
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

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

Manna Cafe's Mission To Feed the Hungry Becomes Ministry That Feeds the Heart of an Island

In the Bible, manna is the miracle food God sent the wandering Israelites. It might be a stretch to call the food served by Chincoteague's Manna Cafe miraculous, but the ministry, which offers a free meal open to everyone in the fellowship hall of Chincoteague's Christ United Methodist Church every Monday from 11 a.m - 1 p.m., is based on biblical principles for its success.

The cafe feeds more than 400 each week. Most would find that overwhelming, but cafe founders Bill and Fran Lytle cut their teeth on a feeding ministry in Princeton, N.J., their home before moving to Chincoteague 10 years ago.

Fran Lytle cited two biblical principles. The first is to help those who cannot repay you. The second is to use your talents. "God gives every one of us gifts," she said. "Bill and I have gifts for hospitality."

"We had the skill set," she continued, "the managing, shopping, cooking," and the couple knew there were food insecure people on the island, so with

a cadre of core volunteers, they began their food ministry. Bill Lytle is the head chef and Fran Lytle is the director. Sixteen people turned up to eat the first week in January 2017.

With some publicity it started to grow and to draw not only those who needed food but those in need of connection and conversation, including "the elderly, who can become lonely or isolated," Fran Lytle said. Donations have been plentiful and sponsors have kicked in for entire meals. The June 4 meal was sponsored by Taylor Bank.

The Lytles, branding consultants by trade, repackaged the cafe's message to "everyone is welcome," and soon everyone was there. By the summer of 2017, more than 300 guests were joining the weekly meals, and they are closing in on 400 in the hall and more than 40 meals delivered each week.

It is so much more than a meal, says Fran Lytle. Senior citizens greet friends and make new ones. Island visitors come to hear stories from local residents. "It evolved based on the actual needs of the people on the

island," she said. One of the volunteers said it's like the TV show "Cheers."

"Without beer," Lytle quipped.

"It's a nice place for senior citizens," said Susan Jester who was dining at the cafe recently.

Donald Jester said he enjoys making new friends. "Everyone is so gentle," he said.

A nice side benefit of everyone dining together is it's hard to know who is there out of necessity, so there is no stigma attached to dining at the Manna Cafe. "I think it makes everyone more comfortable," said volunteer Valerie Tolbert.

From 9 until about 10:30 a.m. kitchen volunteers are busy readying the day's meal, servers are bustling to prepare their stations, a two-person cleanup team is at the ready for quick dish turnaround, and a group of committed volunteer drivers is staging to package meals to be taken to homebound residents. The menu was hot dogs, chili, sauerkraut, baked beans, salad, watermelon, desserts, and beverages. In the dining hall, 383 guests were served. Fortyfour meals were taken to homebound neighbors.

Each week tables along sidewalls invite guests to select a food or personal care item to take home. In the

back of the room is the Loving Hearts and Hands table, where guests can purchase items for "any amount or no amount at all," Lytle said. Volunteer Joyce Westberry started the tables after bringing in a few items she made and putting them on the "take one" tables. She noticed they went quickly and thought maybe lunch guests would like the chance to find inexpensive items for their homes or family members. The informal shop has proven very popular. "As soon as they walk in the door they come right back," she said.

Some volunteers have been with the Lytles since the beginning, and others cycle in and out, but one thing is clear: being at the cafe is a joyful experience. "Everyone is happy. I don't think I've seen a grumpy face since we started," said Barbara Mason. "They walk in the door and they're looking for us."

"We don't want to miss it," added Marjorie Hiob, another volunteer.

The volunteers get to know the guests by name, and ask about their family members who usually come along if they don't see them, said Lytle.

The meal delivery drivers, from St. Andrews Catholic Church, also look out for the people on

their meal routes. "I'm very attached to these people," said Amy Jo Krystek, many of whom can't come to the door for their meals. In some cases the drivers are their best links to the outside world, reporting back when assistance is required or taking winter coats when needed.

The Manna Cafe has fans far and wide. "The generosity and compassion shown by the people of this little island is what drew me in on my first visit over 20 years ago," commented Elizabeth Wray, of Pulaski, Va. "Manna Cafe is a perfect example of what can be done with a little effort and a lot of love!"

Wray's comments were left on Facebook in response to a nomination of Manna Cafe as one of Reader's Digest's Nicest Places in America. A "nicest place" is "one where the people believe in kindness, civility, and each other, neighbors help each other out, and strangers are welcomed as friends," according to the magazine website.

Judging began on June 5. Qualifying entries will be viewable on www.rd.com, and finalists will be viewable at www.10Best.com

There could be more "nice places" springing up. Several of the tourists who have visited the Manna Cafe have been very impressed with the operation. "They go back home and start initiatives like this in their own communities," said Lytle. "Isn't that a wonderful thing?"

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Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

Reports of red drum catches behind the breakers of the lower shore barrier islands have fallen off greatly over the last weekend, but it has nothing to do with a decline in the number of available red drum in the area. It has everything to do with anglers shifting their attention and fishing efforts over to cobia.

Cobia season opened last Friday and the southern portion of the Chesapeake Bay is one of the top areas for catching this tough battler affectionately known as "the man in the brown suit." Cobia anglers can be seen from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel as they cruise the bridge and nearby flats in small boats with large towers, attempting to spot the fish as they glide just under the surface.

Cobia will hit a number of baits including large bucktails, spoons, live spot, small bluefish, and eels, or can be caught by anchoring and chumming with menhaden while using chunks of menhaden (aka bunker) as bait fished from fishfinder rigs on the bottom.

Lower Shore — Jeb Brady at Bailey's Bait & Tackle reports that the cobia bite has been good with keeper-sized cobia landed along with plenty of throwbacks. Most of the cobia anglers have been concentrating on the area from the Cabbage Patch down to the bridge-tunnel. The shop has received reports of flounder catches from Ship Shoal Inlet out of Oyster, as well as in the Ditch. Catches of sea mullet were reported from the Kiptopeke State Park Pier over the weekend.

Chris Snook at Chris' Bait & Tackle reported that black drum are still available by the bridge and off Fisherman's Island, but they have been smaller in size. Red drum were still in the breakers. The shop had seen a "handful" of sheepshead brought in and spadefish have made their appearance off the fourth island of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Anglers fishing out of Oyster were finding croaker. Flounder action was reported from Wise Point, the Ditch, and off Kiptopeke's concrete ships, while pier anglers were catching a mixed bag of flounder, croaker, and sea mullet. When conditions were favorable, anglers were spotting up to 20 cobia per trip from their towers, but a lot of the fish have been on the small side. The shop is stocking fresh and frozen bunker, as well as chum and live eels.

Wachapreague — Captain Lindsay Paul at Trident Tackle reports that anglers are finding "a few flounder, but nothing hot and heavy recently." Captains Sam Parker and Nat Atkinson found decent numbers of flatfish over the weekend but had lots of throwbacks just below the 16.5-inch minimum size limit. One captain returned from an offshore trip with a catch of tasty tilefish. Catches of false albacore were made over the Lumpy Bottom and Sam's Hill.

Chincoteague — Donna Rae at Captain Bob's Marina reported that flounder action has improved during periods between the recent wind and rain. Flounder action was reported on the north and south side of Queen Sound bridge, up to the area around Buoy #4. Action in Assateague Channel has fallen off, probably due to the intense concentration of anglers targeting flounder there over the last few weeks. Increasing numbers of small croaker, as well as larger-sized kingfish/ whiting, are showing up in the inlet. Keeper gray trout catches have come from the southwest area of Queen Sound, opposite the sandbar, directly in front of the marina and catches of bluefish have come from inside Chincoteague Channel. The annual Captain Bob's Marina Flounder Tournament started on June 7 and will run through Sunday, June 10. The largest flounder will be worth \$1,500 to the angler!

Jimmy Vasilou at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle reported that the waters of Assateague Channel were hot last weekend, producing some nice-sized flounder. Gulp baits combined with minnows or silversides and fished on Aqua Clear rigs have been very successful producers, second only to the East Coast flounder rigs in the chartreuse color version. Bob and Bonnie Jagger enjoyed a successful flounder trip on Monday, using Berkley Gulp and minnow combinations. Black drum are still dominating the action in the Assateague surf, with the biggest recent catch made by Sheryl Turner weighing in at 70 pounds. King can be found in numbers and are hitting bloodworms or Fish Bites.

Upper Shore — Captain Matt Abell at the Sea Hawk Sports Center reports that anglers have seen a slight increase in the number of speckled trout inside Pocomoke Sound recently. A good bite was reported on Saturday, mostly by anglers casting artificials. Hunter Hickman boated a 26-inch speckled trout on Monday. Flounder action has been very good on the flats during last of the ebb tide through the first of the flood. A recent charter boated 35 flounder, finding seven keeper-sized fish. Matt verified the good start to the cobia season as customers reported fish up to 47 inches in the lower Chesapeake.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the

Year. Bill is an IGFA International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.



Posted at Sea Level

Now there is a perfect beer for everyone. Even me and I don't usually like the stuff. It's called "Cranky," which is probably part of the reason I fell for it. But don't believe the name. It depicts an ill-tempered or irritable grouch, but it is none of that.

In a way, it is typical Eastern Shore. It's described one way and is really the opposite. Example: "That Chincoteague Pony is lame," he said after it kicked him in the ribs. "She's an ugly one," he said, describing a most beautiful woman.

Cranky is a light farmhouse ale created at the Black Narrows Brewing Company on Chicken City Road, on Chincoteague, which is the first craft brewery on the Shore. It is part of the Infinite Sky Collection and includes melon, black pepper, and shortbread. And it is the smoothest beer I have ever tasted.

Okay, so my experience with beer is limited. I drank a few Schlitz in college. And I never fared well with that. I tried the little "pony" Millers that family members drank. Blah. Then, I tasted a beer with lime in it and it left me sour. But now, if there was nothing to drink and I was on a remote barrier island thirsting to death, I would turn and ask for a Cranky. Oh yes, I would. I'm just trying to sound like a true Eastern Shore woman.

Last weekend, I was on the island on my way to the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge with the goal of photographing some of



the awesome birds there. My boyfriend, Doug, came along to check out the brewery. So, we stopped by and he ordered the sample combo. There were six four-ounce beers served in canning jars. They were separated in half and came in crate-like holders.

We were told Cranky was the favorite. I usually don't follow the crowd so I wasn't impressed by that information. But I thought I would give it a try. I thought I would try little sips of a couple of them before asking for a bottle of water. I was surprised to find I could put my stamp of approval on three. Cranky, Salts, and Little Bay, in that order, won. Yippee!

Salts, considered the "Mainstay," has tart oyster and wheat and is described as briny, marsh, and lemon. It had the flavor of oyster juice left in the shell after downing the raw mollusk. I could imagine it with melted butter on top. Yippee!

Little Bay, also called Eastern Shore Saison, was described as bright, funky, and floral. It wasn't particularly flowery or funky. But it was a contender for bright.

Doug, who is a beer enthusiast, also favored Cranky and finished the glass. The same went for some stuff called "Good Morning, Good Afternoon, Goodnight," that was a cocoa bean stout described as smooth, roasted, and mocha. That was the strongest and to me tasted bitter. Doug said it was "sweet."

Neither of us was impressed with the beer

called "Plum Wild." We are going to be nice and leave it at that. Well, let me try again, I guess people could rinse their hair with it.

Ulysses' Revenge, a fruited wild ale with strawberry, is also not for me. Ugh, I can't eat strawberries, they make my face breakout. But others seemed to enjoy it.

There were two Philadelphia men sitting on the other side of me. The older one wouldn't give his name or let me take his picture. He was mixing the cocoa bean stout with the Cranky and called it black and tan, a favorite of western Pennsylvanians, he said. His son-in-law was much friendlier. He posed for a photo, spelled his name, Vittorio Meronyck Jr. (above left), and was enjoying Salts. They were visiting Chincoteague for a birthday celebration.
