Lose Yourself On The Beach And Make The Find Of A Lifetime

It's a time-honored tradition to walk the water's edge, lost in thought as the waves lash against the sand, heaving their daily offerings onto the shore.

The thrill of discovering what is waiting on the beach is enough to compel beachgoers out of bed in the morning, and with 36 miles of beach in the Assateague Island National Seashore, there's plenty of coastline to explore.

We asked readers about their best beachcombing finds and they did not disappoint.

"One day as I was walking down the beach of Assateague, I was wading in the water and I was grabbing whatever the ocean handed me in the waves," said Emily Guemple, of Parksley. Handful after handful yielded only sand and broken shells and she was ready to return home, when "that last wave

Grant Will Help Field Station Better Serve Community

Chincoteague Bay Field Station received a \$25,000 grant from the Eastern Shore of Virginia Community Foundation to support the upgrade and expansion of its transportation fleet.

The grant allowed for the purchase of two used school buses and a used vehicle for the outreach program. A dedicated outreach vehicle will allow the field station to increase programs at local schools, community centers, and events. Specifically, the vehicle will allow the field station to expand its Shore People Advancing Readiness for Knowledge (SPARK) after-school program into Kegotank, Accawmacke, and Pungoteague elementary schools.







handed over (the) treasure." At first it wasn't clear she was holding anything special, "but I saw two eye sockets and then two nostrils. ... This thing started looking more and more like a baby dragon skull." Through her research she determined it was a prehistoric sea robin skull that had petrified. A sea robin is a bottom-feeding fish that gets its name from the large pectoral fins which, when in use, resemble a flying bird.

"There are always things washing up here," said Heather McDaniel, lead seasonal interpretive park ranger at Assateague National Seashore. Many variables affect what a beachcomber might find on any given day. "It depends on how far you walk and how slowly you walk," she said. Storms also play a role because "storms dislodge things."

The migratory nature of barrier islands is a factor as well. "Assateague is constantly rolling over itself," said McDaniel, burying what was once visible and uncovering what was buried.

Kimberly Blackwelder, of Landenberg, Pa., has spent many summers on the Assateague beach. She has been visiting Chincoteague since first grade and was married at the Channel Bass Inn in 2009.

Blackwelder recounts the time she floated out in an inner tube "because I could see the sun reflecting off of something." Her parents waved from the shore for her to come back, but "I was determined to see what it was."

What she found was a bottle with a note inside. "My family had a great time opening the bottle and reading the message. I no longer remember what it said, but I have great memories of carrying that bottle back to shore," she said.

Faith Sturgis, of Painter, found something valuable in the sand the summer before her high school senior year. "I was on the beach and just sitting on my towel talking," she said. "I reached my hand in the sand and felt something. It was a class ring." She and her grandmother located and called the school depicted on the ring (at a time before Google) and the school's guidance department helped them get in touch with the young man who had it.

"He said that he and his friends looked for a couple of hours." She mailed it back to him. "He sent me some money for finding his ring, but I sent it back," said Sturgis. "We ended up corresponding during my senior year and guess who showed up to my graduation? Yep, you guessed it!"

Others, like Linda Hess, find beauty in the natural features like shells and driftwood. "I found a beautiful piece of driftwood with a natural cross in the wood," she said. "I had it painted with 'Be still and know that I am God."

"Everything washes up here at some point," McDaniel said. Last year, lifeguards found an entire whale vertebrae in the surf and dragged it to shore, stash-

ing it under the guards' chairs. "They educated people about it for a day or so" before taking it to the visitor center. Mammal remains, like the whale vertebrae, are completely off limits for taking from the national seashore.

More common discoveries for beachcombers are "lots of different shells," egg casings, fish bones, fishing tackle, and jellyfish. "If people have questions about what they have found, they are welcome to come in to the visitor center," said McDaniel.

One gallon of "unoccupied shells" per person per day may be taken from the beach, so be sure to check shells for snails and hermit crabs or other critters who might have made the shells their home.

"If you take the time to look, you can find some cool stuff," said McDaniel.

Some say their best finds are not tangible: they are memories of meaningful moments.

"Last time I was there (years and years ago) there was a storm offshore and some dolphins were swimming close to shore," said Doug Kerins, who now lives in Texas. "That was a super day."

Denise Brown, of Greenbackville, had a similar experience last fall. She had walked north on the beach to find a quiet spot to sit and enjoy the sea. "I noticed dolphins playing," she said. "They were fairly close to the shore and the waves were high. All of a sudden three of them ride the wave in. They were actually inside the wave curl."

She was unable to get her phone out in time to record the moment, but it is one she won't forget. "It was incredible!"

Beach Paws Photography had a hard time choosing and submitted several images as favorites, including a seal and beached sturgeon (both on Page 4).

Other intangibles mentioned were peace and tranquility.

"Riding down the beach with the ponies walking in the surf beside me, that's what I found to be extra special to me," said Roy Ballard, of Exmore.

Perhaps the greatest finds were made not by those looking down for treasure cast upon the shore, but looking up to find their prizes already gazing toward them.

Safe Cycling On Chincoteague

During tourism season, Chincoteague's population swells with visitors seeing the sights, which means more vehicles of every kind are on the road, including bicycles. They are a fun way to explore the island and a great family activity, but nothing can ruin a fun trip like an accident or injury.

To assist cyclists, the Chincoteague Police Department has published a map with recommended routes based on traffic volumes and road features, and scenic routes. The map can be found online at https://chincoteagueva.gov/files/BIKEMAP2.pdf

In some areas, bike lanes and shared-use paths provide an alternative to riding in the travel lane. A dedicated bike lane runs along Maddox Boulevard from Deep Hole Road to the Museum of Chincoteague where the shared-use bicycle/pedestrian path to the wildlife refuge begins. A shared-use path also follows Deep Hole Road from the intersection with Maddox Boulevard to Hallie Whealton Smith Drive. For safety's sake, bicyclists must not carry articles which prevent them from keeping at least one hand on the handlebars and must not carry more people than the bicycle is designed to accommodate, except for adult bicyclists carrying a child under six years of age securely attached to the bicycle in a seat or trailer designed to carry children. Also, bicyclists may not attach themselves or their bicycles to any other vehicle on the roadway, nor are they permitted to wear earphones in both ears while riding a bicycle.

If a bicycle is operating on the roadway, it is considered a vehicle under the code of Virginia and has the same rights and duties as other vehicles. Some of those are to move in the same direction as traffic, stop at stop signs and signals, signal for turns, and yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.


Bicyclists on sidewalks, shared-use paths, and crosswalks have all the rights and duties of pedestrians under the same circumstance. If crossing highways at clearly marked crosswalks. they must come to a complete stop at stop signs prior to entering such crosswalk. If there isn't a stop sign or other signal, they aren't required to stop, but cannot disregard oncoming traffic.

Even though cyclists have to obey all signals, under certain circumstances bicyclists, motorcycles, and mopeds may proceed through a proceed through a nonresponsive solid red light at an intersection, but only if the driver or rider:


- Comes to a full stop at the intersection for two complete cycles of the traffic light or for two minutes, whichever is shorter.
- Exercises due care as provided by law.
- Otherwise treats the traffic control device as a stop sign.
- Determines that it is safe to proceed.
- Yields the right of way to the driver of any vehicle approaching on such other highway from either direction.

There are also stipulations about where bicyclists can ride.

- Ride with the flow of traffic on the right side of the highway.
- If operating on a roadway at less than the normal speed of traffic, ride as close as safely practicable to the right curb or edge of roadway.
- Exceptions to this are when overtaking and passing another vehicle in the same direction, preparing for a left turn, avoiding unsafe conditions, avoiding riding in a lane that turns or diverges to the right, riding on a one-way street where bicyclists may ride near the left-hand curb or edge of roadway, or when the lane width is too narrow to share with a motor vehicle.
- Bicycles are not excluded from riding on the highway shoulder.
- Do not ride between two lanes of

traffic moving in the same direction unless one lane is a separate or mandatory turn lane.

- Do not ride more than two abreast on highways. When riding two abreast, bicyclists cannot impede the movement of traffic and need to move into a single file when being overtaken from the rear. On a laned roadway, bicyclists shall ride in a single lane.
- Bicycles may be ridden on sidewalks unless prohibited by local ordinance or traffic control devices.
 While on sidewalks and shared-use

- paths, bicyclists must always yield the right of way to pedestrians and give an audible signal before passing a pedestrian.
- Bicyclists pulling onto a sidewalk or highway from a driveway must yield the right of way to pedestrians or vehicles already on the sidewalk or highway.



Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

Yellowfin tuna offshore and cobia in the lower Chesapeake Bay have highlighted the angling action over the last week as the recent run of nice weather has pleased both anglers and tackle shop operators. One tackle shop reported that every boat they were aware of which ventured offshore to the canyons was rewarded with catches of yellowfins. Cobia remain abundant in the lower bay, but anglers are having to work to find keeper-sized fish.

Lower Shore — Mark Snook at Chris' Bait & Tackle reported there were plenty of cobia to be found in the area between Cape Charles and the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Small spadefish were being caught around the bridge-tunnel's fourth island. The fantastic run of red drum seems to have slowed down a bit, but a few small black drum remain in the surf of the lower barrier islands. Croaker catches of up to a half cooler full were being made out of Oyster. Latimer Shoals was producing catches of sea mullet.

Jeb Brady at Bailey's Bait & Tackle reported there has been "some really good cobia action with anglers having some really good days, but lots of shorts." He cited the area around buoy 36-A as well as the shoals along the bridge-tunnel as productive locations for cobia. Flounder action was still going on in the "Ditch."

Wachapreague — Captain Lindsay Paul at Trident Tackle reported that anglers had "a pretty decent weekend" out of Wachapreague. Flounder anglers were finding a few more keepers for their efforts, although there were still plenty of throwbacks. Croakers have arrived, but they are small in size. Captain Paul said that offshore anglers were finding yellowfin tuna in the Washington Canyon, as well as in Bob's Canyon. A few dolphin (mahi) and even a couple of makos were included in the catches. One of the makos was caught while trolling for tuna, the other was caught while shark fishing

along the 20 fathom line. False albacore were "everywhere" from the canyons inshore to the Hills.

Chincoteague — Donna Rae at Captain Bob's Marina reported that fishing over Blackfish Banks really heated up over the weekend with flounder in the 22- to 24-inch range.

Black sea bass, spadefish, and triggerfish rounded out the catches. Offshore, bigeye tuna and large yellowfin tuna catches came in from the Washington and the Poor Man's canyons. Shark action was on the increase as three-foot-long Atlantic finetooth shark catches were reported. A nice-sized sand tiger was caught and released in the Assateague surf. Croakers measuring 8- to 12-inches, 13- to 14-inch kingfish/whiting, and mostly throwback flounder dominated the action on the inside. Small cobia catches were reported from the Chincoteague Channel in front of the Waterside Inn.

Jimmy Vasilou at Captain Steve's

Bait and Tackle reported that the Rumer Has It won the Frederick Tuna Tournament held last weekend with a 79-pound, 3-ounce bigeye tuna that was caught by Terry Conrad. The shop also weighed in a 177-pound bluefin tuna caught in the Poor Man's Canvon over the weekend for Robert Dobart. The Huntress had a limit catch of black sea bass from an offshore wreck, while catches of spadefish, gray triggerfish and a few keeper seabass were being made over some of the inshore wrecks. A 7-foot sandtiger was released by a surf fisherman. Kingfish/ whiting and sharks comprised most of the catches being made by surf fishermen. Pinhead croakers were starting to show up, with action reported from the dock at Robert Reed Park as well as in Deep Hole. A few keeper flounder are still around and Bob Miller stopped by the shop with three nice flatfish. A 3-pound, 2-ounce largemouth bass took first place in a recent tournament held at the Wallops Mill Pond.

Upper Shore — Captain Matt Abell reported that the big fishing news centered on the yellowfin tuna bite. Matt reported that everybody caught tuna along with a few dolphin/mahi. Steve Shumaker had a large blue marlin release in the Washington Canyon. Catches of triggers

and spadefish were reported from the wrecks and large flounder were caught along the rail cars out of Chincoteague. The best flounder action that was reported came from Wachapreague, where a total of nine keeper fish were made by a three-person fishing party. Brian Sheats and sons had a catch of three cobia, one of which was a keeper, in the lower bay. Bottom fishing in Pocomoke Sound was slow, with only a few kingfish catches reported.




