# A Kid-Friendly Guide to Chincoteague Island

Chincoteague and Assateague islands boast some of the most beautiful landscapes and unique activities the Eastern Shore has to offer, not to mention the home of the world-famous wild ponies! The streets are also lined with local businesses and eateries that are sure to give anyone a day-or weekend-getaway they need to escape the mainland hustle and bustle. But for those of us Shore-folk that have little fillies and colts of our own, finding kid-friendly summer activities are at the top of our to-do lists. Have no fear! All summer long, my 8-year-old daughter, Isabella, will be bringing you kid-tested and approved activities all across the islands to help fill out your schedule. Take a look at our top 18 things we plan to do, in no particular order, at some point this summer around the islands, and if you see us out and about, don't hesitate to say hello and share your own experiences. There's really something for "every pony" to enjoy!

## 1. Ride the Pony Express

We've always seen the signs and heard about the trolley rides, but wanted to make sure it was a priority this summer for us to finally be able to experience it for ourselves. For just 25 cents, a person can ride the green or red route around the island.

## 2. Explore the Lighthouse

This is one we are both particularly excited to do, as neither of us have had an opportunity to explore a lighthouse,

let alone Assateague's. A prominent landmark as one drives through the refuge, we've always said we wanted to stop and see it, but haven't gotten the chance. It is a particularly beautiful view at sunset from the ground, so I cannot begin to imagine the view from the lighthouse itself. This is at the top of our list!

# 3. Bike Ride the Assateague Trail

Another one we are excited to do, as we love to ride our bikes. I grew up on Seaside in Machipongo, so we would frequently take long rides to the marsh. Now, we live a block from the beach in the town of Cape Charles, so we bike ride everywhere when the weather is nice. We plan to pack a lunch and spend a good part of the day riding and exploring.

# 4. Visit the NASA Wallop's Flight Facility Visitor Center

This made our list as a great rainy day activity. As much as we love spending time outdoors, we know Mother Nature is not going to be cooperative every weekend during the summer months. We tried to plan some inside-but still funthings we can do, and what is even better, is that this is also a great educational experience. There are also some free upcoming events, such as the Youth Art Contest, "Apollo's 50th Anniversary," for kids in grades pre-K through 12. 

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# Banners Fly for Veterans

Displayed high and proud, 102 banners have been erected across the island this week in honor of Chincoteague residents and immediate family members, both past and present, who have served during a time of armed conflict. Many family and friends of the honorees can pass by the banners and be reminded of their beloved veteran or active duty member, and give a nod of gratitude to their endless sacrifices this Memorial Day holiday.

Since its inception in 2015, the Chincoteague American Legion Post 159 Auxiliary has offered the Hometown Heroes Banner Program to recognize military residents, or those that have immediate family, on the Island. The Town of Chincoteague positions the banners along the streets of Chincoteague at no cost. This is the second year the town has displayed banners of veterans; in the first three years, only those on active duty were decorated to line the many streets across town.

Now in year five, there are a total of 77 veteran banners, and 25 active duty, for a distinguished total of 102. When looking up at this year's displays, admirers will notice four Lighthouse Service veterans are also included, a first in the lineup.

This year, among those honored was E-4 Petty Officer Third Class Koby Linton, whose banner hangs on Ridge Rd. "He is currently serving 3,000 miles away, and things like this make him feel closer to home, and honored to be a part of such a great tribute," said his mother, Lisa Tyler Linton.

E5 Petty Officer Second Class Randy S. Bowden Jr.'s place is overlooking the corner of Main and Cleveland streets.

Standing underneath the Island Theatre marquee, you can look right to find a 3-by-5-foot reminder of the service of Sergeant MAJ E-9 Richard Martin Fecteau of the U.S. Marine Corps (1943-1970).

The banners will fly until Labor Day, unless a case of bad weather is impeding, in which they will be taken down to avoid damage. The banners will be presented at the annual ceremony held on Veterans Day, Nov. 11.


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

bike, and golf cart rentals, fishing, shuffleboard, jumping pillow, and activity room. We will also be bringing our miniature schnauzer, Ollie, as there is also a dog park on the property.

## 6. Eat...Well, Everywhere.

I mean, who doesn't love to eat? We sure do! Bella won a local pie-eating contest, if this tells you anything. By the end of the summer, we would like to say we have had a dining experience at all the local eateries. To date, we've only actually eaten at the Island Creamery, (more times than we can count) so we need to up our Chincoteague restaurant game. The top of our list is Pico Taqueria. Anytime we've been on the island, this highly recommended staple has unfortunately been closed, and we are suckers for some good tacos. Not every kid enjoys eating as much as mine does, but because I know the moment the wheels get off the causeway, she'll say, "Mom, I'm hungry," I knew it needed to make our list. Black Narrows Brewery is also at the top of our (my) list.

# 7. Check Out the Touch Tank at Tom Cove's Visitor Center

This is more of an activity to add in with other plans, as it is a 30-minute activity, but nonetheless, Bella would like to pop in to experience the touchtank aquarium they have set up, which features marine life such as horseshoe crabs and conchs. Since it is open daily during the day, it's a nice break in between soaking up the hot rays all day at the beach (hint: air conditioning!)

## 8. Chincoteague Volunteer Fireman's Carnival

We love rides and all the carnival foods, obviously, because you know ... food. We will be making at least one appearance at the annual carnival. I say at least one appearance, because it seems anytime we plan to go to any carnival, we always end up on the night it decides to pour sideways and they have close early, leaving Bella sorely disappointed. Here's to already anticipating it happens at least once, but they do still honor pre-bought wristbands for situations like these, so that is food for thought.

## 9. Chincoteague Cultural Alliance Free Art Day

The Chincoteague Cultural Alliance holds a free art class for kids on the first Saturday of the month from 1 to 2 p.m. at the CCA Community Center for the Arts at 6309 Church St. They provide all the supplies needed—you just literally show up! Sounds like a pretty sweet deal, and yet another great activity you can do if the weather turns sour. With how creative and talented my daughter is (I'm not the least bit biased, I promise), I know she will absolutely love the opportunity to indulge in a little summer creativity, which will be taught by CCA artist volunteers. The first one of the summer will be held June 1, in honor of International Children's Day.

#### 10. Guided Kavak Tour

I've never actually participated in a guided kayak tour anywhere, nor has Bella, but we love ponies, and although we own our own horses and ride almost daily, we still get excited, yell, and point and yell "horse" whenever we see one. The thought of getting to explore the island off the beaten path by water, with the chance of getting a different view of the wild ponies, is definitely one we are putting on our to-do list.

## 11. Attend the Blueberry Festival

I think its self-explanatory, considering, well, again with the food. But, we have this one on our list because we've never had the pleasure of attending, and they will be celebrating 32 years this summer. It is said to be the largest fine arts and crafts show on the Shore, and then there is all the food, including muffins, pancakes, and old fashioned blueberry shortcake. I'm craving breakfast just thinking about it. With nonstop live music all weekend long, it's an event we are not going to miss. # 12. Check Out the Local Libraries and Book Stores

Bella loves to read, and she frequents our local Cape Charles library. This was a must on our list, and another nice, rainy day activity for when the weather doesn't want to be our friend. We will definitely be spending some time at Sundial Books and the Chincoteague Island Library. Although a little young for Bella, the Chincoteague Island Library offers Tales for Tots Thursdays at 10 a.m. for those that have tinier little ones.

# 13. Test All the Slides at Maui Jack's

Who's been to the super cool new waterpark? Not us, as Bella will be the first to remind me. We planned a day last summer, but things got busy and we never ended up being able to go, much to my daughter's dismay. This is No. 1 on her list, no doubt, as she's asked me repeatedly when we are going. I keep reminding her we'd like it to be sunny and warm, not cold and rainy, which has seemed to be the theme recently. This is definitely a midsummer activity. She's impatient though, and is totally "that kid" who is perfectly fine swimming in a freshly filled plastic kiddie pool with ice-cold water, so I'm sure I'll hear about it daily until we finally go. She's trying to get me to cave for a May date. I'm thinking July. May the odds be ever in my favor, because I'm not as thick-skinned about water temperature as she is.

#### 14. Pet the Ponies Behind McDonald's

Bella has pet the ponies every time, and I mean, every-single-time, we've been on the island during the day. And I'll admit, I've stopped to pet them with my group of adult friends on our way out for the night—we all did, in my defense—there's no shame in our pony game. But, we always wondered who these ponies were, and why they were tucked in this particular place. It was a question posed by Bella, who did some investigating to find out the mystery (mystery to us, at least) of the ponies behind the Chincoteague McDonald's.

#### 15. Play A Round of Mini Golf

There are two mini golf courses on Maddox, Funland and Surfside, with Funland also offering other kid-friendly activities such as go-karts, an arcade,

and launch pad. This would be a nice after-dinner experience, which is what we plan to do.

#### 16. Swing at the Veteran's Memorial Park

We've gone by Chincoteague's only free playground a few times, with Bella always asking if we can stop. This summer, she'll get her chance. She'll get her time to swing, and it's conveniently located next to a free fishing pier that the kids can also take advantage of while in the area, which brings us to No. 17...

#### 17. Go Crabbing and Catch Fish Off the Pier

No individual fishing license required for the pier next to the Veteran's Memorial Park (if you plan to throw a line over a different pier, you'll need to check the regulations, as there are both public and private piers on the islands). We plan to bring our own gear and check out both the park's pier, as well as the one at Robert Reed Park, and take a photo op with the LOVE chairs.

# 18. Chincoteague Cultural Alliance Cinema Nights

This is such a neat idea, and for people who love the outdoors, this is a must. CCA offers free films under the stars all summer long in Robert Reed Downtown Waterfront Park, with the films beginning at dusk. Bring a chair or blanket to lounge on, and refreshments are offered. We have pencilled in the Aug. 8 showing of "Wall-E," which is the most kid-friendly film on the list. # Honorable Mention:

## 1. Farmer's and Artisans Market

This may not be a kid-friendly activity for everyone, but it deserves an honorable mention in our book, as my daughter enjoys fresh veggies and locally grown organic foods, as well as shopping for unique jewelry and art, as mentioned on the CCA website. The market is held Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. through Oct. 26, and Wednesdays June 12-Aug. 28. Second Saturday Artful Flea Market also takes place at 6309 Church St. and will also offer a variety of local art, crafts, and antiques until 2 p.m, every second Saturday until Oct. 12.

#### 2. Assateague Beach

This one is kind of a given, but we still plan to spend a few days posted up on the beach. We've been plenty of times before, and it never gets old seeing the occasional pony spotting.

#### 3. Pony Swim and Auction

I have attended the auction before, but I have never experienced the pony swim, nor has Bella. Unfortunately, we will be in Oklahoma that week because she is competing in Arabian Youth Nationals, but seeing the ponies up-close, and experiencing the tradition that has taken place for 95 years is something the whole family will not want to miss, and one worth mentioning for those that have never had the pleasure of attending at least once. There are children that save up their pennies—yes, I've seen jars of literal pennies—to buy a coveted Chincoteague pony. Nothing like the joy on a little one's face after realizing they've just won not only a new member of their family, but they are now a small piece of Island



Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

The weather has gotten hotter, so has the fishing. Increasing numbers of speckled tout, sheepshead, black drum, and even early season cobia have highlighted the angling activity through the week. Small rockfish, most under the 20-inch minimum size limit, can be found along almost any creek entrance on the upper bayside of the peninsula. Flounder numbers have had a slight increase, but the ratio of keepers to throwbacks has fallen.

Cobia have already begun to show up in Virginia waters and have become an increasing bycatch in the lower shore black drum fishery. A few cobia have already been reportedly sighted as far north as Onancock! The season for keeping a cobia does not open until June 1 and anglers must have a permit to keep one. The permit is free and is available online at <a href="https://webapps.mrc.virginia.gov/public/mpermits/index.php">https://webapps.mrc.virginia.gov/public/mpermits/index.php</a>

A group of local fishing enthusiasts and charter captains have organized a project intent on increasing the number of artificial reefs available to anglers off the coast of the Eastern Shore. The group has chosen the name, "Chincoteague Wachapreague Reef Project" and the organization has a Facebook page and a website, which can be found at <a href="https://www.shorereefs.org">www.shorereefs.org</a>

Lower Shore – Mark Snook, at Chris' Bait & Tackle, reports that anglers are catching black drum, with a few red drum mixed in, outside of Fisherman's Island. Increasing numbers of sheepshead and cobia are showing up in the black drum fishery. Sea mullet numbers are increasing on the bayside. Anglers fishing off the Kiptopeke State Park Pier have been finding a mixture of small panfish, including puffers, sea mullet, and small bluefish. Flounder catches have come from inside the Ditch, near Wise Point.

Jeb Brady, of Bailey's Bait & Tack-

being landed, but angers will have to wait until June 1 to keep one for the table. The Cape Charles pier produced some nice sea mullet (whiting) catches over the weekend.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, reports that a few flounder are being caught, but it still has not been "hot and heavy." On his best day of the week, Paul and crew landed 10 flounder, of which only two were keepers. Paul did mention the drains of Drawing Channel as one of the locations that anglers were concentrating their efforts. On the bright side, black drum and striped bass catches were coming from inside the inlet and along the surf.

Chincoteague – Jimmy Vasilou, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reported that anglers were limiting out on black sea bass, while fishing on the offshore wrecks. The largest seabass were in excess of 4 pounds. Inside the inlet, flounder action was reported in the Assateague Channel. The largest flounder weighed in https://webapps. mrc.virginia.gov/public/mpermits/index.php the shop over the weekend weighed 5 pounds, 8 ounces. A few bluefish were caught inside the bay, the largest was almost 4 pounds. Fishing off the beach was a little slower during the week but picked up on Sunday with catches of black drum, stripers, puffers, kingfish (whiting), and a sheepshead. Whiting catches were also being made in the inlet.

Donna Rae Roeske, at the Captain Bob's Marina, reports that schools of snapper blues have been working their way from just outside the inlet into the canal. Kingfish (whiting) are being caught from buoys 11 to 14. Kingfish action was almost guaranteed for anglers soaking live bloodworms or bloodworm-scented Fishbites in this area. Flounder numbers saw a bit of an increase over the week. Roeske said that

savvy flounder anglers were employing a variety of different baits and rigs to secure their catches. Live minnows, silversides, smelt, squid, and Berkley Gulp Swimming Mullet were being used in a myriad of combinations. Roeske named Wallops Island, Cockle Creek, Watts Bay, and near the swing bridge as areas that produced fish last week. By Monday, keeper flounder had moved into the main channels with fish up to 20- nches landed in the Chincoteague Channel between Beebe Road and Captain Bob's.

Upper Shore - Captain Matt Abell, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported that speckled trout catches have picked up in the creeks of the middle bay, where keeper-sized rockfish and some red drum were also being found. Josh Harrison landed rockfish to 28 inches. Topwater baits and paddletails were some of the more productive lures mentioned. Abell said that the flounder fishing was "not bad," as the water had finally cleared. Customers reported finding more fish, but not necessarily more keepers. Customers returning from the fishing the area near the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel had

black drum catches and reports of cobia releases. Ray Johns and Bill Petka had cobia releases of 46 and 52 inches, respectfully. Matt said that he had not heard of much from Assateague, but the beach on Wallops Island produced at least one red drum as well as rockfish over the weekend.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year. Bill is an I.G.F.A. International Committee Representative and a longtime member of the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament Committee. He is the Virginia Recreation Fishing representative on the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Panel and is a past recipient of the CCA-VA Virginia Outdoor Writer Conservation Leadership Award.
