The End of an Era

District 7 Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy Will Not Seek Re-Election

After Almost 30 Years On County Board By Linda Cicoira

District 7 Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy has been a devoted member of the Accomack Board of Supervisors since she was first elected in 1988. She is now serving her seventh four-year term and announced this week that at the end of 2019 it will be time to sit back and enjoy her great-grandchildren. She is not seeking re-election.

"I've been on there a long time," Gordy said. "I have really given it my all. It's time for me to stay home."

Often the voice that let other board members know it was time to move on to the next subject, Gordy has not been timid with her views. She served as chairwoman five times and she was on the hospital board when plans were finalized to build the new facility in Accomack County.

"We did get the Folly Creek boat ramp in our budget this year," Gordy said of recent endeavors for her district. "I've been trying to get that for years and years," she said of the needed improvements.

Gordy was first elected in 1988 and served two terms. After being defeated by 17 votes in 1995, she came back in 2000 and has continued to serve on the board ever since.

She was there when land for a recreational park at the former Jones lumber yard near Accomac was obtained, the Wallops Research Park was established, convenience centers were erected, new schools were constructed, the Eastern Shore Area Agency on Aging purchased its own building, and when the county and Onancock first made an agreement regarding water and sewage.

"There have been a lot of changes," the supervisor said. She also was around when the board hired its first full-time county attorney.

Gordy has served on the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission, the Accomack Social Services Board, the Eastern Shore Area Agency on Aging Community Action Board, Eastern Shore of Virginia Tourism Commission for which she was chairwoman for five years, the Solid Waste Management Committee, the Accomack Parks and Recreation Commission,

the Eastern Shore Public Library Board of Trustees, the Accomack County Agriculture and Forestal Committee, the Eastern Shore Community College Board, and the Eastern Shore Health Advisory Board.

She was chairwoman of the hospital charity ball for two years and a member of the Executive Finance and Long-Range Planning Committee as chairwoman of Public Relations for Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital Board of Trustees. Gordy volunteered as manager of the hospital's gift shop for more than 15 years and was hospital auxiliary president.

She has served on committees of the Virginia Association of Counties and was appointed by the governor to

Second School Threat Within Three Weeks at Arcadia High

For the second time in three weeks, Arcadia High School parents weighed whether it was safe to send their children to school Friday after another student allegedly threatened others at Arcadia High School. Schools were closed Thursday for staff development.

Superintendent Chris Holland, when asked about the nature of the threat, the protocol followed, and assurances parents, students and staff had that school was safe to attend, issued this statement:

"This is W.C. Holland, Superintendent of Accomack County Public Schools. Today, Wednesday, March 6, it was alleged that a student made a threat regarding Arcadia High School. We have taken all precautions and followed all protocol to ensure that all students and staff at Arcadia High School are safe. We are working with the Accomack County Sheriff's Office in this investigation. It is our top priority to provide a safe environment where our students can learn."

A student was removed from school Feb. 14 for allegedly threatening other students. The school board got an earful at its Feb. 22 meeting from parents and Supervisor Ron Wolff for lack of notification to parents who heard about the incident from their children. Wolff said the only communication was a call from his grandson to say only about 200 students attended the following day. Holland did not confirm Feb. 15 attendance when asked by a reporter. According to the school records, enrollment is about 650 students.

Officials sent a letter home with students Wednesday, the same day the second alleged threat was made. An official at the sheriff's office confirmed officers were called to the school, but no additional information was released.

The threat was made the same day the Virginia Department of Education and the University of Virginia were scheduled to survey Arcadia students as part of a statewide student school climate survey. "The purpose of this survey is to help schools assess their progress in establishing a positive school climate that promotes student learning," according to Arcadia's website. Holland declined to say whether the survey went on as scheduled.

A call to Arcadia principal Rose Taylor was not returned by press time.

2 = Eastern Shore Post = March 8, 2019 Northampton Occupancy Tax Collections Up 74 Percent in 5 Years

Northampton's proposed budget for fiscal year 2020 is around \$28.5 million, an increase of about \$378,000, or 1.34 percent, and even though Director of Finance John Chandler said the budget has grown a little more than 15 percent over the past five years – not a lot compared to the rate of inflation - there is one "shining star" among the county's revenues.

Transient occupancy taxes collected in Northampton increased by 74 percent in the last five years – a higher growth rate than any other tax revenue in the county. The tax applies to visitor accommodations such as hotels, bed-and-breakfasts, and campgrounds.

Forty percent of the transient occupancy taxes go into the county's general fund,

and of the remaining 60 percent, 45 percent helps fund the Eastern Shore of Virginia Tourism Commission and 15 percent is for tourism-related capital projects.

In the same five-year period, revenue from building permits, planning and zoning fees, and other permits and fees increased more than 40 percent, and sales tax revenues rose about 28 percent.

Chandler said September and October are among the best months of the year for Northampton for sales taxes because there is a two-month "lag" between the time purchases are made and the time the county receives the revenue, so September and October reflect sales activity in July and August, during tourist season.

Northampton's towns receive more than 12 percent of sales taxes, and the

county gets the rest.

In FY 2020. Northampton expects to receive \$1.4 million from sales taxes, \$450,000 from transient occupancy taxes, and \$350,000 from food and beverage taxes.

Real estate and personal property tax revenues combined will increase about \$150.000 and cover around \$18.5 million of the budget. Property tax revenues have increased about 11 percent over the last five years. The county expects to get about \$98,000 more from personal property taxes in FY 2020.

In 2015, the real estate tax rate was 68.05 cents per \$100 of assessed value. The rate was raised to 83 cents per \$100 in 2016 and has not changed to date.

Chandler said the last two changes to the tax rate were not technically tax increases, but "equalization tax rate adjustments based on assessed value," but Supervisor Robert Duer pointed out that to the average citizen, "it looks like a tax increase."

Northampton's real estate taxes pay for 18.78 percent of the county's debts, and Chairman Spencer Murray wants that figure to stay below 20 percent. He admitted accomplishing that goal may require some "creative financing" in light of structural issues at Northampton High School that must be addressed.

Supervisor John Coker asked why only about \$4.000 more is expected to be collected in real estate taxes compared to last year. Duer observed last year the county had an "excellent" year for collecting back taxes, which are now paid up. The commissioner of the revenue estimates the assessed value of all real property in Northampton will be a little more than \$2 billion. Property values peaked in 2012, when they reached nearly \$3 billion.

The Northampton County Sheriff's Office made a more conservative estimate this year of how much in fines and forfeitures will be collected – only \$665,000, or \$95,000 less than last year – which Murray remarked is "not chump change," considering how the lowered estimate will affect the overall budget.


The proposed budget includes about \$607,000 in non-revenue from the county's undesignated fund balance, a transaction that Chandler likened to transferring money from a savings account to a checking account.

In accordance with legislators' recommendations, the budget will be adjusted to include a 3 percent raise for regional jail employees and constitutional officers, which include Northampton's sheriff, commonwealth's attorney, circuit court clerk, commissioner of the revenue, and voter registrar.





CAPE CHARLES CAT FIGHT: WHAT TO DO ABOUT FERAL CATS

Cape Charles residents have let the cat out of the bag on their feelings about the proliferation of feral felines in town and the resulting impact on quality of life.

Mayor Smitty Dize welcomed citizens to share their comments publicly during the Feb. 21 town council meeting.

Opinions appeared to be divided between members and supporters of the Eastern Shore Spay Organization (ES Spay), which practices the trap, neuter, and release method of feral cat population control, and citizens who disapprove of both sheltering the cats in town and the alternative - allowing the cats to be captured and possibly euthanized by animal control.

ES Spay's mission is "to provide lowcost spay/neuter services for the Eastern Shore and to help reduce the local cat population," said Sandy Mayer, the non-

Cat Team 7 is a nonprofit that helps relocate feral Navy cats in the colony on the Navy base to barns and vineyards. These cats are free and Cat Team 7 provides free training and food to help the

profit's secretary and treasurer.

Trap, neuter, and release is the only natural and effective way to control cat populations, Mayer said. While still under anesthesia, each cat is "eartipped" the tip of one ear is clipped as an easy way to visually identify cats that have been neutered. Each cat also receives a rabies vaccination.

Eventually, feral cat populations are eliminated because they can't reproduce, Mayer said.

Her husband, Hank Mayer, also spoke. Since the organization was formed in 2013, it has raised \$32,000, and through an agreement with PETA (People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals), 1,100 cats have been spayed or neutered, including 520 "community cats" and 580 pet cats whose owners could not afford the surgery, he said.

Joy Pelletier said that without intervention, each cat would reproduce about

six kittens per litter.

She monitors cat shelters intended to keep the animals out of private property and to help them stay healthy, Pelletier said. A shelter is never built without permission, she added.

PetSmart in Chesapeake, Va., helps find adoptive families for the socialized cats. Pelletier said.

But JoAnn Bawiec, a self-proclaimed animal lover, observed that Cape Charles is experiencing a housing boom and whenever new houses are built, cats and shelters are displaced from the formerly vacant lots. "Personally, I don't think they belong in a historic, residential area," she added.

She suggested the council form a committee to examine possible long-term solutions and relayed a rumor that a landowner once considered donating a parcel outside the town limits to relocate

According to the town ordinance, she pointed out, animals may not "roam free," but she is not in favor of capturing and euthanizing the cats.

"If you were on Facebook today, you would have thought there was going to

three times per year, with an average of be a roundup at midnight and a mass execution. That's not what happened," she said.

> Ryan Pattan wrote that a nearby shelter attracted so many cats to his house that all three of his sons, ages 3 to 6, who suffer from cat allergies, have been limited in how much time they can spend at home.

> Ashley Sabo commented that feral cats can also spread diseases like toxoplasmosis and cat scratch fever.

> Jeanna Bouzek, a part-time resident. wrote to express support for neutering and vaccinating the cats, but bemoaned the cats using her backyard as "their personal litter box" and refused to expose her dogs to the cat feces, which can cause illness when ingested.

> She also couldn't visit her home for weeks due to "toxic chemicals" used to exterminate an infestation of fleas she attributed to the cats.

> "It's embarrassing to sit on my front porch with friends and have them comment on the cat urine smell. I pay my taxes, spend tens of thousands of dollars improving the looks of my home, mow my lawn, follow all rules and regulations ... what recourse do I have?" she asked.



Readers React to New Law Making 21 Age of Consent for Smoking

Starting July 1, in Virginia, one must be at least 21 years old to buy cigarettes or vape products, according to a law approved by both the House and the Senate and signed by Gov. Ralph Northam, a pediatric neurologist.

Seventy-five percent of Accomack and Northampton residents who participated in an email survey conducted by the Eastern Shore Post this week favored the bill that changed the age requirement from 18.

The bill involves the "purchase, possession, and sale of tobacco products, nicotine vapor products, and alternative nicotine products." It excludes active military personnel and allows the products "to be sold from a vending machine if there is posted notice of the minimum-age requirements and the machine is located in a place that is not open to the general public and not generally accessible to persons under 21 years of age."

"I don't smoke," Linda Nicola, 65, of Onancock, wrote in response to the query. "I will never smoke. I think smoking and the smell are disgusting. I think the new law is terrific. Eighteen is too young to decide to smoke or not. The brain isn't even fully formed by then, and the last part of the brain to develop is judgment."

Douglass Stewart, "68 years young," of Wardtown, said he "quit 17 years ago this May. I started smoking when I was about 14, but quit for football and baseball seasons. I started full time at about 17. I tried everything from gum to the patch, even hypnotism. Finally, I attended sessions held by the American Lung Association and quit cold turkey on the date we set. My brother-in-law smokes and I don't get it," Stewart continued. "He's a health-care professional."

Stewart supports the new law. "The human brain has not finished growing and has still not matured enough to make decisions of this magnitude. Nicotine is highly addictive, and I believe should be outlawed in all forms, including vaping."

Bill Payne, 76, of Cape Charles, is a former smoker who quit "cold turkey" due to peer pressure. He thinks raising the age is "excellent."

Stefanie Jackson, 40, of Pungote-

ague, isn't a smoker. "I'm a singer. My voice is a gift from God and I don't want to damage it," she said. A family member smokes though. "So, I know how hard it is to quit," she wrote.

"Smoking is an unhealthy habit, but as an adult, it's your choice whether you want to do it or not," said Jackson. "An individual is legally an adult at 18, therefore the legal smoking age — and drinking age, for that matter — should be 18. Passing this law was a waste of precious time for our Virginia legislators. There are far more important things they should be doing. In my opinion, there was no logical reason for this change."

Zach Ponds, 29, of Cape Charles, says he doesn't smoke and no one in his family does. "Ban smoking for good" was his solution to the issue.

Robert Doughty, 70, of South Chesconessex, is a smoker. He started at 18 and quit cold turkey 40 years ago for three years. He said the law is "a contradiction. Active military are exempt ... A person 18 years or older is considered an adult in a court of law. They should be allowed to make adult decisions including the purchase of hard liquor."

Norman Colpitts, 69, of Craddock-ville, said the new law is a "GREAT IDEA. Getting kids addicted to nicotine, especially via fruit flavored vaping should be illegal!" He tried smoking "very briefly" as a teen and "never smoked more than a few times." He thanked God that no one in his family smokes. "My wife and three adult daughters (are) all non-smokers."

Nicki Tiffany, 69, of Cape Charles, quit 25 years ago. "I started when I was 18 and smoked for 25 years. I quit cold turkey, but also went to a support group for eight weeks." One of her grown children smokes and another vapes. "They know how we feel about it and are considerate not (do it) to around us."

"I applaud the effort," Tiffany said of the new law. "But kids are going to find ways to get cigs or vapes any way they can, so I don't know how effective that effort is going to be."

Beverly Lynch, 68, of Painter, has never smoked. "Twenty-one sounds like the right age for everything, drinking, smoking, VOTING, etc. to be allowed. Of course, some will break the

law, but if it will discourage smoking until people are more mature and less likely to indulge, it would be a good thing. There's always a debate about ages for these things, but 21 (is) the traditional age."

David Adams, 62, of Stevensville, Mont., used work at NASA Wallops Flight Facility and live in Atlantic. He started smoking when he was 16 years old and quit "cold turkey at age 35. I think smoking at any age should be illegal. I work in a hospital cath lab. Smoking kills and brings on heart disease."

Adams said another law might help. "At least give me the authority to throw a cup of water on people who smoke around me," he said.

Angie Crutchley, of Exmore, said, "All it will do is create illegal activity. The fewer laws the better. People will do what they want to do and should be allowed to do it. No one should babysit another human being. That's just what we need ... one more damn law."

Carrie Jacobson, 62, of Wachapreague, tried and tried to quit smoking "and finally it worked." She thinks the law is "good but probably ineffective. If kids want to smoke, they will find ways to smoke."

Jacobson's husband, Peter Jacobson, 72, is also a former smoker. He started at 13 and quit by using nicotine gum. He thinks the new law is "great."

David Boyd, 63, of Cape Charles, quit. He did so "using a combination of the patch and e-cigarettes, as vaping used to be called." He "smoked almost 40 years, quit 10 years ago" and thinks the change is a "good law. People just starting to smoke have no idea the wasted money, problems to their and others' health they are creating. They also have no clue how hard it is to quit. Quitting smoking and quitting drinking are about a dead heat on health effects and difficulty quitting in my humble opinion."

Carol Callander, 70-plus, of Bloxom, never smoked. "I think it is a good idea," she wrote of the law change. "Smoking of any kind is deadly."

Judy Brunk, 81, of Jamesville, never had the habit either. "I think it's a good law but if they want to smoke that won't stop them just like gun restrictions won't prevent criminals from having guns! Where there's a will, there's a way!"

Autumn Irons, 19, of Parksley, has never smoked. "I think that this new law is a good thing. If we can't legally drink until 21. then it wouldn't do any harm to make legal smoking age the same."

David Martin, of Onancock, said he is "old enough to know better." He also quit "cold turkey" and said, "Bravo," to the new law.

Carey Winter, 26, of Belle Haven, uses a vaping device. She started smoking cigarettes when she was 17. Her parents used to smoke and she has a brother who vapes. She said the law is a "good idea."

Bob Peters, 91, of Horsey, started smoking when he was 15. He also quit "cold turkey." The law "sounds good to me," he wrote.

LeeAnna Barker, 25, of Cape Charles, has family members who smoke. "As a nonsmoker, who sees the damaging effects of smoking and second-hand smoke all around us. I think

it is a wonderful idea. I do believe, however, like many laws, people will still find their way around it."

Bruce MacMaster Jr., who is over 65 and lives in Onley, started smoking when he was 15 or 16 and stopped at 40. "I realized the dangers of it." He has family members with the habit. He said the law is "useless."

Comments Pour In During Coastal Flooding Discussions

A public input session held by The Nature Conservancy in the Craddockville United Methodist Church fellowship hall Tuesday was awash with comments from citizens describing their experiences with coastal flooding and ideas on how to prevent it in the future.

The Nature Conservancy is a global organization whose mission is to "conserve the lands and waters on which all life depends." One of its many projects is the Virginia Coast Reserve, headquartered at the Brownsville Preserve in Nassawadox.

Virginia Coast Reserve Director Jill Bieri inspired the audience to share their most impactful experiences with flooding on the Shore.

Virginia Coast Reserve Outreach and Education Coordinator Margaret Van Clief has watched a colleague ride a jon boat down the driveway of the Brownsville house at the preserve of the same name.

Local Russell Vreeland has witnessed a lot of changes at Craddock Creek over the last eight years, like the ditches filling with water and attracting swarms of mosquitoes. Once, the tide rose so high he had to "stop on Craddock Neck Road to allow the fish to swim across one ditch to the other."

Bill Sterling, also from the Craddock Creek area, said his dock has been destroyed by flooding three times. He also remembers visiting Davis Wharf on Sunday afternoons during the 1950s and 1960s, where there was a sandbar that could hold 20 or 30 families but disappeared by the 1980s.

Bill Mastyl, who was present with his wife, Sue Mastyl, said his property values have decreased because his land is shrinking due to floods washing it away.

Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason added, "It's not just our land washing away, it's our history."

Curt Smith, of the Accomack-Northampton Planning District Commission (A-NPDC), shared the results of a Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) inundation vulnerability study conducted in 2015.

VDOT determined that by 2025, 33

miles of Eastern Shore roads will be under water, and by 2090, 25 percent of the Shore's roads will be inundated.

Sea level rise is expected to increase steadily, from 1 foot in 2025 to 6 feet by 2090, according to the VDOT study.

Bieri asked for ideas on how to address the coastal flooding issue.

Ruthie Kranz-Carl spoke up for the protection and restoration of the Shore's marsh lands, and Collie Ortley emphasized the need to clean drainage ditches.

But Vreeland sought acknowledgement from Accomack County staff that there is no one-size-fits-all solution. His property is "maybe a foot above sea level. You come down and fix my ditches by digging out another 2 feet, there's no point, because the water's going to be right back in my yard."

"When you talk about drainage ditches, the biggest problem I see is litter," said Rob Kelly, who pastors the Craddockville church. "I walk up and down King Street, where I live, and I take a trash can, and I fill that up within about 40 feet."

Sue Mastyl said Shore residents may have to accept that some areas ravaged by flooding will not be "salvageable." She cautioned against having unrealistic goals because the state and federal government have "bigger fish to fry" and local resources are limited.

Her husband agreed. "We have people in Washington that still don't believe in global warming," Bill Mastyl said.

Bieri emphasized staying focused on solutions that can be implemented locally.

Mason said Accomack County accepted its first opportunity to get involved in a living shoreline project, with the Francis Makemie Society, at Makemie Monument Park, near Saxis.

A living shoreline uses natural elements to create a buffer that protects marsh lands and prevents erosion.

Smith said living shorelines present an "economic opportunity" for the Shore; the challenge is getting local contractors trained in constructing them and making the innovation accessible to homeowners.

5 Charges Dropped, 3 Certified In Horntown Case

Five felony charges against a Norfolk man who has relatives on Chincoteague were dismissed Monday in Accomack General District Court while probable cause was found to certify two other felonies and a misdemeanor to a county grand jury.

Charges of stealing property belonging to Horntown resident Joquan Persinger, robbery of Persinger, breaking into the home of Persinger while armed with a deadly weapon, malicious wounding of Persinger, and armed robbery were dismissed against Joseph Paul Mullane, 19, of Waltham Street.

The charges could be brought up again before the grand jury. An officer who investigated the case was not available to testify.

Substitute Judge Robert MacDonald found probable cause to certify charges of displaying a firearm in a threatening man-

ner in a felony and burglary at the home of Cindy Reed. He also certified a misdemeanor count of brandishing a firearm.

Mullane is free on \$5,000 bond.

Persinger testified that he had spent the night at the Reed home on Oct. 22, 2018, where he once lived. He said he was awakened by a sound, saw a figure, and was attacked by something that hit his face. Persinger felt something "leak down my face" and later learned it was blood. He said he saw a blurry object. "It seemed like someone was holding it." He did not see who the person was. He mentioned he thought he saw tannish/yellow pantyhose. "The person left. I never saw his face." Persinger showed the judge an injury near his eye.

Cindy Reed, of Pine Road on Chincoteague, said she lives with her husband and two sons. Reed was getting ready for work on another floor of the house when "the house started shaking really violently." She "heard voices and arguing" but could not make out what was being said. "I got scared." She hid in her room. "I waited until it stopped basically."

A white Toyota Camry was in her driveway. She saw the car pull away. "I could hear footsteps come up the stairs. She was afraid to holler out." Persinger appeared and told her what had happened. Persinger and Reed's son went to the police station to report it.

"I was waiting in the house and doing a few dishes," Reed said. "I heard some wrestling downstairs. I thought the boys had returned. When I approached my son's bedroom door, I could see someone in the crack of the door." She identified Mullane as the person she saw.

"I asked him what are you doing in my house," Reed said. "We were face to face. He pointed a weapon in my face ... When he lowered the weapon, a handgun, I took off up the stairs. I grabbed my cell phone and hid."

She said she has known Mullane since he was nine years old and that her husband coached him in sports.

Her son, Trevor Reed, said he later discovered that a \$300 gold chain, a \$300 gold watch, and a \$700 Louis Vuitton hoodie were missing. He said the items were in his bedroom, which was ransacked.

Cheriton Man Sentenced For Strangulation

A Cheriton man was sentenced Monday to 50 years in prison for two counts

of strangulation, malicious bodily injury, and abduction in connection with incidents that occurred June 16, 2018, and malicious wounding on April 29, 2018.

Nine years of each decade-long sentence were suspended for George Walker III, 27, of Cheriton, in connection with the June offenses. All but a year and seven months were suspended for the April offense.

Andrew Junior Smith, 48, of Blue Heron Road in Cape Charles, was sentenced to 10 years each for two counts of possession with intent to distribute cocaine. Three years and nine months of each term were suspended. Indefinite probation was ordered. The crimes occurred in November 2016.

Larry Windsor Christopher Jr., 53, of Nassawadox, pleaded guilty to misdemeanor assault and battery of a family member. He was initially charged with felony strangulation. Christopher was sentenced to a year in jail with 10 months suspended. The crime occurred Sept. 22, 2018.

Thomas Smith Mulligan, of Onancock, was given a 12-month suspended sentence for misdemeanor sexual battery. He was initially indicted on a count of aggravated sexual battery, which is a felony. The crime occurred Sept. 25, 2018.

Exmore Business Owner Pleads for Parking Parameters

Exmore, like nearby town Cape Charles, has a parking problem, but it has nothing to do with how its parking spaces are angled or a requirement that drivers back in instead of pull in.

According to Main Street store owner Spring Custis, the problem is who uses the limited number of parallel parking spaces in front of businesses and who should be allowed to use them.

Because there is only enough space to park two or three vehicles in front of each business on Main Street, those spaces should be reserved for customers only, Custis asserted.

The parking spaces should not be used by employees or business owners. When a proprietor parks in front of his business instead of leaving the most convenient parking spaces for customers, "you're eating out of your own hand," Custis said.

Drivers passing through are less inclined to stop when no available parking spaces can be seen from the street, and stores lose potential business, she continued.

Custis said the vehicles that are parked in front of her store all day belong to employees of New Ravenna, the nearby mosaic tile manufacturer. She said after speaking to New Ravenna management, the problem stopped for a couple weeks but later resurfaced.

Custis recommended establishing a two-hour time limit for parking on Main Street.

Police Chief Angelo DiMartino indicated such a measure would be difficult to enforce. Mayor Douglas Greer preferred to install "Store Parking Only" signs on the street so violators cannot plead ignorance if they are ticketed.

Greer also suggested dividing the parking lot behind Main Street and in front of New Ravenna with a split-rail fence to separate employee and customer parking areas.

He assured Custis that the parking issue will be addressed, and council members thanked her for bringing the problem to their attention.

In other business, the council voted unanimously to approve Verizon's request to build a 5G communications tower behind Shore Plaza.

The council also approved the issuance of a bond to pay for the town's well construction project; groundbreaking is expected to take place by the end of March.

Miriam Riggs Is Seeking District 7 Board of Supervisors Seat

Miriam Riggs, a local artist, businesswoman, mother, and environmental activist, announced this week she will seek election to the District 7 seat on the Accomack Board of Supervisors.

The seat is currently held by Supervisor Laura Belle Gordy, who is not seeking reelection. Riggs, of Cashville, has lived in Accomack County for more than 40 years. She is a self-employed designer and raised four children in the area.

We need to protect waters along our Atlantic coast by speaking in opposition to offshore drilling so that the research and development at the Wallops Spaceport may continue its major role in supporting our economy."

"I like the wisdom of having a broad and diverse economic base so that if one industry has a setback, there will still be opportunity for other industries to support our citizens. I place a high value on education, the new public library, and good internet access. Also, it is crucially important to leave room for up and coming innovators, such as renewable energy and organic farming to become established in our county."

Riggs said she enjoyed her connection to the community when she worked for WESR radio where she was the news director. "Even my experience as host on WESR Swap Shop provided a deeper connection to the community which has helped me understand and appreciate the diverse social networks of the Eastern Shore. It enabled me to assist others in many unexpected ways, whether it was collecting donations for a family who had lost their home in a fire, or helping others sell farm equipment or even homegrown produce."

Riggs has served on the boards of directors of Citizens for a Better Eastern Shore, the Eastern Shore Artisans Guild, Save Our Shore, and Central Green. In 2006, she co-organized "Friends of Broadway Landing" to work with state and local officials in re-establishing public access to the Chesapeake Bay at an overlooked public right-of-way. She served on the Citizen's Stakeholder Committee that provided input for revisions to the county comprehensive plan.

She is on the Chesapeake Bay Clean Water Council. Rigg's ongoing professional work includes exhibit design for the Barrier Islands Center and restoration of a Virginia Historic Landmark house near Eastville. She has a bachelor's degree from Old Dominion University.



Volunteers Plant Seeds of Hope for Migratory Birds at Magothy Bay Preserve

The Magothy Bay Natural Area Preserve, near Cape Charles, originally a 285-acre preserve, recently acquired an additional 55 acres of former farmland on Latimer Siding Road that's being transformed into a haven for migratory songbirds, insect pollinators, and even bicyclists.

The field where soybeans, corn, and potatoes once grew is being planted with oak trees, wax myrtles, and winter wheat.

The Eastern Shore Chapter of Virginia Master Naturalists provided most of the volunteers who have been planting 360 oak trees over the course of three weeks, starting in the last week of February, heading into March.

The master naturalists are spending up to eight hours per day planting four different species of oak, including white, scarlet, and willow oak.

About 1.153 bushes and shrubs have also been planted.

Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation participants include Dot Field, Eastern Shore region steward, Richard Ayers, coastal operations steward, and Shelby Crouch, senior public relations and marketing specialist.

The preserve has been designed to provide a welcoming stopover habitat for migratory birds, like black-throated blue warblers and Kentucky warblers, that live up north and migrate to Central America for the winter.

The birds stop to rest and feed before

crossing the Chesapeake Bay.

When the wax myrtles that were planted reach maturity, the evergreens will bear fruit that will provide fat and fiber for the warblers as they prepare to continue their journey south.

The birds travel under cover of night to avoid predators like hawks and eagles.

One corner of the preserve will be planted with milkweed, which attracts monarch butterflies during their fall migration.

It will be a designated pollinator area for butterflies, bees, and beetles, and it will feature a bike rack and path around the area for visitors to enjoy who stop along the Southern Tip Bike and Hike Trail that runs between the preserve and Route 13.

The Magothy Bay Natural Area Preserve is one of 20 of 63 preserves open to

Nine of Virginia's nature preserves are on the Eastern Shore.

Unlike state parks, natural area preserves do not offer facilities like picnic areas or restrooms, so they are usually open year-round.

Occasionally, preserves will be closed when birds are nesting or during other periods. Information on closings can be found online by visiting www.dcr.virginia.gov/natural-heritage

Crouch invited everyone to come visit Virginia preserves and enjoy "nature exactly how it should be."





The new local campaign, "50 Days to Explore the Shore," a scavenger hunt that doubles as a guide to the Shore, will focus on enticing visitors to leave Route 13 and discover the area's secrets. The event will run from Oct. 1 to Nov. 19. Participants and partners will be using the hashtags #visitesva, #loveesva and #sharewhatyoulove to help capture the essence of Virginia's Eastern Shore.

In 2017, visitors to Virginia spent \$25 billion, which supported 232,000 jobs and contributed \$1.73 billion in state and local taxes.





Former Eastern Shore District Ballers' Sophomore Seasons in Full-Swing

Nandua alum Kimberly Wert has not only found her stripes with the University of Missouri Tigers softball team but is leading the pack.

The 2017 graduate attended Hofstra University as a freshman and played under the direction of coach Larissa Anderson with the Division I team to begin her collegiate softball career. When Anderson was offered the head coaching position with the Tigers, Wert made the decision to follow her coach.

Last season, Wert appeared in 32 games for Hofstra as a pinch hit-

ter, smashing three homers as her first three collegiate hits, with her first being the gamewinning three-run blast against North Florida last February. She finished her debut year with five home runs and 13 RBIs, and a .800 slugging percentage.

Wert has 18 games under her belt with the Divi-

sion I Missouri and is the top performer for home runs with 6, RBIs with 16, and she currently sports a .311 hitting average.

In her last time out March 2, Wert launched one home run and 3 RBIs during 5 at-bats in the Tiger's 9-8 loss to IUPUI, and she went 1-for-3 to contribute in the 11-1 win over Indiana State.

During her tenure with the Warriors, Wert earned the title of Eastern Shore District Player of the Year three straight years, aiding the Nandua club to three consecutive district and one conference championship. She was also a two-time all-conference selection.

Wert is majoring in health science and plans to become a physical therapist upon graduation.

The Tigers are back in action for a first-of-three on the road against Alabama beginning tonight (Friday) at 6:30 p.m.

Left-handed sniper and Chincoteague graduate Trey Fisher is now in his sophomore season with Old Dominion University Division I baseball team and helped his Monarch's squad to a 12-5 win over Rutgers University March 2, earning Fisher his first career win on the bump, throwing 1.2 innings with 2 strikeouts and 2 hits at Bud Metheny Complex in Norfolk.

The 6-foot Eastern Shore native

threw a scoreless inning in the Monarch's 5-4 loss during the second game against High Point Feb. 15. Fisher relieved the mound for the start of the ninth during the series finale against High Point Feb. 17, facing three batters and allowing one hit.

Fisher earned his first career save Feb. 24 over Binghamton, 12-9, helping the Monarchs to clinch their first series win since 2017.

In his first season with Old Dominion, Fisher pitched in 10 games with one start, with a 0-1 and 7.20 ERA. His collegiate debut was against William & Mary, in which he allowed a run on two hits in 1.1 innings.

Fisher played with the Ponies since his freshman year, where he made the Eastern Shore All-District team consecutively for three years and helped the Ponies claim back-to-back district championships and a flawless record. The Ponies also claimed the Conference 41 championship title during Fisher's sophomore and junior seasons, and he was named Conference 41 Player of the Year and Eastern Shore Player of the Year in 2015.

Fisher is a sport management major. The Monarchs begin a three-game away series this afternoon (Friday) at 3 p.m. against Kansas State at Tointon Stadium. They will be back at home March 12 to take on William & Mary at 6 p.m.

There are so many reasons to quit smoking and to do so immediately that I find it impossible to believe people in the military aren't being better protected from the problem.

It makes absolutely no sense to me that soldiers have this smoking age disadvantage brought about by the July 1 state law that will make it illegal for anyone under the age of 21 to purchase cigarettes in Virginia except those in the military.

That's like saying, you have served your country well, so we want you to die young.

Smoking kills and should be banned altogether. Vaping is the nastiest air freshener I've ever encountered. All branches of the services should be obligated to keep their soldiers safe and that includes from the ills of smoking. Our men and women deserve so much more.

Cigarette smoking caused my mother's kidney cancer, it caused others I knew to die from lung cancer, and it is making my older brother sicker every day.

I am so thankful that I was able to quit about 35 years ago. Back then there was only one way to quit — cold turkey. Now people can ask their doctors for help. I took up eating Tootsie Roll Pops. It was trading one habit for another but it worked.

I started smoking when I was 12. In the 1970s, young students, without parental consent, could smoke in the smoking area behind the auditorium at Central High School, in Painter.

When I started smoking, the cost of a pack of cigarettes was 34 cents. I quit when they were about 98 cents. Now cigarettes range from \$4.80 a pack to more than \$5 a pack. A person with a pack-a-day habit would spend \$35 a week or \$1,820 a year.

According to https://smokefree.gov
"Smokers who quit before age 40 reduce their chance of dying too early from smoking-related diseases by about

90 percent. Over time, you'll greatly lower your risk of death from lung cancer and other diseases such as heart disease, stroke, chronic bronchitis, emphysema, and at least 13 other kinds of cancer."

The website <u>www.webmd.com</u> says smoking speeds up mental decline. "In the elderly years, the rate of mental decline is up to five times faster in smokers than in nonsmokers, according to a study to 9,200 men and women over age 65."

Smoking also raises the risk of developing Lupus, causing infant death syndrome, impotence, macular degeneration, rheumatoid arthritis, acid reflux, colon cancer, depression, and thyroid disease.

Besides all the things I've mentioned, cigarettes stink. They make your clothes reek and your breath most unpleasant. If you smoke in your car, the value goes down faster than ever.

Lung diseases caused by smoking include COPD, which includes emphysema and chronic bronchitis. Cigarette smoking causes most cases of lung cancer. If you have asthma, tobacco smoke can trigger an attack or make an attack worse. Smok-

ers are 12 to 13 times more likely to die from COPD than nonsmokers.

Smoking can cause ectopic pregnancy, which is when a fertilized egg implants somewhere other than the uterus. The egg can't survive and, if left untreated, can be life-threatening for the mother. Smoking also causes reduced fertility. Smoking while pregnant can cause babies to be born prematurely and/or with a low birth weight.

Smokers are also more likely to get Type 2 diabetes. The risk is 30 to 40 percent higher for smokers than nonsmokers. In addition, smoking increases the risk of complications such as heart and kidney disease, poor blood flow to legs and feet, blindness and nerve damage. Smoking kills more Americans than alcohol, car accidents, HIV, guns, and illegal drugs combined. It shortens male lives by about 12 years and those of females by about 11 years. It can damage nearly every organ in the body, including the lungs, heart, blood vessels, reproductive organs, mouth, skin, eyes, and bones.

Please quit and encourage others to stop.

Hard to Avoid Stress in Medical Care

We are all consumers of health care. One of the pieces of basic advice that almost all of us get is to "avoid stress." But ironically, dealing with many providers within the health care system becomes very stressful, regardless of one's condition. This should not happen; it is hard enough being sick or injured without having additional stress.

What am I talking about? You call your provider's office and instead of promptly getting a human being, you are presented with an automated series of messages and menus, which do nothing to address your concerns. Finally, you get

past the menus and messages, but instead of getting a human, you get voice-mail. Medical care by voicemail during normal working hours is outrageous and certainly stressful. You have to either try calling back or wait for someone who did not care enough to answer your original call to hopefully call you back. In either event, you still have not gotten done what you needed to get done, whether it was to make an appointment or get a question answered or whatever. Not exactly avoiding stress.

Then there is the stress of waiting for results of a test or other lab work. I'm not talking about situations where

endometrial cancer and had to wait 10 days for results. 10 days. How is this avoiding stress?

Then there is the case where one calls the provider's office to get results and is told that the doctor is not available, even though the test results are there. Presumable the staff can read. Cannot someone read the results to you rather than making you wait for a phone call that may come who knows

when? How is this avoiding stress? How is it even humane to make a person, already worried about his/her condition, worry even longer for an indeterminate amount of time?

Then there is the scheduling hassle. You uphold your end of the bargain by arriving at the provider's office when you are supposed to, but you end up waiting long past your scheduled appointment time. I am certainly not complaining here about trivial overruns, but waits sometimes exceed an hour past the scheduled time. This is caused mostly by a lack of skill and

consideration by those doing the scheduling. It is stressful sitting in a medical waiting room well past appointment time with no knowledge of when you will be seen.

There is one basic suggestion that those working in the medical arena might try: putting themselves in the patient's shoes and making some corrections before giving the banal advice to avoid stress.
