Whispering Pines To Whisper Its Last

The former Whispering Pines Motel, in ruins from being neglected and set afire during an infamous arson spree, is going to be demolished at last. Well, at least there is an approved plan for the dangerous, abandoned, and deteriorating buildings that are filled with rotting mattresses, mold, and trash. A date for its demise is expected to be set next week.

Accomack supervisors voted Wednesday to give Allen Clark Jr. Inc., of Atlantic, the \$185,260 job of hauling away the dangerous remains of the once-booming landmark. Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr was absent from the session due to illness. The rest of the members were in favor of the move, which included an assessment of \$10,910 for the abatement of asbestos.

Three other companies bid on the project. Harry C. White House Movers, of Pocomoke, Md., wanted \$660,000; Brittingham Bulldozing and Excavating, of New Church, bid \$399,500; and Macsons Demolition & Environmental Services, of Norfolk, asked for \$248,316.

A lien will be put on the property, which belongs to Whispering Pines Inc., of Dillsburg, Pa., for any money that can't be recovered. The old motel was auctioned in 2012 for \$28,000 in an attempt to collect around \$35,000 in back real estate taxes. The sale fell through when it was realized that the company and its president, Dusan Bratic, had filed for bankruptcy. In December, a judge decided to allow the county to move forward despite the filing.

A Virginia Economic Development Partnership grant of \$50,000 will help fund the project. Nearly \$118,460 in derelict building funds, set aside for such projects, will also be used. The rest will come from the current county budget.

"Although we hope to recoup costs expended, unfortunately, it is likely that the county will have to absorb a portion of the costs, and recoup expenses from future tax revenue generated by the future development of the property," according to a memo written by Deputy County Administrator Rich Morrison. "The property will be flat," he said at the session. Trees and some concrete are not part of the demolition. "A sewage lagoon, that is secured by a fence,"

HAS NORTHAMPTON GONE TOO FAR WITH UNSAFE BUILDINGS?

A concerned citizen opened a dialogue with Northampton supervisors March 12 on whether county procedures for addressing unsafe structures are too heavy-handed on historical properties that may be worth saving or at least allowing salvage of valuable materials before demolition.

Donna Bozza, of Cape Charles, noted that "the county has been really proactive with tearing down abandoned buildings," but she was concerned about the demolition of the former Capeville train depot that was located just south of the Cape Center.

Northampton County staff had sent the property owners notice of the building's unsafe condition last year, requiring them to either repair or remove the structure. The owners gave permission for the county to demolish the building by controlled burn in December 2018.

Bozza said the building had been featured in a magazine article about travel on the Eastern Shore and suggested Northampton's disposition toward its

old and historical structures "speaks to our tourism initiative" and "how we present ourselves."

"I know there's a fine line between what is a historical building and what is ... rubble," she said.

"How do you discriminate between what is an eyesore and what is something that brings character and charm?" she asked. "The soul of the Eastern Shore is a lot of its old buildings."

Roy Ballard, of Exmore, who is known for restoring railroad relics, would have liked to do something at the Capeville train depot if he had known it was about to be "torched," Bozza said.

In a conversation with the Eastern Shore Post, Kim Denny, the executive director of the Cape Charles Historical Society, which runs the Cape Charles Museum and Welcome Center, said her organization also would have been interested in the Capeville train depot, but the historical society did not know about the plans to burn the building until it was "too late."

will also be left, Morrison reported.

NASA Report

Acting Director Dave Pierce, of NASA Wallops Flight Facility, was introduced to the supervisors and reported that the agency is anticipating an "amazing" year. He also acknowledged the goal of making reductions. "Companies are consolidating ... administration directed us to do the same ... to work more closely with the Greenbelt office."

"Wallops is crucial to the future of the agency over the next 20 years ... We know that our budget is solid for this year... and for the years to come," Pierce said. "We want to work with our community to be as involved and as transparent as possible."

The director said there will be 23 sounding rockets, 16 balloon flights, two Antares missions, a Minotaur launch, aircraft missions, a launch competition to help grown small launch vehicle providers, and more in 2019.

He thanked local chambers of commerce, chicken plants, churches, and others for supporting NASA employees during the shutdown. Pierce noted that NASA was recognized as the best place to work in the federal government "and we believe Wallops is best of that."

Pierce got his start through an internship while in high school and wants to inspire students to work in a STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) job. "We can look forward to partnering with you to have internships and work in the schools." Quoting a recent ODU study, Pierce said, NASA brings \$820 million in direct economic impacts to the community, \$284 million in indirect impacts, and \$265 million in induced impacts.

County Budget Approved

The supervisors also voted to approve their 2019-20 budget of \$58.2 million with no increases in real estate or personal property tax rates. The total spending package involves 1.2 percent more money than is in the current budget or an increase of \$674,010.

There was a \$5 per ton increase in the tipping fee, to \$80. About 57 percent of the total funds, or \$32.9 million, would come from general property taxes. The majority of the funds, about \$18.1 million, or 31.2 percent, are earmarked for county schools.

It includes penalties and interest. The debtors are provided alphabetically on 158 pages and exclude those owing less than \$5. The list totals \$3,853,364.

Litter Plan

A new initiative that pairs guarded prisoners with county workers to collect roadside litter has begun, Mason reported. The idea was the brainstorm of Capt. Todd Wessells, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, who volunteered nonviolent prisoners with less than 90 days left on their sentence for the task. It takes three people to operate the county's litter vacuum truck - a driver, a hose operator, and an additional laborer to collect items too large/heavy to be vacuumed.

The driver will continue to be a county employee. But the other two workers will be prisoners under the guard of an armed deputy. Mason said the plan was approved by the county's liability cov-

erage provider and agreed to by Sheriff Todd Godwin. "Standard operating guidelines have also been drafted (and are) designed to safeguard county staff."

Prisoners are already involved in trash collection on the weekends. Wessells wants to up the job to four times a week with two runs for litter during the week.

Supervisor Reneta Major said she saw Godwin's work crew recently on Shell-bridge Road. "Trash is everywhere," she said. "It sickens me to see so much trash. Especially when it is so close to a convenience center. I noticed the Waste Watcher group doing litter pickup as well."

Melfa Area Apartments

The supervisors also approved a conditional use permit for Accomack Properties, Inc. as recommended for by the county planning commission. The permit will allow three apartment buildings with a total of 45 units within the residential zone. Permits are required for more than 25 dwelling units. The property is on Dogwood Road near Lankford Highway. Before the project could begin, the company would have to acquire property from the state police nearby so a traffic light and adequate turn lanes could be constructed.





Community Organizers Pitch Solutions to School Board After Arcadia Threats

At Arcadia High School, two alleged threats of violence made recently by students prompted local members of the activist group, Virginia Organizing, to speak at the March 19 Accomack school board meeting to raise awareness of a bill passed by state legislators that may help the school division prepare for potential future threats.

"Recent events at Arcadia High School have refocused the community's concern regarding school safety and school resource officer responsibilities," stated Lorna Gagneux, of Virginia Organizing.

Senate Bill 1214, co-sponsored by Sen. Lynwood Lewis, will require all Virginia school divisions that employ school resource officers to have a memorandum of understanding with local law enforcement outlining the roles and responsibilities of school resource officers.

Willie Justis, a local leader of Virginia Organizing, called the bill a "protective mechanism for both the school division and law enforcement."

Virginia Organizing is willing to assist the school board in drafting the

memorandum of understanding, Justis said.

Gagneux asked the school board to "communicate with the public" and solicit input before writing the memorandum of understanding.

According to the Virginia General Assembly website, Gov. Ralph Northam approved the bill March 18, and it will take effect July 1.

Members of Virginia Organizing also addressed the Accomack school division's efforts to recruit and hire a highly qualified, diverse teacher workforce.

Accomack is one of seven Virginia school divisions selected to receive Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) grants promoting diversity among public school teachers.

Accomack will get \$4,216; the maximum award is \$10,000.

The money will pay for tutoring and testing fees to help provisionally licensed minority teachers achieve full licensure. In Virginia, before obtaining professional teaching licenses, teachers must pass the Praxis tests, standardized tests designed specifically for teachers to assess their basic knowl-

edge of the subjects they teach.

According to data acquired by Virginia Organizing, Accomack schools hired 53 new teachers for the current school year, and only three, or less than 6 percent, were nonwhite.

But Accomack student enrollment as of May 2016 showed that 60 percent of students were nonwhite. Of 5,322 students, more than 39 percent were white, about 37 percent were black, and 21.5 percent were Hispanic.

Karen Downing, of Virginia Organizing, suggested that more of Accomack's future teachers should be local.

"Instead of a school-to-prison pipeline, we should be building a school-toteaching pipeline by investing in career paths and incentives to ignite an interest and passion in elementary age children to become teachers," she said.

They should be encouraged to continue pursuing a career in education "as they go into middle and high school, with the hope and anticipation that they will return to the Shore, thereby increasing the pool of qualified teachers," Downing said.

She also cited Accomack's retired

teacher population as a potential resource in the classroom and as mentors for new teachers.

In another matter, Connie Burford, of Bloxom, suggested Accomack high school graduations be broadcast live for graduates' family and friends who can't attend due to military obligations or other reasons, such as the limited number of tickets allotted to each graduate.

"I do know that we have the capabilities to do this," Burford said.

She suggested having "trial runs" by live broadcasting the grand marches at the high schools' upcoming proms.

School board member Gary Reese said Burford had a "great idea" and several others agreed.

Burford believes parents would also be interested in getting copies of the broadcasts as mementos of the occasions.

"I go back and look at my son's kindergarten graduation, and I find it really entertaining to see how far he's come.

"Just think about parents now, ten years from now, when they could go back and look at their child's high school graduation, compliments of Accomack County school systems."

Growing Pains Have Two Businesses Grappling for Same Waterfront Property

Cape Charles is having growing pains, as made evident at two public hearings March 14, both concerning development by the town harbor.

Jon Dempster, owner of the Shanty restaurant and the Hungry Crab LLC, offered the town \$262,000 for a portion of Lot 10 at the harbor, an area less than half an acre, to expand his business and reduce wait times during the summer tourist season from two hours to one hour.

But some citizens were concerned that the Cape Charles town council is giving away prime harborfront property for cheap, even though \$262,000 was determined as the fair market value of the property, according to an independent review by W.R. McCain and Associates, of Salisbury, Md.

Bruce Evans called the property "tremendously undervalued."

Wayne Creed said citizens are also worried Cape Charles would be "giving up control on the waterfront" by selling the harbor property to the Hungry Crab. He suggested the council extend

the Shanty's lease or take other action to ensure the business' success without selling harbor property.

Dempster currently has a lease agreement with the town, effective from 2012 through 2021, for the property occupied by the Shanty. He pays \$500 a month plus 1 percent of gross revenues. The amount of gross revenues paid started at .5 percent but increased in 2015.

Dempster assured the town council that he isn't planning to "flip" the property or "block any access or take anything away from the town," but to "continue to invest in it and continue to improve it."

He chose to locate his restaurant at the Cape Charles harbor because the town's harbor plan called for the development. Dempster has invested \$750,000 in the business and has spent \$100,000 this winter renovating the kitchen and restrooms in preparation for further expansion.

"We have three-quarters of a million dollars invested on someone else's land. That, from a business owner's perspective, can be an uneasy place to sit," Dempster said.

"You don't just snap your fingers and come up with" money, he continued. "You need to go to the bank, and the bank wants equity."

"We feel much more comfortable having the security of owning the land," Dempster said.

But the Shanty owner's issue is twofold. Not only must be convince town council members to sell him the land, he must convince them not to accept a competing offer.

Southern Shore Holdings LLC made an unsolicited offer for the .4-acre harbor property – \$300,000 cash, nearly \$40,000 more than the fair market value and "without the lengthy financing contingency," the company stated in an email.

The company also offered the town first right of refusal and the lessor of the property second right of refusal "to prevent the future sale that may not be in the taxpayers'

best interest."

The Shanty would be allowed to continue operating under its current lease, but if the restaurant "falls out of favor and moves on," the parcel would be repurposed for a "new highest and best use."

Southern Shore Holdings recommended the town council practice "fiscal responsibility" rather than "subsidizing a private enterprise."

Another public hearing concerned the town vacating the Sustainable Technology Industrial Park (STIP) public right-of-way, near the Cape Charles Yacht Center to the north and the Cape Charles Natural Area Preserve to the west.

The STIP park, which opened in 1996, was the first of its kind in the U.S. It offered financial incentives to green businesses that used renewable energy and resources, but few pursued those incentives and the industrial park remains largely empty today.



Eyre Baldwin, of Southport Investors LLC, owns the yacht center, which is undergoing a multi-year expansion that will include the acquisition of a 600-ton boat lift. Last year, he purchased the 1.5-acre parcel that includes the right-of-way on Bayshore Road from Northampton County. The parcel originally belonged to the town of Cape Charles.

He wants the road for transporting boats on lifts from the yacht center to a repair facility on another nearby parcel he owns.

"If VDOT (the Virginia Department of Transportation) or the county kept the road, and I wanted to move a boat that was over-width ... then I've got to get a special use permit every single time ... even if it's only for two or three minutes," Baldwin said.

"There's no conspiracy, there's no drama. It's safety, and it's cost-factor."

He added he has no intention of closing the road to the public and plans to extend a local trail around the harbor for public access. Baldwin also allows

public access to two natural area preserve walkways on additional property he owns.

Baldwin is ready to settle the matter of the right-of-way so telephone and power lines can be buried to allow boat lifts safe passage, and he can close two other business deals, he said.

Spencer Murray, chairman of the Northampton board of supervisors, called Cape Charles' vacation of the public right-of-way a "simple thing," noting the property transfer was already done.

Both the county and the town abandoning the right-of-way means the street will be removed from the secondary road system and "VDOT has no further obligation to go in there and do anything."

"I don't think VDOT's ever thrown a pebble of gravel on it in the last number of years," Murray remarked.

Northampton supervisors will vote on the matter April 9.

At press time March 21, the Cape Charles council was preparing to render its decisions on both matters presented at the March 14 public hearings.

~ Buildings ~

It would not have been the historical society's first time getting involved with Eastern Shore railroad history outside of Cape Charles. The organization saved the Bloxom train station, which was dismantled and rebuilt onsite at the Cape Charles Museum — one of the projects Ballard worked on, Bozza said.

"Most historical-minded people on the Eastern Shore would agree that the burning (of the Capeville train depot) was sad," Denny said.

Even if a historical building is beyond saving, the wood could be salvaged. There are "lucrative business" opportunities in selling reclaimed hardwood, Bozza said.

Before a historical structure is demolished, local historical societies and craftsmen should have the opportunity to contact the owner and say, "We'll take that off your hands," rather than find out about the demolition afterward and realize "it's gone and we'll never get it again," she said.

Spencer Murray, the chairman of the Northampton board of supervisors, responded.

"The process for demolition of unsafe buildings is not totally without

sensitivity to historical value," he said.

That process requires locating the property owner and obtaining written permission to proceed with demolition. Sometimes the owner doesn't respond, Murray said.

There are additional complications when a historical society expresses interest in a property but lacks funding, causing further delays, he said.

The Capes Charles Historical Society is one of those organizations with limited resources, Denny said. "There's only so much we can do ... so much money ... so many volunteers."

But "if there's another checkmark that we need to make ... we ought to check that," Murray added later.

"I don't want anybody ... to think that we're just going around burning down buildings willy-nilly," he said.

Supervisor David Fauber suggested that, in the future, the county could advertise the demolition of a historic structure in advance and give the public the opportunity to salvage material from the site.

Murray referred Bozza to County Administrator Charlie Kolakowski and Director of Planning and Zoning Susan McGhee for further assistance.

3 Charged With Felonies

Three out-of-state men were charged with felonies this week, according to records filed in Accomack General District Court.

Marcus D. Turner, 45, of St. Bernard Street in Philadelphia, was charged with transporting cocaine, or a cocaine derivative, into Virginia with the intent to distribute and a second or subsequent offense of possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. The crimes occurred March 16. Special Agent Scott Wade, head of the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force, investigated.

William Andrew Mueller, 40, of West Sunset Dr. in Tampa, Fla., was charged with committing a willful act or omission in the care of a child for whom he was responsible on March 16. He was also charged with driving in excess of 80 mph, a misdemeanor. Secured bail was set at \$2,000. Trooper Mark Blankenship investigated.

Charles Carter, 48, of Bartram Drive in Philadelphia, was accused of possessing a Schedule I or II drug March 16. Wade investigated.

Jesse Paul Juarez-Perez, 20, of Bennett Street in Parksley, was convicted of misdemeanor intentional damage in connection with a Dec. 15, 2018, incident. Juarez-Perez was initially charged with a felony.

Parksley Man Pleads Guilty to Charges

A Parksley man pleaded guilty Tuesday in Accomack Circuit Court to burglary and petty larceny in connection with an incident at his father's office last July.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan said Richard Alexander Lewis, 31, of Mary Road, admitted to crimes in a text message to his father, Richard Lewis, who owns Associated Grain. The office was entered and five checks were taken, Morgan said. Four of the checks were cashed by the defendant.

A plea bargain in the case involved not charging the suspect with forgery, uttering, and gaining money by false pretenses in exchange for the guilty pleas.

Substitute Judge Ray Grubbs said he hoped to sentence Lewis in May after guidelines and screening for the CCAP (Community Corrections Alternative Program) were completed.

First Sentencing in Murder-for-Hire Scheme

The first of a half dozen suspects charged in connection with the October 2017 murder-for-hire scheme of a police informant was sentenced recently in Accomack Circuit Court to 10 years in prison.

All but time served was suspended for Deshawn Markiese Drummond, 28, of Savageville. The term was given for conspiracy to commit obstruction of justice. Drummond was initially charged with conspiring to commit capital murder and conspiring to commit capital murder with a prisoner. Those counts will not be prosecuted in accordance with a plea agreement Drummond made with Accomack Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan.

Those details of the agreement were disclosed in a trial but the record itself is sealed.

"I didn't try to do no murder," Drummond testified. "He (Evron Terrell Strand Sr.) wanted to get off his charges" so he used codes to tell Drummond to kill Johnson. "I'm telling you how the streets is ... at first he said whatever I needed and pick a car out of his yard" as payment. "I made no at-

tempt ... I'm pleading guilty to where I was on the phone."

A jury has recommended that Strand, 44, of Deer Drive in Nelsonia, be sentenced to 50 years in prison for seven felony counts that resulted in the shooting of Nathaniel "Nate" Johnson Sr., 30, the informant, and his then-girlfriend, 20-year-old Dezarae Smith. The jury also recommended Strand be fined a total of \$202,500. Sentencing is scheduled for June 6.

Strand was awaiting trial for dis-

tribution of cocaine when Johnson and Smith were shot while walking on Linhaven Circle, near Painter, on Halloween night 2017. Strand wanted Johnson to be unable to testify against him.

In another case, James Patrick Bowen, 43, of Texacotown Road in Melfa, was sentenced to two years with all but 30 days suspended for possession of hydrocodone on Aug. 5, 2017.

Good behavior was ordered for five years. His driver's license was suspended for six months.

VDOT Green Lights Signal at Cape Charles Food Lion

The Virginia Department of Transportation gave its final approval for the Cape Charles Food Lion project that was modified to include a traffic signal at the intersection of Route 13 and the shopping center's south entrance.

Chris Isdell, VDOT's Accomac residency administrator, reported the news to Northampton supervisors March 12.

The road safety enhancement project originally included wider, longer turn lanes, tapered road edges, upgraded road markings and signs, and additional lighting, but no traffic signal.

When citizens at a VDOT public hearing last July demanded a traffic signal for the busy intersection, Isdell was concerned that the entire project would have to be resubmitted for review and could be rejected.

But that speed bump was avoided, and the only other action that is required is finding more funding, Isdell said.

The addition of the traffic signal drove up the total cost of the project from \$1.7 million to \$1.9 million, a 13

percent increase.

Isdell previously estimated the traffic signal might cost around \$500,000.

Construction is expected to begin in July 2020 and end in April 2021.

Isdell informed supervisors on upcoming repairs to Cemetery Road. That project will cost \$925,000 and is scheduled from November 2022 to October 2023, at the same time the road will be repaired in Accomack County.

The chairman of the board of supervisors, Spencer Murray, remarked that he and Supervisor Oliver Bennett have worked on that project since 2006 and "both of us hope that the repairs are made before we're actually in the cemetery."

"I would hope so, too," Isdell said.

He also addressed maintenance issues. The Eastern Shore avoided a major weather event this winter like the blizzard last January, but wet and rainy conditions have created a "host of challenges for us with drainage" that are keeping VDOT workers busy on a daily basis, he said.

Isdell introduced the new assistant Accomac residency administrator, Tommy Spring, who filled the position after a two-year vacancy.

Clarification

A court document identified Cole Kambarn Conklin, 29, of Maddox Boulevard on Chincoteague, who admitted to charges related to burglarizing two local pharmacies, as a Navy engineer. A spokesperson for the Navy said Conklin is not in the Navy or employed by the Navy, but employed by a contractor working for the Navy.





Before joining the treasurer's office in 2005, Lilliston worked at Food Lion, in Onley, for 14 years.

Lilliston says he has a reputation

for being "humble" and the "drive and passion for the job" and "a support staff with over 80 years of experience." He promised he "will do his best to be fair and understanding in every possible situation" and "will assist anyone in any way that he can."

With these qualities and his commitment and loyalty to Accomack County and its taxpayers, Lilliston said he is "truly a great asset to the county."

Lilliston is an active member of Burton's Independent Methodist Church, where he serves on the trustee board and assists with church finances. He is a 1991 graduate of Nandua High School and earned a business management degree with an emphasis on computer information systems in 1997 from the Eastern Shore Community College. Lilliston and his wife of 22 years, Tysheia, have five children and five grandchildren.







New ESCC Building to Open in Late Summer

The Eastern Shore Community College is undergoing a few changes. There's the reorganization of the school called a reboot that involved all the community colleges in the state and will mean a consolidation of resources, a decrease in administrative costs, and a drive to increase enrollment - all over the next three years.

Interim President Billy Greer is holding down the fort as the college continues its search for a new president after Linda Thomas-Glover left more than a year ago.

And the new main building is slated to open in late summer just in time for the fall term. Initially, construction was due to be completed in February, but weather prevented that from happening.

The new building will be filled with windows that will allow fantastic views of the campus. It has a grand staircase, lots of classrooms including labs for computers, chemistry, and biology.

"We certainly believe it's going to get the attention of a lot of 18-yearolds," Greer said, adding, the freshman can start in Melfa instead of going to a school with tens of thousands of students where they would get lost in the crowd.

An abundance of study rooms, a student center, a medical room, a large media center, and a bookstore are all included in the new building. There is even a recessed wall where a Willie Crockett painting will be placed while the view from the president's office and many of the classrooms will show off the Turner sculpture that stands in the parking circle.



The Monumental Accomplishments of Two Eastern Shore Women

It's been a long time coming, but Virginia women in history are getting recognition with the Virginia Women's Monument on Capitol Square in downtown Richmond. Two Eastern Shore women — Dr. Susie May Ames and Anne Makemie Holden — are among the 230 names cited for making unique contributions to the commonwealth's culture and history.

The inscribed names are literally reflected on the glass Wall of Honor at the monument. The Virginia Women's Monument is the first monument in the nation to honor the many significant but usually unrecognized contributions of women.

This year is the 400th anniversary of the first English women coming to Virginia — in 1619 — in significant numbers. The brave female travelers who crossed the Atlantic Ocean under arduous conditions helped make the Virginia colony — and the nation — a permanent settlement for families. The lives of the two Eastern Shore women recognized span historical times from the Revolutionary War to the civil rights era of the 1960s.

Preacher's Daughter, Patriot

In the 1700s, when women's lives were defined by men — their fathers and husbands —Anne Makemie Holden (1702-1788) was no exception. Today's travelers to Accomack County's Makemie Monument Park in Grotons (in the Mappsville/Temperanceville area), can visit her grave, beside that of her father, Francis Makemie, recognized as chief founder of organized Presbyterianism in America in 1706.

An ordained minister educated at Glasgow University, Makemie settled on the Shore in 1683, according to genealogical records provided by Onancock descendant Joseph P. "Joe" Boggs. Boggs, who says he grew up knowing he was related to Makemie, has learned he's related in "about five different ways." He's gone through all of the Makemie family wills and recommends books and online resources by historians "for all of the Makemie facts."

Francis Makemie's first home, "Matchatank," was a land grant to Makemie from England's King Charles II. The farm eventually comprised more than 450 acres of commercial enterprises, in-



cluding shipbuilding operations, according to Boggs. Makemie became a wealthy landowner by combining various entrepreneurial efforts with his ministry, such as hauling cargo to Barbados during trips there to evangelize.

Daughter Anne – his only heir after his wife and other daughter died – became a wealthy woman through inheritances. Her father's will had left his daughters more than two thousand acres spread among Smith Island, Sykes Island, Watts Great Island and "350 acres on the South side of Matchetank [sic] Creek." Besides her father's landholdings, she was widowed three times (Holden being the surname of her third husband) – but proved herself to be a very capable manager of her lands and business operations.

Expanding on her inheritance, she made her mission in life that of continuing her father's mission – supporting individuals in the formation of towns, as opposed to encouraging life on individual plantations. The development of mills, for example, supported entire communities.

A woman who "could be feisty when necessary," Boggs says Holden demonstrated "a revolutionary spirit when she refused to allow British militia in her home during the Revolutionary War." Specific reference to her patriotism appears in historian Ralph T. Whitelaw's papers referencing that in "1787 Madame Anne Holden made a deed of gift of her land in Fookses' Neck to John, Francis, and Joseph Boggs which stated that, 'In consideration of the Natural Love and affection which she bears to Johh, Francis and Joseph Boggs aforesaid and that they will always Vote at the Annual Election for the most Wise and Discreet men and who have proved theselves [sic] real friends to American Independence to represent the County of Accomack..."

The Francis Makemie Society provides directions on its website to get to the Makemie Monument Park: In Temperanceville, turn west from U.S. 13 onto Route 695, Saxis Road, and proceed about 6 miles. Turn right on Monument Road and proceed to the park. Travelers can find at least nine highway markers related to the Makemie family within seven miles of the historical marker at Makemie Monument Park.

Professor, Historian

Coming forward a century, Susie May Ames was born in Pungoteague in 1888, exactly a hundred years after Anne Makemie Holden died. Ames, who never married, was the eldest of five daughters and the second of seven children of a local businessman, according to the "Dictionary of Virginia Biography" written by Dr. Jon Kukla and J. Jefferson Looney and published by the Library of Virginia in 1998.

In 1908 Ames graduated from Randolph-Macon Women's College (later Randolph College) and was appointed an instructor there in 1923 after teaching and serving as principal in schools on the Eastern Shore and in Maryland, Indiana, and Kentucky. From 1923 to 1955, Ames "devoted her life to the college and its students," according to the DVB. Her biography goes on to show she became "adjunct professor in 1926, associate professor in 1940 and professor in 1954. Ames was one of fewer than 500 women to earn a doctorate in history [at Columbia University] between 1920 and the completion of her graduate work in 1940. Her dissertation, published as "Studies of the Virginia Eastern Shore in the Seventeenth Century" (1940; reprinted 1973), was a pioneering investigation of social and economic history based on thorough analysis of the earliest county court records in the nation."

Kukla explained in a telephone interview that although scholarship by women wasn't valued in Virginia or in the South at large at the time, "Scholars at Columbia University and in other parts of the country clearly respected Ames's work on early Virginia history." Being "limited by gender," he says, meant that without recognition by her male peers, "she lacked access to important contacts for her scholarship."

Not to be deterred by the lack of male assistance, Ames edited - among many other works -- two volumes of early Eastern Shore records, volumes still in use and "as solid today as when she was alive," Kukla adds. (Ames died at The Hermitage in Onancock in 1969 and is buried at St. George's Church cemetery near Pungoteague). "Because she was closed off from access to male audiences, Ames gave really excellent presentations to female audiences. In reading through them, I was struck by their outstanding quality. She stands out among only four or five historians of early Virginia and the Eastern Shore."

Ninety-one-year-old Ridgway Dunton of Onancock, a member of the Eastern Shore




Photo courtesy of Library of Virginia Susie May Ames is recognized in panel 10 of the Virginia Women's Monument. It is on the bottom right side of the photo.

of Virginia Historical Society — of which Ames was a founder and president — personally met Ames and recalls her as a tiny person who "was an absolute dynamo in terms of promoting the Eastern Shore. She did special events, he says, "like 'Home and History Week' to get people to return to the Shore for visits." Of her writings, he specifically remembers her paper, "Federal Policy Toward the Eastern Shore of Virginia in 1861," published in the "Virginia Magazine of History and Biography" in 1961, a paper, Kuka writes, prompted by issues of civil rights and Massive Resistance she observed in her later years.

Dedication Ceremony for Monument

When completed, the Virginia Women's Monument will include 12 life-size, bronze statues on a granite plaza, of historic women representing a number of different fields and endeavors. The granite plaza and the Wall of Honor are completed and accessible to the public.

"These women played important roles in the early years of the Old Dominion's recorded history and in the 20th century, when our state and country were undergoing seismic social changes," said Susan Clarke Schaar, clerk of the Senate and a member of the Virginia Women's Monument Commission. "Their stories richly deserve to be remembered and told."

The full cost of the project, for the plaza, glass wall and sculptures, is

\$3.8 million, and has been mostly privately funded by individuals, corporations, and philanthropic organizations. Some funding came from the state.

The Women's Monument Commission has been working on the project since 2011. The first four statues were commissioned in 2018, and commissioning of the next three was announced last week.

The remaining five statues — of Martha Washington, Clementina Rind, Sally L. Tompkins, Maggie L. Walker, and Sarah G. Jones — are partially funded and will be commissioned as contributions become available.

A formal dedication of the Virginia Women's Monument is scheduled for Oct. 14, with most of the bronze statues expected to be installed by that time. Visitors will be able to walk up to the statues and learn more about the women and their stories through an educational component.



Four Completed Bronze Statues

The first four bronze statues, fully funded and commissioned for the Virginia Women's Monument, include Cockacoeske (pronounced Coke-a-COWski), a visionary Native American chieftain; Anne Burras Laydon, a Jamestown settler; Virginia E. Randolph, an influential African-American educator; and Adele Clark, a passionate advocate for woman suffrage and the arts.

- Cockacoeske, leader of the Pamunkey after the death of her husband, Totopotomoy, in 1656. She was an astute leader of her people and she made an impression on the colonial officials with whom she negotiated. On May 29, 1677, she signed the Treaty of Middle Plantation, which secured tribal hunting rights and land ownership as well as united several tribes under her authority.
- Anne Burras Laydon represents the women who sailed to Virginia and overcame many deprivations to establish a thriving colony. She arrived in Jamestown in 1608 as a teenage maidservant. In December of that year, she married John Laydon, in what is recorded as the first English wedding to take place in Virginia. She and her husband survived the starving time of 1609-1610 and raised four daughters.
- Virginia E. Randolph, the child of former slaves, taught school in Goochland, Hanover, and Henrico counties. While teaching at Henrico's Mountain Road School, she developed her innovative approach to education by creating a successful formula based on practicality, creativity, and involvement from parents and the community. In 1908, she became the first Jeanes Supervisor Industrial Teacher, a position she held for more than 40 years. She earned a national and international reputation as a leader in education.
- Adèle Clark championed the arts and the woman suffrage movement. She helped establish the Equal Suffrage League of Virginia in 1909 and went on speaking tours that helped establish chapters throughout the state. Selected as the first chair of the newly organized Virginia League of Women Voters, she twice served as president and also was elected to the board of the National League of Women Voters. An accomplished artist, she was instrumental in establishing Virginia's Art Commission, a precursor to the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts.



A Dying Wish For Wachapreague

It started out as a local man's dying wish to inform people about the USS Wachapreague so the knowledge would somehow revitalize his hometown and make it as prosperous as it was when the late Johnny Tatum was growing up there many decades ago.

Once the Eastern Shore Post learned of the quest, a reporter began a search for details about the ship, which soon led to information about other boats that also had familiar titles. Navy vessels were named USS Saxis, USS Tangier, USS Accomack, USS Oyster Bay, and USS Chincoteague.

John Harrison "Johnny" Tatum died in 2015 when he was 58 years old. He lived in Wachapreague for years in the home of his grandparents, near the firehouse. He was a Navy veteran, worked on party fishing boats in Wachapreague, and did other jobs around town.

Johnny Tatum was a rescue swimmer in the Navy, his first cousin William Tatum, also a Navy veteran, said recently. "If people fell off or had to eject, the helicopter would hover and he (Johnny Tatum) would jump out and rescue. We learned how to swim the hard way by jumping off the pier, falling off, or swimming with the currents," the cousin added.

Johnny Tatum was stationed on a new carrier while in the service "when a pipe burst," William Tatum said. "It was a chemical reaction that paralyzed him" and the injuries brought him back home. "I wish he was still living to tell this."

Navy records show the USS Wachapreague was a motor torpedo boat tender commissioned from 1944 to 1946. During World War II, the boat was assigned to the Asiatic-Pacific theater and participated in two campaigns. "It earned four battle stars for World War II service," records state.

This type of ship was also used by the Navy in the Vietnam War. It provided fuel and other provisions for torpedo boats. It was classified as "AGP" and is sometimes called a "patrol craft tender."

According to another Navy site, AGPs were often named for mythological figures. Wachapreague, a Native American word, is well known locally as meaning "Little City by the Sea." The boat was also referred to as a seaplane tender. Those vessels were often named for bays, sounds, straits, avia-

tion pioneers, or birds.

The Wachapreague weighed 2,400 tons with a full load. It was 311 feet long, had a 41-foot beam and a 14-foot draft. It could go up to 18 knots. It had diesel engines, was built at Lake Washington Shipyards in Houghton, Wash., and was commissioned on May 17, 1944. Another Navy listing stated the Wachapreague was christened by Mrs. E. L. Barr during launching ceremonies on July 10, 1943.

The boat departed San Diego, Calif., in July 1944, following shakedown training and got underway for Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, en route to the Southwest Pacific. "She stopped briefly at Espiritu Santo, New Herbeides, and Brisbane, Australia, before reaching her ultimate destination ... Milne Bay, New Guinea, where she began tending a patrol torpedo (PT) boat squadron," a Navy record stated.

"In October, she sailed with her sisters," USS Oyster Bay and USS Willoughby (an area near Norfolk, Va.), "all escorting a group of 45 PT boats."

"Wachapreague slowing to nine knots periodically to fuel two torpedo boats simultaneously, one alongside to starboard and one astern, eventually replenishing the fuel supply of all 15 of her brood and successfully completed the voyage under their own power. A brief two-day respite at Kossol Roads, Palau, for repairs and a further refueling of the PT boats, preceded the final leg of the voyage."

A few days after arriving in the Philippines, her PT boats played "a prominent role in the Battle of Surigao Strait, in which the Japanese lost two battleships, two cruisers, and several destroyers."

"Wachapreague continued to tend PT boats in the Philippines for the next six months, coming under attack several times by kamikazes but escaping damage," the Navy reported. "In April 1945 she accompanied her PT boats to North Borneo, where she continued her tender duties through the end of the war."

It wasn't until after that the Wachapreague would actually see the Atlantic Ocean. The boat arrived at San Francisco in December 1945 and sailed for Boston in March 1946.

On Oct. 24, 1944, "upon receipt of word that three powerful Japanese task forces were approaching from three di-

rections, PT boats tended by Wachapreague sped to action stations," the Navy records show. "In the van of the southern Japanese force steamed two battleships and a heavy cruiser, screened by four destroyers, 30 nautical miles behind came the second group, consisting of three cruisers and four destroyers. The American PT boats met the Japanese southern force head-on; three coordinated destroyer torpedo attacks soon followed; while American battleships and cruisers under Rear Admiral Jesse B. Oldendorf deployed across the northern end of Surigao Strait to cross the T of the Japanese ships. The devastation the American warships wreaked upon the Japanese force was nearly total. Only one Japanese ship, the destroyer Shigure, emerged from what became known as the Battle of Surigao Strait."

"PT boats from MTBR on 12 then threw the second task group off balance at the head of the strait, slamming a torpedo into the side of the Japanese light cruiser Abukuma and forcing Abukuma out of the battle line, badly damaged. The Japanese flagship, the heavy cruiser Nachi, collided with another ship in the melee and found her

own speed reduced to 18 knots. This second echelon of Japanese ships, correctly surmising that the first had fallen upon some hard times, then fled, hotly pursued by American planes which administered the coup de grace to sink the already crippled Abukuma and the destroyer Shiranuhi."

Those actions and the battle were part of the larger Battle of Leyte Gulf, "a decisive defeat of the Imperial Japanese Navy from which it never recovered. Yet, while the Japanese capacity for seaborne operations lessened, Japanese forces nevertheless could still strike back from the skies. While the crew of Wachapreague labored to repair the badly damaged torpedo boat on Oct. 25, 1944, a Japanese plane attacked the ship, only to be driven off by a heavy anti-aircraft barrage. Later that day, Wachapreague shifted to Hinunagan Bay for refueling operations that would enable her six PT boats to return to San Pedro Bay. Japanese nuisance attacks from the air continued, however, and a dive bomber attacked Wachapreague just as she was completing the refueling ... as PT-134 pulled away from Wachapreague's side, a Japanese bomb landed some 18 feet from the PT boat's stern, killing one man and wounding four ... Moving out under cover of a smoke screen, Wachapreague vacated her anchorage just before 14 Japanese planes struck and, while clearing the bay, fired on three twin-engined Mitsubishi G4M bombers ... claiming two kills as one ... crashed into the sea and a second, trailing smoke, crashed behind a nearby island."

It was also reported Jan. 4, 1945, "a Japanese suicide aircraft dived into a merchant ship 100 yards ahead of

Wachapreague ... another came under fire as it plunged toward the merchant ship SS Kyle V. Johnson, and a third headed for Wachapreague, only to be knocked into the sea by a heavy anti-aircraft barrage. Later that evening, came alongside Wachapreague and transferred two men she had rescued from the water who had been blown overboard from Kyle V. Johnson during the earlier heavy air action. Wachapreague was anchored at Port Sual to tend to PT boats that gradually extended their patrols northward ... and wreaking havoc on Japanese barge traffic and shipping along the northwest coast of Luzon, destroying some 20 barges. Wachapreague meanwhile continued to make all electrical and engine repairs for the squadron PT boats and handled all major communications for the motor torpedo boat squadrons until she departed Lingayen March 12, 1945, to replenish at Leyte."

Later during the Borneo campaign, Wachapreague "took part in the invasion of Tarakan Island. While the guns still pounded the shore and the invasion itself was underway, Wachapreague entered the Tarakan Bay May 1, 1945, to establish an advance base for her PT boats. For the next four months, until the surrender of Japan on Aug. 15, 1945, that ended World War II, Wachapreague operated from this bay, tending ... 36 PT boats while they in turn conducted daily offensive runs up the coast of Borneo."

The Wachapreague was transferred to the Coast Guard May 10, 1946, and was struck from the Naval Register on June 5, 1946. Later that year, the boat was commissioned the USCGC McCulloch, a high endur-

ance cutter.

It was decommissioned and transferred to South Vietnam in June 1972 and renamed RVNS (Republic of Vietnam Navy South) Ngô Quy n and served as a frigate or warship. In April 1975, custody of the vessel was assumed by the Republic of the Philippines and it was soon commissioned as BRP Gregorio de Pilar. In May 1985, the boat was decommissioned by the Philippine Navy. The final

disposition was listed as "fate unknown."

When Wachapreague was transferred to the Coast Guard, it was converted for service as a weather-reporting ship. The new name, McCulloch, honored the financier Hugh McCulloch, who served as Secretary of the Treasury under presidents Abraham Lincoln, Andrew Johnson, and Chester Arthur.

McCulloch's first homeport was Boston. The boat's primary duty was to gather meteorological data and it was required to patrol a 210-square-mile area for three weeks at a time, "leaving only when physically relieved by another Coast Guard cutter or in the case of a dire emergency."

"While McCulloch was patrolling Ocean Station Bravo off" Labrador, Canada, in January 1959, "raging winter seas cracked her main decks and swept one crewman overboard." The boat managed to reach Naval Station Argentina, Newfoundland, without further mishap, the Navy reported.

In October and November 1965, McCulloch was assigned to patrol the Florida Strait and rescue Cuban refugees during the Cuban exodus, where many people "were in overcrowded and unseaworthy craft handled by totally inexperienced people ... In early November 1965, McCulloch rescued 280 Cuban refugees from small craft in the Florida Strait and carried them to Key West." The 144-member crew was cited for outstanding service and was awarded a Unit Commendation.

McCulloch was reclassified as a high endurance cutter in 1966 and was stationed in Wilmington, N.C., where the boat worked in law enforcement and search and rescue operations until 1972. In 1970, McCullough helped fight a fire aboard Tsui Yung, a merchant ship in Wilmington.

Later, as the Ngô Quy n, at the end of the Vietnam War, the boat "became a ship without a country. She fled to Subic Bay in the Philippines, packed with South Vietnamese refugees."

The Philippine Navy took custody and cleaned and repaired the boat, renaming it Gregorio del Pilar. "The boat was discarded in July 1990 "and probably scrapped."

Meet the March of Dimes Ambassador Family: The Metzgers

Nathaniel Metzger has an appetite for life (and food) like most 17-monthold boys. Watching his brown curls bounce as he gains footing, and distance, to get the fruit plate his dad is feeding him, one wouldn't suspect the tumultuous beginning of his life. Le'Andra and Nathan Metzger, Nathaniel's parents, are thankful for his accomplishments and milestones because his life started with a whirlwind. He was born Oct. 9, 2017, at just 26 weeks and 6 days. The 2 pound, 1 ounce baby was deemed a miracle by those closest to the family. The Metzgers are this year's March of Dimes (MOD) Ambassador Family.

"Little Nathaniel is a testament to how far our medical field has come with prematurity and everyone that is involved in the Eastern Shore March for Babies should be proud they are a part of that. Success takes every facet, from research to community programs and education," said MOD Community Director Susan Turner.

Teachers for Accomack County, they were both in school when Le'Andra's water broke at 24 weeks. She sent Nathan a message and said, "I'm scared and I think you need to come."

Nathan tried to remain calm for his wife, and did so until they told him that she would be flown to a hospital across the bay. The scenario was made more tragic because the Metzgers 10-monthold godchild died earlier that year from congenital myopathy.

Le'Andra was at the hospital for two hours when the situation's gravity struck her.

"I broke down. 'It's gonna be all right, mama,' said the nurse. 'It's gonna be all right."

They gave her surfactant, a drug promoted by MOD that helps with lung development, hoping to keep her from labor until 34 weeks. She was successfully delayed for two more weeks thanks to prolonged medical care and advanced medicines.

"Both schools raised money and

brought us gifts and things to occupy our time while we were at the Ronald McDonald House," said Le'Andra. "We are very thankful for the support ... and prayers during our journey."

Nathan's parents were first able to hold him at nine days old. After that, he made amazing strides, and after 82 days in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) of the Children's Hospital of The King's Daughters, the little boy got to come home on Dec. 30, 2017. He weighed 6 pounds and 3 ounces. The Metzgers are now on the family advisory committee for the NICU.

There are 14 MOD teams so far this year and 20 corporate sponsors.

Last year the Eastern Shore raised almost \$45,000. This year's goal is \$50,000 and already \$12,000 has come in, according to Turner.

But the real goal, said Turner, is "reaching a goal of healthier moms and stronger babies."

These days, Nathan is healthy and happy. He loves mandarin oranges, peanut butter and jelly, and grilled cheese sandwiches. A big fan of "Sesame Street" with a strong admiration for Elmo, the little red muppet, he can also be found any given evening playing with the family dog, Juno.

"Juno loves him and he loves Juno," said Nathan.

There may also be a future in music for the little fellow, who loves the drums.

"My dad is a pastor and last Sunday we sat him up with his own drums," said Le'Andra. "He is very musically inclined."

And he is a little flirt. His first words were spoken at day care: "Hey babe," which is also how his mom answers the phone when his dad calls.


