaning those areas have no air conditioning.

Truckner said his department did as they were told to keep the HVAC unit running as long as possible, keeping in mind the future need for a new facility.

Supervisor and Vice Chairman John Coker, who led the meeting in Chairman Spencer Murray's absence, said, "We're not going to have a new school in a year or two," and later added, "I don't want one child to be unsafe for one minute any day of this year."

The need for immediate repairs to the building and equipment is "pretty simple, in my mind," Coker said.

Lawrence advised supervisors that creating a timeline for construction of a new high school would enable contractors to offer temporary, less expensive options for immediate repairs, saving thousands or even millions of dollars. Coker said a new school could be built now with a 20 to 25 percent tax increase, but wouldn't go over well with taxpavers. Northampton is likely five to seven years away from having a new high school, he added.

Truckner said the 1950s-era building will not last another seven years and is "falling to pieces ... right now," as the structural engineer predicted about a decade ago, who is about to walk away from the project for liability reasons.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence said a recent comment was made that he wanted a new school. "Eddie Lawrence does not want a new school. Northampton County needs a new school."


School board chairman William Oakley said, "The last thing any of us want ... is somebody to come in and say this building cannot be inhabited any longer," but, "in four years, we've gotten nowhere" with a plan to replace the school.

Northampton schools chief financial officer Brook Thomas reminded supervisors that Davenport financial advisors explained a debt arrangement could be made allowing lower initial payments on a new school, which would increase as the county's debt capacity increases.

Supervisor Robert Duer suggested a joint meeting of supervisors and the school board with the county finance department at supervisors' June 30 work session.

Thomas agreed to bring information on square footage needed per student and estimated construction costs based on square footage.





for bee mortality. Last year, the statewide losses were more than 30 percent, which is in keeping with national losses.

"Even though the loss of hives is about 30 percent, our total number of hives doesn't reflect that because we have new beekeepers getting started to help recoup the losses," said Elaine Lidholm of the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. "We encourage new beekeepers and we also encourage the public to plant pollinator gardens to provide food for the existing bees."

Russell Vreeland, of Craddockville, has been a beekeeper for 25 years. "I keep bees not only for the delicious, healthy honey, but because watching and interacting with these industrious creatures is truly fascinating as they reveal their inner lives," he wrote to the Eastern Shore Post earlier this month.

"In the last seven years this interaction has involved more problem-solving as bees continue to disappear and hives die," Vreeland continued. "What is most disturbing is to work with a hive all year only to have that hive decline no

matter what the beekeeper does."

In April of 2012 and 2013, he said, "I could place an empty hive in a tree outside my window and within a couple of weeks that hive would be filled with large numbers of honeybees from somewhere in the surrounding forest." But that doesn't work anymore. "I was able to maintain hives in several apiaries in Accomack County and collect the honey," said Vreeland. "Then I began to notice that some apiaries that should be prime bee forage areas ended up being toxic and all of the bees I put there died. Other apiaries continued to support hives and produced wonderful honey. Unfortunately, it has only gotten worse."

In May 2016, "I had 14 hives in four apiaries in Accomack County. By March 2017, I had seven. So I reinvested and rebuilt. By May 2017, I managed to again reach 13 functioning hives. As of Easter Sunday 2018, all 13 had died and I have no bees. This is not just depressing, it is expensive," said Vreeland. "Three pounds of honeybees and a queen costs \$120 with a discount. (A) larger numbers of bees, about 5 pounds, can cost nearly \$200. Because these bees arrive in late spring, I probably won't have any honey for my family or others this year."

Vreeland talked to other Shore beekeepers in 2017 and early 2018 and learned he is not alone. "Collectively in 2017, based on my unscientific surveys, we have lost nearly 70 percent of our bees. That is millions of insects needed for the vegetables, fruit and berries we all eat. In addition, I have also seen fewer and fewer native solitary bees occupying the houses I put up to attract them."

The problems have been reported nationally. Beekeepers are forced to inbreed just to replace losses; imported parasite mites the carry viruses are adversely affecting the bees; small hive beetles are also attacking the bees; habitat loss like woods being into farm fields, cleared for wood, or divided in subdivisions are taking over; and there is an ever-increasing use of nonorganic, broad spectrum pesticides, herbicides and fungicides, according to Vreeland.

He suggested people plant flowering trees like maples, locusts, sumac, or basswood around and between buildings. "The shade alone makes things nicer in summer. Those trees and wildflowers would help the pollinators throughout the summer. ... Those dan-

delions and other small flowering weeds that arise early, literally provide food to insects that are starving from winter. The clover, the basswood, and other plants that bloom all summer are the things that help bees prepare for winter. They need it and they need diversity of plantings."

"Every person or family that has plants anywhere must think about all other creatures, insects and animals, before we spray, clear cut or plant," said Vreeland. "We need your help and everyone needs our bees."



DEQ Finds No Contamination or Hazardous Waste at Shad Landing Property

No petroleum contamination or disposal of hazardous waste was found on parcels owned by Lance Fisher in Sanford in a recent investigation of the site, according Russell F. Deppe, an attorney with the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ).

DEQ followed up on information provided by people who commented after Fisher was ordered to clean up 120 tons of trash including more than 100 tires that were dumped on Fisher's property on Shad Landing Road. Deppe said nothing was found.

While DEQ officers were on the site after the dump was reported, Fisher was caught driving in more garbage in a dump truck labeled Fisher's Environmental in May 2017. The company belongs to his sons with an office in Delmar, Md. They do asbestos removal, mold remediation, lead paint abatement, demolition services, water damage restoration removal, fire damage restoration duct cleaning, air quality control, wet crawl space solutions, hazardous material clean-up, and emergency response.

"This is a site whose contaminated

areas are just starting to come to light," Supervisor Paul Muhly wrote to the agency after the dump materials were taken away. Muhly asked DEQ to reconsider enforcing the fine and address "the remaining questions of contamination at man-made ponds that parallel Shad Landing Road and the possible hydraulic fluid and other liquid wastes in the Chesapeake Bay waters at the old oyster house ... The propertv at the site of the old ovster house is said to be contaminated with hydraulic fluid from the machinery that operated there," the supervisor continued, attributing his information to local residents who have lived in the area "their whole lives. Even today that site is being used for overboard dumping of fluids. Folks who crab there have seen iridescent film trails on and in the water."

Three other citizens also asked that the rest of the property be investigated for more dumping issues.

A consent order was posted on the DEQ website that told of the \$13,500 fine issued against Fisher for dumping. During the public comment period, after the cleanup was ordered, 25

people commented on the civil charge which was waived because Fisher's income showed he was not able to pay.

Deppe said Fisher's ability is determined by his income not any assets he may hold.

Muhly said Fisher's 80-acre site is assessed at more than \$300,000. "He could have used this property as security for a bank loan to pay the token fine for his actions. The tipping fees he paid at the county landfill when the dump was cleaned up is only what he should have normally paid to begin with."

The county official wants the property to be further evaluated. "The southern part of the property has several lagoons or ponds that can be seen from the Google Earth website. What has been dumped here over the years is anybody's guess. How many family wells in the neighborhood have been affected?" he asked. "Should not these area wells be tested by the DEQ?"

If testing of soil or water samples was made, it was not addressed by Deppe in his letter to Muhly.

On April 9, 2018, Deppe said, an onsite investigation was made. "DEQ did

not observe any violations of Virginia's environmental laws and regulations. Department staff conducted a thorough investigation of the Fisher Properties for evidence of petroleum contamination or releases. The soil, ditches, and bodies of water in and around the Fisher properties were investigated and there were no observable petroleum sheens, and no staining of the soil from petroleum releases was observed. Additionally, the two lagoons and borrow pit on the properties were investigated and there was no evidence of improperly disposed solid or hazardous waste."

Of the 25 comments the agency received regarding its decision to forego the civil charge, 18 stated allowing Fisher to slide creates a bad precedent. Deppe said allowing Fisher to use his income is consistent with all DEQ case actions. Seven comments were made urging DEQ to protect human health and the environment. "In this case, DEQ followed standard operating procedures to ensure that the identified waste was disposed of properly, thus following its ... mission to protect human health and the environment," Deppe said.

Northampton Wetlands Board Approves Cleanup of Area Affected by Clear-Cutting

Approximately eight acres in Northampton were clear-cut without a permit near Bayside Road in Hungars Creek earlier this year, on property owned by Jeffery and Susan Touralt, of Virginia Beach. The incident was originally reported Feb. 6 and the wetlands board was notified Feb. 21 during its regular meeting.

The board reviewed the resulting violations April 18. An erosion and sediment control plan was required for the eight-acre area. About 6.5 acres of the Resource Protection Area and Resource Management Area were disturbed without an approved plan, by clear-cutting vegetation more than 2 inches in diameter. Work on 1.5 acres of the eight-acre area encroached into the RPA without a permit.

An initial report stated 725 square feet of tidal wetlands had been impacted; upon review by the Army Corps of Engineers, that figure was increased to 1,602 square feet. According to the summary of violations sent to the Touralts by the Northampton planning department,

"destruction of wetlands" occurred on .1 acres.

Pine trees approximately eight to 10 years old and 4 to 5 inches thick were mulched with heavy equipment that can leave at least 7 inches of mulch on the ground. Larger trees were removed by chain saw. The sole source of impact to the wetlands was the spreading of mulch from nearby trees that were eliminated.

A waterfront consultant recommended immediately cleaning up the affected area by raking up the mulch before new spring growth could emerge.

A motion was made to approve cleaning up the impacted wetland area by raking, with additional cleanup (such as the removal of fallen trees) to be authorized by the county planning and zoning department and overseen by the development inspector. It passed unanimously.

Director of Planning and Zoning Susan McGhee requested the oversight to ensure the additional cleanup would be done in accordance with Department of Environmental Quality guidelines, which state no tree, dead or alive, may be removed from within Eastern Shore residents, but agreed contractors should be advised to

The notice of violation sent to the Touralts acknowledged the area appeared to have been used as farmland previously, and tax map aerial photos showed the land was clear prior to 2007.

The wetlands board discussed how many farmers and property owners from out of the area do not realize they need permits to clear overgrowth on their own land. They decided to advertise in the local news to create awareness of the issue.

Board member Bob Meyers clarified the main purpose of the advertisement would be "education for contractors." It was noted contractors need to be aware of the differing legal requirements when performing work in Accomack on the seaside versus Northampton on the bayside.

The board acknowledged that work done on any property is the responsibility of the landowner, regardless of whether or not they are full-time Eastern Shore residents, but agreed contractors should be advised to check with the county planning department before beginning work.

Board members also discussed the benefit of realtors informing potential buyers about permits they would need before doing work on their land affecting an area of more than 2,500 square feet and considered taking action on that matter in the future.

McGhee announced her department is hiring an environmental specialist who will begin work at the end of May and could assist the wetlands board in matters such as public education on land use planning and permitting procedures.

In the matter of the Salt Grove wetlands restoration, board member Bowdoin Lusk made a motion to grant the project a 10-month extension, contingent on staff receiving and approving the coordinates of the mitigation area.

The motion passed with board member David Boyd dissenting.

Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court Felonies Certified to Grand Jury

Felony charges filed against three men in Accomack Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court were certified recently to a county grand jury, according to records filed in the circuit court.

Judge Croxton Gordon, of Accomack Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court, found probable cause to certify a charge of rape by force or threat against Michael Lee Camper Jr., 29, of Valerie Drive of New Church. The offense occurred Feb. 14, 2018, and was handled by Investigator Meghan Patterson of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office (ACSO). Camper is being held without bond.

The victim's name is being withheld because of the nature of the crime.

A third offense of assault and battery of a family or household member was also certified to the jury against William Marqese Holden, 27, with addresses in Mill Run Lane in Belle Haven and Graves Court in Exmore. The victim, Trikira Fletcher, told authorities the incident occurred on March 5. Holden was arrested two days later. Deputy A.J. Turner of ACSO investigated.

Secured bond was set at \$1,000.

Two counts of abuse and neglect involving children under 18 years old were certified for George Michael Taylor Jr., 34, of Greenbrier Drive in Snow Hill, Md. Deputy B.K. Misener of ACSO investigated. Secured bond was set at \$2,500.

Arrest Made In Prybar Wounding

An Onley man was accused last week of maliciously wounding another man with a prybar, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Jean Denis Adolphe, 45, of First Lane, was arrested April 17. He is being held without bond for allegedly hitting Jean Louis Augustine "with a prybar resulting in injuries to the head."

Adolphe told authorities he "hit the victim with a rock and not a prybar." Records state he has a prior criminal history that is 12 pages long. Chief John Spivey of Onley Police Department investigated.

In another case, Antonio Arnaz Brown Sr., 43, of Bullbegger Road in Withams, was charged with felony neglect of two children under 18 years old, driving after being declared a habitual offender, and DUI. The offenses occurred April 21.

Brown admitted to police he was drunk. Pfc. David Gladding of Chincoteague Police Department (CPD) saw Brown driving a vehicle. When Brown stopped, Gladding saw "two small children were on (the) rear seat not in child restraints," the file stated. Secured bond was set at \$2,500.

Brittany Carol Doiron, 26, with addresses on Pine Ridge Road in Melfa and Evans Wharf Road in Onancock, was charged with obtaining a credit card without permission from the owner on Jan. 7, 2018. Investigator Meghan Patterson of ACSO handled the case.

Larry Dynell Justice, 54, of John Cane Road in Greenbush, was accused of stealing property valued at \$200 or more belonging to Advantage Lawn Care on March 16. He was arrested April 18. Secured bond was set at \$6,000. Trooper D. W. Wallace investigated.

Jaylon Kellam, 19, of Beartown Road in Mappsville, was charged with the felonies maliciously shooting at an occupied vehicle thereby putting the life of the occupant in peril and destruction of property belonging to Tahah Berryville of Onancock. Sentence Given For Pizza Delivery Robbery

An 18-year-old Onley resident was sentenced last week in Accomack Circuit Court to five years in prison for robbing a Nelsonia pizza deliveryman at gunpoint and related charges last June.

Vincent Lavette Stoudmire, of Logan Road, pleaded no contest to robbery, taking more than \$5, and use of a firearm in the robbery. He was sentenced to 10 years with all but two years suspended for robbery. Stoudmire was given a five-year suspended sentence for larceny and the mandatory three years for using a gun in a felony.

Judge W. Revell Lewis set the terms to run consecutively. Supervised probation was set for 15 years upon release and restitution of \$250 was ordered.

"You are a young man and you made a very bad choice," Lewis told Stoudmire. "Five years may seem like a long time. Once you get it behind you, you will still have a lot of life to live. Hopefully, we'll never see you in this court again."

The maximum punishment for these crimes is life plus 23 years, according to court records.

Stoudmire's 16-year-old brother, Shawndele Anthony Fletcher Jr., of Bethel Church Road in Parksley, was also charged in the robbery and will be treated as an adult by the court. He plans to plead not guilty to the charges and is free on unspecified bond. A court date was not set.

Fletcher was indicted on counts of robbing a business with a gun, grand larceny, robing Yuuji Yagami of currency by presenting a firearm, and stealing \$5 or more from Yagami.

The victim said an order was placed at Roma Pizzeria in Nelsonia. When he went to the home, everything was dark. While on the steps, he was approached by a male who said he would not be paying for the food. He was held at gunpoint, while the food and money were taken. He also said he was hit in the head.

In another case, Erroll Ralph Jenkins II, 22, of Culver Road in Salisbury, Md., got three years for conspiracy and 12 months for larceny. He apologized to the court and said he was taking responsibility for his actions. Lewis urged him to go to Narcotics Anonymous and Alcoholics Anonymous to help to kick his habits. He suspended all but time served for the terms and put Jenkins on

good behavior for five years.

"The ball's in your court, sir," the judge said.

Prison for Cheriton Man


A Cheriton man was sentenced to 10 years in prison Monday in Northampton Circuit Court for the October 2016 offense of possession with intent to distribute cocaine, according to Commonwealth's Attorney Beverly Leatherbury.

Frederick Amonzo Bellamy, of Birdsnest, was charged with burglary in connection with an April 20 incident, according to papers filed in Northampton General District Court. Bellamy was arrested the same day.

Deputy Carlos Moyano of the Northampton County Sheriff's Office investigated. A May 31 preliminary hearing was scheduled.

Two More Indicted in Murder-for-Hire

Two suspects have been accused of soliciting four others to kill an Eastern Shore Drug Task Force (ESDTF) informant near Painter last Halloween, according to indictments made public Monday and brought by an Accomack grand jury earlier this month.

Sixteen indictments connected to the murder-for-hire scheme were brought against Cynthia Harmon, 52, of Dennis Drive in Parksley, and Evron Terrell Strand, 43, with addresses on Deer Drive in Nelsonia and Mary N. Smith Road in Accomac. Harmon is being detained in Accomack Jail without bond. Strand is in the Eastern Shore Regional Jail. He was in Accomack Jail when the criminal plans were made through telephone calls with Harmon, according to court records and testimony at a preliminary hearing.

Killing Nathaniel Johnson, 30, who testified against a drug dealer in early October, was the goal. One of the suspects who was asked to murder him has been tied to gang activity.

Johnson survived being shot three times. His girlfriend, Dezarae Smith, 19, was apparently in the wrong place at the wrong time and was hit with gunfire in the foot during the murder attempt. The incident occurred on Linhaven Circle.

The indictments accuse Harmon and Strand of soliciting Harmon's son, Debrandon Pierre Harmon, 30, of Dogwood Drive in Melfa, to murder Johnson between Aug. 11 and Nov. 10, 2017.

Indictments also accuse Cynthia Harmon and Strand of asking Aaron Jamarcus Bowens, also known as "Easy" and "BOBO," 22, of Big Pine Road in Painter, to commit murder between Oct. 19 and Nov. 10, 2017. Bowens has been publicly accused of committing murder in Northampton, although he was never charged with the crime. His home was searched after Johnson and Smith were shot, and gangrelated notes were confiscated.

Keenan Jibrel Berry, 26, of Jermaine Lane in Parksley, was also asked by the alleged planners to kill Johnson between Aug. 21 and Oct. 31, 2017, the indictments state. Deshawn Drummond was solicited for the task between Sept. 25 and Oct. 31. It is unclear from the records if Deshawn Drummond is also Cynthia Harmon's relative. No age or address was given for him.

Roquan Lee'teq (Cake) Rogers, 19, of Benjamin Banneker Street in Exmore, who was identified as the shooter in an attempt to kill Johnson, was asked by Cynthia Harmon and Strand to commit murder between Oct. 28 and 31, 2017, the indictments also accuse.

Cynthia Harmon and Strand were also indicted on counts of conspiring to commit capital murder, conspiring to commit murder involving a prisoner, conspiring to intimidate a witness, intimidating a witness, maliciously wounding Johnson, maliciously wounding Smith, attempting to kill Johnson while a prisoner, use of a firearm in the wounding of Johnson, and use of a firearm in the wounding of Smith.

The unsealed indictments brought against Debrandon Harmon include possession with intent to sell cocaine, possession of cocaine while possessing a firearm, conspiring to commit murder, conspiring to commit murder by a prisoner, conspiring to intimidate a witness, and receiving stolen property. The drug offenses were initially brought on Nov. 10, when arrests in the scheme were made.

Debrandon Harmon was initially released on bond. He was arrested again when the indictments were brought and is being held in Accomack Jail.

Deshawn Markiese Drummond was indicted on counts of conspiracy to commit murder, conspiring with a prisoner to commit the capital offense, and conspiring to intimidate a witness. He is being held in Accomack Jail without bond.

Information about the crimes was given to the grand jury by Jason Marsh of the ESDTF.

Indictments brought against Berry and Rogers were disclosed last week. Johnson testified against Rogers' brother in a drug case. Akeem Markiese Rogers, 26, of Benjamin Banneker Street in Exmore, was convicted of distributing cocaine. He is in the regional jail awaiting sentencing and trial for another charge of selling drugs.

At a preliminary hearing, retired Judge Robert Phillips of Accomack General District Court dismissed a charge against Strand saying there was not enough evidence because references made between Cynthia Harmon and Strand when they were talking on the phone were made in code and were left to interpretation. Cynthia Harmon waived her preliminary hearing.

Strand is serving nine years for three counts of distribution of cocaine.

LIQUOR SALES UP AGAIN IN 2017

Liquor sales were up in 2017 on the Eastern Shore at the five state-run ABC stores where more than 85,000 gallons of booze with net sales of nearly \$4.8 million were sold, according to an agency report.

In the previous year, 82,420 gallons were sold locally with net sales of about \$4.6 million.

The trend was comparable to statewide figures. ABC stores in Virginia sold a total of 11,691,494 gallons of alcohol with gross sales of more than \$937 million in 2017. In the previous year, 11,379,647 gallons were sold with gross sales of \$895 million.

The Onley store at Four Corner Plaza was the top seller of the five stores in both 2016 and 2017. Last year, nearly 26,000 gallons were sold in Onley with gross sales of more than \$1.7 million. The year before, about 24,745 gallons of alcohol sold there for about \$1.66 million in gross receipts.

The store on Lankford Highway near Cape Charles was second with nearly 18,400 gallons of the spirits going out the door in 2017 with gross sales of about \$1.3 million. In 2016, that store sold nearly 17,460 gallons with more than \$1.2 million in gross sales.

Exmore's facility, also on Lankford Highway, was third with about 15,370 gallons of liquor or about \$941,000 worth sold

in 2017. The year before, 15,685 gallons were sold with \$956,740 in gross sales.

The stores on Lankford Highway in Oak Hall and Pension Street on Chincote-ague ran close in sales in 2017. Oak Hall sold 12,695 gallons with nearly \$888,000 in sales. Chincoteague sold 12,643 gallons with gross sales of more than \$870,000.

In 2016, the Oak Hall store sold 12,586 gallons with \$871,485 in gross sales. The Chincoteague store sold 11,948 gallons in 2016 with about \$819,760 in gross sales.

In Accomack, 138 other businesses also sold alcoholic in 2017 including six bed and breakfasts, two beer and wine importers, three beer and wine wholesalers, three clubs, 29 convenience stores, a deli, two drugstores, nine gourmet brew shops, 16 grocery and gourmet stores, two hotel and resorts, 23 restaurants that sell mixed beverages, and 36 restaurants that sell beer and wine.

In Northampton, 71 other businesses sell alcohol including three bed and breakfasts, a beer and wine importer, five beer and wine wholesalers, a caterer, a club, 16 convenience stores, a drugstore, a gourmet brew shop, six grocery or gourmet stores, a hotel, 13 restaurants serving mixed drinks, 17 restaurants selling beer and wine, and a winery.

Perdue Releases 96% of Eastern Shore Toxins According to State Inventory

Improvements in technology have allowed local poultry plants to treat on-site and reduce the amount of toxins released by more than 900,000 pounds, according to an Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission staff summary of the state Toxics Release Inventory (TRI).

However, Perdue Farms in Accomac "still releases over 20 times as much as Tyson" Foods in Temperanceville "and is responsible for 96 percent of TRI releases in Accomack County," the document concluded.

Perdue released 699,640 pounds of nitrate compounds in 2016, more than twice as much as it did in 2015, and 29 pounds of peracetic acid (also known as peroxyacetic acid, or PAA) to water, which was just less than was released in the previous year. Peracetic acid is a component of antimicrobial washes used for poultry carcasses and fruit.

Perdue also released 83,880 pounds of hydrogen sulfide into the air or almost double of the amount from 2015. Hydrogen sulfide is a colorless, flammable, extremely hazardous gas with a rotten egg

smell. It occurs naturally in crude petroleum and natural gas and can be produced by the breakdown of organic matter and human or animal wastes, according to OSHA, the federal Home Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Tyson released 31,053 pounds of nitrate compounds to water, which was up from 22,332 pounds in 2015, and 2,736 pounds of ammonia to air, down from 16,387 pounds in 2015.

KMX Chemical in New Church released 750 pounds of ethylene glycol and 250 pounds of methanol into the air. According to the National Center for Biotechnology Information, "ethylene glycol is the most important glycol commercially available and is manufactured on a large scale in the U.S. It is used as an antifreeze and coolant, in hydraulic fluids, and in the manufacture of low-freezing dynamites and resins."

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) describe methanol as "a toxic alcohol that is used industrially as a solvent, pesticide. and alternative fuel source. It also occurs naturally in humans, animals, and plants."

NASA Wallops Flight Facility re-

leased 88 pounds of lead compounds to the air, "But a total of 273 pounds released might be chromium." There is a conflict between Virginia DEQ and EPA totals. The state agency reported 66 pounds were released. The EPA said 273 pounds were released.

According to the EPA, "Lead is used in the manufacture of batteries, metal products, and ammunition. Exposure to lead can occur from breathing contaminated air in or near workplaces that process lead or lead materials, as well as from incidentally ingesting dust or paint chips in houses with lead-based paint. Lead can cause effects on the blood, as well as the nervous, immune, renal and cardiovascular systems. Early childhood and prenatal exposures are associated with slowed cognitive development, learning deficits and other effects. Exposure to high amounts of lead can cause gastrointestinal symptoms, severely damage the brain and kidneys, and may cause reproductive effects. Large doses of some lead compounds have caused cancer in lab animals."

"The primary use of lead is in the

manufacture of batteries." the EPA noted. "Lead is also used in the production of lead alloys and metal products, such as sheet lead, solder, and pipes, and in, ammunition, cable covering, and other products. Its use in ceramic glazes, paint and pipe solder has been dramatically reduced. ... Leaded gasoline is still used for propeller-driven aircraft and some race cars."



Governor Signs Bill Authorizing Local Teams to Review Opioid Fatalities

"We're not here to lock everybody up," Capt. Todd Wessells of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office said Wednesday at a gathering in Melfa of local and state law enforcement officers and leaders who have joined forces to fight the opioid epidemic on the Eastern Shore and across the commonwealth. "We're here to help people."

Scott Wade, coordinator of the local drug task force, agreed. He said police are focusing on charging the dealers of heroin, oxycodone, hydrocodone, morphine, codeine, and fentanyl with crimes and not necessary the users; educating people about the dangers of becoming addicted to prescription pain relievers and street drugs with no medical use; and collecting unused pills to keep them from getting into the wrong hands.

Gov. Ralph Northan, a Shore native and a pediatric neurologist, was there Wednesday to sign a bill into law that authorizes the establishment of opioid fatality review teams. Senate Bill 399 came from the efforts of Wade, Chief Probation Officer Ann Wessells and Sen. Lynwood Lewis, who introduced it to the General Assembly earlier this year.

The law will take effect July 1 and calls for teams to advise health departments and other relevant state agencies on changes to law, policy, or practice to prevent overdoses. It also authorizes the teams to review drugsuspected deaths of Virginians.

"It's already working," Wade said of a program recently presented to about 2,800 local public school students. "Twenty kids

have come forward during or after and sought counseling." One student admitted, "My mom's a heroin addict." He was promptly shown the way to a local agency that was available to help.

The goal is to stop addiction before it starts. Wade said those who have acute pain and are predisposed to addiction can get hooked after using pain medications for three or four days.

School Board Chairman Ronnie Holden said Monday that Miles would be at the next session. He indicated an announcement could be made at that time. Superintendent Chris Holland was not available when he was called, and Assistant Superintendent Rhonda Hall and School Board Clerk Gretta Smith said they had not seen a resignation letter. Miles did not answer her cellphone.

Jodi Greene, chairwoman of the selection commission, answered in an email,

"This position is being advertised."

The ad states the selection commission will hold a public hearing in the board of supervisors' chambers, Tuesday, May 8, at 7:30 p.m. regarding Miles' District 4 post, which expires June 30, 2021.

The seats held by school board members Camesha Handy and Paul Bull, in Election Districts 5 and 6, are also up for grabs because the terms will soon expire.

The appointments for all three seats are scheduled to be made Tuesday, May 15, at 3 p.m.

The referendum that asked if voters want an elected school board in Accomack passed with nearly 72 percent of the vote in November 2017. Elections are not anticipated to occur until 2019.

I wrote recently to report on the special session convened by the governor on April 11 to address the lack of a budget. At this time, the Senate and

House budget committees have not come to an agreement on the budget, but the General Assembly did meet for the annual veto session on April 18.

At veto session, both the Senate and the House voted on the governor's amendments to bills passed during this year's legislative session. We also voted to uphold or override Gov. Ralph Northam's ten vetoes. Most of the governor's amendments were adopted and none of his vetoes received the two-thirds vote needed to be overridden. While many of the governor's amendments received broad bipartisan support, his amendments to strengthen SB106 were rejected on a mostly party line vote. If approved, these amendments would have established real nonpartisan redistricting reforms.

Nonpartisan redistricting has strong support across the political spectrum, but we have been unable to pass any real reform in the Virginia State Legislature. As a proponent of nonpartisan redistricting reform and a consistent sponsor of legislation to improve our redistricting processes in the commonwealth, I am very disappointed to see another push to end political gerrymandering fail. Without the amendments proposed by the governor, this specific legislation should and will likely be vetoed. I will continue to advocate for Virginia voters, who should be the ones selecting their representatives – not the other way around.

In addition to addressing the governor's amendments and vetoes, some committees met to address specified legislation. This included the Privileges and Elections Committee, which met to discuss the explanations for two constitutional amendments that will be on the ballot in November. I was the chief patron of one of these amendments, SJ21, and that amendment would allow localities to grant partial tax exemptions for real estate subject to recurring flooding

gation or resiliency efforts have been taken. The second amendment would permit the surviving spouse of a 100 percent disabled veteran to retain the real estate tax exemption on his or her primary residence even if the spouse moves. I am hopeful that both of these amendments will be approved by voters this fall. At one point, we also hoped that we

would deal with the budget while meeting for veto session. The evening before we met for our veto session, the House voted again to pass a budget that included Medicaid expansion. This version included a stronger work requirement in what appeared to be an effort to gain the support of a few Senate Republicans. Despite those efforts, we still left Richmond

without a budget. The entire General Assembly will be called to Richmond at some point in the coming weeks to vote on a budget. There is no strong indicator of when that will be, but it is looking more and more likely that it may not be until mid-to-late May.

The General Assembly is still in session until we have a finalized budget. All members not based in the Richmond area are bouncing back and forth from their districts to Richmond during this continued special session. I am holding off on scheduling our post-session town halls until we have adjourned with a budget, but my office is available by phone or email to handle questions, concerns and legislative issues of constituents. We recently returned to Richmond this week for the veto session where we discussed changes the governor made to legislation.


He has three options when we send

him our bills. He can sign them into law, veto them, or amend them. If he signs them into law, most will become effective July 1. If he vetoes a bill, as he did to eight of them, we may try to override his decision, but chances are that will not happen due to the parity in both chambers. Additionally, members of the Democratic Party will not vote against the governor. He may also amend a bill. Gov. Ralph Northam amended approximately 30 House bills. Some changes are technical in nature, but others change the actual intent of the bill. This is where we will spend the most time debating, and if we can agree on the bill with the changes, the bills will go to the Senate for its approval. This can be a long day with nerves getting frazzled due to bills being changed in ways the patron might not have wanted them to be changed. In the meantime, some bills are being "held hostage," if you will, because of the ongoing budget negotiations.


We also are trying to agree to a twoyear budget for the state. The House is scheduled to pass a budget this week but the Senate has not posted a date to discuss their budget.







Fishing from
the Shore

Although it has officially been spring for over a month, Mother Nature has hit us with one of the coldest and windiest spring seasons in recent memory. It seems that, for the most part, it has been too cold to fish on the calm days and too windy to safely be in a boat on the warm days.

The fish don't seem to mind though, as flounder, black drum, red drum, and striped bass have appeared, despite the conditions. The weather even looks like it is finally catching up with the forecast for the foreseeable future, calling for highs in the mid 60s to low 70s, and the nighttime temperatures only falling down into the 50s. So, grab your wind suit and hit the water, 'cause as one wise man once put it, "time and tide wait for no man (or woman)."

Lower Shore – Chris Snook of Chris' Bait & Tackle reports that there have been a "handfull" of flounder caught out of Oyster. Both large black and red drum have been caught by anglers surf fishing, as well as by boat fishing, just outside the breakers off the lower barrier islands. One black drum caught from the surf by an unnamed Delaware angler weighed 63 pounds on the shop's scales. Tautog catches have come from around the rock islands and over the tunnel portions of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel when conditions have been suitable for vessels to get there. Chris has heard reports of black drum being caught commercially in the lower bay, but as of Monday, was still waiting for the first confirmed bayside hook-and-line catch. The tackle shop was expecting to receive its first shipment of sea clams this week.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul of Trident Tackle reports that flounder fishing has picked up when the weather conditions are suitable. A party with Captain Sam Parker had 10 keepers over the weekend. Captain Paul said that the shop has seen some "nice-sized" fish, with one angler landing a 24-inch and a 25-inch flounder on the same trip. Flounder catches have come from both the shallow

water flats, as well as the deep water. The shop's flounder tournament starts Friday and runs through next Sunday.

A few black drum have been landed in the surf, and there have been reports of some red drum caught and released on the bayside between Onancock and Pungoteaue Creeks.

Chincoteague – Jimmy Vasilou at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle reports that Paul Elias was leading the shop's flounder tournament as of Monday with a fish weighing 4.15 pounds. Vasilou said that live minnows have been the best bait, followed by Berkley Gulps and silversides fished on a variety of bottom rigs. White and pink were cited as the most productive colors. Vasilou recommended targeting the fish in eight to 15-foot depths, and listed Four Mouths and Watts Bay as two productive areas. Vasilou has seen a fair number of black drum landed in the surf of Assateague Island, with one party landing three on a recent trip.

Donna Rae of Captain Bob's Marina reports that flounder fishing is now "in full force," she too, recommended Four Mouths to Watts Bay, but also included the Canal, north of the Assateague Bridge, and in Chincoteague Bay, as far north as Captain's Cove, as areas producing keeper flatfish. Top catches have come from jumbo minnows paired with pearl white Berkley Swimming Mullets. Some anglers have enjoyed success using Gulp shrimp. Several of the fish have been in the three to four pound range. Donna said that black drum have come from and just outside the surf, with clams being the top drum bait.

Upper Shore – Allan Ring at the SeaHawk Sports Center reports that flounder catches have come from up and down the seaside, especially from Gargatha, Folly Creek, and Wachapreague. Silversides and live minnows have been the top baits. The Maryland trophy striped bass season opened last Saturday, and the shop has seen trophy rock fish up to 50 inches. Allan even got in on the action, landing a

42-inch striper while fishing with his son, Patrick. The best action has come from trolling tandem parachute lures with nine-inch rubber shads. Ring added that white perch catches were coming from the Pocomoke, Manokin, Wicomico, and Nanticoke Rivers, with bloodworms being the preferred bait for these tasty panfish.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named

Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a long-time member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED EQUALIZED REAL PROPERTY TAX RATE (Corrected)

The Board of Supervisors of Northampton County, Virginia, proposes to equalize property tax levies.

- 1. Assessment Increase: Total assessed value of real property, excluding additional assessments due to new construction or improvements to property, is greater than last year's total assessed value of real property by 1.61 percent.
- 2. Lowered Rate Necessary to Offset Increased Assessment: The tax rate which would levy the same amount of real estate tax as last year, when multiplied by the new total assessed value of real estate with the exclusions mentioned above, would be \$0.823 per \$100 of assessed value. The Code of Virginia allows for a 1% growth of the levy which results in an equalized rate of \$0.8313.
- 3. Effective Rate: The Board of Supervisors of Northampton County, Virginia, proposes to adopt a tax rate of \$0.8313 per \$100 of assessed value. Individual property taxes may, however, increase at a percentage greater than or less than the above percentage. A public hearing on the Equalized Tax Rate will be held on May 15, 2018, commencing at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room of the County Administration Building, 16404 Courthouse Road, Eastville, Virginia.
- 4. The Board will convene a separate public hearing on May 29, 2018, commencing at 7:00 p.m., in the Board Room of the County Administration Building, 16404 Courthouse Road, Eastville, Virginia, to consider the proposed FY 2019 budget which may increase, decrease or retain the Equalized Tax Rate.







Cape Charles Is In the Spotlight For House and Garden Tour

Annual Tour Highlights The Area's Seasonal Splendor

Cape Charles will be the focal point of the Eastern Shore's 71st Annual House and Garden Tour.

It is one of 25 tours that make up the statewide Historic Garden Week, organized by local chapters of the Garden Club of Virginia, which has been sponsoring the event for 85 years. Tours are timed to coincide with the peak of spring blooms.

It is the country's only statewide house and garden tour. Proceeds from the tour fund restoration and preservation at more than 40 historic public gardens and landscapes, a research fellowship program, and a new initiative with Virginia state parks.

Eventgoers will note 80 to 100 fresh floral arrangements created by members of the Eastern Shore Garden Club, who also serve as docents. "Our volunteers wear multiple hats and we couldn't manage Historic Garden Week on the Eastern Shore without them," said spokesperson Megan Ames. "On tour day we will have over 130 volunteers helping" with the event.

Four of the six featured homes are open for the first time: 6 Tazewell; the Wilson's Building; and Serenity and Tides Pointe, both situated in the Bay Creek community.

Constructed in 1912 and known locally as "the Dodd house" because it was held in the Horner/Dodd family for 84 years, 6 Tazewell features an striking wraparound porch for relaxing and catching bay breezes. The home was extensively renovated in 2011, but retains original hardwood floors, entryway paneling, and back staircase.

The wraparound porch on this circa 1912 home is a Cape Charles landmark.


The Wilson Building celebrated its 100th birthday in 2017. In the town's heyday as a railroad and ferry dock, Wilson's Department Store bustled with shopping activity. Renovated in 2014, the commercial street level houses shops and galleries, while the upper three floors of what was once the tallest building on the Eastern Shore are loft condominiums. A

Bay Creek, home to both Serenity and Tides

Pointe, was developed on land that belonged to Littleton Waller Tazewell, the 26th governor of Virginia and which was first surveyed by Capt. John Smith.

The entrance to the contemporary English manor home, Serenity, is punctuated by a spiral staircase with dark wood set against white custom woodwork panels. Outdoor space includes azalea, hydrangea, and rhododendron plantings, with a backyard

patio fire pit and Adirondack chairs from which to enjoy views of Plantation Creek.

Built in 2014, Tides Pointe is located on Plantation Creek. Much of the woodwork for this stately residence was milled on site. The owner employed an old tradition of faux marbling on the baseboards and also completed the decorative wall finishes. The informal outdoor garden features native plantings and is framed by a pierced wall.

second time.

Bayholme's expansive porch wraps around three sides of the first floor, and columns set off balconies on the second and third floors.

Although not in Cape Charles, Eyre Hall owner Furlong Baldwin opens his ancestral home annually. The 1758-era manor was recently designated a National Historic Landmark.

Eyre Hall's rambling formal gardens are lined with boxwoods and set off with vibrant floral groupings. "Eyre Hall is always a very strong draw for tourgoers," said Ames. "The gardens are incredible."

While the tour has a dedicated group from the Eastern Shore of Virginia, Ames said the majority of those touring are from Delaware, Maryland, and other parts of Virginia. "It's always incredible to learn how far some folks have traveled for Historic Garden Week in Virginia. Last year we met a couple from Aus-

tralia!" she said.

The House and Garden Tour is Saturday, April 28 only, from 9:30 a.m. until 5 p.m., rain or shine.



Central Park is the Heart of the Town, Heartbeat of Harbor for the Arts

Though it barely feels like spring in many parts of the Eastern Shore, the sounds of summer can already be heard off in the distance in Cape Charles.

The 6th annual Harbor for the Arts free summer concert series will return from mid-June to Labor Day weekend with one of 13 performances most Saturdays at 7 p.m. at Central Park or the Palace Theatre.

2017, with around 4,000 expected in 2018.

Concertgoers are encouraged to arrive early at Central Park to claim their spot on the lawn, as each performance attracts a crowd of 300 to 500. Lawn chairs, coolers, blankets, and picnic items are welcome. Alcohol is allowed, and margaritas will be sold by Citizens for Central Park as part of their fundraising efforts for future concerts. Donations also will be accepted. The organization hopes to raise between \$8,000 and \$9,000 of the event's \$23,000 to \$24,000 yearly budget.

Citizens for Central Park is a nonprofit started in 2001 with the intent of transforming the football field of the former Cape Charles High School into a town park. The field had been abandoned after the school closed.

Citizens for Central Park achieved its original goal of repurposing the old football field into a town park for all Cape Charles residents and visitors to enjoy. Treasurer Hank Mayer said more than \$1 million was invested in its transformation, including installation of sidewalks, lights, restrooms, playground equipment, and the gazebo which serves as the park's hub and center stage for its outdoor concerts.

Since the park's creation, Citizens for Central Park have turned their attention toward managing and promoting park events like Harbor for the Arts, which they sponsor in partnership with fellow Cape Charles nonprofit, Arts Enter, and the town.

Harbor for the Arts features Virginia musical acts exclusively and is supported by organizations such as the Virginia Commission for the Arts and the Virginia Tourism Commission.

The Harbor for the Arts music festival website — https://www.hfa-festival.com/ — is currently under construction and will be updated with more information soon. Updates will also be posted on the Citizens for Central Park Facebook page.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY EVENT EXAMINES LIFE OF JOHN SERGEANT WISE

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Historical Society is hosting Shore historians Dennis Custis and Kellee Blake for an evening of memorable stories about the illustrious John Sergeant Wise (1846-1913), attorney, congressman, Virginia Military Institute cadet, Civil War soldier, author, and son of Gov. Henry A. Wise.

The life adventures of Wise, a child of the Shore, were the stuff of movies, as was his Chesapeake Bay dream home, Kiptopeke, at the southern tip of Northampton County.

Wise's social circle included great authors, politicians, and military leaders of his day, including Mark Twain and the Astors. Among his correspondents were Theodore Roosevelt; Henry Irving; Grover Cleveland; and Varina Davis, widow of Jefferson Davis. Popular and widely respected, Wise was the Republican gubernatorial candidate in the 1885 Virginia race but lost to Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, son of Robert E. Lee.

In December 2017, precious Wise family items came up for sale in Northern auctions. Some were rescued to be returned to Virginia and the Shore. Others were scattered in perpetuity to autograph collectors around the world, likely unavailable to future researchers. The discussion will address what can be done to better support and protect institutions committed to gathering collections and telling stories such as Wise's.

The event is scheduled for Friday, May 4, 6 p.m. at the Palace Theatre in Cape Charles. Admission is \$25 for Historical Society members, \$30 for not-yet members.

Virginia's crabbing season began April 1 this year, but the safety of local watermen is no April Fools' joke.

In honor and celebration of all those who have made or make their living off the water, Cape Charles Harbor will hold its 11th annual Blessing of the Fleet, Friday, April 27, from 6 to 10 p.m.

This year's Blessing of the Fleet will be held at the harbor, in front of the watermen's memorial, near The Shanty restaurant, which partnered with the town and harbor to sponsor the event.

The Blessing of the Fleet is an opportunity for local working watermen to gather together and for church congregations to unite, regardless of denomination, offering prayers for the safety of working watermen, Cape Charles harbormaster, Charlie Farlow said.

Cape Charles Community Events and Recreational Director, Jen Lewis, will emcee, with remarks by Mayor George Proto. It will be Proto's last Blessing of the Fleet as mayor before his term expires June 30. He is not seeking re-election.

Local clergy who will participate are Father Michael Breslin, the Rev. Russell Goodrich, the Rev. Felton Sessoms, and the Rev. Jeff Conrow, repre-

senting a variety of faiths on the lower Shore.

The event will open with the Cape Charles Coast Guard Station performing the presentation of colors and the band, Off The Hook, playing the Star-Spangled Banner.

The Blessing of the Fleet will be flanked by a time of thanksgiving for watermen and prayer for those lost at sea, followed by the tolling of the ship's bell and throwing of the wreath.

The ship's bell is tolled once for every soul lost at sea in the past year. The throwing of the wreath is a yearly tradition upheld by the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary honoring those lost. The wreath is then towed out into the Chesapeake Bay.

The ceremony will conclude with a cannon salute by the American Legion Post 56 Honor Guard and final prayer.

Guests are invited to stay for more music by Off The Hook, including some nautical-themed tunes, and light refreshments. The Shanty will be selling appetizers and other items, with proceeds benefiting the unfinished memorial.

Inventory Documents Health and History of Cape Charles Trees

Trees and shrubs lining the streets and sidewalks are essential to small town charm, and Cape Charles not only has an abundance, it has a complete inventory, thanks to the work of the Eastern Shore Master Naturalists.

At the request of the Cape Charles Historic District Review Board, and under the direction of master naturalist Barbara O'Hare, the team conducted the tree survey over the course of three months last year. The inventory in the town's master tree plan had not been updated since the plan was originally published in 2006.

A leisurely stroll on a warm, sunny day through the town's historic district reveals many of Cape Charles' signature trees, from nonnative crepe myrtles and cedars to native maples, oaks, sycamores, pecans, and basswoods.

Other highlights noted in the tree inventory include a native bald cypress on Randolph Avenue, an old cedar of Lebanon on Peach Street, and a 50-year-old blue spruce on Harbor Avenue.

The little beach town boasts some big trees as well. The tallest trees recorded in the inventory are a group of three 90-foot pecan trees on Madison Avenue. The average pecan tree grows 40 to 75 feet tall.

Other tall trees to look up to in Cape Charles are a 75-foot hackberry on Monroe Avenue and a 70-foot basswood on Madison Avenue.

A Japanese maple on Monroe Avenue flourishes with a 25-foot canopy that makes the tree as wide as it is tall.

The tree inventory will help the town make decisions on the best choices for landscaping, preserving both Cape Charles' history and the health of its signature and native trees.



If you ever doubted the existence of Chessie, the sea monster who lives in the Chesapeake Bay, it is time to put those thoughts aside.

Yes, there really is a Chessie. She's 42 feet in diameter, more than 325 feet long, and she just got a job at the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel (CBBT). Chessie is going to excavate a mile-long tunnel under the Thimble Shoal Channel that will cost \$756 million. That serpent sounds like a real go-getter to me.

Okay, so I have to admit that this Chessie was just given her name by Grace Bentley of Nandua Middle School as part of a naming contest. Yippee for Grace! Chessie is also a massive tunnel boring machine (TBM) and is being manufactured in Germany, so she hasn't arrived vet.

Chessie was the natural choice for the machine, according to an announcement made by CBBT officials. "The name has remained popular in the Chesapeake Bay region for years and personifies many things, including boats, trains, trails and animals."

The new tunnel will run parallel to an

existing one used by more than four million vehicles annually in the journey from Kiptopeke to Virginia Beach. The new passageway will have two lanes of southbound traffic. It will be the first transportation tunnel constructed by a tunnel boring machine, also known as a mole, in the Hampton Roads area. The launching ceremony is scheduled for 2019.

Another reason to cheer for Grace is her name suggestion was selected from among more than 120 entries from 6th grade students in Virginia Beach, Norfolk, Chesapeake, Portsmouth, Hampton, Newport News, and the Eastern Shore.

Giving a feminine name to a TBM comes from early mining traditions when miners looked to Saint Barbara to protect them as they worked underground. Naming the machine before the work begins is good luck for the project. I'm in favor of that.

Shore students also came in second and third place in the competition. Caleb McIntyre of Broadwater Academy suggested the TBM be called BESSY the Boring Bufflehead. Shania Finley of Kiptopeke Elementary wanted it to be named Ms. Taylor, after one of her favorite bus drivers. Yippee for Ms. Taylor!

"The woman I chose is a real person," Shania said in the entry. "She drives bus 39 at Kiptopeke Elementary School. ... She is kind, helpful, nice, and caring. ... The reason I chose her name is because of what she has done for me. One day when I got on the bus, I started to get bullied and she was the one to make it stop." When Shania isn't on the bus, Ms. Taylor looks out for Shania's two

younger brothers so they don't get teased.

"In my opinion, I really think she is a good person." Shania entered the contest because she didn't think anyone else would write about his or her bus driver. "I wanted to think outside the box," she said.

"Every student who participated in this naming contest is to be commended, as their entries expressed a lot of thought and creativity," said Jeff Holland, executive director of CBBT. "The commission extends congratulations to the winners ... We look forward to the students, teachers, and their classes continuing to follow the progress of this tunnel project until it is completed."

Chessie is also the name of a cat used as a symbol of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad and derived from an etching by Guido Gruenwald. The urban dictionary describes Chessie as a tall, Caucasian girl, usually very pretty, very polite and dignified. Chessie is also a male West Indian Manatee. In 1994, he earned his name by showing up in Chesapeake Bay.
