Jury Returns Verdict in Homicide Trial

A jury found Brian Terrell Walker guilty of involuntary manslaughter last Friday in Accomack Circuit Court in connection with the 2010 death of his fiancée's 11-month-old son and recommended a sentence of five years in prison.

Judge Stephen Mahan did not formally accept the finding, took under advisement the defense lawyer's motions for both dismissal and setting aside the verdict, and ordered a presentence report for the 25-year-old Northampton man who was taken back to Accomack County Jail.

The child, Isaiah Russell of Justiceville Road near Parksley, died last year from "blunt-force head injuries," a medical examiner testified during the trial. She said the boy's skull was fractured in three places, his brain was swollen and the encompassing membranes and his retinas hemorrhaged. In addition, bruises marked his face, head, shin, elbow and buttocks and the child's optic nerves had bled.

The judge said he would receive written arguments regarding the verdict from defense lawyer Benjamin Hamlet of Virginia Beach before sentencing.

"Although there was a theory ... of time of injuries of the child in this case ... specific evidence was not the exclusive solution a reasonable fact finder might have reached," said Mahan. "The court obviously does not know what the jury concluded in there."

The judge said verbal arguments from both the defense and the prosecution would be heard at sentencing. A date has not been set.

The judge made himself available to the jurors for more than an hour after

Accomack Eliminates Lobbyist Service

In a 6-3 vote Wednesday, Accomack supervisors decided not to continue using the services of a lobbying firm that was costing the county \$6,500 a month. Its contract ends on June 30.

"All of us have a code we live by ...
there is no way in the world I can vote
for" extending the contract, said Supervisor Grayson Chesser. "The people of
Accomack County sense this is wrong."

Chesser volunteered to go to Washington, in place of the lobbyist, to convince Congress to pass a proposed bill that would offer Accomack an exemption from the requirement to purchase \$820,000 worth of property in order to use federal recreational land at Wallops Research Park.

"T've been before," Chesser said of Congress. "I promise you they (people he knows) will help me ... I'll do my

Chesser said he tries to be agreeable. "I can't be on this. I'd rather be shot for being a stubborn mule than sheared like a sheep."

"This piece of property sits in the middle of the park," said Supervisor Wanda Thornton. She favored using lobbyist Rob Catron of Alcade & Fay, Ltd. The lobbyist pleaded for the work at a session last month, but was not in attendance Wednesday. "You don't get anything if you don't have a lobbyist," said Thornton. "The bill wouldn't have been written if we hadn't had somebody help. If you can't be there on a daily basis, it's a lost cause."

In the end, Chairman Donald Hart, Vice Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy and Supervisors Chesser, Robert Crockett, Sandy Hart-Mears and Jack Gray voted against extending the lobbyist's contract until the end of 2011. Supervisors Thornton, Reneta Major and Ron Wolff were in favor of the contract.

Thornton criticized as lobbyists other organizations, such as the state sheriff's association, which Crockett headed for several years, and the Virginia Association of Counties, over which Hart once presided.

"My constituents have more intelli-

gence then she says they have," Crockett responded. "Everybody without a doubt is against" paying a lobbyist. "Who am I to say they are wrong?" Crockett complained of the lobbying efforts to keep the firm. "A former congresswoman has being calling people to try to keep this lobbyist."

Crockett said Catron "wants a never-ending relationship. I don't think so. I'm there to represent ... my district."

Wolff said while Crockett made some "very good points," the sheriff's association sees "the need for a lobbyist ... why are we any different? We need a voice ... Mr. Chesser doesn't leave the county all that often, the lobbyist is in DC day in and day out."

"We need Wallops Research Park," said Wolff "We need jobs. We need that infrastructure." Wolff said over the

Cupid Not Welcome in Northampton County

A local property owner who has been seeking approval for a plan to create a wedding venue was turned away by the Northampton County Board of Supervisors Tuesday.

For the past three months, William Parr has attempted to obtain a minor special-use permit to allow a refurbished 125-year-old barn to be used for special events. The county Planning Commission fielded a host of public hearings, during which many property owners spoke against the plan. Citing dangers such as noise, increased traffic, and the risk of intoxicated guests causing accidents, the speakers demanded that the supervisors turn down Parr's request.

Supervisor Sam Long argued that the Zoning Ordinance and Comprehensive Plan both support the concept of agritourism, thus he could not see how the county could oppose an individual who actually wished to create such a venue. Speaking of the number of visitors who might come for such an event and spend money in nearby hotels and restaurants, Long stated, "It could be a net benefit for the County. I truly hope, Mr. Chairman. that tonight we can break the stranglehold cycle on the past, and support Mr. Parr's application."

Speaking against the application, Supervisor Spencer Murray spoke of the value of agri-tourism and the need to bring in tourist dollars, but noted that he would listen to those who spoke against the request.

Supervisor Richard Tankard indicated that he has always supported businesses in the county, but was concerned

that this request was not compatible support the zoning amendment. with agricultural uses for the area.

Supervisors Oliver Bennett and Chairman Willie Randall both stated that they would heed the wishes of the constituents who opposed the project.

In the end, after nearly two hours of speakers and debate, the board voted 5-1 (Long supporting the application). to turn down Parr's request.

A second point of contention for the evening surrounded a request by the board itself to amend zoning in the waterfront villages of Oyster and Willis Wharf. The request, which went from the supervisors to the Planning Commission three months ago, faced stiff opposition by the county planners as well as a number of residents in both communities.

The supervisors were seeking to allow a multitude of water-oriented uses in and around the waterfronts of Ovster and Willis Wharf.

Comments and letters speaking in opposition to development in either of the two communities came from Camden Whitehead, Tom Bonniwell, Gregory Hughes, Sarah Morgan, Donna Fauber and Jane Kafigian. Art Schwarschild of Willis Wharf suggested that the supervisors take more time to work through any possible adverse effects that might result from the amendment.

"I do not know what or if any development or redevelopment in the Waterfront Villages will occur if these changes are approved." stated Murray.

A total of 1.28 acres in Oyster and just over 4 acres in Willis Wharf might be directly affected by the change.

Ultimately, the board voted 6-0 to

In other action, the supervisors approved a laundry list of housekeeping ordinance changes, including readjusting their annual salary from \$2,000 back to \$4,000. They had halved their own salary a year ago.

Other changes included accepting the statewide building code and traffic codes, and exempting antique vehicles from license tax fees.

Prior to concluding the session, Murray announced that he will not be seeking re-election to his position in the fall general election. Murray cited personal and family reasons for his decision.

Accomack Orders Independent Audit of County Departments

Another study. Another \$7,500.

This time the money will be spent for an independent auditor to check Accomack County's "entire tax system." County supervisors want "the finger pointing" to stop and the money to pour in. So they unanimously voted for the inquiry Wednesday.

The debate concerns the nearly \$13.6 million worth of past-due realestate and personal-property taxes owed to Accomack County since 1981.

The audit would look into "any problems that exist" in the offices of the director of finance, treasurer and commissioner of the revenue, said Supervisor Robert Crockett, who came up with the proposal.

"Everybody (who heads those departments) is 100 percent in favor of it," said Crockett. The supervisors want to use an auditor none of the departments has ever used. A committee of the departments will select the auditor.

"While we're doing this, I hope we're moving forward to collect these delinquent taxes," said Supervisor Jack Gray. "I hope we don't hold up while the auditor comes."

Treasurer Dana Bundick assured the board that she wouldn't stop working. She asked that the assessor's office be included in the audit.

Another motion was made by Crockett and passed unanimously that gives the auditor the right to go to any county office to make inquiries.

"I'm ready to get going," said Bundick.
"I'm in favor of this. But I don't want anything to slow things down."

The supervisors also appointed members as liaisons to various other

government officials. Gray, a former School Board member, was appointed to serve as that panel's liaison. Supervisors Wanda Thornton and Ron Wolff will alternate as the Economic Development Commission's contact. The liaison to Bundick will be Crockett. Commissioner of the Revenue Leslie Savage's go-between will be Supervisor Reneta Major. Chairman Donald Hart

will be the contact for Clerk of Court Sammy Cooper. Vice Chairwoman Laura Belle Gordy will be the liaison for Commonwealth's Attorney Gary Agar and Supervisor Grayson Chesser will be the link for the Sheriff's Department.

Chincoteague Gym

Thornton reported that Chincoteague Town Council declined acceptance of the old Chincoteague Elementary School gym because of the restriction that it reverts to the county after use. The facility needs about \$100,000 in repairs. Thornton said the property was originally bought with money raised by town residents, the initial structure cost \$50,000 to build and Mary N. Smith School was given without restrictions to its alumni association. The supervisors then unanimously voted to remove the restriction.

Atlantic Community Health Center

Thirty-five years of serving the community didn't seem to mean much to the Accomack Planning Commission. Eastern Shore Rural Health (ESRH) CEO Nancy Stern said the commission caused a two-month delay in construction of the new Atlantic facility.

It is set to go up on Lankford Highway near New Church. Stern was asking for a conditional-use permit to allow the center to be in an agricultural/ general business zone. The supervisors voted unanimously to give her what she wanted. They nixed additional Planning Commission requirements that were not part of the plan when Onley Community Health Center was constructed.

Stern complained that the commis-

sion, which makes recommendations to the supervisors, held three meetings and talked for hours about topics — including landscaping only with native plants and installing pervious parking spaces for storm drainage. The two were not required for the Onley center.

Asked why the change, Commissioner Bob Hickman said there are now more commissioners who are conscious of environmental and Comprehensive Plan concerns.

"We are on a timeline," said Stern. ESRH got a \$4.93 million grant for the project. "If we don't get the building built," the grant could be lost, she said. "Did we not comply with everything in Onley? There's no way we would deviate ... we'll do the best we can."

"We should be encouraging Eastern Shore Rural Health," said Thornton. She urged the other supervisors to listen to the Planning Commission tapes. "This project has been held up and delayed. We just need to work with people a little bit more."

The center opened 33 years ago with

four exam rooms and one doctor. Now there are seven doctors, more services, often standingroom-only in the waiting room, lack of parking, and dangerous traffic conditions for entrance and exit.

"We really need this building," said Jean Thornton, the center's manager. "We need to offer more."

Chesser blamed some of the delay on the lack

Matthews wrote a letter to the board asking for help.

Virginia Department of Transportation representative Steve Rowan said he would bring the issue to the attention of his district manager and the local maintenance department.

Chesser said there is a similar problem on Horsey Road in front of the Episcopal Church.

the trial to answer questions and take their suggestions on the process.

The jury could have chosen to convict Walker of second-degree murder, which carries a maximum of 40 years in prison, or found him not guilty. The maximum term for involuntary manslaughter is 10 years. Mahan explained that the basic different between second-degree murder and involuntary manslaughter is "malice."

The jury, which consisted of three men (two white and one black) and nine women (eight white and one black), deliberated on the verdict for about seven hours Thursday and Friday. Once that job was done, they got more instructions and took about another hour to agree on the sentence.

The jury was polled for both the verdict and sentence findings at the request of Hamlet. Both proved to be unanimous.

At least a dozen of Walker's family members attended the proceedings. At times, some of them joined for loud group prayers in the hallway and outside. They asked God to acquit "BJ," which is the defendant's nickname.

Walker's mother, Geraldine Johnson, served as a character witness just before the jury deliberated on a sentence. She described her son as a "caring, loving, very protecting father." She said, "he took care" of the children and "stayed up with them." Johnson said he was never violent. "He always kept a job. He works real hard."

Other testimony disclosed that the child's injuries occurred while the boy's mother, Jessica Russell, was at work in a local chicken factory. Walker, her fiancé, was on vacation from the plant and was in charge of the daytime care of the boy and his toddler sister. A third child — Isaiah's 9-year-old sister — was in school.

"Just because there was no previous information that he has harmed a child ... doesn't mean he's not a violent person," said Accomack Deputy Commonwealth's Attorney Matthew Brenner.

At the sentencing, the prosecutor supplied the jury with Walker's criminal records, most of which are from when he was a juvenile. He was convicted in 2000 of brandishing a firearm, felony destruction of property and authorized use of an automobile. In 2003, he was convicted of possession of marijuana and in 2004 of three counts of destruction of property. In 2006, Walker was convicted of two counts of driving with a suspended driver's license, failure to pay restitution, speeding, reckless driving and not wearing a seatbelt. In 2007, he was convicted of contempt for failing to appear in court.

Brenner called the case a "negligent homicide of ... a baby that can never now grow up ... get married ... have children ... go through high school ... have a first kiss ... ride a bike ... blow out candles." Brenner argued to the jury, "Ten years is not too long to give for a life ... an 11-month-old helpless baby."

Accomack Tax Collection Rates Don't Stack Up

Accomack came in last when Finance Director Mike Mason compared 2009 and 2010 tax collection efforts in similar counties in Virginia, according to information obtained from the county Tuesday.


Warren, Northampton, Louisa, Orange, Culpeper, Prince George, Isle of Wight, Amherst, Wythe and Gloucester counties had higher collection rates than Accomack.

Mason said these counties have been used for years for comparisons. "They were initially chosen by the (county's) Cost Savings Committee based on their proximity to our population or per capita income. Northampton was not originally one of the comparables, but we added them for obvious reasons."

For 2010, the overall collection rates were 89.7 percent in Accomack, 95.27 percent in Culpeper, 96.22 percent in Prince George, 96.37 percent in Isle of Wight, 96.69 percent in Amherst, and 96.93 percent in Wythe County.

At the time that the data were compiled, the most recent collection rates in some areas were for 2009. Those included 90.28 percent in Warren, 92.14 percent in Northampton, 93.62 percent in Louisa, 95.21 percent in Orange and 97.31 percent in Gloucester County.

Philip Shannon (Shane) Irwin, 44, of Jamesville, a computer business owner in Onancock, pleaded guilty Monday in Northampton Circuit Court to drug and sex charges involving a minor.

According to Commonwealth's Attorney Bruce Jones, Irwin pleaded guilty to distributing marijuana to a minor, contributing to the delinquency of a minor and use of a communication system (a computer) to solicit sex from a minor.

A presentence report was ordered.

According to court records, the marijuana and delinquency incidents occurred on Dec. 1, 2009. Irwin was indicted on May 7, 2010, and arrested five days later.

The communication system charge came from an incident on Sept. 8, 2009. He was indicted on that count on Nov. 8, 2010, and was arrested three days later.

Irwin also had been indicted on a charge of taking indecent liberties with a minor regarding an alleged incident on Dec. 14, 2009. Jones said Irwin was not prosecuted for that charge.

An Accomack grand jury indicted Irwin on 11 counts of possession of child pornography in April of 2011. The direct indictments were not initially released to the public with the others. Court records show the alleged incidents occurred in April 30, 2010.

He is being held in Eastern Shore Regional Jail without bond.

In another court case, Clark Leslie Bowman, 50, of Hertford, N.C., pleaded guilty to two counts of obtaining money by false pretenses. The case was continued pending completion of a presentence report.

Chincoteague Abandons Proposal To Increase Transient Occupancy Tax

The proposed 1 percent increase in Chincoteague's transient occupancy tax was removed from the town's draft budget last week.

Council eliminated the \$40,936 that was hoped to be gained and was designated for beach, recreation and tourism. Vice Mayor Ellen Richardson and Council members Terry Howard and Nancy Conklin favored deleting it. Councilmen John Jester and Tripp Muth were opposed.

Earlier at the same session, Accomack Supervisor Wanda Thornton said she was speaking as a citizen and taxpayer as she voiced opposition to Council's proposed increase in the occupancy tax rate, saying it was unnecessary. Businesses are struggling already, she said.

Thornton also told Council that the business license increase did not generate more revenue and that she received many complaints on the hike. She suggested putting excess revenue funds in a beach storm fund for parking issues and for beach, recreation and tourism.

Thornton said items in the town

budget shouldn't be lumped together. She wants local government investment pools to be listed in a monthly report. She also said the town should follow the Government Finance Officers Association recommendation of having 5 to 15 percent in reserves.

Thornton also voiced disapproval of last year's vehicle decal increase. She said the \$11,000 it raised was not worth it. Thornton said the town donates too much money.

Conklin asked about the recent 3 percent increase in the county's transient occupancy tax. Thornton advised that the hike is strictly for tourism, forever. She said the money would not be going into the county's General Fund.

Finance Director Karen Hipple noted that while other towns in Accomack raised real-estate tax rates last year, Chincoteague chose to raise only vehicle decal fees.

Waterside Inn proprietor Donna Mason complained that while other areas are offering incentives for visitors, the town is contemplating increasing the occupancy tax. She said the town is not reaching out to tourism.

her. Tommy Daisey expressed concern for the economy. He said people are trying to cut back and can't afford any increases. Daisey wondered how many people on the island benefit from touring ism. He said he favors raises and benefits for town workers, but is concerned wal that there won't be enough money to

continue to employ them.

Others voicing disapproval of the 1 percent increase were island residents and business owners Richard Conklin, Susie Cole, Nancy Lane, Richard Vesley and former Councilman Jim Frese.

Council also voted to approve a permit that will allow Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company to offer a fireworks display on July 4. New state legislation made the vote necessary.

Laurie Walton said vehicles are turning into the Marsh Island portion of the new bridge without realizing where it leads. She requested a "No Outlet" sign be moved to the corner of the spur so that motorists see it before they turn.

Redskin's Northampton Tax Payment Expected

Interim Northampton County Treasurer Cindy Bradford expects to soon collect money from an NFL football player who owes delinquent real-estate taxes.

Redskins cornerback DeAngelo Hall is in arrears for more than \$24,200 in back taxes, including penalties and interest, for 2008. 2009 and 2010, Bradford confirmed Monday.

Attorney James Elliott, who has a collection contract with the county, recently started the process of seizing Hall's \$1.3 million Plantation Point home near Cape Charles and selling it at auction to collect the debt. the treasurer said.

She explained, "The address recorded on the deed was the address of the property" and Hall "was not getting his mail there." Bradford noted that the football player's lawyers recently called Elliott to say they want to take care of the bill. "I expect it to be cleared up soon," she said.

Northampton School Board Welcomes Superintendent, Discusses Benefits, OKs Budget

The Northampton County School Board welcomed Dr. Walter R. Clemons to the Shore as the new superintendent at its meeting this week.

Dr. Clemons, a Smithfield, Va., native, has 21 years of education experience serving in Isle of Wight, Franklin, and Newport News, Va., and Charlotte. N.C. He will assume the helm of Northampton County's three schools

The issue of merging with the county's insurance plan was discussed. Coverage, savings, and additional costs to staff were major concerns. Retiring Superintendent Dr. Bowmaster, who like many retirees will be directly affected, was asked for his views. He indicated reluctance to merge at this time. The savings for most staff currently covered would be a few cents per month, while those in family plans would see substantial increases in premiums.

The School Board voted not to merge with the county's system for the upcoming school year and to review the decision again in 2012.

Approval was given to the \$19,992,540 school budget for FY 2012. Funding is provided by a combination of federal, state, and local money, along with various grants.

The board appointed Annette Gray to serve as the superintendent's designee in his absence for the coming school term.

Board member Calvin Brickhouse reported that the school uniform committee is recommending that the colors burgundy and maroon be removed from the approved list, while adding the black for pants, slacks, shorts, skirts, jumpers, and skorts. Striped shirts also were removed from the approved list. The committee also is suggesting that a dress code be in place for staff.

The board reviewed the school lunch program. The board outsourced the service in 2010 as a way to improve the quality of lunches as well as the number of students who take part in the program. School Finance Director Brook Thomas reported that while the program got off to a good start in the fall of 2010, the number of students who took part it began to fall off by the beginning of 2011. The board has the option of going back to in-house food service in that the current cafeteria.

Board members Calvin Brickhouse and Richard Bland were slated to surrender their seats at the end of their current term but will retain their positions until the Board of Supervisors completes its redistricting plan, which calls for the reduction of one supervisor and could also reduce the School Board by one representative.





Cape Charles OKs Budget

Cape Charles Town Council last week approved the town's FY 2012 budget of \$11,743,743, including \$6.5 million in grants. Fees for the coming year will include a minimum water rate of \$43, trash fees of \$14, and a minimum wastewater rate of \$34. The full budget is posted on the town's website.

Council also reviewed and updated its golf cart ordinance. According to Town Planner Tom Bonadeo, almost 100 carts are registered in town. The ordinance allows them to be operated in town by licensed drivers. The carts must be inspected, operated within the 25-mph speed limit, have a horn and seat belts, and be equippd with lights if operated at night.

Harbormaster Smitty Dize announced that the new harbor floating docks are operational and being extensively utilized. The town has been working on plans for a bathhouse to be added at the harbor. Council supported the bathhouse plan, for which the town received a \$343,977 Boating Infrastructure Grant earlier this year.

Town Manager Heather Arcos was authorized to apply for a U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development Grant to obtain a new police vehicle. The \$32,000 grant would be an 80 percent/20 percent match, with the town paying \$8,000 for a new vehicle.

Council reviewed a request from Landmark Holdings U.S. for a conditional-use permit extension for the construction of multi-residential and commercial property near the harbor. Bonadeo noted that Council had granted an extension a year ago, but there are no visible signs of progress. Additionally, it was reported that the applicant proposed to pay delinquent taxes by the end of 2011. Council voted not to grant the extension.

Council voted to support the tall ship initiative in the amount of \$5,000, to be provided as in-kind services and/or direct funding. Councilwoman Joan Natali urged that a means for measuring financial benefits from the initiative be in place. Councilman Bruce Evans noted that once vessels begin to make port in Cape Charles, the initiative would fund itself with the growth of town businesses.

years there has been much talk of big projects that never materialized, but this time is different. Wolff spoke of the telephone poles being moved and the "largest water tower of its kind in the world" being erected on Wallops Island.

"This is not a pipe dream. It is real," he said. "It can happen ... we need somebody to speak for us. I see good value."

Major called the tendency to be afraid of new things "small-minded. Young people don't want to come back to the Shore; there's nothing here. No one in my district called to say anything negative ... that's a lot of money saved."

Wesley Edwards, Major's undeclared opponent in the November election, also favors the lobbyist.

Gray said he would support a lobbyist who would find money for education in Accomack. "We need to pursue that with the lobbyist or without," he said.

"I think this has gotten down to a personal thing," Gordy said of the bickering. "I have not had one constituent in favor." She called Wolff's description of generations working for NASA "an exaggeration."

"We normally get a response from our representatives," said Hart-Mears. "They know we're here. They know we exist."

Hart said he talked to hundreds of District 8 residents in recent weeks and "not one has spoken in favor" of using the firm. About 25 of those presented him with a petition opposing the move. "Lobbyist' is a very dirty word," said Hart. "We gave the lobbyist six months. We paid him for that. They did their job."

"Accomack County and Chincoteague are paying more money (for the lobbying firm) than the County of Fairfax," said Hart. "That bothers me a great deal since they are 30 times our size."

County Administrator Steve Miner said, "Lobbyists are a tool, a resource ... they make an honest living vying their trade. ... Clearly, having a lobbyist increases the chance of getting a bill passed." He said the proposal is with a subcommittee of the Committee of Natural Resources. Miner plans to go to Washington next week to talk with staff and possibly meet the subcommittee chairperson.

"We need to know the commitment of this board for Wallops Research Park,"

Jeff Shield of Melfa recently was awarded \$2,290,247 by a Northampton County jury in response to his lawsuit against Shore Memorial Hospital (now Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital), Emergency Department contractors Southeastern Emergency Physicians, Inc., and Dr. Elizabeth J. Rogers.

According to court records, Shield went to the Emergency Department on Dec. 26, 2006, complaining of a headache, dizziness and weakness in his left leg. He was treated by Dr. Rogers, who ordered a CT Scan, indicated that it showed no negative findings, scheduled an MRI for three days later, diagnosed that Shield had a migraine headache, and discharged him, the court records note.

Two days later, according to the lawsuit, Shield suffered a stroke. His attorney, William L. Perkins III of Virginia Beach, claimed that Dr. Rogers had misdiagnosed Shield, who would not have had the stroke if an MRI had been performed immediately. Perkins contended that had the MRI shown the possibility of a stroke when Shield first went to the hospital and had he been given the medication heparin, the stroke might have been prevented.

A battery of expert witnesses gave mixed testimony regarding the use of heparin with regards to stroke therapy. Shield indicated that he had medical expenses of \$40,247, continues to suffer from excessive pain, and was disabled to the extent that he is no longer able to work. Medical records showed that Shield was able to continue playing golf and tennis to some degree following the stroke. Shield maintains that his health and quality of life have diminished greatly.

The jury deliberated for less than

Court records show that Shield filed a suit against Dr. Rogers two years after suffering the stroke, but it was withdrawn. The suit was later reinstated, asking for \$4 million.







appointments, leaving the circuit court seat for the counties of Accomack and Northampton unoccupied until at least July.

The Virginia Beach General Assembly Delegation had previously chosen W.

Revell Lewis, an attorney in Accomac, to fill the post left vacant by the retirement of Judge Glen A.Tyler. I brokered an agreement last week to have Lewis approved by the Senate Democratic Caucus, and the Senate voted 34-0 on a resolution to appoint Lewis, along with two judges in the 9th Judicial Circuit.

It is disappointing to me that a group of legislators who do not represent the Shore would ignore our efforts to do the right thing. The fair and fast administration of justice is already enough of a

challenge in rural areas without legislators from across the water throwing up roadblocks.

Although the Eastern Shore seat is part of the Virginia Beach circuit, it is specifically mentioned in the Code of Virginia, and therefore legally required to exist and to be filled if funding is available.

I worked with others in the General Assembly this year to en-

> sure that money for the seat would be available.

The Senate has found the money and the votes to put a judge on the bench. The ball is in their court now.

Should the House fail to approve Lewis in July, the seat will remain open unless the governor makes a temporary appointment, which would have to be revisited by the General Assembly
