Red Light, Yellow Light, Green Light: Go! All The Ways To Get Around The Island

Traffic on the island can be a bit heavy in the summer months, especially along Maddox heading towards the beach. Sometimes, it can even cause a hefty backup through the refuge gates due to the payment of entry fees. Visitors, however, have resources all across the island that will help them ditch their regularly scheduled wheels for something that will make exploring much more enjoyable, and possibly cause less hassle going to and from your destination.

One of the most convenient transportation options during the season is the Pony Express, the island's trolley system. The trolley runs from 5 to 10:25 p.m., and costs just 25 cents a ride. Many stops are within walking distance to hotels and popular spots. It is also wheelchair accessible, so anyone is able to enjoy this amenity. Another popular mode of transportation is the bicycle. Maddox is home to numerous bike rental sites, offering options for everyone in the family. Traveling by bicycle gives visitors a chance to explore parts of the island that are off the beaten path, get a little exercise, enjoy the warm salty air, and maybe even see a pony.

There are over 15 miles of bike trails scattered around both Chincoteague and the National Wildlife Refuge. Each trail offers a different experience. The refuge offers scenic landscapes, wildlife, and fo-

liage, while the trails on Chincoteague give views of historic buildings and other pieces of island history. Information, maps, and details on the refuge trails can be found on the refuge's website at www.fws.gov/refuge/chincoteague/visit/trails.html Maps and details on the Chincoteague trails can be found at www.chincoteague.com/Chinco-biking-Brochure.pdf

Be sure to check to see if pets are permitted on certain trails—many, including parts of Chincoteague's pine forest trail, and the refuge trails, prohibit pets.

Bike rental options include Fun on Wheels (www.funonwheelsci.com), The Bike Depot (www.refugebikes.com), and Jus' Bikes (www.jus-bikes.com). All three businesses are located along Maddox Boulevard. Some offer tandem bikes (built for two). Don't forget helmets—all accessories are also available for rent.

There are also other fun ways to get around on the island, including scooters, mopeds, buggies, golf carts, three-wheelers, and low-speed vehicles. Larger rentals have two- to six-person options available. Keep in mind that mopeds are not allowed on trails and will not be given free access to the refuge, as bicycles are.

Of course, there is always the option of walking, and there are beautifully situated walking paths for visitors to take advantage of, many of which are only allowed access by foot. Take a stroll down Main Street to check out the local shopping and dining options with a pit stop at the Robert Reed Waterfront Park, a hike to the refuge and Marsh Trail, or take the walk-only trek to the Assateague Lighthouse.

Not feeling the wheels but still want to be transported? Many boat and kayak tours are also available. Both offer different options depending on the experience, with many offering tours around the refuge for pony-spotting. Many locals have said this is the best—and most unique—way to get a look at the four-legged icons that live on the refuge. Oh, the places you'll go! This week, we loaded up the bikes and headed to the Chincoteague Wildlife Refuge to do some exploring on two wheels. With all the beauty that lies on the refuge, we knew this would be an adventure—to be able to pedal through spots we haven't seen during drives through the refuge and hopefully spot some of the island's wildlife (and maybe even a pony, as Bella was hoping for) during our quest.

We parked and unloaded on Chincote-ague, keeping in mind that the refuge's gate fees of \$20 weekly or \$40 for the season are waived if you walk or bicycle your way in. We are glad we did this, because as soon as we were almost to the refuge gates, we spotted a doe and her two tiny fawns grazing in the woods just off the bike path. You do have a little bit of a trek to the refuge, but there are plenty of places to stop if you need a break, like Bella, since the bridge goes uphill as you get closer. You can even bring your crabbing gear and stop at the little pier nestled on the left side of the bridge.

Once through the gates, the bike trail wraps through the trees and filters you to the trail parking lot. At one end of the parking lot, there is the hike-only, half-mile Marsh Trail. If you continue straight, you will hit the Wildlife Loop, which is what we took. You can also take a right and take the trail that leads towards the lighthouse and visitor center area, but we opted for the more scenic route.

Let me just say the loop is long. Make sure you give yourself plenty of time to relax and explore. There are plenty of benches located along the path to stop and take a break or picnic if you've brought snacks. I think Bella stopped at every one to either sit and break or to stand and look for ponies and other animals.

Speaking of what to bring, definitely bring bug spray! The mosquitos, especially through the wooded parts at the beginning of the trail, were terrible. We would also suggest bringing a bottle of water, as the trail is long, and depending on the time of day, you will want to hydrate. We went in the afternoon on a weekday, and it was a cloudy day with a nice breeze going, otherwise, we would have picked an evening time to go, as we were shooting for a cooler temperature option so we didn't have to bake in the sun.

About one-third of the way along the 3.2-mile loop there is a path that takes you up to Beach Road, called Black Duck Trail. It is a one-mile long biking and walking route only and goes through the woods to bring you to pony viewing areas. From the end of Black Duck, you can route left to head toward the beach or right to wrap back around toward the visitor center and lighthouse. If you

head left and travel the route it will take you to another 1.6-mile trail, Woodland, that wraps around another pony viewing area. We turned around and headed back to the loop, as we wanted to continue along there and avoid the heavy traffic that was on Beach Road. I will note that during the time we were on the loop, cars were also permitted, as it is a paved road. Pets are not permitted on the trails or refuge.

Heading back along the loop, a little ways down from Black Duck is another half-mile bike/hike trail called Swan Cove. This one takes you directly to the beach path. You will have to park your bike and walk just a little ways.

There are maps and signs along the loop that you can look to for help, as well as information on what wildlife you may see, such as whitetail deer, migratory waterfowl, great blue herons, bobwhite quail, river otters, and black rat snakes (we didn't run into any). We saw a lot of waterfowl and songbirds; otters and quail

were said to only be spotted depending on the season. The loop was incredibly peaceful. The ocean breeze bending the lush greenery, the lighthouse peeking over the tree line—it was a nice way to spend the afternoon. No pony sightings for Bella though. We will plan another day to just do the Woodland Trail and hopefully have a better chance of ponies.

Once back on the loop, it wraps all the way around Snow Goose Pool and back to the parking lot at the start. From here, take the trail back through the refuge gates, up the bridge, and back to Chincoteague. It took us about two hours, but I would add another hour or two if you opt to travel across Beach Road to the Woodland Trail. We biked to the refuge, but you can always drive and pay the fee, and park in the parking lots at the front of the refuge, or even park down at the beach and follow the maps to the bike trails. There are so many options, you can choose your own path and create your own family adventure!






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



Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



The 3rd Annual Croaker Classic Fishing Tournament to benefit the Onancock Volunteer Fire Department will be held Saturday, August 10, out of the Onancock Town Wharf. For information, call 757-710-2050 or 757-710-2731.

Lower Shore – Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Tackle Shop, reported that cobia fishing has been great with fish up to 50 inches long coming from the buoy 36A area. Anglers targeting cobia in the evenings have also recorded releases of large red drum. Spanish mackerel schools with some bluefish mixed in are still roaming the lower bay. Flounder catches were reported from inside the Ditch. The Cape Charles pier has produced some decent sized spot as well as gray trout catches.

Chris Snook, of Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported spadefish are still concentrated around the fourth island of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Anglers targeting flounder are drifting around the fourth island and jigging the bridge pilings. Snook said that Spanish mackerel fishing has been good from off Cape Charles south to the ocean side of the bridge. Red drum are showing up in increasing numbers in the evenings, just as spot numbers are on the rise. Croakers are still on



the small side out of Oyster, though one boat kept 230 fish on Saturday. Cobia anglers who are bait fishing are having to deal with sharks.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, reported that "there is a little something going on" for the anglers fishing out of Wachapreague. Flounder are being caught both inside the inlet and out on the wrecks. Inside, kingfish (whiting) some "decent" sized spot, and croakers of various sizes have been hitting. Spanish mackerel are being caught from outside the inlet. Offshore, dolphin and billfish are being caught, but tuna catches have been scarce.

Chincoteague - Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, reported flounder action continues to be good on both sides of the Queen Sound Bridge, as well as inside the Chincoteague Channel, where the area around buoy 17 has been particularly productive. Other locations that have produced keeper-sized flounder include the town pier, the areas off Memorial Park, Tom's Cove, and inside of Assateague Channel. Cobia have made an appearance and Roeske wants to remind everyone that a VMRC permit with mandatory reporting is required to target cobia and the minimum legal length for the one fish per person limit is 40 inches. From buoy 15 all the way outside the inlet, anglers have encountered a mixed bag, including Spanish mackerel, kingfish (whiting), and sharks. Surf fishermen are finding the usual summertime species, including spot, kingfish, bluefish, sharks, rays, and the occasional Spanish mackerel. A little farther offshore, flounder, spadefish, triggerfish, and sea bass are still hanging around the subway cars. Tuna, dolphin, and billfish are being encountered in the blue water.



& Tackle, reports that flounder fishing continues to be productive inside Chincoteague Bay as well as out on the wrecks. Schools of croaker have also moved into the bay. Chincoteague continues to have a banner year on Spanish mackerel, the best in recent memory, according to Vasiliou. The Spanish mackerel's larger cousin, the king mackerel have been caught as close in as just three miles off the inlet. Spadefish and triggers continue to provide action on the inshore wrecks, while gaffer dolphin and the occasional yellowfin tuna are being encountered farther offshore.

Upper Shore – Allan Ring, of the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported flounder fishing was spotty, with some of the best action still being found around the seaside inlets. The "normal" baits have all been effective such as combinations of live minnows or frozen silversides with Berkley Gulps, Bob's Your Uncles, and Fish Bites. Over on the Chesapeake, Allan said that Spanish mackerel are now being caught as far north as Hoopers Island in the middle bay. The best action is occurring on Clark Spoons pulled behind inline weights or small planers.

Speckled trout and rockfish are in the shallows and have been hitting Bass Assassin paddletail baits on jigheads. In the deeper water, small bottom dwellers such as spot, kingfish (whiting), and croakers are being caught over the oyster rocks and along ledges on bloodworms, Fish Bites, and peeler crab baits. A little farther to our north, 403 boats are competing for a portion of the approximately \$6.1 million purse in the 46th Annual White Marlin Open, out of Ocean City. Md. Fishing wraps up on Friday and we hope to have the winners listed in next week's edition.

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
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
